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
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

4 caught, cops probe link to Rt. 22 stonings

HILLSIDE — Police arrested four men Sunday afternoon for throwing objects from their vehicle on Route 22.

Authorities say they are unsure whether the four men from Newark are connected to previous incidents on the highway.

Leland K. Alexander, 20, Khalief J. Selph, Tajharay S. Pugh and Isiah Williams, all 18 were arrested as the result of a joint effort between Hillside officers Lt. Demetrios Katsoudas, Gerald Pydeski and Nancy Swider, along with Union County Police Lt. Chris Debbie and Cpl. Gary Black.

Katsoudas and Pydeski began following the 1993 white Ford Taurus the men were riding in after they were spotted speeding on the eastbound side of Bloy Street at approximately 5:29 p.m.

"While these officers were following this vehicle in an unmarked police car, they received information from Hillside dispatchers that a vehicle of the same description had fired a (paintball) shot at another vehicle traveling Route 22," said Hillside police Detective Lt. Vincent Ricciardi.

The Hillside officers followed the men into Newark and eventually stopped the car on Elizabeth Avenue. They found carbon dioxide-powered paintball guns inside the vehicle.

As the officers were arresting the four individuals, "household trash" was reportedly flung at the policemen from a nearby apartment building, denting two police cars.

No officers were injured.

"It is under investigation whether these men are linked to the other rock-throwing incidents," Ricciardi said. "We just do not know yet."

According to law enforcement officials, the four men were charged with aggravated assault, unlawful possession of a weapon, possession of a weapon for an unlawful purpose and interference with transportation.

Williams was also charged with hindering apprehension for providing a false name during his arrest.

Alexander is being held on a \$45,000 bail and Selph, Pugh and Williams are each being held on a \$35,000 bail.

Overdue projects advance

CRANFORD — Township officials are reporting progress on several projects that have drawn attention from residents for many years.

These projects include maintenance and reconstruction work, such as the improvements at Sperry Park, and vital public safety measures, like the pump house on Riverside Drive. Meanwhile, overdue work, such as the replacement of the High Street footbridge and the Post Office Plaza Improvement Project are wrapping up.

"I think there is a good amount of progress going on," said township engineer Richard Marsden.

Mayor Robert Puhak said that the committee's efforts have been aided by having a clear list of priorities updates from Marsden twice a month.

"A priority of the township committee was to see advances in a list of outstanding engineering projects," Puhak said. "It was something that we worked on last year and this year. It takes longterm, stable commitment, and we continue to see results."

A bid has been awarded to the JRC Construction Company from Kearny to take on the Post Office

Budget OKed two months after KO; taxes up \$277

LINDEN — The Linden Council voted 9-1 to pass the 2008 municipal spending plan, with Councilwoman Michelle Yamakaitis casting the lone nay vote and new councilman Robert Sadowski abstaining.

Taxpayers can brace for a \$277 tax increase on a home accessed at the city's average of \$141,100.

The \$92.4 million budget, trimmed from \$92.6 million, faced heavy criticism from council members who said they desperately wanted to minimize the damage of a tax increase they agreed was inevitable.

Mayor Richard Gerbounka originally asked the City Council to completely revamp the budget when it was first introduced but voted down in May.

Some councilmembers were worried the budget was already barebones and little else could be cut.

Instead the city will turn to a longterm plan to try and lower spending.

Gerbounka still asked for more fiscal austerity, saying unpaid days off, more consolidations, even layoffs may be necessary to ease the taxpayers' burden.

"(We) are committed to making

the hard decisions to reduce our spending," he said at the meeting.

The approximate \$200,000 that was cut from the original spending plan was due to a number of municipal changes, including council members giving up health benefits, reconfiguring part-time salary structures and consolidating various city departments.

In addition to the number of con-

solidations in the Recreation and Public Properties Departments that were passed at the June council meeting, the governing body last week voted to place 911 Dispatch under the control of the police department and merge the Division of Automotive Services with the Department of the Municipal Garage.



Two prostitution arrests at parlor

KENILWORTH - Police have arrested two women for allegedly offering customers more than massages at K&W Health Center.

Sun Oh Kim, 48 and Ying Ha Zhang, 44, of Flushing, Queens were arrested on prostitution charges July 17. The Federal Avenue business was shut done by police. Each woman was being held on a \$1,000 bail.

A third employee was released after police determined she was not involved with the prostitution, according to Detective Sgt. Dowd.

The month-long police probe led by Detective Sgt. Dowd into the business kicked off after authorities spotted advertisements for the business in The Star Ledger's classified section and on "Craigslist," an online classified advertisement service. There was an entrance fee and additional money was requested to perform sexual acts at the business, which had reportedly been operating in the borough for the past few months, Detective Sgt. Dowd said.

Kenilworth Police Chief William Dowd said several complaints against the establishment were filed with the police department. "The business initially applied for a certificate, stating they performed acupuncture and acupressure services," he said.

According to Chief Dowd, approximately \$6,000 in cash, a camera surveillance system and "prostitution-related materials" were seized by borough law enforcement officials assisted by detectives from the Union County Prosecutor's Office.

A records book seized during the arrests indicated that at least 10 to 20 clients, mostly single males, visited the business per day. Police did not release the names of any of the clients.

This isn't the first time a business offering illicit sexual services has been found in the quiet, suburban area, according to Chief Dowd.

'There was one on North Michigan Avenue, which was also closed down," Dowd noted. "In that instance, two women were also arrested." Jackeline Leon can be reached at 908-686-7700, ext. 126..



Best Buy open, **Target complete**

Shoppers get complete and ready for business.

At the 30,200-square-foot Best Buy, employees have been ringing up customers since the early morning hours of July 18 and the 137,400-square-foot Target store is expected to open Sunday morning.

The two stores, along with the 59,400-square-foot Whole Foods Market still under construction, Course, which burned down in owned the property. April 2007.

New York City, is the developer on the project which commenced earlier this year.

Township engineering officials say they are unsure when construction on the Whole Foods Market will conclude, but they may be able to judge that after site improvements are complete.

complaining the proposed buildings were too large.

Township Committeeman ready. Two of three new stores Anthony Terrezza, who was on slated for Springfield Avenue are the Planning Board at the time, said the large retail stores would increase traffic on the already busy roadway. "We have 55,000 residents in Union but that number jumps to 140,000 during the workdays," he said.







City tennis courts revamped

SUMMIT — The ball is rolling. After more than a year of planning, eight tennis courts at Memorial Field in Summit are ready for play.

The \$900,000 renovations performed by Paving Materials and Construction Company of Roselle include the addition of two new courts, resurfacing six existing courts, removing a garage from the play grounds, adding a curb to prevent cars from driving near playground, creating a more efficient parking lot, a roadway leading into the facility and planting several new trees, according to Beth Kinney, director of the Summit Department of Community Services.

"The park looks beautiful," Kinney said. "We continue to receive nothing but incredibly positive comments from everyone who passes by.'

The renovation of the courts was the first update in almost 30 years. Minor renovations, such as filling cracks in the surface, have been done periodically when needed.

Officials said they decided to revamp the play grounds due to weathering and significant cracks in the surface that were beyond repair. The project, however, suffered some set backs last fall, after foundation and structural work on the tennis courts were completed

face," multiple 70-degree days were needed, and the weather would not cooperate at that time, delaying the completion of the project until last month, according to Judith Leblein Josephs, director of the city Department of Community Programs.

The resurfacing project went off without a hitch. The Premiere Surface was poured this past month and has now properly cured." Josephs said.

