## Springfield Approves Basin For Drainage: Democrats Charge G.O.P. With "Give-Away"

Howard Smith and Louis Ceithaml, Democratic candidates for Springfield Township Committee, charged today that "clouds of political disgrace hang heavy over Town Hall."

Smith and Ceithaml stated that "the majority in power, those who are running the present administration headed by Township Committee candidate Philip Del Vecchio, are about to hand over a sewer package to the owners of Springfield, who are brothers of former Township Attorney Max Xherman."

Smith and Ceithaml stated that "the most amazing thing about this 'Give Away' is that the cast of characters hasn't changed a bit since the Stumpke Sewer finance of three years ago."

"At the time, the Republican dominated Township Committee tried to approve a plan whereby township funds were to be utilized for the building of a sewer for the sole benefit of the developers, who were then developing houses on Shunpike Road."

## Highway Department Closes Deals For 28 Properties On Rt. 78

The State Highway Department is making progress in the acquisition of right of way for the new Federal highway route 78, 28 deals having been completed as of last week, it is reported.

Negotiations have evidently been completed with the owners of, at least, 28 properties and deals closed with the Acquisition Division of the Highway Department.

The Highway Department is far off its schedule for the start of actual construction work on the new highway. Their engineers reported that actual digging would be started this Fall but the job of acquiring all the right of way hasn't been up to their schedule.

The report is that approximately 85 more properties are very close to deals and announcement that these have been closed and ready for transfer to the Highway Department is expected within a very short time.

### Object To New Movie Ordinance

The new ordinance to regulate and control motion picture operation in Springfield is headed for more trouble.

Objection to some of the wording in the code has been crystallizing since the ordinance passed on its first reading and a large crowd is expected next Tuesday evening when the public hearing is scheduled.

A statement issued yesterday by representatives of the group of objectors urged "citizens concerned with the vital issue of a censorship clause in ordinance to attend the public hearing next Tuesday evening and express their opinions."

The statement of the protesting group follows: "On August 14, the Township Committee heard objections to the original proposed theater ordinance which contained a censorship clause. Responding to the popular will of those in attendance at this public hearing they decided to reconsider the matter."

"On August 28 they then introduced a second proposal which will come up for final adoption on September 11, after another public hearing."

"The new censorship ordinance is much broader than its predecessor. Although not using the words 'censor' or 'thought control' or 'immorality' in the body of the ordinance, nevertheless the ordinance constitutes the Township Committee as a local court, authorized to revoke or suspend theatre licenses if a public exhibition... is injurious to public welfare, health, safety or good order, according to the standards set by the Statutes and Courts of New Jersey."

"Under this ordinance apparently the Township Committee is empowered to construe state statutes, a function normally allocated to the judiciary. It also would appear that the Township Committee has failed to legislate on the issues, and has delegated the function of the courts to themselves."

"By using such general language as 'injurious to public welfare, health, safety, or good order,' the ordinance really says nothing intelligible."

"No one can ascertain what the draftsmen have in mind. As a result no licensee could ascertain what standard is required of him."

"Substantial objection to such censorship has developed at citizens meetings. One of the principal objections is directed to the manner in which the censorship control was written into the ordinance without giving notice to the public of the real nature of the control."

Springfield Planning Board agreed to recommend to Springfield Township Committee for final approval the Springfield subdivision application calling for the construction of 35 single-family homes in Springfield at its regular meeting Tuesday night in the Municipal Building.

The proposed 54-home tract, located on Baltusrol Mountain, is also expected to consist of 19 homes in Mountaintop off Rolling Rock Road.

The developer is Isidor Sherman of 23 Londonerry Way, Summit.

The application includes the construction of a retention basin on Baltusrol Golf Club property to handle storm waters.

Motion for approval of the application was made by Vice Chairman Francis J. Keane and seconded by Mayor Philip Del Vecchio.

Other members voting yes were Board Chairman Donald S. Rotwein, Township Engineer Walter Kozub, Committee member Robert Hardgrove, Kenneth Young, and Albert Evans.

Wilbur Binder, an employee of the applicant, abstained and Azeglio Pancani Jr., celebrating his 25th wedding anniversary Tuesday night, did not attend the meeting.

Approval was given subject to the inclusion of May 17th sketches and subject to a satisfactory developer's agreement being executed between the developer and the township.

Appearing for the applicant at the meeting were Max Sherman, attorney and brother, and Richard Jeske of the engineering firm of Aurnhammer, Jeske, and Aurnhammer of Summit.

