

EDITORIAL

The SPRINGFIELD SUN is back on one of its favorite editorial topics—the Baltusrol Golf Club.

It is very commendable that the club has offered to lease, donate or permit an easement on more than 2 acres of its 463 acres for the construction of a water retention basin between the fifth, green and sixth fairway.

This was reported at last week's meeting of the Planning Board. A map, prepared in conjunction with the news, shows that the site for the proposed water-basin is just off Irwin Street.

If Baltusrol is "leasing or donating" this more than 2 acre tract—what is wrong with the SUN suggestion that the golf club consider SELLING ENOUGH LAND ADJOINING THE IRWIN STREET PLAYGROUND FOR THE PUBLIC SWIM POOL AND RECREATION AREA?

If the Swim Pool Committee and the Township are ready to offer \$20,000.00 per acre for the not very esthetic Jenco property, why shouldn't the Baltusrol Golf Club consider this price per acre for a little more land than it is reported, the club wants to "lease or donate" for this rain-water basin.

Baltusrol Golf Club did sell about 10 acres of land to the Springfield Board of Education for future school expansion—and the price was very low, said to be \$2,600. per acre.

That parcel, it is said, is in the most inaccessible part of the club's 463 acres.

However, when this land is needed the School Board, of course, would put in all the necessary utilities.

It isn't important whether or not the real estate committee of Baltusrol had this in mind when the 10 acres of trees were sold to the School Board.

However, just a few more acres than has been offered for the retention basin, added to the Irwin Street playground property, might solve the entire question of where to have the public swim pool and recreation area.

Accept Offer-Or Else!

Pressure Reported In Negotiations For Rte 78 Properties

Property owners in Springfield report that some high pressure is being used in some instances by negotiators for the Acquisition Division of the State Highway Department in making proposals for the Route 78 right of way.

The reports are that negotiators have been making arbitrary proposals for the acquisition of the property needed, and some owners have been threatened with condemnation proceedings if the figures offered are not immediately accepted.

Other reports have it that the Highway Department negotiators have offered differing amounts even though the owners originally purchased similar residences and each paid the same amount.

In one instance residences, next to each other, of the same size on the same-sized plot of land, and purchased for the same amount, brought an offer of \$500.00 more for one of the homes.

The owner of the home, offered the lesser amount, pointed out to the negotiator how many extras he had put in the home and the many improvements, but Highway Department representative refused to listen to any changes in the purchase price or explain why the same home, next door, is worth \$500.00 more.

The legal work on acquisition of Route 78 property in Springfield is being done by Summit City, Hughes, Hartlaub & Thorne, 51 Union Place. The appraisal teams are also from out of Springfield according to the reports. None of this work has been assigned to any one in Springfield, a survey shows.

Some buildings in Springfield on property needed for the highway have been sold at auction but only one, purchased by the State Highway Department, has been moved to a vacant plot of ground.

The most recent auction of a similar home brought \$1,000. for the building. This one, however, has not yet been moved to another location.

Negotiations are very near to the completion stage for a great many properties in Bryant Avenue, Park Lane and Clairmont Place area.

When the buildings on these properties are offered for sale at auction by the State Highway Department, many of the homes, originally purchased for \$27,000., may be bid in for as little as \$250.

Cawley Named As Manager For Stamler In Springfield

James M. Cawley, Township Attorney of Springfield, will spearhead election campaign activities in that municipality for Assemblyman Nelson F. Stamler, Republican candidate from Union County for the State Senate.

Cawley today was named Springfield campaign manager for Stamler by James E. Mitchell of Mountaintide, county campaign chief for the Republican candidate.

Stamler, an Assemblyman since 1959, is seeking the Senate seat vacated by the late Robert C. Crane, a Republican.

Last year, Cawley managed the successful campaign which elected all local GOP candidates, the first elected in five years in the township. In 1960 he served as Elnace chairman for the (Springfield) Republican Campaign Committee.

"The enthusiasm, energy and experience that Jim Cawley brings as campaign manager means that Springfield voters can anticipate an aggressive, informative campaign on behalf of Nelson Stamler," Mitchell said.

He is past-president of St. James Holy Name Society, member of the Springfield Historical Society and a member of the Board of Directors, Springfield Chamber of Commerce.

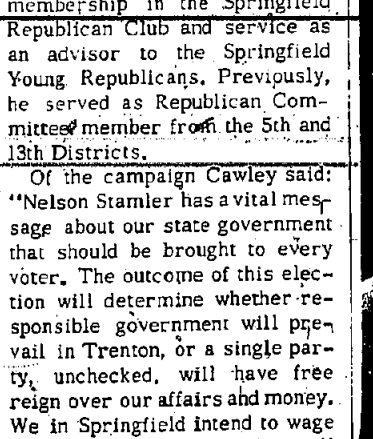
Associated with the law firm of Clancy and Clancy, Esqs., of East Orange, Cawley serves as Judge Advocate of the Union County American Legion, Presiding Justice of the Subordinate Forum, Springfield Elks Lodge, and Legal Officer of a United States Naval Reserve unit.

