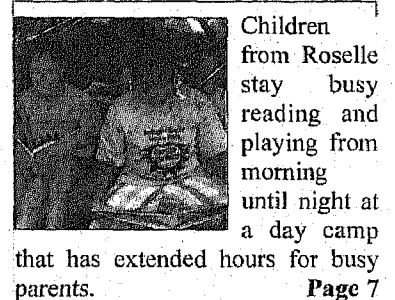

Union among 100 best places to live

UNION — The township has received a thumbs up from CNN Money, which says it's the 75th best place to live in the nation, making it the only municipality in the county

selected for an overall rating.

On Monday, the township of 56,000 residents was selected out of thousands nationwide for its potential real estate appeal, economic growth and diversity.

According to CNNmoney.com, the town-

ship, like the other 100 municipalities selected nationwide, offers its residents a high-ranking education system, low crime, proximity to various outdoor events, good year-long weather and an overall optimal quality of life.

Union was set apart from the rest of the 100 towns selected for its economic prospects as a result of its proximity to Newark International Airport and major revenue-generators Verizon and Comcast.

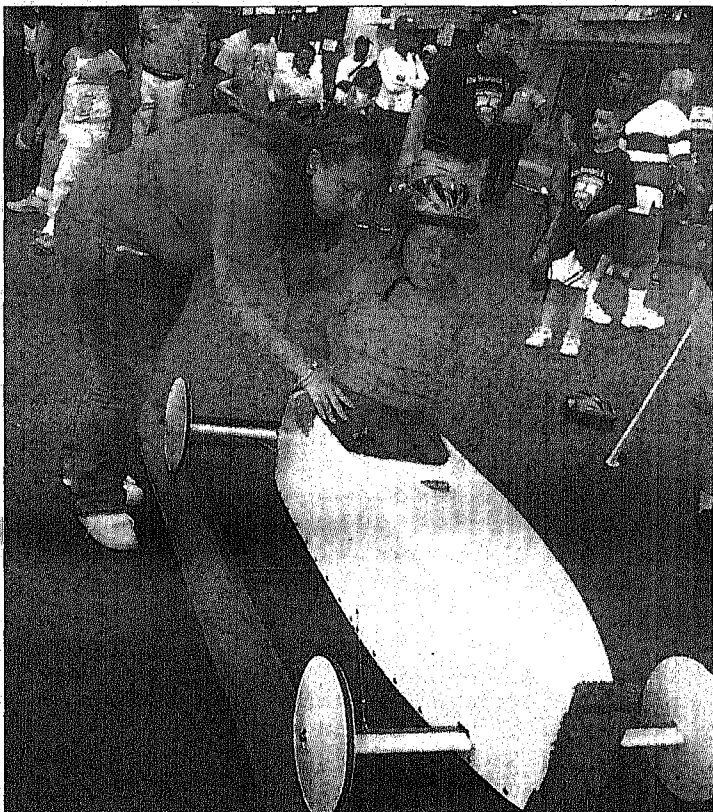

Two charged with prostitution at spa

LINDEN — After months of complaints of "unusual activity" at a local spa, two women who work at the establishment were arrested on charges of prostitution, according to police.

BOE to vote on new official

SUMMIT — Less than a month after approving the appointment of a new district superintendent, the Board of Education is poised to make another addition.

The school board will decide whether to hire Julie Glazer as the assistant superintendent during a meeting at 8 p.m. tonight in Summit High School.

If approved by the board, Glazer will replace Ross Kasun, who is leaving the district to become the superintendent of the Colts Neck School District.

She would have a one-year contract and earn an annual salary of \$138,000 in Summit. The start date would be Aug. 1. Nathan Parker

was appointed as superintendent of schools mid-June. Director of Summit's Human Resources

Department, Ken Shulack, said Glazer's knowledge of curriculum, effective professional development programs and extensive work with both administrators and teachers make her a perfect fit for the district.

If Glazer is appointed, she will leave Orange Public Schools, where she has worked since 2004 as supervisor of instruction and professional learning and development. From 2002 to 2004, Glazer

taught fifth grade language arts at Laura Donovan Elementary School in Freehold. Prior to that, she taught in Evanston, Ill.

Glazer has received degrees from Indiana University, Columbia College in Chicago, DePaul University in Chicago, Rutgers University and Seton Hall University.

If elected to the assistant superintendent post, Glazer said she plans to close the "achievement gap" in instructional priority areas. "The key to this goal is to develop learning communities that involve all stakeholders, looking at student work by grade level and content, engaging in meaningful conversations around the data and involving parents and the community in our efforts," she said.

CRANFORD — No charges have been filed so far in the case involving a student from Newark who died after being struck by a car in front of Union County College on July 8.



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Police: Woman greeted with handgun

Mountainside

On July 6, a woman reported she had a gun pulled on her while waiting to cross the street in front of her Summit Road home.

The victim said a silver vehicle slowed down as it approached her and the driver pointed what she thought was a black handgun at her. The suspect allegedly said "boom" and the woman heard a click she thought was the trigger being pulled, although no shot was fired. The suspect was described as having an "olive complexion."

• Earnest Williams, 55, of Newark was arrested at 12:21 p.m. on July 7 on Route 22 East and was charged with having an outstanding warrant.

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Police arrest youth director

MOUNTAINSIDE — A local church youth director has denied claims that he sexually assaulted a minor.

Jason Hagg, the youth group director at Mountainside Gospel Chapel, was arrested on July 7 for alleged sexual assault on a 16-year-old female member of his youth group.

Hagg, a 35-year-old Piscataway resident, is the son of minister Gregg Hagg, the church's spiritual leader. He was charged with sexual assault and later released after posting \$100,000 bail, according to officials.

According to Hagg's attorney, Thomas Pavics of Flemington, his client is absolutely innocent. Pavics suspects some ulterior motive behind the charges, because these allegations "came out of nowhere and are not true."

"He is innocent," Pavics said. "The sad thing is, you can never clear your name after this kind of allegation. That part of the damage is already done. We will do our best, though, to clear his name."

Pavics, who is still awaiting the official complaint from police, said even if there was some relationship between the child and his client, and he stressed there was not, she is of legal age for sexual consent, unless Hagg was in a supervisory position, which he was not.

Hagg, who is a delivery man with United Rental in Piscataway, was arrested at work on the afternoon of July 7, according to Detective Andrew Huber of the Mountainside Police Department.

Contrary to Pavics' understanding, Huber said Hagg was in a supervisory position and, because

of that, the charges will be raised to second-degree sexual assault.

According to a police report, Hagg allegedly engaged in

multiple sexual acts with the teenager during April and May in the chapel and at Hagg's home.

According to Huber, Mountainside detectives learned of the encounters after a friend of the girl explained to a school official at Governor Livingston High School in Berkeley Heights what had happened.

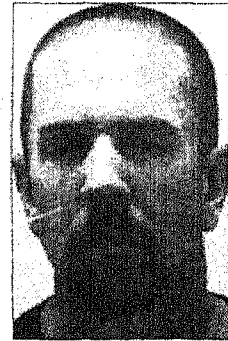
The school then contacted Mountainside detectives, who have an office in the school building.

Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow found these charges particularly disturbing.

In a statement released by the Prosecutor's Office, Romankow said, "The investigation continues, but it's especially egregious when someone in a position of authority takes advantage of that role, particularly when it happens within a church."

Hagg, who moved to Piscataway in 2005 with his wife and three children, ages 7, 4 and 2, was ordered by Superior Court Judge John Triarsi to have no contact with the girl or her family.

Hagg's first court appearance was scheduled for Wednesday. Attempts to contact Hagg or officials at the Mountainside Gospel Chapel were unsuccessful.

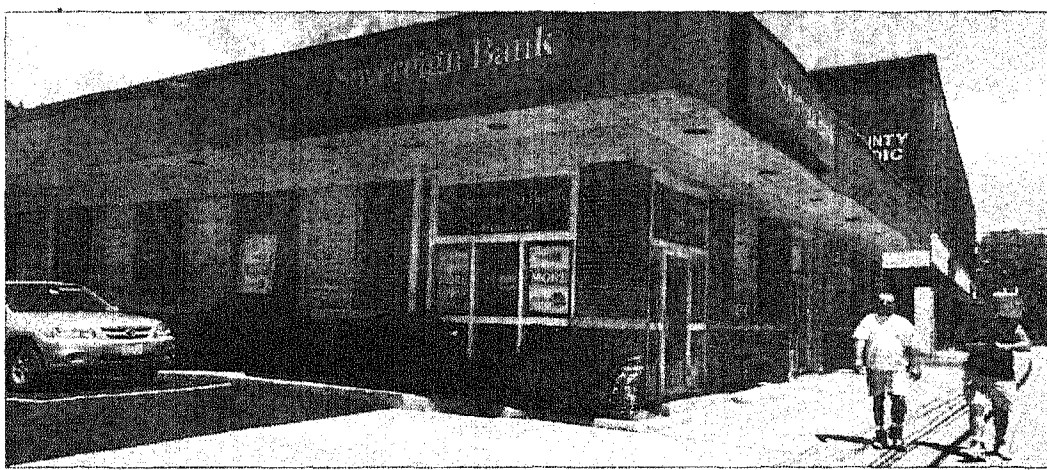

Police: Thefts may be linked

LINDEN — A man claiming to have a gun allegedly stole an unknown amount of money from a Linden bank and authorities say the same man may be responsible for an earlier heist.

Sovereign Bank, located at 236 West St. Georges Ave. was robbed at approximately 10:24 a.m. on July 8 when a suspect handed a note to a teller saying he was armed and demanding cash.

No gun was actually seen, according to authorities, and the

suspect fled northbound on Dewitt Terrace.

Neither the teller nor any of the four customers present at the time of the robbery were injured.

The nearby Wachovia Bank on 705 West St. Georges Ave. was also robbed on May 27.

In that incident, a man handed the teller a note demanding cash and walked out with \$2,000.

Linden police and FBI officials are still investigating the crimes and believe the same suspect could be responsible for both robberies. Authorities said both sus-

pect descriptions seemed to match.

The latest report listed the man as a white male in his mid-20s with a beard. He is said to be about 5 feet, 8 inches tall and weighs approximately 120 pounds. He was seen wearing light-colored shorts and a dark, long-sleeve, crew-neck shirt with stripes on the chest and a dark visor. An earlier description listed the man as being in his 30s, 5 feet, 7 inches tall, with a thin build and wearing a baseball "army" hat and a leather jacket.

Linden Police investigate robberies

LINDEN — Two armed robberies within a 45-minute span on Sunday are believed to be the work of the same men, police said earlier this week.

Both an East Elizabeth Avenue limousine service and the Linden House diner were victimized by men brandishing shotguns.

"Obviously, they are similar types of situations, so we believe it was the same actors who did both

of these robberies" said Linden Police Capt. Raymond Tyra.

The time frame between robberies would have given the suspects time to travel the 2.5-mile distance from one location to the other, Tyra added.

At around 11:30 a.m., two men entered the Capital Limousine service at 1800 East Elizabeth Ave., both wielding shotguns.

After the manager said he had no money, the men snatched a \$20 bill and a pack of cigarettes from

the counter and fled, police said.

Approximately 45 minutes later, at 12:15 a.m., three men entered the Linden House diner on 200 West St. Georges Ave.