She claims this new Premiere Surface, that was poured over the painted asphalt, will reduce cracking in the surface and give the courts a 25-year quality guarantee, as opposed to other courts, which usually see cracks after approximately five years. The new courts will be more resilient, durable and comfortable for players.

Along with the updates to the tennis courts, the city is working on adding a new lined outdoor basketball court at the park in the upcoming weeks.

Summit Tennis Association, which pushed for the this renovation last year, pledged to donate \$60,000 to the project, according to Dick Walter, a member the STA Board of Directors.

"The courts look terrific. We are very pleased to be able to contribute something to the city in appreciation for what they have done with the courts," Walter said.

Plaza improvement project for \$63,000. There will be upgrades to the triangular plaza in front of the Cranford Post Office, with new shrubbery, paving and a large Victorian fountain as a center piece. The Public Works Department will be removing existing trees and walls at the site.

The tentative completion date is Sept. 30. Once the main work is done, a World War I-era flagpole will be re-installed at the site as a finishing touch. Fundraising efforts to pay for the refurbishing of the pole are underway, and a meter portraying the progress of the fundraising effort is being located near the site. The pole still requires sandblasting to remove the lead paint, which should be done in the next few weeks, Smith said, adding that the fundraising campaign should meet the Nov. 8 deadline for re-installation at the site.

The effort to replace the High Street footbridge is also moving forward, following a series of delays and miscommunications. The previous bridge was damaged beyond repair in the Tax Day Flood of 2007.

The most recent delay stemmed from the interference of an underground sewerage line, which will require the new bridge to occupy a slightly different position from that of the former structure.

The new bridge is now being fabricated, but it is unclear whether it will be installed by September, when students will once again be seeking a walking route to and from school. "We're hoping to get that project in before school starts, but the fabrication takes 8 to 12 weeks," Marsden explained.

The pump house that comprises Phase 2A of the five-phase Northeast Quadrant Stormwater Management Project was completed this summer. This facility on Riverside drive will work to dispel floodwater from the surrounding streets but is not designed to protect residents from water that tops the dikes along the river. The dikes will be addressed in phases three and four. The designs for these phases have been submitted to the county for their review, as the dikes are partially located on county land in Nomahegan Park. Riverside Drive is expected to be fully operational by the end of July.

County officials report that work in Sperry Park is also nearing completion. This small public area near the 9/11 Memorial on Springfield Avenue features rock walls on either side of the river that have been badly eroded over their 75-year life. In addition the rebuilding of these walls, the park will be upgraded with new benches, landscaping and the paving of paths. "The retaining wall has been rebuilt on the eastern side of the river. The slope on the western bank has been rebuilt with biobricks to halt erosion. New walking paths have been paved and landscaping is being done so residents can enjoy a much-improved park," said Free-holder and Cranford resident Bette Jane Kowalski.

Everything but the site's amenities and sidewalks were expected to be completed by July 21. The removal of stone and placing of topsoil near the guide rail will be done after the sidewalks are completed, and pruning will be done within a few weeks.

Smith said less pressing construction work, such as road resurfacing efforts have been put on hold. Willow Street is one area in need of paving work.

Another project that is waiting its turn will focus on the Walnut Avenue train overpass, where crosswalks, lights and fences will be installed to improve pedestrian safety.



Cheers and Jeers

Sometimes, you have to give credit where it's due; other times, not so much.

With a focus on Route 22, we offer cheers to the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders for considering the installation of bus stop shelters at the locations where the transit shuttles pick up passengers along the busy highway.


The free shuttle service, which began in October 2007 and was funded partially by state and federal grants, provides a safer means of transportation for those who need to gain access to both sides of the congested eastbound and westbound corridors of Route 22, but who aren't willing to risk their lives by sprinting across the busy roadway. The addition of the proposed shelters, will make a good program even better.

Great, big jeers, however, to the state of New Jersey for it's ongoing lack of attention to the area of Route 22 that passes through Union, Hillside and Newark.

For several weeks, Hillside police have investigated reports of rocks being "thrown" onto the state highway from a bridge or area above the roadway. Cheers, by the way, to the Police Department and Hillside DPW for arresting four individuals in connection with the incidents. Approximately 30 vehicles were hit by the objects and three injuries were reported. Initially, some speculated that the incidents were the result of chunks of rock crumbling from the aging North Broad Street bridge. Although that wasn't the case, the bridge's deterioration and the poor condition of the roadway itself, remains a problem.

The state has repeatedly ignored Hillside's requests to remove the the structure, which is no longer in use and has been dubbed the "bridge to nowhere." The highway was constructed nearly a century ago and is desperate need of upgrades, which are the responsibility of the New Jersey Department of Transportation. What are they waiting for? The fact that the state is ignoring the township's requests is deplorable. What is it going to take for them to wake up and realize that peoples' lives are in danger? If the state can provide funds to help the county establish a shuttle service, there's no reason money can't be allocated to road repairs on Route 22. If nothing else, the state should have enough respect to respond to Hillside's requests.

Residents and anyone who travels along Route 22 in Hillside and Newark should be appalled at the state's negligence. Further, they should be flooding the offices of NJDOT Commissioner Kris Kolluri and local legislators with calls and letters demanding that the state take action. 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

ization using RCA agreements was a positive plan for redevelopment. It remains insulting that suburban towns after paying big bucks in RCA agreements, were somehow racist for wanting to limit growth in already overcrowded suburbs.

Clark Mayor Sal Bonaccorso had something to say about fair share at the town's June 30 special meeting. On the subject of the town's separate sewer use tax Bonaccorso went on at length.

In part he said, "Shop Rite, Bally's, where showers run all day long, Clark Nursing and Rehabilitation, business of this nature and not to pick on them...they are all fine neighbors of the community and we're all very happy to have those folks work here in our community. Under this plan all their entities went way up and they are now paying true value on the sewerage that they use."

It's hard to argue with the mayor's logic about user fees. The problem is his lack of comment when tax comparisons to other towns give Clark an artificially low rate, compared to those who did not carve out the sewerage bill.

Call it one of the rare times when more, not less, comment was required.



Public Safety Bldg. plan moves ahead

KENILWORTH - A consulting firm has been selected, moving forward plans to add to the public safety building.

Last month, the governing body opted to have architecture, engineering, planning and construction firm El Associates of Cedar Knolls handle the design and execution of the new building's construction, estimated to cost up to \$4 million without site remediation, according to Councilman Fred Pugliese.

"We are doing environmental studies on the site, which is necessary anyway," Councilman and Finance Chair Brian Joho said. "We need to make sure we know what we're heading into."

According to Mayor Kathi Fiamingo, it is unknown when the public safety building will be built, as plans have not yet been fully discussed.

A \$190,000 grant awarded to the borough in 2004 by the New Jersey Department of County Affairs would be utilized to help fund the project. Joho said the council may explore other funding opportunities.

Last month, the choice to use EI Associates over Buck Simpers Architects and Associates of Red Bank was a difficult decision to make, according to borough officials.

'The council discussed it for a long time. It really was difficult because both were very good," Fiamingo said.

The plan proposed by El Associates during a special meeting last month involves creating a 10,000-square-foot, three-story addition to the Borough Hall building, with new parking area added beneath the structure, bringing parking up to 45 spaces from 30 existing on the grounds.

The addition would connect to the second floor of Borough Hall. The courtroom, currently located on this floor, may be moved to the new building, as it may cost less to rebuild rather than to update the space, according to Richard Basta, senior vice president of design of El Associ-

Officials suggest those plans are not definite and need to be further discussed.

