# Tower plan a year-old

CRANFORD — The end is nowhere in sight for the controversial Zoning Board hearings on a proposal to erect a 120-foot tall cell tower on the Cranford Swim Club grounds, an application reaching the one year anniversary of its introduction this month.


The applicant, Verizon, is seeking height and setback variances needed to erect the pole in a residential area, near the county-owned Lenape Park and the Rahway River Park historic district.

Zoning Board Chair Robert Hellenbrect said he expects more hearings on the project, anticipated to extend well into 2009. He said he never expected the application process to last so long, but he is not surprised.

Summit doctor answers prayer for help; will perform rare procedure on ailing 4-year-old

SUMMIT — For all of Nicholas Peacock's short life, he has been plagued with an undiagnosed genetic neurological syndrome that causes his muscles to spasm and flex uncontrollably, making it difficult for the 4-year-old boy from Sandpoint, Idaho, to walk.

His family's prayers to see him well may have been answered, as they will fly to New Jersey on Oct. 14 to have a potentially life-changing procedure to correct the problem performed by Summit resident Dr. Roy Nuzzo at the Children's Neuromuscular Center at Overlook Hospital.

Typically, those stricken with this syndrome wear braces on their legs, as well as receiving Botox injections to paralyze the tight muscles and allow them to relax. However, the Botox only lasts for three or four

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

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
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# Town, PBA, SOA avoid arbitration, agree on contracts

SPRINGFIELD — For the first time in over a decade, the Police Benevolent and Superior Officers associations have reached an agreement with the township on their collective bargaining contract without sitting through arbitration hearings, a measure that could save the township \$50,000 in legal fees.

The Township of Springfield previously had the longest consecutive string of PBA/SOA arbitration cases in the county — spanning the past 16 years. Last year, the township spent \$75,000 in legal fees dur-

Both associations had been

months until they were signed two weeks ago. "We did not agree on every aspect, but their open-mindedness made it easier for us to agree to disagree," said Sgt. John Cook, the president of the SOA.

According to officials, there are few changes in the contract - it mostly keeps pay increases and health benefits on par with the public sector. The greatest change was in the approach to meetings and the township's willingness to negotiate. The contract will last until 2010.

"It was a fair agreement. Each side explained their position," said Jim Morton, president of the PBA.

According to Mayor Bart

working without contracts for 21 Fraenkel, a member of the Public Safety Committee, honesty was key during the talks. "I told them what they hear from me will be the truth," he said.

Public Safety Chair Steven Grau agreed honesty played a big role in coming to terms with the police associations. He also credited personnel changes since the last negotiations in 2004.

Clara Harelik, the former Public Safety Committee chair, entered meetings with the PBA and SOA, with little hope of reaching a decision without help, according to Grau.

"The state allows the two bodies three attempts to come to terms on a deal before the matter is taken to an arbitration hearing," Grau said. "Harelik was known to say, 'we're going three and out this year,' before even entering these meetings." An arbitration is necessary because police are forbidden to go on strike.

Morton agrees communication and mutual respect were an important aspect. "I have seen a great change over the past year and a half on the Township Committee as far as mindset and open communication," he said

According to Cook, the PBA/SOA did file for arbitration in 2007, but recognized that in January 2008 a new group of committee chairs would take their post and agreed to hear out Fraenkel and or editorial@thelocalsource.com.

LINDEN — Those students taking a siesta in the back of class at Linden High School get a pass today. They may be tired from a 12-hour jet trip, not the 45 minute lecture.

A: I was a professor Kean for 47 years. I taught math and educa-



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# Educator enhances resume, African schools

SPRINGFIELD - Barbara Trueger's journey to earn her doctorate led her to South Africa several times during the past five years. There, she did more than enhance her own education, she enhanced the lives of poor South African families as well.

Trueger, the coordinator of the Springfield School District's Gifted and Talented programs for the past five years, earned a doctorate from the Rutgers Graduate School of Education's Department of Social and Philosophical Foundations of Education after participating in Rutgers' South Africa Initiative, a program that attempts to facilitate international contacts among U.S. and South African educators.

According to the Rutgers University Web site, the program is "committed to educating students for responsible global citizenship in ways that deepen their learning and improve the quality of the world community.

While working with the SAI, Trueger taught a fourth-grade class in Paarl, South Africa, and offered teaching staff a developmental workshop to help them relate to parents.

When she returned to Springfield, she established a pen pal relationship between her Springfield and Paarl classes. This program was such a hit, Rutgers agreed to sponsor a video conference between the students.

In 2004, Trueger returned to South Africa for a month, this time on Rutgers' Fullbright Fellowship.

was the language barrier, but also the fact that most of the parents are illiterate," Trueger said. "Because of this, the teachers never knew the parents cared about education."

According to Trueger, it wasn't until her second trip that she realized how much the parents cared and that the children were excited about learning. Her doctoral dissertation, entitled 'Parental Involvement in Two South African Primary Schools," was inspired by her findings.

Trueger returned for two weeks in 2006 on her own to conduct a study for her dissertation. She interviewed principals, teachers and parents in two rural South African communities, often asking them what they thought the roles of teachers, parents and students were.

"The whole process was amazing for everyone," Trueger said. "They really embraced me and seemed very willing to learn and make a change.

Her findings revealed that while most of the people she interviewed believed parental involvement was important in a student's learning process, there was a difference between parents' expectations of themselves and educators' expectations of parents. One parent burned her son's school book to fuel a fire in their home, Trueger offered as an example.

Trueger went to work. "She facilitated workshops promoting parent and staff development in an attempt to unify the two," According to Jennifer St. Pierre, Rutgers' public relations

These workshops resulted in the teachers who participated considering several alternatives to better involve parents in their children's education, despite the difficulties they face daily in Africa, such as such as poverty and dis-

She returned one last time in 2007 to reinterview the same people and document any changes. "It is amazing the change this village underwent in one year," Trueger said. "Communication improved and most were willing to learn and participate in their children's educa-

Trueger's experiences culminated in finishing her dissertation and earning her doctorate last May.

