

Rahway parking costs on the rise

RAHWAY After public protests and debate amongst officials, the city's Parking Authority has decided to raise prices at most city parking areas beginning Aug.1.

A monthly permit at the Lewis Street parking deck will be raised from \$65 to \$85 — about a 67 cent increase per day.

Monthly rates for surface lots will go up about \$10 dollars, from \$50 and \$55 to \$60 and \$65 in most

"We take no tax money from the city and we still have not had a raise in three-and-a-half years. But

increase in utilities and insurance costs lately," said Executive Director of the Parking Authority, Donald Andersen said about the need for the hike.

Most daily rates will also rise slightly, although the first half-hour Street parking garage and Main at city garages will be free. Longer stays will rise slightly - there will be an increase of 50 cents to \$3.75 when parking four to six hours.

> Parking rates will not increase in Lot B, a spot for downtown shopping available only to residents and merchants.

(Continued from Page 1) -cause a similar water detention basin on Miesel Avenue in Springfield operates without a surrounding fence. "If they can have an open basin, why do we need a fence," Magiera asked.

But he also noted that if needed for safety reasons, the fence should be built, but at a lesser cost than proposed.

Within Hoerning's ward, \$30,000 allocated to repair a fence between a municipal parking lot and residences on Williams Street will remain in the budget.

Among the list of capital projects are a new generator and gear for the fire department, as well as repairs to borough roadways and the community center.

Another point of contention was whether or not to televise borough planning and zoning board

According to Magiera many borough residents would like both meetings to be televised, but the change would be costly. "There are so many people that stop me on the street and ask me questions about that," he said.

Magiera has been pushing for the meetings to be filmed since 2005 and said it would cost the borough approximately \$1,440 per year to televise both meetings.

Hoerning said the mayor was receptive to the idea, but "its not budgeted for this year."

When the proposed plans for the Romerovski Corp. site were unveiled earlier this year, many residents were surprised. "People can go to board meetings, but for many it can be difficult, and it would be nice to watch it on TV to stay informed." Hoerning said.

Magiera agreed. "If we had this information we would've been more aware of what's going on at the Romerovski site. Government needs to be transparent and the public should be informed."

The July 17 council meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. in Borough Hall, 110 East Westfield Ave.

Cellular tower plan revisited

CRANFORD changes have been revealed in the controversial cell tower application that has drawn large crowds to Zoning Board meetings since October.

At the June 23 meeting, residents and officials learned that Sprint, one of the companies that planned to maintain an antennae on the structure, has withdrawn from the project.

The fenced enclosure that will house cell tower equipment will remain the same size, but contain fewer cabinets — compartments which house equipment or transmitters — as a result of Sprint's departure from the plan. Remaining companies include Omnipoint and

The pole, according to the revised proposal, will also be lowered from 130 feet to 120 feet.

Verizon is seeking height and setback variances that are needed to erect the pole on the grounds of the Cranford Swimming Club, which is located in a residential area.

After Verizon's application first appeared in October 2007, more than 30 neighbors of the swimming club hired attorney John Schmidt Jr. to represent them in opposing the project. Schmidt did not return calls for comment as of press time.

If the cell tower application is approved, the Cranford Swimming Club could generate about \$20,000 in revenue, in the form of fees paid by the cell phone company for hav-

ing the tower on its property. Cranford Swimming Club representatives could not be reached for comment as of press time.

The applicant is expected to present a final witness - a professional planner -- at the next meeting. Verizon Attorney Greg Meese could not be reached for comment.

The attorney representing the residents is expected to call three witnesses to testify against the pro-

Area residents' concerns have focused on aesthetics and the proposed location of the tower in relation to property lines and the adjoining park.

Since the proposal was first made, there has also been opposition from the State Historic Preservation Office. Historians contend that the tower project must either be rejected or modified to mitigate its impact on the adjacent Lenape Park and the Rahway River Park historic district.

Freeholder Bette Jane Kowalski has been the voice of Union County's opposition to the project, because of its proximity to Lenape Park. Kowalski said she feels cell towers are a necessary part of life, but finds the proposed location near the park unsuitable.

