to "lease or donate" for this rain water basin. Baltusrol Golf Club did sell about 10 acres of land to the Springfield Board of Education for future school expansion -- and the price was very low, said to be \$2,500. per acre.

That parcel, it is said, is in the most unaccessible part of rhe club's 463 acres.

However, when this land is needed the School Board, of course ould put in all the necessary utilities.

It isn't important whether or not the real estate committee of Baltusrol had this in mind when the 10 acres of trees were sold to the School Board.

However, just a few more acres than has been offered for the retention basin, added to the Irwin Street playground property, might solve the entire question of where to have the public swim pool and recreation area.
