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Election yields mixed results

Editor's Note: Election results are not official until certified by the Union County Clerk's Office.

Democrats dominated several races in Tuesday's General Election, sweeping the municipal races in Rahway, Roselle Park and Linden, while Republicans claimed victory in races in Clark, Kenilworth and Summit.

Residents packed the polls in an election marked by a heavy voter turnout, spurred largely by the presidential race between Republican Sen. John McCain of Arizona and Democratic Sen. Barack

Obama of Illinois.

Clark

Republican incumbents retained three at-large council seats, as well as the mayor's seat.

Mayor Sal Bonaccorso defeated challenger Gary Slodowski by 1,404 votes.

Council candidates also won by a considerable margin, with Al Barr receiving 4,012 votes, Sheila Whiting capturing 3,975 and Angel Albanese amassing 3,969. Democrats trailed, with local party chair Nancy Sheridan receiving only 2,739 votes, Diane Lanigan receiv-See COUNTY, Page 5

Union schools: Gang initiations just rumor

UNION - The week leading up to Halloween is reportedly notorious for gang initiations.

In Union, as in neighboring communities, rumors had swirled there may be gang activity in the area from Newark crews, however, some school administrators said that's all they were: rumors.

According to published reports, text messages and e-mails circulated, stating a specific number of women would be killed as part of a gang initiation. Rumors were fueled by recent shootings in Newark and the discovery of a woman found dead in a burning vehicle in Elizabeth on Oct.

The petition to review the final decision was filed Oct. 24.



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Flagpole standing; tops local projects

CRANFORD - After much effort on the part of residents and municipal officials, the WWI-era flagpole removed from the Post Office Plaza in 2002 is standing again.

The pole, which will be re-dedicated Saturday, enhances the completed Post Office Plaza Improvement Project, a long-delayed effort to install improved pavers and landscaping in the area.

The cost to repair and reinstall the pole totaled \$50,000. The town will be reimbursed for the expenses through private donations, thanks to a months of fundraising overseen by Public Affairs Commissioner Martha Garcia, according to Engineering Commissioner Mark Smith.

"More than \$30,000 has been collected, and there will be additional opportunities for larger donations," Smith said, noting he is confident the full amount will be raised.

A Victorian-style fountain donated by the Cranford Garden Club also made its way to the plaza. It was added in mid-October, after sitting in storage for several years, awaiting the construction of the plaza.

Those heading to the re-dedication ceremony will also get a chance to see another project recently completed in the area. The Walnut Avenue underpass between North Avenue and South Avenue is now lined with metal fencing on either side of the street. The fencing was added to deter pedestrians from attempting to cross the road below the busy, poorly-lit underpass, where pillars dividing the lanes further hamper visibility.

Officials said they have received both positive and negative feedback from residents regarding this change. "I've gotten several complaints from residents, saying they are no longer able to get across the street there," Public Safety Commissioner Michael Plick said.

Township Engineer Richard Marsden said he has observed some people vaulting the fence to cross the street.

PSE&G is expected to install lighting below the underpass, which will further aid visibility and safety, according to Marsden.

Despite the progression of Cranford 's current engineering efforts, there is some disappointment surrounding the overdue replacement of the High Street footbridge, which was demolished after being seriously damaged in a flood in April 2007. The new bridge has been fabricated and is presently in Minnesota awaiting shipment, according to Smith.

Work to ready the site for the bridge, however, is stalled. This work includes driving piles into the ground to serve as a foundation.

The Township Committee is threatening to take legal action against the contractor, Marvec Construction Corporation of Verona, in an effort to spur the company into completing the project. The bridge was scheduled to be in place by Oct. 17.

Since the threat, Smith said township Attorney Carl Woodward has not heard from the construction company. "We're trying to avoid...legal action, because if it occurs, there is a chance it could become a very protracted process," he said. "We're trying to resolve it as quickly as possible. We hope that the contractor will begin to act responsibly."