"The timeframe for construction may be around one year," Basta said to the governing body and public during the special presentation on the project.

He added that the entire project would be done in phases to keep the building operational throughout construction,





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

Teacher awarded \$2K grant

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

Last year, Gov. Jon Corzine released an extensive Crime Prevention Strategy aimed at clearing crime off New Jersey streets by offering greater cooperation from Trenton to local governments.

Recently, Rahway has decided to take the lead by becoming the first city to team with the county and take advantage of their programs and expertise.

The Rahway Municipal Alliance has

Youth Services to form a joint-partnership based prevention programs aimed at keeping helping city youth who are at-risk of succumbing to violence or gangs.

The two groups are focusing on the second phase of Corzine's plan: preventing violent crimes among young children and gang members by offering positive programs to stop them from ever entering a life of crime.

"We can't arrest our way out of the problem of violent street gangs and gun violence," said Attorney General Anne Milgram in a press release explaining the governor's teamed with the Union County Division of plan. "That is why proven and evidence-

Union County already offers six extensive delinquency prevention programs, including free family counseling, gang awareness classes and two classes that expose children to theater, music and art.

What the new crime plan aims to do its make it easier for people who need those programs to find them.

"People in Union County can't get to

these services," said Darrell Hatchett, Union County Division of Youth Services director. "Municipal Alliances have the framework and structure to get (the word) out."

Hatchett and project coordinators are subscribing to state recommendations that counties use their Municipal Alliances as the vehicle for bringing the governor's crime plans to the streets.

Sex offender laws may face repeal

Local ordinances prohibiting sex offenders from residing or travelling in Union County towns may be facing repeal.

A July 15 decision by the state appeals court found that municipalities could not restrict the activities of sex offenders.

These ordinances, which typically restrict sex offenders from living or travelling within as much as 2,500 feet of schools, playgrounds and other areas where children could congregate, has been criticized by some as unenforceable and unconstitutional. In many instances, these "sex offender-free zones" encompass virtually the entire town.

The court did not rule on the constitutionality of the laws, but found that the authority of the town to regulate sex offenders is pre-empted by Megan's Law, a state statute.

The decision of the appeals court stems from lawsuits in the towns of Cherry Hill and Galloway. An appeal has since been filed in the state Supreme Court. Should the court accept the case and affirm the decision of the appellate court, other towns with similar sex offender ordinances will likely have to repeal their statutes as well. The Supreme Court could, however, reverse or modify the appellate division's decision. Approximately 100 New Jersey municipalities have already established "sexoffender free zones.'

Roselle Park Councilman at Large Ricky Badillo defended his town's sex offender ordinance.

"The people of not only the state, but the country want these laws and the judges just keep knocking them down," Badillo said.

In some cases, when a municipality establishes such an ordinance, neighboring towns feel compelled to pass similar laws to prevent sex offenders from taking refuge in their communities instead. Cranford Mayor Robert Puhak said this was part of the reasoning behind Cranford's introduction of a similar ordinance, but not the sole reason.

"Obviously, any level of government has a primary responsibility to protect its residents, especially those most vulnerable. Certainly our children fall into that category," Puhak said, "The Township Committee's focus is to do the most we can to meet that responsibility and so at minimal, its disappointing that our ability is struck down by this most recent court decision. And equally disturbing is that it seems to put the rights of violators above the safety of potential victims."

Springfield Township Attorney Bruce Bergen elaborated on some of the legal concerns surrounding local sex offender ordinances. Bergen said according to Megan's Law, no one may discriminate against selling or renting property to sex offenders registered under the law.

"Megan's Law is not a punitive law because then it would be unconstitutional," Bergen said, "Any local law that looks like it is punishing a Megan's Law registrant is unconstitutional. It is re-punishing someone for a crime they've already served their sentence for.'

As lawsuits continue to successfully challenge these ordinances, a number of other municipalities, such as Garwood, have been compelled to repeal their ordinances to eliminate the possibility of future litigation. Cranford Township Attorney Carl Woodward said he did not care to speculate on the future of Cranford's sex offender ordinance.

'We're going to wait and see what the supreme court does before we take any further action," Woodward said.

Police probe problem with poncho funds

Both Black and local law enforcement officials have been unsuccessful in their attempts to contact Leach. Lautenburg could not be reached for comment as of press time.

(Continued from Page 18) the new county-municipality partnership. Within three years, officials hope to have a county-affiliated juvenile help center - run by a local Municipal Youth Services Commission - in every town in the county.

"The game plan is to provide services to all 21 municipalities irrespective of race, ethnic lines and socio-economic status," said Hatchett.

AME Church in Rahway has already offered space for a Municipal Youth Services Commission office and officials say Linden is close to finding room as well.

Other communities that have contacted the county about the program, including Garwood and Elizabeth. The program is already popular in Somerset County, where two-thirds of the municipalities have MYSC offices.

"A strategic plan (for youth violence prevention) has been lacking," said Monica Lallo, Union County's program administrator. She said fights over "territory and egos" had led to cities and counties fighting over jurisdictional issues regarding programs and available funding.

"Now the county is offering a clear incentive to work together," Lallo said.

That incentive includes a more sophisticated method of obtaining grants."

State agencies are making available almost \$36 million in funding for youth violence prevention

classes. At an average of \$300,000 per grant, a smaller town would have a hard time winning those competitive funds against a larger city, Lallo said.

With the county alliance, however, the county itself can put together packages that will spread the grant fairly to multiple munici-

Lallo also said the new trend in government is a scientific, research-based blueprint for requesting grants. By showing data that can statistically predict the benefits of a program for a town, she said the chance of winning the competitive funds rises exponentially.

To assist with further development and implementation of the program, the state last year announced that it will also provide funding for municipalities to establish Community Justice Coordinators to work with officials.

With all of the benefits, county administrators say there will soon be more programs and more ways for at-risk residents to find and attend them.

They are confident that with success for their pilot program, other towns will come into the fold and fulfill the projections of a MYSC in all 21 communities in Union County.

"Once other municipalities see the framework (in Rahway), they will buy in." Hatchett said.







Several teens make a promise to 'wait'

"True Love Waits was a great reminder of all the things God has in store for our lives," according to Danny Halek of Cranford, one of the 46 teens who came together for five Friday night sessions that began in May and ended in June at Calvary Assembly of God in Union.

They heard from experts, viewed videos and listened to each other as together they learned what sex, love, and romance are all about. The majority of those attending the True Love Waits program were Calvary's teens who regularly attend youth group, but about 15 percent of the group was comprised of other youth, such as their friends or those who came from other area churches.

Topics that were given in-depth consideration included the facets of personality that comprise the whole person; true intimacy; physical and emotional consequences on non-marital sexual activity such as sexual transmitted disease, pregnancy, lower self-esteem/depression; respect for life that is created in sexual activity; and skills for deciding to abstain and them maintaining the decision.

All of this was presented in the context of God's plan for our lives a plan that promises health, wholeness and complete protection.

"True Love Waits helped me understand the importance of purity for myself and others. It opened my eyes to things I won't hear anywhere else," Morgan Carmona of Union said.

On June 29, youth who attended the session came together again to make a public commitment of their decision to save sex for marriage.

Family, friends, and the congregation joined in supporting these young people. The Rev. Joshua Bechtel, youth pastor at Calvary and coordinator of the True Love Waits program said, "Our youth today face challenges in trying to live a chaste life, free of the life-changing consequences of early sexual activity. They need more than just good information. They need to hear from adults they trust that waiting has benefits and, although not easy in today's world, the decision to wait is worth making."



