



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# Final Rt. 35 leader pleads guilty; faces life sentence

RAHWAY --- The final member of the Route 35 Crew to plead guilty to a series of robberies and of weapons possession charges faces a sentence of life imprisonment and a \$250,000 fine, according to the U.S. District Attorney's Office.

Ruben Rosado, 31, of Rahway - one of the leaders of the crew accused of armed robbery, racketeering and sexual assault - is scheduled to be sentenced on March 16, before U.S. District Judge Joel Pisano. He is currently being held in the Union County jail. Rosado, however, has already been ordered to pay restitution - not yet determined — to his victims.

The store owners could not immediately be reached for comment. "We feel...very lucky," said Clelia, who purchased the winning ticket, "I was just in the grocery store, making my purchases, like I always have, and on my way out, I bought some Mega Millions tickets.'

According to the Lopeses attorney, Michael O. Bertone of Newark, they waited before coming forward because they were organizing their finances, tax issues and estate planning. "It took us a long time just to let the fact that we won sink in," Mario said in the press release, "We took our time and got some legal and financial advice from professionals. Clelia and I are pretty good with money, but when you're talking

\$75 million, well, it doesn't hurt to. have an expert opinion or two."

Clelia said she didn't realize she had the winning ticket until several days after the drawing. "I checked the numbers twice, and then we checked them together, and we checked them again," she said.

State Treasurer R. David Rousseau shared the Lopes's excitement when the family was presented their ceremonial check

at a press conference in Trenton Monday. "One of the greatest satisfactions the job of state treasurer holds is moments like this," Rousseau said.

At the press conference, The Lopes Family explained they plan to continue living in New Jersey and have no big plan to spend the money, but intend to sharing it with extended family in Portugal, where they are both from.

"We knew we'd be making our

players very happy this holiday season. The Lopes Family is living proof of that, even if their really big present came in July, rather than this month," acting Executive Director of the New Jersey Lottery William T. Jourdain said.

The Largest, single-ticket win in the New Jersey Lottery's 36year history was Harold and Helen Lerner, who were the sole winners of a Mega Millions jackpot of \$258 million on Sept. 16, 2005.

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

"We're always open to finding a Board common middle ground that can make both parties happy," said Hillside Office Park's attorney, Michael Holzapfel, with the Shrewsbury-based law firm Becker Meisel.

Dougherty said the applicant pushed for final approval several months later, without addressing the environmental concerns.

But Holzapfel said that according to state environmental law, the party responsible for the contamination of the site, Bristol Myers, is also responsible for its remediation.

He added the Planning Board has overstepped its bounds by denying final site plan approval. "The substance of the lawsuit was that in imposing that condition, the board is imposing on the jurisdiction of the DEP," Holzapfel said.

Representatives from DEP could not be reached for comment.



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


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

# Costa: Looting discovered

ROSELLE PARK --- The Nov. 18 fire that destroyed the Costa restaurant on Chestnut Street has attracted some less admirable behavior, according to police who arrested a 46-year-old man for allegedly looting the abandoned structure a week after the incident.

After Joseph Gratacos, 46, was charged with burglary, theft and possession of burglary tools Nov. 25, he allegedly committed lewd acts while being held at the police station, according to law enforcement officials.

Detective Sgt. Manuel Jimenez said Gratacos' arrest came after police saw him covered with soot County jail on \$35,000 bail. and ash and hauling a power washer down Chestnut Street.

The officer who approached Gratacos noticed he smelled of smoke, according to police reports.

The power washer was found to have been taken from a shed in the rear of the Costa restaurant property. Gratacos was also found with a rial@thelocalsource.com.

checkbook that was missing from an apartment above the restaurant.

"Gratacos was...close enough to the fire scene for the (officer) to figure what was happening," Jimenez said.

After being transported to police headquarters, Gratacos created a disturbance in the holding area, removing all his clothes, threatening officers and hurling his feces at the walls, police said.

Jimenez said Roselle Park police have had "encounters" with Gratacos in the past.

He received an additional charge of criminal mischief for damaging the station's holding area. His was held at the Union

Jimenez said that while the restaurant is not in danger of collapsing, it should be considered unsafe. "It's definitely a place ... no one should be walking through," he said.

my own success. Q: What programs have you initiated that you are

*most proud of?* A: I've had a number of programs people have really bought into. They include Reading First and our after-school tutoring program. The International Baccalau-reate program has been very successful and adds another dimension to our academics. Also Life Skills, a program for special peeds students.

Q: What areas of improvement did you try to focus on as superintendent?

A: Student achievement is very important to me. In the eyes of many people in this town, we once had a great school system, but I think we are heading back to that.

People have to realize accountability happens today in state testing that never existed before. I think it is very important we have that, but the penalties put on school districts by No Child Left Behind are crazy, in my opinion.

**Q**: What challenges did you face that the public nught not be aware of?

A: In anything I have done, I've always tried to out work people. With new technology, it is hard to do. Other challenges exist in putting board members, administrators and staff on the same path. I give a little bit of leadership, but I'm really nothing special. I am surrounded by great people, from staff to Board of Educations to mayors and the city council's past and present.

**Q:** Do you find Linden unique in the level of cooperation for schools?

A: Linden is unique. There are services that this town offers that are phenomenal. I only hope it can continue, because you don't get cooperation between the city, the community and the school system in

every town. When it comes to helping kids, there really is no jealousy in this town. Q: What is an example of a service that makes the

district stand out? A: Some people have questioned why we teach Chinese. Well, if you look at the big picture, China is going to be a major force in our civilization. Why not start now and not worry about it 10, 20 or 50 years from now, when these kids are grown up.

