Former chief charged

SPRINGFIELD - The Union Prosecutor's Office County announced last week that former Springfield Fire Chief Wayne Masiello has been charged with forgery for allegedly altering a firefighters entrance exam taken one year ago.

Masiello retired from the Fire Department in March, just months after accusations of nepotism surfaced and volunteers voiced their concerns about the issue.

Masiello was charged with two counts of fourth degree forgery. Fourth degree crimes can result in an 18-month prison sentence, but Assistant Prosecutor William Kolano, who prosecuted the case, said it's still too early to speculate as to what type of punishment might be imposed.

Masiello is scheduled to make his first appearance before Union County Superior Court Judge Joan Robinson Gross on Nov. 7.



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Finding out why things go 'bump' in the night





He also called for the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders to fund the restructuring of the dikes in Nomahegan Park and the state to give greater recognition to the regional nature of the flood problem.

The pumping station, which constitutes Phase 2A of the fivephase Upper Northeast Quadrant Stormwater Management Project has already proven itself capable of handling the rain water that would otherwise find its way into residents' yards and homes.

The construction of the pump house cost \$5.5 million in funds bonded from the township.

Township officials are continuing to pursue the completion of Phase 2B, which calls for an express sewer system connected to the pump house that will help reduced flooding on the streets.

The town has not yet identified a source of funding for Phase 2B work, which is estimated to cost between \$1.5 million and \$2 million.

"We're looking at a variety of possible funding sources," Engineering Commissioner Mark Smith said.



EDITORIALS Estrada, Yakubov

Like the rest of the nation, Union County residents are feeling the effects of a strained economy --- a situation that will not improve locally if the current Democratic stronghold continues to spend taxpayer dollars frivolously, without anyone on the board having the courage to speak out against the majority and oppose wasteful spending.

We also can't deny the fact that there have been several positive initiatives at the county level in the past year, such as the distribution of grants to support history and the arts, and the presentation of funds for a new Child Advocacy Center.

With that in mind, we believe voters should support Roselle Park Republican Michael Yakubov and Democratic Freeholder Chairman Angel Estrada when they go to the polls to cast their votes in Tuesday's election.

Yakubov brings to the table a realistic plan for cutting costs in the county. He has expressed the need to expand shared services, implement a hiring freeze in 2009 and evaluate all county departments to ensure they are being run efficiently.

Although, in true Democratic freeholder fashion, he sticks with the majority on most issues, Estrada has proven himself to be dedicated, honest and expressive when the need arises,


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

One of the debates is whether ticket enforcement is a hidden form of revenue or a tool to move traffic and enhance commerce. In the case of ticketing early on Saturday, the conclusion was obvious.



Talks about the possible reactivation of the Rahway Valley and Staten Island Railroad, a freight line that would run through the borough, were also discussed.







Liquor allegedly sold to minors

HILLSIDE - Five establishments were charged with serving alcohol to minors after two underage and undercover officers were sold alcohol without a proof of age last Wednesday.

The undercover sting operation was organized by Police Chief Robert Quintan and he says the investigations will continue to ensure all bars and liquor stores in Hillside are complying with the law.

According to a press release, the establishments facing charges are Mayfair Liquors on North Broad Street, Tanky's Tavern, Regional Tavern and Long Avenue Tavern and Liquors, all on Long Avenue, and The New Blue Ribbon Inn on Hollywood Avenue.

Quinlan said Long Avenue Tavern and Liquors, The New Blue Ribbon Inn and Regional Tavern may face heavier penalties because their liquor licenses had already been suspended a year ago. State law prohibits the sale of alcoholic beverages to anyone younger than 21 years old.

Following an Alcoholic Beverage Control Board hearing, the tavents and liquor stores face a license suspension of up to 15 days.

The three establishments that previously violated the law face a suspension of their liquor licenses for up to 30 days.

According to Quinlan, the Old Manhattan bar has been closed for eight months after an 18-year-old Springfield resident was arrested for driving while under the influence and it was discovered upon investigation, that he had been served liquor at the Liberty Avenue establishment.

