Fraenkel said many statements included in the trailer were taken out of context. "You can slant anything anyway you want with the right editing," he said.

Michael Prigoff, an Englewood attorney representing Hamilton and D'Angelo, disagrees with the mayor's assessment.

"I reviewed everything that went into this documentary," Prigoff said. "It is only a movie trailer that has been released. If you visit the Web site, there are full explanations and everything is put into context."



Cranford mulling textile recycling

CRANFORD --- Worn-out clothes in Cranford may be headed to the recycling bin rather than the trash heap by the end of the year, as the town hopes to expand its recycling program to include textiles.

Mayor Robert Puhak and Environmental Commission Chair Nelson Dittmar said they have been examining the feasibility of recycling textiles since May, when they first met with Planet Aid representatives at an environmental exposition organized by Cranford High School student Becky Hoeffler at the Hillside Avenue School.

"We sell the clothes to buyers who then re-sell them at much more affordable prices on the worldwide market in poorer countries," explained Planet Aid representative Donald Kelly explained about the program.

Planet Aid offers various options to municipalities, including the potential for curbside pickup or a conservation center drop off, Depending on the specific arrangement between the municipality and the company, Planet Aid would pay the township between 2 and 8 cents for each pound of fabric collected.

Some organizations, like the Red Cross and the local churches and temples, already recycle clothes. "This concept has been around a long time," Dittmar said.

Planet Aid works, however, on a larger scale, maintaining programs in 19 states nationwide. "We accept any sort of textile donations as long as they're dry," said Kelly, who noted also that carpet cannot be donated.


The funds raised from these sales go to support programs to fight AIDS and malaria in Africa and developmental projects in Africa, Asia and Brazil, including at hospitals, schools and orphanages.

"We'd like to perhaps take action in late September or October," Puhak said about the recycling plan. "I would like to see it in place by the end of the year."

While it is not known if Cranford will choose Planet Aid to help meet its recycling ambitions, Dittmar said the program appears to have environmental, moral and economical benefits. "It would keep this stuff out of the waste stream, so instead of going to the landfill it would be used for a more appropriate purpose. If there's money to be made, then Cranford would benefit from it," Dittmar said.

17-year-old saves a life in spare time

Joe Puerari moving from class to class at David Brearley High School, you wouldn't know the shy 17-year-old saved a life during his summer break and routinely tackles 10-foot waves as a hobby.

Joe, who has spent the past two summers working as a lifeguard on Long Beach Island, rescued Amybeth Lindsey of Pennsylvania from drowning July 13 — the 41-yearold victim was being dragged under soccer, I'm afraid I'll get hit with water by a riptide in the Beach Haven section.

In August, Joe received a lifeguard merit award from Beach Haven Mayor Thomas Stewart.

Joe said he has rescued five people during his two-years as a lifeguard and each time he has remained calm. "It's as if death came, tipped his hat and vanished," he said about his latest rescue.

Amybeth said she owes her life to the youth.

head, while trying to tread water. I thought for sure no one could see me," she said. "Without the heroic effort of lifeguards like Joe, my daughter would be without a mother and my husband would be without his wife.'

Amybeth, 41, had been on a weeklong vacation with family at the Jersey Shore when the nearfatal accident occurred. Hurricane Bertha created strong riptides along the shore, one of which pulled Amybeth about 200 feet away from the beach.

While she tried to remain calm and swim parallel to the shore, large waves knock her under water, causing her to lose her strength, Amybeth said.

That's when Joe stepped in.

"As each wave approached he KENILWORTH --- Watching told me to hold my breath and go under it," Amybeth said. She explained that they followed this procedure several times as she held on tightly to his arm. "I wondered later if I left bruises on his arm," she added.

> Joe said he loves the sea and will continue working as a lifeguard, though his main hobby is surfing.

> "It's funny, when I'm playing the ball, but I'm not scared of 10foot waves," Joe said jokingly.

