

Cell tower rejected

CRANFORD - A cell tower will not have a home on the Cranford Swimming Club grounds, officials agreed after more than a year reviewing the application.

The township Zoning Board rejected the project in a unanimous vote at its Dec. 8 hearing on the application, which drew dozens of community members eager to voice their concerns during a block reserved for public comments.

Residents applauded the decision.

Officials opposed the plan on the basis that there might not be a gap in coverage and that the tower would have a negative affect on the surrounding parkland and residences. "Cell towers can be located anywhere, but you can't move a park," Zoning Board member Jeffrey Pistol said.

The applicant, Verizon, sought height and setback variances to erect the pole at the site in a residential area, near the county-owned Lenape Park and the historic Rahway River Park district. The tower would have been 120-feet-tall,



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

DBH school teacher saves man from burning vehicle

KENILWORTH --- Webster's Dictionary defines a hero as "one that shows great courage." John Ciborowski certainly meets every letter of that definition.

At 6:25 a.m. on Dec. 9, the 58year-old David Brearley High School science teacher was making his usual drive to work from his home in Pittstown, when he decided to take the scenic route through the Watchung Reservation, rather than driving along Route 22.

The beautiful scenery turned tragic when he happened upon a car ablaze in the Scotch Plains area of the reservation on Sky Top Drive.

me," Ciborowski said, "At first, I thought it was a police siren, maybe doing a traffic stop. When I got closer. I saw a car was burning through the hood and the wheel wells, and I saw there was someone in the driver's seat."

The sight pushed Ciborowski into action, though now, he said he is unsure where he got his confidence.

over and approached the burning vehicle.

He began banging on the windows, but it appeared the man, later identified as "Ron" by police, was sleeping. He attempted to open each door but the fire had created a vacuum in the car and the doors would not open. After some determination, however, he was able to opened one of the doors, which caused the fire to spread inside the car.

Ciborowski pulled the sleeping man to safety, patting out the fire that had spread to the man's jacket and sweater and walking him to his pick-up truck to wait for police and paramedics.

Ciborowski credited his quick "I saw a glowing light ahead of reaction, in part, to his experience as an assistant scout master of Troop 187 of Holland Township. "I ripped off his coat and noticed his sweater was on fire and remembered 'stop, drop and roll' from the scouts, so I jumped on him and smothered the fire," Ciborowski said.

The victim was brought to St. Barnabas Hospital's Burn Unit in Livingston, while Ciborowski reached at 908-686-7700.

Ciborowski pulled his truck was treated for second-degree burns to his face and fingers at Overlook Hospital in Summit. Police did not comment on

how the fire began. Ciborowski's wife, Marlene, feared the worst when she first received the phone call relating her husband's actions.

"When you hear the phone ring that early, you know it's not good news. I was relieved to hear he was OK, though," she said.

The father of an 18-year-old, Daniel, said he isn't surprised what a little adrenaline can do. "I didn't even think until well after, 'what if the car exploded with me in it?" "

David Brearley High School Principal Charles Cappello explained Ciborowski will be recognized as the school's "Teacher of the Month" by both the school and the Kenilworth Board of Education at the end of the month.

"Heroic, heroic, heroic," Cappello said referring to Ciborowski, "He saved a life. Without him, that man would not be alive today.'

Voting highlight of woman's long life

RAHWAY --- She has lived through six wars, the Great Depression, civil rights movements and the Cold War. She saw the first "Model-T" car built and was able to vote for the first time in 1932, a moment that stands out against all others in her life.

On Nov. 22, Josephine Lewis, celebrated her 100th birthday and received 100 roses from her only family, nieces Joan and Ann Kisner who live in California,

She said she has lived a humble life.

Born an orphan in Manhattan in 1908, Lewis lived at the New York Foundling Home for orphans until age 7. After that, she moved to St. Mary's Orphanage in Newark, where she stayed until she was 17 years old.

"I lived a very quiet life," she said. "I liked to read books and J enjoyed classical music."


Lewis remembers as a young girl she often played the piano, which then may have been a large, vertically strung wooden instrument, most likely handmade.

Lewis worked several jobs during her life, including holding a position as a saleswoman at a Rahway department store in the 1920s, a typical job for woman at that time. She has also worked as a bookkeeper, a cashier and as a nurse's aid at St. Michael's Hospital and later at the Woodbridge State School, neither of which exist today, before retiring in 1968.