At a Township Committee meeting in October, Administrator Marlena Schmid said when these delays arise, it does not necessarily mean the contractor is inept or intentionally negligent. She said it is likely the work is being impeded by financial troubles, a scenario that is likely to affect more businesses as nation-wide economic problems persist.

Schmid could not be reached for further comment.

He stressed communication between school principals and the police department was heightened on Thursday, locally know as "mischief night," and Friday, Halloween. "All my principals met, and we reached out to the police department and spoke with Sgt. Speckhardt and others with regard to whether or not there was any validity to the rumors," Jakubowski assured.

He noted the police department had reached out to the Union County Gang Task Force, just to be safe. "They believe it was just rumors," Jakubowski said.

Thursday morning students who usually linger outside the schools before classes were ushexplained.

Letters explaining the rumored threat, however, were not sent home to parents, "We chose not to send the letters because they would overly concern people, and because we felt we had everything under control," Jakubowski said.

No incidents of gang violence were reported and a high school football game, which included extra security, went uninterrupted Friday evening. Security hired for mischief night patrolled the interior and exterior of the high school around the clock. "We've never had

Union held their traditional Halloween parades outdoors on Friday with the exception of Franklin Elementary School, which according to principal Corey Lowery, had to be held indoors after suspicious activity was observed.

Lowery said a white car was seen circling the school for several minutes by a cafeteria aide. "The activity created some suspicion, especially with those rumors, and we wanted to make sure we would safeguard the 500 students," Lowery said.

According to Burnett Middle School teacher, Brian Getchman, it was "business as usual" at the school Friday. "Our concerns have been addressed through casual conversation, but everything has been handled well," he said.

The two open seats on Cranford's Township Committee went to Republican Mark Dugan, who received, 5,514 votes, and Democrat Dan Aschenbach, who beat out Dugan's running mate, Chris Drew, by 12 votes, Aschenbach's running mate, Kevin Illing, finished last with 5,364.

Aschenbach and Dugan will replace Republicans Robert Puhak and Michael Plick.

Kenilworth

Republicans swept the elections in the borough, with candidates Kevin Leary Jr., Scott Klinder and incumbent Salvatore Candarella taking the three-year seats. They beat out Democratic candidates Darrin McMahon, Robert Beiner and Cheryl Pantina by an average amount of 395 votes. The results translate into a Republican run council.

Linden

City Democrats swept the three council seats up for grabs, snatching one seat from an Independent incumbent. In a rematch of last year's 10th ward race, Richard Puschel turned the tables and defeated Independent incumbent Bruce Howe by 220 votes.

Two newcomers did not succeed in unseating Democratic incumbents Robert Sadowski in the 6th ward and Michelle Yamakaitas in the 8th ward. Sadowski narrowly defeated Diane Wilverding by 69 votes. Yamakaitis locked out Elaine Lubas by a total of 910 votes.

Derek Armstead, running unopposed, won the 4th Ward council seat.

Rahway

Residents confirmed their support for the current council, as the entire Democratic ticket won five open ward seats on City Council. The three incumbents defeated their Republican challengers. Jerry Scaturo, 3rd Ward, beat out Bryan Derochers by 488 votes. Jennifer Wenson-Maier, 5th Ward, defeated James Pekarofski by 378 votes. Current council president Samson Steinman, 6th Ward, held off opponent Kevin Retcho with 317 more votes.

In the 1st Ward, newcomer Bobby Akbar kept the council seat in Democrat possession by defeating former Republican councilman Lawrence Bodine by 785 votes. In a battle of two first time candidates, Democrat Michael Cox beat Republican Kenneth Lund by 588.

Roselle Park

The Democrats narrowly clinched a victory in the borough, winning by less than 100 votes.

Democratic candidate for a Councilman-at-large seat, Carl Hokanson, and running mate for the 1st ward, Laurence Dinardo, beat out Republican incumbent Jose "Ricky" Badillo and Richard Huxford by an average amount of 64 votes.

