Linwood Inn owners sue Linden, developer

LINDEN — After a prolonged battle with the city, the owners of the Linwood Inn, John and Lori Neshimka, are suing to protect their business from eminent domain.

The lawsuit, filed last month against the city and Verge Developers, calls for the restaurant to lose its designation as "blighted" and to be included in the city's plan to refurbish the Wood Avenue area surrounding the train station, according to the family's attorney, Peter Dick-

son of the Princeton-based firm Potter and Dickson.

The Neshimka Family has fought for five years to lose the label of an "area in need of redevelopment," which would allow the city to seize the property using eminent domain.

Their property is not blighted, Neshimka say. They claim they have spent nearly \$500,000 on renovations to the facade since 2000.

The Neshimka's also claim they never received a letter telling them they were designated an area in need of redevelopment. The previous

owner, John's stepfather, received it and did not notify them, they say. Legally, an owner must be notified if their property is designated for redevelopment.

In a past interview John Neshimka said he felt he was being strung along by the city.

"Everyone told us to wait and wait. Wait for what?" he asked.

The fate of the restaurant at East Linden and South Wood avenues has been in limbo since the city sued the company they hired to develop the Wood Avenue area, Verge Develop-

ers, last year for breach of contract. Verge countersued.

Officials have been working to settle the issue, and last week the Union County Improvement Authority aborted the contract with Verge and will begin seeking a new developer, according to Mayor Richard Gerbounka.

Gerbounka said he was "very disappointed" with the lawsuit, saying he hoped to avoid a legal battle with the Neshimkas. "I told them we would be willing to talk to them about developing property without

eminent domain...when we were able to get out of our contract with the developers," he said.

Requests for Proposals are expected to go out to potential developers by mid-December.

Officials want to bring mixed-use retail and office space, as well as condos and apartments, to what is now several vacant lots and smaller retail stores in the Wood Avenue area.

Borough budget up 7.3 %

ROSELLE PARK— The 2008 municipal budget adopted two weeks ago includes a 7.36 percent increase for the average taxpayer.

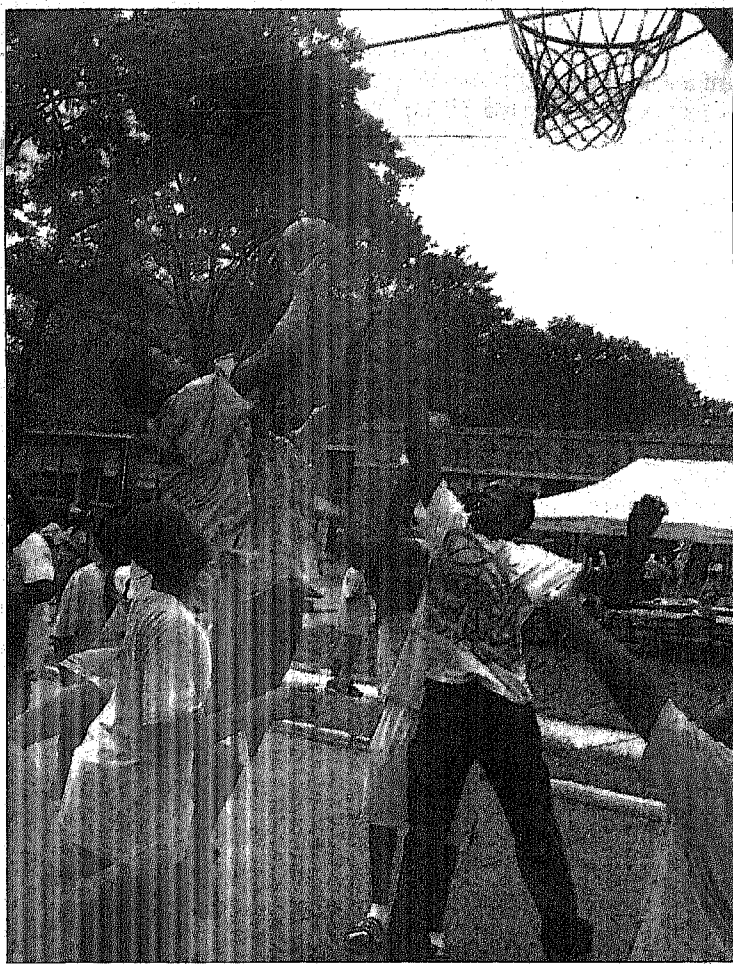
The \$153 average increase — approved Aug. 21 by the governing body — would have been approximately \$257, but officials say they worked to decrease the total tax impact on residents in various ways, including adding shared service programs to minimize costs. The county has been responsible for the borough's welfare department since Feb. 1 and is also handling the information technology services.

Ken Blum, chief financial officer for the borough, said the total budget is approximately \$13.5 million, which increased a total of \$217,171 from last year.

According to borough officials, the increase is due to a drop of about \$167,000 in state aid. Other reasons for the tax hike included salary and wage increases of up to approximately \$93,000, appropriat-

Ashland Rd. work behind schedule

SUMMIT — Summit residents will have to drive around road construction for a few more weeks.

The Union County Engineer's Office will continue with the culvert replacement project on Ashland Road between Tulip Street and Larned Road in Summit, that has been blocking the street since the Fourth of July.

The \$609,000 project was originally slated to be complete on Labor Day, before the start of classes at the nearby Brayton School.

According to Union County Director of Communications, Sebastian D'Elia, Caro Construction Company of Florham Park, who are the contractors in charge of the road work, are about two weeks behind schedule.

"We have unfortunately been delayed during this project due to some problems with the contractors," D'Elia said. "I do not have any specifics as to what the issue is, but I can assure that all necessary preparations have been made to handle the delay."

New judge in Cranford

CRANFORD — The death of Judge James Bell and the retirement of court administrator Carol Campbell, both long-time township employees, are prompting big changes at the municipal court.

On July 15, Assistant Prosecutor Mark Cassidy was appointed to fill Bell's term, which expires Dec. 31, for a salary of \$36,000.

"I'm humbled by the confidence the council has placed in me," Cas-

sidy said, noting he hopes to serve as judge in 2009 as well.

Bell, who died in April after a long battle with multiple illnesses, had served as judge for 30 years, earning much respect from town officials and residents, according to township officials and his co-workers.

Cassidy served as assistant prosecutor in Middlesex County for 12 years and in Ocean County for three years. He also served as mun-

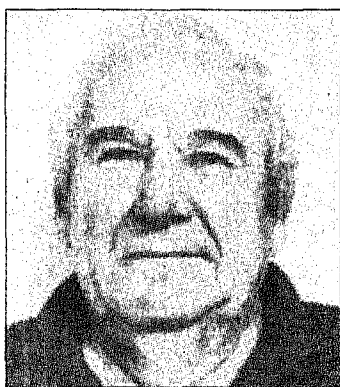
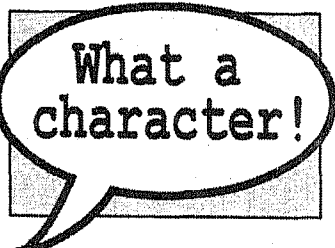
UNION — Michael Vieira is out of a job, but he isn't out of the woods.

HPD, NPD nab alleged robber

HILLSIDE — A man suspected of armed robbery in Newark was arrested after leading township police on a high-speed chase.

The suspect, the passenger in the gray Nissan pursued by police, James Heyward, 35, of Newark was arrested shortly after 10 a.m. Aug. 27. The driver, who got away, is being sought by Newark authorities on charges of eluding arrest and numerous motor vehicle violations in addition to similar charges as Heyward.

According to a press release issued by the Hillside Police Department, Detective Lt. Matthew Ross, along with Detectives Michael Ricci and Jamie Howell, had been involved in an unrelated investigation in Newark when they spotted the suspects vehicle, with license plates matching the description of a vehicle used in a armed robbery in city.

Detectives reportedly spotted the vehicle being driven out of an Exxon gas station parking lot at the intersection of Clinton and Elizabeth avenues.

Authorities who followed the vehicle urged the driver to stop, but they accelerated, speeding through the streets of Newark. The driver and Heyward jumped from the vehicle and attempted to flee the area after striking a fence on Littleton Avenue.

According to Hillside Detective Lt. Vincent Ricciardi, Newark officer Michael Silva and Hillside Detective Jamie Howell managed to catch Heyward, who was turned over to Newark police.

Newark authorities charged Heyward with four counts of armed robbery with a handgun, possession of a weapon and possession of a weapon for unlawful purposes.

Three Kenilworth Dems announce run for council
Candidates will vie for three open seats

KENILWORTH — The borough's Democratic party has named three candidates for the upcoming November election.

Darrin F. McMahon, Cheryl A. Pantina and Robert Beiner were selected to run for two three-year terms and one two-year term on the Borough Council.

The seats up for grabs are currently occupied by Democrats Lawrence Clementi and Anthony DeLuca and Republican Salvatore Candarella. "You have to be the face of the town and I firmly believe the three (Democratic)

candidates are very knowledgeable and know the town and would present some good ideas," DeLuca said.