The men, one showing a shotgun, approached the diner's owner and stole an unknown amount of cash from the register. On the way out they also held up a trio of customers. Witnesses described two of the suspects as short, black males, between 5-feet, 6 inches tall and 5-feet, 9 inches tall.

Court declares council had right to slash BOE budget

HILLSIDE — After two years and almost \$75,000 in legal fees, a decision was reached in the case between the Hillside Township Council and the Board of Education; but the board is planning to argue the decision.

State Administrative Law Judge Joseph A. Paone decided on June 26 to rule in favor of the township council, which was defending itself against claims made by the school board regarding funds cut from the 2006-07 school budget.

The board claimed the council had "misappropriated" funds for that year, when the governing body decided to slash \$1.5 million from the defeated budget on May 17, 2006.

"It's not unusual in Hillside, because the history of cuts has always been high," said Richard H. Bauch of Bauch, Zucker, Hatfield LLC of Springfield, the attorney representing the township. "We're a different type of municipality."

The Hillside School District received \$1.7 million in Abbott Rim Aid for the 2006-07 school year.

The attorney representing the Board of Education, Thomas Johnston of Porzio, Bromberg, and Newman P.C. of Morristown, said school budget funds were unlawfully used to decrease the tax levy.

"The Abbott-border district aid law was thwarted by making tax levy cuts, with money meant to be put to educational use," Johnston said.

He noted that the aid was intended to provide assistance to "chronically underfunded" school districts such as Hillside.

Council President John Kulish said the cuts were made after the defeated budget was passed along to the council for review.

"We made cuts we thought wouldn't affect educational programs or sports programs and wouldn't require the layoff of teachers," Kulish said.

According to Kulish, the board had

already signed contracts for repair work to be done throughout the district's aging facilities, and were planning to seek funding for additional work as well. The council recommended the number of projects be reduced. School officials said the \$1.5 million cut reportedly affected funding for those additional plans.

"When they claimed we misappropriated the school board's funds, that was a serious charge and we needed to defend ourselves," John Kulish said. "We proved right and at this point, I hope the (school) board accepts the judge's ruling."

The school board, however, decided last week to argue the court decision and has requested an extension to show exceptions and build its case.

Johnston said the court decision was not final and is, in fact, a recommendation and the board will therefore file an "exception," or response clarifying major points of its legal argument. He said the exception may be filed by next week.

Bauch said the attempt to challenge the court decision is futile because the Board of Education does not have a legal basis for its claims.

"Isn't the whole point of state aid to reduce reliance on local taxpayers and spread the burden across the state," asked Bauch.

According to Bauch, the cut had been proposed ahead of time during discussions between both parties.

Bauch argues that the Hillside Board of Education has been at odds politically with the Township Council and the lawsuit was an act of retaliation.

"It's impossible for there to be a misappropriation because there was no money," Bauch said. "We never had money. The board used the term misappropriation as a sound bite."

A settlement between both parties was never reached, although according to Johnston, settlement proposals were exchanged on both sides.

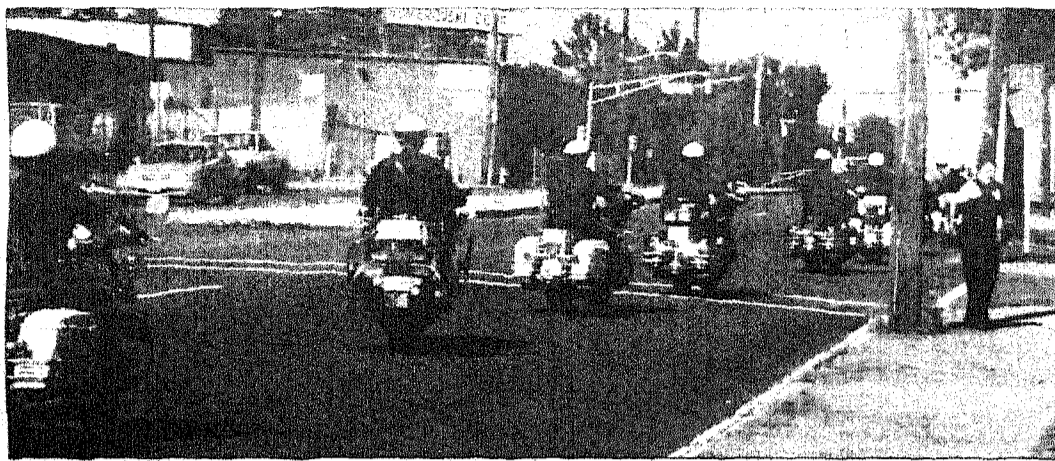

Baby's 'bravery' lives on

KENILWORTH — August Villanti may have lost his battle with cancer, but his bravery lives on, having touched the hearts of many Kenilworth police officers who now regard him as an unofficial member.

Friday morning, four days after the toddler's death, police cars and motorcycles from several municipalities in the county escorted their tiny hero from a special mass in his honor at the Church of Assumption to his final resting place in the Hollywood Memorial Park in Union. August, or "Guzzy" as he is fondly remembered by Kenilworth's finest, suffered from birth with neuroblastoma, a form of brain cancer.

He was being taken care of by his grandparents, Elizabeth McCormick and Richard Haupt, and endured numerous surgeries and several chemotherapy treatments, before succumbing to the rare illness two months after cele-

brating his second birthday.

Several borough police officers first met August in May, after getting to know his grandmother at the Kenilworth Diner, where she worked as a waitress and they often stopped to eat.

They were won over by his spirit. "He was the most lively, energetic little boy you've ever met," We all kind of adopted him," said patrolman Michael Devlin.

Every year, the police department organizes a motorcycle run to raise money for a cause of their choice. This year, the officers wanted to help pay for August's medical bills.

Devlin said choosing August as the recipient of the proceeds was an easy decision to make. "There was no better recipient than this boy," he said.

He said when officers learned of August's death, they wanted to give a deserving send-off.

Police Capt. Scott Phillips attended the Friday mass. "He had

the kind of bravery some officers would want to have," he said.

August was buried with his "blankie," a Barney doll he loved and Sgt. Mark David's "lucky hat," his police cap.

Elizabeth said August had the ability to warm people's hearts, even staff at Beth Israel Hospital in Newark missed him when he didn't return to the facility for treatment. She added that while his death was devastating, having him in her life was a blessing.

"I'm home now and it's empty," she said sadly. "It wasn't hard taking care of him because he was so easy to care for."

Elizabeth was thankful for the concern and care the police department demonstrated to her and August.

"They called me one day and surprised me with the fundraiser," Elizabeth said. "They are a very giving group of people, and I can't even begin to express how good they are, not just as officers but as friends."

Foundation offers clarity to the needy

The Summit Area Public Foundation succeeded in bringing the world into focus for 125 low-income residents of Union, Morris and Essex counties through its \$7,500 grant to New Eyes for the Needy. In partnership with the Summit-based Foundation, New Eyes purchased new prescription glasses for poor children and adults who cannot afford glasses on their own.

"The Summit Area Public Foundation has been a tremendous supporter of our program to improve the vision of disadvantaged people in New Jersey," explained Pamela DePompo, executive director of New Eyes. "Without the generous support of organizations like the Summit Area Public Foundation, we could not help the poor get the clear vision they need to build better lives."

New Eyes purchased 5,945 pairs of eyeglasses for indigent men, women and children across the U.S. between 2007 and 2008. Of that total, 1,361 pairs of glasses went directly to help state residents.

Parents ordered to pay tuition fees

Thousands owed to Hillside School District by families of illegal students

HILLSIDE— An administrative judge ruled two students who were illegally attending Hillside schools during a portion of the 2007-08 school year will not be permitted to enroll for the next school year and has ordered their parents to pay the district the tuition fee they dodged.

One parent is required to pay \$2,000, while the other must hand over \$3,000 since their child enrolled for a longer period of time while living out of district, according to Superintendent Raymond Bandlow.

School officials would not release the names of the students and families for reasons of "confidentiality," according to a press release they issued announcing the victory.

"This came about through good investigations. When the parents were confronted with the evidence in a hearing, they couldn't make excuses," Bandlow said.

Both cases entered the courts after the parents opted to appeal the school's decision. "Parents can appeal our exclusion...to the state

of New Jersey, and ultimately, it appears before a judge," said Hillside School Business Administrator Kenneth Weinheimer.

Weinheimer said the district has put more time into weeding out illegal students. School officials hired two new residency investigators this past year, for a total of five investigators working at different times.

"The Board of Education has been very aggressive in removing non-residents, but we are stepping up the pressure by going after them for back tuition as well," Bandlow said.

Weinheimer said several factors may motivate parents to send their children to schools in other towns. "It indicates that a school district perhaps has more to offer than their home location," he said.

District authorities have been identifying between 90 and 100 fraudulently-enrolled students each year.

They anticipate additional court hearings in the future, according to Weinheimer.

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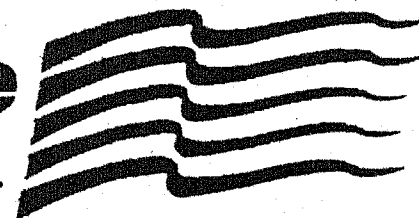
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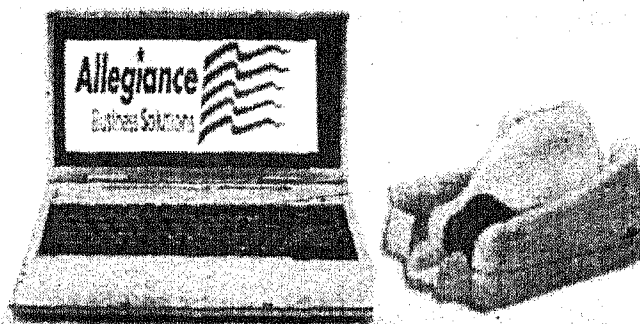
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Victim succumbs to injuries from accident

Wright suffered severe head trauma and was flown by a state police helicopter to University Hospital in Newark. She succumbed to her injuries July 11, authorities said. The incident has been turned over to the Union County Prosecutor's Office. According to Cranford Police, no charges have been filed against Trivedi.

"The initial investigation seems to indicate that the driver had the right of way," Det. Sgt. Gerry Quinn said. "She was in the crosswalk, but crossing against the signal."

Lt. Joseph Van Bergen said there were no drugs or alcohol involved.

"At this point, there's nothing that appears criminal," Van Bergen said.

Detective Ed Davenport said police were not authorized to reveal whether a sobriety test was administered to the driver.

The accident comes just months after a pedestrian fatality in the neighboring town of Clark claimed the life of 20 year-old Cranford resident, Erin Leary. The investigation into this accident was concluded without any charges being filed against the driver.

Union County Assistant Executive Prosecutor Eileen Walsh explained that criminal charges cannot be filed unless investigators determine that criminal elements are involved.

"If we don't see those elements and don't feel that there's a case we cannot charge people," Walsh said.

The investigation into the July 8 accident is ongoing. Anyone with information regarding this incident is asked to contact Detective Ed Davenport at 908-709-7336.

Mukhailova was charged with promoting prostitution and released on a summons. Pleshivtseva was charged with prostitution and released on \$500 bail.

The investigation was completed by Linden Detective Doug Fortuna after both residents and business owners complained of uncommon occurrences for a beauty salon.

"People were entering ... in off-hours and an unusual amount of male patrons were going to this beauty salon," said Linden Police Capt. Raymond Tyra.