He looks forward to college, where he plans to study architecture or teaching, but in the meantime, hopes to put his living-saving skills to use on the local rescue squad.

"This has really touched his life," high school Principal Charles Cappello said.





(Continued From Page 1) pump house is designed to prevent first-floor flooding in the area of Riverside Drive, There are plans to eventually install an express sewer system that will help clear the roads of water as well.

Assistant Engineer Sandra Caceres-Cardenas said the fire had been extinguished by the time she arrived. "I don't think there's been any real damage," Caceres-Cardenas said.

Ana Tempesta, a three-year Cranford resident, said she was taking a nap Friday afternoon when the commotion outside caused her to wake up and find grey smoke billowing from the

pump station, which is directly behind her house.

"I'm panicking like crazy right now," Tempesta said last week. "I went through all the agony of the construction, and now I want it to work. I don't want worries."

In an unrelated, but simultaneous incident, a PSE&G sub-station experienced a malfunction at about 4 p.m., that resulted in a rolling brownout that cut power to about 1,000 homes and business in Cranford, mostly in the North area of town.

Students admitted feeling scared and upset when they thought about the terrorist attacks.

"It's sad to see all those people helpless and they couldn't do anything," said 10-year-old Angelica Bilica.

Jonathan Wagner, 10, said he worried in the months after the attacks that the bad guys were going to get him.

Years later, Wagner, along with his classmates, used the remembrance ceremony to ask questions and express a "thank you" to the heroes of that day, rather than being fearful.

"Why would someone want to do this to our country, why would someone want to risk other people's lives?" asked Brenda Miranda. 10.

She found solace in the actions of rescue workers. "The policemen and firemen...risked their lives just to save people. They went into the building with smoke and everything just to help."

All the students said their parents still talk to them about what happened and they in turn sometimes even teach their younger siblings about it.

"You can't do enough of [these remembrance ceremonies]." Iozzi said "Kids have to know what happened and that is what we're trying to do."



EDITORIALS United we stand


Today is Sept. 11, like Dec. 7, 1941, a "date which will live in infamy." Seven years ago, a series of coordinated suicide attacks by the terrorist organization al-Qaeda resulted in the death of 2,974 people, excluding the 19 terrorists, with another 24 people missing and presumed dead. This was the result of the hijacking of four civilian jet airliners. of which two were crashed into the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center in New York City, one into the Pentagon and the fourth into a field near Shanksville in rural Somerset County, Pa., en route to Washington, D.C. No passengers survived.


The results of the attack were immediate. Many police officers and rescue workers from around the country took leaves of absence to travel to New York City to assist in recovering bodies from the site. Blood donations across the United States surged in the weeks following Sept. 11. Flights were grounded around the world and the United States declared a War on Terrorism. U.S. military forces invaded Afghanistan in 2001 to overthrow the Taliban. The War on Terrorism continues to this day, not only in Afghanistan but in Iraq and in other parts of the world.

The impact of Sept. 11 was far-reaching. Four hundred eleven emergency workers who responded to the scene died and the health of many survivors, including those who fled the towers, were in the immediate area or acted as rescuers, were affected by the toxic debris and dust. The Stock Market shut down for a week and stocks lost \$1.4 trillion in value for the week. Approximately 18,000 small businesses were destroyed or displaced. In New York City, there were approximately 430,000 lost jobs and \$2.8 billion in lost wages. Our nation's seeming invincibility had been shattered.

But out of the wreckage of Sept. 11 came a newfound burst of pride and patriotism. In the same way the United States came together after the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, following the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, our nation found a collective spirit, both in helping those who needed it and in striking out against those who were guilty of these attacks. Unfortunately, terrorists are soldiers without a country and, while the war continues, many of al-Qaeda's leaders, including Osama bin Laden, are still at large.

While memorials quickly sprang up, much of the fervor so apparent seven years ago has died down. But we will not forget. We live each day with a hope for renewal and, as yesterday's children become today's adults and tomorrow's parents, we continue to teach that lesson of unity. Only through unity will we survive and persevere.