DeLuca and Clementi both decided not to run again for election for personal reasons.

Candarella, whose seat would be for a two-year term, stepped in earlier this year to fill a vacancy left by Republican mayor Mayor Kathi Fiamingo who vacated her council seat in January to become mayor.

The three Republicans who have already announced their candidacy for the election, Candarella, Kevin Leary Jr. and

Scott Klinder have the support of the mayor.


"Sal's been doing a great job this year," Fiamingo said. "Kevin has a lot of experience in the political arena and both he and Scott were born and raised in town and really care about it."

During the fall elections, candidates on both sides are expected to face issues ranging from the ongoing plans for the proposed public safety building, tax concerns and the borough's master plan, which is currently being adjusted.

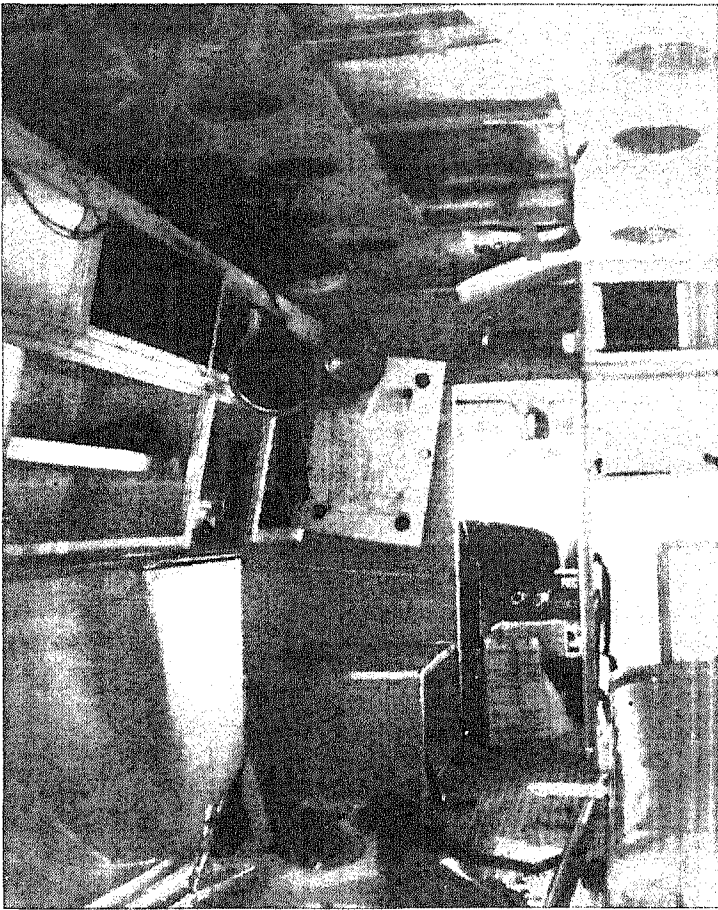

RPFAS ambulance damaged by blaze

A Roselle Park First Aid Squad ambulance used for fire rehabilitation was the victim of damaging flames when it suddenly caught fire while traveling down Chestnut Street in Union on Aug. 26.

The driver, Rich Lonecke, was not harmed, nor were other drivers and vehicles on the road at the time, but considerable damage was done to the roof and sides of the ambulance, one of three used by the Roselle Park First Aid Squad.

Lonecke said the ambulance may not be in service for an undetermined amount of time.

"It may have been an electrical fire," Union Fire Department Lt. Mike Scanio said about the cause of the incident. Lonecke told authorities the insulation along the sides of the rear of the ambulance caught fire after a blower motor shorted out.

"I'm freaked that it went on fire now like this and not on a rehab call," Lonecke said.

He said he was performing a regular service run —driving along Chestnut Street, heading toward Roselle Park— when he smelled smoke at approximately 1:30 p.m. "I jumped out," he said. Luckily, a nearby policeman came to his aid.

Within minutes the block surrounding Colonial Avenue and Chestnut Street was roped off by Union police. Traffic was redirected around the block for about a half an hour.

The fire was extinguished within twenty minutes, according to Scanio.

It is not yet known how much the repairs to the ambulance will cost.

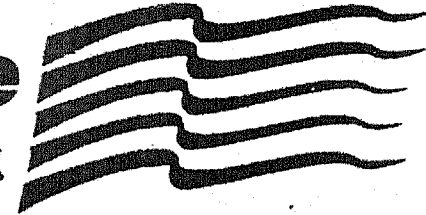

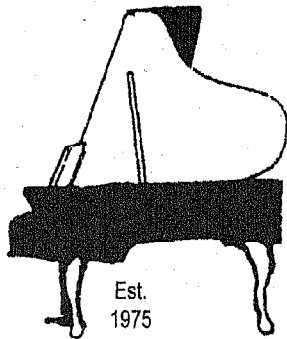

Feds keep pressure on 'Crew'

RAHWAY — The dismantling of the "Route 35 Crew" is almost complete. The fourth of six individuals authorities believe are connected to the gang pleaded guilty last week to bank robbery and burglary.

Andre Billups, 24, of Rahway admitted to conspiring to commit a home burglary in Allentown, Pa., and to robbing a cash-carrying courier who was bringing a large deposit to a Commerce Bank in Cranford, according to U.S. Attorney Christopher Christie.

He faces a maximum penalty of 20 years in federal prison and a \$250,000 fine.

Billups admitted that on Aug. 15, 2006, he drove to the Allentown apartment of a man who owed his friend money.

He, along with Sandy Hart and alleged accomplice Ruben Rosado, entered the apartment, bound a woman at gunpoint and stole \$300 in cash and other items.

He also admitted to conspiring with Andria Yarborough — an employee at the Cranford bank — to rob a

customer who she knew frequently brought large deposits to the branch.

Billups and the accomplices robbed the bank customer and split the haul with Yarborough.

He will be sentenced on Dec. 1 by U.S. District Judge Joel Pisano.

Authorities say the "Route 35 Crew" was responsible for at least 13 bank heists and home robberies in Union and Middlesex counties between August 2006 and November 2007.

Michael Green, 30, of Linden, Hart, 29, of Rahway and Yarborough, 24, of Roselle have all pleaded guilty to a range of robberies connected to the gang and are awaiting sentencing.

Rosado, 31, and Brandon Thomas, 27, both of Rahway are awaiting trial for the bank robbery and accepting stolen property, respectively.

Thomas was released on a \$100,000 bail, while Rosado was detained without bail.

Officials consider retesting in wake of SFD test scandal

SPRINGFIELD — The Township Committee has put off deciding whether firefighters must take a new Fire Department entrance exam, due to lobbying on the part of several volunteer firefighters.

Reissuing the exam would cost the township \$8,000, according Mayor Bart Fraenkel.

The test results from the first entrance exam taken last February were thrown out in March at the recommendation of both test-takers and Union County Judge Walter Barisonek following accusations of tampering and nepotism. Shortly after an ordinance was created to throw out the February exam, the original results were discovered, affirming the test results were altered. Some pointed to now retired Fire Chief Wayne Masiello, alleging he changed the results to secure a place on the Fire Department staff for Adam Masiello.

With the test results in limbo

since March, two vacancies left by retired firefighters remain.

Volunteer Firefighter Connor Hamilton, whose oral exam score was allegedly altered, believes he earned a spot towards the top of the eligibility list. "It's...a waste of the taxpayer's money to spend \$8,000 on a new test when we have the correct list available," he said.

According to Hamilton, the expenses would not stop there. If a new test was given, the township would need to return the \$5,325 paid by the 71 hopefuls that took the original test, as well as continuing to pay firefighters overtime while the new test is taken to fill the vacancies.

Fire Chief James Sanford did not see any adverse effect caused by the vacancies. "It is not impacting the safety of my men or the town," he said.

On the list of the original test scores, Hamilton finished first out of 71 test-takers in the oral section, and second overall.

Fraenkel and the governing body is working to find a solution that would benefit all parties involved. "There are so many moving parts here," Fraenkel said. "We need to find what we believe is a fair solution; that's our main responsibility. The fact is, though, we cannot make everybody happy."

The mayor said that the original list of exam scores cannot be used as criteria, because Masiello's case has not been closed yet, and because those scores have already been thrown out.

Hamilton has lobbied the township in the past to only allow two-year volunteers eligibility to take the entrance exam. This is another topic the committee must review before taking a final vote.

"We do not want to rush into anything," Fraenkel said. "What we need to do is establish the methodology that can be used from now on."

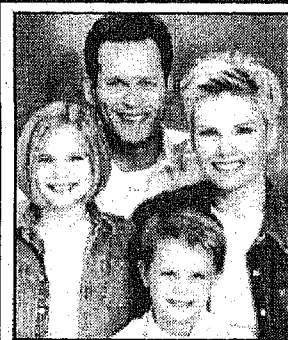

DOE: Educator fired for sex with student

ROSELLE — An Abraham Clark High School teacher has been fired by school officials for allegedly having a sexual relationship with a 10th-grade student two years ago.