Springfield

The town can look forward to a new face in 2009. Hugh Keffer, D. finished ahead of Jerry Fernandez, R, earning 207 additional votes and a three-year term on theTownship Committee. Incumbent Steven Grau earned a mere 746 votes.

Summit

Election Day came to a close with the look of Summit's Common Council remaining the same as it appeared in 2008. Republican incumbent Michael Vernotico defeated Democrat Terri Tauber in a landslide, gaining 367 more votes to be re-elected to his second three-year term as councilman in the 2nd Ward.

"He is ... the dean of our board," said current school board president Bryan Russell. "When you need advice on anything, you go to Bill Motley," he said.

Motley, a supervisor for the county human services, was elected to the board after serving on the Linden City Council. . .

He said he did not intend to spend more than two terms on the board, until he began regularly attending state workshops to learn more about the issues they face. Eventually two terms of service became three, then four.

"I had other things I wanted to do in my life, but once I began to understand boardsmanship and board governance, I wanted to learn more about the process," Motley said.

Eight years ago a fellow city board member tried unsuccessfully to attain the rank.

Motley was curious how close he was to attaining the accreditation, leading him to asked officials how many credits he needed. The response was one.

"I said to myself, if I do it...it's because I will bring an awareness to board members and put them in a better position to take the test," he said.

Since the designation was first given out, in 1992, only 188 board members in the country have attained it. There are currently more than 4,800 members in the state.

"Making it to the master level is certainly a difficult achievement," said Mike Yaple, spokesman for the New Jersey School Boards Association.

Yaple noted the NJSBA formed the collegiate-like Board Member Academy to recognize members who went "above and beyond" their normal commitment.



UNION — Township residents living near the Irvington border only on the non-residential side, the ed by the Federal Highway Adminwere already feeling on edge, contending with increased noise from construction on Interstate 78.

Now, they may have to deal with a digitalized billboard that could become a nuisance due to its bright

The construction on Interstate-78 is far from complete. Sound barriers have been pushed back several feet, toward nearby homes on May Street, Van Ness Terrace, Halsey uled for Oct. 22 regarding the mat-Street, Andrew Street, Porter Road and Edmund Terrace, to make way for a new lane intended to allow motorists to enter I-78 via the Garden State Parkway.

Settlement pitched for Romerovski site

ROSELLE PARK — Residents packed into Council Chambers to hear borough officials and Avalon Bay Communities pitch a compromise expected to kick start redevelopment at the Romerovski site.

Litigation had impeded progress at the Westfield Avenue warehouse since January 2007. Borough officials and Avalon Bay's vice president, Ron Ladell, differed on how to develop the site. Avalon Bay sued the borough in January 2007 for not meeting their affordable housing quota.

While the municipality hoped for retail space, senior housing and perhaps condominiums, their final settlement calls for 249 luxury apartment units in a four-and-a-half-story facility, priced between \$1,200 and \$2,600 per month to rent.

"I would like to see some things change, but we worked out the best deal we could," Mayor Joseph DeIorio told the public about the compromise during the meeting Oct. 28.

The Borough Council is expected to finalize the settlement with Avalon Bay by Dec. 31, according Elizabeth McKenzie, the mediator and special court master.

Some residents expressed outrage over being sued by the developers and worried the apartments would flood the district with students.

Most, however, were pleased with the conditions of the settlement, or at least felt it was the best the borough could get, and wanted to move on.

The plan includes several benefits to the borough and concessions from developers, including 37 units, or 15 percent of the apartments, set aside for low- to moderate-income housing. This would fulfill the city's affordable housing obligations to the state.

Avalon Bay will use a "Payment in Lieu of Taxes," often used in redevelopment projects to benefit the town. The PILOT will give the borough ten percent of the new facility's gross profits, projected as \$584,000. Ninety-five percent of the PILOT goes directly to the municipality, though less than what taxes would bring in - originally estimated between \$750,000 and \$800,000.

Normal taxes split the larger number, giving 50 percent of the funds to the school board and 15 percent to the county, which now gets only five.