The Springfield representatives advised the board the application for final approval differed from the application for a preliminary subdivision in that a change had been made in the retention-basin plans with their relocation on Baltusrol Golf Club Property instead of an Springfield property as originally proposed.

Mayor Del Vecchio explained that at the Springfield Township Committee in April, it was felt that the location of the basin would be more suitable at a natural confluence of streams on the golf course.

Baltusrol Golf Club is willing to let us use two acres of its property for the basin, he said.

The mayor said: "Baltusrol did this as a community service and

neighborly attitude and is commendable on their part to show they want to work with the community."

Mayor Del Vecchio stressed that the basin will once and for all wipe out the problem of handling the water draining in the area as the mountain property is developed. It was reported that all future developers in that area will be required to pipe their water to the basin.

It was reported the basin would be built by the developer (Mr. Sherman) and maintained by the township just as it handles other municipal drainage systems such as storm sewers.

Access to township maintenance would be gained from the Springfield property with a gate installed in the Baltusrol club fence in the area.

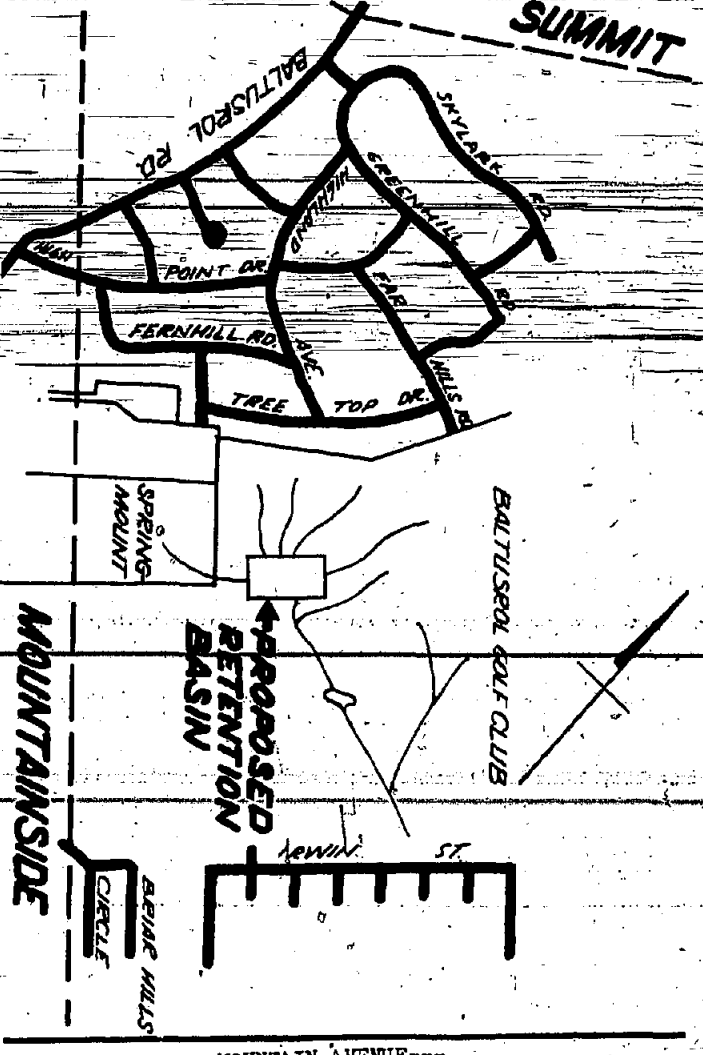
Chairman Rotwein declared that he was "quite pleased and satisfied." He continued, "All the engineers agreed that this (putting the basin on Baltusrol property) was the proper thing to do. It is excellent that they (Baltusrol) are recognizing our problems. They are to be commended."

Committeeman Hardgrove commended the Golf Club for "its progressive attitude towards the community."

When Chairman Rotwein asked whether the basin size was adequate, he was assured by Mr. Jeske that the basin would serve the area on its complete development and pointed out that it would also alleviate the drainage problem in the Kipling Village area.

Board Member Kenneth Young who indicated skepticism in the Baltusrol offer, was advised by Mayor Del Vecchio that "there is no cost to Springfield."