Gilbert Young Jr., 51, engaged in sexual activity with a 17-year-old male student, according to the state Department of Education.

Young was immediately dismissed from his post following the decision made during the Aug. 18 tenure hearing on the matter.

He will receive back pay for the 120 days he was suspended without pay in January. That is the maximum time allowed for a tenured employee to be suspended without pay. After that time and up to the Aug. 18 decision Young was suspended with pay. He earned an annual salary of \$47,734 in 2007, according to the Asbury Park Press Website.

DOE spokesman Richard Vespucci said Young has the option of appealing the ruling and taking it to court. He must file within 45 days.

He could not be reached for comment and his attorney, Louis Bucceri, of Bucceri & Pincus, did not return calls made to his Clifton office.

A police and Institutional Abuse Investigation Unit probe into the matter cleared Young of sexual abuse and criminal charges because the student was the age of consent at the time of the sexual activity.

The state Commissioner of Education, Lucille E. Davy, however, found Young used his position to take advantage of the student and ruled that his conduct was grounds for dismissal. "[Young] took a minor...and subjected him to acts unbecoming a teacher," the DOE concluded in their ruling.

Young was a seventh-grade math teacher when he first met the the victim — one of his students. The victim claimed sometime during December 2004, Young began driving him home from school and dropping him down the street from his house.

According to school policy, teachers are not to drive students home.

The victim claimed that during one of these drives, they stopped at Warinanco Park, where the teacher kissed and fondled him. On New Year's Day 2005, the student snuck out of his grandmother's house and stayed with Young in a room at the Linden Motor Inn. There they allegedly engaged in various sex acts, which the victim said he tried to stop at one point.

According to the DOE's ruling, prior to those incidents the student gave Young "blatantly affectionate notes," which he kept for three years without reporting them to school administrators. He also received phone calls that were sometimes mildly sexually explicit.

"We recently learned of Commissioner Davy's decision and will abide by it. Student safety is a top priority in Roselle's Public Schools, where our focus is on learning and achieving excellence," said Roselle superintendent Elnardo Webster.

Be vigilant

Recently, three administrators in a Monmouth County school district used academic degrees they obtained from unaccredited universities to obtain salary increases. In response to these allegations, Senate President Richard Codey has demanded an investigation of the credentials of every superintendent and administrator in the state's 589 school districts to determine if this practice extends beyond Monmouth County. Codey also has asked Attorney General Anne Milgram to investigate if any laws have been broken, and has said he will propose legislation to prevent increases in compensation based on "fake diplomas."

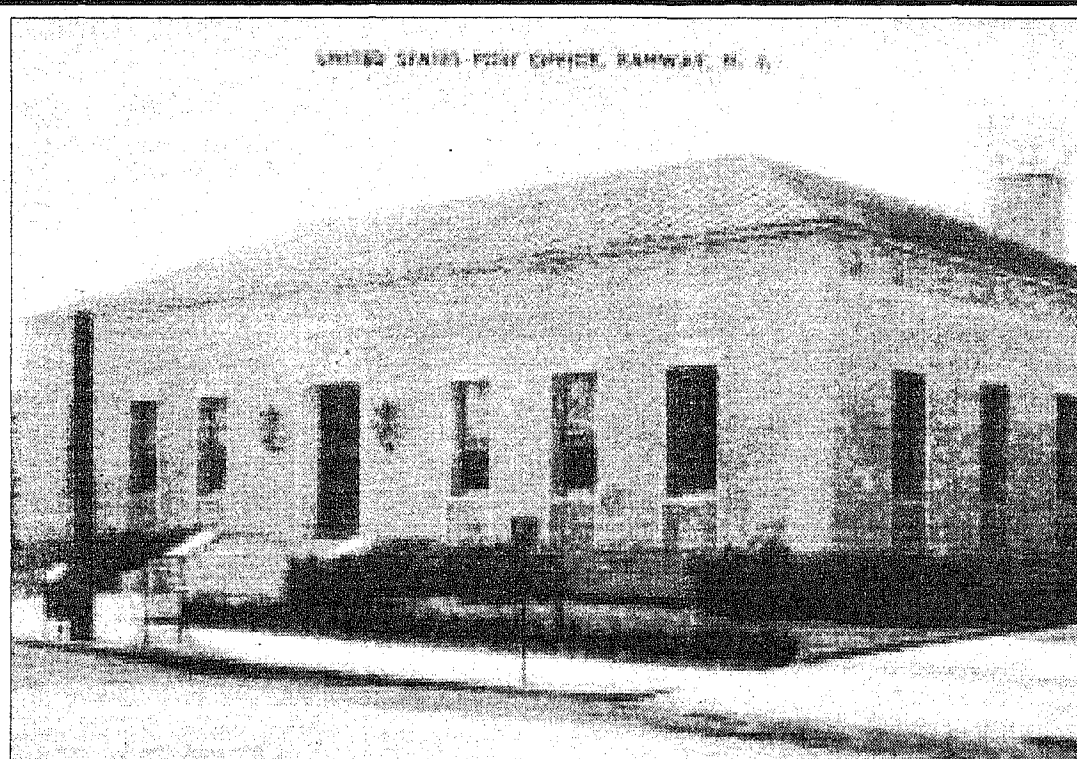
Good for Codey. If these allegations are true, the administrators in Monmouth County took money, our tax dollars, under false pretenses and should return every penny and face the appropriate legal consequences. Academics should not be an easy ticket to the easy life. What lesson would a slap on the wrist teach our children?

In another recent incident, the superintendent of the Keansburg school district retired from her post with nearly \$740,000 in severance pay and accumulated sick days. This, too, is wrong. How irresponsible can school board members be to approve such a contract? And the district is an Abbott district, meaning the school board was spending not the money of the local taxpayers but the money of taxpayers statewide. New laws are in the works to hopefully end this irresponsible practice.

For most of us, school taxes account for about half our property taxes, yet attendance at school board meetings often is scant, and turnout for school board elections rarely tops 20 percent of the registered voters in any municipality. While we understand that school board members are expected to set policy and offer guidance, not run the day-to-day details of a district, we believe that keeping a close watch on the purse strings is an important policy issue, and one of their key responsibilities. Board members are the representatives we elect to compile the district budget each year and to negotiate salaries and union contracts.

We expect them to be responsible stewards of our tax dollars, striking a fair balance between what the students, teachers and administrators need and what the community can afford to pay.

Blindly approving pay raises without gathering all the facts or signing off on huge severance packages do not help the children, the taxpayers or the school district. They only help the administrators

Councilwoman Michele Yamakaitis walked the streets of the 8th Ward in Linden — which she represents on the City Council — over the Labor Day Weekend.

She found a lot of people at home. She knows many of them on a first name basis. Most of her bell-ringing as she campaigns for re-election ends with her question "are there any problems I can help you with?"

In this part of the city, with a refinery looming in the background, two airports close by, and U.S. Highway 1 dividing her ward down the middle, it is a reminder of an industrial time that is passing. The neat — if aging — housing stock speaks to a time when they were home to the employees of industry. The number of employees has since dwindled.

At the houses she visits, Yamakaitis hands out her campaign flier. In this area, it's important to inform residents that she is "the third of four children of Robert and Patricia Szenczik." At each door, she also gives a refrigerator magnet, which means her phone number will be readily accessible.

Accessible also means leading the charge to combat graffiti which plagues part of her ward. She says taxes are a big issue.

Despite the big, recent jumps in the city the subject of taxes comes up rarely in her campaign stops this day.

Her focus is directed to an abandoned dog she has helped segregate after the barking annoys neighbors. After her cell phone calls to city employees, the owner is connected again with his dog. All of this takes place in front of watchful neighbors.

Her name, Michele, — "my mother loved the Beatles," she explains — meant the wrong spelling on a council person name plate had to be replaced. Once in a while because of the last name, this Lithuanian by decent is thought to be married to a Japanese, which she is not.

She says she likes focused results and not the politics. Still, she can play the game like a pro with showing pictures of her with the Easter Bunny and Santa Claus. You wonder, as all 5-feet or so charges up the next flight of stairs, just how much energy exists.

Her council results are in some areas significant. Her career has been in helping the handicapped. She grew up on the Elizabeth side of Bayway, separated only by the paving of the streets that border Linden. Her husband is a lifer in Linden, another point made in her fliers. She refreshingly knows how to make of fun of herself.

There was no laughter last year when she went head to head with PSE&G when the utility started taking down trees in the name of wire safety. She succeeded in getting a large number of new plantings.

As she walks through the ward, the sharp memory reels off the accomplishments of fixing sewer problems and placing of handicapped parking signs. She spends time at one house, discussing the

hospitalization of a man's wife in the shadow of one of the signs she delivered as it gets installed.

Often, in response to her question about helping with any problems, the answer is: "no things are all right." She is the local girl who stayed in touch. She will be Linden's grand marshal at the 2008 Pulaski Day Parade.

