

# Township Committee To Purchase Land For Planned Municipal Swimming Pool

Positive steps toward the establishment of a municipal swimming pool were taken by Springfield Township Committee Tuesday night with the introduction of an ordinance appropriating \$568,000 for the purchase of land and for the construction of the facility.

The proposal provides for the purchase of the site known as the Jenco property, presently owned by Lester Robbins (The Robbins Construction Corp. of Union), it consists of 14,067 acres, located north of Morrison Road, Springfield.

Stipulation is made in the ordinance that the lands are to be used for a recreation area and municipal swimming pool facility.

The measure calls for a \$289,000 appropriation for purchase of the land and a \$279,000 appropriation for construction of the utility.

Authorization is given for the issuance of bonds and notes for financing the undertaking. Estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes was set at \$539,600 with \$28,400 designated as the down payment.

A public hearing on the ordinance will be held December 11 at 8 P.M. in the Municipal Building.

The \$289,000 land purchase cost includes \$280,000 for sale of the property as well as an additional \$9,000 for cost to issue bonds and interest on notes, appraisal, surveys, and legal fees.

Springfield Township Committee unanimously voted in favor of adopting the ordinance on first reading.

## Springmount Tract Debated

Springmount, a development of 54 homes - 35 in Springfield and 19 in Mountside, proposed on Balustrad Mountain, which has been before municipal officials many months and is still pending, arose again at the Springfield Township Committee meeting Tuesday night.

# Cross-Country Star 16yrs. Old, 135lbs., Harris Is A Whiz

When you're 16 years old, weight 135 pounds and play in the high school band every Saturday you have about as much chance of winning a college scholarship as a snowball has of surviving in a blast furnace.

College scholarships go to the Saturday heroes on the schoolyard gridirons around the state and nation and even if you were a tremendous football player the chances are few colleges would risk their football future on a 135-pounder.

But there is a 16-year-old junior student at Fanwood-Scotch Plains High School who weighs only 135 pounds and plays in the Blue Raider band every Saturday who is going to receive plenty of college scholarship offers when he graduates in June, 1964.

Of course, Steve Harris is no ordinary 16-year-old, 135-pound member of the Blue Raiders' marching band. He just happens to be one of the finest cross-country runners in Union County, in Central Jersey and quite probably in the entire state of New Jersey.

For the uninitiated, cross-country is one of the more grueling sports in which schoolboy athletes participate during the fall. It calls upon boys to be in superb condition and to run anywhere from 2 to 2-1/2 miles up and down hills, through woods, across bridges and roads, and sometimes on cinder tracks.

Throughout the fall, Steve Harris has been racing over cross-country courses throughout North and Central New Jersey, considerably faster than any of the boys he has competed against. He has left numerous broken course records strewn in his path as he has romped to victory in the Union County Conference, Watchung Conference, Central Jersey, Seton Hall Spiked Shoe and New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association's Group 4 championships.

Just for good measure, he won 15 straight dual meets as Fanwood-Scotch Plains posted a fine 12-3 record in dual-meet competition and Steve also captured several invitation meet championships.

Despite all this, Steve lacks a clear-cut claim to being New Jersey's best cross-country schoolboy runner. He has whipped everyone he has met and has taken on all comers, but in the NJSIAA meet, which is run in four separate sections, another runner bettered his time.

In winning the Group 3 championship, Jack En-

drikat of Hanover Park Regional was clocked in 12:26.4 minutes for the 2-1/2 mile grind. Harris was clocked in 12:32.5 in sweeping to the Group 4 title.

Since neither runner was hard-pressed, Endrikat won by 125 yards and Harris by 30. It is hard to tell just how fast they could have run. In any case, both boys broke the former state record of 12:34.3 set last year by Carl Budden of Rancocas Valley.

And also in the running for the title of New Jersey's best cross-country runner would have to be Barry Middleton of Moorestown. He won the combined Groups 1-2 race in 12:39.9 and like Harris and Endrikat won pretty much as he pleased, leading his closest rival by more than 50 yards.

Making the situation more confusing is that Harris, Endrikat and Middleton all were underated this season. Since the boys run for schools in different groups, it is quite unlikely they ever will run against one another, even though Endrikat, like Harris, is only a junior.

The obvious solution would be a match race among the three, with Dave Faherty, the Parochial schools champion from Bergen Catholic, also being included to provide a true state champion. It's a race that would create wide interest. It's also a race that will not be run this year. The NJSIAA will see to that!

Regardless of any controversy, Harris is easily the finest distance runner ever produced by Fanwood-Scotch Plains and could become the finest in Union County history. He is the first Fanwood-Scotch Plains runner to win the State Group 4 championship but the third straight Union County runner to capture the coveted crown.

Now if Fanwood-Scotch Plains can come up with some other standout harrier next season, maybe Harris can lead the Blue Raiders to their first State cross-country title. It's a rather tall order.