While the revenue Roselle Park receives will remain about the same, Delorio said the biggest benefit is the property owner cannot file a tax appeal and lower their assessment in the future.

It is a significant improvement on what the current site brings in, about \$192,000, according to several municipal officials.

Borough officials also said the new income would be used on a yearly basis for special projects, including perhaps the school system.

Councilman Ricky Badillo also pledged to put 20 to 30 percent of the money directly into reducing taxes.

Avalon Bay will also pay \$400,000 into a fund for senior housing in the borough. The money will be placed in a trust fund until current plans to erect homes for the elderly are completed.

The final requirement gives a nod to the historic background of the site, which was originally home to the Marconi Wireless Telegraph factory and lab, where inventor Guglielmo Marconi worked on creating the

The borough's Historical Society Museum will be given a space in the development, no less than 2,000-square-feet, and 10 public parking spaces in the lot. The developers will also pay at least \$50,000 to ready the museum for use and will charge a "nominal fee" of \$3.75 per square foot — at least \$7,500 — in monthly rent, close to the \$7,000 the museum pays for their current space.

Between obtaining permits and finishing a site plan, Ladell said renters would not begin moving in for two years or more. The tax rate will remain the same until construction is complete.

Veterans Day

Veterans Day will be celebrated in America on Tuesday.

This holiday, which has evolved considerably since its establishment in the years following World War I, is set aside to honor those who have served in the armed forces of the United States.

In parades, veterans march in contingents that are grouped according to the wars in which they served: Gulf War soldiers dressed in their pale green-and-brown camouflage uniforms; Vietnam veterans, who often dress in civilian clothes that include vests with numerous insignias and assorted headwear; and Korea and World War II veterans in dark greens or khaki uniforms; nearly all the veterans of World War I have now faded into history.

The holiday has a specific moment as its epicenter: 11:11 a.m. on Nov. 11, the moment in 1918 when World War I hostilities were ordered to cease. In the beginning, it was called Armistice Day, designed to honor combat veterans and promote world peace.


In 1954, following World War II and the Korean War, it was changed to Veterans Day and the emphasis was firmly placed on honoring veterans. In the early 1970s, the holiday was absorbed into the trend of moving holidays to a Monday, thus creating a three-day weekend. Strange, but remember, those were the years when the leisure suit was in fashion.

In 1975, President Gerald Ford put an end to all that nonsense and re-established the holiday on Nov. 11, where it remains today.

On Veterans Day we honor those of our neighbors who, in times of national crisis, set aside their tools, hung up their butcher aprons or closed their shops to travel across vast oceans and engage in battles to the death with determined enemies.

These neighbors left their homes and families to sleep in rain, walk night patrol in the jungles of Vietnam or on the frozen hilltops in Korea, wade ashore on Omaha Beach or patrol the dangerous streets of Fallu-

These men and women have given so much, and Veterans Day is a time to remember their sacrifices. The day includes parades, assemblies in schools and ceremonies at town memorials. And, in our private thoughts, we should all take a moment to remember those who stepped forward to preserve our national freedom and personal liberties.



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

Keep teen drivers safe

To the Editor:

We have read with dismay the recent stories about some college presidents trying to open a national discussion on lowering the legal drinking age from 21 to

If they spent a little time in our shoes, they'd think twice about such a dangerous idea.

All too often in our work as insurance agents, we see the aftermath of teen car crashes. And we hope each teen crash only involves damage to the car. Sadly, that's not always the case.

Car crashes are the leading cause of death among American teenagers. The uniform nationwide 21-year old drinking age - on the books for nearly 25 years - has helped make our roads safer. The idea that lowering the drinking age will reduce binge drinking on college campuses is unproven and has dangerous consequences on our roads.

What we know is that a lower drinking age would result in more deaths on our nation's highways. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates the 21 minimum legal drinking age law has reduced traffic fatalities involving drivers ages 18 to 20 years old by 13 percent, saving an estimated more than 25,000 lives since 1975. That's about 1,000 lives saved each year.