As a newly minted candidate for township committee in Springfield, the Republican candidate hammers By Frank Capece away at a few, direct themes.


Fernandez focuses on the downtown in Springfield - or if you will, the lack of one. Ringing bells on weekends and most weeknights, he reminds residents that just like him, they are forced to shop in Millburn, Westfield and Cranford.

Married, the father of two children with a third one on the way, this restaurant owner is part of a resurging GOP in the usually Democratic stronghold.

Along with his brother, they own the family business - the Spanish Pavilion in Harrison. He speaks about the challenges to a business owner in this state. There doesn't appear to be a whole lot of affection towards state regulation. Part of his mantra is not to end county government a recurring theme in some suburban towns. Rather, in his fliers, Jerry pledges to "fight for the return of our fair share of tax dollars from the county."

His style is engaging, reflecting his service background. He speaks about safe subjects like "fiscal responsibility" and "open government." He shares the indignation of one resident over the recent embarrassment of a so-called "massage parlor," still operating in the community.

A resident in the area speaks boldly that the big issue is the construction of a Stop and Shop on the township border. It doesn't come up again on this day of campaigning on streets such as Tower Drive. The problems of the weak cen-



tral business district, does come up frequently. At one manicured home we visit, from this corner, the temptation to ask the neighbor about his beautiful thick grass becomes irresistible. The use of a leaf blower reminds that the winter cold and the campaign heat are both approaching.

Fernandez is an appealing guy. He is unfailingly polite. The shirt and pants are a little frumpy, reflecting the seventh hour of campaigning under the receding sun last Sunday evening. Residents receive him politely. There is little anger expressed about taxes.

One resident observes the transient nature saying, "people stay here a few years and then just move on." Fernandez grabs the opportunity, expressing his desire to stay and raise his family. As he leaves this house, like most others, he dutifully records his observations on a computer sheet on his clip board. He reels off the age and political affiliation of the voter.

Fernandez faces the opposition of both a former Republican running as an Independent, and a Democrat. Surprisingly, the party affiliation issue rarely comes up. Fernandez rejects the usual targeting strategy and instead rings the paign continues in the next month, door of every voter. "Party affiliation is not that strong," he says, justifying his approach. At each door, he makes his way up the stairs, rings the doorbell and steps back to pavement.

can seem endless to a campaigner, Fernandez quips, "I never know exactly how long the wait" before he writes in red marker "Sorry I missed you."

This candidate knows about sacrifice. A Jets season ticket holder, he gave away all games before November, "even Brett Farve's opening game next Sunday." He adds that his brother is carrying more than his share on the business front, allowing the campaigner more time. He expects to ring every voter's doorbell by the time Election Day rolls around.

This day, he hits a dry spell where four residents weren't home. While walking, he speaks about the need for better planning and keeping families in the community. He speaks a little too vaguely about undetailed sources of money he will fight for to revitalize the downtown. One resident wryly says, "That money dried up 15 years ago." At one home, he is subjected to the frustration of all local candidates — confusing the board of education with the municipal government. Fernandez listens politely as the woman acknowledges she understands the difference but goes on none-the-less. She says she will try to attend his open house held last Wednesday at McLynns in the community.

A few weeks ago in an open letter, he concludes, "together we can make Springfield affordable and a great place to live." 



Mountainside Ave. exit revamp to block traffic

MOUNTAINSIDE - It may not be aesthetically pleasing at the moment, but huge mounds of dirt piled up at the Mountain Avenue exit off Route 22 may save drivers hours of aggravation after heavy rains

The State Department of Transportation has devoted \$867,997 to a project that will include digging an overflow basin into the center island between Route 22's eastbound and westbound lanes, bordering Mountain Avenue, as well as placing additional drainage pipes in the area. New pipes and canals expected to be installed, are according to Greeley. designed to help direct rain water Transportation.

are designed to eliminate flooding even during the area's largest rain storms," said DOT spokesman Timothy Greeley.