As she crosses Route 1, she enters a different portion of the ward where a large portion are minorities. Her voter pitch, her concerns stay consistent no matter who she speaks with. This year she faces opposition by an independent supported by Mayor Richard Gerbounka. She succeeds, more often than not, in winning commitments for re-election lawn sign locations in the fall.

She sometimes speaks about the need for better planning, budget problems, and the other scourges of local officials. If there is a disappointment, it may be in the lousy traffic flow on Stiles Street caused by the new Sam's club and TGI Friday's restaurant. It's a bad situation, and there doesn't seem to be an urgency on the part of city officials to make it better.

She spends time with a black resident who has moved from Jersey City into her ward. She asks, and immediately registers, the new voter. The councilwoman with the husband, two kids, a yellow labrador named Samantha and a cat is the contact for the voter and his community. If any problems arise, he can reach his councilperson, whose number will be on his refrigerator.

It shouldn't be a popularity contest

Editor's note: The following is the second installment in a series on "running for election."

The primary failing of most political candidates, especially the "winners" at the local level, is a reluctance to speak truthfully on developing problems out of either ignorance or fear of rejection.

The state sees this and tries to place parameters, like budget caps and mandates, on the damage these officials can do in office. But though this may limit the damage, it also limits actions that can be taken to fix the problems.

The main problem I see is that property taxes are too high. Yet the state allows annual increases even when the real income of taxpayers is falling.

Budgets are now strictly prepared to keep within the caps, with major items like pension and health care expenses being exempt, with no incentive to take proactive steps to actually reduce taxes that have become onerous. Too many elected officials feel their jobs are done when their accountants stay within the state limits on tax hikes. Reducing costs is effectively discouraged, since the same percentage limit would apply next year to a lower base.

If, for example, the Union County freeholders decided to do away with the Musicfest and lower taxes in one year, then their budget for the subsequent year would be

constrained, since the percentage increase would be applied to a smaller number.

So the tax spiral continues. Besides the annual increases, property taxes in future years will be much higher for three main reasons: sewerage costs, pension payments and worker and retiree health care costs.

The Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority provides water to 11 communities in Union County and, because of court-mandated improvements required to the system, \$300 million in upgrades are now being paid off.

These hikes were so onerous that Clark had them taken out of the property tax bill so that their elected officials could distance themselves from the big cost increases to come. Kenilworth was also considering doing the same, but wisely demurred.

The state pension system, covering about a quarter of a million retirees and another half million workers at all levels of govern-

ment, has an overall deficit that will be coming in at \$50 billion this year. This is money promised to participants that the state has not seen it prudent to bill the towns, school boards, or other government entities for just yet.

Through a series of games going back to the Florio administration, the plan is on target to be bankrupt within seven years, at a time when annual payout promises will be in the \$15 billion range. If even a semblance of actuarial soundness is reintroduced, pension costs that taxpayers will have to pick up could easily double next year.

Finally, government employees retain some of the best and most expensive health care benefits anywhere.

These used to be provided to make up for below-market salaries back in the day, but even as salaries have caught up, benefits remained generous — and costly.

These problems are not insurmountable if faced squarely. Unfortunately, it seems to be the insurmountable problems, like abortion and gay marriage, that are deemed worthy of discourse. Issues that affect us all are left to fester as mayors and councils elected in popularity contests are either ill-prepared or ill-motivated to confront them.

Nature in an 'urban landscape'

The large, whitish bird with long concave shaped wings circled over the Rahway River at a great height.

Against puffy cumulus clouds, the clear slate colored back and distinct eye stripe gave away the bird's identity; osprey. Commonly called the fish hawk, the osprey came up the Rahway River, probably in search of food. The boys and girls of the John F. Kennedy Community Center drew "oohs" and "ahhs" as they struggled to locate the bird with their binoculars, even though it was impressive with the naked eye.

Soon afterwards, a dark, snake-like bird stretched its long neck upwards on the Rahway River. To a chuckle or two, I explained that the bird is a double-crested cormorant — a fish-eating bird related to herons and egrets. ming fish and eat many in a short period.

In a flourish of color, a tiger swallowtail alighted onto a tall phlox in the newly minted butterfly garden. Created in conjunction by the Rahway River Association, the John F. Kennedy Community Center and Merck and Company, the garden will naturally attract nectar-seeking hummingbirds, butterflies, bees and other beneficial insects.

A fenced in area within the park contains a detention basin surrounded by many wildflowers; purple looserstrife, vervain and Joe Pye weed. The children ran, laughed and discovered a natural world literally around the block from their homes and community center. The sights and sounds of Rahway Riverfront Park triggered a blizzard of questions about nature, animals and plants by the children. Their natural curiosity, instinct for discovery, and a sense of marvel was

in full force — as it should be.

Rahway Riverfront Park is a brief afterthought as you speed busily along Elizabeth Avenue. If you happen to turn into the park, you are greeted by manicured lawns, the butterfly garden, scattered trees and an elevated trail that provides a panoramic view of the Rahway River right down to the Rahway Yacht Club, where it ends abruptly. The underused park lies next to the Rahway River and runs parallel for a distance equivalent to several city blocks.

It is counterintuitive to think that an urban park can provide great glimpses of wildlife that one would associate with wilder areas of the New Jersey Highlands and Pinelands.

Indeed, the weekly tours of the Rahway Riverfront Park with a local troop of children from the John F. Kennedy Community Center proves that a small city park can provide a much needed window into a natural world that is so difficult to find in an urban landscape.

Orientation is underway for many new teachers beginning work in the district.

"We'll follow our strategic plan and move forward with a lot of professional development," LaPrete said.

New faces and fresh paint are among other changes Clark students are likely to notice when they hit the books again in September.

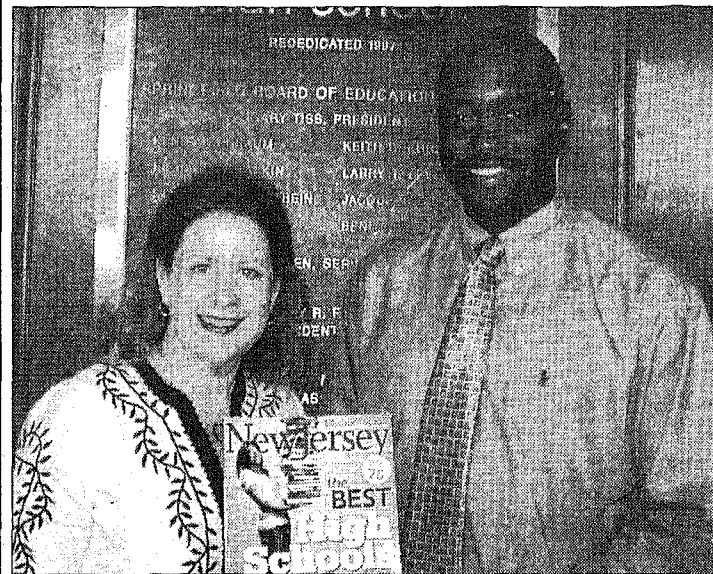

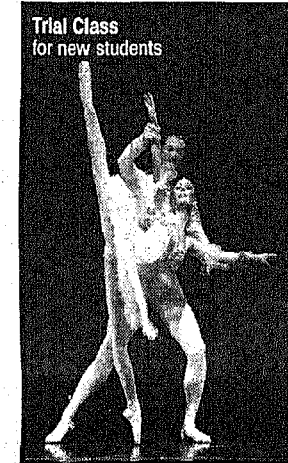

Gang members plead guilty to charges

As the county-wide crack-down on the Latin Kings street gang continues, three family members pleaded guilty to charges ranging from drug distribution to financial facilitation of criminal activity.

On Aug. 26, two siblings from Elizabeth — Roberto Torres, 26, and Jesus Gomez, 28 — recently pleaded guilty to drug and weapons charges. They are believed to be members of the Latin Kings street gang.

Their mother, Maria Gomez, 48, of Neshanic Station, Somerset County, also pleaded guilty to knowingly holding on to

proceeds of drug sales for her sons.

In a press release issued by the Union County Prosecutor's Office, it was confirmed that both Gomez and Torres may serve up to 20 years in state prison and must serve 10 years to attain parole eligibility.

Their mother faces probation after pleading guilty to third degree financial facilitation. According to Union County Prosecutor Theodore J. Romankow, Gomez pleaded guilty to first degree charges of distributing cocaine and third degree charges of distributing a controlled dangerous substance within 1,000 feet of a school.

His brother, Torres, pleaded guilty to first

degree charges of cocaine distribution and second degree charges of unlawful possession of a weapon. According to officials from the prosecutor's office, the three individuals will be sentenced Oct. 10 before Union County Superior Court Judge John Triarsi.

The two brothers were two of 20 Latin Kings gang members arrested in April, after several months of intense investigations led by the Prosecutor's Office.

"The raids involved more than 300 officers from various law enforcement agencies and 21 homes were raided simultaneously," said Assistant Prosecutor Robert Vanderstreet, who prosecuted this case.

