Citizens Swimming Pool Committee has announced that If the swimming pool ordinance is adopted by Springfield Township Committee after the public hearing next Tuesday night, letters with membership applications will immediately be sent to all Springfield residents, Family-membership for the first year has been tentatively set at \$60.

Interested citizens will be urged to return to Municipal Building the application form with their checks as soon as possible so that plans can be quickly formulated.

The committee=is-aiming for a 1,000 membership the first year. membership should exceed capacity, applications will be honored on a first come, first serve basis.

Membership Estimated

Estimated membership was established for the first six years of operation using Livingston's municipal pool experience. Thiswas based on percentage of population who were members of the


Livingston pool and applying this to Springfield's population. From this survey, a scale was established with estimated membership for the next few years as follows: first year, 860; second year, 1,161; third-year, 1,161; fourth year, 1,333; fifth year, 1,462, and

Hope For January Sale_

sixth year, 1,634.

If the program meets approval, it is hoped the sale of the property will be consummated in January with construction underway in early Spring.

The initial project will concern the pool area with locker rooms and the parking space. Under consideration is a major pool-of about 11,000 square feet, a 1,250 square-foot wading pool, and a parking lot for 200 cars. Expanded recreation facilities would be done in the-future. Future developments under consideration include various courts and play areas and a pond for ice skating and



possibly fishing, which could also be used for water retension purposes,

It was pointed out that Millburn, with a population comparable to Springfield, had received 1,389 members by November with \$70,-000 in fees collected. It is hoped a similar experience will result in Springfield. The committee is looking for a 1,000 membership, but the pool could readily function usccessfully with an 800 membership the first year, it was said. However, the greater the number who join, the greater the surplus, it was emphasized.

Monday-night in Municipal Building, Springfield Township Committee and representatives of the Citizens Swimming Pool Committee - members of the publicity and financial arms of thatgroup -- thoroughly explored the financial aspect of the proposal. There should be a surplus at the end of the six years after payment of all expenses including interest and principal on bond of \$140,360, a member of the pool committee said. This accumulation could be applied towards the purchase of ad-

ditional equipment, or another pool if necessary, or reduction of annual membership fees, or the retirement of the indebtedness

Other sources of income which serve as an additional "insurance factor" which were not conidered in the figures were: concession-income, contributions from industry, husiness, private citizens, and service organizations, possible guest fees, individual memberships such-as-a single person-at a reduced rate, and interest income on pre-paid membership.

As this is being written the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association has not made any announcement concerning the selection of its Central Jersey, Group 4 football champion.

Based on the Saylor Ratings, which are unofficial but-pretty much reflect the Colliton Ratingson which the NJSIAA depends in awarding championships, four schools would appear to be in the running for at least a share of the title.

Plainfield-(7-1-1) has a rating of 501 points, the highest of any Central Jersey, Group 4 contender. Thomas Jefferson of Elizabeth (6-1-1) and Scotch Plains-Fanwood (8-0-1) are rated next with 481 points, just two more than Westfield

(7-1-1). With such a narrow difference in ratings, a fourway co-championship would seem to be in order under ordinary circumstances. But these are not ordinary circumstances.

Plainfield, which started the season slowly due to rash of injuries, defeated Jefferson, 19-0, and Westfield, 27-7, in key late season games. The victory over Jefferson helped the Cardinals win the Central Jersey Group 4 Conference champion-

previously undefeated Westfield will be enough to give it an-outright claim to the Central Jersey, Group 4 State championship.

Such a move is possible but we find it hard to believe that the NJSIAA can overlook an undefeated team like Scotch Plains-Fanwood (one of the few undefeated teams in the State) when two schools are so closely rated.

It is a shame, of course, that Plainfield and Scotch Plains-Fanwood could not be matched in a post season contest. NJSIAA regulations would not permit this, but you can bet it would be a whale of-a-contest.

Both teams were at their peak as the season came to a close on Thanksgiving Day and the following Saturday. Plainfield completely outclassed Westfield, running up a 27-0 lead before the Blue Devils, who had been undefeated in 22 games, managed to score.

But the Cardinals' show of strength hardly overshadowed Scotch- Plains-Fanwood's performance in manhandling a Clark Regional team that was enjoying its greatest season, had lost only one game, and was led by the boy who was rated by Union County's coaches as the best quarterback in the area.

-In-a- game that it had to win to share the Watchung Conference title with Westfield, the Blue Raiders came up with their finest performance of the season in routing the Crusaders, 34-7, in a contest that had loomed close to being even when the teams took the field.

Like Plainfield, Scotch Plains-Fanwood blanked its rival until the game was far beyond recall. The Raiders led 34-0 in the final period before in the Raiders' end zone.

And even more amazing, Scotch Plains-Fanwood ran the ball for 355 yards against a Clark defense that had been rated among the best in the area. The Raiders added another 77 yards in the air as Tom Rutishauser completed all five passes he threw, including one for a touchdown.

What had been __heralded as a duel between Clark's Ken Hauswald and Rutishauser was exploded by the Raiders' defense. Clark gained only nine yards rushing in the first half as Scotch Plains-Fanwood rolled to a 21-0 lead.

While Rutishauser was having a field day (three touchdown runs, one on a 68-yard run, and a scoring pass), Hauswald was having his troubles. His fumble set up the Raiders' first touchdown, he completed only 4 of 12 passes for 27 'yards, and all-in-all had one of the worst days of his career.

The Raiders' showing really wasn't surprising. They came up with a top-notch performance every time they had too. They walloped North Plainfield, 27-0, Springfield Regional fell, 9-6, and Westfield was battled to a 6-6 standoff. Scotch Plains-Fanwood can hardly be faulted if its schedule wasn't quite up-to the standard of Plainfield's. It's hardly the Raiders' fault that such perennial powerhouses as Rahway and Cranford had rare losing seasons.

Scotch Plains-Fanwood deserves at least a share of the Central Jersey, Group 4 title. An undefeated team hardly deserves less. In the past the NJSIAA has come up with, some strange decisions. We just hope Scotch Plains-Fanwood is not the victim of one of them!

Before closing the book on the 1962 football season we would like to give a deserved nod to the area's two other schoolboy elevens--Governor Livingston Regional High of Berkeley Heights and Springfield Regional.

Both the Highlanders and Bulldogs finished upand-down seasons on an up note. Bobby Clarkson turned in a tremendous show in Berkeley Heights, scoring three touchdowns, two on long runs, as Governor Livingston downed Ridge High of Basking Ridge, 18-6, Clarkson's efforts gave Governor Livingston a 4-4-1 record for the season, the third straight year the Highlanders have escaped a losing year to the surprise of the "experts."

Considering that three of the Highlanders' losses were administered by teams that lost only one-game-each-during-the-season; Governor-Liv ingston did quite well.

Springfield, something of a disappointment in the Watchung Conference this season, took out its frustration on arch-rival Rahway, which has fallen on lean pickings of late. Richie Bittle with three touchdowns, Ron Puorro with two, and Jack Apgar with a pair-of scoring passes paced the Bulldogs to a 32-6 rout-of the Scarlet. 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