Councilman Paul Mirabelli is eager to see the effects of this project. "The main purpose...is to stop the flooding under the bridge. Once that flooding is alleviated , it will greatly improve traffic during rainstorms, which is something everyone is looking forward to," Mirabelli said.

The project, which began several weeks ago, is being performed by Green Construction based in South River and is expected to be completed by early December,

UEZ: \$176K state grant aids patrols

HILLSIDE - The Urban Enterprise Zone Patrol Project, credited with helping reduce crime in the township, will continue to keep the streets safer with the assistance of a \$176,847 state grant.

According to Yves Aubourg, UEZ coordinator and acting economic development director, the new grant is being used to pay the salaries of four officers, tasked with patrolling business areas and maintaining positive communication with business owners since the program was created in 2003.

The officers also help keep the streets clean by enforcing parking laws that facilitate street cleaning. They use two radio cars Urban Enterprise Zone Authority funds were used to purchase four years ago.

"The addition of the four officers was intended to make shoppers feel safe in Hillside, and I believe they do," Hillside Police Chief Robert Quinlan said. "Although the program is intended to benefit the business community, the additional officers have increased the visibility and effectiveness of the police department."

According to law enforcement officials, since the projects inception, crime has dropped an estimated 25 percent overall. Between 1996 to 2006 crime decreased nearly 47 percent, according to the Uniform Crime Report.

Aubourg, said the officers would continue patrolling along Hillside, Maple and Liberty avenues, among others areas.

He noted the total cost to fund the program this year is about \$252,000, prompting the township to match the recent state grant with a 30 percent contribution.


Aubourg explained the program is necessary for Hillside, which is near municipalities with higher crime rates, like Newark and Irvington. "This is a win-win for businesses and the town," he said.

Chief Quinlan said he regularly receives compliments from pleased business owners, such as Queen King, the owner of the Fresh and Pretty florist shop on Maple Avenue, who say they feel safer with more patrols.

Heat stroke occurs when heat gain exceeds a dog's ability to dissipate the heat. A dog wears its fur coat all year long and doesn't sweat. 


"I know you've been waiting for it for a year now, but the bus is coming," Committeeman Joseph Florio assured community members during the recent meeting.



State DEP stalls senior housing development

CLARK — The embattled plans to construct a \$60 million senior housing facility on Terminal Avenue are again stalled.

Tony DiGiovanni, director of Development at Garden Homes, the developer, has received approval from the state Department of Environmental Protection for sanitary sewer work, but is still awaiting confirmation that the site has been remediated. Environmental problems at the Terminal Avenue site ---the result of a sump pump and high compounds of fertilizer - were caused by AT&T, the former property owner now responsible for cleaning up the grounds.

"We're still working on architectural plans to submit, but the state's been a little slow in responding or giving us final approval." DiGiovanni said. "The review is

tial review," DiGiovanni said.

DEP Environmental Specialist Ralph Rodriguez said they are behind schedule because the residents age 55 and over. The department's workload is considerable. 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New \$1 billion span may replace Goethals Bridge

Anyone taking the long and winding road to Staten Island knows one thing -- beware the Goethals Bridge.

The notoriously narrow connection between Elizabeth and Staten Island, N.Y. over the Arthur Kill is known for heavy congestion.

But commuters may soon be able to take comfort in the fact their days of navigating the bridge are nearing an end.

The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey unveiled details last month to build a new bridge, south of the Goethal's current location.

The plans call for the roadway to expand to six lanes with a full

shoulder on both sides. The often year capital plan, but say final costs congested Goethals currently has two lanes on each side with no shoulders. Other features include a pedestrian walkway and a middle tunnel that could be used for mass transit in the future.

The 28.4 million drivers who drove across the bridge in 2007 were victim to major delays, as any minor accident could clog the cramped crossing.