In November of 2007, the Prosecutor's Office was made aware of a possible scandal after two volunteer firefighters --- Dino D'Angelo and Connor Hamilton, who took the exam a month earlier with Masiello's son --- complained that the final scores appeared to have been significantly altered.

The scores ranked Masiello's sonthird out of 10 candidates when he actually ranked eighth among the pool of candidates. Masiello also suppressed the high scores of several volunteers hoping the join the paid division of the Fire Department.

CLARK --- One of the largest remaining farmsteads in the county has completed its transformation into a county park on Madison Hill Road in Clark.

The \$2.9 million needed for the creation of the 13-acre Esposito Park was funded through the Union County Open Space Recreation and Historic Preservation Trust Fund.

The farm was active from 1913 to 2001 when its owner, Pete Esposito, died. According to Council President Brian Toal, as Esposito's health declined, his final wish to those who knew him was that housing never be built on his land. "He wanted children to be happy

and have a place to play," Toal said. This was a request that town officials have honored with help from the county. The park that bears Esposito's name contains tennis courts, a baseball diamond, playground equipment and paths for. walking and biking.

"Instead of having developers take it over, the Open Space Fund purchased it," Union County Public Information Officer Wayne Avery said

Construction on the park began in early 2007 and ended in September, A. Guliano and Sons of Stirling began the work on the project, and after a change of contractor, Applied Landscape Technologies based in Montville finished the job. The county will maintain the park.

Freeholder Chairman Angel Estrada and Freeholder Nancy Ward both spoke at the opening.

Man charged in Elizabeth murder

A little more than a month after the Union County Prosecutor's Office initiated its Homicide Task Force, and just weeks after the county's forensics lab was nationally accredited, the two entities may have have jointly solved their first homicide case.

Members of the task force recently arrested a Newark man and charged him with homicide, following an alleged shooting that occurred in the early morning hours of Oct. 5 in Elizabeth, according to Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow.

According to the Prosecutor's Office, Washington and several friends left the bar around 2:40 a.m. when they were approached by a group of men who allegedly demanded money. When the victims refused, a fight broke out and Washington was shot several times.

During the struggle Turner was allegedly stabbed several times by Washington. The victim was then transported to Beth Israel Medical Center in Newark, where he spent several days undergoing treatment for serious, but not lifethreatening injuries.

Turner was released several days later and investigators, with help from the biology unit of the Union County Prosecutor's Office Forensic Laboratory, were able to identify Turner as a suspect.



(Continued from Page 14) The rate fell to 5.9 percent in September.

"New Jersey's employment situation was consistent with the national economic downturn, with job losses during the first eight months of this year," said New Jersey Labor Commissioner David J. Socolow.

Kevin Smith, a spokesman for the Department of Labor and Workforce Development, said different regions of New Jersey may be experiencing the affects of the economic problem in different ways and to a varying degree.

"The unemployment rate has basically trended up the entire year," Smith said. "What you'll find is that New Jersey's economy has very much been tracking with the national economy."

Statewide job losses in the private sector were concentrated in two sectors: leisure and hospitality, which includes hotels and restaurants, and professional and business services.

Another organization positioned to take notice of the economic downturn is the United Way of the Greater Union County, a provider of social service and community outreach measures. United Way Chief Executive Officer James Horne said that tracking calls made to the organization's help lines has revealed some changes that are likely tied to the national economy.

"What we're finding is calls for temporary financial assistance is up 46 percent from a month and a half ago," Horne said.

Horne reported that in the same time span, the number of people seeking help related to housing has risen by 10 percent, while calls seeking mental health help are up 11 percent.

"Community organizations that the United Way deals with are seeing a lot more individuals coming in looking for help with mortgage support and foreclosure," Horn said. "The challenge for the system is we don't have the capacity to deal with the requests that are coming in."

Horne said he expects that the number of calls related to unemployment may soon rise.

"We anticipate that these initial calls are more directly related to rising housing costs," he explained.