Despite her heavy work schedule. Lewis recalls she was never too busy to lend a hand. "I always made time to volunteer," said Lewis, who met her late husband, Leroy, at a young age and was married at 20.

Memories of harder times, such as the Great Depression, do not come back to Lewis as easily. "I was too young to know and understand the significance of it," she said.

She said her greatest thrill was



"She has many friends," said Riverton nurse Rosa Engle. "She always has visitors."

Lewis now passes her bright life on to others, according to Engle. We all love Josephine," she said.



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Congressman-elect offers insight into district's future

CRANFORD - Congressman-elect Leonard Lance was on-hand during the recent Board of Education/Township Committee Alliance meeting to discuss how upcoming challenges at the state and federal level could impact Cranford schools.

While few community members attended the Dec. 10 forum, there was no shortage of questions and comments from the Alliance, comprised of township and school officials, as well as residents.

Lance, a Republican and Hunterdon County-native, steps into the seat vacated by Mike Ferguson, who opted not to run again after four terms. Lance is concluding a seven-year run as a state senator.

The topics raised by school and town officials included the possible reauthorization of the federal No Child Left Behind program, which was proposed in 2000 by President W. Bush. The law increased the standards of accountability for states, school districts and schools.

Lance expressed his uncertainty regarding this possibility. "It needs...modification, and I will not vote for a reauthorization unless there is a major modification," he said.

The most heated discussion surrounded state mandates, such as the state's unfulfilled obligation to fund Special Education and the upcoming full-day preschool requirement educators in Cranford and throughout the state have criticized for not being properly funded.

District Superintendent Gayle Carrick told Lance the mandates reflect a lack of input from local school districts. "We don't...have local control. We're told what to do and told to go out and find money for them," Carrick said.

Carrick could not be reached for further comment by press time.

Board member Camille Widdows said many state mandates are being handed down in rapid succession and then virtually forgotten by state officials who created them.

Widdows said what's worse, is no one is monitoring the long-term affect of these mandates to determine if they are effective or if they need revisions.

Mayor Robert Puhak said the Alliance has a responsibility to question state policies impacting schools and municipalities. "Our job is to look at areas of disparity and see how we can correct them," Puhak said.

Lance expressed sympathy with the plight of local educators and assured them he intends to practice "common sense and middle-of-the-road government."

Still, he painted a grim picture of what's to come, "We have difficult challenges in Trenton, as I'm sure you do in Cranford and Union County," Lance told officials, noting the recession has damaged the country's financial stability and is likely to complicate the 2009 school funding situation.

Lance noted he is doing what he can, saying he supported a freeze on all new state programs in light of the recession.

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Bus driver attacked

ROSELLE PARK - A New Jersey Transit bus driver is recovering since being punched in the face by a passenger at a bus stop two weeks ago.


The alleged assailant fled and has not been located by police, local law enforcement officials say.

The victim could not provide a description of the suspect and no witnesses were present.

The incident at approximately 8:30 p.m. on Dec. 3 occurred after the 94 bus line stopped at Chestnut Street and West Grant Avenue, near Borough Hall. The bus line travels between Bloomfield and Linden and makes stops in East Orange, Newark, Union and Roselle.

The driver was struck in the right eye by the suspect, according to NJ Transit spokesman John Dee. He would not speculate on the reason for the assault. "The operator was taken to St. Barnabas Hospital, in Livingston...he received nonlife-threatening injuries," Dee said.

Both Roselle Park and NJ Transit police responded to the scene, but the suspect was gone.





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

Clark, Villa lawsuit winding dow

CLARK --- A lawsuit against the township appears to be winding down, four years after the Villa Corporation filed suit over an ordinance to rezone about 300 parcels of township land containing various businesses for residential use.

The rezoning was in accordance with the town's master plan, which was revised in 2003. The lawsuit claimed property owners in the area had not been properly notified of this change,

The case, which is currently in the Appellate Division, had been defeated in Superior Court by Judge Ross Anzaldi, who struck down the ordinance in December 2007

The case is a lingering reminder of the deterioration of the township's relationship with the Villa Corporation.

Villa's attorney, Thomas Carroll, who also represented the corporation in a separate lawsuit "Realty Sites" case.