The proposed "cable-stayed" design will "help relieve congestion by minimizing delays due to traffic volume, vehicle breakdowns and slow-moving trucks," authority spokesperson Marc La Vorgna said in a press release.

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

Independents carve out a place in local government

While Union County is known for its dominant Democratic party and small pockets of Republican influence, there remains an even smaller minority --- that is the Independent Party.

These council members and mayors, few as they are, have earned the respect of many voters in towns such as Linden, Hillside and Springfield.

Linden Mayor Richard Gerbounka was elected as a Democrat but said he switched to the Independent Party after finding it difficult to march in step with the Democrats. Gerbounka said that on a local level, being a Democrat or Republican don't matter as much compared to what is best for the town.

"When you come to gun control or abortion or income tax, those are issues that are irrelevant on a local level," he said.

Gerbounka also said most local officials select a party simply to gain access to the funds needed to run a campaign. For this reason, an independent candidate is likely to find it more difficult to get elected. However, once in office, they may feel less obligated to "march in step" with the interests that supported them.

Independent Hillside Councilman Gerald Freedman concurred. "I'm answerable to nobody and I'm free to do what's right," Freed-

man said. "It's painful to see somebody know they shouldn't vote a certain way, but they're directed to."

Springfield Councilman Steven Grau renounced the Republican party in favor of being an Independent. "I've seen both sides of the politics in Springfield and I think both sides are pretty disgusting," Grau said.

Democratic Freeholder Bette Jane Kowalski said she has not had much experience working with Independents and does not know what might compel someone to declare himself or herself an Independent candidate. Kowalski said although she supports the Democratic Party, she encourages everyone to be involved in the political process and would welcome an Independent politician on the presently all-Democrat Freeholder Board.

"If that's who the voters chose, that's who we work with,' Kowalski said. "I'm not opposed to working with anybody.'

Union County Republican Chairman Philip Morin said some towns have a political climate that makes Independent candidacy attractive, but added that he feels there is a distinction to be drawn among Independents.

"To me, there's a difference between someone who runs as an

Independent and someone runs on a party line and then changes midstream." Morin said.

Morin added he would be willing to work with anyone interested in having a more balanced government in the county.

"I recognize there's a lot of talented people out there who's primary interest is lowering the tax burden on themselves and their families," Morin said. "To them, political parties come second, and I think there's a valuable place for them at any level in government."

Linden now has three independent councilmen in addition to the mayor. An organization known as the Linden Citizens' Association works to support candidates regardless of their political affiliation. Independents do not hold large-scale party conventions or necessarily associate with Independents in other towns or counties in an organized fashion, as do Republicans and Democrats.

"The Independent party is just - independent," Gerbounka that said. "There is no Union County Independent Party and no Independent Party in the city of Linden."

Freedman said the Independent party is not an organized party but rather the lack of a party - a political philosophy he feels has merit on a larger scale as well.

"If it hasn't been proven before, I think this national election shows we could do with an alternate party system," Freedman said.







"It's very nice that they thought of me to do this," Jeskey said.


Jeskey heard from the school's administration at the end of May that they were planning something and then told at his retirement dinner at the end of June that they were going to do it.

Although the Roselle Park girls' termis team lost five of its top seven players to graduation from last year's successful 14-to squad, the Panthers at least have a more legitimate chance of state tournament success new that they are situated back in Central Jersey, Group 1

After capturing North 2, Group 1 on several occasions before the NJSIAA came up with its reclassification in 2003. Reselle Park were on to win Central Jersey, Group 1 its first two years in the section in 2003 and 2004. Then Roselle Park was bumped up to Central Lensey, Group 2 for the 2005, 2006 and 2007 seasons, reaching the quarterfinals in 31933 and 2007 and the semifinals in 2006.

There wasn't much chance there that Roselle Park was going to win a sectional title. Despite returning only two starters from last year the Panthers will have more of a chance for continued success this year in Central Jersey, Group 1.

The two returning starters are junior Rebecca Vera at first singles and junior Monica Soliz moving up to second singles.