The Latin Kings of Elizabeth are known for selling drugs, mainly cocaine, and had been basing their business out of the Xclusive Auto Repair shop on East Jersey Street in Elizabeth. Authorities allege drug-related operations were carried out around the clock at the auto shop.

According to the Prosecutor's Office, nearly 400 retail transactions occurred daily with up to \$400,000 made weekly with the sale of nearly four kilograms of drugs.

The press release issued by county law enforcement officials indicated that criminal charges against the other arrested former gang members are still pending.

Feeling the pinch at the pump? Try safe driving

Union County residents can get big savings on gasoline by practicing safe driving habits, according to the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders.

"You may have heard that moderate driving is more fuel-efficient, but the actual results can surprise you," said Freeholder Chairman Angel G. Estrada. The savings from moderate driving can easily exceed 30 percent, depending on a driver's current habits. Four of the most effective strategies are also the easiest to do:

- Observe the posted speed limit. Fuel efficiency drops greatly at higher speeds.
- Keep a safe following distance. Passing, weaving and tailgating all involve needless accelerating and braking, which wastes gas.
- At intersections, avoid jackrabbit starts. Accelerating gradually is more fuel-efficient.
- When waiting in line for school pick-ups and drive-through services, turn off the engine. Excessive

idling is illegal in New Jersey. It also wastes gas and puts more wear and tear on the engine. After just 15 seconds, an idling car uses more gas than it would take to shut off and restart.

- For even more savings, keep up with routine maintenance, and keep tires inflated properly. Removing unused roof racks and keeping the trunk free of excess weight can also help.

- Avoid additives or devices that make extravagant claims for improving gas mileage. According to the U.S. Federal Trade Commission, these products are scams that do not work, and some may cause engine damage.

County grants are all HEART

The Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders recently announced this year's recipients of the 2008 Union County History, Education, Arts Reaching Thousands grant.

The freeholders chose 45 businesses or artists across the county to receive a total of \$75,000 in grant funds.

In 1998, the Union County Freeholders established the annual HEART Grant Program to promote the significance of history and the arts in the county, and to encourage local groups, historians and educators to make an effort to express this importance in everyday activities.

"The services provided by these artists, scholars and organizations directly benefit the residents of our county and increase appreciation for the arts, our history and the humanities," Freeholder Chairman Angel Estrada said in a recent press release. "These cultural assets are a vital part of community life...economic development and cultural heritage tourism in Union County."

According to Sebastian D'Elia, director of communications for Union County, many organizations apply for this grant but only a certain amount are chosen every year, based on the funds available.

Applicants must be Union County-based, non-profit organizations, units of local government, libraries or individual artists or scholars who live in Union County. Programs and projects must also occur within Union County.

Reeves-Reed Arboretum in Summit and the Occupational Center of Union County in Roselle,

each receiving \$2,500, were among the organizations that received the largest HEART grants.

Arthur Grand, the vice president of professional services at the Occupational Center, explained that the center looks forward to this grant every year as it helps restart the center's art education program.

"We will use the money to provide art education, appreciation, and therapy to those with disabilities," Grand explained. "It allows us to continue the progress we've made the year before. We plan to restart the art program this fall."

Reeves-Reed Arboretum received two separate grants this year: one for \$2,500 to create a brochure outlining Summit's historical sites, and one for \$300 to hire a musician to perform "turn-of-the-century songs" for the county's annual Four Centuries in a Weekend county-wide historic tour Oct 18 and 19.

According to the arboretum's grants and communications manager, Beth Karp, the 10,000 full-color brochures will include the history, directions and photos of four different Four Centuries sites in Summit, including the Summit Playhouse, Twin Maple historic mansion, the Carter House and the arboretum.

The arboretum itself will be one of the stops on the Four Centuries in a Weekend tour next month.

The second \$300 grant that the arboretum received will provide musical entertainment for this event, courtesy of Molly Watson, who will perform songs from the early 1900s.

"We are hoping that this money will help raise awareness of the history in this area, because there is a lot to enjoy," Karp said.

Put a plan in place if a hurricane strikes

The 2008 Atlantic hurricane season has arrived along the East Coast.

Hurricane season runs through the month of November and the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders is urging residents to make plans now to deal with any storm-related emergencies that might occur as a result. New Jersey is no stranger to dangerous storms and damaging floods. In 2004 Hurricane Ivan crashed ashore and quickly became a category five hurricane, causing millions of dollars in damage to homes and businesses.

"It is extremely important, particularly for families, to have a plan in place in the event a storm hits our area," said Union County Freeholder Chairman Angel G. Estrada, stressing the importance of being prepared. "Taking the time now to map out escape routes and store away needed supplies could save you and your family in the event tragedy strikes."

Here are some tips to ensure you are ready if a hurricane strikes:

- Discuss the type of hazards that could affect your family. Know your home's vulnerability to storm surge, flooding and wind.

- Locate a safe room or the safest areas in your home for each hurricane hazard. In certain circumstances the safest areas may not be

your home but within your community.

- Determine escape routes from your home and places to meet. These should be measured in tens of miles rather than hundreds of miles.

- Chose an out-of-state friend to act as a contact to make sure every family member is accounted for after an evacuation.

- Plan for what to do with your pets if you need to evacuate.

- Post emergency telephone numbers by your phones and make sure your children know how and when to call 911.

- Check your insurance coverage. Flood damage is not usually covered by homeowners insurance.

- Stock non-perishable, emergency supplies and a disaster supply kit.

- Use a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration — NOAA — weather radio, which monitors official weather service warning, watches, forecasts and other hazard information 24 hours a day.

- Take first aid, CPR and disaster preparedness classes.

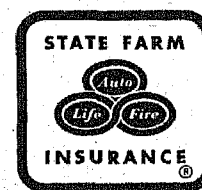

Men's Club awards \$500 scholarships

Four years ago, when Temple Beth Ahm — now Temple Beth Ahm Yisrael — created a Holocaust Garden, the Springfield temple's Men's Club not only contributed to the project, but also wanted to do something special that would stand out and emphasize the tragedy of holocausts.

More than six million Jews were murdered during World War II by the Nazis and their accomplices.

More than 22,000 Jewish soldiers died serving in the Imperial German Army in World War I. Yet, beginning in the 1930s, the Nazi regime began to murder thousands of Jewish relatives of those soldiers who died for Germany, followed by massacres of Jews and others throughout Europe.

After analyzing the situation, the Men's Club board decided to establish an annual scholarship for two students of the Holocaust Class at Jonathan Dayton High School. The winners of the scholarships were selected based on essays they wrote on any holocaust, whether the victims were Jews or non-Jews.

Because of the importance of the project, the board stressed that the students must not be identified to the person selecting the winning essays.

The Men's Club board believed there should be a universal objection to any holocaust regardless of race or religion and that the two annual student winners need not be members of families belonging to Temple Beth Ahm Yisrael.

Bernard Flashberg of Union, a former Men's Club president and a retired high school teacher who is deeply involved in Holocaust studies, volunteered to take the job and he met with Jonathan Dayton High School administrators on the two awards, then \$250 each.

Flashberg met next with the Holocaust Studies Teacher Mary Coeking to work out the details on judging the essays which he also volunteered to do. Coeking's role has been to encourage her students to participate in the essay project. She makes a record of those who do, notes what they have written, blacks out their names and, instead, numbers each essay.

Flashberg reads each essay and picks the two best. Only then does he find out the names of the winners with the two best essays on the Holocaust.

This year's winners are Matthew D. Profio and Stephen Wortman. Neither student is a member of a family attending Temple Beth Ahm Yisrael.

Matthew wrote about a Polish priest, Father Maximilian Kolbe, an inmate of the Auschwitz death camp who volunteered to be executed by the Nazis, saving the life of another man.

Stephen wrote about Barbara Szymanska, a Polish Christian widow with three children of her own, who saved the life of a 7-year-old Jewish girl, also during World War II.

Recently, the Men's Club has made the two awards even more attractive by increasing them to \$500 each.



A book for women 'seeking answers'

Justyce Packwood, who once resided in Linden and Roselle, has written an honest little book about her tragic life. It is called "Domino Effect" with a subtitle, "Beyond Ordinary Adultery."

Packwood obviously has poured her heart and soul into this self-published story about the people in her realm and how her existence and those of her two sons suffered as a result of an abusive, homosexual, pedophilic husband.

Her book, which is in dire need of an editor — any editor — concentrates primarily on Packwood's growing-up years, in which her decent and respectable parents try to teach her good from bad. Still, in her own words, she manages to have some affairs, becomes a single mother of a son, meets an attractive soulmate, Cain, moves in with him, takes care of his own son, then has a son with him.

And, up until now, Packwood has little suspicion about her husband's

sexuality, even though there's enough evidence among his questionable male friends. It is only when he becomes abusive, verbally and physically, to her and the knowledge of his pedophilia that she moves out of their home. However, Packwood never mentions that her husband was ever suspected of child abuse of their own children.

The climax of her unhappy life takes place when Cain is convicted by a judge and jury and sentenced to life in prison.