The location fronted as the Luana Health and Beauty Spa and had been in operation for about six months prior to the arrests.

Authorities say the two women were renting the property from a local businessman. They are investigating what types of licenses the property had.

Police are still not sure if there were other suspects involved.

"Further investigations perhaps will reveal someone who was actually running the business, but that remains to be seen," said Tyra.

In an unrelated incident, a Rahway woman was arrested for prostitution after selling her services on the Internet.

Rachel Stack, 25, was arrested Friday at the Sheraton Hotel in Hauppauge, Long Island, after allegedly soliciting clients on Craigslist, a popular Web site offering free classified advertisements. George Karapistolis, 32, of Smithtown, was also arrested for acquiring her services.

Suffolk County police set up surveillance at the hotel after finding out Stack was advertising online and scheduling her appointments via the Internet. Stack and Karapistolis were released and are scheduled to appear in court.

Camp keeps children busy from morning 'til night

ROSELLE — It's noon at the borough's new day camp, and youngsters can be seen shooting hoops, gossiping in the shade and taking part in daily reading sessions.

Wait, reading at a summer camp?

Mixing paperbacks and play-

time is the philosophy at Roselle's "Seven to Seven Day Camp."

Now in its second year of operation, the program is open five days a week for 12 hours a day to accommodate working parents in the community. "The community expressed a need for child services. We looked at it as an educational opportunity. Now the borough combines both services," said

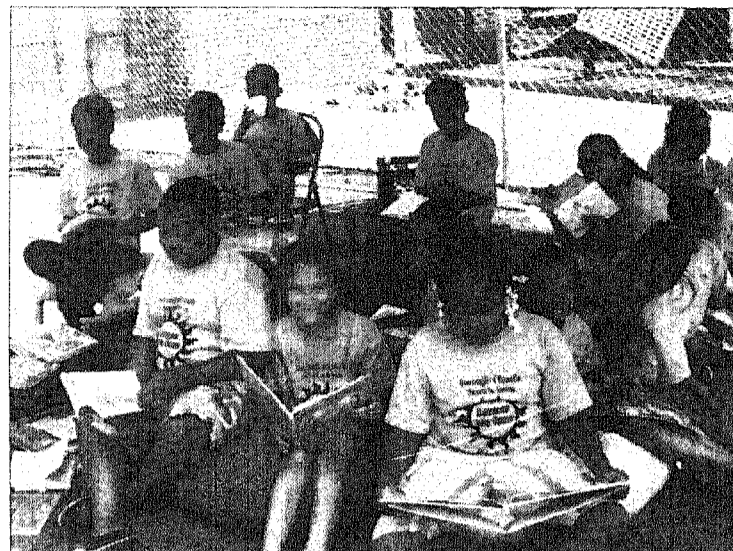
Roselle Superintendent Elnardo Webster.

Program director and Polk Elementary School Principal, Andrea Harry, likened it to a summer school disguised as a summer camp. "The focus is on student achievement," she said.

According to Harry, the learning atmosphere at the camp is exceptional because most of the counselors, about 60 percent, are also certified educators — the rest are mostly comprised of Roselle High School students.

Councilwoman Sylvia Turnage said the teachers are integral. "It brings continuity to students and allows them to interact with their teachers and be ready to work when school starts," she said.

What really has school and borough officials raving, however, is the level of cooperation behind the scenes that has helped get the most out of the estimated \$140,000 camp budget. Program operators say everyone from the governing body to parents have been pitching in by volunteering. Even the borough's Department of Public Works cleans up the camp sites in the morning. Shared services are also utilized to enhance the camp. Officials use borough and senior buses

to send campers on trips. They also have local soccer players teach free clinics, according to Turnage.

"We live in a community of working parents. With taxes high, so we need to provide services that equal their tax dollars," she said.

Many parents are finding the recipe of educational enrichment, affordable fees and flexible hours too good to pass up.

Annette Jones, a kindergarten teacher at Polk and employees at the camp, has 9-year-old and 12-year-old sons who attended the camp. "It's close and inexpensive. I like the kids being with friends, but they also get some academic enrichment," she said.

Aside from keeping busy and learning, Jones said the children still find time to have fun. "They always ask me: 'Can't I stay a little longer?'"

Officials are discussing expanding the camp, if possible, next year, saying there has been a high demand for pre-K and kindergarten services as well.

The camp runs from July 7 to Aug. 15, with approximately 475 student participants between the ages of 7 and 18.

Camp locations include Harrison Elementary School, Washington Elementary School, Grace Wilday Junior High and Bud Simmons Park.

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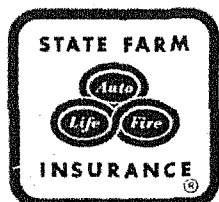
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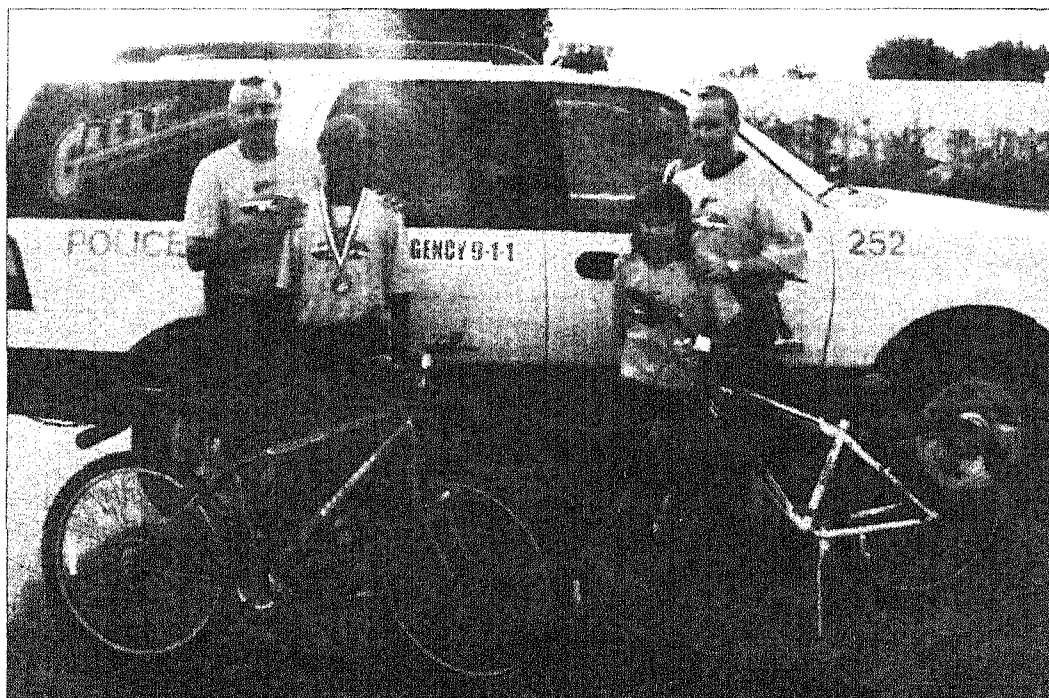

Invest in our state

New Jersey is a state drowning in debt. When suggestions as inane as increasing tolls by 800 percent in 12 years or selling the New Jersey Turnpike to foreign investors are discounted, what remains is a dire need for the state to tighten its belt. Then, just weeks after the state budget squeaks through amid complaints from small groups and special interests, it's announced that \$3.9 billion will be directed toward school construction for the coming year. These bills will fall on the shoulders of our children and our children's children, assuming they remain in the state to pay off our debt.

The real tragedy is that New Jersey's most desirable aspect, the businesses that call this state home, are being neglected by the very place that so needs them. To add insult to injury, neighboring states have been courting these same businesses, encouraging them to jump ship and bid farewell to the Garden State.

One of the biggest culprits is Pennsylvania, particularly its governor, Ed Rendell. In the five years he has been in office, Rendell has shown no qualms about approaching chief executive officers of major corporations in an attempt to entice them to relocate into the Keystone State. In 2004, the Pennsylvania Legislature passed a \$2.8 billion economic stimulus bill, which provides incentives for future development in the Keystone State. That money translated into an additional \$7 billion in private capital and the creation 178,200 jobs.

In the mean time, New Jersey has been letting businesses slip through its fingers. International Battery, with headquarters in northern Bergen County, considered building a factory in New Jersey. However, although many state offices were contacted, no support was proffered and the company wound up opening a plant in Allentown, Pa., in October. Now only a small engineering operation is still located in New Jersey.

In 2006, Pennsylvania ranked first in the nation in cross-border investments, projects whose capital comes from outside a given state. Rendell's action team closed on 998 deals in the past five years, which translated into \$11 billion of private investment and 105,000 new jobs.

This is the kind of return New Jersey desperately needs. Our state is known for its pharmaceutical industries, companies that need to be encouraged to expand and invest. But there are other industries just as attractive which need our state's support.

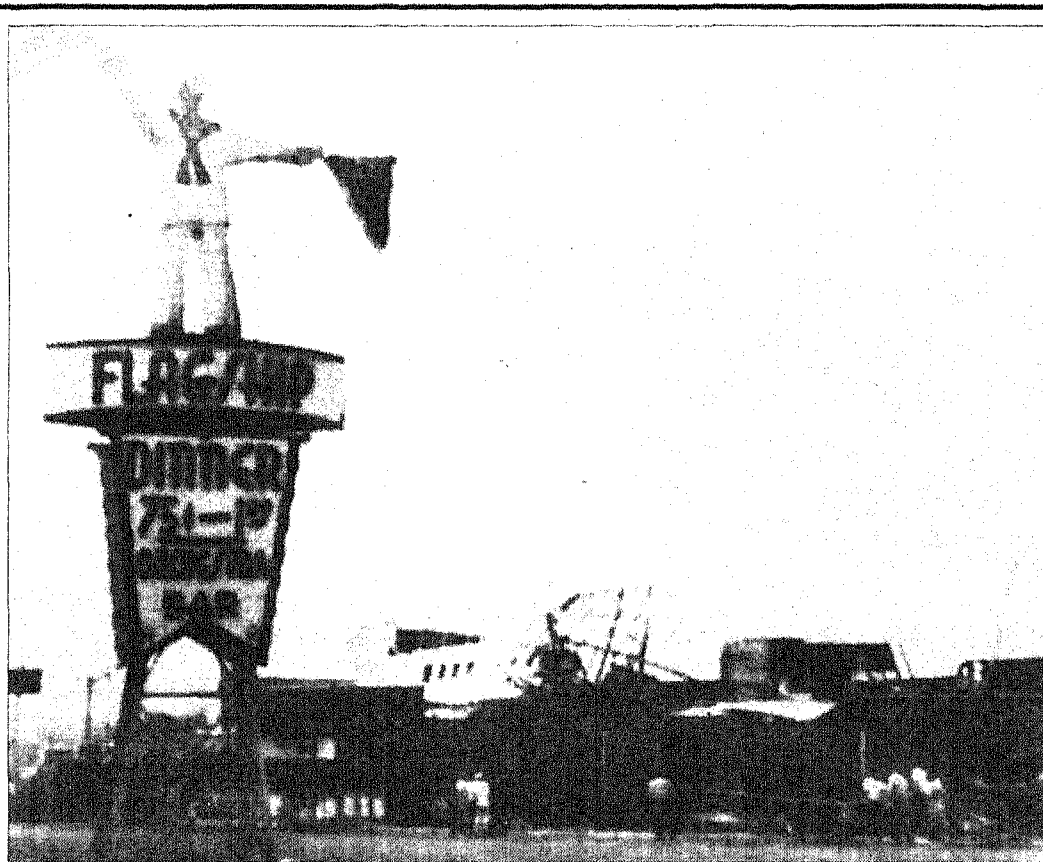

makes them understandable.