"It gives us great pride to see her earn her doctorate," said Darren Clarke, co-founder of the SAI and executive director of Continuing Education and Global Programs for the Graduate School of Education. "In addition to being a tremendous achievement, her research highlights the importance of the type of cross-cultural awareness in education SAI promotes."

Along with being a professor at Caldwell and Kean universities and serving as an administrator for the Springfield Public Schools, Trueger is also a professional development provider for the New Jersey Department of Education."The one thing I take away from my trips is the world is a beautiful place," Trueger said.



# **Cutbacks at Hyatt** Hills; more expected

CRANFORD — Expenditures associated with running the Hyatt Hills Golf Course are being cut to help the facility out of a \$2 million debt, according to a the Golf Commission.

At the Sept. 22 governing body workshop meeting, committee representatives on the commission, Joan Varanelli and Paul Giano, said club staff has been cut by ten percent and the commission decided to go out to bid on its insurance. The changes are expected to save about 16,000.

"There are many things going on," Varanelli said.

The Township Committee's concerns surrounding the Hyatt ment with GM could be available. Hills stems from the \$2 million debt owed to the property owner, ness agreement with GM, the General Motors. This debt was accrued in start-up costs, when the club first opened approximately ten years ago. To date, no portion has been repaid.

Cranford commissioners said they see room for further savings, questioning an expenditure of \$5,000 on a television commercial advertising the facility, despite there being no need for additional customers.

"Why are you advertising if you're already operating at capacity?" Deputy Mayor David Robinson asked.

Mayor Robert Puhak echoed Robinson's concern, calling the advertising a "complete waste."

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

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
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

# District aims for top grade with accreditation program

KENILWORTH -David Brearley High School and middle school is undergoing another evaluation to ensure its graduates are better prepared for college and the workforce.

The Accreditation for Growth program — a part of Middle States accreditation, which - involves determining a school's weaknesses and finding solutions to improving the institution.

The program, kicked off at the school in 2001, works on a sevenyear cycle. "Last time we focused on language arts and math," said David Brearley ESL and Spanish teacher, Bill Hopper.

Hopper, who serves as the high school's internal coordinator for the program, said information is collected through a survey given to teachers, parents and students. They are asked to give their opinion on such topics as academics and student life.

The AFG committee, composed of teachers, administrators and a student from each grade level, meet once a month to discuss how to trators need to find a way to

help the school improve and grow, based on the results of the survey.

A new measure being used by the committee to identify student needs is graduate profiling.

Science teacher and AFG publicity chairperson, David Novak, said profiling graduates has been essential component in determining what needs to be fixed. "We look at the profile of the graduate as they exit the school and work from there," Novak said.

As the next seven-year cycle begins, administrators are considering adding a social studies and science course to graduate requirements in accordance with state requirements.

Hopper said the survey results have prompted concerns about the character of the student body, seen in a declining interest in volun-

Curtis Cerillo, a science teacher at the middle school, said he sees a problem with a growing lack of interest in civic duties. "Students should want to learn about government and participate in it," he said.

Hopper added school adminis-

improve test scores across the board, as well as motivate students to enroll for more college level classes or advanced placement courses.

While students are meeting state standards, few are excelling, he stressed. "On state exams like the HSPA and GEPA, a large number scored proficient but there was a much lower amount of students who scored advanced proficient," Hopper said.

Amber Cox, a senior attending David Brearley who won the state Department of Education Student of the Month Award in February and is currently taking several advance placement classes, has served on the AFG committee since the ninth grade. She believes the variety of people involved in the committee increases the chances of the programs' results working to aid everyone in the school. She noted she is glad to have been able to provide her input. "It's a good school, but it could be better," Cox

They would, however, foot the bill for the cost of electricity produced by the panels from EnviroUtilite. Jersey Central Power and Electric would continue to handle any addition electricity.

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
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



# Linden residents, skaters differ on skate park move

LINDEN — Skaters and residents are at odds over a plan to relocate the city's skate park to John Russell Wheeler Park, near Wood Avenue and Routes 1&9.

The Sept. 23 hearing on plan, which was required to be held since the county-owned park receives Green Acres funding, allowed homeowners and a few skate-boarders to share their concerns or support the move.

"We would like to sleep at night, but [with the noise] we can't," said Kennedy Drive resident Kathy Czerwinski, who was one of about two dozen sixth ward residents who complain about the park's move into their neighborhood.

Other residents who live along the borders of the park complained of the current noise level getting worse, garbage being strewn across their lawns and feared a spike in vandalism.

Frank Lopez, 22, sat at the meeting, skateboard in hand, and asked residents not to judge him and his fellow skaters. He said skating is way for him to bond with his 11-year-old brother and it keeps him out of trouble. He promised the skaters and residents can compromise to deal with any future issues.

"I'll work with the community, I'll come clean up the park every Sunday if that's what I have to do," Lopez offered, in an attempt to appease residents who are against the park's relocation.

The \$400,000 skate park was originally planted in Dobson Park, by the intersection of Dobson and Maple streets in July 2007.

Within two months, complaints from nearby residents, whose back porches were in some spots 40-feet from the park, caused it to be shut down.

each day," said Al McDonald, head of the Department of Public Properties.

"The only problem we hadn't anticipated was the noise of skateboards hitting ramps," he said.

The new site will be farther from homes, about 400 feet from the nearest residential house, according to Councilman Bob Frazier, who was assigned to head the search committee for a new park.

The skate park equipment will be moved to a patch between Stiles Street and Wood Avenue, about 80 feet from the fence along Routes 1&9.

"This is the safest spot throughout Linden for our kids. I don't feel we should deny young people this opportunity," Frazier said at the meeting, noting most children would not have to cross the highway to get to Wheeler.

County representatives will delay their final decision on relocating the park for up to two weeks to accept written comments from the public until Oct. 7.

If approved 150x75 foot park is scheduled to be operational from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

The date of completion is still undetermined, but McDonald said a "realistic" time frame would be in the spring.

Mayor Richard Gerbounka tried to ease residents con-"I'll work with the community, I'll come clean up the cerns by promising the park could be moved again if problems persist at the new location.

