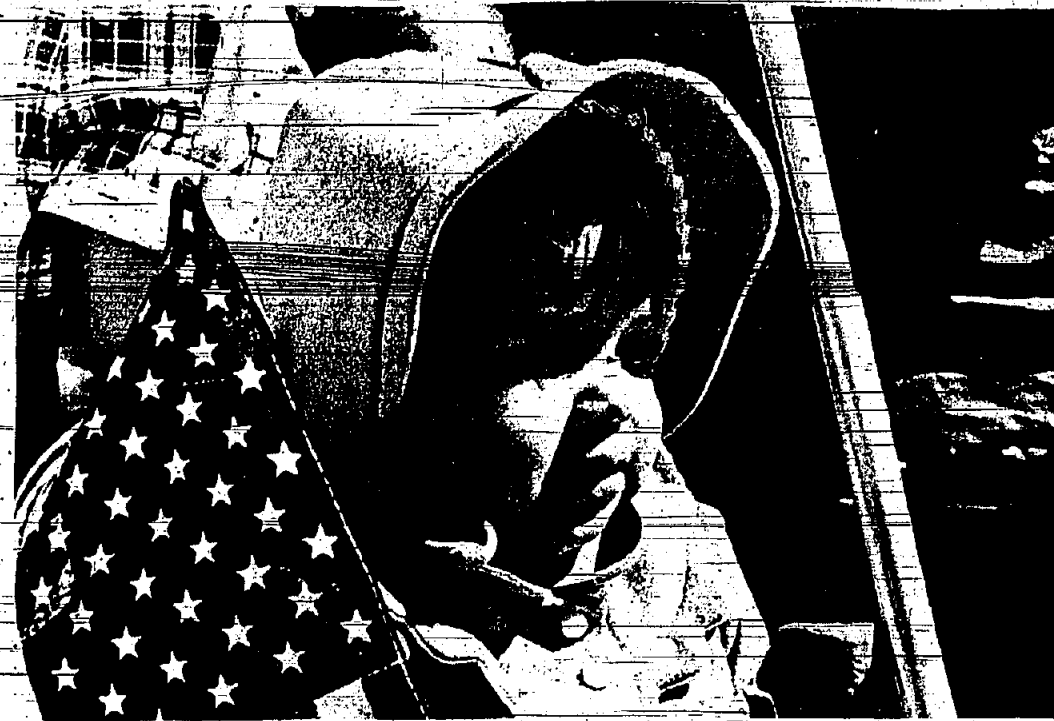


Huge Crowds Gather-Watch Annual Memorial

\$800 Exemption Forms Now Available at Tax Office

Wilbert W. Layne, Secretary of the Board of Tax Assessors of Springfield, has announced that application forms for persons 65 years of age or over who wish to claim the \$800 exemption on their dwellings are now available at his office.

The recently enacted law permits this exemption to those who, as of October 1, 1960—

- were 65 years old or over;
- citizens of the United States;
- legally domiciled within the State of New Jersey for not less than three years immediately prior to October 1, 1960;
- resided in and owned the dwelling house for which exemption is claimed.

In addition, claimants must have had an annual income, during the applicable income period, from all sources of not more than \$5,000.

The completed application form, Mr. Layne said, must be filed with him on or before July 1, 1961 to be eligible for the \$800 exemption from the assessed valuation of the claimant's dwelling-house for the tax year 1961. Proof of age, as well as proof of income, may accompany the application.

While all applications will be accepted by the assessor's office up to July 1, 1961, the claimant must be prepared to submit proof that all requirements have been met before the exemption will be granted.

Hohn Elected Fellow of Science Teacher's Group

At the annual meeting of the New Jersey State Science Teachers' Association, Walter Hohn of Springfield was elected as a Fellow of the Association, Mr. Hohn is Coordinator of the science programs of the Union County Regional High School District Number 1. Mr. Hohn represents the seventh science teacher to be elected as a Fellow of the New Jersey State Science Teachers' Association by its executive committee.

Local CC Nominates Boardmen

The nominating committee of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, elected by the Board of Directors, has selected the following nominees for the vacancies to be filled on the Board:

James Cawley, Henry Grabarz, and Jack Sufelman, 3-year terms; Carl Becker and Henry McMullen, 2-year unexpired term; and Saul Freeman, 1-year unexpired term.

Additional nominations may be made by any five members in good standing. The nominations may not exceed the number of Board vacancies to be filled. These five members must submit a proposal in writing to the Secretary for such nominations. The additional nominations must be submitted within one week after receipt by the members of the list of nominees selected by the Nominating Committee.

If there are more nominations than there are vacancies to be filled, the secretary will prepare ballots containing the names of all nominees arranged in alphabetical order. The secretary will mail the ballots to each member in good standing with instructions that the ballots be returned to the Chamber office within one week.