This month, Kanterman held an event at his house to mark the publication of his new book "Managing Firework Displays." Naturally, he has been a leader in state and national fireworks safety organizations.

It turns out, there is no turnkey step by step textbook for the managing of fireworks displays. Kanterman took care of that need. The book is expected to be a valuable resource for fire marshalls and fire officers around the country.

The fireworks safety program has been of concern to Kanterman going back to his first career as a firefighter in New York. Even during his tenure as president of the Union County Firefighters Association from 1995-97, he saw a need for a manual and of course, he filled it.

At the other end of the county, the Springfield Police Department has also experienced the higher standard of conduct which our public safety personnel are held to every day. It can be a very sharp

double-edge sword.

The decision by the township to terminate Officer Mark Berman back in 2006, finally resulted in a decision by the State Appellate Division last week.

The officer's battle with the township had followed the path of disciplinary hearings at the local level, followed by an appeal to Union County's top judge, Walter Barisonek, and later to the Appellate Court.

The case centered around an adverse "fitness for duty evaluation" conducted by the township's appointed psychologist. During the trial before Barisonek, Berman's psychologist presented counter arguments. Barisonek ruled for the township.

The three-panel Appellate Division stated that "courts are instructed to take into consideration the special role of law enforcement officers in society." They added, "a police officer can not complain that he or she is being held to an unfairly high standard of conduct. Rather, it is one of the obligations he undertakes upon voluntary entry into the public service."

Something about filling needs comes to mind.

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Does the 'gravy train' stop in UC?

It's not always easy coming up with a weekly column.

Sometimes you go to council meetings that end in 15 minutes with no public comment. Even the 10 people in attendance would prefer to forget these meetings. But then the next day, you make it to a Union County freeholder meeting where the budget is passed and some members of the public come with an agenda to convey as much displeasure as they can fit into their allotted five minutes.

On June 26, it all boiled over as the freeholders bit back and in the heat of anger — and possibly inadvertently — uttered two magic words that should outrage every citizen in Union County. Hopefully, you'll be able to check it out on your local access cable channel for the theater alone. Here's my take.

Had you ever been at, or seen these freeholder meetings in the last few years, you may be familiar with Tina Renna, a Cranford resident who seems to believe that everyone on the board is corrupt and wasting about half the tax money they take in to employ and entertain themselves and their friends and relatives. On this night Mrs. Renna commented on the county manager getting a new Tahoe hybrid vehicle, a redesigned office, and having his personal trainer manage county golf courses.

In rebuttal, Freeholder Daniel Sullivan objected to the personal nature of Mrs. Renna's comments, which quickly degenerated into a sniping match.

In any case, being a uniter by nature, I took to the podium, attempting to defuse the situation. I asked an innocuous budget question, gave a brief synopsis of Rodney King's "can't we all get along" speech. I finished up with what, to

the freeholders, is the rhetorical equivalent of scratching a cat's belly, when I brought up possibilities for musicfest acts. Incidentally, no big names have been set yet, though I suggested Bob Dylan would be in the area.

As I was calming the waters, I noticed that Freeholder Sullivan stepped out for a minute. What I took initially as a snub I later discovered was probably a trip back to his desk for props which he was to use during his next comment time. By then, Mrs. Renna had already left, so Freeholder Sullivan was brandishing two pieces of paper to rebuke Mrs. Renna to everyone who had attended the meeting — except Mrs. Renna.

Apparently, there was a newsletter, UC Directions made up by some UC Alliance, that Joe Renna, Tina Renna's husband and a one-time county employee and freeholder candidate, had earlier this century been tasked with setting up.

To that end, Joe Renna hired Tina Renna to sell advertising of which she was to get 15 percent of the revenue. One of the brandished papers was the contract setting out terms and the other was the invoice for what I gathered was \$5,000 paid. Freeholder Sullivan then noted that Tina Renna had only attended these meetings and been troublesome after Joe Renna left his county job and the "dollars in the gravy train stopped."

That's where I, too, stopped.

Daniel Sullivan has been a sitting freeholder since 1995 and was the chairman of the board in 1998 and 2000. Even in pique, to have him candidly equate any aspect of this county's government to a "gravy train" is either a: an exaggeration to malign a critic or, b: the truth.

If it's b, then more questions have to be asked. Is the gravy train still in service? Were the Rennas allowed on board only if they played ball? What's the game? Can anyone play? Who's the conductor?

What Freeholder Sullivan openly admitted, with apparent approbation from the other board members, was that, yes, Union County government is running a favor-mill and any critics of their practices must be disgruntled because they can't get a taste. Here was a couple on the "gravy train" who were kicked off and that's why they are now critics.

Motives for criticism vary and I'm not about to psychoanalyze Tina Renna. I can only speak for myself. I object that we even have county government, when most of the useful services they supply could be absorbed at the municipal or state level where there seems to be better oversight. I object that there ever was, and may still be, a "gravy train" run by that government. I object to having my taxes fuel that train.

The state was rebuffed on toll hikes and there are no other taxes to raise. They'll hit the property-tax payer hard to pay for over-generous benefits whose tab can no longer be put off. In this case, silence is approval. If you accept your taxes funding a "gravy train" then you deserve to be taken for a ride.

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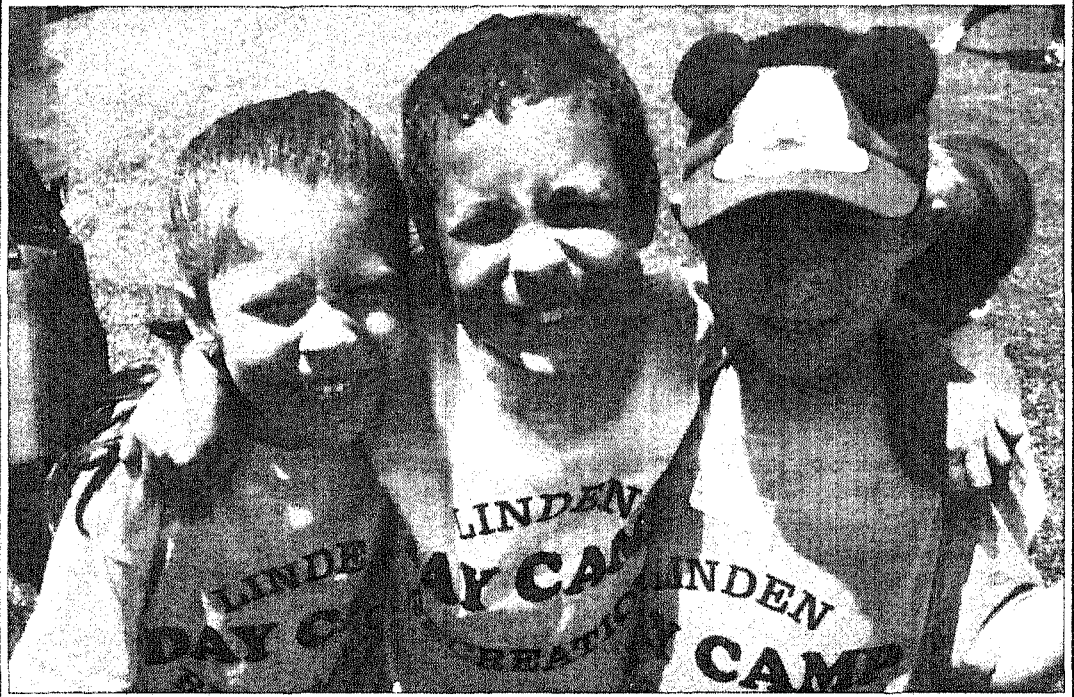

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Bullets strike 3 homes

LINDEN — A quiet night was interrupted by the sound of multiple gunshots July 8. Three separate homes on the 800-block of East Curtis Street were hit by stray bullets, according to police.

Although one suspect was arrested and found to be in possession of a handgun, law enforcement officials believe the man who fired the shots is still on the loose.

Anthony McGriff, 21, of Elizabeth was arrested after a brief chase, but a second suspect has still not been located.

"We don't suspect the weapon recovered was responsible for (the bullets lodged in homes). We believe...there was a second weapon discharged," Capt. Raymond Tyra said. The shots were heard around 11:03 p.m. Residents in two of the homes narrowly avoided injury, police said.

A 30-year-old mother was sitting in her living room with her 4-year-old son when a bullet went through a window and lodged in the wall. The woman said she could hear a bullet whiz through the room, as she pulled herself and her son to the ground.

Another victim, a 72-year-old woman, was watching television when she heard a bullet strike her air conditioner, which was in a window. Police found a shell lodged in the unit.

McGriff led Community Oriented Policing units who responded to the area on a brief footchase. He and another individual had begun running when police approached them as they stood in a group near the corner of Lincoln and East Curtis streets.

Officer Airan Fernandez chased the fleeing McGriff several yards and recovered a black revolver he discarded during the chase. Other officers nabbed McGriff as he tried running back across Lincoln Street.

Law enforcement officials recovered six spent .45 caliber shell casings and one live .45 caliber round at the intersection of Lincoln and East Curtis streets. All the evidence collected was sent to the Union County Police Lab for analysis.

Unlawful possession of a weapon and obstruction were among the charges filed against McGriff. He is being held at Union County Jail on a \$60,000 bail.

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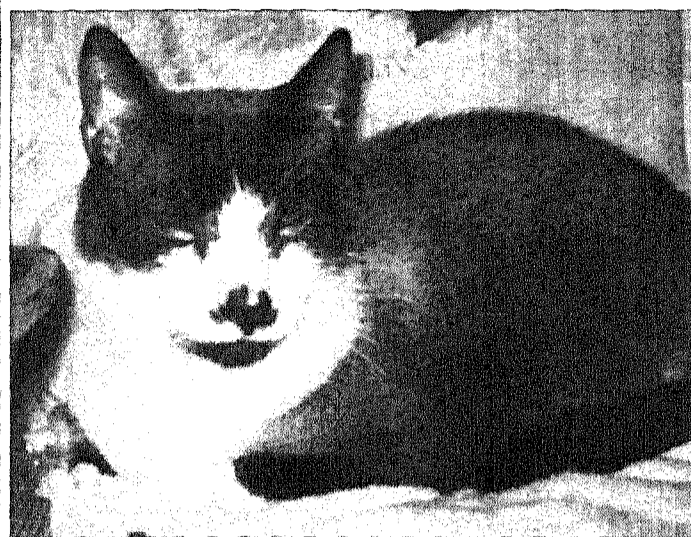

Police to youth: Gear up for a safe summer

SUMMIT — Last month, a child riding a scooter without a helmet was seriously injured after being hit by a car. Summit police say incidents like these are becoming all too common in the city.

To curb the growing problem, the Police Department recently kicked off an initiative to educate Summit youth on the importance of helmet safety throughout the summer.

Police will be strictly enforcing the Bicycle Helmet Law, which has been in place in New Jersey since 2006, for children younger than 17 years old, according to Lt. John Dockerty, who serves as commander of the Traffic and Special Services Bureau.