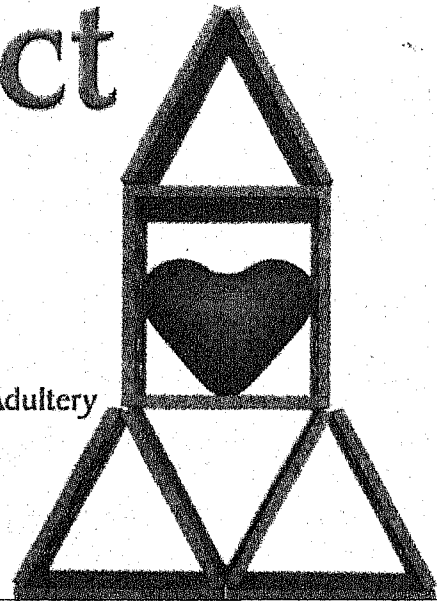
In the beginning of the book, the author says that it is dedicated "to all

the women who have been seeking answers and still have none." She has obviously since found her way in life through religion and feels, if she has reached at least one woman with this story, then she is happy. Packwood even includes a chapter in her book that may guide women on the right path. Starting all over again has not been easy for the author. But now that she has moved from New Jersey to Atlanta, Ga., she is raising her sons properly and happily takes part in community and religious events. She has buried the secrets of her old life forever, and, whenever humanly possible, Packwood manages to live a normal life.

Not all stories make it on the shelf of this reviewer's bookcase simply because it can become very crowded with literary gems. Perhaps next time.

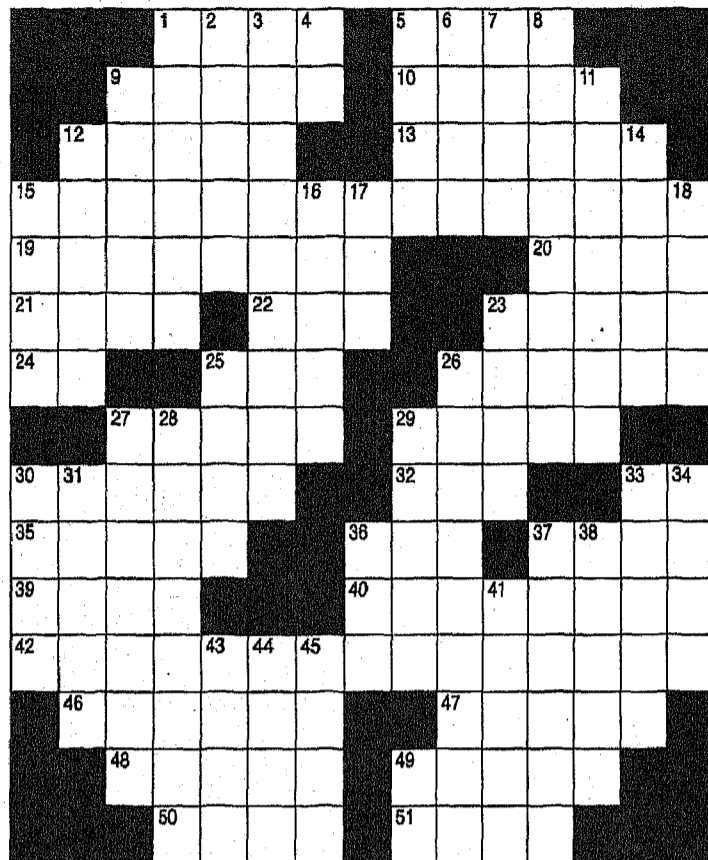

Both Brearley and Roselle will open next weekend at home against non-conference foes, with Brearley set to play Pennington of Mercer County Sept. 12 at Ward Field in Kenilworth and Roselle to face Bound Brook of Somerset County Sept. 13 at Arminio Field.

However, at least as of Tuesday's press time, both were still looking for a ninth regular season opponent.

Brearley has all eight of its games scheduled by the state playoff cutoff date in order to have a chance to make the grade again in North 2, Group 1, a section the Bears captured in 2006 for the first time since 1991.

That's fine for Brearley - compared to Roselle who needs an opponent before the cutoff date because its eighth game right now is against Roselle Park on Thanksgiving which, is after the cutoff date - but the Bears don't what to have to go through this process again.

"This new plan has to go through," said Brearley athletic director Joe Lafferty, talking about the NJSIAA's Super Conferences proposal that will be voted on Oct. 1 by its executive committee.

"We can't be doing this, trying to find teams to play. We're a Group 1 school that the big schools do not want to play."

As of Tuesday, according to Lafferty, Highland Park was in the same situation as Brearley, with eight games on its schedule through the cutoff date and looking for another game before Thanksgiving or on Thanksgiving.

If Brearley and Highland Park both find games on the weekend they have off before Thanksgiving, then when they play each other on the playoff cutoff date weekend, that game will be the ninth for both and won't count for either toward qualifying for the state playoffs.

"We'll take another game anyway we can," Lafferty said. "We'll take it before Thanksgiving or on Thanksgiving."

Brearley does not have a Thanksgiving Day game scheduled after playing Hillside on the holiday from 2000-2007.

Brearley plays the first seven weeks of the season, then gets the weekend of Oct. 31-Nov. 1 off before playing at Highland Park on Nov. 7.

Meisel Field closed again

Deemed unplayable by county for football and soccer

Once again, the Dayton Bulldogs don't have a home field.

Mountain Valley Conference-Valley Division member Dayton, one of 17 football-playing schools in Union County, will have to play all of its games on the road this year.

Dayton's home field - Meisel Field - was deemed unplayable by the county on Aug. 22 because of sub-par field conditions.

Meisel Field was closed for nearly 10 years because of chemical problems before Dayton varsity football was able to play on it once again last year.

Dayton played eight of its 10 games at Meisel Field last year, including a win at home against Manville 22-20 in its second game. That was Dayton's first varsity victory since the 1999 season.

Football came back at Dayton in 2005 with a junior varsity team going 3-5-1, playing all of its games on the road. Varsity football returned in 2006, with Dayton going 0-10, with all of its games on the road once again while Meisel Field was being worked on for the 2007 season.

"The field is just too ripped up," Dayton head football coach Joe Goerge said. "I'm not sure what they're going to do yet, but there will be no games at Meisel Field this year for anyone, including us, soccer and Minutemen football and soccer."

Dayton's varsity football team had only three home dates as it was, including Newark Central Sept. 27, Roselle Oct. 11 and New Providence Nov. 8. The Bulldogs will now play those games on the road.

"Since we only had three home dates, we're better off playing those games on the road," Goerge said. "There is no press box and no real bleachers, so - until we get that - we're better off playing somewhere else."

"It's a shame because of all the work that was done a couple of years ago and we're able to get only one year out of the field," said Springfield resident and Minutemen Youth Football Program coach Dino DiCocco, whose son Dan played varsity football for Dayton last year as a senior and is now a freshman student at West Virginia University.

DiCocco described Meisel Field as a venue filled with rocks, pebbles and sand and one with no traction.

"There are also spinkler heads that are an inch above the ground," DiCocco continued. "If a kid tripped over one they would get injured very badly. I wouldn't want my kids playing there. Thank God my son got to play on it for one season."

Well, the questions now are, where are Springfield's athletic teams going to play and what will happen with Meisel Field?

The varsity football team is practicing in right field of the baseball field called Ruby Field - Dayton's varsity baseball field - while, according to DiCocco, Minutemen youth football teams will play home games in the back field behind Dayton High School.

"This gives us no area to maneuver any program because we don't have facilities," DiCocco said. "The worst thing is that there has been total mismanagement by county officials who give out permits and allow youngsters to play on the field during rainstorms and thunderstorms during the spring."

Goerge, who DiCocco said has done a great job with Dayton football since he came aboard, but gets very little support, is working on getting field turf for the near future.

"We're negotiating right now, talking with the township about field turf," Goerge said. "Half of the soccer field is owned by the township, with the board of education owning the rest."

"We're trying to get the town to deed us the land, so we can get field turf. We would privately fund raise, so it would be at no cost to the taxpayers."

"We would also maintain the field where it would be run the exact way it is run right now, except that it would be field turf."

"The whole area would be field turf, the practice area as well. Included in the turf area would be a cut off softball field. We would also turf the field that has goal posts on it. We're using the field now, but it's owned by the town."

DiCocco's frustration of the Meisel Field situation continues to fester.

"The amazing thing is that there is so much promise and this is a town where we pay top dollar to live in and my taxes have doubled in the last 10 years and my kids have nothing to show for it," DiCocco said. "There are nothing but delays and we don't have time for this stuff."

"There are over 110 kids in the youth football program and about 35 more at the high school level."

This has been a process that has gone on for many, many years and not one that just came about overnight."

It sounds like what would be best for Meisel Field is field turf, a press box and bleachers at least, which is what most high school facilities have already. Getting the money to pay for that is the real challenge.

High school football start is still one weekend away

New coaches in fold at Linden, Hillside

Can the high school football season begin already? In contrast to the past few years, we'll have to wait another weekend for games that will count.