**Q:** How do you see education changing from 30 years ago to today?

A: The biggest change has come not only in technology but in the family. The ability of parents to stay at home with the kids in the evenings has changed. There is pressure on parents to work two or three jobs, or to be a single parent. There was more stability years ago.

**Q:** What are major challenges you think the district will face in the future?

A: One challenge I was never able to tackle was building a new high school. With the tax burden and building space, it became harder and harder, and now with the financial crisis, it's harder yet. That's one thing I'll have to leave for somebody else.

**Q:** What is one thing you won't miss about your job?

A: I really do work 24 hours a day. I wont miss being up to 4 or 5 a.m., when it snows. I'll miss the people, the kids, but I won't miss meetings.

Q: What are you planning to do after you retire? A: Now, I'm going to take a day off. I really don't have any plans, but I'm not going to be bored. Before

I die, I want to go back to Italy. All I know is it's time. I have had a great run. I'm probably here longer than I should have been, *(laughs)* but I'm very thankful.



# Towns push for funding **By Paul Greulich**

Local governments in several municipalities across Union County have announced their support for a resolution aimed at altering the distribution of money collected from traffic fines in order to give municipalities the majority of the funds.

Presently, half of the fine money for all moving violations goes to the county. This amounted to about \$4.5 million in 2007. The county puts this money toward expenses related to the maintenance of county roads as well as snow removal. Prior to the 1980s, the county received 100 percent of these fines. The new resolution hopes to alter the split, allowing 80 percent to be retained by the town while 20 percent is forwarded to the county.

The resolution was first proposed by Fanwood Councilman Anthony Parenti, who has served as the Fanwood police chief and director of the Union County Police Academy

"I just see how much it costs us to run the court and the police department," Parenti said. "Seeing as the municipalities are the ones paying for the court and the police, the split seems a little unfair."

Union County Public Information Director Sebastian D'Elia said the the important roadwork being carried out using the funds in question stills need to be performed, regardless of where the money comes from. Parenti said Fanwood sends the county about \$25,000 a year through the collection of fines from moving violations, which is what it costs the borough to run the court. Parenti said it is not fair that, in addition to the normal county property taxes, funds are being taken from a specific function of the communities See TOWNS, Page 18


According to the club's vice president, Robert Nalbone, all funds collected go towards the non-profit model train elub.



Scher has an extensive background as a television producer in the one-hour, talk format. His past work included serving as producer at "The Montel Williams Show" before becoming senior producer of the successful daytime talk show, "The Ricki Lake Show" and "The Queen Latifah Show,"

Scher, who currently lives in Los Angeles, still fondly remembers Cranford, which has served as a shooting location for numerous television shows and movies, such as the show "Pete and Pete."

Q: What sort of memories do you have of your hometown?

A: Cranford to me is a really unique town. I have friends I still speak with and there's something about Cranford. I think its like the center of the universe because no matter where I go I meet someone from Cranford, Cranford always



had a personality where the memories of growing up there are price-

Q: How did you become a TV producer?

A: Actually, it's all because of my aunt, Beverly Scher, who still lives in Cranford and teaches there. I got my degree in television broadcasting. I started at the bottom. I got rejection after rejection. Then my aunt was in the studio audience on the show "Everyday" with Joan London, and during a commercial break my aunt went up to Michael Krauss, one of the producers, and said "My nephew is trying to get a job in TV." He said, "Tell him to call me tomorrow." Within four days, I faxed my resume, had an interview and got hired. In TV you have to pay your dues so I started out sweeping the floors. That was in 1988.

Q: Describe your role in producing the show "The Doctors." What is your contribution?

A: As co-executive producer, I decide whether or not to go forward with a topic. I get pitched things every single day. I like to do stuff that's mainstream, that people around America can relate to.

Q: What is especially unique or memorable about this program?


A: There's no other show like that on the air now. We've taken a huge chance in giving medical info to the viewers every day. We provide so much information on everything from the common cold to the DaVinci surgery and ultimate makeovers.

Q: Do you need to have a strong stomach to deal with some of the medical topics that come up?







Congratulations to Governor Livingston, Johnson and Rahway for reaching state championship games and scoring first in them before bowing to the opposition.


GL reached only its second playoff final and first since 1989, falling to Caldwell 22-7 last Friday night in the North 2, Group 2 final at Giants Stadium.

Reavey was part of a special senior class at GL one that reached the playoffs every season.

"I'm real proud of my seniors every year, but these kids worked real hard and never gave up," said fifthyear GL head coach Terry Hanralty, who has guided GL to the playoffs every year he has been at the helm.

Caldwell, which needed to win on the cutoff date to qualify, finished an 8-4 season with five consecutive wins, the last four coming on the road - including all three playoff triumphs and a Thanksgiving eve victory over Butler.

GL, which was appearing in only its second playoff championship game and first since a 24-0 loss at New Providence in the 1989 North 2, Group 1 final, finished 7-5.

This fall, more than 100 CPAs are headed back to the classroom to discuss careers in accounting with more than 7,000 high school students.


As working professionals, these NJSCPA members are able to give students a realistic picture of what it takes to succeed in accounting and rewards accounting professionals can expect.