Local law enforcement will be keeping an eye on more than just bicycle riders.

"People are not aware that this law includes people riding, not only bicycles, but all recreational vehicles," Dockerty said.

According to Sgt. David Richel of the Traffic and Special Services Bureau, there usually is a spike in bicyclist of all ages in the streets during the summer months, as most youth are not in school and adults may be on vacation.

"Almost all accidents that occur when juveniles are riding on these toys will result in head injury if the child is not wearing a helmet," Richel said.

Youth spotted without helmets, when needed, may be issued a summons.

If a summons is issued the offender must appear in court and may be fined.

No summonses have been issued this year, according to who Dockerty



Summit police are cracking down on youth who are not wearing helmets while riding bicycles, scooters and other related equipment.

"Our objective is not to be a nuisance to these children, it is to educate them on the risks of not wearing a helmet," Dockerty said.

While there is no federal law requiring cyclists to wear bicycle helmets, there are a total of 22 state laws, including New Jersey, and approximately 152 laws initiated in municipalities throughout the country.

Only 14 states do not have state or local laws requiring the use of the protective head gear, among them are Arkansas, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Mississippi, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, South Carolina, Utah, Vermont and Wyoming.

From 1994 to 2005, there were 9,522 bicycle-related deaths in America; 8,143 of those incidents involved individuals who were not wearing a helmet, according to statistics.

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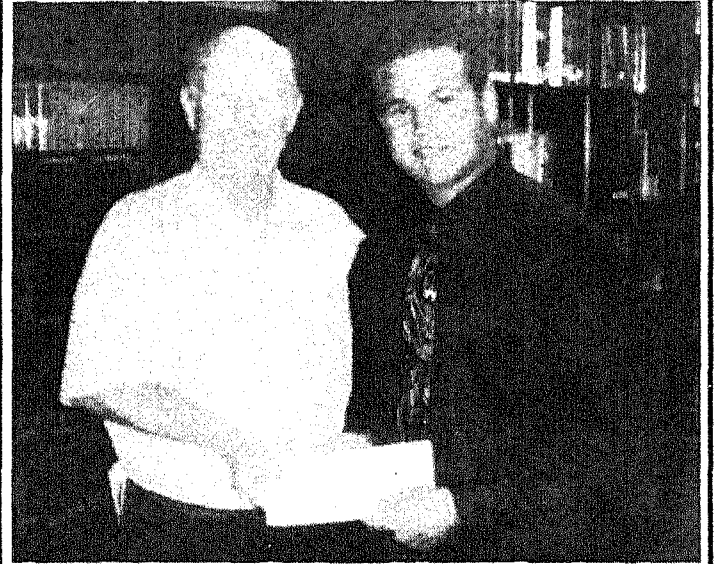

Still a problem area

Police continue to investigate Rt. 22

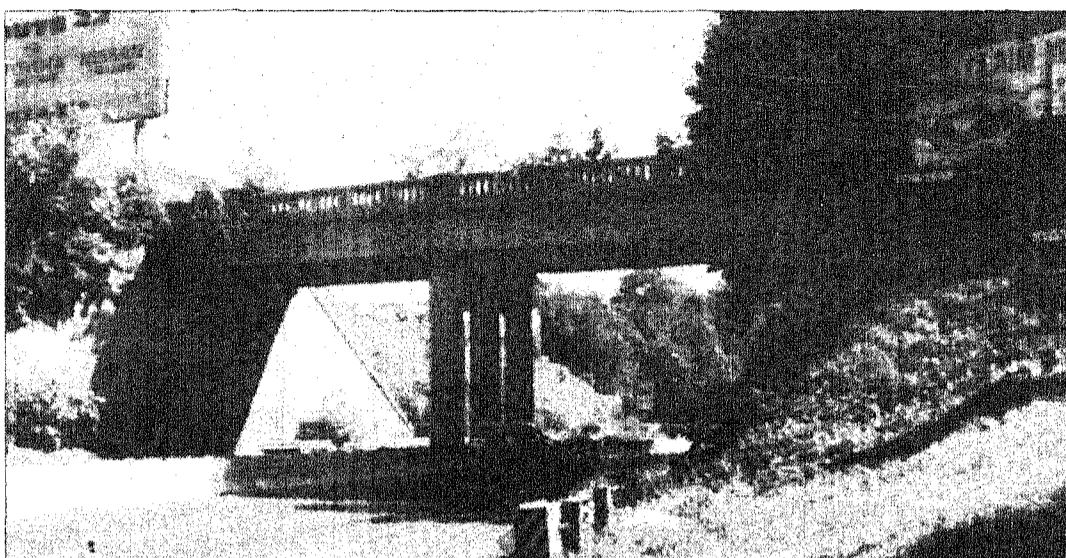

HILLSIDE — Patrols on Route 22 have increased since initial reports of rocks being thrown onto the busy roadway a month ago, but authorities suggest the highway, with its sudden curves and aging overpasses has always been a problem area.

"Thousands pass through Hillside on Route 22 safely and these few incidents should not scare people," Hillside Police Chief Robert Quinlan said.

Although there has been an increase in patrols this last week on Route 22, Quinlan said he would rather not jeopardize the safety of Hillside residents by stationing too many officers on the highway and not enough within the township.

"This town does not have the resources to cover every inch of that highway 24 hours a day," Quinlan said. "Our primary concern has always been the streets of

Hillside and we don't want the town to be neglected."

To date, 30 reports have been made by motorists claiming damage was done to their vehicles because of stones or chunks of rock hurled at them while driving on Route 22 through Hillside. According to Quinlan, three of those 30 incidents involved injuries. On June 13, one person was transported to the Overlook Hospital's Union campus for head injuries. On June 11, someone was taken to Beth Israel Medical Center in Newark for an eye-related injury and another was taken to Trinitas Hospital in Elizabeth for a head injury.

On June 15, seven cars were reportedly struck by stones as they were driving on Route 22 near the Newark border. The 30 incidents have occurred in various locations along Route 22 in Hillside, according to reports. The investigation, which is being led by Capt. Louis Panarese, remains open.

Quinlan assured motorists that although several reports of damage to vehicles have been made, there has not yet been any confirmation that all of the incidents were related. The chief said no one but the victims has witnessed the incidents.

"Route 22 has been a problem for years," Quinlan said. "For years we've arrested kids for throwing things from nearby bridges."

He noted that some of the incidents may have occurred as a result of debris falling off the back of dumptrucks, rather than stones being thrown by someone.

Quinlan said a bridge located on North Broad Street was used as a trolley line until the 1930s and is now dubbed "the bridge to nowhere" because it is no longer in use. Some speculate it may be a spot from which people have thrown objects. Department of Public Works Superintendent Scott Anderson said that upon request by council president John Kulish,

an investigation of the bridge took place Friday morning.

"On the side behind the North Broad Street the fence blocking the bridge was there but on the other side, the eastbound side, the fence has been cut up and pulled up as if kids have been sneaking in there," he said.

He added that it is unknown how long ago the fence was cut and whether or not it has played a role in the recent Route 22 stone-throwing incidents.

Anderson said he has been sending letters to the New Jersey Department of Transportation requesting the removal of "the bridge to nowhere" as well as upgrades on the dangerous highway. According to both Anderson and Quinlan the state has been ignoring Hillside's requests for years. Jeff Spikler, a regional DOT representative, was not available for comment. Quinlan said many fatal accidents have occurred on the state highway.

"One of the dangerous spots is by Bloy Street where there's a lot of truck traffic," Quinlan said. "We have the most hazardous curves in New Jersey."

He said the state highway, which was originally constructed in the early 1900s, has not been upgraded to withstand the faster pace of traffic in the 21st century.

Fewer weather worries

County may install bus stop shelters

Pedestrians, who no longer have to cross a deadly stretch of Route 22 in Union and Springfield thanks to the county's free shuttle service, can expect some improvements to the program, which began in 2007.

The county is proposing the addition of 11 bus stop shelters, which are expected to improve service for the 200 riders who depend on the Route 22 Transit Shuttle every day.

At last week's Union County Freeholder meeting, officials considered a resolution that would permit the county to enter into an agreement with NJ Transit to purchase and install 11 bus shelters along the heavily-traveled 3.5 mile business corridor.

Officials said the project, if approved at the July 24 freeholder meeting, would not require tapping into taxpayers dollars.

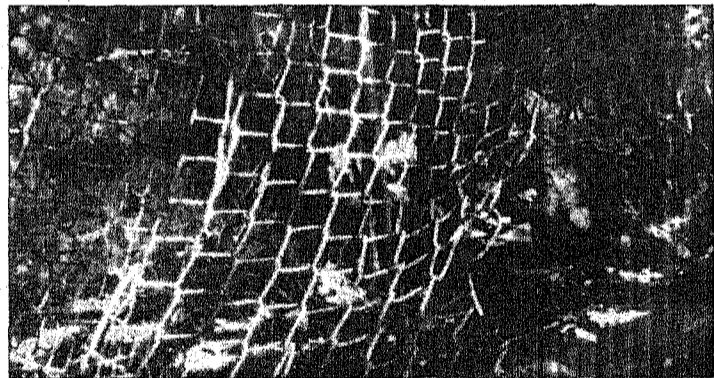
The county engineering department has already prioritized placement for the first three shelters, pending the project's approval. Included is the staging area for the shuttle at Monroe Street, Route 22 West in Union, Jefferson Avenue, Route 22 East in Union adjacent to the Target store and Brown Avenue near David's Bridal on Route 22 West in Springfield.

This initiative is the next step in a program that officials say, proved to be more successful than they expected. One month after the shuttle bus pilot program was launched in October 2007, it became evident the county would have to expand the weekday shuttle service to a seven-day service, due to the overwhelming response of riders.

County officials believe the small, white shuttles have provided a safer means of transportation for the large number of resident, retail, office and industrial employees who need to gain access to both sides of the congested eastbound and westbound corridors of Route 22.

In the first month of operation alone, two 20-passenger vans provided rides to 2,949 people, five days a week from 6:30 a.m. to 11 p.m. By the following month, that number had doubled, requiring the county to expand the program to seven days a week, officials said.

Asian Tiger is county's newest 'pest'

Add the Asian Tiger Mosquito to the list of flying, stinging pests to watch out for this summer. This non-native species has been moving northward since it was first identified in Texas in 1935. It has now found a home in at least half of New Jersey, including Union County.

"The Union County Bureau of Mosquito Control has identified the Asian Tiger Mosquito as a nuisance because of its sharp bite and its preference for urban areas," said Freeholder Chairman Angel G. Estrada. "All County residents can help reduce its numbers, by regularly

checking yards and neighborhoods for potential breeding spots."

Unlike many mosquitoes, the Asian Tiger shuns green space. It prefers crowded urban habitats including patios and backyards.

It is called a "container mosquito" because it breeds easily in any small object that holds water, such as flower pots, yard toys, discarded tires, empty bottles, plastic bags and even bottle caps. The Asian Tiger Mosquito also breeds in neglected pools, fountains and clogged rain gutters.

"Get rid of the breeding sites, and you help get rid of the mosquito," Estrada said.

Removing litter and debris is a major first step toward eliminating breeding sites. Unused pools, fountains and ornamental ponds should be drained and covered.

Mosquitoes carry a range of diseases including malaria, West Nile Virus and dengue fever.