Schools that open Week Zero - Sept. 12 and 13 - will be having their game-scrimmages this weekend.

Schools that open Week One - Sept. 19 and 20 - still have another week of practices and initial scrimmages before their game-scrimmages kick in next weekend.

In Union County, there are two new head coaches this year. Deon Candia is a head coach for the first time at his alma mater, Linden, while John Power is also a head coach for the first time, taking over at Hillside.

Both Candia and Power begin their stints following bad seasons by both teams. Linden went 1-9 last year and gave up 321 points. Hillside went 0-10 for the first time.

Both are very optimistic about their first seasons at the helm, with both having returning quarterbacks in fold.

Coming back at Linden for his second year as a starter and first full season as a starter at that position is junior southpaw Trell Myers (6-2, 185), who will be running the triple option.

"We know we have a young quarterback with experience," Candia said. "He has a very strong arm, but with the pass last year he wasn't able to show the kind of athlete he is.

"With the triple option, he will be able to show how versatile he is, including running with the ball."

Myers productivity at QB during the second half of last year's campaign was a highlight this year's squad could embrace.

"He'll get more carries, but we still don't want to get rid of our 4-receiver set," Candia said. "We'll run some things from that as well."

Adding quickness to the backfield are halfbacks Jihaad Burns, a senior, and Kevin Rodriguez, a sophomore.

"Our wings (Burns and Rodriguez) can catch the ball and we want to utilize them," Candia said. "Both are real quick and have good hands.

"We want to get them the ball to try to get them to go 1-on-1 with the linebackers."

Myers is receiving quality quarterback instruction from former Elizabeth High and University of Minnesota standout Asad Abdul-Khalik.

"Trell dedicated himself in the off-season," Candia said. "He added 10 pounds of muscle in the weight room.

"We have a good quarterbacks coach in Asad, who has been mentoring him in practice and helping him understand the game as a pure quarterback.

"Trell still has a way to go, but he has developed the poise necessary for a quarterback to have."

Back to run Hillside's Multiple-I offense is senior quarterback Carron McCluney (6-1, 200), who is also an exceptional basketball player. His first year as a starting quarterback was last season.

"Carron is committed to football and has led us all summer long," Power said. "He's a guy that can be counted on at that position and has a strong sense of accountability.

"He's done an excellent job so far and is poised for an outstanding senior year."

A prime target for McCluney to throw the ball to will be senior end Malachi Jones.

"Malachi's worked extremely hard this summer and during the off-season in the weight room," Power said. "He made plays on both sides of the ball in the 7-on-7 passing league at West Orange. We'll be looking to get him the ball."

RIVALRY GAMES ON PLAYOFF CUTOFF DATE WEEKEND FOR FIRST TIME

Among the most heated rivalries in Union County are Union-Elizabeth in the Watchung Conference and Roselle-Hillside in the Mountain Valley Conference. For the first time - or for the first time in my memory or in some time - these arch rivals are scheduled to face each other on the playoff cutoff date weekend, which is Nov. 7 and 8.

Union-Elizabeth and Roselle-Hillside matchups have traditionally been in October - or earlier in the case of Union-Elizabeth, who opened against each other in 1995 on a Saturday night at Union, with the Farmers winning 15-12.

On Nov. 7 at 7 p.m., Union will travel to Elizabeth to face the Minutemen at Williams Field. Look for this game to be a huge one as far as North 2, Group 4 implications are concerned.

Elizabeth has a two-game winning streak against Union, while the Farmers are 0-4 in their last four trips to Williams field, losing in 2006, 2004, 2002 and 2000. Union last beat Elizabeth at Williams Field in 1998, winning 20-18.

Roselle vs. Hillside won't have quite the same exact impact when the two meet on Nov. 8 at 1 p.m. at Wood Field in Hillside. Roselle is in the MVC's Valley Division for the second straight season, while Hillside remains one of six teams in the Mountain Division. Plus, the game will be Hillside's ninth and for the Comets will not count toward the playoffs. For Roselle, the Rams hope it will be their eighth.

Right now, Roselle only has eight regular season games scheduled, with the eighth its annual Thanksgiving Day matchup against Roselle Park, which is scheduled after the playoff cutoff date weekend.

Roselle originally had Kearny on its schedule in October, but the Cardinals came off and are now back in the Watchung Conference for football this season. Head coach Kenneth Wiggins and athletic director Joe Pisauro are trying to find a team to play on the weekend of Oct. 4 or Oct. 18.

Although it will be Hillside's ninth game and, hopefully, Roselle's eighth, and though it isn't considered a conference game, when these two teams get together, players have to strap on their helmets a bit tighter. The hitting always seems to be more bone-crunching when the Comets and Rams face each other on the gridiron, regardless of team records or anything else.

Hillside will open against Passaic for the third consecutive year, hosting the Indians Sept. 13. The Comets' last winning season and last playoff season was in 2003 when they went 6-4 and reached the North 2, Group 2 quarterfinals.

Roselle last had a winning season in 1998 when the Rams went 8-3 and reached the North 2, Group 2 semifinals. The Rams' last playoff season was 2000 when they went 4-6 and reached the North 2, Group 2 quarterfinals.

"This year we take care of both of those things," said Wiggins, in his second season as the head coach after moving up from being an assistant.

How's that for not mincing words?

"I say that because of our speed at the skill positions," Wiggins said. "We also went to camp (Port Jervis, N.Y., Aug. 19-22) this year - which is a first for Roselle kids as far as I now - and we have new coaches. That makes us a better team already."

Last year's squad was 3-3 at one point after an overtime home victory over Hillside.

The following weekend, Roselle was then right there with eventual MVC-Mountain Division champion Rahway, falling 6-0 at home.

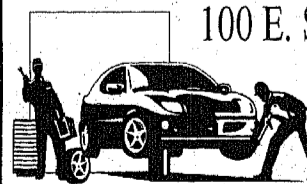

County grid coaches talk about possible alignment

A final vote will take place on Oct. 1

Will this be the last year of the Watchung Conference for football?

Will it be the final season for the Mountain Valley Conference?

Will the Iron Hills Conference — in existence since 1977-78 — disband, with Summit coming back to compete against some Union County teams once again?

Those questions — and many more — are about to be answered in the upcoming weeks.

Seeking to end years of competitive imbalance caused partly by non-public schools, a state-wide high school league realignment proposal by the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association was unveiled two weeks ago.

It would turn the 11 existing leagues and conferences in parts of Central and all of Northern Jersey into six super conferences while maintaining all leagues and conferences from Monmouth, Middlesex and Mercer counties and to the south alone.

These super conferences are based on geography and split into divisions based on enrollment.

Pending approval by the NJSIAA member schools in October, the plan will dismantle the current league makeups and create new leagues that are deemed competitive — and travel-friendly — beginning in the 2009-10 school year.

The proposal was devised by the 34-member NJSIAA Leagues and Conference committee.

The NJSIAA member schools had until Sept. 2 to express concerns or requests for changes to the proposal, which will then be presented to the NJSIAA executive committee Sept. 10.

The committee will study the proposal and a final vote will take place Oct. 1.

Here's the Skyland/Union football proposal, which includes the 40 football playing schools from Super Conference 5 and Super Conference 6:

Skyland/Union Football

Group A: Elizabeth, Hunterdon Central, Bridge-water-Raritan, Union, Hillsborough, Watchung Hills, Franklin, Linden, North Hunterdon, Westfield.

Group B: Montgomery, Plainfield, Ridge, Phillipsburg, Scotch Plains, Warren Hills, Rahway, Voorhees, Somerville, Summit.

Group C: Cranford, Gov. Livingston, Hack-ettstown, Delaware Valley, Hillside, North Plainfield, Johnson, Immaculata, Bernards, Roselle.

Group D: North Warren, Roselle Park, New Providence, Belvidere, Dayton, Pingry, Brearley, Bound Brook, Manville, South Hunterdon.

Here's what some Union County head football coaches said about what might happen and what they would like to see come to fruition:

Gary Mobley, at Rahway since 2004 and a 1986 Union graduate: "I feel good about a Union County Conference. I'm opposed to what I saw in The Star-Ledger. The Skyland/Union Conference is absurd.

"With those many teams in the conference, there will be travel constraints. We have great, competitive football in Union County. How about junior varsity and freshman games? How will these teams travel on a Monday or Friday afternoon? Those types of things have to be looked at.

"A Super Conference for Union County for all sports will bring back interest to this county. Union County has a great, rich tradition for athletics.

"I would be in favor of a Union County Conference, not a Skyland/Union one."

Erik Rosenmeier, at Cranford since 2005 and a 1983 Johnson Regional graduate: "I'm not rooting for anything. I'm in favor of anything that can happen to have people play fair teams. I think of schools of similar size when I think of fairness.

"If it's a Union County thing or a state recommendation, I think that's fair. It might not be easy, but everyone should get the opportunity to play schools similar in size.

"You need a somewhat consistent schedule, with not the same teams every year, but teams the same size.