Vera was 13-10 as a sophomore last year during her first season at first singles. She fashioned an impressive 21-4 mark at third singles as a freshman to help lead Roselle Park to a 19-4 finish

"Her game looks as sharp as ever." Sturcke said "We're looking forward to Rebecca having a good season She's focused and hitting the ball nicely." Vera began her 2008 campaign with a 6-0, 6-1 win over Johnson's

Dana Russo last Friday. Roselle Park won the match 5-0, winning the straight sets at four of the five positions to improve to 1-0.

Soliz excelled at third singles last year, finishing 16-5.

"She has also stepped up her game a notch, which should serve her well," Sturcke said. "She worked had over the summer."

Soliz defeated Kaitlyn Peres of Johnson 6-1, 6-2. Vera and Soliz are Roselle Park's co-captains this year.



After putting together one of the best seasons in the history of Cranford boys' soccer last season, what are the Cougars capable of accomplishing as an encore this year?

The first pre-season games saw Cranford tie Spotswood 0-0 on the road and then blank Iselin Kennedy and Woodbridge 4-0 at home.

Not a bad start for a team that has only three returning starters back from an outstanding 2007 season that saw Cranford go 15-4-1.

"We've looked good in the pre-season," said fourth-year head coach Mike Curci prior to Tuesday's scheduled home scrimmage against Livingston.

That was Cranford's last scheduled scrimmage. As of Tuesday's press time, it was not certain if the scrimmage would be played because of inclement weather.

Cranford, the defending Mountain Valley Conference-Mountain Division champ, opens its 2008 campaign at Brearley tomorrow at 4 p.m.

Defending champions has a nice kind of ring to it for the Cougars because last year's conference title was the first championship of any kind for the Cranford boys' soccer team in its 50-year history.

"A banner is being made now and will be put up in the gym," Curci said. "That was quite an accomplishment and our main goal going in." Cranford's .790 winning percentage last year was a school record.

The Cougars reached the Union County Tournament and North 2, Group 3 quarterfinals, falling at eventual UCT champ Scotch Plains 3-2 (penalty kicks 4-3) and at home to Mendham 1-0 in the section.

After the Cougars opened with a 1-0 loss at Scotch Plains, Cranford went 12-0-1 in its next 13 matches before falling to Scotch Plains again in the UCT. Cranford won six straight, tied Westfield 0-0 in Westfield in a game that did not include overtime because of inclement weather, and then won six more in a row before the heartbreaking loss to Scotch Plains in the UCT.

"Our starters have played half a game in our scrimmages and from a bench standpoint our young guys have stepped up," Curci said. "We start with five games in eight days, including Scotch Plains and Westfield, so we'll be busy right away."

Cranford is scheduled to face Scotch Plains Saturday at 2 p.m. in its home-opener at Walnut Avenue School. The Cougars will then play at Roselle Catholic Tuesday at 4 p.m., host Union Catholic Thursday at 4 and remain at home Sept. 19 for a 7 p.m. home game against Westfield.

The three returning starters - all captains - are junior goalkeeper Scott Boyer, junior sweeper Pat Kaskiw and senior attacking center midfielder Peter Lordan.

After playing on the junior varsity team as a freshman, Boyer had an outstanding sophomore season on the varsity in 2007. He posted nine shutouts and was part of a defense that allowed only 17 goals the entire season. Boyer was First Team All Conference and Honorable Mention All County.

"He's a very athletic kid and probably the strongest player on our team," Curci said. "He's deceptively strong and has great athleticism. I think he will get better and better."

Kaskiw was a midfielder and also played outside defender last season. "He played a dominant role in different positions," Curci said. "He reads the game well, is tough and has a good touch."

Lordan is a four-year starter who was a freshman during Curci's first year at the helm in 2005.


"Peter's more of a creator than a goal scorer," Curci said. "He has great touch on his passes. He's good enough to play in college somewhere."