The Villa Corporation sold its property and left Clark in Spring 2008.

Township Attorney Joseph Triarsi had indicated to the council that court hearings have continued, although Carroll has since ceased to appear.

Triarsi also told council members this case represents the first time in his career he has gone to court, only to find the opposing attorney absent.

"We're kind of fighting the ghost of Villa," Mayor Sal Bonaccorso said.

Triarsi and Carroll did not return repeated calls for comment.

Among those properties set to be rezoned for residential use are several businesses, including Clark Power Equipment on Westfield Avenue, Owner Al Bonney said the

"It wouldn't help me at all," against the town, is handling the Bonney said. "The value of the property is probably less, being that it's a residential zone. I don't know what effect it has on all the new people who bought the Villa property."

Bonaccorso said he thinks the case should be dismissed, but he wants the court to be comfortable with the resolution. "I want to make sure things are done properly," he said.

Council members noted with a mixture of dismay and humor that by the time this matter is settled. yet another master plan review will be due.

Bonaccorso said the intended rezoning, which was stalled by the lawsuit, will probably be put into place as part of the 2009 review. That's the funny part about it," he said.

Impaired drivers targeted

CRANFORD — Cranford Police Department is again stepping up driving enforcement.

"Existing patrols will focus their attention on apprehending drunk drivers," Detective Sgt. Gerard Quinn said.

The program is in effect from from Dec. 8 to Jan. 2.

Police Chief Eric Mason said the department will continue the campaign police have participated in during the holiday season for years, because it is effective in the community.

Impaired driving kills nearly 18,000 people in the U.S. each year, according to the New Jersey Department of Highway Traffic Safety.

The "Over the Limit, Under Arrest" campaign is part of a national effort launched in 1999 to remove drivers under the influence of narcotics and alcohol from roadways, as well as raise awareness about the dangers of drinking and driving during the busiest travel times of the year, during holiday seasons.

"This ...program...can save lives during a time of the year when impaired driving traditionally increases by nearly 10 percent," said Director of the New Jersey Division of Highway Traffic Safety, Pam Fischer. "This initiative brings attention to not only the serious fines and penalties drunk drivers can face, but the grave dangers these motorists pose to all individuals on the road."

Local law enforcement officials made nine drunk driving arrests in December 2006 and 10 such arrests in December 2007, according to the Traffic Division.

Mason said police will not pay special attention to specific areas in town. "We include all the roadways in our enforcement," he said.

Cranford Police advise individuals who are planning to drink to choose a designated driver, spend the night where the activity involving drinking is held or take advantage of public transportation.

Those convicted on drunk driving charges face lines ranging from \$250 to \$1,000, suspension of a driver's license, community service or jail time. Motorists on the road can protect themselves against impaired drivers by wearing their seat belts and reporting questionable behavior, to law enforcement.

Festival of Lights

The Jewish festival of rededication, also known as Hanukkah or the Festival of Lights, is an eight-day festival that begins at sundown on Sunday and celebrates the miracle of the candles.


Around 200 B.C., Jews lived as an autonomous people in the land of Israel, also referred to as Judea, which at that time was controlled by the Seleucid king of Syria. By 175 B.C., Antiochus IV Epiphanes ascended to the Seleucid throne. At first little changed but, under his reign, the Temple in Jerusalem was looted, Jews were massacred and Judaism was effectively outlawed. In 167 B.C., Antiochus ordered an altar to Zeus erected in the temple.


Antiochus' actions provoked a large-scale revolt and, by 165 B.C., the Jewish revolt was successful. The temple was liberated and rededicated. After recovering Jerusalem and the temple, Judah ordered the temple to be cleansed, a new altar to be built in place of the polluted one and new holy vessels to be made. According to the Talmud, olive oil was needed for the menorah in the temple, which was required to burn throughout the night every night, but there was only enough oil to burn for one day. Miraculously, it burned for eight days, the time needed to prepare a fresh supply of oil for the menorah. An eight-day festival was declared by the Jewish sages to commemorate this miracle.

