Seats Won By Jones, Hopping Janisko, Mrs. Dorsky Voice Views on Education Board

Janisko Cites Bd. Indifference

George T. Janisko, candidate for a three-year term on the Springfield Board of Education, takes issue with the Board's indifference in relation to the bookkeeping methods employed by them in making up the budget. He promises to pay attention to "the business end of the school system, in which the Board has been so sorely lacking." His statement follows:

"It is my considered opinion that members of a Board of Education are supposed to be dedicated civic servants who serve without compensation, to protect the interests of the taxpayers as well as the children in seeing that our educational system is adequate, fulfilling all state and county requirements.

Mrs. Dorsky Offers 8-Point Plan

Mrs. Lawrence Dorsky, candidate for a one-year term on the Springfield School Board of Education, presents an 8-point program to the voters of Springfield. She stresses the need of cooperation and assistance between the local school system and the county and state authorities; the importance of attracting and keeping good teachers; resolving the lunch room problems; the formation of an advisory committee to assist the Board when necessary, the establishment of a central purchasing office, slow speeds for vehicles passing school areas, and the instituting of foreign language programs in local schools.

Her complete statement follows:

Colleges and Universities Surrounding Our Community Should Be Secured

"The formation of policies and methods to attract and keep the finest teachers available. A policy of in-service courses designed to keep our educators in continuous contact with the latest methods and material available in education.

"Resolution of the lunch problems that confront each of the schools and many of the children, utilizing existing facilities whenever possible.

Four Board Seats Vacant Til Tues.

—Voters to Judge \$956,706 Budget

Four places are to be filled at the Springfield Board of Education elections to be held next Tuesday, February 14, with three propositions to be voted on, one of which is the budget for current expenses amounting to \$956,706.

The polls will be open from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m. with voters in Districts No. 1 to 6 casting their ballots at the James Caldwell School, Districts 7 to 9 at the Raymond Chisholm School and Districts No. 10 to 13 at the Edward V. Walton School.

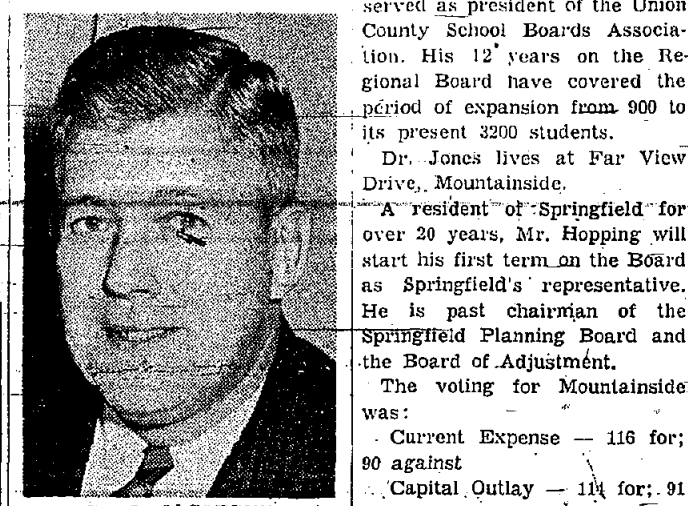
Howard S. Smith, who has been on the Board of Education for the past 15 years and is at present the president of the Board, is a candidate for re-election next Tuesday for the full three-year term.

Other candidates for the three-year term are John C. Gaces, Joseph A. Bender and George T. Janisko. Three of these four candidates are to be elected next Tuesday. This will be Mr. Smith's sixth candidacy for the Board of Education.

There is also a contest for an unexpired term of one year with incumbent Alan R. Cunningham seeking reelection and Sonya Dorsky as his opponent. Mr. Cunningham had already served two full three-year terms on the School Board, from 1953 to 1959, and was named to fill a vacancy on the Board in July of 1960.

Mrs. Dorsky is a graduate of New York University, School of Education, and holds a B.S. degree and three teaching licenses in New York City.