Dayton will open at South Hunterdon Sept. 13 and then play at Manville Sept. 19.







Union County Public Information Officer Sebastian D'Elia said extending MusicFest to a two-day event was spurred by the event's considerable success in previous years.

The Rock on! Walkathon and 5k Rock N' Run opened the festival on Saturday to benefit the Love Hope Strength Foundation and The Valerie Fund. The walkathon drew some 650 walkers compared to last year's 250, and raised approximately \$80,000.

More local authors than ever are seeing their poetry, mysteries, memoirs and advice covered, bound and up for sale thanks largely to the proliferation of self-publishers willing and ready to make such authors' available in online catalogues, as well as the shelves of locally-owned bookstores

Joe Leo, owner of Here's the Story, an independent bookstore in Union, said he has noticed a dramatic rise in the number of selfpublished books.

"There's definitely been an increase in self-published people over the last 13 years," Leo said.

The recent proliferation of selfpublishers has been attributed to a number of changes in both the business and technology of the publishing and book selling industries. Advances in digital print-ondemand technology allow publishers to recoup the expenses associated with printing.

The use of the Internet as a more convenient way to purchase books is also an essential factor, as the majority of bookstores will not stock many self-published books.

Self-publishers also offer a chance for fledgling writers - in an environment in which many publishers and literary agents are pressured to alter their standards and practices - to fall into step behind the handful of large corporations such as Barnes and Noble and Borders, that have come to dominate the book industry in the last 20 years.

self-published authors from Union pen," Hardrick said.

County in his store, and said many best-selling authors start out by self-publishing their books to attract the attention of big publish-

"It gives authors a chance to get their work out there by word of mouth without publishers having to take a huge risk by publishing a thousand or more copies," Leo said.

Leo said self-publishing is here to stay.

"It's the new way for an author to be heard without having to go through the disappointments and stress of constant rejection from major publishers," Leo said.

According to a representative at XLibris, one of the most successful self-publishers operating today, self-publishing has taken off because "a lot of people now want to express themselves."

For Union resident and author Jackie Hardrick, self-publishing was not her first choice, but later proved to be the right decision.

Hardrick's young adult novels "Imani in Young Love & Deception" and "Imani in Never Say Goodbye" met with considerable success, allowing her to recoup the cost of printing and copywriting them.

Hardrick initially submitted her work to 10 different agents and was met with consistent rejection. However, she said she knew her work would be beneficial to teenagers, so she chose to follow the same advice she gives to the teens she seeks to inspire.

"If you know what you're doing Leo said he is happy to stock is right, find a way to make it hap-

pleased with the prospect of paying for a slim chance to find income in a field in which they may already have schooling and expertise.

Kenilworth resident Nick Gallicchio, who recently self-published his crime novel "Men Without Redemption," said self-publishing was also not his first choice.

After more than three years of writing and editing his-book, Gallicchio worked to find a contact with Simon and Schuster, only to discover that the publishing giant would not consider his work unless he had a literary agent to represent him. After further searching, Gallicchio had not found an agent that would answer his queries except

disappearing for several months.

Gallicchio found self-publishers to be more communicative, however most of them required payment of at least \$3,500. Editing and proofreading was purely optional, he said, and cost more.

"You're on your own. They don't care how your book comes out." Gallicchio said.


An effort on the part of a selfpublisher to market or promote an author's work, as traditional publishers do, will also often require additional funding from the author.


A Barnes and Noble customer. who chose to remain anonymous, said that as traditional publishers and independent bookstores continwill get more and more desperate.

"When you get just a couple businesses controlling almost the whole market, you're going to see a loss in variety and choices to the individual. Its what happens with any monopoly, only they don't care to shut this one down for some reason." said the customer, a Springfield resident.

Gallicchio said he feels there are more authors than ever before, but fewer people willing to give them a real chance.

"The whole country's changed," Gallicchio said. "I'm working on my third book now and I don't know who to turn to. I might just let it roast in the computer.'

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


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
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