Rather than taking a step back in safety by lowering the drinking age, Allstate urges Congress to take a step forward by enacting federal standards for graduated driver licensing laws, which ease teenagers into driving with gradually added privileges. It's a proven way to reduce teen crashes. Keeping our teens safe on the roads is a critical issue.

Let's focus on ways to improve safety through better nationwide licensing standards, not adding danger to the roads by lowering the drinking age.

Nepotism causes problems To the Editor:

Star-Ledger reporter Jason Jett did a great job of exposing nepotism in Union and showing the connection to county government.

Union Township Committeeman Jim Florio's son was promoted in his county job over two, long-standing county employees even though they scored higher on a civil service exam. This resulted in three law-

Maria Todaro was hired by the county Division of Weights and Measurers in 1993. Michael Florio joined the county five years later in 1998.

Todaro who scored higher than Florio on a civil service exam, has a math degree, is bilingual, formerly worked for a law school dean and was a former packing manager for Proctor and Gamble. She has been secretary to the New Jersey Weights and Measures Association since 1997 and was employee of

In Maria Todaro's first lawsuit, a Union County Grand Jury found that Todaro proved that she was passed over for the county promotion because she is a registered Republican and initially awarded Ms. Todaro \$300,000. Ms. Todaro appealed the second part of the lawsuit, in which she argued she should be awarded the job because she was the most qualified

In November, 2007, the county agreed to settle Todaro's second lawsuit for \$200,000 and give her the superintendent's pay raise but they would not give Todaro the job.

Employee Joseph Freitas, who joined the county in 1987, 11 years prior to Mayor Florio's son, also won \$150,000 in a suit filed in federal court for being passed over for the same job. Freitas also scored higher than Florio on a civil service exam. The county's legal fees were \$25,000. Freitas is no longer on the county payroll.

Florio's son is still the superintendent, Todaro is the assistant superintendent, and they both have the same salary — \$62,113 — taxpayers are out approximately \$675,000 so a mayor's son could get a lousy \$8,000 pay raise. All elected officials involved are still in office.

"We were able to establish that Mike Florio had repeatedly bragged to several people that he was going to get the job because he was a Democrat, his father was a Democrat and that they had made connections to Sen. (Raymond) Lesniak," stated Todaro's attorney David Corrigan in a Star-Ledger article.

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

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

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

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Police probe origin of envelope containing harmless powder

CRANFORD --- A local business that received an envelope containing a suspicious, white, powdery substance early last week was not in danger, police say.

The same day it was received, law enforcement officials learned the mysterious powder was harmless.

Township and county police responded to Registrar and Transfer, a financial business that facilitates the transfer of stocks on Commerce Drive, at 11:39 a.m. on Oct. 28, after receiving a call from the business.

Police arrived to find the envelope had been opened by an employee. The county hazmat team and the Office of Emergency Management were called.

"Through the preliminary test at the scene, it was determined it was not a harmful substance," Cranford Detective Sgt. Gerard Quinn said.

Public Safety Commissioner Michael Plick said authorities responded with the attitude that the substance was in fact harmful.

"We always take every precaution and take every incident seriously," Plick said.

The Registrar and Transfer's Human Resources Manager, Pat Lewis, did not return calls for comment.

According to Quinn, the envelope had no postage or return address, which has made it difficult for authorities to determine its origin. "Because it was a business reply envelope, the sender has not been identified," he said.

Authorities have not yet determined the identity of the white powder.

Plick said a report of this nature is rare in Cranford, and he hopes it stays that way.

Some crimes rise as economy falls

Editor's note: The following is the second part in a series about to county authorities. the national economy and its effect on Union County.

As the nation's financial strains grow more dire by the day, Union County officials are dealing with more gang- and financial-related crimes than ever before. Some believe the two may have direct links. According to Union County Sheriff Ralph Froehlich, crime in Union County has taken a dramatic and alarming turn since he was first elected in 1977.