Although Hanukkah doesn't have the religious significance of Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur or Passover, more emphasis is placed on what the rabbi teaches for this holiday and it actually carries a great deal of importance. For this holiday, there are nine candles lit on the menorah: the shammus or servant candle, which lights the others, and one candle for each day of the miracle. Fried foods are eaten because of the significance of oil, usually latkes or potato paneakes. And, while gift-giving is not a traditional part of the holiday, it has become customary in the United States, especially with younger children. The only traditional gift of the holiday is "gelt," small amounts of money.

The reason for the Hanukkah lights is not for the "lighting of the house within," but rather for the "illumination of the house without," so that passers-by should see it and be reminded of the holiday's miracle. For the Festival of Lights, celebrate the miracles God provides in our lives every day. Big or small, these miracles are a testament to our faith and the participation of God in our lives.

We wish everyone a happy Hanukkah.



Zieser, the father of three college-aged children, was part of the Newark Police Department between 1973 and 2008. The 18-year veteran had been the youngest officer in the country when he was hired by the NPD. He had lived in Union for several years before moving to Clark.

He last served as Newark's chief of operations, reducing a \$14 million over-time budget to \$8 million by the end of his career as chief of operations --- at the time, 900 officers reported to him.

Zieser said his main goals now include getting Union's 170-staff department involved with surrounding towns' law enforcement agencies, streamlining communication with the township administration and, most importantly, maintaining a budget that won't cost any jobs in the current economic crisis.

He was victim to budget-related layoffs twice during his first few years on the Newark force, including the year he was married, "When you experience it personally and have to turn in your gun and badge, it's a heartbreaker," he said.

Zieser pointed to numerous shared services with other departments that could cost little and get a big

return in terms of staff. He hopes to send officers to joint task forces, like the Union County Homicide unit, where one Union officer is current working, and Essex/Union County Auto Task force.

"Union PD historically has been considered an island. They haven't really gotten involved with county or state police," he said. "But, if you donate one guy to the [task force], on certain nights, I may get 15 gays in return."

He also hopes to add new technology, like dashboard cameras, expand the tactical anti-crime unit and possibly change the number of officers on duty in a given shift based on the township's crime statistics per time of day.

Zieser said he is aware of political disputes surrounding the police director position, which translated into a morale problem for the department, but noted he is confident his background in law enforcement will rally his new charges.

"As long as you show you are behind them 100 percent, that means a lot," Zieser said.

Zieser begins work as police director Jan. 1.

Kimmins sympathized with the Zoning Board, saying she understood the difficulties it faced.

An attorney for the group of local residents who opposed the plan, John Schmidt of Lindabury, McCormiek, Estabrook and Cooper, said Verizon did not provide thorough information or the coverage the tower would provide.

"This applicant failed to show not only a significant gap in coverage but any gap in coverage," said Schmidt.

Verizon's attorney, Greg Meese of Price, Meese, Shulman and D'Arminio based in Woodeliff Lake, said the proposal was based not on everyday usage, but on the maximum usage that could be expected in the future.

"You don't base your building codes on withstanding the average wind, you base them on a strong wind," Meese said.

Cranford may not have seen the last of this proposal.


Once the Zoning Board passes a formal resolution denving the application, the applicant has 45 days to appeal the decision in court, which Schmidt said is the likely course of action for Verizon. "With the amount of litigation that has gone on in the past involving cell towers, I am confident this will be appealed by the carriers," he said.

Live Trees: Water the tree daily. A 6 foot tree will absorb 1 or more quarts of water per day. When you purchase the tree, ask the merchant to give the tree a fresh cut and then as soon as possible, place the tree in a secured stand with water. Trees can absorb as much as 1 gallon of water over the 1st dav.

Artificial Trees: Make sure the tree is "fire resistant" and never use electric lights on a metallic tree. Place the tree in a secure stand capable of keeping the tree upright.

All Trees: Secure all types of trees to the wall or ceiling and keep them away from heat sources, sparks or flames. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways, never use candles on any type of tree.

Use only noncombustible or flame resistant materials to trim any tree type.

Be sure to periodically check the lights on the tree to insure that they do not get too hot. Unplug and remove any set that feel hot to the touch.

Tax relief for UC towns

Towns can defer pension payments By John O'Reilly

UNION COUNTY Local municipal governments are receiving an early Christmas present from Gov. Jon Corzine that may temporarily save millions of dollars over the next four years.