Even still, many of the 6th Ward residents are holding out hope the move will be stopped.

"After the installation in Dobson Park, residents began to complain about noise, about parking problems, about hours of operation," 6th Ward councilman Robert Sadowski complained, "Do [we] deserve any less consideration than those residents who surrounded Dobson?"

# Paying the price

In the course of 53 years, crude oil, pesticides and chemicals seeped into the ground between Linden and Bayonne, killing wildlife and harming the fragile environment.

The damage may have already been done, but a recent Superior Court ruling will ensure that the polluters are held accountable.

In a Superior Court ruling earlier this month, ExxonMobil, which previously operated the Bayway refinery in Linden, was found liable for accidental spills and dumping that damaged and polluted the nearby wetlands, the Arthur Kill and Morses Creek.

The lawsuit was filed by the Department of Environmental Protection in order to force the oil company to compensate the public for the loss of natural resources and to restore damaged resources through a

While it may take a while before another trial takes place to put a dollar amount on the damages, the litigation accomplished one major goal — it sent a message to companies, large and small, that harming the environment comes at a price, and will not be tolerat-


Whether the damage was a result of conscious pollution or negligence, refineries and other large chemical companies must be held accountable for their

The court ruling will not completely reverse the damage that has been done to the environment, but it may force companies involved with environmentally dangerous chemicals to take steps toward eliminating pollution that can be caused by their operations.

# Rising to probable cause in a case

Jon-Henry Barr knew the session of the Clark municipal court was going to be tough.

The Clark prosecutor wasn't fazed by the usual line of lawyers and regular people lined up in the narrow corridor at the police station, waiting to make pleas on speeding and other violations.

This day, Barr was facing the emotionally charged issue of whether or not he should oppose the bringing of careless driving charges against Eleanor Gordon of Rahway. On May 18, in the evening, her car allegedly struck and killed 21-yearold Erin Leary of Cranford, who was crossing Westfield Avenue in Clark.

In the weeks that followed in May, after an investigation, the Union County prosecutor made a decision not to charge Gordon with vehicular homicide. They also determined not to charge Ms. Gordon with careless driving.

The parents of Ms. Leary and her companion, Joshua Jeney, then brought civilian charges for careless driving. Barr faced a lineup of grieving parents, concerned friends and a Star-Ledger columnist who had written a none-too-favorable account about Barr back in July.

For Barr, whose own political ambitions included a short-lived run for Congress earlier this year, there had to be a temptation to gain the favor of the day and the press.

Barr read from a six page, single-spaced analysis. The Ledger would later call that a "speech" that 'had to do mostly with Jon-Henry Barr." Cheap shots can also be inac-

Barr painstakingly went though the steps he had taken to reach his decision. He researched the law on

careless driving, spoke to investigators and experts on careless driving. He spoke to the parents, chief of police and anyone else with relevant knowledge. On a number of occasions, he walked the spot of the tragedy.

Barr brought the issue of whether or not a civilian should be able to bring the charges under these circumstances to the New Jersey Municipal Prosecutor's Association. The obvious conclusion was not to permit the matter to go forward.

He wrote, "I have concluded that there are facts which may give rise to probable cause to believe that Eleanor Gordon (was) driving carelessly, but there are also many more facts which obviate any possibility of sustaining a conviction for the offense."

Barr added, "For several reasons, which I will describe, the state can not possibly meet the burden of proof for careless driving. Therefore, the careless driving charges will not go forward."

Barr said that the experts — the officers - "do not believe that speed was a factor and that they do not believe that the cause was careless driving." He spoke about the lack of witnesses and the common law on the subject.

He ended, "I have exhausted every legitimate means at my disposal to entertain the potential for prosecuting Eleanor Gordon. I would prefer to prosecute the case in a resident of Cranford.

as much as it may bring some sense of comfort or closure to the Leary family. Unfortunately, knowing what I currently know, the facts of this case, the available evidence, and the law of the state of New Jersey do not permit me to prosecute Eleanor Gordon for careless driv-

Judge Antonio Inacio praised Barr's efforts and spoke about Ms. Gordan having to live with her actions the rest of her life.

Paul Leary, the father of the deceased, spoke of the tragedy and that the ability to prosecute the case was necessary. From this corner his composure, while facing the person who, while without malice, still took his daughter's life was amazing. He clearly wanted the opportunity to bring this case (to court). In a fair world, he should be given this

The decision by Inacio to dismiss the case did not end the matter. This Monday, Barr and Inacio were convicted in a column in the Star-Ledger. Barr was convicted of making a "speech" and giving a "lecture." "It had to do mostly with Jon-Henry Barr." For good measure the column concluded, "The suits ran for cover behind legal excuses." The well-reasoned arguments on the state of the law by Barr were

Standing outside the courthouse, on the summery early afternoon, the columnist, speaking to a lawyer on another case, said that he was also a lawyer adding, "I'm a sole practitioner." Maybe so, but not taking the Ledger buyout offered reporters might be a wise decision.

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
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
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

# Rahway paralegal guilty in fraud case

RAHWAY - A city woman pleaded guilty to involvement in a real estate scam that netted \$75 million, according to U.S. Attorney Christopher Christie.

admitted last week to falsifying Raposo - who worked as a paradocuments in order to receive mortgage loans from the state Department of Housing and Urban Development, something she said she was instructed to do by her employ-

Raposo could not be reached for comment by press time.

Between March 2003 and Sept. 12, 2005, Raposo created phony legal documents claiming individuals as homeowners when in fact they put no money towards the properties in question, she said.

The scam was allegedly organized by Wayne Puff of the N.J. Affordable Homes Corp. According to a statement released by assistant U.S. Attorney Robert Kirsch, Puff allowed "nominee buyers," or fake buyers, to request HUD loans that were meant for low- to moderate-income home buyers. He is cur-

rently in federal custody for running the scheme.