After the meeting, the mayor told the Springfield Sun that he was informed through John Russell, Baltusrol Golf Club official, that the Board of Govern-

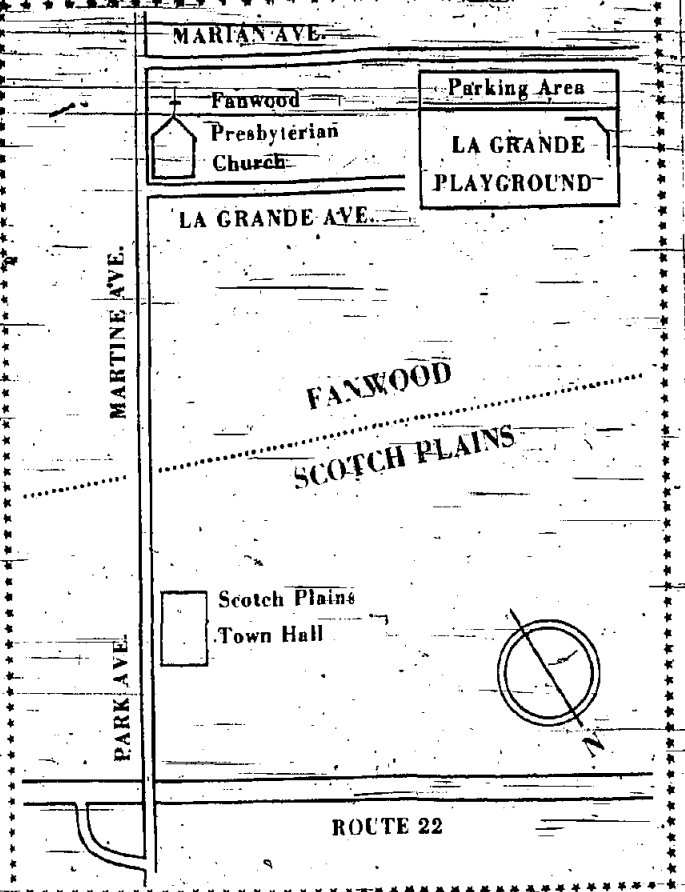

How much time under social security does a woman need to qualify if she will be 62 this year? Also, what about a man who will be 62 in 1963? A. A woman reaching age 62 in 1962 can qualify with 11 social security credits, or about 2-3/4 years of work. A man becoming 62 years of age in 1962 can qualify with 15 credits, or 3-3/4 years of work under social security. The credits do not have to be consecutive, and work as far back as 1937 counts.

# SCIENCE NOTEBOOK

BY HANS KLEIN

Evolution, thirty-seven years ago, was as lively a topic as space travel is today. Dayton, Tennessee was the scene of the famous "Evolution" trial in which John T. Scopes, a science teacher, was found guilty of teaching theories of evolution. Scopes was fined \$100, but the penalty was set aside without an expression of opinion as to the constitutionality of the law.

Evolution in Darwin's time was a hotly debated issue but gradually died in intensity, until the final, and last flare-up in the Scopes trial.

From the earliest times there was some speculation concerning evolution. However, Lamarck, Darwin, and de Vries provided the most significant theories.

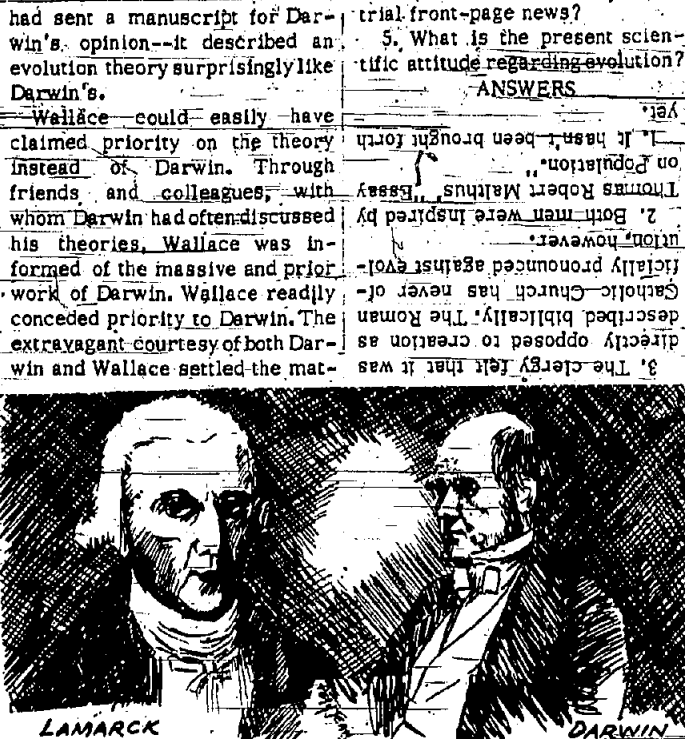
The very year of Darwin's birth Lamarck published "Zoological Philosophy" wherein he described an evolution theory he had worked on for 16 years. Lamarck's theory emphasized "use and disuse" and "inheritance of acquired characteristics".