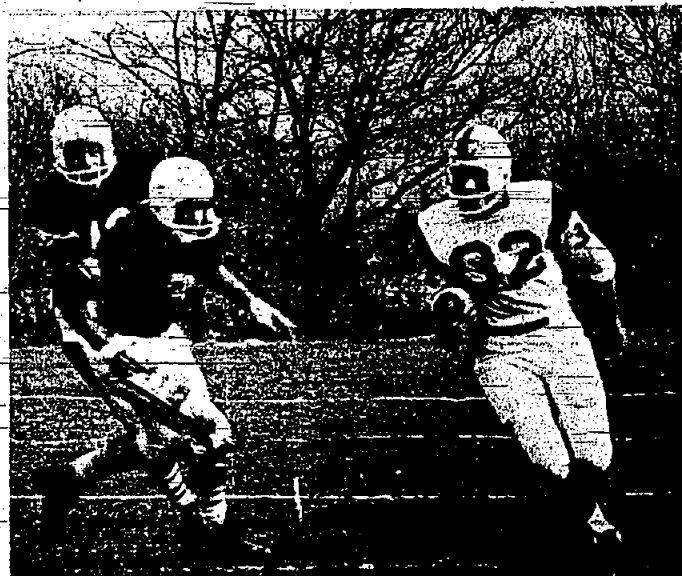

## Saturday Win Over Ridge High Gives Livingston 4-4-1 Overall

Ebby Clarkson, 163 pounds of speed and determination, did everything but collect tickets and sell hot dogs at halftime last Saturday as he led Governor Livingston Regional High School to a hard-earned 18-6 victory over Ridge High School of Basking Ridge.

Playing on a wind-swept gridiron still muddied by heavy rains in mid-week which had caused the game to be postponed on Thanksgiving Day, Clarkson paid no heed to the tricky footing and high winds.

Winding up his football career, the senior halfback scored all three Governor Livingston touchdowns, two on runs of 65 and 59 yards, the other on an eight-yard smash off tackle; helped knock down a Ridge pass in the end zone to stop a Ridge bid to tie the score in the final period, and came up with a quick kick into the wind to pull the Highlanders out of a hole in the third period.

On a day on which the Highlanders' other big offensive threats—Ben Russell and Lynn Nesbitt—were pretty much stymied by a stubborn Ridge defense, Clarkson came up with the finest performance of his career.

And the Highlanders needed Bobby's efforts to avoid their

first losing season under Coach Al Brown. Aided by the wind on two key plays, Ridge moved into a 6-0 lead late in the first period and threatened to tie or win the game until Clarkson's third touchdown sealed the verdict for the Highlanders in the final minute of play.

The Highlanders were in command in the early minutes, moving to the Ridge 17 on the strength of three consecutive first downs. This drive was accomplished on straight power but it petered out when two passes fell incomplete.

Ridge, with the help of a penalty, picked up its only first down of the first half on its own 32. That's when the wind first came to Ridge's aid. A wind-blown punt pushed the Highlanders back to their own 17-yard line.

A five-yard penalty put Governor Livingston back on its 12. Then the wind helped Ridge a second time. John Adamajt tried to pass but the wind held the ball up and it was intercepted by Ridge on the Highlander 22 and returned to the 15.

A 10-yard touchdown pass gave Ridge the lead, 6-0, but an attempted kick for the extra point was wide and low.

Following the kickoff, an exchange of wind-shortened punts

What had been billed as a duel between Rutishauser and Clark's Ken Hauswald; turned out to be scried no contest. Rutishauser scored three touchdowns on quarterback sneaks and passed for a fourth score. The Blue Raider forwards gave Hauswald fits all day with the only Crusader score coming on a fumble recovery in the Fanwood-Scotch Plains end zone.

The Clark score came with Fanwood-Scotch Plains leading 34-0 and amounted to nothing more than a consolation touchdown for the badly beaten Crusaders.

Fanwood-Scotch Plains virtually assured itself of a share of the Watchung Conference title in the very first period. Rutishauser climaxed the Raiders' first scoring drive, sneaking over from one yard out.

Later in the period, Tom and Marcellous Reed collaborated on a 38-yard touchdown pass. Haywood Gipson converted with place kicks after each touchdown and Fanwood-Scotch Plains was in front 14-0.

The Blue Raiders never let up. Gipson scored from two yards out in the second period and added this third extra-point to make the score 21-0 at halftime.

Rutishauser scored twice from the five-yard line in the second half to seal Clark's doom. Gipson booted the extra point after the first score, but missed his final try.

Clark halfback Jim Burg recovered a fumble in the Fanwood-Scotch Plains end zone in the final period.

