





Four Years Ago Watchung B'nai Brith

<u>In response to many requests received by the Springfield eague of Women Voters in regard to this organisation's </u> stand on the possibilities of a change of government in the Township of Springfield, as reflected in petitions currently being circulated, the Lague has prepared a statement detailing the stand it took in Springfield's last altempt at a change in 1968. The statement follows:

In 1958, the League of Women Voters of Springfield made an extensive study of our present form of local government as well as those forms described in the Faulkner Act of 1950. The Act provides the means for citizens to study, through an elected charter commission, their existing municipal government and the forms available to them under the law. At that time, the League initiated the idea of a Charter Study for Springfield and encouraged local organizations to participate in the Citizens Committee for Charter Study. The work of this Committee resulted in a referendum by petition which was placed on the ballot in November. 1957. When a Charter Commission consisting of 5 residents of Springfield was elected to make the study and funds provided by the Township.

Dr. William Miller, a Princeton governmental consultant, aided the Commission. He outlined the duties and procedures of such a study to the Commission and was present at all interviews they conducted subsequently. Dr. Miller is a lawyer and a law professor and has served many state governments in studies of administrative organization, taxation, and finance. He is considered an expert in the field.

In July, 1958, the results of the study were published by the Commission in the book. 'A CHANGE OF GOVERNMENT FOR CHANGING TIMES." The book described the weaknesses of the Township committee form of government (Springfield's present system.) It went on to explain the advantages of Council-Manager Plan E. The Commission was unanimous in recommending this form of government for Springfield. Their recommendation was then placed on the ballot November 4, 1958 as follows:

"Shall Council-Manager Plan E of the

Optional Municipal Charter Law providing for a council of five councilmen to be elected at large be adopted by Springfield Township?"

"A vote of YES will give Springfield a modern form of government, with a council of five members elected by the people and a full-time, qualified township manager appointed by the council and accountable to it, and subject to removal by the council.

A vote of NO will keep the present township committee form of government," The League of Women Voters of Spring-

field fully supported this form of government as stated in this referendum. Only 400 votes defeated this referendum. Of over 5,600 voters, 1,000 did not even

vote on the referendum. According to the Faulkner Act, a fouryear period must elapse before a proposed

change of government can again be placed before the voters.

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



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

When a coach is so confident of his team's ability on the basketball court that he is genuinely disappointed that a coach as talented as Al Lo-Balbo is no longer at St. Mary's High in Elizabeth so that he can whip his squad, it's hard to imagine the same coach being genuinely concerned about losing his opening game of the season.

Yet that is the unique situation facing Coach Don Wodock of Governor Livingston Regional High School in Berkeley Heights, Wodock has a veteran team, and a good one, and the Highlander coach is certain—his boys are going to have a highly successful season;

But the Highlanders opening-night opponent tomorrow evening in Berkeley Heights just happens to be arch-rival Summit High School. The Highlanders haven't beaten Summit in four tries during the past two seasons and it wouldn't exactly qualify as an upset if the Hilltoppers won again tomorrow

Like Governor Livingston, Summit has four starters back from last season's squad that whipped the Highlanders twice. Summit already has been tabbed by the Suburban Conference coaches as the team to beat for the conference title and is expected to be a leading contender for the State Group 3 championship next March.

The Highlanders, however, must be accorded an excellent chance of whipping Summit for the first time. Governor Livingston will have a distinct height advantage with 6-5 Bob Heuer-the-tallest man on the floor.

Wodock's starters will include three other sixfooters in Lynn Nesbitt, the best rebounder on the team the past two seasons; John Adamiak, the crackerjack football quarterback who came into his own as a basketballer late last season, and Dave-Jubanowsky, the only newcomer on the starting five. The other regular will be Bobby Clarkson, the hero of the football victory over Ridge, who could hold the key to the Highlanders' success on the asketball-court this season

Clarkson is the team's playmaker and "take charge" guy, He is the boy that Wodock is counting on to put the "go" in what should be a high-powered Governor Livingston attack.

Nesbitt already holds season and career scoring marks at Governor Livingston. He is atremendous rebounder and shooter and if the Highlanders have a good season Lynn should make a strong bid to become an all-state athlete in two sports. The six-foot, 200-pounder was the top third baseman in New Jersey last spring.

Heuer and Adamiak, both big and strong, figure to give Nesbitt plenty of support in the rebounding department this season. Heuer-scored in double figures last season, while Adamiak scored well in several gamés late last year.

Despite two straight losing seasons, Wodock apparently feels that the Highlanders came of age last February when they upset top-seeded Westfield High in the Union County Conference tournament. Don was hopeful of getting a crack at-St. Mary's then, but the Governor Livingston lost a squeaker to Scotch Plains in the quarter-final round and was eliminated.

Wodock succeeded in getting St. Mary's on the Highlander schedule this season for the first time, but during the summer LoBalbo, the most successful coach in Union County schoolboy basketball annals, departed for Belleville High School in Essex County where he hopes to rebuild the Bellboys' sagging.

In posting an 8-11 record last season, Governor Livingston lost nine games by a total of 50 points. Wodock expects to win those nine games this year and figures his team should win 14 or 15 of its 18. regularly scheduled games. That would be quite a

The Highlanders are playing a beefed-up schedule this season that will include six games against teams considered presention threats for State championships as well as contests with Springfield Regional and Clark Regional for the first time.

The power teams on the slate include Summit (twice), a Group 3 title threat; New Providence (twice) and South Plainfield, Group 2 championship hopefuls, and St. Mary's the defending county champion and a perennial Catholic "B" contender

In the Highlanders' favor in undertaking such an ambitious schedule is that 11 of the 18 games will be played at home. Another factor making Wodock optimistic is that he now has two assistant coaches, with Bob Martin handling the Highlander jayvees, and Howard Tozier serving as mentor of <u>he</u> freshmen quintet.

The jayvees will play a full 18-game-schedule like the varsity, while the freshmen currently are slated for 11 games, with the opener at home against Scotch Plains on December 18 at 3:45 p.m.

As the duscussion neared a close, Marvin Strauss of Berkeley Road, a member of the Citizens Swimming Pool Committee, emphasized that Mr. Sisco is the foremost authority-on-swimming pools in the state, having advised all the towns in the area on the subject. Mr. Strauss concluded his remarks by recommending a. positive attitude on the proposal.