"Football is a sport which scheduling can be difficult. If there's an easier way to schedule and a fair amount of games, I'm all for it."

Deon Candia, first year at Linden and a 1991 Linden graduate: "I just want to keep Union County where we have the best conference. I think we have some of the best football in New Jersey and I don't want it watered down with other teams that are not as talented.

"I want to see it stay competitive and have teams that may keep the competition level up high."

John Liberato, at Summit since 2007 and a 1983 New Providence graduate: "This is the most ridiculous thing I've ever heard of. Super Conferences? This should have been done not just for North Jersey, but for the whole state.

"To me, the most obvious way is geographic location and school population. If you're a Group 1 school, you play Group 1 schools. If you're a Group 2 school, you play Group 2 schools — and so on and so forth.

"In this Skyland/Union Conference, they have us playing Group 4 schools.

"The Iron Hills Conference is awesome and the structure is awesome. The upper (Iron) division is 4s and 3s and the lower (Hills) is 2s and 3s. The furthest we travel is 20 minutes to Mendham or 25 because of a couple of traffic lights.

"I think we have one of the best conferences in the state for all sports. There's nothing wrong with the Iron Hills. If there's nothing wrong with the Greater Middlesex Conference or South Jersey, then there's nothing wrong with the Iron Hills Conference.

"I'm not too sure a Union County Conference would work. The best proposal was the one by Mike Van Zile of Wallkill Valley, which put group size and geographic location as the focus."

After reaching the North 2, Group 2 championship game its last four seasons as a member of the National Division of the Watchung Conference — for Summit that was the years 1992-1995, with the Hilltoppers winning the crown in 1993 and 1994 — Summit moved over to the Hills Division of the Iron Hills Conference for football and all sports in the fall of 1996.

Summit struggled on the gridiron a bit its first few years in the league before enjoying a great deal of success in 2002 and 2003.

In both of those seasons, Summit was one of the best teams in the Hills Division of the IHC and also reached the North 2, Group 2 semifinals each year as the top seed before they were eliminated in the state playoffs.

Summit is attempting to climb back up the hill in the division, so to speak.

Kenneth Wiggins, at Roselle since 2007 and a 1975 graduate of Boys (now Boys and Girls) High School in Brooklyn, N.Y.: "One of the coaches was telling me that we might play Immaculata and other people. I say whatever.

"I'm receptive to whatever they do right now. We just have to coach them up and play.

"A lot of the stuff is hype, with so and so can't beat so and so."

"Whoever they say we have to play, we have to play as far as I'm concerned."

John Power, first year at Hillside and a 1989 Union graduate: "I would like to see, for Hillside for the most part, the conference we're in, which would include Group 2s and lower Group 3s. That would be fine."

"I understand some traditional rivalries might be taken away and some people might be upset. Equity would make sense."

"There are enough teams around, but it's not easy."

Gus Kalikas, at Johnson since 2004 and a 1990 Johnson Regional graduate: "We have to play teams our size. I'm not a huge proponent of the power points system."

"If your AD knows the AD at a particular school, you can pick up a very poor school on your schedule. You get power points from a team that isn't very good."

"If you go to a Group 2 schedule or Group 2 conference - in our case - then wins and losses and head-to-head eliminates that."

"We beat Governor Livingston last year and had the same record, (both were 5-3 at the cutoff) but they got in (qualifying in Central Jersey, Group 2 with more power points)."

"If I could, I would want to avoid a situation like that."

Terry Hanratty, at Governor Livingston since 2004 and a 1990 Elizabeth graduate: "It looked at it and it looks good. I'm not sure Immaculata should be in there, but everyone else in Group C are Group 2 schools."

"We should not be playing Group 1s or 3s. We should be focusing on Group 2s."

James Foy, at Roselle Park since 2006 and a 1990 Roselle Park graduate: "What I saw in the paper, with the conference Roselle Park was in, I liked it. If you have 10 or 11 teams in, you don't have to schedule outside and that makes it easier for us."

"We were lucky to get Sussex Tech this year, for example. The travel is not a big deal for football, because you would play the same team on the road every other year. For freshman and JV games, everyone has lights, so just start the games a half hour later at 4:30 p.m. and just put the lights on."

"My understanding is that we will still keep our Thanksgiving Day game with Roselle. We both want to preserve that."

"Since we don't cross over with teams from the Mountain Division (of the MVC), it's not that big of a change. For us, it's like having our side of the conference (the Valley Division) and combining it with another conference."

Brian Sheridan, at Union since 2007 and a 1993 Union graduate: "I think I would love to continue to play Irvington - and it would have to be in a scrimmage setting. Seeing that type of team speed in the pre-season could do wonders for any program. I want to keep the relationship there if it's possible."

"I have a great deal of respect for the Watchung Conference and all of its coaches. It takes time to install what you're trying to develop. Reggie Robinson at Plainfield has done a great job. Steve Ciccotelli does a great job and I played against him."

"Playing Hunterdon Central every single year will, obviously, be a major challenge. We will have to get tougher with them."

"Hopefully, some new rivalries will be born and competition will remain high. It's good that Union and Elizabeth are staying together."

"Our program would just go forward. I'm an optimist. You would probably have to play those teams in the playoffs. We'll play whoever we have to play."

"It looks like the landscape of high school football might change. We'll change with it."

That was one of two losses by one touchdown in an eventual 3-7 campaign.

"I think this year will be completely different," Wiggins said.

"We have the potential now."

Running the multiple offense is senior quarterback Akram Reid (40-yard dash time is 4.5), who is being guided by first-year offensive coordinator Lonnie Stevenson, who played at Roselle and who has been a Pop Warner coach for some time.

"Lonnie was on staff after our second game last year," Wiggins said. "We're pretty much on the same sheet of music."

When Wiggins speaks of, "the better players that are still here," he is talking about Reid, senior wide receiver Kendall James, senior running back-linebacker Joshua Joyner, senior running back-linebacker Brandon Medford - a transfer student - and junior running back Jordan Solomon to name a few.

An up-and-coming sophomore is running back-punter Darius Mayers, who is a cousin of Elizabeth senior running back Jaheed Mayers.

Senior Sha'quan Johnson is also a strength in the secondary.

"Solomon didn't play at all last year because of a knee injury and Johnson is a little more tenacious for us," Wiggins said. "Medford brings a lot of speed and intensity."

"It's easy to talk about, but we can't wait until Bound Brook."

Roselle opens Sept. 13 at home against Bound Brook, the first of a three-game homestand to start the season. Home games follow against Brearley and Johnson.

Ray Oliver, who helped coach Queen of Peace to a state championship as an assistant, is a first-year offensive line coach.

Dwayne Williams, who played running back at Iowa after Bayonne High, is the running backs coach.

James and senior teammate Bijan Mekoba, a tight end, both have grade-point averages over 3.80 and are being sought by Ivy League schools.



The summary of the terms of such ordinance follows:

Title: AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ELIZABETH, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, NEW JERSEY, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 3916 OF THE CITY FINALLY ADOPTED SEPTEMBER 4, 2007, PROVIDING FOR VARIOUS RECREATIONAL FACILITIES IMPROVEMENTS FOR THE CITY OF ELIZABETH AND APPROPRIATING \$3,400,000, THEREFOR, AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$3,230,000 IN GENERAL IMPROVEMENT BONDS OR NOTES OF THE CITY OF ELIZABETH TO FINANCE THE SAME.

Purpose(s): The purpose of the ordinance is to amend Bond Ordinance No. 3916 of the City as follows:

(1) To amend Ordinance No. 3916 of the City to appropriate an additional \$1,200,000, authorizing an additional, \$1,140,000 in bonds or notes, increasing the down payment authorized by an additional \$60,000, and increasing the items of expense listed and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20 by an additional \$300,000.

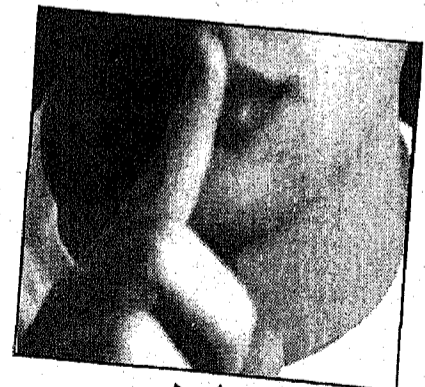

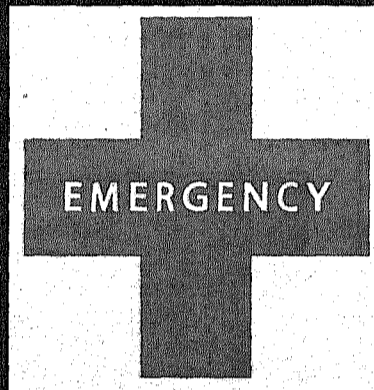

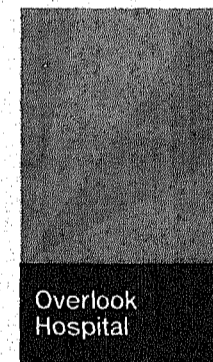