The next Zoning Board meeting is scheduled for Monday at 8:15 p.m. at the Cranford Municipal Building, 8 Springfield Ave.

Cranford will retain charter, with changes

CRANFORD - The Charter Study Advisory Committee tasked with examining a potential change in the township's form of government, has reached the consensus that Cranford should retain its traditional charter, with certain changes.

The committee gave its report to township officials at the June 23 workshop meeting.

The findings were presented by Charter Study Advisory Committee member and former township clerk, Rosalie Hellenbrecht. Hellenbrecht said the committee's conclusion was far from unanimous.

"There were a lot of split decisions on the individual members' preferences," Hellenbrecht said.

The state constitution allows for 12 different forms of municipal government that offer a variety of configurations of mayor and council. The three charters that received the most attention in the process were the mayor/council form, the council/manager form and the mayor/council/administrator form.

All are known as Faulkner forms of government, after the Faulkner Act that established them in the 1950s. Many of these charters utilize a popularly elected mayor that wields executive power, while the council is relegated to legislative duties. The township committee model dates back to colonial times, when citizens were wary of placing too much power in the hands of too few officials.

According to Hellenbrecht, as research and debate progressed, more committee members began to see the merit of the township's present charter. However, they also saw the need for some changes. Specifically, it was recommended that the township's administrative

the township administrator. This is intended to reduce the role of commissioners in the day to day management of the town, providing them with more time and energy to devote to constituents and other duties.

The original impetus for the study was the recurring complaints from residents of a lack of accountability and consistency in the town's administration.

"It makes sense to reconsider from time to time, to be sure that the best form of government is in place," Mayor Robert Puhak said.

Puhak said it has been decades since such a study was done.

Despite the voting public having approved the ballot question by a 2 to 1 margin, township officials said repeated attempts to solicit public involvement in the charter study process were largely unsuccessful.

Hellenbrecht said the majority of residents interviewed during the study had no idea how their town government worked. She added that the specific ramifications of changing the form of government may not have been taken into consideration by the voters.

Engineering Commissioner Mark Smith said the inconsistencies residents have complained about can be reduced through the diligence of officials, as well as the voters responsible for electing them and monitoring their performance.

"We're at a very important juncture where we have feedback and it's time for the Township Committee to reflect on the committee's findings and recommendations and take related action as it sees best fit for the interests of the community in the near future." Puhak said.

(Continued from Page 1) entitled to procedural rights and protections as an avenue for recouping and regaining the taxpayers dollars and monies for costs and fees," Jack Carbone, the attorney representing Birch, said in a letter to Judge Katherine DuPuis.

The attorney for the CUU, Thaddeus Maciag could not immediately be reached for comment.

"It's sad that they can go this route," CUU member Fran Metta said. "It's just costing too much money to taxpayers to put a question on the ballot and it has gotten too out of control and costly."

She added that "dirty politics" has been at the core of the case.

"The bottom line is 6,600 people signed that petition and wanted a change of government," Metta said. "Why are they so gung-ho on stopping something that the people have the right to do?"

On July 3, Superior Court Judge Katherine Dupuis responded to a letter from Carbone requesting further instruction from the court. The judge also formally stated that all motions need to be

"This is a civic group that is trying so hard just to do what is right for the people of Union," Metta said. "We care about the town.'

The township passed a resolution in November of last year adopting a charter study ordinance that would put a question on the ballot, asking residents for input on whether or not a charter study commission should be developed.

"They would study the current form of government and any alternate forms and provide a conclusion as to which change, if any, should be implemented," Township Attorney Daniel Antonelli

The commission would be composed of five people, who would be selected by the residents of Union through popular vote.

"Those five people would have to sign and file a petition with the clerk and then his or her name will go on the a ballot in November as well," Antonelli said.

Township Committeeman Joseph Florio said the township has spent a considerable amount of money to argue the case.

"We are very happy and pleased that this lawsuit is apparently coming to an end but I'm very upset by the amount of money the township has had to spend to defend this," Florio said.

He also said he was concerned the matter may have besmirched Birch's name, but he's glad she may be vindicated.

Carbone said two members of the CUU, Joseph Padula and Louis Papale, do not reside in Union. Both provided their signatures on the petition and Carbone stated the action is illegal.