Cawley is Past Commandant and Judge Advocate of the Springfield American Legion. He has served as acting Springfield Magistrate and is sworn to practice before all New Jersey courts, the United States District Court, the Supreme Court and the military Court of Appeals. In addition, he is a member of the Union County Bar Association, New Jersey State Bar Association and the Catholic Lawyers Guild, and a member of the Board of Governors of Seton Hall University School of Law.

Political activities also include membership in the Springfield Republican Club and service as an advisor to the Springfield Young Republicans. Previously, he served as Republican Committee member from the 5th and 13th Districts.

Of the campaign Cawley said: "Nelson Stamler has a vital message about our state government that should be brought to every voter. The outcome of this election will determine whether responsible government will prevail in Trenton, or a single party, unchecked, will have free reign over our affairs and money. We in Springfield intend to wage an intensive campaign that will illustrate the importance of a Republican Senate and focus on Nelson Stamler's unique qualifications for the Senate seat."

Gov. Hughes Visits Springfield; Urges Democratic Victory

If there is any question on the importance of Union County—especially Springfield—in the November election, the political invasion here over the weekend should have given the answer.

Not only all the Union County big guns but the State and National political rockets were brought up to Evergreen Lodge on Sunday where the County and Municipal Democratic candidates actually got their campaigns into orbit.

Governor Richard J. Hughes, U.S. Senator Harrison A. Williams, former Governor Robert B. Meyner were among the top drawer Democrats who came to Springfield for one of the largest gatherings of Democrats ever held in this area. They asked the huge throng to help local and county Democrats to victory this year.

Governor Hughes opened his campaign Sunday to elect former Linden Mayor H. Roy Wheeler as State Senator and Mrs.

Lillian Walsh Egolf of Rahway to Congress at the first annual clambake of the Union County Democratic Committee at Old Evergreen Lodge, Springfield.

More than 2,000 Democrats heard Governor Hughes attack what he called "the vicious Senate Caucus system" and said the election of Wheeler, which will give the Democrats a 10-10 majority, will put an end to the system.

He also said that the entire state is dependent upon a Wheeler victory to help promote such legislation as Medicare, crime prevention, stronger narcotics laws, and better aid to schools instead of being bottled up by the Senate Caucus.

He predicted "A glowing victory for the Democratic Party throughout New Jersey this fall."

He said a victory for Mrs. Egolf should further enhance the chances of President Kennedy getting his legislative program

through Congress. Former Governor Meyner and U.S. Senator A. Williams were other party big-guns who urged victory for Wheeler, Mrs. Egolf and the entire ticket in Union County.

James J. Kinnealy, county chairman and honorary chairman of the clambake committee, and Dennis J. Valvano, Jr., Linden, general chairman, greeted the huge throng.

Union County Attorney Leo Kaplowitz introduced the speakers and candidates. Walter J. Mitchell of Roselle, clerk of the Union County Board of Freeholders was ticket chairman.

In addition to Wheeler and Mrs. Egolf other candidates who spoke included: Sheriff Ralph Orsello, seeking re-election; Richard Baggett, John C. Demos and Samuel Davidson, freshholder aspirants, and John F. Blewett, Samuel DeMartino and John Freeman, candidates for coroner.

Republicans Have Managed Good Humor License, 44 Pt. Tax Rise And New Give-Away!

In an unusual campaign statement, Howard S. Smith, School Board President, and Louis Ceithaml, Democratic candidates for the two Township Committee seats in the November 6 elections, came to the defense of Philip Del Vecchio, candidate for Township Committee.

Del Vecchio has been charged with being executive chairman of a "do nothing," inept administration in Springfield.

Those who quote from the records of the minutes say that "not a single bit of progress, not one blessed thing has been accomplished by the Del Vecchio controlled governing body since it took over eight months ago."

Progress in Springfield has come to a halt! "In defense of the Del Vecchio record of accomplishments," the Smith-Ceithaml press release continued, "those charges of having fumbled through a do-nothing eight months are not altogether true."