Horne said Union County's employers have remained relatively stable. "In our experience, the major employers in Union County, fortunately for us, are somewhat stable," he said.

The United Way offers a bilingual helpline open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, accessible by dialing 211 on a telephone.



UC herb garden a 'sensory treat'

Visitors to Union County's Watchung Reservation are in for a sensory treat. An elaborate new herb garden has been added to the many natural attractions at the reservation.

The garden is a project of the Master Gardeners of Union County, supported in part by the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders. It is located behind the county's Trailside Nature and Science Center off New Providence Road in Mountainside.

The garden features almost 100 different herbs, with many colorful and unusual varieties such as lime balm, lemon verbena, enormous 12foot tall castor plants, lamb's ears, and chocolate mint.

The formal raised beds are arranged in ten themes, including medicinal herbs, scented herbs, and herbs from the Bible. Fans of Harry Potter will enjoy a special bed containing lungwort, wolf bane and other herbs mentioned in the popular series of books.

Some of the herbs are used for projects and activities in the Master Gardener's horticultural therapy program, which serves children and adults with special needs throughout Union County.

The centerpiece of the garden is a gazebo donated by the Sisters of Maria Villa. The Merck Community Advisory Panel Mini-Grant Program provided a grant to purchase the horticultural therapy herbs. Most of the funds to build the garden beds came from the annual Master Gardeners' Spring Fair and Plant Sale. The garden is fenced and gated to protect the plants from wildlife.





Most people involved in Union County sports are looking forward to that change in venue because most are in favor of the NJSIAA's conference realignment plan that passed.





Johnson girls' soccer is going for first UCT title

CLARK -- Behind a couple of World Cup performances by senior defenseman Casey Dunn and junior goalkeeper Danielle Kohen and a goal and an assist each from sophomore forward Rachel Syko and sophomore midfielder Kristi Pflug, the Johnson girls' soccer team finds itself in the Union County Tournament championship game for the first time since 1994.

Fourth-seeded Johnson ousted top-seeded Westfield 2-0 in last Friday night's second semifinal at Nolan Field, preventing a third straight Scotch Plains-Westfield final.

Second-seeded Scotch Plains won the first semifinal over sixth-seeded Cranford 2-0, breaking a scoreless tie with goals scored three minutes apart with 13 and 10 minutes left in the match.

So it will be Johnson vs. Scotch Plains here in the championship game on Nov. 1 at 5 p.m., before the boys' final at 7 that pits fifth-seeded Summit vs. second-seeded Elizabeth.

Johnson, which improved to 14-0-2 on Monday with a 1-0 Mountain Valley Conference win at Rahway, has never won the girls' title. Syko scored her 20th goal in the Rahway win.

Scotch Plains, now 14-3-1, won its first title in 2005, shared the 2006 crown with Westfield and won the 2007 championship outright.

The Raiders will be going for a fourth straight title after reaching the final for the first time three years ago.

Johnson, as of Tuesday, was still the only unbeaten team remaining from Union County.

The Crusders will play as the visiting team against Scotch Plains because they are the lower seed.

Johnson was also the visiting team on its home field Friday night against Group 4 Watchung Conference power Westfield, which slipped to 12-2-2. Syko scored her 19th goal and fourth in UCT play seven minutes in, while Pflug made it 2-0 with 24 minutes left in the second half.

Syko's goal quickly put Johnson ahead, which was important for the Crusaders, who were considered the underdog. She took a pass from Pflug inside the penalty box at the left, dribbled the ball past Westfield goalie Meghan Brody with her left foot and then kicked the ball into an empty net with her right foot.

"We had to set the tone of the game and we did," Syko said. "We came out and we were ready. We wanted this so bad and we got what we wanted.'

Playing the role of stopper - or the last line of defense in front of Kohen - Dunn made sure that Westfield was done by clearing away every ball in front of her. Three minutes after Johnson took the lead for good on Syko's game-winning goal, Dunn - with her right foot - cleared a ball in front of the net that Kohen would not have been able to get to and then cleared a rebound attempt away with her same right foot.