In the years while developing his natural selection theory, Darwin, slow and cautious, was reluctant to have anything printed until one day he was shocked to receive a letter of extraordinary coincidence. From the East Indies, halfway around the world, Alfred Russell Wallace

had sent a manuscript for Darwin's opinion—it described an evolution theory surprisingly like Darwin's.

Wallace could easily have claimed priority on the theory instead of Darwin. Through friends and colleagues, with whom Darwin had often discussed his theories, Wallace was informed of the massive and prior work of Darwin. Wallace readily conceded priority to Darwin. The extravagant courtesy of both Darwin and Wallace settled the matter.

It is so amusing that this episode itself is outstanding in the history of science.

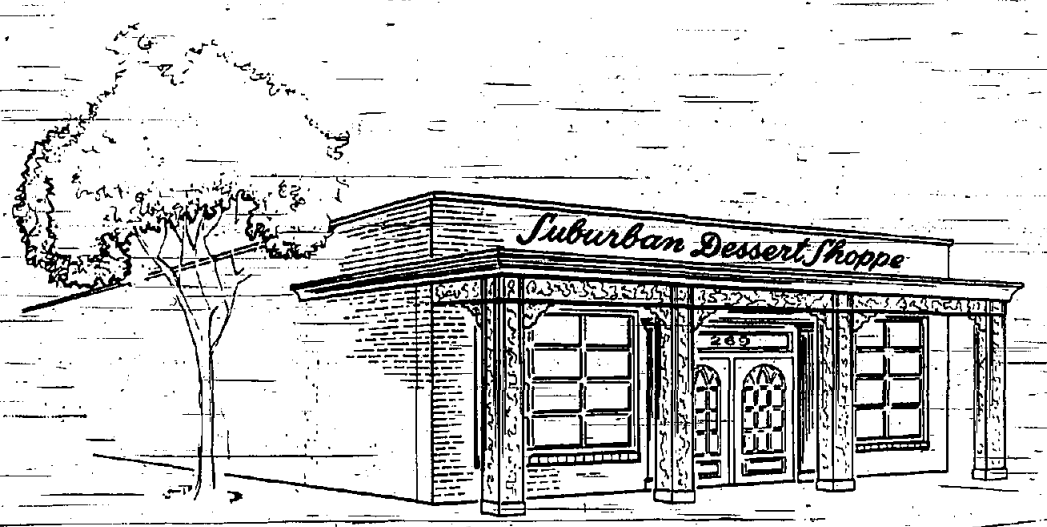

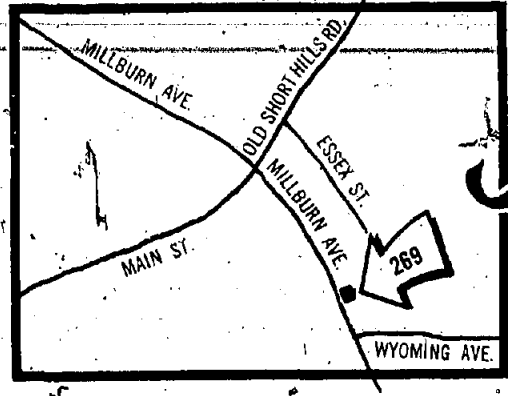

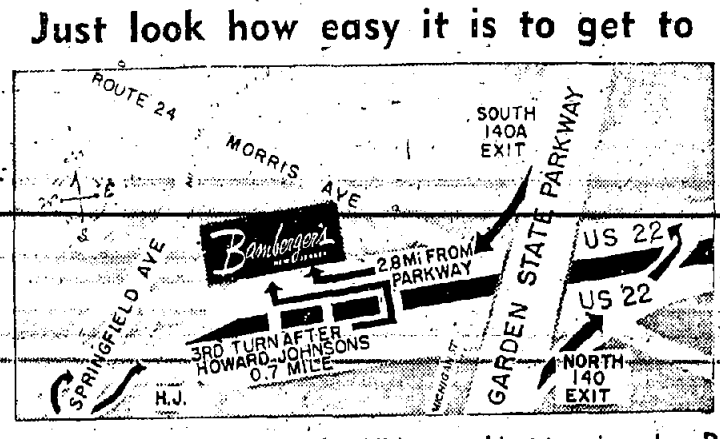