"The most important accomplishment was that the Del Vecchio administration issued a Good Humor license, an act which showed complete disregard for the best interests of the people of Springfield and the safety of their children; and was an act that all past Township Committees would never condone. "Despite their promise to do otherwise the Del Vecchio administration managed to increase the tax rate by 44 points which is quite a political feat when local school costs went down for the first time in many years. "However, aside from the granting of the Good Humor license, skyrocketing increase of the tax rate by 44 points and the new sewer give-away to the same insiders who attempted to foist the 1958 Shunpike sewer fiasco on the Springfield taxpayers, it is a fact that the Del Vecchio team cannot point to any single thing the present, fumbling administration has done. "An examination of the minutes in the past eight months since

the Del Vecchio administration took over control in January of this year—shows that the only accomplishment made was the issuance of a Good Humor license and the increase in tax rate.

"That's not a very difficult record to beat. There are many important things to do for our rapidly growing Springfield and our program for progress, stated Smith and Ceithaml, will make up for the shameful record of the "do-nothing, Brand-X" administration of the Township has been forced to accept since the Del Vecchio crowd took over in January of this year."

"Above and beyond those considerations, we were concerned that the Rahway River, which is the outlet for all Springfield surface drainage, would not be overloaded during peak storms. In peak storms the Rahway River tends to overflow, causing flood damage in the lower ends of town.

"A retention basin such as the one contemplated on the Baltusrol property holds water back during the peak flows and then releases the water as the storm subsides, thus making existing drainage facilities more adequate.

"The cost of construction of the retention basin will be borne entirely by the developer. The location of the retention basin entirely within Baltusrol's property, which is surrounded by a cyclone fence and removed from built-up area, is a safe, sound and economical means of controlling drainage waters in this area of the municipality.

"The baseless charges are an unfair aspersion against a bipartisan Planning Board which spent many, many hours in discharge of its civic duties, without compensation and motivated

merely in the best interests of the township.

"It is regrettable that political motivations can be so petty as to attack civic minded individuals, well qualified to serve the township.

"This can only result in reluctance on the part of future qualified individuals to serve in a public capacity all to the great loss of the Township," the statement concluded.

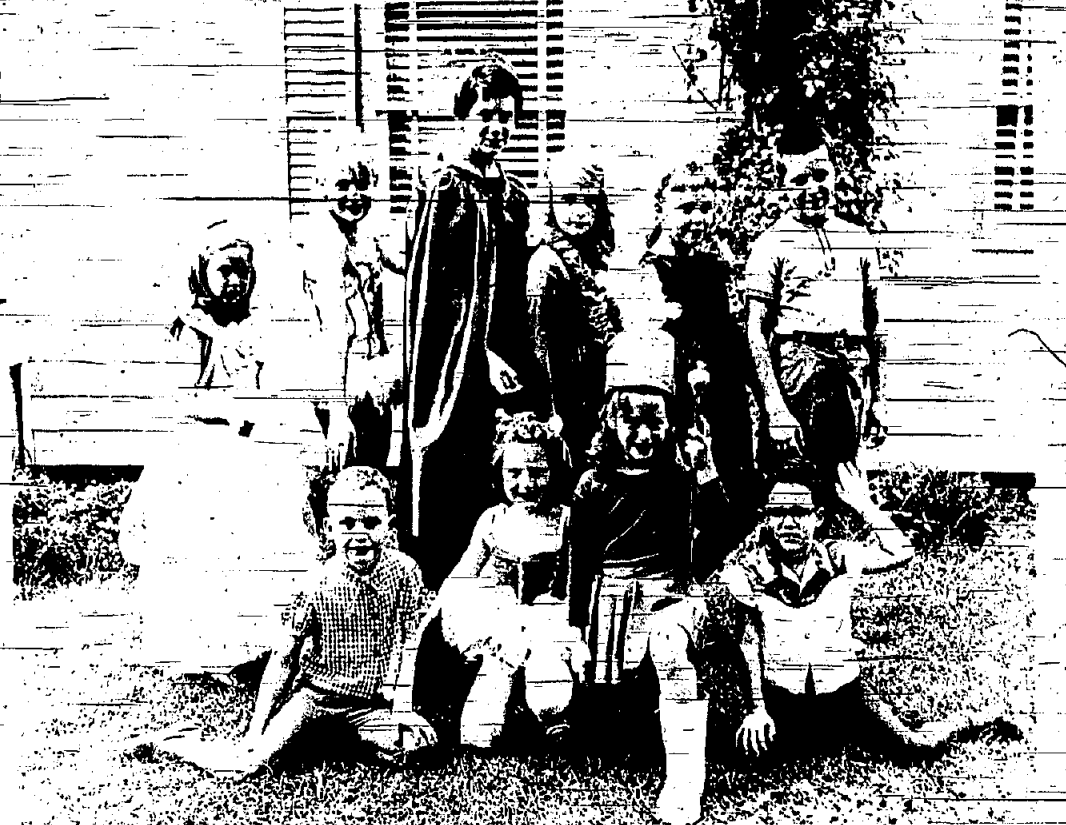
