
**Postmaster** Asks For Consideration

Postmaster A, V, Del Vecchio said today, "Right now is the time to start your Christmas gifts on still afloat. Other highlights are their way. The calendar says Christmas is less than one month away, but here in the Post-Office it will be Christmas every day from now on."

By making preparations now, the Postmaster went on to say, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the full Christmas rush begins, For example, do not take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. These gifts represent a lot of time and money spent and-unlimited sentiment which should not be wasted by careless wrapping and addressing. Each year the Post Office Department is unable to deliver about one half millionparcels because of poor packaging and inadequate addressing. Postmaster Del Vecchio advises the use of sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, heavy wrapping paper and strong cord.

If you have articles of unusal size or bulk, check with the post office before attempting to mail them. The limits on size and weight vary. As an extra pre= caution, place an extra label with both your return address and the recipients address INSIDE the package.

Postmaster A.V. Del Vecchio also suggests, "Be sure to send your Christmas cards by-first class mail using the attractive new 4¢ Christmas stamps.







He has whipped everyone he has met and has taken on all comers, but in the NJSIAA meet, which is run in four separate sections, another runner bettered his time. In winning the Group 3 championship, Jack En-



This point total was 294 points more than Passaic Valley was charged with in capturing the team title. To put it another way, it means that the average placing of the other four Blue Raiders who figured in their team's scoring total was 99th. From first to 99th place is quite a spread and leaves considerable room for improvement.

Another wind-shortened punt gave the Highlanders a scoring chance before the half ended. Clarkson, Adamiak and Russellcarried four times for two first downs to the Ridge 33. A pass interception halted the threat. Early in the third period, a Highlander punt into the wind carried only 15 yards to the Governor Livingston 42. Ridge took to the air but completed only one of four passes and lost the ball at the Highlander 35.

On the first play, Clarkson slanted off the right side and streaked 65 yards for his sceond touchdown. Adamiak attempted to pass for the extra point but it fell incomplete.

Ahead 12-6, the Highlanders tried an on-side kick on the kickoff but Ridge covered the ball on its 48. The Red Devils picked up a first down and then a 15yard penalty carried Ridge to the Highlander-27. Rich Kelleystopped the threat, recovering a fumble on the Governor Living-

ston 15. Bucking a strong wind, the Highlanders still were in trouble. but Clarkson quick-kicked 37 yards to take off the pressure for awhile. Ridge, however, stormed back from its 48 to the Governor Livingston-20-as the third period ended.

Ridge reached the Highlander 14 before Clarkson and George Bubrick combined to thwart a fourth-down pass in the end zone.

The Highlanders then consumed virtually the entire fourth period in an 86-yard-touchdown march sparked by the spectacular clutch running of Adamiak. On four occasions, Adamiak ran a quarterback keeper play around end\_for\_first\_down yardage when the Highlanders-were-faced with crucial third-down plays.

-Despite-Adamiak-s-clutch-per formance, the Highlanders nearly blew their chance for the cfinching touchdown. Governor Livingston fumbled at-the Ridge 40 after Adamiak had chalked up a third-first down and the elated Red Devils took-over for one final attempt to win or tie. The Ridge threat lasted only\_ through-one play. Mark Irwin recovered, a Ridge fumble on the Red Devil 41 and from there the Highlanders resumed their