The victory gave Fanwood-Scotch Plains an 8-0-1 record this season and a 6-0-1 mark in the Watchung Conference. The loss was only Clark's second in nine games, but the Crusaders also were tied twice. Despite the setback, Clark finished with a winning record for the first time in its eight-year history. The loss dropped Clark into a tie for third place with Springfield Regional, which defeated Rahway last Saturday.

Fanwood-Scotch Plains now is awaiting a decision from the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association on whether the Central Jersey Group 4 championship will be awarded to Plainfield, Westfield or Fanwood-Scotch Plains, or split among two or more of the schools.

A co-championship for Plainfield and Fanwood-Scotch Plains seems most likely. Plainfield (7-1-1) from title contention on Thanksgiving Day by whipping the Blue Devils, 27-7. Plainfield (7-1-7) has lost to Columbia (South Orange) and was tied by Perth Amboy but its strong schedule probably will assure it of at least a share of the Central Jersey title.

Plainfield already has won the Central Jersey Group 4 Conference. Fanwood-Scotch Plains is not a member of that group.

Another wind-shortened punt gave the Highlanders a scoring chance before the half ended. Clarkson, Adamiak and Russell carried four times for two first downs to the Ridge 33. A pass interception halted the threat.

Early in the third period, a Highlander punt into the wind carried only 15 yards to the Governor Livingston 42. Ridge took the air but completed only one of four passes and lost the ball at the Highlander 35.

On the first play, Clarkson slanted off the right side and streaked 65 yards for his second touchdown. Adamiak attempted to pass for the extra point but it fell incomplete.

Ahead 12-6, the Highlanders tried an on-side kick on the kick-off but Ridge covered the ball on its 48. The Red Devils picked up a first down and then a 15-yard penalty carried Ridge to the Highlander-27. Rich Kelley stopped the threat, recovering a fumble on the Governor Livingston 15.

Bucking a strong wind, the Highlanders still were in trouble but Clarkson quick-kicked 37 yards to take off the pressure for a while. Ridge, however, stormed back from its 48 to the Governor Livingston-20 as the third period ended.

Ridge reached the Highlander 14 before Clarkson and George Bubrick combined to thwart a fourth-down pass in the end zone.

The Highlanders then consumed virtually the entire fourth period in an 86-yard-touchdown march sparked by the spectacular clutch running of Adamiak. On four occasions, Adamiak ran a quarterback keeper play around end for first-down yardage when the Highlanders were faced with crucial third-down plays.

Despite Adamiak's clutch performance, the Highlanders nearly blew their chance for the clinching touchdown. Governor Livingston fumbled at the Ridge 40 after Adamiak had chalked up a third-first down and the elated Red Devils took over for one final attempt to win or tie.

The Ridge threat lasted only through one play. Mark Irwin recovered a Ridge fumble on the Red Devil 41 and from there the Highlanders resumed their touchdown drive. Adamiak picked up a first down on the Ridge 24. Russell swept and for another first down on the 13.

From there, Clarkson carried over for the score in two plays. Bobby went off tackle for five yards, then romped over guard for the final eight yards and his third touchdown. Russell's smash for the extra point was stopped short but it mattered little. Ridge had time only to return Adamiak's long kickoff before the game ended.

The victory gave Governor Livingston a 4-4-1 mark for the season and marked the first time in three seasons that Brown's team had failed to post a winning record. Brown's overall coaching record at Governor Livingston now is a fine 15-10-2.

The loss was Ridge's sixth against two victories and a tie. It also was Ridge's second straight loss to Governor Livingston. Ironically, Governor Livingston came from behind to win both games on long scoring runs by a senior halfback. Last year it was Artie Thomas and this year it was Clarkson.

It was with much regret that the Board accepted Smith's resignation at its last meeting. How can his seventeen years of dedicated service to the educational system of Springfield ever be fully thanked? A resolution was drawn in his behalf to officially note the feelings of the Board on his retirement, and to let him know how much he will be missed.

As one reviews the growth of Springfield during the past seventeen years, the realization comes forward of the many hours of studying, planning, and unself-giving of time that Mr. Smith "must have given to the town as its educational problems kept pace with the times.

Howard Smith may have officially resigned from the Board, but his influence will be felt by this Board, and many future Boards to come as an inspiration to us all. We salute him, and wish him many happy years ahead!

Libraries. A total of 4,378 books have been accessioned to date. Not all of these books have been classified, processed and cataloged. This is due to the fact that at the Caldwell and Sandmeier Schools the books were ordered unprocessed; books were slow and erratic in arriving from supplier; cards, pockets, etc., were slow in arriving, and there was limited clerical help.

The Chisholm Library, having the advantage of last year's organization, is a functioning facility, 745 books being circulated in September and 1,149 in October.

Class group visits on a scheduled basis have been in effect in the Chisholm School and have been started in the Caldwell School. During these visits there are book talks, storytelling and Library instruction.