The scam cost both investors in Puff's company and mortgage lenders over \$75 million, Kirsch

During court hearings before Sydney Raposo, 41, of Rahway U.S. District Judge Jose Linares, legal for a Cranford attorney identified by initials A.N. in court records - claimed she was instructed by her employer to falsify the legal documents.

Raposo faces up to two years in prison and a \$250,000 fine, according to U.S. prosecutors handling the case. She was released on \$50,000 bail. Sentencing is scheduled for Jan. 5.

Seven other individuals have pleaded guilty to some form of involvement in the scam, including several real estate appraisers, attorneys and an accountant, some of whom worked for NJAH.

Authorities say the investigation is ongoing, signaling more indictments may follow.



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
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

# Cell tower plan: One year later

(Continued from Page 1) lenbrect said.

The first hearing on the application was Oct. 15, 2007. Area residents' concerns focused on aesthetics, the location of the pole in relation to their property lines and the adjoining park, and the health hazards associated with living near the tower, a factor that remains a topic of concern despite not yet having been scientifically substantiated.

The residents hired attorney John Schmidt of Lindabury, McCormick & Estabrook in Westfield to represent them in the mat-

Hellenbrect pointed out the application involves a lot of technical details, which have generated a lot of questions.

"The applicant has finished his portion of testimony. Presently the lawyer, who represents a good number of people, is presenting his witnesses," Hellenbrect said.

County officials are expected to take a turn, offering their view of the proposed tower on Oct. 6, depending on scheduling.

County Counsel and Cranford Democratic Chair Norman Albert, will represent Union County's view on the issue.

"I'm disappointed its gone on this long, but I'm not surprised," Albert said. "I think the appropriate thing to do would be to withdraw this application as inappropriate for the neighborhood and for Cranford and the county."

"The county attorney...will present a witness and that may will wrap up the portion of the hearings associated with testimony," Hellenbrect said. "And we will then open it up to public comments."

Among the most vocal opponents of the cell tower proposal have been some members of The Shuvart Family, who live near the site, on Manitou Circle.

Michael Shuvart acknowledged the lengthy nature of the application, but said he felt a lot of progress had been made in recent meetings toward bringing out what he described as "discrepancies" in the application.

"It's time for us to provide our

witnesses," said Shuvart, who noted the residents onsulted with a radio frequency engineer and a real estate appraiser.

Hellenbrect said that while meeting attendance has fallen off somewhat since the hearings became televised in April, residents have continued to follow the process.

"There has been a considerable amount of interest through the entire hearing," he said.

Hellenbrect disagreed with statements made suggesting the cell tower has become the longestrunning application to come before the Zoning Board.

This distinction, he maintains, is held by a four-year-old application for a gas station at the end of Orchard Street.

Schmidt, Verizon attorney Gregory Meese and representatives form the Cranford Swim Club did not return calls for comment.

The next hearing on the application will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Monday at the Municipal Building, 8 Springfield Ave.

Recently, the Peacocks learned of a new treatment - selective percutaneous myofascial lengthening, a procedure approximately five surgeons in the country are qualified to perform, and Nuzzo is one of them. Surgeons from all over the country are currently coming to him for training in the method.

"Through tiny holes in the skin, Dr. Nuzzo feels for the tight areas and makes small cuts allowing the muscles to relax without destroying its function," Nicholas' mother, Kristan said, describing the treatment her son will receive.

The procedure is expected to cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000. The Peacock's insurance will only pay for about a quarter of that fee. But Kristan doesn't mind, because

it means her child may soon be healthy. "How can you put a price on a child's ability to walk and run unassisted?'

The Peacock Family learned of the procedure through a friend's child who had never been able to walk without the help of a walker. Last year, he had the procedure performed by Dr. Nuzzo, and now, he can walk on his own. Kristan

She and her husband, Scott, received good news after sending to Overlook Hospital the medical records, X-rays and a video of Nicholas walking.

Nuzzo believes Nicholas will walk without the walker or the leg braces he currently wears if he undergoes this treatment.

According to his Website, of his more than 500 patients who have received this treatment, age 12 years old or less, post operation admissions are less than 1 percent

- nationally that figure is 10 percent. No cases of infection, over lengthening, significant hematoma or nerve injury have been reported.

Despite the risks involved with any surgery, Kristen remains optimistic. "This simple procedure has worked well for others and has given thousands of people a better quality of life."

After dealing with a barrage of testing in the past three years, from MRIs to DNA testing to a spinal tap, Kristan finally has hope her son will lead a normal childhood.

To help with costs, friends of the family set up a benefit account for Nicholas and are organizing a benefit concert.

Members of Cranford's Environmental Commission were handing out compact fluorescent light bulbs, which are reputed to use 75 percent less electricity and last up to ten times as long as the more common incandes-

The event was a success despite limited publicity, with all of the 150 bulbs allotted for the event given away, one to each person, according to township officials.

The last light bulb giveaway was also a success, with some 165 bulbs being claimed.

Cranford Postmaster Wayne Orshak said the event does not impede on

or affect business at the post office. "The postal service is in favor of energy conservation," Orshak said.

"I did not have anything but positive remarks from customers." Organizers were thankful that the possibility of rain did not become a

reality. "It's a little awkward because we want people to fill out forms with questions on them, so keeping those things dry can be a real chore," Dittmar explained.

A compact fluorescent light bulb can last up to ten years depending on the bulb and how much it is used each day, while incandescent bulbs may only last a year

Dittmar said making use of these new bulbs in all light fixtures could amount to substantial savings over time. "Lighting accounts for about 20 percent of the electricity you use in your house," Dittmar said.


This event is part of wide-spread initiative run by the federally-funded Energy Star Program. The light bulbs are being supplied by the State Board of Public Utilities through the state's clean energy program. "The global view is that if everyone does this, electrical use should go way down," Dittmar explained.





# UCC's 'year to remember'

75-year-old county college will celebrate diamond anniversary

During the course of its 2008-09 school year, Union County College will be hosting several events to celebrate its 75th anniversary.

UCC is the oldest two-year, non-profit, degree-granting institution in New Jersey. It has been operating since 1933.