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Roselle Post 229 Sues a stellar scholar and athlete gives solid effort

To play in District 2 Saturday

RAHWAY - Bases loaded, two outs, top of the seventh and Roselle Post 229 was down by a run.

Kevin Mack stepped up to the plate with a 1-for-3 resume that included an RBI-single in the bottom of the first off Watchung Hills pitcher Matt

Still in the game and one out from a complete-game victory, the leftythrowing Harding challenged Mack immediately with a first-pitch fastball right off the plate.

Mack smacked the ball hard, but right to Watchung Hills second baseman Kyle Kurland, who calmly threw to first baseman Richard Hunt for the game's final out.

As a result, the team from Somerset County captured the Union County Junior American Legion baseball playoff championship Monday night at Veterans Memorial Field, beating two-time defending champion Roselle 3-2 in the final.

After going 12-4-1 to win the regular season title, Watchung Hills defeated Hillside, Union Catholic, Rahway and Roselle in the league playoffs to begin district play with a 16-4-1 mark. Watchung Hills will next play Caldwell Post 185 Saturday night at 7 in a District 2 game at Roselle Park's Shaw Field.

Roselle, which also won 12 games in the regular season along with Cranford, will also compete in District 2 and is scheduled to play Valsburg Post 395 Saturday at 10 a.m. at Shaw Field.

Harding improved to 4-0 this summer and won his second legion playoff game after also going undefeated on the freshman team at Watchung Hills in the spring. He knew Mack, who started on the mound and took the loss for Roselle, had that hit off him in the first inning that gave Roselle a quick

"I was aware of that, so I had to pitch outside to him at top speed," said Harding, who tossed a six-hitter. "I was trying to keep it low in the zone. I didn't want to give him anything good to hit."

"I didn't realize it was that kid, but with two outs, they had only put two or three balls in the air all day, so I was assuming a ground ball," Watchung Hills head coach Joe Ascolese said. "He, actually, hit a fastball on the ground, it wasn't a curve. We started him with a curve the time before, so I didn't want to come right back with it.

"Matt got him to hit a good hop, we threw him out and that was probably the hardest out we made all season."

Mack also grounded out to second in his previous at-bat in the sixth, which was also on the first pitch.

Harding's 78-pitch, seven-inning stint included five strikeouts, two walks and two hit batters. Both runs he gave up were earned, while he also picked off a baserunner at first base in the fifth, which turned out to be a huge out. Roselle did not score in the inning and the score remained 3-1.

Harding walked Nick Telle to lead off the game and Telle came around to score in the first on Mack's RBI-single to center. Harding did not walk a batter again until after he yielded a leadoff infield single to Nick Ramierez leading off the top of the seventh. Ramierez hit a ball to deep short and just beat the throw to first base.

A five-pitch walk to Luke Stinson put runners on first and second with none out. After retiring designated hitter Joe Condura on a hard-hit fly ball to left, Roselle No. 9 batter Brendan Cross reached base again on a

It was the second time in the game Cross reached on a bunt attempt, while he was just thrown out at first on one in between his two successful attempts. Cross went 2-for-3 and now has seven bunt singles this summer, including two in Roselle's 8-5 semifinal victory Sunday over Scotch Plains.

Roselle, down 3-1, now had the bases loaded and just one out in the top of the seventh and the top of the order coming to the plate. Telle, on the first pitch to him, was hit by a pitch for an RBI, cutting the lead to 3-2.

With the bases still loaded, Harding was able to retire Andrew Bellusio on strikes for the second out before getting Mack to ground out for the third consecutive time and second straight time to second base.



watching a hum-drum football game all of a sudden boom - a play that makes you go "oohh" and "aahh" comes out of nowhere.

That was the case with last week's Snapple Bowl. An electrifying 85-yard pass from quarterback Al Tampa to wide receiver Josh Williams with 3:05 left in the fourth quarter set up the winning touchdown as the Middlesex County All-Stars defeated Union County 14-7 last Thursday night before a crowd of 3,000 in Home News Tribune Snapple Bowl XV.

With the score tied 7-7 and Middlesex faced with a third-and-22 from its own seven-yard line, the 6-4, 205-pound Tampa, from sectional champion Carteret, threw the ball deep down field.

Three plays later, Middlesex County running back Ryan Meseroll of Monroe scored his second touchdown of the game on a two-yard run up the middle. Meseroll also scored on a one-yard run in the second quarter to give Middlesex County a 7-0 lead.

With its final possession beginning with just 1:50 remaining, Union County drove deep into Middlesex County territory. A pass by quarterback Tyler George of Governor Livingston to end Demetrius Washington-Ellison of Rahway put the ball at the Middlesex County eight-yard line with 24 seconds left. However, Union County was called for holding and the play came back.

Union County's final play was a completion by George to wide receiver Jerelle Louis of Linden that fell short at the Middlesex 25.

Before Middlesex County snapped the deadlock, Union County fumbled the ball away at the Middlesex County 20 on a play where a Middlesex County rusher was clearly off sides before the play was executed. There were four officials positioned right in front of the kid - as many as eight eyes on the play. Not one of them took a flag out to make the proper call.

The tall and lanky Washington-Ellison (6-4, 180) made his presence felt at wide receiver with several catches that counted. Most of his receptions were slant patterns over the middle.

"This was fun," said Washington-Ellison, who will continue playing at the University of Maine along with fellow Rahway teammate Donte Dennis, who helped the North beat the South 31-25 in last month's North-South All-Star Game at Rutgers. "The competition was intense, with a lot of guys coming out and playing hard."

Middlesex County won its third straight game in the series for the first time and now leads again by an 8-7 margin. Middlesex County is now 2-4 in the six games played at East Brunswick.

Selected as the game's MVP was James White (5-11, 185) of Piscataway, who at linebacker was one of the top defensive players in a game dominated by both defenses.

White helped lead Piscataway to an 11-1 record last season, with the team's only loss coming to Hunterdon Central 23-13 in the North 2, Group 4 championship game at Rutgers.

Washington-Ellison was a key member of a Rahway team that went 9-2 last year and reached the Central Jersey, Group 2 semifinals for the fourth straight year, falling to Carteret 19-14. Rahway rebounded to beat Johnson 27-6 to capture the Mountain Valley Conference-Mountain Division crown.

Union County finally got on the scoreboard midway through the third quarter. George connected on a five-yard touchdown pass to running back Darahn Worilds of Roselle. That play capped a six-play, 55yard drive that was helped by a pass interference call against Middlesex County.

A key gain on the drive came when Union County running back Chad Faulcon of Cranford bolted up the middle for 21 yards on a trap play that gave his team a first down at the Middlesex County 19. A slant pass of nine yards for a first down by George to wide receiver Afolabi Omole of Union gave the squad a first and goal at the Middlesex County five.

In the first half, Middlesex County's touchdown was set up by an interception by strong safety Larry Belotta of Bishop Ahr. Later in the second quarter, Union County had a short drive that reached the Middlesex County 14 before the visiting team fumbled the ball away with 5:58 to go before halftime.

The game was stopped with 10:12 to go in the first quarter because of lightning. Play resumed 30 minutes later and at that time it was determined that the final three quarters would be 12 minutes instead of 15.

The field lights went out in the second quarter of last year's game at Kean University in Union. Play did not resume for another 35 minutes.

Next year, the Middlesex County squad will attempt to become the first team to win four straight games in the series, while Union County will attempt to snap a three-game losing streak and even the series at 8-8.