"That's a criminal offense," Carbone said.

According to a New Jersey. Motor Vehicle Commission document, Papale is registered as a Summit resident. Carbone also said that, according to private investigation findings, Padula lives in Colo-

"He was born and raised in Union and always lived here," Papale said in Padula's defense.

Papale said he is currently in the middle of personal problems and is moving his personal belongings from a residence he has in Summit, but he says he also has property in Union and lives in the township.

"I wouldn't do anything illegal," he said.

Metta doesn't believe residency is a problem.

"People can have dual residencies," Metta said. "There shouldn't be a problem with that."

Antonelli, however, said in a direct interview that it does, in fact, present a legal issue.

"Mr. Papale and Mr. Padula and Fran Metta can make that argument to the Union County Prosecutor and the Board of Election but you can't live in one town and vote in another because its a clear violation of the law," Antonelli said.

He said that when both men signed the petition they were essentially certifying they were residents of the township.

Papale said Carbone threatened to press criminal charges for signing the petition.


"He's doing this to gain favor in our suit against the clerk and its unethical," Papale said.

In reference to the petition for dismissal. Papale said the proceedings have been dragged out.

"This may take two or three more years at the rate we're going," Papale said. "I personally want to go on with the deposition but I'm not the person who initiated the suit. Padula, Business owner, Alan Hodapp and Metta want to end it because its not economical."

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

- Keep garages and sheds locked with strong locks
 - · Have and use sturdy locks
- · Trim shrubs back to avoid giving burglars cover
- · Keep entrances, alleys and driveways lit by using automatic lights that come on when it is dark or when there is movement
- · Use timers for lights, televisions and stereos when not home
- Never carry identification tags on keys
 - Do not hide spare keys outside

 - · When going on vacation, put mail and newspaper delivery "on
 - · Consider installing a home
 - Store tools and ladders securely

Ricardelli said the survey is meant to increase the vigilance of the borough's strongest defense against crime: residents. "This is just one tool in our toolbox. Without community assistance this program by itself isn't going to work," he said.

In addition to the survey, the Vacation House Checks to borough residents who request the service. Staff-power permitting, officers will be available to perform checks on homes while residents are away.

The Vacation House Check is cupied for a few days and can provide "some form of comfort," Riccardelli explained.

An application for the house checks can be picked up at police headquarters, Chestnut Street.

The police department also offers numerous pamphlets and brochures on crime prevention, personal safety and child safety concerns.

Without the files, which no doubt include important information on current and pending litigation, what's a town to do in that area of business? Nothing!



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

Remaining on the defensive end

A few weeks ago, a not-toobright truck driver smashed into the railroad overpass on Locust Street at the border between Roselle and Roselle Park. He didn't believe the 10-foot, 4-inch top clearance was accurate. It disrupted residents for 12 hours and cost a lot of municipal time.

To the credit of Roselle Park officials, the Police Department has been carrying the pressure to the trucking company to pay for the damages. If that fails, here's hoping the borough takes the driver, his company and the insurance carrier to the cleaners via the courts.

Sometimes, the local officials find themselves on the defensive end in the courts. Maybe a whole lot of towns will be there, based on some decisions last week.

The first hit came when the state Appellate Division ruled that communities have a very limited ability to accept so-called payments for open space and recreation as part of the approvals for new projects. One of the plaintiffs in the case, Rick Van Osten of the Builders League said "sometimes voluntary is sort of with a gun to your head."

Different sets of rules

While conducting my First Amendment right to freedom of speech, as well as to petition the government for a redress of grievances during a public hearing, before Union County government passed a \$437.8-million budget, I was shouted at by elected freeholders and harassed by county employees.

I was warned several times by the county counsel that I was breaking their Roberts Rules of Order. These rules only apply to citizens. County employees and elected officials can harass citizens at will. Citizens are given five minutes to speak and a county police officer will stop you from speaking if you go a second over. I have been physically removed from freeholder meetings several times for the crime of speaking more than my allotted five minutes.

When a citizen sits down after making a public comment, freeholders can rant on, using all the time they want to try and discredit what was said as well as personally attack the speaker, with no recourse for the citizen. It is no wonder to me that on average, one or two citizens bother to attend freeholder meetings, even though county government is responsible for about onefourth of our property tax bills.