The college first opened its doors during the Great Depression, with an enrollment of only a few hundred students, but has grown over the years, and currently has an enrollment of more than 35,000. It currently has campuses in Cranford, Elizabeth, Plainfield and Scotch Plains.


"I am excited to say that it will be a year to remember," said Victor Richel, chairman of the Union County College Board of Trustees. "The college community is planning a year's menu of activities and events to mark the occasion."

The kick-off to the year-long celebration took place during the

county-sponsored MusicFest on Sept. 5 and 6, in Nomahegan Park across the street from the Cranford campus, where banners were displayed and recognition was given to the school.

The celebration will move forward this month when Jim Cramer, the host of CNBC's "Mad Money," - who will be the 75th Anniversary Presidential Guest Speaker on Oct. 15 at 7:30 p.m — will speak at the college. His presentation will cover "Current Market Conditions...Where Do We Go From Here?" The presentation will take place in the Roy Smith Theater on the Cranford campus, and admission will only be granted after purchasing a ticket, which can be done online at the college's Web site, www.ucc.edu.

On Oct. 16, the school will celebrate Founder's Day to commemorate the opening of UCC then known as Union County Junior College — on Oct. 16, 1933. Folk singer Kevin Klein will be performing music from


The celebration will conclude May during the 75th commencement ceremony.

# Tracking program is a 'Lifesaver'

Anyone with a relative who suffers from Alzheimer's Disease or Autism knows the feeling of fear when their suffering parent, child or grandparent wanders away from home, leading to injury - or worse.

The Union County Sheriff's department wants families to know there are ways to protect

"Project Lifesaver" came to Union County about two years ago as a way to monitor Alzheimers or Autism patients and find them if

they stray away from their homes, unnoticed by caretakers. An 81-year-old Elizabeth man, suffering from Alzheimer's disease, was able to benefit from the project earlier this month. On Sept. 18 he wandered from his Madison Avenue home around 2 p.m., according to his wife, who

Five Sheriff's Department K-9 Search and Rescue units quickly began a search of the area, using three receivers to track a signal from a watch-sized radio transmitter the man was wearing. Officer Brian Way quickly tracked the man to the Stop & Shop supermarket at nearby North

and Newark avenues. He was unharmed.

"If it wasn't for Project Lifesaver we may not have located this gentleman before something terrible happened," said Union County Sheriff Ralph Froehlich. "Instead, we found him safe and well in 20 minutes."

He was the fourth county resident to be found using the Lifesaver system. Traditional searches could take up to nine hours and cost taxpayers \$1,500 an hour for overtime and vehicle use, according to representatives at the Project Lifesaver headquarters in Chesapeake, Va.

# Violent crime down

### Non-violent crime on the rise in UC

According to the 2007 New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Report released last week, violent crime decreased between 2006 and 2007 in the county, but non-violent crimes are on the rise.

According to the UCR, violent crime has decreased from 2,138 incidents in 2006 to 2,129 last year.

Incidents of violent crime, which include murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault, have declined, with the exception of robberies which jumped from 1,125 in 2006 to 1,247 last year.

From municipality to municipality, the numbers are different.

Non-violent crime has been decreasing in towns such as Union and Cranford but has been increasing in Summit, Linden and Rahway, the UCR indicates.

In Summit, the crime rate per 1,000 people has jumped from 11.9 to 14.0. Rahway saw an increase in the same category from 25.8 to 26.7 and Linden's numbers rose from 36.2 in 2006 to 37.6 last year. .

Robberies have been on the rise in Rahway, Linden, Summit, and Cranford. In Union the number of robberies did not change between 2006 and 2007.


Summit Mayor Jordan Glatt could not be reached for comment as of press time. Rahway Police Chief John Roger and Linden Police Chief Michael Boyle also could not be immediately reached for comment.


In Hillside, crime has increased overall from 34.8 incidents in 2006 to 37.1 incidents per 1,000 people last year. However, violent crime in the township has dropped from 102 incidents to 97, and motor vehicle thefts have decreased from 151 to 141 cases last year.

Hillside Police Chief Robert Quinlan said that 141 motor vehicle thefts is still too many, but the downward trend in the number of incidents is positive.

"In 1996, it was 273 (motor vehicle thefts); 346 was the highest amount we've seen and that was in 1999 and we've cut it down to 141," Quinlan said, calling it a con-

sistent decrease that he has seen in his six years as police chief.

He credits the men and women of the Police Department for impacting crime rates positively through increased visibility and aggressiveness on crime.

"The word is out that Hillside is no longer the place to steal cars," Quinlan said. "We will catch you."

The Essex/Union Auto Theft Task Force is also credited with playing a role in the decrease in motor vehicle thefts in the county.

Union County Prosecutor Theodore J. Romankow said homicides county-wide decreased last year. In 2006, there were 37 murders in Union County compared to 23 last year.

"We are addressing the homicide rate through our newly formed (Union County Homicide) Task Force and I have no doubt that their presence on the streets will have a positive effect on investigations," Romankow said. "There is still much work to be done and through good cooperation between the citizens of the county and law enforcement, we will continue to see the numbers improve."

According to spokesperson Amber Whittaker, the system has helped law enforcement workers locate 1,756 individuals and has never had a fatality. The average search time is between 16 and 30 minutes. Currently, 12 county residents are enrolled in the program. Receivers cost approximately \$1,300 each, while transmitters plus monthly maintenance and batteries cost about \$300 each. An annual softball game between the

sheriff's and corrections departments fund the entire cost for residents. The company encourages this type of community involvement to help those who are at-risk, such as utilizing the Adopt-a-Citizen program where a person or group can help fund the equipment for a neighbor in need.

"Some agencies don't charge a single thing thanks to community support. It's really community-driven," Whittaker said.

New Jersey is the only state in


the country to be fully covered by the system, due to the initial support from the New Jersey Sheriff's Association, according to Froehlich. But there is still work to be done, the sheriff said. He asked all citizens to follow suit and utilize "Project Lifesaver" if a loved one, from child to grandparent, suffers from either autism or Alzheimers. The Minutemen also have an excellent chance to be 3-0 this weekend when they host Kearny (1-2) tomorrow night.