The president will appoint five tellers who will count the returned ballots and declare elected those nominees who have received the highest number of ballots.

If there are not additional nominees at the expiration of the time allowed, the secretary will cast a ballot declaring the nominees of the Nominating Committee unanimously elected.

US in Twilight Zone Between War and Peace Says Bonadies

A clear and sunny day with light breezes brought out thousands of Springfielders to witness and participate in the annual Memorial Day parade Tuesday morning. Springfield led this year's parade; Millburn was in the second section.

Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies of Springfield spoke at the closing ceremonies and described the world as being in "a twilight zone between war and peace." The mayor said the world is on the threshold of what may prove to be a disastrous war or lasting peace.

He asked those people who were gathered for the ceremony to observe a moment of silent prayer for the success of President Kennedy's talk with Russian Premier Khrushchev "so there will be need for no further war memorials."

He stressed the President had asked the American people for "renewed sacrifices" to reestablish and maintain this nation's position of world leadership.

The parade started and ended in front of the Springfield Municipal Building and made stops at the Presbyterian and Methodist cemeteries for memorial services.

Local groups who participated in the parade were the police department, harmony band, fire department reserves, American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, VFW, VFW Auxiliary, First Aid Squad, First Aid Auxiliary, high school band, Civil Air Patrol, Elks Club, Lions Club, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Firewites and Cub Scouts.

Editor, Sun,

The present attempt to have the Board of Freeholders build an expensive white elephant in the form of an elaborate vocational school is clear evidence that it should waste not time devising ways and means to abolish the present vocational-technical school it is now operating on Morris Avenue. If not, it may find itself becoming so involved in the field of education, where it really has no business being, that later when it realizes what an impossible task it has embarked upon, it will be very difficult for it to disengage itself.

Already, it is obvious that just as Rumlle Hospital is, so is this school developing into a political football. Hospitals and education are too important to be involved in politics and so the sooner they are taken out of politics the better.

With all due respect to the Freeholders, their record of operating Rumlle Hospital is hardly one that is conducive to confidence in their ability to run any such enterprise, much less a school of this size.

Despite this, if the Board does go ahead, then, in order to be fair to all, it should make every conceivable trade available. It would be the rankest favoritism to give training for machinists or carpenters and not ballet dancers or barbers. Since it is obviously impossible to provide all the vocations, it should provide none and it has precedent for such action. In our public schools as it is impossible to provide the religious education satisfactory to all the different denominations, no religious instruction is provided.

If the Board wishes to avoid future headaches, as well as tremendous expense, let it get out of the educational training business forthwith.

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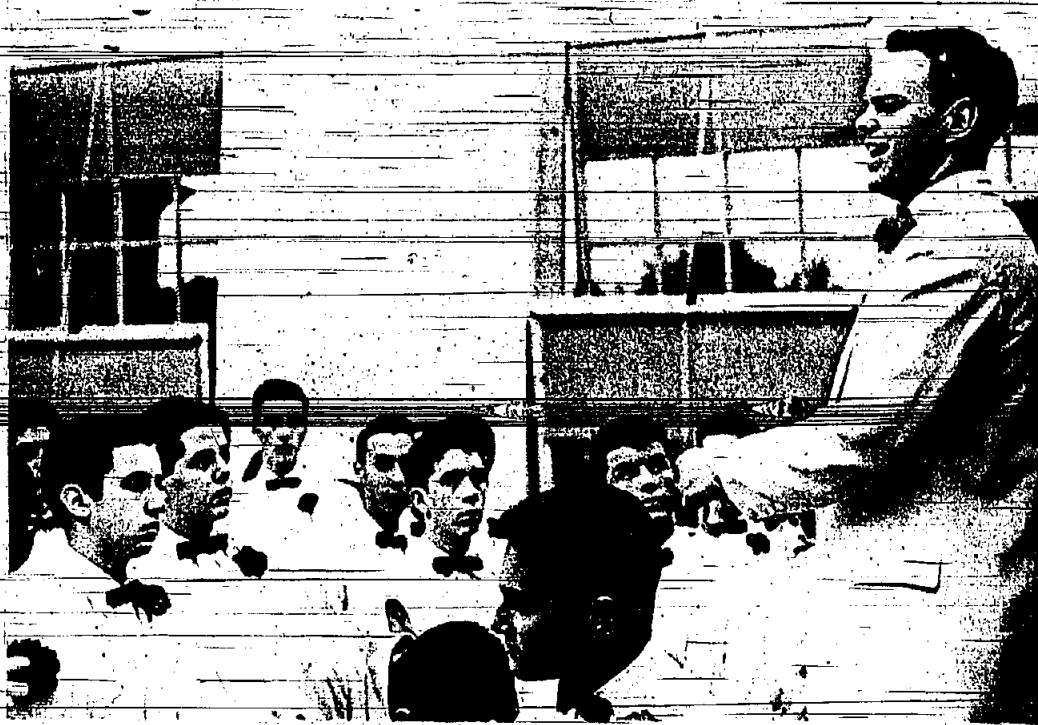