She then immediately pumped her fist in the air in -triumph after reacting quickly to both Westfield chances inside the penalty box.

That set the stage for an outstanding, MVP-like performance by Dunn.

"Casey was unbelievable," first-year Johnson head coach Lissette Brandao said. "She has the technical ability to keep the ball, but she can also get the ball out of the back.

Kohen made 10 saves for her sixth shutout. She has not allowed a goal in three games against Watchung Conference competition.

She was kept busy the entire 80 minutes -- Westfield had a 14-11 edge in shots - which is a good thing for a goalie.

Kohen came through time and time again, including making a stop that saw the ball go off her hands, hit the out for this game the way we were hoping. crossbar, and then come right back to her.

"Danielle was outstanding," Brandao said, "She was always there on corners and set pieces. She got right up after contact (with Westfield senior Tara Handza) too, which was good, because we really don't have another keeper."

"My defense, I've got to give a lot of credit to them, they played their hearts out," a very modest Kohen said.

Johnson is now 2-0-1 vs. Group 4 Watchung Conference foes. First came a 0-0 regular season tie at home against Union Oct. 8, followed by a 3-0 UCTfirst round win at home over Linden Oct. 11, Syko scored twice and Pflug once vs. Linden.

"Kristi playing right mid actually worked quite well because she had been playing the majority of the time at center mid," Brandao said. "With her crosses and her defensive composure here on the side, it worked well.'

Syko scored Johnson's goal in regulation last Saturday when the host Crusaders ousted fifth-seeded New Providence 2-1 in a UCT quarterfinal. The game went to penalty kicks after two scoreless overtime periods, with Johnson winning the penalty kicks 4-1. Syko scored one of Johnson's four penalty kick goals.

"Rachel's always there for us and always comes up with big goals," Brandao said.

"The whole team has such great chemistry and it's just great to come together for something so important like this," said Syko, who did not play the entire first half because she was not feeling well. We were trying to keep possession. We scouted them and knew who we had to watch. We came to play the best game we could."

Westfield forward Sam Costello had a number of chances that were thwarted by Johnson's defense or by Kohen. Brody also played well in goal for the Blue Devils, making seven saves.

"We prepared yesterday a lot, playing possession," Brandao said. "We haven't been playing our game lately (Johnson's previous match was a 1-1 tie at Brearley Wednesday), so it was great for us to get back to playing Johnson soccer."

Johnson, the No. 1 team in the Mountain Valley Conference this year, will have to beat another Watchung Conference school to win its first county championship.

"It could be anybody's game," said Brandao, who played on UCT championship teams at Union Catholic before starring at Rutgers.

"I'm looking forward to it."

Senior Katie Cornacchia and senior captain Rachel Cooper - on a penalty kick - scored for Scotch Plains in its win over Cranford. Cornacchia found a loose ball inside the penalty box and with her right foot kicked it into the left corner of the goal.

Raider senior goalkeeper Jackie Law played well to earn a shutout.

Cranford junior keeper Lauren Grandal also excelled in goal.

Cranford, which fell at Scotch Plains 2-0 in nonconference play back on Sept. 13, had the better of the play in the first half and for those first 40 minutes looked like the team that had won the last three UCTs.

"I was very impressed with the way our girls came out," Cranford head coach Jen Michewicz said, "We prepared for this game all week and I think they came

Summit vs. Elizabeth in UCT boys' soccer final

CLARK - After leaving the Watchung Conference and joining the Hills Division of the Iron Hills Conference in 1996, Summit has always been on the outside looking in as far as Union County sports programs go.

For the most part, you have your larger schools in the Watchung Conference and your smaller ones in the Mountain Valley Conference.

Then there's Summit, the only Union County team that competes in the IHC, which is a league filled with teams from Essex and Morris counties,

So when Summit enters the Union County Tournament in any sport, the Hilltoppers are sort of an unknown quantity.