Brearley head coach Scott Miller's record is now 57-11 (.838) at the helm of the Bears since his first season in 2002.

# Roselle Park football tops Sussex Tech for first win

## Hosts New Providence tomorrow night

ROSELLE PARK – After beginning a third consecutive season with back-to-back non-conference setbacks to Metuchen and Middlesex, the Roselle Park football team needed to feel good about itself before embarking on its Mountain Valley Conference-Valley Division schedule next week.

A third straight non-conference game was played last Friday night at Herm Shaw Field against Sussex Tech. As anticipated, the Panthers took care of business, rolling to a more-than-convincing 47-14 homeopening triumph.

Roselle Park improved to 1-2 and Sussex Tech fell to 0-3.

Roselle Park jumped out to a 33-0 halftime lead, sparked by two touchdown runs from senior running back Alex Arayena.

"We have some inexperienced kids that got some experience in the Metuchen and Middlesex games and tonight we came out successful," said Aravena, who in a misty rain carried roughly eight times for 124 yards before the half, including TD runs of eight and 25 yards. "Our offense is our best defense.

"Our defense is inexperienced, with new kids in some spots, but our offense will always keep ourselves in the game."

Roselle Park took the opening kickoff and drove right down the field before fumbling the ball away. Then Sussex Tech fumbled it away in its own end zone, with sophomore defensive lineman Rich Carvalho there to pick up the ball in the end zone for the Panthers' first six points.

Aravena's first touchdown capped an eight-play, 55-yard drive that took up 3:42 on Roselle Park's second drive

On Sussex Tech's possession before that, junior defensive lineman Ronald Valente had back-to-back quarterback sacks that totaled 18 yards in losses.

Valente then gave the Panthers a 19-0 lead when he recovered a fumble and carried it 40 yards to the end zone. It was one of three fumbles the Mustangs from Sussex County lost in the first half.

After Roselle Park led 20-0 going into the second quarter, Aravena scored his second touchdown and Russell Benner scored on a three-yard run to cap the first-half scoring.

Roselle Park sophomore reserve running back Connor Gabriel scored on touchdown runs of one and 62 yards – his second down the right sideline - in the third and fourth quarters for Roselle Park's sixth and seventh touchdowns.

In between, Sussex Tech scored both of its TDs, the first in the third quarter and the second in the fourth. Starting quarterback Christopher Kelly got loose on a quarterback sneak up the middle against the Roselle Park reserves in the third quarter and raced 57 yards for his team's first points.

Teammate Matthew Lucenti, a senior running back, scored Sussex Tech's second TD on a four-yard run to the right. Kelly ran in for two points for the game's final score.

Next up for Roselle Park is conference rival New Providence, which is 1-1 after falling at home to Brearley 20-13 last Saturday.

Roselle Park will host the Pioneers here tomorrow night at 7:30. The Panthers last beat New Providence in 2001, which was a wild 35-33 comeback victory at Lieder Field. The Pioneers have won the last six games in the series.

"Our team will come out ready," Aravena said. "We're going to have a good week of practice and we'll see them on Friday."

Roselle Park third-year head coach James Foy was understandably pleased with his team's effort.

"The kids played well tonight after playing two good teams right off the bat; our schedule's tough," Foy said.

"This week we had some injuries and we had to hold some things back, but they came out and got the job done and we were able to get the other guys in and rest some guys up to get ready for New Providence."

Bringing the ball-carrier down was something Foy's squad keyed on during the week of practice leading up to the game

"Defensively, we tackled a lot better, I thought," Foy said. "Offensively, we finished the plays well."

# Mannix and Stafford lift Brearley to big grid win

NEW PROVIDENCE - The Brearley football team wants some respect. The Bears deserve much for the way they came back to beat New Providence 20-13 last Saturday afternoon at Lieder Field.

"We believed in ourselves and didn't care what anybody said," Brearley senior quarterback Tom Manms proclaimed moments after the huge triumph.

Marmix, one of only a few returning starters, carried 30 times for 150 yards, including second-half game-tying and game-winning touchdown runs of 42 and two yards. He also completed five of eight passes for 61 yards without getting intercepted.

So far in three games, he has rushed for seven touchdowns and passed for two in leading Brearley to a somewhat surprising 3-0 record.

Star-Ledger Union County beat writer Josh Rosenfeld said it best on the Brearley sidelines Saturday afternoon - and he said it in the first half when Brearlev was down - "Tom Mannix may not be the best player in the county but he might be the most valuable. Where would Brearley be without him?"

"We knew that we have a good team," Mannix said. "We came out and did what we were taught."

Back in the game and only trailing 13-6 at the half after sophomore defensive end Robert Loneker intercepted an errant John Lesnewich pass and returned it 13 yards for a touchdown late in the second quarter, Brearley felt good about how it was moving the ball on offense, but needed to be able to stop New Providence better on defense

The Pioneers received the second half kickoff, but three plays gained only six yards rushing and New Providence was forced to punt. Brearley's defense gained confidence from that stop, which sparked the offense to touchdown drives on its first two second-half possessions.

New Providence rushed for 142 yards in the first half and threw for six. The Pioneers spread the wealth on the ground, with Jimmy Siracusa, Dan Barletta, Vinny Fuschetto and Lesnewich all gaining at least 27 yards each.

"We thought we moved the ball fine offensively, it was just defensively we had to step it up," Mannix said. "We had to pick it up defensively and that's what we did."

New Providence scored on its third play of the game from scrimmage, with sophomore running back Vinny Fuschetto going around left end for a 45-yard touchdown run. At that point it appeared to some that New Providence might be on its way to a convincing victory, especially with its experience and size advantage,

The Pioneers increased their lead to 13-0 after scoring on their third possession. A five-play drive was concluded when Siracusa picked up a Lesnewich fumble in the end zone after Lesnewich carried 22 yards right to the goal line before losing the ball.

turned out to be its final points of the game.