As more residents loose their homes to foreclosures, younger residents may look ahead and see very difficult times in the future. Some criminals and gang members feel that desperate times may call for desperate measures, including burglary and violent crimes, according

"Some use the economy as an excuse," Froehlich said, "but whatever the cause is, the county at the present time has seen a serious increase in violent crimes. There have recently been more (violent crimes) than I can ever remember."

Once children give up on an honest future, some turn to gangs and violence as an alternative, according to Froehlich.

Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow agrees gang presence has been an issue among younger residents for nearly 10 years and has now proliferated in most of the towns in Union County.


"A lot of poles can be leaning or splintered and it doesn't mean they're structurally unsafe," Prater

(Continued from Page 14) along with other socio-economic factors," Romankow said.

According to Romankow, gang members offer youths things they normally could not obtain on their own, such as money, expensive clothing and jewelry. However, the real root of the problem stems from illegal drug use, according to the prosecutor, Romankow pointed out that approximately 70 percent of crimes in the county are driven by drugs. The sale of drugs leads to large amounts of money, which in turn leads to the purchase of

According to Detective Sgt. Ron Hampton of the New Jersey State Police, 43 percent of gang members in the state are younger than 18 years old. Hampton said many counties in the state with an urban center, such as Union County, will see gang presence.

"Gangs are still on the up-tick," Hampton said, "And membership continues to increase."

The Sheriff's Office and Proseentor's Office together have taken several steps recently to ensure the safety of county residents. In the past month, the county has begun initiatives such as the Homicide Task Force and the accreditation of the only county-run forensics lab in the state. Law enforcement officials have also been speaking to local teens and informing residents during gang symposiums of serious issues involving gang violence in the county.

Romankow does not necessarily equate the failing economy to a spike in county crimes. In fact, he stated that the overall crime rate has dropped in the county over the past few years. However, he has begun to see a large amount of money-related crimes, including fraud and some con artistry.

Though statistics show that

most of the crime is still occurring in the county's more urban areas, there is some fear, according to Froehlich, that it may migrate into the more suburban and rural communities.

'You go where the food is," Froehlich said, "Once the well runs dry in the urban areas, we could see a shift."

According to Hampton, much of the drugs purchased from innercity gang members are bought by residents of suburban areas. Therefore, more and more gang members are migrating to areas closer to their target market, not only for convenience, but many times to sell their narcotics for a higher price. If this trend continues, suburban areas will soon be infested with gangs, making them more dangerous and therefore driving property values down even further.

Police investigate two homicides in UC

The Union County Homicide Task Force is investigating the discovery of two apparent murders within 24 hours in Elizabeth.

The bodies of two victims were found in parked cars several blocks apart in Elizabeth, but despite similar circumstances and location, Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow said there is no immediate evidence to suggest the homicides are related.

The first victim, identified as Tanya Worthy, 35, of Green Brook, was found around 10:45 p.m. on Oct. 28, on Neck Lane, inside a burning twodoor BMW convertible. A wealthy businesswoman, her death has officially been ruled a homicide, according to authorities.


The second victim, Christopher Rambert, 26, of Elizabeth, was found dead inside a car on Coakley Circle around 4:15 p.m. the next day.

The two deaths bring the number of homicides for the year up to 18 in Union County. Thirteen have occurred in Elizabeth — the only Union County municipality that is not a member of the Homicide Task Force.

The investigation is being handled by the task force, which was created last month in response to a growing number of unsolved homicides.

"Work is being done to bring those responsible to justice and give the victim's family some comfort during this difficult time," Romankow said.

After a little rock 'n' roll, during which audiences nearly fell out of their seats trying to move to the rhythms, Francis once more seriously bonded with her fans with a moving rendition of "Brother, Can You Spare a Dime?"

She showed pictures and talked about entertaining 25,000 troops in Vietnam, ending her shows with "God Bless America."

Then, as in Saturday night's performance, she sang "God Bless America," as the audience stood to pay tribute to its country and its favorite singer, both at the same time.