Seminar designed to assist student-athletes

As the fall scholastic sports season approaches, rising upperclassmen begin to approach the college recruitment process for the first time. Many athletes have seen the recruiting of high-profile recruits like Jimmy Clausen and Terrelle Pryor and they think that might await them. The fact is that there a lot of things to learn about the recruiting process and it's important for students and their parents to learn the process sooner, rather than later.

The process will be reviewed extensively on Aug. 2 during a seminar titled, "A Winning Game Plan for College Athletic Recruit-

"It would behoove athletes to learn about the recruiting process and what is expected of them academically, not just athletically." Reilly said. "By knowing this information, it would help them be better prepared for the recruiting process itself, "

Reilly's comment is pertinent because the sad fact is that many student athletes are woefully unprepared as they begin the process. Many are unaware of the importance of academic requirements, how to effectively market themselves and the regulations of the recruiting process.

"We'll help them be better prepared," Reilly said. "We don't profess to make any guarantees that they will be eligible for athletic scholarship money, but it's pretty probably that they won't if they don't meet the requirements or they're not enrolled in the proper courses."

It's typical for a student-athlete to feel good about his or her chances based upon their own perceptions of their athletic talents, but if they're not careful, there are plenty of pitfalls that can prevent them from being successful.

"A lack of information and a lack of understanding is a huge pitfall for them," Reilly said. "College scholarships don't just materialize.

"It does take work. If you're not considered a blue-chip athlete, it takes a lot of work to market and promote yourself. A lot of kids still seem to have this idea that somehow coaches are going to know about them.

"They're going to find me, or they're going to come and recruit me.' Unfortunately, that's a fallacy that a lot of student-athletes still believe."

Marketing has changed considerably over the last 10 years. The advent of social networking sites like myspace.com, facebook.com and even things like youtube.com have changed the way that athletes can promote their abilities.

But it's not as simple as merely posting a video. Athletes need to use caution when promoting themselves.

"Student athletes should be careful about everything they do," Reilly said. "Being careful is the best way to stay out of potential harm. It's something you do as a marketing ploy. It's a way of promoting yourself. Students have to be cautious about the process."

Much of the issue comes down to the parental guidance athletes receive. "Is it seen as a way out of a bad situation or is it seen as a vehicle?" Reilly said. There will also be times when recruiters don't let the athletes have any time to study, giving the student-athlete another situation to be wary of.

"Sometimes you're being stalked," Reilly said. "The more the parents know, the better. One thing I want parents to understand is that the more time you take, the more prepared you will be."

Springfield shop to change hands after nearly 50 years in business

SPRINGFIELD — As Norma Latore prepares to say goodbye to an old friend, so does the township.

The Barnegat resident recently decided to sell her business, Norma's Salon on Morris Avenue in Springfield, and retire after 48 years of success in the area.

The last day of Latore's ownership of Norma Salon will be Oct. 1, when Nino Cutuli will take over. He will keep all Latore's current employees, and he plans to bring ina few of his own as well.

According to Latore, it took several months to find a replacement to "fill her shoes," but she feels she has found someone who will do a good job. Once Cutuli assumes ownership, he said that he will keep the haircutting station that Latore worked at empty, just in case she decides to come back to the salon every now and then.

Though all of the employees at Norma's will continue to cut hair, they have all said it will not be the same without Norma working next to them.

"I feel strange and apprehensive," DiBella said. "We grew old together and have been through many ups and downs together. I'm going to miss

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

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
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

Gas Prices Become Speed Bumps for Business

So you soccer moms filling up the tank of the minivan think you have it tough?

Rising gasoline prices are affecting business of all sizes today, from onetruck florists to interstate haulers. Certainly fuel prices affect businesses in transportation industries, such as long distance trucking or commercial tour bus companies. But high gas prices also affect other businesses from the real estate agent who spends the day in her car to the pizza deliveryman. Even vital services such as home health care providers, police

and school districts are feeling the Dinch.

"Fuel prices are the number one concern of anyone in the commercial fleet business," said Rick Buro, manager of transportation for PSE&G. "Prices for gasoline have risen 38 percent just in the last year, and diesel is up 64 percent."

Prices have been rising fairly steadily throughout the last decade, from a low of \$1.05 in 1999 to today's nationwide average of \$4.09. New Jersey businesses actually are pretty lucky - gas here is lower than in most parts of the country. Despite almost

daily increases throughout June and early July, gas in New Jersey averaged \$3.99 on July 10, 54 cents lower than


Businesses are coping with the cost of vehicle fuel in a variety of ways, from raising prices to adding a fuel surcharge to their products. Other business owners have not raised prices, instead absorbing the increase in the cost of doing business rather than offending customers.

"We've added a 30 percent fuel surcharge on all our business," said John Kruse, owner of J. Way Transportation in Hillside, a local trucking company that specializes in ultra clean distribution, consolidation and delivery for the medical, food and beverage industries. "It's the only way we can cope."

But the surcharge does not fully cover the increase in fuel costs.

"It just costs more to do business these days," Kruse said.

"We've raised our prices some, but you can never raise it enough to fully make up the difference," said Dee Villani of Villani Bus Company in Linden, which operates both school buses and arranges nationwide motor coach tours. "We've increased prices by a couple of percent but fuel has

gone up a lot more than that."

Even companies not traditionally considered part of the transportation industry often offer delivery as part of their services, and fuel costs are effecting them, as well.

"We're looking at creative ways to cut costs and still deliver the service," said Mark Bistis of B&B Press in Somerville, B&B delivers about 40 percent of the printing materials they produce for their customers. "Instead of our own delivery trucks we are using UPS more."

While B&B has increased some of its delivery fees, Bistis is resisting increasing his prices.

"Times are tough on everyone," he said. "It's a luxury to be able to increase your price."

Rising gas prices also affect nonprofit organizations, according to Evelyn Savage of the Visiting Nurse Association of Somerset Hills (VNA). Like many other non-profits, VNA does not have the choice or ability to increase prices.

Savage worries not only about the increased cost of gasoline for the association, but also for her employees. While full-time employees have use of a company car, part-time staff use their own vehicles and public transportation is not an option.

"Public transportation in New Jersey just isn't that good if you are going from one residential area to another," Savage explained.

Savage cannot increase prices to her customers, either.

"We can't raise prices because we are reimbursed for our services by Medicare or insurance companies, she explained. "They are the ones that

Drivers Scoot to Pass the Pump

The recent spike in gasoline prices is increasingly leading people to park their gas guzzlers and hop on scooters, mopeds and motorcycles as cheaper transportation alternatives.

These gas-stingy vehicles have long been the favored mode of transportation for commuters in cities like Rome, Paris, Madrid, Tokyo, Bombay and Beijing, where gasoline sold by the liter has historically been far more costly than in the United

Now Americans are speeding to catch up.

The sale of scooters in the United States has been on the increase annually since 1997, when there were 12,000 sold nationwide, according to the Motorcycle Industry Council. That increased to more than 130,000 in both 2006 and 2007.

Taking ethical business to the next level — Lately, confidence and trust in corporate America has been shocked by a succession of corporate scandals and executive malfeasance. Amidst new laws and regulations, such as Sarbanes Oxley, greater pursuit and punishment by the courts and real bottom-line impact lies a truth for these times: Integrity can be a source of competitive advantage over those who ignore this issue.

Critical issues from the headlines – As customers recoil and search for signs of corporate accountability, they are more receptive than ever to a business message of ethics, integrity and social responsibility. Across every market, issues of compliance, reporting, privacy, product ethics and honesty have changed the landscape.