To avoid bites, county residents are advised to wear long clothing when outdoors in the early morning and early evening. DEET remains the single most effective mosquito repellent.

Team presents study results

Researchers from Kean University presented the official Union County Needs Assessment final report to the United Way of Greater Union County in a presentation in the Kean Hall Conference Center on June 12.

The event marked the culmination of a 15-month study of the social and human needs of the residents of Union County. Members of the research team, who were selected for their expertise in the various research areas, consisted of Kean University faculty members José Sanchez, principal investigator, Christopher Donoghue, Zandra Gratz, Mary Lou Mayo and Melodie Toby.

"From the onset of this project, the consulting team and I conceived the design and methodology of this study as a way to address issues related to social justice and community service," said Sanchez.

Key study areas included exploring needs and gaps in the delivery of services and how increased institutional efficiency and effectiveness may be used as vehicles to improve social services.

"The research findings are only meaningful if they are utilized to improve the lives of people," Sanchez said. "It is our obligation to work everyday toward transforming lives and our success is a reflection of our compassion and our commitment to our work."

Ridership has continued to increase. Last month, the county saw the highest usage to date, with 6,112 riders total, or approximately 200 passengers a day. According to county officials, the collaboration of various county, state and federal agencies was necessary in order to fund this service.

According to Karen Dinsmore, assistant director of the Union County Department of Human Services, projected costs to run the shuttle came in at \$750,000 annually or \$50,700 a month.

This cost, however, will be re-evaluated, especially in light of recent skyrocketing gas prices.

Riders support the shuttle and readily admit they feel a sense of relief now that they no longer have to dodge traffic to get to their places of employment, restaurants or local stores.

"Everyday I thank God I don't have to wait until I can make a run for it across that road," said Emalina Ruggiero, 38, of Union, who works at a retail store on the eastbound side of Route 22. "Trust me, without a car, I have no choice. I have to work and the only way to get there is to cross Route 22."

As he waited for the shuttle to arrive, George Everett, 69, also of Union, said he feels safer since he began using the van service.

"I had so many near misses, especially at night," Everett said. "This is a dangerous road and now, after all these years, now I just come here and wait, the van comes and its free. You can't beat that with a stick."

Everett said he would welcome a shelter, but with or without this addition, he would still wait for the van because of the safety issue.

Other riders said that while they rely on the shuttle and it has made getting across this roadway safer, they still have to stand out in the rain and snow to wait for the van.

"Let's face it, sometimes when it's raining really hard or it's winter and the weather is really cold....you see a break in traffic and you think about taking a chance and trying to cross the highway," said Augusto Rivera, 27, Union. "I wait because who wants to get killed," Rivera said. "If they put up the shelters, that would be good. That would be real good. Then I won't have to bring a change of clothes with me when the weather is bad."

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Cranford enters interim cost agreement with Garden Homes

CRANFORD — A public presentation of the proposed Riverfront Redevelopment Project afforded residents a look at Garden Homes' plan for the site, as the township begins its interim cost agreement for exclusive negotiations with the developer Garden Homes.

"I would say that Garden Homes seems to clearly hear the township's concerns with previous concepts and stepped forward with a plan that met many of the township's concerns," Mayor Robert Puhak said.

Puhak said the committee hopes to reach a consensus with the developer in the next three or four months.

The televised meeting consisted of an outline of the project by Garden Homes representatives, including Director of Development Anthony DiGiovanni.

Slides portraying schematics and photographs were also displayed.

Resident reaction at the meeting was mixed, with many giving praise for Garden Homes' thorough approach to the project, while some misgivings on specific aspects such as parking and density persisted.

Zoning Board member Jeff Pistol was more concerned about attracting significant retailers to Cranford than about the size of the project.

"I think the development is on an appropriate scale," Pistol said.

Former township commissioner George McDonough said he supported Garden Homes' plan, but questioned the committee's concession to 106 units on three acres after they had turned down a proposal by Lehigh Acquisition Corporation for 126 units of age-restricted housing on five acres at the 555 South Ave. site.

"Are you guys using logic or are these numbers based on the mood of the night?" McDonough asked.

The rejection of Lehigh Acquisition's plan drew a builder's remedy lawsuit that is presently under way. McDonough said the governing body should apply the same standards to both the Riverfront project and the 555 site, unless the township's decisions with regard to appropriate density appear arbitrary or discriminatory.

"It adds fuel to the case of the litigants who are suing us," McDonough said.

Township officials said the ongoing litigation prevented them from discussing the 555 South Ave. project, but did indicate the two projects are dissimilar in a number of ways.

After the 3.5-acre site was designated an area in need of redevelopment in 1998, the project endured 10 years of fits and starts, including exclusive negotiations with two other developers.

Garden Homes' present plan calls for four buildings containing 17,000 square feet of retail space, 14,000 square feet of office space

and 106 residential units. An additional 214 parking spaces will be created for the project. The buildings will be situated with two three-story structures along South Avenue, one three-story building along High Street and one four-story building set back from the road where its 47-foot height would not be noticeable from the street.

Because of the site's inclusion in the 100-year flood plane, flood storage areas will be located underneath the structures.

The plan also allows for small green spaces such as pocket parks and public squares to exist between buildings, in addition to a community room that can be used for civic activities and events.

Garden Homes has purchased all the properties on the site and will be covering the costs of necessary sewerage infrastructure improvements, which is estimated at hundreds of thousands of dollars.

DiGiovanni said that, as a life-long Cranford resident, he has a personal stake in putting forth the best project possible for his town.

"We have national experience and local flavor as well," DiGiovanni said.

There will be more public updates on this project in the future and there are plans to make the presentation available to the public through a link on the township Web site.

Show takes comical look at Shakespeare's work

Three actors take on 100 roles, 37 classic plays in less than two hours — with some hilarious results

If the very mention of William Shakespeare makes your children's eyes glaze over and if just remembering reading his plays in school makes you shudder, then journey to the Greek Amphitheatre at the College of St. Elizabeth, where The Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey is performing "The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (abridged)" through July 26. Your sides will hurt from laughing and you will never think of the Bard the same way ever again.

A much-reduced company of three actors in hightops and wigs, who think the tragedies are funnier than the comedies, performs a zany, slapstick, breakneck-paced romp that is an assault on the writings of the Bard.

As they race through all 37 of Shakespeare's plays in less than two hours, the actors portray more

than 100 characters and shed a completely new light on Romeo, Juliet, Othello, Hamlet and many of Shakespeare's other characters, as well.

The actors, Jeffrey M. Bender, David Foubert and Jay Liebowitz, believe they know all there is to know about Shakespeare, but they tend to mix up, forget and often drastically alter the plays. Much of the hilarity stems from the frustration and confusion among the actors themselves. They have a hard time deciding who will play whom and what will happen next. They even coerce the audience to participate in the show! The three actors play these clowns with so much energy that it's a wonder they can do six shows a week.

Hilariously influenced by the Marx Brothers and Monty Python, "Othello" becomes a rap number and "Hamlet" is performed four times — once backwards! The cast

presents the histories as a football game, with the crown substituting for the pigskin. "The Scottish Play," aka "Macbeth," out-Scottish the most ardent kilt wearer and the gory "Titus Andronicus" becomes a Rachael Ray cooking show, complete with extra virgin olive oil! The 16 comedies are condensed into one play, titled "Cymbeline Taming Pericles the Merchant in the Tempest of Love As Much as You Like It for Nothing" or "The Love Boat Goes to Verona."

The play's original authors, Adam Long, Daniel Singer and Jess Winfield, have given each production permission to keep the play fresh by inserting topical references, which means that mentions of Face Book, Ryan Seacrest, Lindsay Lohan and "The Sopranos" elicit an uproar from the audience. And since the theater is directly in the flight path for Morristown Air-



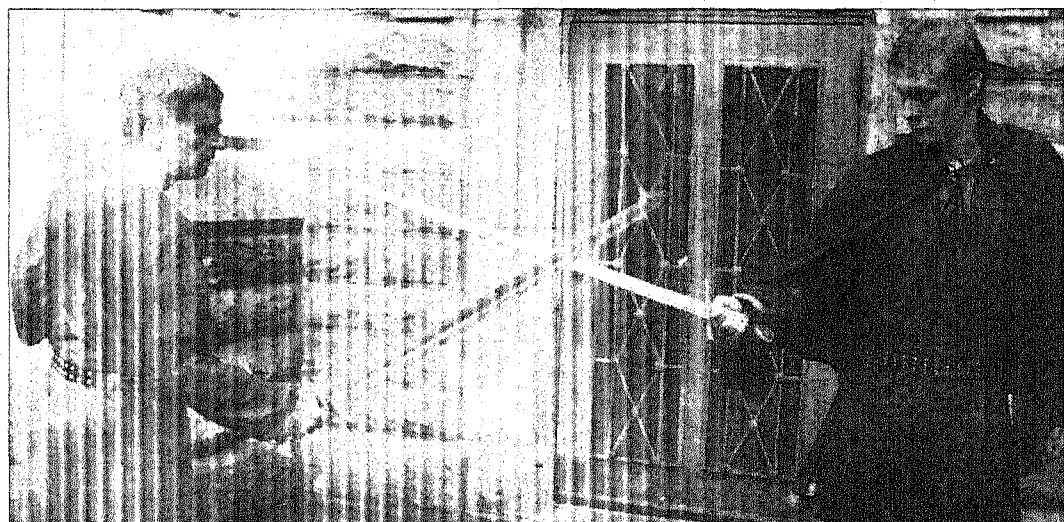

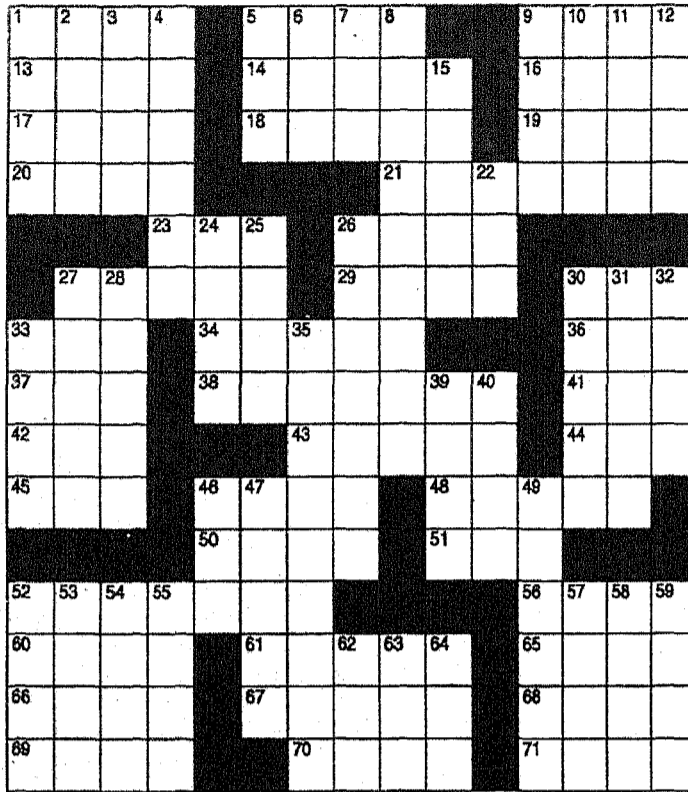
"This program is a wonderful way to get parents and family members more involved in art education," Davey said.