The county is now spending more than \$1.19 million per day, every day, including Sunday. My hometown of Cranford is now forced to send the county more than \$1 million every month. My family sends the county approximately \$3,000 every year, yet when citizens dare to question how this money is being spent, they are harassed and badgered. This is tyrannical and desperate, not at all how any American citizen should accept their government to behave.

In the heat of the night, several things were said by officials that were outright lies and at best, distortions of the truth.

It is an old political ploy to make a detractor look angry and negative, in order to discredit your character and your facts. Freeholder (Daniel) Sullivan employed this tactic when I couldn't defend myself. While he didn't dispute my fact, he said my interest in county spending and Sen. Raymond Lesniak's family involvement in particular, was all personal with me because my husband is a former county employee who was forced to sue county government.

Sullivan stated that my husband had cost the county \$400,000 in legal bills. What he didn't bother to mention is that it cost the county \$400,000 in legal bills because the county lost the case. My husband was exonerated and this is a matter of public record. So were many other county employees who have won law suits against the county in politically-charged cases in recent years.

Add these all up, and the cost to taxpayers is in the millions with more cases still outstanding. This is what happens when government is accountable to power brokers and not the people.

Also addressed during freeholder closing comments, when no one can dispute them or add to the debate, was the Summit Common Council's recent resolution calling for the districting of Union County government instead of freeholders being elected at-large. The Union County freeholder board has been all Democratic for 10 years

The election numbers show that the Democrat voters from the cities in Union County out-vote the Republican/Independent voters in the Suburban towns. For instance, Freeholder Bette Jane Kowalski lives in Cranford, but she has never won an election there, including her run for a municipal council seat. According to the county, Freeholder Kowalski was elected to represent the people of Cranford and Westfield, Mountainside, Summit etc. That is tyrannical.

"I wish the people on the Summit Council would get over it," said Mr. Sullivan.

Schering to cut 500 jobs

KENILWORTH — Schering Plough Corp. announced this week that approximately 500 jobs have been slashed and more may be eliminated with the major focus being its global headquarters in Kenilworth.

Nearly 1,100 jobs in the statewide pharmaceutical industry are expected to be cut in the coming weeks in three different pharmaceuticals including Schering-

Schering executives say the layoffs began in the week of June 8 in order to follow through with a streamlining initiative announced in April intended to reduce costs. A total of 8,500 New Jersey residents are employed by Schering with 4,100 of those located in Kenilworth. Most of the job cuts took place in the Kenilworth, Berkeley Heights, Roseland, Springfield, Summit and Union locations.

Hillside school chief resigns

Superintendent of Schools accepts new job at Fort Lee School District

HILLSIDE — After eight years in the district, Hillside Superintendent of Schools Raymond Bandlow has given his resignation, and he believes he's leaving the public school system in better shape than it was when he began.

Bandlow, 61, has accepted a position as the superintendent of the Fort Lee School District in Bergen County, The Fort Lee Board of Education officially appointed Bandlow during a meeting June 30. The following day, he spoke to members of the Hillside school board and told them of his plans to resign later next month, according to board member, June

Bandlow's first day as Fort Lee's Superintendent of Schools will be Aug. 25, and he plans to continue working in Hillside until that date.

Bandlow said he'll be sad to leave Hillside, but he's looking forward to his job in Fort Lee.

'I'm very excited about it," said Bandlow, who began working in the Hillside School District in 2001.

The Fort Lee School District has agreed to pay Bandlow a salary of \$199,000, which is an increase of nearly \$20,000 from his current salary

Bandlow, who has worked as both a superintendent and a college professor before joining the Hillside School District, believes he has been able to make some positive changes in the last 7 years. State-mandated test scores, for example, have risen in some of the district's elementary school classes. In addition, there have been some improvements made to school facilities throughout the township.

"He has done a number of things for the district," Korzeneski said of

Korzeneski, a former teacher in the district, credited Bandlow with strengthening professional development efforts by forming relationships with entities such as Merck and Kean University.