Jacobsen Attends NASSP Convent'n



R. T. Jacobsen, Principal of Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield, will be taking an active part in the program of the 45th annual convention of the National Association of Secondary-School Principals (NASSP) to be held in Detroit, February 11-15. This convention promises to be one of the largest in its history. NASSP officials estimate that approximately 7,000 high school principals from all over the United States will attend.

Convention session will be held in Detroit's Cobb Hall and theme for the five-day meeting is "Individual Competence and the National Welfare."

Among topics to be studied during the five-day conference are the college admission squeeze, the role of the student council in school affairs, and current developments in science, math, the social studies, and modern foreign languages.

West Doesn't Censure Board; Wants Improved Bookkeeping

State Sanctions Board's Methods

County School Superintendent Dr. William West today stated in a letter to the local Board of Education that he (Dr. West) had indicated a recommendation for improvement on school board bookkeeping rather than a censure as stated in last week's Sun.

Dr. West's most recent letter is the outgrowth of a letter published in last week's SUN in which reference was made to the methods by which the local Board of Education kept records.

In this latest letter to the school board, Dr. West stated the following:

"One of your members has suggested that I write a letter as a result of the publication in the local paper last week of an item in which my letter concerning bookkeeping procedures was the avowed basis. Obviously, the writer of the item went beyond the original purpose of the letter which was a recommendation for improvement, rather than any 'censure' as stated by the heading of the column.

"The reference to the school board election was not contained in my original letter and was not implied.

"When requested to supply a copy of the letter to the paper, the County Superintendent declined to do so. The caller was told that the matter was not of such significance that it should be made into a story and was closed for the present so far as the County Superintendent was concerned.

Coinciding with this letter of Dr. West, The Springfield Board of Education stated their position. "The method of accounting by the Springfield Board of Education bears the approval of the State Board of Education and is subject to their jurisdiction.

Never Chase Your Hat - And Don't Worry About Being Stuck In Snow

There's an old and accepted rule that if a strong wind blows off your hat and it goes whipping down the street, don't risk your life in the heavy traffic or even exert yourself chasing it.

Invariably, some stranger will sprint in and out of the range of speeding taxis, pounce on the rolling Knox creation and fetch it to you, panting for breath and wondering what prompted this "deed for today."

The same "do good" rule also applies to getting stuck "up to here" in the heavy snows. The Springfield resident who had an opportunity to test this adage was Sun Publisher Julian Sarokin, who suddenly realized that the wheels of his car were spinning fiercely but getting him exactly nowhere during the height of the most recent blizzard.

Sarokin had shoveled through a two-day igloo in front of his own garage in Milltown Road and when he finally succeeded in skidding his car onto the single traffic of the street, decided to bring milk to his parents at the corner of Fieldstone Drive and Litchfield Place. The milk was for home.

That's when he realized that his spinning-wheels were just spinning for exercise. For nearly thirty minutes his back wheels merely made nice impressions on the snow and attracted the attention of the residents in that area.

The street was soon filled with creek-in-the-back-snow shovelers who deserted their own driveway chores and came to the aid of Sarokin.

The Roaches, the Vaughans, the Dr. Yuckmans, the Wolcotts, the Scoobys and others in the block just didn't offer advice to the discouraged driver of the car. They came with their snow shovels, old rags for better traction, cans of rereashes - anything to get Sarokin's car-out of the deep snow.

Finally, after using every trick to move the car, some one suggested pushing the auto out of the snow pile, and with six man power and a lively and unfeeling chantey, the men in the rescue squad got the car free while the women folks supervised the task and Sarokin sat nonchalantly in the driver's seat.

Sarokin rolled away, after thanking the good neighbors for a good neighborly deed, only to find that the Township snow-plow had thrown most of the snow back on his own driveway. Which has been one of the local occupational hazards: clearing the snow away too soon.