The boys' soccer team proved to be quite successful in conference play this season before entering the UCT as the fifth seed. Then Watching Conference foes Linden, the 12th seed, and Union, the fourth, found out just how competitive the Hilltoppers are.

Summit blanked Linden 6-0 at home in the first round before going to Union and coming away with a 2-1 win in the quarterfinals,

The Hilltoppers followed that up with Sunday night's convincing 3-0 triumph over ninth-seeded Governor Livingston in the second UCT semifinal played at Nolan Field in Clark.

GL, which fell to 9-8, did well to eliminate topseeded Westfield on the road in the quarterfinals last weekend. The Highlanders were seeking to reach their first final since last winning the crown in 1994.

In Sunday's first semifinal, second-seeded Elizabeth held on for a 4-2 win over sixth-seeded New Providence, handing the Pioneers their first loss of the season. New Providence slipped to 14-1-2, with its ties coming against MVC-Valley Division rivals Brearley and Dayton on the road.

That sets up Saturday's 7 p.m. championship game here between Summit and Elizabeth. The girls' final is 5 p.m. between fourth-seeded Johnson and second-seeded and three-time defending champion Scotch Plains.

The Hilltoppers are in the final for the first time since 1981 and last won the crown in 1980. The Minutemen won their first title in 2005 and also reached the final last year as they will be playing in their third championship game in four years.

Elizabeth faced Scotch Plains in the 2005 and 2007 finals. This will be the first championship game since Westfield beat Rahway 2-1 in 1996 that does not include Scotch Plains. The Raiders appeared in the last 11 finals (1997-2007), winning eight of their record 14 championships in that span.

Summit and Elizabeth also won their 13th games Sunday, with Summit improving to 13-4-1 and Elizabeth to 13-4.

Summit received an early first half goal from senior Evan Elko and second half goals from Julian Cyrus and Dan Palma. Filling in nicely for injured senior goalie Alex Lucaci was junior Jay Crisfield, who made four saves for a shutout in his first start of the year.

"We came out determined, this being the Union County Tournament," said a very happy fourth-year Summit head coach Rob Grella moments after the memorable triumph, "Coming into this a lot of people didn't give us too much respect. We played great defense, we played composed, we kept it together and we played a very good Governor Livingston team."

Green building strategies: those strategies that minimize the impact of development on the environment, and enhance the health, safety and well-being of residents by producing durable, low-maintenance, resource-efficient housing while making opti-mum use of existing infrastructure and community services.

Store brings fresh twist to township

UNION -- Last week, residents were given a sneak-peak of the township's new Whole Foods Market, which features an assortment of firsts for the natural and organic foods retailer,

Whole Foods, located on Springfield Avenue in the Vauxhall section of Union, is next to the new Best Buy and Target, both of which opened recently. Whole Foods officially opened its doors Wednesday,

The Whole Foods store had been relocated from Millburn and although it is now in Union, it still bears the name Whole Foods Market Millburn-Union. According to Fred Shank, public relations manager for Whole Foods, the store was relocated in order to expand.

"In Millburn, we had space limitations and parking problems," Shank said. "Here, it will provide a much better shopping experience."

Shank said the 60,000 square-foot store offers a wide-variety of food, supplies, fresh juice made on-the-spot and even a casual dining experience. The Millburn-Union "Osteria" restaurant features a separate entrance and is the only Osteria in the tri-state area with a liquor license according, to the Whole Foods Market culinary concepts coordinator for the northeast region, Michelle Di Pietro.

The store also features the first-ever greenhouse within a Whole Foods Market in the nation. Inside the greenhouse, fresh herbs such as thyme and cilantro are grown vertically using a hydroponic system, in which plants do not require soil to grow.

Planning Board Member Jean Perkins toured the new store Saturday morning and said the addition would be beneficial to the surrounding landscape. "The store is fabulous and the community will certainly be enhanced and enriched by it," Perkins said.


The Whole Foods Market also has strong links to local charities such as Hoop-A-Paluza, an organization that aims to raise money for children's health programs.



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
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