Respect and service — One beginning, for any business, is to consider the servant-leader approach by its management and across its communications programs. Managers who can prove themselves leaders are those who recognize that they are servants delivering trust across their communities of relationships. The most successful businesses will be the ones that adapt to changing times and incorporate this message in anticipating customer concerns.

- Tell the truth about product, services, people and pricing.
- · Deliver what you say.
- . Don't misstate reporting or financial information.

- When wrong, correct the answer as quickly and appropriately as possible.
- Make ethics personal communicate like your customers are family.
- · Tell both sides to the story.
- · Hire people, partner, invest and sell to people you trust.
- Don't make up answers in the media it's okay to say you don't know and get back to them.
- Be proactive reach out and avoid surprises. Don't hide hoping "it all goes away."
- Don't dazzle them with information clutter and volume to obfuscate the real issues.

Anticipate crisis as part of your integrity strategy – This is an era of information transparency. With the internet, blogs, 'digital' word-of-mouth and proactive journalism, you need to establish a contingency plan to deal with a crisis caused by disclosure or accusation. Here are some pointers: Keep your customer informed, understand the impact to them, communicate that you understand their concerns, inform them how you are solving the problem and deliver a plan that addresses the key questions every customer relationship demands (who, what, when, where and how will I get back to being 'whole').

Use your tools – Create a cohesive approach to crisis management. Designate a single point person to coordinate people and communications. Leverage your message and adapt your responses to changing issues as they evolve. Deliver your story across every medium at your disposal – from sales to investor relations, from PR to email, and from personal connections to public forums. It is all a coordinated crisis response.

It's going to come knocking at your door – Sooner or later you will need to incorporate a strategy of integrity. Decide in advance to raise the bar and communicate your expectations within and beyond your organization. The payoff when the (blank) hits the fan will be incredible and the long-term impact to your relationship success will be even more valuable.

Scooters have smaller displacement engines than motorcycles, which are larger. heavier and more expensive. Mopeds are loosely defined as a "gas it and go" one-speed automatic transmission scooter, with a top speed of 30-40 miles per hour.

New Jersey dealers and repair shops that service and customize motorcycles, scooters and mopeds say they have never been as busy keeping up with the demand as consumers look for more economy and fewer visits to the gas pump.

Drew Gaydos of Andy's Cycle Center in Linden said moped sales are approaching those levels of 28 years ago when the high-mileage hybrid was first introduced. The store sells a variety of scooters, mopeds, electric bikes and skateboards.

"Kids are our core customer but we are seeing more adults riding back and forth to train stations on their mopeds," he said. "We're definitely seeing a wider range of demographics interested in the mopeds."

Gaydos is seeing three- to six-month delays in production because of the demand.

Some people are choosing electric bikes as alternatives, Gaydos said. They can travel up to 25 miles on one charge at a speed of 15-18 miles per hour as opposed to some mopeds, which can attain double that speed and average between 75 and 100 miles per gallon of gasoline.

"As bad as the recession is, right now we're doing pretty well," said Frank Mantino, a mechanic with Absolute Performance in Linden. "We've probably doubled where we were last year right now. I've been in this business for 20 years and this is probably the busiest I've ever been. I think the price of fuel is a big part of it, but the sport is growing.

Bill Captain, owner of Green Brook Cycle and Marine in Green Brook, is seeing both new converts and old riders coming back.

"We are selling some smaller motorcycles, that's industry-wide, and there are a lot of entry-level people," he said. "We're also seeing people getting bikes out of their garage. They're repairing them (and) getting them on the road again."

Rich Young, a machinist and mechanic with Cycles Inc. Stroker Motors in Cream Ridge, is fielding calls every day from novices looking for scooters and motorcycles.

"It seems like people are just calling around looking for bikes and scooters," he said.

While declining to discuss specific sales figures, John Siedel, a spokesman for Honda Motorcycles, said the company has begun to supply dealers with 2009 models.

"We're releasing them early because dealers need product and that's indicative of what's going on in the marketplace," he said.

Fuel efficiency and gas savings, however, must be tempered by the realities of the road and the shortcomings of two-wheel motorized travel, including the lack of trunk space, seating and winter travel.

However, safety is the number one issue, according to James Solomon, director of defensive training and defensive driving courses for the National Safety Council, which has seen an increase in the motorcycle death rate in the 55-and-over age group.

"People are buying motorcycles and scooters, all type of things, and we understand the desire to save fuel," Solomon said. "But the first thing you have to consider is, if you're in a crash on a motorcycle traveling at the same speed you would have in a car, whether it's 20, 40 or 50 miles per hour, the odds of injury are 35 times greater than if you had been in an enclosed car or truck.

"You do not have the collapsible features around you. If you're going to ride you have to be more cognizant that you fall under all the same laws as motorcycles, that you're smaller and you're not protected and that there will not be people watching out for you."

Mopeds must be registered and insured. New Jersey state law requires operators of mopeds, scooters and motorcycles to wear helmets and abide by all motor vehicle laws. New Jersey also prohibits mopeds and scooters from travel on state highways and interstates.

Rising Gas Prices May Have the Opposite Effect on Employee Mordle

As gas prices continue to soar and make headlines, employees are modifying their travel to reduce expenses. They are becoming creative with their commutes to work and considering alternative resources such as public transportation or car pooling, all the while wishing they lived closer to their place of employment.

set our prices. We have to live within our budget."

That has become more difficult as fuel prices increase. Last year transportation costs for the organization were \$345,000 and Savage expects that to be higher this year, although she cannot project by how much.

VNA is trying to keep down transportation costs by increasing efficiency in other ways. Savage tries to reduce the amount of travel for her staff by allowing them to come into the office only for scheduled meetings. They are given laptop computers and cell phones with photo capability to allow them to send pictures and information to the office electronically. This means that they can consult with a supervisor about a patient without an additional trip into the office.

One of the best ways to combat fuel increases is to find alternatives to gasoline and diesel, according to Buro of PSE&G. The utility actually began work in this area beginning in 2003.

"At that time it was more the idea of addressing our carbon footprint rather than saving money, but it is paying dividends in cost savings now," Boro said.

PSE&G was among the first fleets to use B20, a blend of 20 percent biodiesel and 80 percent petroleum diesel. Biodiesel is produced from a variety of domestic, renewable resources and burns cleaner than petroleum-based products.

"There are no negatives here," Buro said. "It eliminates smoke and odor, reduces carbon emissions and costs less."

PSE&G is working to reduce fuel consumption in a number of other ways, as well, such as replacing gas engine-powered sign and arrow boards with solar-powered versions as the older ones become obsolete, thereby saving money and benefiting the environment.

The utility also uses electric forklifts rather than gasoline-powered models wherever

possible, and is switching to hybrids for its passenger and light vehicle fleet.

The vehicle most commonly associated with the utility may be the "cherry picker," a truck with a lift device for working at the top of utility poles. PSE&G has shifted more than half of these to electricity, allowing the vehicle's motor to be turned off rather than idling while lines are worked on.

"These vehicles can sit for hours, or even days, at one site," Boro said. "Diesel engines burn one gallon of fuel every hour they idle. Think how much fuel we save if the engine isn't running while the vehicle is sitting."

With a fleet of 5,400 vehicles ranging from cars to construction equipment, teaching employees how to increase fuel efficiency also is an important part of the PSE&G program.

"We talk to our drivers about unnecessary idling as well as reducing the weight in the vehicle," Boro explained, "Reduced weight increases gas mileage so we ask our repairmen to only carry what they will need on a job, rather than loading up the vehicle with unnecessary equipment."