"I'll Be Seeing You," Connie Francis sang toward the end of this incredible concert. And to her audience, she called out, "It's great to be home."

It was an evening like no other; a concert like no other --- and an incomparable entertainer like no other - in New Jersey or throughout the world.





Union Catholic wins GVB title

Hoeffler, Bartsch excel for defending champ Cranford

SCOTCH PLAINS - To show you how far girls' volleyball has come in Union County, all of the parking spaces were taken for last Thursday night's championship match at Union Catholic and once you entered the gym you had a hard time hearing yourself think

A near-capacity crowd of roughly 300 - including revved up, facepainting high school fans of both teams - were treated to a very exciting and very intense three-game set between - hands down - the two best teams in the county.

Union Catholic came back to take the first game away from Cranford, which led almost the entire contest.

Cranford then came back to post a convincing triumph in game two. Union Catholic then overcame a four-point deficit and hung on to take game three and win the championship.

Second-seeded Union Catholic defeated top-seeded and defending champion Cranford 26-24, 17-25, 25-22. It was the first title for the Vikings since 2005. Cranford was seeking to become the first repeat champion since Union Catholic won the fast of a string of titles in 2002.

Both teams moved to 19-4, with Union Catholic the second seed in Non-Public and Cranford the top seed in Group 2 for the state playoffs.

Last year at Westfield, Cranford won the UCT as the top seed by beating the Blue Devils 25-18, 25-22 in the final at Westfield.

In order to repeat as champion, Cranford had to beat the host team again in the final, although the Cougars were the higher seeded squad and playing as the home team.

'We played real hard in all three games to try to win," Cranford senior captain and outside hitter Chelsea Hoeffler said.

'We didn't finish the first game strong, came back and won the second and just fell short in the third," Cranford junior setter Meghan Bartsch said.

On Sept. 18 at Cranford, the home team Cougars won 21-25, 25-22, 25-14. On Oct. 23 at Union Catholic, the home team Vikings won 25-23, 25-22.

"This was no different than the last time we played them," Hoeffler said. "Both teams wanted to win real bad."

You could make a case for Hoeffler as Cranford's MVP and junior Emily Willim as Union Catholic's. Willim ended games one and three with kills and Hoeffler game two with one.

Willim, a junior outside hitter, won Union Catholic's last five points in game one after the score was tied a fourth time at 21-21. She was set up well by her teammates and then leaped in the air and spiked the ball over the net for five consecutive game-ending kills. She finished the first game with six kills and added four in game two and three in game three for a total of 13.

"I'm so excited, I don't know what to say," said a very jubilant Willim moments after the triumph. "We had to regroup for the third game and ime out and played well, especially on defense."

After all the kills Hoeffler had in game two, Union Catholic did well to block a few of her kill attempts in game three. That enabled the Vikings to tie the game for a third time at 11-11 and then take the lead for good at 13-12.

At one point, after being down by a 10-6 score, Union Catholic went on a 13-3 run to take a 19-13 lead.

'We stepped it up with our blocking, that was a big difference in the third game," Union Catholic head coach Nancy Saggio said. "This is the county final, so it's not a time to tank it and start getting mental, so they settled themselves down and once we got a run going our confidence

When Union Catholic went ahead 13-12 in game three on a point off a Cranford serve, Viking senior libero Kristine Esguera served five consecutive points to give her team a commanding 17-12 lead.

Freshman Julie Monroy, a Rahway resident, also did a very good job helping her team gain points off her serves.

"After we beat them on Oct. 23, in two games we were comfortable thinking we knew their game," Saggio said, "They earned the No. 1 seed (Group 2) in the state tournament, so we knew they weren't going to lay down."

A kill by Hoeffler pulled Cranford to within 24-22 as the Cougars chipped away at Union Catholic's lead in game three before falling. On a Cranford point that made it 22-19, Cougar senior libero Kaitlyn Irwin came up with an excellent save of a low, hard-hit ball. She got the ball to junior middle hitter Emma Hansen, who won the point over the net for Cranford.