In an effort to ease the tax burden for local governments during the current economic troubles, the state, through the proposed Economic Assistance and Recovery Plan, will allow towns to defer some of their annual pension payments until 2012. Businesses will also benefit as the state is awarding grants to help pay for newly hired employees or business repairs.

"As much as I prefer another course, I proposed this deferral simply as a practical bridge over today's economic circumstances while reflecting the state's reduced fiscal capacity for direct aid," Gov. Corzine said in a news release announcing his plan. "Given the unprecedented nature of the deferral, this action must translate into property tax relief, not business-as- Roselle Sewerage Authority.

Cranford man earns top job By John O'Reilly

CRANFORD --- Local resident Ralph J. Marra was recently appointed New Jersey's leading lawyer after serving as a top aid in the state's U.S. Attorney's Office.

Marra, 55, is serving as acting U.S. Attorney, temporarily filling the vacancy left after the popular Christopher Christie resigned on Dec. 1.

Christie leaves behind a legacy of high profile prosecutions that often put corrupt politicians in the state's crosshairs. He has convicted more than 130 elected or appointed officials.

During his tenure, there were also numerous convictions in violent crimes and several large child exploitation rings.

"It has been the greatest professional experience of my life to serve in the Department of Justice, to serve with the dedicated people in this office and to serve the people of New Jersey," he wrote in a letter of resignation to the Attorney General.

He did not give a reason for stepping down as the U.S. attorney, but many are speculating he is preparing a run for governor in the next election.

Marra had been Christie's first assistant prosecutor since March of 2002, a few months after he was first appointed U.S. attorney.

Prior to that, the longtime civil servant worked in the U.S. Attorney's Office as an assistant prosecutor since 1985 and has taken on many high profile cases. Marra was the lead attorney against former state Sen. Wayne Bryant, who was found guilty in November of getting paid for a no-show job from New Jersey's School of Osteopathic Medicine in return for securing the school more than \$10 million dollars of state funding.

"The U.S. Attorney's Office has never been more effective in all areas of prosecution. It's a record and reputation I intend to continue," Marra vowed during the announcement of Christie's resignation.

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He will remain in the position until June 28, 2009, or until a presidential appointment is made and the U.S. Senate confirms it. If no federal appointment is made by June 28, the Attorney General may appoint an interim U.S. Attorney.

'Marijuana bill' heads to Senate

New Jersey has moved a step closer to becoming one of a handful of states to allow the use of medical marijuana, under certain circumstances.

After hearing testimony Monday morning from several people who believe they would benefit from the use of medical marijuana, the Senate Health Committee agreed to advance \$119, The New Jersey Compassionate Use Medical Marijuana Act.


"When all other avenues of cur-

defer \$2.7 million. Information about municipalities throughout the state and their eligibility through the program is available at http://www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions/epbam/exhibits/pdf/2009-persbilling-50revised.pdf. Corzine proposed his Economic Assistance and Recovery Plan to the New Jersey Legislature in October. The bill is facing stiff opposition in Trenton. Some critics have called it fiscally irresponsible and the state Senate delayed the voting until next month in order to secure its passage.

Across the state, the deferrals will save property taxpayers a total of \$540 million next year, said Corzine's spokeswoman, Gloria Montealegre. The plan allows governments to pay 50 percent of their required contributions for 2009, 60 percent in 2010 and 80 percent in 2011. Full payments will resume in 2012 and will be larger to compensate for the lost payments during the prior three years. Montealegre compared the plan to the restructuring of a home mortgage.

"Absent this temporary deferral, some communities would have to raise local taxes to unbearably high levels at the precisely wrong time, or make unacceptable sacrifices to the public in the delivery of critical municipal services in such areas as public safety, public health and education," she said.

Some officials are not fully sold on the plan however, saying taxpayers will have to pay the same, whether its charged next year or in three.

"It's the usual pay me now or pay me later," said Linden mayor Richard Gerbounka, who said the only benefit would be putting the amount saved in the bank and accruing some interest.

Aside from municipal governments, local business owners can expect help as well from the state. The governor has implemented Invest NJ as a way to save local jobs. The plan provides businesses with a \$3,000 grant for each new job they create. The proposed initiative also provides a grant equal to 7 percent of any qualified capital investment of more than \$5,000 - including business upgrades such as a new computer system through Jan. 1, 2011.