Slower driving speeds, more gradual stops and starts, better route planning and proper vehicle maintenance all can save on fuel costs, he added.

Still, with fuel prices rising so quickly, all these efforts "are only a finger plugging up the dike," Boro warns. His goal right now is for the utility just to stay even.

Today experts are predicting even higher gas prices in the future. Investment bank CIBC has projected that gasoline will increase to \$7 per gallon by 2012. Other predictions are as much as \$12 to \$15.

With increases like this possible, every business – from the solo practice to the 1,000-vehicle fleet – are seeking ways to cut fuel costs like PSE&G. It can mean the difference between making money or running out of gas.

Creative Selling, Kmart and the Dog Who Didn't Bark

"Is there any point to which you would wish to draw my attention?" asked inspector Gregory of Scotland Yard.

"To the curious incident of the dog in the night-time," said Sherlock Holmes.

"The dog did nothing in the night-time."

"That was the curious incident," remarked Sherlock Holmes.

A business owner once learned the hard way the "curious incident of the dog in the night-time."

More than 15 years ago the business owner developed a new consumer product and began presenting it to retailers. Finally he attracted Kmart's attention. The Kmart buyer liked the product but preferred to buy it from an existing supplier of related product. So the Kmart buyer "shopped the concept," showing it to vendors like Hasbro.

Fortunately, the larger competitors didn't want to produce this niche product. So Kmart bought the new product and sales "took off." The entrepreneur "flew in under the radar."

The product did well for a number of years. After the initial innovation, the owner developed modest improvements in the product to give consumers new reasons to buy. But then sales-persquare-foot started dropping. (Retail sales are metric driven; there's no place to hide.) Eventually, Kmart dropped the product.

The owner realized he hadn't been innovative enough, and started developing many "out of the box" products. In the next year, he developed more new products than in the previous five years combined. But it was too late; he had closed the barn door after the horse had left. Kmart never carried the product again.

This owner was guilty of the "curious incident of the dog in the night-time."

In effect, from the market's perspective, he did nothing.

"Losing Kmart" became a metric for this business owner, a way to visualize and prevent his death. He realized that we are only as good as our last project, our last shipment, our last job. So he always strived to excel.

When his business was very busy, colleagues would ask him why he was so driven? He would tell the Kmart story. He didn't want it to happen again.

One of the central lessons of this story is not merely "don't rest on your laurels." By contrast, you should strive even harder for excellence at the height of your success. You never know when a "Kmart experience" is around the corner.

What does this mean for selling?

The selling process is never over. The first sale is often a single transaction – a trial. This could open the door to a business relationship based on trust. Or a consultative relationship, where clients share their compelling needs and work with the salesperson to solve business problems.

Let's Stop Chopping Down the Trees

About 300 years ago England faced an energy crisis that makes ours pale in comparison. Because of a population explosion brought about by new farming techniques, the country ran out of wood. The whole island was practically denuded.

England had abundant reserves of coal, but they couldn't dig enough of it to replace the wood that had been used for centuries. Every time they dug down more than a few feet, their mine would fill with water and they would have to start over somewhere else. Not a very efficient system, but one that assured very high energy prices.

So along comes Thomas Newcomen, an ironmonger and Baptist preacher, who has an idea: Why not make a powered pump that can suck the water out of the mine, allowing it to go deeper. Although Hero of Alexandria invented the basic idea of the steam engine in the first century, no one ever came up with a practical use for it or a workable design until Newcomen in the early 1700s. Newcomen's application of technology averted England's energy crisis.

It also started the industrial revolution. Suddenly there was a power source that had a wide range of applications. There now was an abundant fuel source, coal, that could be used to power the steam engines. And because of the population explosion mentioned above, there also was an abundance of people available to provide labor for these new industries.

Thus, out of an energy crisis came what many consider to be the most important event in human history, the industrial revolution.

Is today's energy crisis the same? In the short run, no. We are not close to running out of oil. The recent run up in price has a lot more to do with speculation than it does with a devastating supply collapse. Demand is growing faster than supply, but not enough to cause the price run up we have been experiencing.

The current energy crisis has given a warning of what is looming, however, it is one we should heed, for it is better to deal with an impending crisis than a current one.

So if I'm right and this is a speculative crisis, prices are going to drop sometime in the not-todistant future and all this redistribution of wealth from everyone to the oil producers is going to come to an end.

In the long run, however, we are facing a crisis. As incomes rise in the rest of the world, especially in Russia, China and India, consumption is going to increase a lot, too. Right now on a per capita basis, the United States consumes four times as much oil as Russia, 14 times as much as China and 35 times as much as India. Now these countries are never likely to become as profligate as us, but it does give you an idea of what the world is facing.

Of course, this doesn't even take into consideration the negative aspects of fossil fuels such as global warming and pollution.

We are now awake to the pain caused by an energy crisis. It is amazing to hear all the talk of alternative energy sources, high capacity batteries, and all kinds of new technologies. However, when prices fall we are likely to go back to sleep, and do what we do so well—drive big cars long distances at high speeds, and walk around the house in our underwear in the winter with all the lights on

Unless forced to, we will not conserve. It is human nature to put off any crisis that is not immediate. And if this happens, all these new technologies will go nowhere. Perhaps a better idea is to keep prices at today's levels by using a tax. This way we would be pushed to conserve and pushed to develop new technologies and ways of doing things. Through a tax, we also would ensure that the funding needed to develop these technologies would be available, as well as the funds to repair our sagging infrastructure.

This Robin Hood's a Fake

Here we go again - going nowhere fast and charging the taxpayer for the ride.

The New Jersey Legislature is considering a new tax – surprise. At least they are being creative this time, hitting both the business community and the consumer while trying to hide their latest swipe at our wallets in a uniquely worded bill that sounds like it's hitting the other guy and helping those in need.

Formally, \$1931/A2765 "Authorizes certain municipalities to impose a tax on the rental of motor vehicles to fund redevelopment plan activities." The bill would allow municipalities with commercial airports to impose a tax of up to 5 percent on car and truck rentals.

Removed from the legalese, the bill initially was an attempt to hit up tourists flying into Newark Airport and renting cars to tool around New York City, or business executives hopping into rented luxury sedans on their way to Somerset County pharmaceuticals. The money would go to help urban renewal projects, such as building low-cost housing in Newark, home of Newark Liberty International Airport.

That sounds palatable, if not entirely hospitable or fair. But there was a problem – it's not legal. It turns out that a whole slew of people, from the Federal Aviation Authority to the courts, say you can't selectively tax folks that way.

So proponents of the idea – Senator Raymond Lesniak, Assemblyman Albert Coutinho and Assemblywoman Grace Spencer are the chief sponsors, apparently with the blessing of Newark Mayor Cory Booker – devised an alternative to allow the tax to be applied statewide. If passed, municipalities with commercial airports all over New Jersey would be free to tax the multitudes of car rentals rolling off their tarmacs in order to fund urban redevelopment. One imagines the mayors of Morristown, Somerville and Wildwood are ecstatic.

The problem with this latest idea is the truth.

In truth this tax would hurt many of the people its proponents believe it will benefit. Not everyone renting a car holds a suitcase in one hand and a stack full of American Express travelers checks in the other.

Many car rental consumers are people who do not own cars, lower income residents who live in urban neighborhoods but occasionally need a car — whether to take a day trip to Swartswood State Park in Sussex County or to drive their mother or father to Kessler Institute in West Orange in a time of need.

Others are average working residents and homemakers whose car is in the auto repair shop and who need a vehicle to get to work or take their kids to school.