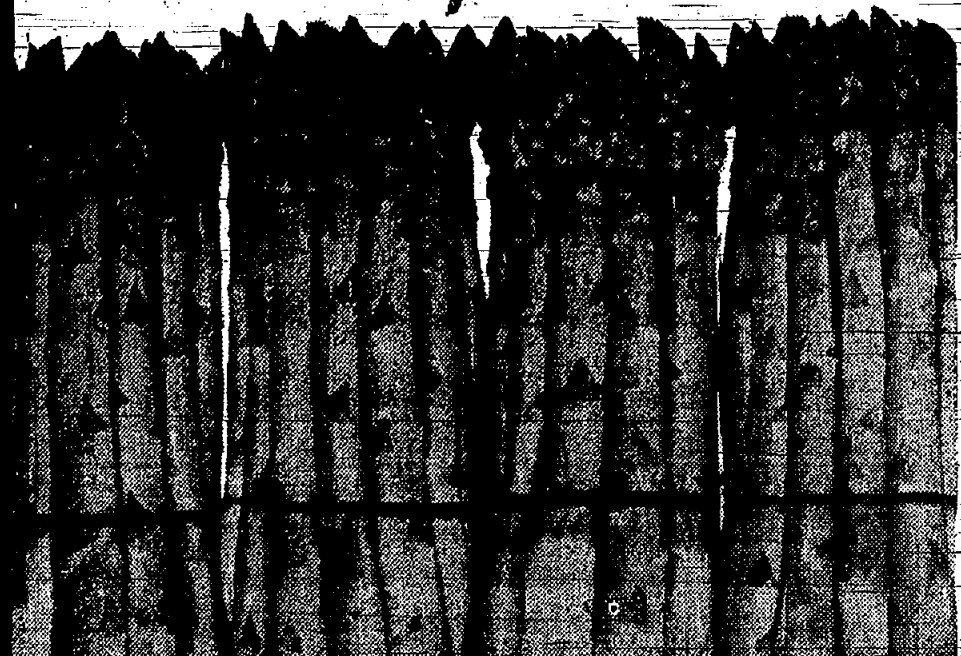

James M. Symington, retired president of Public Service Coordinated Transport, died Sunday night in Mary Imogene Dwyer Hospital, Cooperstown, New York, after a brief illness. He was 66.

Mr. Symington entered the hospital last week and underwent surgery Friday. He and his wife, the former Cecily McKim of Cooperstown, had made their home there since his retirement 2 1/2 years ago.

Mr. Symington retired October 7, 1958, a year after his election to the presidency of the transport company, a subsidiary of Public Service Electric & Gas Company. He had been the chief executive officer of the transit company since 1945, when he was appointed vice president in charge of operations.

His retirement closed a 4-year transit career, all of it with Public Service, which spanned the transition from all-trolley operation which covers the entire operation of New Jersey and operates Interstate service to New York, Philadelphia and Wilmington.

Born in New York on Dec. 7, 1894, Mr. Symington was graduated from Taft School and Yale University. He joined Public Service in 1916 as a cadet engineer and served in all phases of the operations of what then was the Transit Company.

Three years later he was made assistant superintendent of the company's Southern division. He became manager of the Essex division in 1925 and was appointed general manager in 1936.

Under Mr. Symington's direction, the company launched such innovations as regular runs to the state's three race tracks and to out-of-state tracks, special buses to baseball and football games, and trips of religious, scenic, historical and recreation.

In 1917, a year after he joined Public Service, Mr. Symington obtained a leave of absence to join the Army. He served overseas as a first lieutenant in the 23rd Infantry, 2nd Division, which was wounded at Solsona in July, 1918, and received the Silver Star and Purple Heart. He returned to Public Service in April, 1919.

Mr. Symington was active for many years in the American Transit Association, The National Association of Motor Bus Operators and other industry organizations and committees.

He was a past president of the Newark Safety Council, a member of the board of trustees of the New Jersey State Council, former member of the State's Governor's Committee for the New York and New Jersey Traffic and a former member of the Newark Chamber of Commerce. He was first commander of Public Service Post 100, American Legion, and was named commander of Public Service Essex Division Post of the Legion when it was organized in 1934.

Mr. Symington was a member of the Essex Club, and the Down Town Club of Newark and of the Besides his wife, Mr. Symington leaves a son James McKim Symington of Wilton, Conn; two daughters Mrs. Charles Garrison Meyer of Locust Valley, L.I., and Mrs. Maud Symington Van Alen of New York, and six grandchildren.

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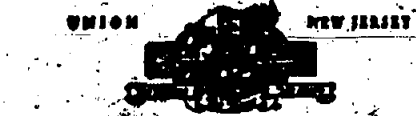