"He has energized the professional development program," Korzenes-


Bandlow has also been responsible for securing a Rim Aid grant from the state after lobbying on behalf of Hillside. The grant was awarded based on the fact that Hillside borders Abbott districts such as Elizabeth, Irvington and Newark.

The school board will now be charged with the task of appointing an interim superintendent, until a permanent replacement for Bandlow can be found. Korzeneski said the board may choose to solicit help from the New Jersey School Boards Association, which provides members with free assistance in searching for administrators. Another, more costly option, would involve hiring a private company dedicated to helping school dis-

"The important thing is to find someone with the qualities our district needs and who can handle the challenges our district faces," Korzeneski

The new superintendent will address a number of issues including aging school facilities and a high student mobility rate throughout the district.







CRANFORD - If you dream of being a Major League Baseball player some day, the first step in realizing that lofty goal might be attending the Cranford Baseball Camp.

Called, "Breakout Sessions," that kind of instruction took place last Tuesday and Wednesday - the two middle days of the four-day camp.

Before becoming one of the top players in the Big East Conference in the late 1980s and early 1990s, McCaffery starred at Roselle Park High School, where he graduated from in 1987.

"As a kid I never attended one camp," said McCaffery, who is principal of the Lincoln School (Cranford Achievement Programs) in Cranford. "A lot of the kids seem to really enjoy it."


McCaffery, who was an assistant at Cranford for three years before becoming the head coach in 1999, thought the time to begin a camp was approaching a few years back.



Three of the top-rated football players in the state - by Dennis McCarthy of the Dennis McCarthy Report - reside in the Watchung Conference.

They include Josh Evans of Irvington, Raymond Graham of Elizabeth and Michael Larrow of Union.

Evans helped guide Irvington it its first-ever 9-0 regular season last year. The Blue Knights finished 9-1 and will, once again, be one of the favorites in North 2, Group 3.

"Everyone wants him," McCarthy said. "He's a great kid, a good student and a heck of a football player."

Evans plays quarterback and free safety for head coach Darnell Grant at Irvington, but projects in college as a defensive back. He was the Essex County and North 2, Group 4 champ this past spring in the 110-meter high hurdles and 400-meter intermediate hurdles.

"He'll be a safety and I think wide receiver is not out of the question," McCarthy said. "He could be a cornerback because he's athletic enough and tall enough (6-2, 185). As a hurdler, he could be in national competition.

"He can also come at you and pop you. He's one of the top players in the state."

McCarthy has Evans ranked No. 2 in Essex County and No. 12 in the state.

"DiLorenzo and Fontaina are also off-the-charts academically," McCarthy said. "DiLorenzo is quick for his size, very strong and very aggressive."

DiLorenzo was third in the NJISAA's Meet of Champions in the shot put competition.

McCarthy has Calabrese rated No. 5 in the state, Bianchi No. 27 and DiLorenzo No. 54.

Two Watchung Conference players among McCarthy's Union County Top 5 seniors for 2008 are Graham, who helped lead the Minutemen to the 2006 North 2, Group 4 championship and Larrow, who has already given a verbal commitment to Rutgers.

"It's a great, great year in New Jersey," McCarthy said. "There's depth at all positions, especially linemen. The last two years the state was very thin on linemen."

McCarthy's two best all-around senior players in the state include running back-linebacker Chris LaPierre of Shawnee and quarterback Michael Colvin of Morristown

LaPierre (6-3, 210) has given a verbal commitment to play lacrosse at Virginia.

"That would be a loss to the football world and a loss to LaPierre who could be a multi-millionaire," McCarthy said. "He would be the perfect rover for Mr. (Joe) Paterno, or hero position as Paterno puts it. He would be the best Penn State ever had at the position, that's how good he is."

Colvin (6-3, 250) guided head coach Chris Hull's Colonials to a 9-2 record last year and the North 2, Group 3 semifinals.

"He's one of the top quarterbacks in the country," McCarthy said. "Watching him athletically, he does all the technical stuff. He can run under 4.6 and what I like about him the most is that he has the kind of field presence that Brett Favre had.

"He has guts, tenaciousness and is an outstanding student. This is the kind of kid you could see quarterbacking in a Super Bowl.