Breadey got to the 50 when Mannix dropped back to pass on second-and-two. He was then hit on the blind side by New Providence senior lineman A.J. Thomson, who made several tackles on the day

Thomson hit Mannix in the back and jarred the ball loose, with fellow senior lineman Greg Dinerman there to recover the famble.

Now down two scores, but still 10:04 left in the second quarter, Brearley didn't panie. Head coach Scott Miller doesn't have a 57-11 (.838) record for nothing.

On Brearley's next possession, the Bears marched from their own 20 to the New Providence five-yard line before Manuix was stopped short on a fourth down run.

However, Brearley made up for not scoring on that drive just three plays later with Loneker's interception return with 2:20 left in the half. Lesnewich tried to throw the ball away because he was about to be brought down by junior linebacker Wayne Hanns, who had a pretty good hold of him.

"That was huge because we were kind of down because we didn't punch it in," Mannix said. "If we would have gone into the half down 13-0, we would have been pretty down. That was a big play."

Brearley's first drive in the second half saw the Bears gain a second first down at the New Providence 42. Mannix then went through a huge hole in the middle of the field and raced left past three New Providence defenders and into the end zone. John Calderon's first of two extra points tied the game at 13-13 with 7:52 left in the third quarter.

That was one of many holes Brearley's offensive line managed to provide Mannix and junior running back Brian Layden.

"It's like the wild hog that Arkansas did," Mannix said. "It's where you fake one way and then quarterback the other way.

"Our offensive line blocked great today. They block

Another such hole was provided on Brearley's next possession, which was its final scoring drive. An 11play, 46-yard march that began with 4:25 left in the third quarter and ended with 11:32 left in the fourth was sparked by a Mannix 13-yard run on fourth-andthree from the New Providence 39. Mannix ran through this hole with sophomore tight end Kevin Silvestrini leading the way in front of him.

"It's a quarterback counter for us," Miller said. "We, basically, run a counter, but we do it with our quarterback instead of our tailback.

"When our tailback is our main focal point, we do it with our tailback, but with Tommy this year, we do it with our quarterback."

New Providence drove all the way to the Brearley 24 on its next possession, with the drive coming to an end on an incomplete pass where Brearley junior defensive back Allen Phillips was covering Siracusa. Senior linebacker Travis Dilts and senior end Robert Maier combined for a sack that went for a five-yard loss two plays earlier.

"We knew this was a big game and we knew it was going to be a battle, just like last year," Mannix said.

Mannix and Lesnewich were the quarterbacks last year as juniors when the teams played at Ward Field in Kenilworth. Brearley entered that game 2-0 and with shutout wins over Cardinal McCarrick and Dayton, while New Providence was 1-1 after beating Newark Central and then losing at Rahway 34-0 on a Sunday afternoon.

Brearley was - perhaps - the favorite in that game, but New Providence came away with a convincing 35-26 triumph. That was Brearley's first loss in two years, snapping a 14-game winning streak, and first home loss in four seasons, snapping a 20-game win streak at Ward Field in Kenilworth.

"We were ready for another physical game, so we New Providence capitalized on a turnover for what just came out and played them tough," Mannix said.



Serving as captains this year are seniors Chelsea Hoeffler and Renee Dobbs. Hoeffler, an outside hitter like her older sister Becky, fnished with 155 kills and 127 digs last season. Dobbs is one of three middle hitters on the roster.

"We want to win counties again and go far in the states," Chelsea Hoeffler said. "We've been talking about states since the summer. That's definitely our main goal. We're all looking forward to that."

In last year's county final, Cranford was in control in both games, winning 25-18 and 25-22. The year before, Cranford reached the semifinals for the first time under Diaz and was defeated by Westfield 25-19, 25-23.

"They were one of our biggest rivals last year, so it was an exciting moment," Hoeffler said.

Since Cranford is in the MVC and Westfield the Watchung Conference, the two are not scheduled to play each other in the regular season. The only time they faced each other last year was in the UCT final. The only time they would face each other this year would be in the UCT as well.

We lost the seniors from our starting lineup, but the girls that came up last from last year are definitely strong and doing really well, so I think we'll go further with them."

Cranford opened its 2008 campaign with conference wins over Rahway, Union Catholic and Roselle Catholic and with non-conference wins over Livingston and Bergen County non-conference foe Rutherford. Another non-conference win was achieved against East Brunswick Sept. 22 and another conference win was Sept. 23 at home over Johnson by scores of 25-10, 25-11.

Being the defending UCT champion and getting off to a 7-0 start - 9-0 as of today - is making people take notice of the program a bit more.

"It's amazing how far the team has come," said first-year assistant coach Christy McDarby, who was the freshman coach the past five years after playing collegiately at Rowan University in Glassboro. She also played at Cranford for coach Pat Hall, was a setter and First Team All-County selection and is a 1998 Cranford graduate. She is a health and physical education teacher at Orange Avenue School.

"There's no doubt in this team," McDarby continued. "No matter how much they may be down in the score, they are confident they're going to come back."

When the UCT commences in two weeks, for the first time Cranford will be the hunted team and also, perhaps, the team to beat again. The seeding meeting is Oct. 14 at 7 p.m. in Westfield.

"They never knew who Cranford was and Cranford never had anything, so that proved a lot about us and CRANFORD - A lot was accomplished by the we're going to keep going with that," Hoeffler said.

Hoeffler and her teammates spent a great portion of the summer practicing at the high school and competing in leagues and camps in preparation for the season. The Cougars are a close-knit team that takes this sport

'We're really strong and working together and even though there are a lot of girls new to the team we mesh really well," said Dobbs, who was on varsity last year, but not a starter.

There's nothing like winning a county championship to build confidence going into the next season. Cranford's confidence has been growing with each victory this month.

"We always want to do better and get farther than we did last year and for the new girls to maybe match what we did last year," Dobbs said.

At the end of last year, Diaz said her team was very confident, intense and a powerful group.

"They just didn't let a lot of things get to them," Diaz said. "They just knew how to get through that. When we made some changes in the beginning of the season and they really started trusting each other, they built their confidence as they went on and they realized that they could go a lot further than what we had anticipated."

