

Channel Co. Is Planning **Bomb Shelter**

Ben_Charin_Channel Lumber Co, executive, is awaiting officialword from Springfield's governing-body to start construction on the first real bomb shelter for Springfield,

The specific $\overline{\text{loc}}$ stion of the Channel Fall Out-bomb-shelter has already been accepted by the Township authorities and actual work will start as soon as Building Inspector Robert Pellegrino

issues a building permit. According to the information in the hands of the Building Inspector's office, the Channel shelter will be constructed in the rear of the main building, next to Sam's Farm on South Spring field Avenue.

As soon as the Channel authorities and Building Inspector Pellegrino decide on the exact specifications-for-this-first-bomb shelter, the permit will be issued Mr. Pellegrino said early this week. "That the issuance of-a building_permit-should be ready in the next four or five days." Mr. Charin says the Channel shelter will be built in accordance with the best information furnished by the Civil Defense authorities and it is the hope of the Channel officials that this safety shelter _will_offer suggestions to others in this area who plan "to do something-aboutthe nuclear bomb threat." On July 27, 1953, Robert Walter, 12 Kipling Road, Springfield, was stricken with Bulbar Polio, a most severe form of the disease. The right side of Robert's body was_completely paralyzed. At first Mrs. Walker tried to give Robert the necessary physical therapy, but soon the task was too much for her to handle. 