Car rental companies make great television commercials showing romantic escapes or top-shelf service for smiling business executives carrying expensive briefcases. In reality most car rental agencies are small businesses operating within the community they serve. While their counters line terminals at major airports they also are found next to donut shops and hardware stores throughout New Jersey – including in those towns with small commercial airports.

Since 1990 the car rental industry and its customers nationwide have paid \$6 billion to state and local governments, in addition to sales taxes, according to a coalition of the car rental companies, the travel industry and tax watchdog groups calling for a prohibition on new car rental taxes. That money has gone to help pay for everything from highway improvement (logical) to local stadiums (rent-a-tailgate?) to sewage treatment plants (doesn't wash). There are 100 car rental excise taxes in 42 states and the District of Columbia.

No wonder it takes so many initials to rent a compact.

The Tax Foundation, a nonpartisan educational organization that promotes sound tax policy and a member of the coalition, states, "A basic goal of any tax system is to raise appropriate revenue for programs while doing the least harm to the economy."

New Jersey legislators would be wise to heed the last portion of that statement. The state's bleeding of business and residential taxpayers continues and the practice of taxing and taxing again to make up for the mistakes of past policies and government leadership cannot continue.

This proposed legislation is a weak attempt at slipping one more tax through the hemorrhaging sieve. Disguising it to read like Robin Hood does not make it any less the Brothers Grimm.

Energy Master Plan Organizes Powerful Tools

In this time of increased energy costs and increasing carbon emissions, a comprehensive program to address the situation has become a necessity. In April of this year, New Jersey released the draft of the state's Energy Master Plan. It enables the organization and improvement of existing energy-related resources for generating and transmitting electricity, heating fuel, and the reduction of overall energy costs by reducing demand and increasing efficiency.

Once organized, these resources and capabilities become powerful tools for managing energy. In New Jersey deregulation occurred in 1999, creating opportunities for managing energy price through competitive purchase, real-time pricing with demand response, etc.

New Jersey's draft energy master plan proposes a road map for adequate, reliable, environmentally responsible energy supplies priced reasonably. The plan outlines the following challenges in New Jersey: supply and demand, price, and climate change.

Growth in the supply of electricity has not been keeping up with the growth in demand: New Jersey's ability to maintain reliable, reasonably priced supply is seriously threatened because of the consistent increase in demands due to the increase in population, increase in the number of cars, aging power plants, and lack of aggressive building codes to promote energy efficiency.

A reliable supply of electricity requires power plants with enough capacity to meet the peak demand for electricity, transmission lines with enough capacity to carry that electricity from power plants to areas where customers are concentrated, and distribution systems with enough capacity to take the electricity from the transmission system and deliver it to customers.

However, demand rises to peak levels for only a small number of hours each year—generally fewer than 50 hours out of 8,760. Building power plants and transmission lines to serve growing peak demand is far more expensive than reducing demand during those few hours. In New Jersey, annual Electric generation capacity increased slowly while peak demand continued to increase significantly. Considering the

anticipated retirement of aging power plants, there is need for reducing demand.

The price of energy has increased substantially over the past few years, and this trend is expected to continue: Between 2002 and 2007, the price of natural gas nearly doubled, driving corresponding increases in the price of heating fuels and the cost of electricity in New Jersey. Given that 55 percent of electricity comes from the most expensive natural gas power plants, we need to shift to non-fossil, carbon-neutral sources. Additionally, the price of oil has also been rising, exceeding \$140 per barrel, with our dependence on foreign sources having increased our concerns about supply.

Without action, our contribution to global warming and other pollutants will continue to increase: We need to minimize the carbon footprint because electricity from outside the state ("leakage") and the in-state plants account for 25 percent of greenhouse gas emissions. The prospect of increased greenhouse gas emissions should not be the only reason to avoid increasing our reliance on out-of-state high carbon-producing electricity. We must become more aggressive in increasing our renewable energy portfolio, thereby, creating a green economy and green collar jobs.

In conclusion, deregulation has brought an opportunity to impact the supply side effectively. In the past, energy management was focused on the demand-side measures. While a strategy for managing the demand-side costs is an important part of the Energy Master Plan, we should also consider ways to impact the supply side for modernizing the distribution network by deploying Smart Grid technologies.

Indeed, the characteristics of the state's future energy generation – natural gas, coal, cogeneration, nuclear and renewable/alternative energy – should be carefully reviewed while keeping several of the following factors in mind; dependence on foreign oil, cost and sustainability of supply, cost of new generation as supposed to demand reduction.

We must ensure that New Jersey's future energy environment provides energy that is affordable, reliable and consistent with the future greenhouse gas emission targets.

Now that we have made it through the presidential primaries, our nation is about to embark on an intense debate over the issues that most effect Americans. There may be no single, more critical issue to our national security, our economy and our future than the issue of energy policy.

All energy prices are up. Oil and gasoline prices have doubled since last summer, with oil in excess of \$140 a barrel and gasoline at more than \$4 a gallon, the highest average in U.S. history.

Natural gas is no different. The wholesale price of natural gas that producers charge – the price local utilities pay for the gas they deliver to customers without a mark-up – has more than doubled since last summer. Elizabethtown Gas adjusts the fuel charge up or down depending on how much we are paying for natural gas.

So what can be done to combat these rising prices and secure our energy future? It will take a combination of tactics — there is no silver bullet.

Governor Jon Corzine recently released the New Jersey Energy Master Plan, which calls for the reduction of energy consumption by at least 20 percent by the year 2020, and signed the Global Warming Response Act, which calls for reductions in the state's contribution to global warming.

The plan highlights conservation, energy efficiency and alternative energy sources as methods of achieving these goals. This is a giant step in the right direction for our state, but as a nation we still need more clean energy than currently exists and is readily available.

Today, our society recognizes the need to conserve our energy resources and limit our effect on the environment. We must continue the exploration and development of alternative and renewable energy sources. However, renewable energy is simply not ready to replace fossil fuels

Meeting the nation's future electric generation demand will require the development of a wide range of clean generation options, starting with renewable sources, but also including clean coal and nuclear.

These technologies will not come online overnight. Our energy has to come from somewhere while we convert to these options, and fossil fuels – particularly clean-burning natural gas – will remain in great demand. Most electric generation capacity built in the last decade, and projected to be built in the next decade, is fueled by natural gas, which emits 45 percent less carbon dioxide (CO₂) than coal and 30 percent less than oil.

Residential demand is up, as well. Despite the sharp price increases, natural gas is still the best energy value for home heating. With all energy costs on the rise, not only is natural gas the more environmentally responsible choice, it is a less expensive choice than oil, propane or electric heating. Homes that directly use natural gas for furnaces, hot water heaters and other appliances produce 40 percent less carbon dioxide emissions than homes using electric appliances.

Through the direct use of natural gas, 90 percent of what is produced is delivered as useful energy. This is compared to less than one-third of the energy converted to electricity reaching customers.

Demand for natural gas is up sharply, yet production has struggled to keep pace. The U.S. has an abundance of natural gas, but there are relatively few areas open to production. As a result, the market price of natural gas reflects an extremely tight balance between supply and demand.

This will continue until we increase domestic production. Offshore drilling, while not popular in New Jersey, must be considered for the good of the nation. Denying this access keeps the U.S. tied to oil and gas imports from volatile portions of the world.

Energy is the lifeblood of this state and our nation. It feeds our industries, keeps our families warm and allows us to enjoy the highest quality of life of any nation in the world. We must act now and look at all energy options that will decrease our dependence on foreign oil.