Igbinosun, Elshiekh and Faulcon seeking to excel in Snapple Bowl

WESTFIELD - Ike Igbinosun and his Rahway football teammates suffered a devastating loss at home to Carteret in last year's Central Jersey, Group 2 semifinals.

The Indians reached the section's semifinals for the fourth straight year, but were turned away 19-14, falling about 25 yards short of reaching the end zone for the winning points.

Igbinosun and fellow Rahway teammates Corey Alfano and Demetrius Washington as Union County All-Stars will get a chance to stick it to several Middlesex County All-Stars such as Joe DeQuarto, Byron Lewin and Al Tampa of Carteret in tonight's 15th annual Home News Tribune Snapple Bowl High School All-Star Football Game between Union and Middlesex counties.

Kickoff is 7:30 at East Brunswick High School.

The series is tied at 7-7, with the Middlesex County squad on a two-game winning streak.

Proceeds from the past 14 games have totaled more than \$227,000 and have benefited the Lakeview School for Cerebral Palsy in Edison and the Children's Specialized Hospital in Mountainside and Fanwood.

Game director Marcus Borden, the head coach at East Brunswick, reported that last year's \$32,000 raised is the record so far.

In addition to Snapple and the Home News Tribune, the U.S. Army is a big sponsor.

Igbinosun, an outstanding outside linebacker and one of the more imposing players on the Union County squad at 6-3, 250, will continue at Southern Connecticut State.

"It's Division 2, but when I went there and visited, it felt like home to me," Igbinosun said. "The football team was real serious. All my brothers played in college, so I can join the tradition."

Igbinosun doesn't have to be reminded of what happened at Veterans Field last November on the Saturday before Thanksgiving when Carteret prevented Rahway from having the opportunity to play again for the school's first state championship in football since 1984.

"This means a lot because I'm playing with a lot of great players," Igbinosun said. "The thing with Carteret, I'm going to have my last revenge on them."

Rahway did rebound to knock off arch rival Johnson 27-6 at home on Thanksgiving to finish 9-2. The Indians won the Mountain Division of the Mountain Valley Conference and won nine games for the first time since last playing for a state championship in 1999 when they were in the North 2, Group 3 championship game and fell to Morristown 46-0 at Giants Stadium.

"We only lost two games, so I thought we had a good season," Igbinosun said. "We had a great team. We stayed together. Even though we lost in the playoffs we still won a game after that against Clark (Johnson)."

Carteret - guided by head coach Matt Yaseko, who is one of the Middlesex County coaches - ended up winning Central Jersey, Group 2 as the sixth seed. Before and after winning at second-seeded Rahway in the semifinals, the Ramblers won at third-seeded Delaware Valley 13-7 in the quarterfinals and downed fifth-seeded Rumson-Fair Haven 20-14 in last December's final at Rutgers.

One Union County All-Star that helped his team win a state championship is linebacker Hany Elshiekh (5-10, 190) of Brearley.

During his junior season in the fall of 2006, Elshiekh's play on both sides of the ball helped the Bears capture their first state championship since 1991 when they held on to defeat Verona 21-20 in that year's North 2, Group 1 final at Giants Stadium.

Elshiekh is also one of the finest wrestlers to ever come out of Brearley. He won more than 100 matches, earning his 100th victory in a big win at Roselle Park this past year. Elshiekh also captured his first Region 3 championship in 2007-2008 and was one of the top 189-pounders in the state.

More importantly, he finished ranked No. 1 academically in his senior class. He will attend Boston College, but only as a student.

"This is exciting to get one last chance to strap on some pads and get out there," Elshiekh said. "Especially with the kids out here, everybody's a great player. After having some rivalries the last three years, it's pretty cool to be on the field and play with all of these guys."

Elshiekh played in two state championship games as a Brearley football player, with the varsity going 10-2 in 2005, 12-0 in 2006 and 8-2 in 2007. Brearley only lost two regular season games in that span and was 5-2 in playoff games. Elshiekh can also say that he has played on the only Union County team ever to go 12-0 so far.

"I've been to the last couple of games (Snapple Bowls) to see some of my friends play, so it looks like a pretty exciting atmosphere," Elshiekh said.

Other Brearley players on the Union County roster include offensive lineman Mark Arredondo (5-11, 230), running back Steve Margolin (5-10, 170) and wide receiver Max Vazquez (5-9, 165).

"This is a big thing," Elshiekh said. "There have been a lot of great players to come out of Brearley. This is a chance to show Brearley pride."

Elshiekh disclosed that his college decision came down to Boston College and Boston University.

"Boston College doesn't have a wrestling team, so I just decided to go to school," Elshiekh said. "Boston University, if I went there I was thinking of possibly wrestling, but I just decided to go to BC."

Elshiekh visited both schools.

"BC's finance department is good," Elshiekh said. "The campus is real nice and it's five minutes out of the city, so you get the best of both worlds."

Cranford's Chad Faulcon (5-11, 175), listed as a running back on the Union County roster, will remain in the Garden State and continue playing at Montclair State University for head coach Rick Giancola.

"A lot of seniors graduated in the secondary, so I'm going to play safety," Faulcon said.

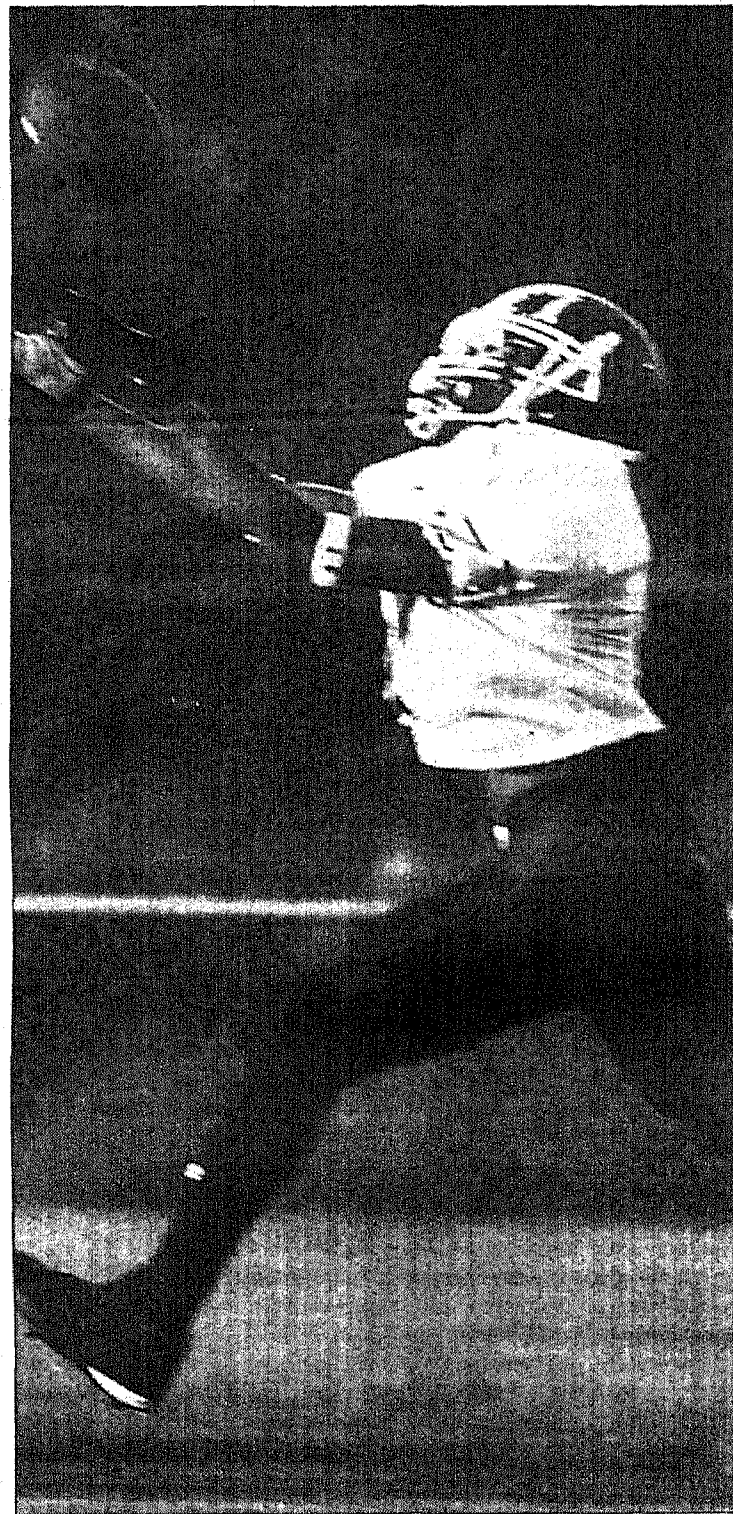
Other Cranford players on the Union County roster include defensive tackle Robert Foster (5-11, 235), offensive lineman Sean Scanlon (6-2, 250) and safety Simon Smith (6-4, 190).

"This means a lot because it will be the last time I'll get to play with these guys and we have four from our team," said Faulcon, who helped lead the Cougars to a 6-4 record his senior season.

Cranford was just two power points shy of qualifying for the state playoffs in the section as the eighth seed.

"Every year we came really close to making the playoffs, but fell just short," Faulcon said.

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Lembryk desired to be head coach

Is new UHS boys' mentor

Lester Lembryk was a successful soccer player at the second largest school in the state, Clifton.

He played collegiately at Kean University with Union assistant boys' soccer coach Ben Kloc.

He's been a physical education, health and driver's education teacher at UHS for more than two years and a teacher in town for seven, beginning at elementary schools.

Those were some of the qualifications that helped land him the position of head boys' soccer coach at Union.

Lembryk, 32, succeeds Jim Jeskey, who guided the Farmers since 1961 and to more than 500 victories, including four Union County Tournament championships.

Lembryk was officially named in late June right after Jeskey retired after 52 years of service as an educator and coach at UHS.

"It was always a goal for me to move up and become a head coach," Lembryk said Thursday during a break at Eric Shaw's Premier Soccer Training camp held at Volunteer Park in Union. "I was very fortunate, Jimmy's a great guy and a great coach. I learned a lot from him and he's always been successful with the program.

"It was a great opportunity for me. While I was here I was able to obtain some of his knowledge of the game and, hopefully, I can continue his success."

Lembryk was a four-year starter at goalie for Clifton head coach Fernando Rossi. He helped lead the Mustangs to one North 1, Group 4 championship by beating Kearny in overtime in the final. He graduated in 1994.

He then went on to play at Kean for head coach Tony Ochrimenko. He holds a degree in education from the Union college.

Lembryk is only the third head boys' soccer coach at Union after Jeskey and Gordon LeMatty.

He has one of the top juniors in the state in forward Robert Barrera.

"We lost some key players in the back, but to say it's a rebuilding season - every year is a rebuilding season," Lembryk said.

"As far as success, I just want to take little steps at a time and see obtainable goals, with county states and so forth being goals every year. We need to take small steps and work our way to that level."

NOTES: The elementary schools in Union that Lembryk taught at included Connecticut Farms, Battle Hill and Franklin.

"There's a lot of interest in the sport here," Lembryk said. "You have a lot of kids involved in it. I'm really hoping to be active with the community now and get these kids more and more interested in it. Getting them more excited to come to Union High School and play.