(Continued from Page 20) Committee, voted against the proposed bill. Kean, who represents the 21st Legislative District, which includes parts of Union County, could not be reached for comment as of press time.

The pending legislation states that "compassion dictates that a distinction be made between medical and non-medical uses of mariiuana."

Under the bill, the use of medical marijuana, as prescribed by a physician under strict guidelines, would be permitted for patients with "debilitating medical conditions" such as cancer, glaucoma and chronic pain associated with illnesses such as multiple sclerosis or Crohn's disease.

"When we talk about medical marijuana, we're not talking about hardened criminals looking to get a buzz," Scutari said. "We're talking about otherwise-law-abiding citizens who have no other treatment options, and who have found some measure of relief and comfort from the smoking of marijuana. We should not treat these folks as criminals, and should take some of the stigma off taking marijuana for medicinal purposes."

The bill now heads to the full Senate for consideration.







Principal encourages creativity with improv

"Improv" is a term usually associated with a comedy routine or a musical performance. Short for "improvisation," improv relies on the use of what's at hand, audience involvement, and performing without a script.

And now, thanks to the efforts of an enthusiastic elementary school principal, the captivating, imaginative and adventurous energy of improv is being introduced into classes in the Summit Public Schools.

Matt Carlin, principal of Lincoln-Hubbard School in Summit, became intrigued with the concept of classroom improv during a graduate course in "Play and Learning Development," taught by Carrie Lobman at Rutgers University.

'This was by far the best course I took during my graduate work," said Carlin. "I took a lot back to the classroom from this experience."

Lobman is an Improv comedian in New York City and also works with teachers on how to bring improvisation into the classroom.

"The fundamentals of Improv are about taking risks, building an ensemble or a team --- in this case the teacher and students, building on each person's contributions, and not negating any of those contributions," Carlin said.

Inspired to share his enthusiasm with his Summit colleagues, Carlin offered a series of after-school workshops for teachers. Ten teachers enrolled in the course and classes are being held weekly. With a Summit Educational Foundation grant, Carlin purchased for each teacher in the course a copy Lobman's book on "Unscripted Learning," co-authored by Matthew Lundquist,

"The book explains the fundamentals of the concept, explaining the research that's been done on play and learning development," said Carlin. "It also includes many activities and exercises teachers can do in the kindergarten through eighth grade classroom and across all subject areas." Carlin explained that by using the suggested techniques in the classroom an "ensemble" begins to develop among the students and teachers.







Cranford boys' basketball has a deep team this year Fanelli is only returning starter

The future appears bright for the Cranford boys' basketball team.

The present will be a learning experience.

The Cougars are working hard and getting along without the presence of 2008 graduate Simon Smith, a 6-4 forward who took with him his more than 1,000 points and 1,006 rebounds to Hudson County and Stevens Tech.

"Not many players in the state score 1,000 points and grab 1,000 rebounds," third-year head coach Ryan Huber said of Smith's accomplishments as a talented Cranford player.

Senior guard Adam Fanelli (6-1) is the only returning starter and junior forward Will Green (6-4) is the only other player who participated in every game last season.

"A lot will fall on Adam's shoulders," Huber said. "He's a shooter, but he has developed his game to go the basket a bit more."

Fanelli averaged 8.3 points and Green 6.4 and 3.5 rebounds in a 14-9 playoff season last year.

"We only have 14 points a game coming back," Huber said. "We'll need Adam to get 15-16 points a game for us to be successful."

Green is the No. 1 big man now and will also be expected to step up his production.

"Will has a tough act to follow in Simon." Huber said. "We're not expecting him to give us the same kind of numbers as Simon did, but the Huber said. majority."

Key backcourt players include junior Alex Porter (5-11), junior Nick Pace (5-10) and sophomores Sean Trotter and Joe Papandrea, both 5-10.

"We don't have a go-to guy yet. Now teams will have to defend all five guys. It could be anybody.'

The lone freshman on the varsity roster is 6-4 forward Chris Gross, who has a lot of potential.

"He has the ability to be one of the very good ones in Union County before he graduates," Huber said. "He's a very talented player, but he has to work hard to get to the next level."