"He's the best quarterback New Jersey's had since Joe Flacco of Audubon High School and the University of Delaware."

Flacco was the 18th pick overall of this year's NFL Draft, chosen by the Baltimore Ravens.

7-on-7 summer football increasing in popularity

points to determine which teams play for a state title in to do that. This is the closest the kids can get to that." 7-on-7 summer football.

The concept continues to increase in popularity.

"The best aspect is the philosophical approach every coach here takes to it," said West Orange head coach John Jacob, who for the second straight summer is running a Passing 7-on-7 month-long venue at his high school every Wednesday evening in July. "We don't have championships, we don't have a trophy and it's not tournament style."

Jacob feels very strongly about the unique philosophy that each coach approaches the operation.

"It's, basically, single games and we each get to compete and all the coaches here are on the same page," Jacob said. "It's all a learning experience for us."

As many as 12 schools total from Essex, Passaic. Hudson, Union, and Somerset counties are involved. with competition taking place on West Orange's field turf varsity football and soccer fields.

This gives returning and budding varsity football players a chance to compete against other local teams without pads. Squads can work on their passing games on offense and coverage on defense.

"The most inviting aspect of it is that coaches all say they love this league because they want to get better," said Jacob, who played his high school ball at Roselle Park for John Wagner and who has now been the head coach at West Orange since 2002.

Jacob also guided the Mountaineers to their first-ever home playoff game and playoff victory, both during a 2006 season in which West Orange went 8-3 and reached the North 1, Group 4 semifinals for the first time.

"This kind of competition is not about trying to win anything," Jacob said. "Each team is guaranteed three games a week. You still feed into the kids' competitiveness."

Cranford, guided by head coach Erik Rosenmeier who is beginning his fourth season at the helm of the Cougars, competed last year and looked forward to being a part of the competition again.

"This is fun," said Rosenmeier, who is a 1983 Johnson Regional of Clark graduate who played briefly in the NFL with the Buffalo Bills.

"There is summer league baseball and summer league basketball and they can go out and do that, WEST ORANGE - Pretty soon we may have power but in football we really don't have an opportunity

Rosenmeier, after being an assistant coach at Scotch Plains, became a head coach for the first time in 2005, succeeding Cranford graduate Chris Hull, who moved on to Morristown, Rosenmeier has led the Cougars to 6-4 finishes in Central Jersey, Group 2 in 2005 and 2007 and to a 5-5 record in North 2, Group 3 in 2006.

"This is touch football, we have fun, but at the same time we're able to get some of our defensive coverages in and take a look at some personnel again and some pretty good athletes," Rosenmeier said.

Cranford narrowly missed qualifying for the state playoffs in each of Rosenmeier's first three seasons, with a 10-9 Mountain Valley Conference-Mountain Division setback at Governor Livingston on a Friday night in Berkeley Heights last September proving critical to GL making it in Central Jersey, Group 2 and Cranford just falling short. GL earned the eighth and final seed, while Cranford was ninth, just two points (32-30) behind the Highlanders for the last berth.

While GL won that game with a late field goal, in a 7-on-7 setting you can continually practice trying to complete that high pass in the corner of the end zone or prevent it from being completed. That kind of play can help a team win a game or lose one. That could also be the difference between a team making the playoffs or not.

"We tell our kids that we want them to hustle and learn their assignments," Rosenmeier said. "We want them to make plays and this is their opportunity to go out and make plays that can occur in the season. They might make a play that wins a game, gets you in the playoffs or wins a championship. That's what we're trying to do here."

Code Blue is an emergency program that helps provide immediate shelter to the homeless in extreme cold.






"Code Blue gives us the means to coordinate county and local resources and focus them where they are needed most," said Human Services Director Guzzo. "Municipalities across Union County have pitched in to make this program work. Its success is thanks to their participation."

Union County implemented Code Blue in November 2007. When extreme cold weather is predicted, the County Department of Human Services coordinates with the County Police and the Division of Emergency Management, to alert municipalities that Code Blue procedures are activated.

This enables local police departments to make immediate contact with County homeless placement services, and to transport homeless persons directly to a shelter. In cases where municipal police are unable to provide transportation, County policy are available.







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
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