"I think it has a great reputation and I think it's very important to develop youth programs and farm systems and get them active. I'd like to see community involvement.

"We actually did community involvement where we had a couple of players come down and assist at a special needs picnic. It worked out great. It was a good time for them. We want to be active."

Shaw and Lembryk will run their soccer camp a second week from Aug. 11-15.

That week, it will take place at UHS and at Volunteer Park.

Shaw was also a standout goalie, leading the Union boys' team to the 1990 UCT title his sophomore season before starring at Seton Hall University.

Plenty to learn at Shaw camp

2nd soccer session Aug. 11-15

UNION - Kids come to Eric Shaw's annual soccer camp in Union to have fun, learn a great deal about soccer and then take that knowledge and put it to good use during the upcoming seasons.

"I think we get more of a serious player here," said Eric Shaw, who is the President and Director of Player Development for the two-week camp that is a part of Shaw's Premier Soccer Training program.

Shaw, a 1993 Union High School graduate who will begin his third season as the girls' varsity soccer coach at UHS, is joined in his camp efforts by new UHS boys' soccer coach Lester Lembryk.

"Because we are the high school coaches, some come to maybe show who they are if they're interested in the high school program and we also get the younger players who are also very interested in playing high-level club soccer," Shaw continued.

Last Thursday was the fourth day of the first week of camp at Volunteer Park. This is the eighth year Shaw has had his camp, which also took place at UHS and Weber Park.

The second week of camp is Aug. 11-15 and will take place at Volunteer Park and UHS. This is the first year the camp has taken place at Volunteer Park, which is located off Stanley Terrace, off Burnet Avenue.

Shaw reported that there were as many as 65-70 campers last week.

The camp runs full day from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. for ages 4-17 and half day from 9 a.m. to noon for those ages 9-11.

"There's a topic of the day, for example, Monday is usually dribbling and individual stuff where we teach them technique," Shaw said.

"I do a demo and most of my high school players that are here that help coach and other coaches do a topic of the day - say dribbling - and then we break into teaching groups for an hour.

"Stations are then rotated where they get different coaches and learn different aspects of dribbling."

Shaw's website is pretraining.com, which explains how he and his professional staff go about providing quality instruction year round.

The philosophy is to offer inspiration to players of all ages and ability levels through the Premier Soccer Training's extensive targeted curricula.

Summer camp sessions in the town of Union are an extension of that.

"The afternoon consists of soccer-tennis, which is a big part of our program," Shaw said. "We make nets out of cement and set them up in the parking lot.

"It's, basically, working on receiving and passing and individual skills, similar to tennis. We play tennis rules, but with your feet and your body. Then later in the afternoon we make it a little bigger and go large group games.

"Something we also do in the morning is 3 degrees, which is playing in small numbers. We talk about how to play in a small number. When you play on a large soccer field, a lot of the play is broken down into small intervals, so we discuss that."

As Soccer Education Specialists, Shaw and his staff pride themselves in offering individual player development in a structured, enjoyable and safe learning environment.

They want the kids to have fun, make friends and look upon their time playing soccer as a positive.

"Soccer is turning into an all-year program, which is good and bad in my eyes," Shaw said. "Most of the kids have been to camps in the past or have at least played soccer the majority of the year, except for the little ones.

"The 4- and 5-year-olds are just getting their feet wet. We play multiple games that teach different skills for them. It's not like we just throw them out there and tell them to kick the ball.

"We do different things to keep them active because at that age it's about teaching the game."

Shaw also said that there is a goalkeeper trainer that works with the kids.

Both Shaw and Lembryk were standout goalkeepers in high school and college. Shaw in college at Seton Hall and Lembryk in high school and college at Clifton and Kean University.

A middle-of-the-day feature includes the kids watching soccer videos and talking about high-level professional players.

Hospitals benefit from annual football contest

Union County has not won this game since 2005 and all of the All-Stars, including Faulcon, are aware of that.

"This is a big game," Faulcon said. "The series is tied at 7-7 and it's time for us to win it again."

Brearley head coach Scott Miller is Union County squad's General Manager. Union County head coaches on the coaching staff include second-year mentors Reggie Robinson of Plainfield and Ken Wiggins of Roselle.

"Once you get here and you start practicing, some things look sloppy, but we've got a good group of kids," said Miller, who coached in last year's game and, once again, coached in this year's North-South Game at Rutgers won by the North 31-25. "As coaches, we ask that you nominate a kid that's a good kid and a good football player."

Miller, a 1987 Brearley graduate who went on to play at the University of Pittsburgh, has been at the helm of Brearley since 2002 and has an impressive record of 54-11 (.831). His resume at Brearley includes six winning seasons in six years, six playoff appearances, two state championship game appearances, one state championship (the school's first in 15 years) and a 6-5 playoff mark when it's the toughest time to win.

He is the only coach so far to guide a Union County team to a 12-0 season, doing so in 2006 when Brearley captured North 2, Group 1 for the first time since 1991. His past three teams have lost only two regular season games combined.

Miller would love to be part of a coaching staff that halts Middlesex County's two-game winning streak in the series before he embarks on his seventh season in charge of the Bears.

"So far in the first two days of practice it looks like we have a good group of kids that listen and practice well with each other," Miller said. "We've got some pretty good players. It's just a matter of what happens when game time comes."

Middlesex County played pretty well in the second half of last year's game to win a 17-10 decision at Kean University in Union. Union County led 7-3 at the half, with the game interrupted in the second quarter when the lights went out and did not come back on for another 35 minutes.

Middlesex County halted Union County's three-game winning streak with a 13-7 win at South Brunswick in 2006. Middlesex County has never won three games in a row in the series.

"We understand that this is an All-Star Game, but the reasons why we're doing this game is the stuff we do at the children's hospitals," Miller said. "That's important. That's what this game was set up for."

"Beside showcasing some of the talent that Middlesex County has and we have, we're really about raising money for the hospitals. We bring the players over there and they're able to interact with the kids."

Coaches like Miller stress that that kind of interaction is even more important than scoring a touchdown tonight.

"If the kids can't make the commitment to attend all of the functions we have, then they can't play in the game," Miller said. "It's important for the kids to be at the hospitals so they can see why we're raising this money and the reasons why we actually have this game."

The first Snapple Bowl was contested at Union High School in 1994, patterned after the Monmouth-Ocean All-Star Game that is held on a Friday night in July.

One of the reasons why the Snapple Bowl was made a Thursday night game was so everyone involved could still go down the shore or do other things the following night of that week.

A number of the bit more polished Division I players from both Union and Middlesex counties will compete in the New Jersey-New York Classic or the North-South All-Star Game.

However, players from Union and Middlesex counties that compete in the Snapple Bowl are also very talented and highly-competitive.

To say the Snapple Bowl has stood the test of time would be accurate.

"Marcus Borden from East Brunswick does a tremendous job and the Snapple Bowl is a premier All-Star Game," Miller said. "You just look at the sponsors that we have. When you go to the game you see the things that are done; the pageantry of Snapple being involved, the U.S. Army now getting involved and the Home News Tribune."

"We have a tremendous amount of support from our sponsors. I know Marcus every year is working on making it bigger and better and he does a great job. Over the years, the dollar amounts that we have been able to raise for both hospitals is phenomenal. It's amazing what this game has turned into in terms of being a great event for, not only both counties, but also for the hospitals."

"This game is definitely a premier All-Star Game."

Tonight players from both teams will attempt to tackle whoever is carrying the ball. They have it easy compared to the children in the hospitals who have to tackle far more difficult tasks on a daily basis.

"When I was at Pitt and when I played at Pitt, we would go every month and we would visit the children's hospital in Pittsburgh," Miller said. "As I got older I actually became in charge of getting the players to go."

"These kids don't understand or maybe they just don't realize how fortunate they are to be able to do simple things like running and catching a football or throwing a football and being able to play football or basketball or whatever they do."

"When they go to the hospital it kind of awakens them on how fortunate they are. We're going to see kids in that hospital that are paraplegic or they can't get out of bed or their brain function doesn't allow them to do things with their limbs, so it's definitely eye-opening for the kids, but it kind of makes you feel good when you're there."

"You're helping the kids and helping the hospital and you're understanding what a good cause this is for."

"Our kids, when we leave there, really have a good understanding of how fortunate they really are."

LONGTIME HILLSIDE ASSISTANT COACH ZAPPULLA LOVES THE COMPETITION

John Zappulla's first season as an assistant coach at Hillside was in 1963 when John Fitzgerald Kennedy was President of the United States.

This is the eighth Snapple Bowl he's coaching in.

After Thursday night's game, he will continue to assist first-year Hillside head coach John Power in what will be his 46th season as an assistant for the Comets.

"I enjoy working with all the coaches from the county and also working with all the different players from all the schools," said Zappulla, who is always praised by the people he works with for his dedication to the sport. "To see the camaraderie and everyone working together is just great."

Hillside's head coach in 1963 when Zappulla first came aboard was Jim Taigia, who passed away in February of this year, Zappulla said.

When asked what keeps him going year after year, the 69-year-old Zappulla simply said, "I just enjoy doing it."

The Middlesex squad was to visit the Lakeview School for Cerebral Palsy Monday and then continue practice afterwards.

As a freshman this past season, Stockl captured the Mountain Valley Conference and Union County matches.

At Echo Lake in Westfield, Stockl shot a one-over-par 73 on the 6,554-yard course to finish ahead of the pack at the UC match.

Stockl's individual championship came on a day when there were manmade construction hazards on the 13th, 14th and 15th holes. For Stockl, who birdied the second, third, sixth, 13th and 15th holes, it was all in a day's work.

The county title was merely the first championship that Stockl won for Johnson. In 2006, he won the U.S. Kids Regional Championship for the 12-year-old division, so there was ample evidence that he could do it.

Later at the MVC match at Warren Brook Golf Club in Warren, Stockl shot a 79 to finish one stroke ahead of Oratory Prep senior Steve Zychowski.

- Inspect sprinklers — Avoid sprinklers that spray a fine mist. Mist can evaporate before it reaches the lawn.
- Check sprinkler systems and timing devices regularly to be sure they operate properly.
- Dispose of tissues and other similar waste in the trash rather than the toilet.
- Take it to the car wash — When taking your car to a car wash, which is a good idea for saving water, be sure it's one of many that recycle wash water.

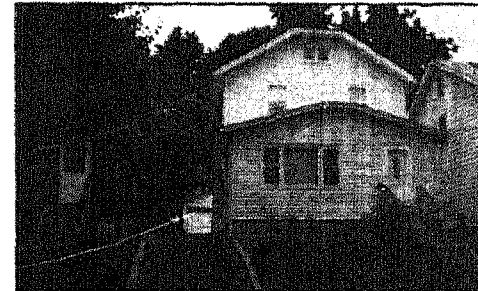
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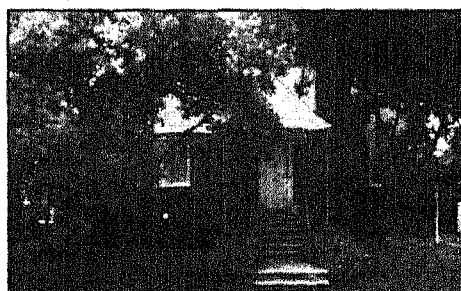
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Salon helps children deal with hair loss

All children who meet the aforementioned criteria are welcome to participate.