Other Union County teams in CJ, G2 include Governor Livingston, Hillside, Johnson and Roselle. "It's a bit of a break from North 2, Group 3,"

Linden boys' basketball, led by Bruce, big up front

Although the Linden boys' basketball team lost the services of a First Team All-State player in Desmond Wade to graduation, the Tigers may have another one in 6-10, 205 pound senior forward David Bruce.

It's now up to Bruce - who has given a verbal commitment to attend St. Joseph's, Pa. - to prove he is good enough to merit such lofty praise.

"He's finally starting to see the light," Linden head coach Phil Colicchio said. "Perhaps it was getting his college commitment out of the way.

"He had his ups and downs this summer and he suffered for it. He's better for it too.'

Bruce had signature games last year - such as his career-high 34-point, 18-rebound effort in a 74-57 home win over Irvington and led Linden with 16 points and eight rebounds in its 47-38 Union County Tournament semifinal win over Union at the Dunn Center and also paced the Tigers with 18 points in their 49-44 home win over Plainfield in the North 2, Group 4 semifinals.

However, there were clunkers at Union in the regular season and vs. Piscataway in the North 2, Group 4 final.

"He's improved an awful lot," Colicchio said. "Away from the basket he's facing up a little bit and has played some wing for us.

"His strengths are still his rebounding and blocking shots, which I think he does as well as anyone in the state. He may be the best big man in the state."

Collechio said that in scrimmages Bruce has scored more, with the Tigers making a real good effort of trying to get the ball into him.

"He's now the focal point," Colicchio said. "Our kids realize that we need to get the ball to him in the low post. There he can be pretty unstoppable."

Sophomore Elijah Hodge (5-10) is the point guard, with Bruce joined in the front court by 6-5 senior forward Tevin Calhoun, 6-2 senior forward Romell Bateman and 6-4 junior forward Qadeer Lewis.

"Our strength is in the front court as we're as big as we've ever been," Colicchio said, "We're starting fourbigs and one guard."

When asked what Linden basketball is like post-Desmond Wade, Collechio said: "We had to move on after players such as Jamaal Tate, Tony Wilson and Michael Henderson and we managed to do quite well."

"It's never easy when you lose a great player. It's a big adjustment for me moreso because we're so young in the backcourt. I've been blessed with seasoned guards. These kids are okay and Hodge is still only a sophomore and a lot will be placed on his shoulders this year. Some of the other guards we have coming back do not have a lot of playing time."

Bateman, who Colicchio says plays more like he's 6-8 with the way he goes after rebounds and gets them, led Linden with 10 boards in its UCT semifinal win over Union. You might see him filling up the hoop a bit more this season. "He's really stepped up his game," Collectio said.

"His game has changed a lot. He's extremely powerful inside, a Charles Barkley type of player.

"He's handling the ball for us too and taking it out on the wing at times. He's been creating matchup problems for people in the pre-season. Since we have just one guard, it will be handling the ball by committee."

Lewis is a player that Colicchio will be counting on a lot more this season as well.

"He's scoring more and is playing better around the basket," Colicchio said. "He had a really good summer for us and has grown up since his sophomore year. He's a leader and a captain of our team."

Colicchio said the team captains for the upcoming season include Lewis and senior guard Billy Bourgouin.

"Our own expectations are the same," Colicchio said. Players graduate, but we still try to go out and win titles. "Each team, every year, is its own team. Last year we were fortunate enough to win the conference again. This team has not won anything yet. We will try to win another one."

Colicchio also feels that this might be the strongest the Watchung Conference has ever been.

"Talent wise. Plainfield has a bunch of veteraus returning and a new coach (former South Plainfield coach Jeff Lubreski) who is very good and has been around," Colicchio said. "Elizabeth has a player like senior Raymond Graham, who competes and has been playing since he was a freshman. Irvington is so wellcoached and you have teams like Shabazz and Newark East Side - night in and night out is very challenging."

"I see our conference this year as similar to the Big East - really good players and really good coaches. Union is another team on the uprise and has improved." · See roster and schedule on JR's Sports Blog at

The Union boys' basketball team accomplished a lot during the 2007-2008 season and became a real player in Union County once again.

Union's 21-7 record, its best since a 20-5 finish in 1999-2000 and its first winning season since a 15-10 mark in 2002-2003, included the Farmers reaching the Union County Tournament and North 2, Group 4 semifinals for the first time since 2000.