A great deal of interest has been expressed by many citizens of Springfield regarding the California Testing System Surveys made yearly in our school system. May we invite you all to attend our next official Board meeting Tuesday, December 19, 1962 at the James Caldwell School? Mr. Micall, school psychologist; and Mr. Hughes of the California Testing Bureau, will be present to explain how these tests are scored. Due to the expressed interest in this subject, the meeting time has been changed to 7:30 P.M. and we urge your attendance.

As a follow-up to last year's self evaluation of our school system, a series of ten meetings have been arranged for this year. Members of this committee are: Mrs. Jeanette Aronow, Mrs. Beverly Kasen, Mrs. Margaret McGarrah, Mr. Robert Micalli, Mrs. Loreta O'Brien, Mrs. Marilyn Perkins, Mr. William Pfeiffer, Mrs. Jane Schorr, and Mr. William Vetter.

One of the continuing considerations of the committee, carried over from last year, is the study of the curriculum implications of our standardized testing program.

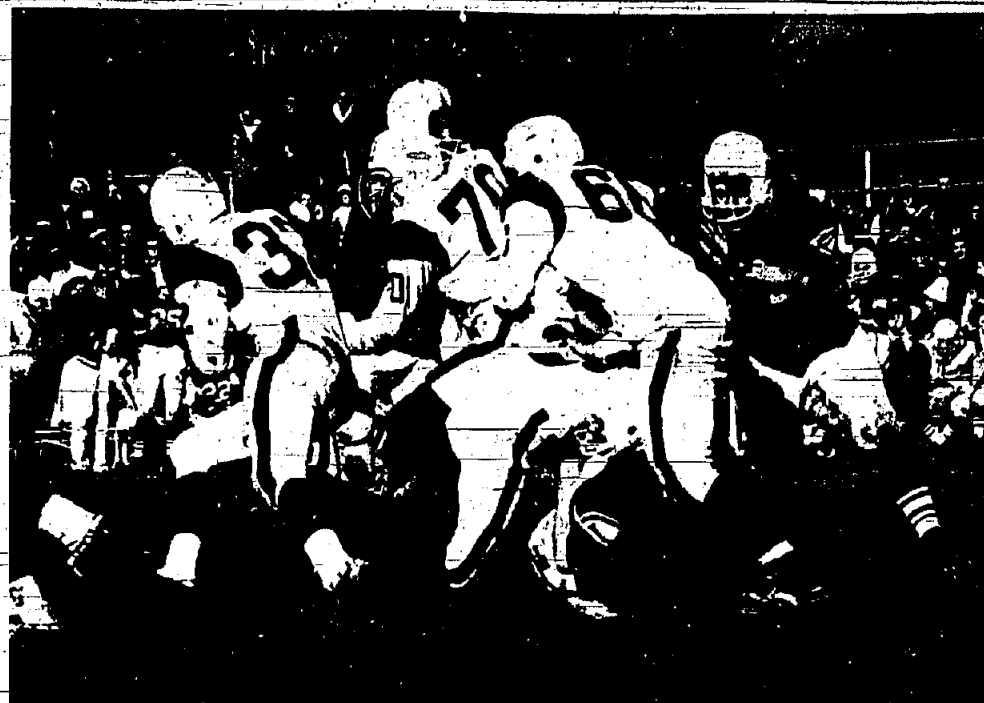

act as an alternate for the first place winner at the finals to be held in Albany.

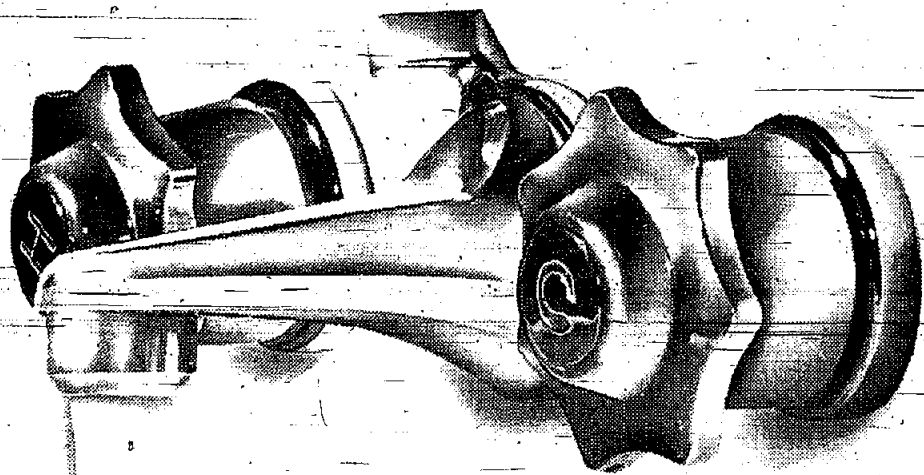
## Senior League Plans Programs