So, what does Diaz anticipate so far from this year's group? "Getting through that first week was going to be a true test," Diaz said of victories over Rahway, Livingston, Rutherford, Union Catholic and Roselle Catholic. "We knew that it was going to be a tough week and it really was going to test us where we stand on some of the state rankings. It gave us some good insight on our chemistry and our competition."

Last Wednesday at Morris Hills. both of those teams found it quite difficult to score on one another.

Diaz kicked the ball just hard enough to the right side of the goal for it to get past Lucaci, who in Summit's victory over Parsippany saved a penalty kick.

For Diaz it was his first varsity goal.

That was it as Morris Hills was Hills Conference-Hills Division able to hold on the rest of the way for a hard-fought 1-0 decision.

The Knights improved to 7-0. posted their sixth shutout and outscored the opposition 23-1 after seven games.

The Hilltoppers fell to 5-1 and outscored their six foes 17-3.

The two are scheduled to meet again in conference play Oct. 25 at 10 a.m. in Summit.

Summit tied Mendham 0-0 Monday in Mendham to see its record move to 6-1-1.

Morris Hills beat Mendham 3-0 last Friday in Mendham to hand the Minutemen their first loss after a 6-0 start.

The Knights improved to 8-0.

Here's how Summit head coach Rob Grella viewed the ref's penalty kick decision:

"We've had the same official now for three or four games and he's just not professional," Grella said. "It more looks like he's doing it as a vengeance. We've already put in our state report. It's sad, it really is.

"I have no problem with the call, to be honest with you. I thought it was a good call. Everyone heard him say it was the third time we hit him in the box. Well, then why didn't you call the first two then?

"That's the problem we had. Then he landed outside the box. It wasn't like he was catapulted out. That's what we were upset about. It wasn't the actual penalty kick. It was the fact that he said it in front of everybody, 'he hit him twice.' Well why didn't you call it the first time or the second time?

"It changed the entire pace of the game, It wasn't physical. They lost control. It's a shame because it started out to be a really nice game and I think everyone saw that for the first 20 minutes."

There were several yellow cards called on players from both teams in the second half, while near the end of the match Summit had a double red card called against it and had to finish the match with 10 players.

Here's how Morris Hills head coach Kevin Rosenberg described the ref's penalty kick decision:

"I thought he should have called it earlier," Rosenberg said. "I thought so on the initial foul. I think that what happened was he didn't want to call it and then the kid pulled him down again and I think he had to call it.

"From their coaches perspective can somewhat understand why he was angry, but he did get down twice on the play, so he should have been happy that he didn't call it the first time. From a coaching standpoint I can understand. It's frustrating. It's definitely frustrating."

This is the third year on the varsity for the tall and lanky Diaz and his first season as the team's penaltv kick shooter.

"I practiced the right side, so I was pretty confident," said Diaz, who wears No. 1 and so far this year has given up just one goal. "I stepped up and knew I could make it."

Morris Hills has been led all ear long by a strong defense. Clearing the ball away in front of Diaz time and time again last Wednesday were senior defenders Alex Tulapol, Billy Emker, Nick Pfeifer and Sebastian Castillo.

"Our back four is as good as it gets," Rosenberg said, "They are all seniors and have been playing together for several years and all are at least two-year letter-winners.

"We still have work to do, but we'll take what we've got so far."

As it turned out, Summit's best opportunity came within the first two minutes of the match. Sophomore forward Dan Palma hit a volley pretty good that Diaz went back for and tipped over the crossbar with both hands.

"Actually I was kind of surprised he got it on target," Diaz said. "I thought he was going to give it a cross, but when he hit it I knew I had to make a reaction so I just dropped back and made the save."

Diaz knew the team's defense was going to have to stand tall again if the Knights were going to have a shot at remaining undefeated.

"I felt that our defense did well and did its job," Diaz said. "We stopped their shots, stayed tight and stayed composed. We knew the job at hand, we did it and it got us the win,

"Our strength is definitely our defense. We're pretty solid and don't give up goals."

Neither team really had an advantage of field possession over the course of 80 minutes. It was definitely a match that could have gone either way. In a month, Summit will seek to beat Morris Hills at home in conference play.

"Morris Hills is a good team," Grella said. "They are very well coached and they play hard. They run through 50-50 balls and have great speed.

"They're a great team and we can't take anything away from Morris Hills,"

"Their coach is a good guy and he trains his kids hard and they always come to play," Rosenberg said of Summit. "This was one of those tough conference games that you're going to have over the course of a season."

The additional improvement or construction shall be considered as separate for purposes of calculating the exemption and/or abatement, except that the assessed value of any previous improvement or construction shall be added to the assessed valuation as it was prior to that improvement or construction, for the purpose of determining the assessed value of the property from which any additional exemption and/or abatement is to be subtracted.

§ 106-10. Ineligibility for tax exemp-

§ 106-10. Ineligibility for tax exemptions and/or abatements.

No exemptions or abatements shall be granted for any property for which property taxes or any other municipal charges are delinquent or remain unpaid, or for which penalties for non-payment are due.

§ 106-11. Notice to qualified property owners.

The Tax Collector shall include an appropriate notice in the mailing of the annual property tax bills to each owner of property in the Urban Enterprise Zone, as designated by Chapter 32 (Urban Enterprise Zone). Article II (Designation), § 32-13 of the Code of the Borough of Roselle, regarding the exemptions and/or abatements provided for pursuant to this Article.

Section 2. Any provision in the Code of the Borough of Roselle in conflict with a provision adopted in Section 1 is hereby repealed. References elsewhere in the Code to current Article II (Tax Exemptions for Property Improvements) shall be amended to conform to the provisions of new Article II (Five-Year Tax Exemptions and Abatements Qualified Businesses in the Urban Enterprise Zone) adopted in Section 1. Section 3, In the event that any section or paragraph, clause, phrase, term, provision, or part of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, such judgment shall not effect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the section, paragraph, clause, term, provision, or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in such judgment has been rendered. 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
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# Clark man to serve on NJ commission
