

## Mayor: Employees should contribute to benefits in '09

LINDEN - City officials staring down the looming financial crisis that is squeezing most municipalities pledged to keep finances afloat at the governing body's annual reorganization meeting last

In addition to typical housekeeping, like swearing in new council members and making appointments to committees, officials asked residents and city employees to prepare for a tough

With all labor union contracts set to be renegotiated in 2009, mayor Richard Gerbounka challenged the council's Negotiation Committee to force city workers to pay into their health benefits.

Though the four council members sworn in, including newcomer Richard Puschell, 10th Ward, along with incumbents Derek Armstead. 4th Ward; Robert Sadowskii 6th, and Michele Yamakaitis, 8th, are in the Democratic majority against the Independent mayor, Gerbounka said reaching across the isle for this plan is crucial to stabilizing city

In his State of the City Address. Gerbounka noted most private industry and other government posts in the nation are requiring employees to pay into their health coverage. "It is time for city employees to do likewise. I ask our Negotiation Committee to hold firm on significant employee contributions," Gerbounka declared.

In addition to reducing spending, whe mayor's speech also touched on plans to stimulate development in the city, bringing in See CITY, Page 13

## Deadly accidents pile up

UNION - A collision on Route 78 in Union left at least two motorists dead and brought traffic in the area to a standstill Monday, less than a week after a pedestrian was killed crossing Morris Avenue.

The Route 78 accident occurred in the Eastbound express lane near

State police say the seven-car pile-up began around 10:42 a.m., when a dump truck swerved from the Westbound lane into the east express lane and hit a tractor trailer.

The rig jackknifed into the path of five "passenger cars," which were also showered with rocks and dirt from the overturned dump truck.

Janet Adamko, 46, of South Brunswick and Laura Hibbler, 47, of Northampton, Pa., both of whom were in their cars driving to work, were pronounced dead at the scene, according to police.

State police say they are investigating what caused the accident, but have not filed any charges yet.

The dump truck driver Brian Perhacs, 28, of East Brunswick suffered minor injuries, along with three other unidentified drivers.

Perhaes was treated and released from University Hospital in Newark, said state police spokesman Stephen Jones.

Traffic on 78 East was backed up for the rest of the day, as far back as the Millburn exit. Route 24 was also clogged, nearly to the Short Hills Mall at least three hours after the accident.

The second fatal motor vehiclerelated accident occurred Jan. 6.

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





## Union native welcomes 2009, 100

UNION — As the world was preparing to ring in the new year, Lillian Patton Carter was celebrating her 100th birthday at home, surrounded by her family.

Carter was born in her parents' home in Newark on Jan, 1, 1909 - the same year United States troops left Cuba after being there since the Spanish-American War, William Taft was the president, the Manhattan Bridge was opened for the first time and the NAACP was established.

"Living in Union my whole life has also been great," Carter said of her beloved hometown. Putting it simply, she said, "It's a good place."

Carter devoted her life to both teaching and her family, says her daughter Beth Hanscom, who lives in Westfield.

She said she was one of the lucky ones to have a job during the Great Depression years, working at the Newark Museum and then teaching third grade in the Hillside Public School system.

Carter was married on June 30, 1938 to Deward Carter, who died in 2004 at age 99. Once she was married, she left teaching to become a full-time homemaker.

"Family was always important reached at Carter attended both Newark to me," said Carter, who also and Hillside public schools, and enjoys knitting blankets and

sweaters for them and playing cards with friends and occasionally striking up a tune on the piano "We do not sing along," Hanscom said. "Our family has terrible voices in it," she joked.

After leaving her job, Carter became an active member of the newly formed First Baptist Church of Union.

In the late 40s, she was the director of the Vacation Bible School and also served as superintendent of her church's Sunday School.

Carter still spends many hours with the family she devoted most of her life to, including her one daughter and six grandchildren.

When asked the secret to her longevity, Carter responded, "I try to take care of myself. And, I eat a lot of vegetables."



## Tuition deduction still available



The 2008 law reinstated the expired deduction for qualified higher education expenses paid in 2008 and 2009. Single filers may deduct up to \$4,000 if adjusted gross income (AGI) is \$65,000 or less (AGI of \$130,000 or less for joint filers). The deduction limit drops to \$2,000 for AGI up to \$80,000 for single filers and

\$160,000 for joint filers. No deduction is allowed over these income thresholds.



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

## City gets ready for deer hunt

SUMMIT -- The city is preparing to conduct its annual Deer Reduction Program, which will entail paid hunters shooting and killing deer in various areas from Wednesday through March

seven-year-old hunt, authorized by the City Council, will take place at the Passaic River Park, Hidden Valley Park, the city's transfer station property and Union County property along and near Glenside Avenue.

City Administrator Chris Cotter said 21 hunters employed by Deer Management Systems are licensed to participate, but only three or four will be active at any given time.

For safety reasons, the hunters will fire from tree stands only, discharging shotguns loaded with slugs into specific baited areas.

During an aerial flyover in March 88 deer were spotted within city limits. Cotter said the actual number is likely higher than this estimate. "The rate of reproduction is considerable, and Summit of course, has open borders," Cotter said, pointing out the proximity of the Watchung Reserva-

highways separating the municipality from most of its neighbors.

Cotter indicated the New Jersey Division of Fish and Wildlife said deer should not be living in Summit. "A community like Summit cannot ... accommodate them,"

He said deer roaming the city damage flowers and gardens in residential areas, and the understory in wooded areas. However, city official's primary concern is safety, "Vehicle and deer accidents can be deadly, and not just for an animal," Cotter said.

Deer caused more than 50 car accidents in Summit in the last five years. Cotter said two deerrelated motor vehicle accidents occurred in 2008.

The hunt has managed to cut deer-related motor vehicle accidents. An average of 34 deer are killed in the hunt each year, according to Cotter.

The city acquired consent forms signed by property owners and those residing within 450 feet of the hunting sites, but officials continue to pursue approval to use additional hunting grounds, particularly a wooded area surrounding a small stream, Salt Brook, by

While state officials believe New Jersey's deer population is still too high, Yuhas said there exists no figure estimating what it should

## Mountainside youth rebuilds near Gaza

MOUNTAINSIDE — The goal was to raise money to build a bomb shelter with an indoor playground for youths living in the war-battered community of Sderot, Israel.

Jocelin Thau achieved more than that during her recent trip to the country, made possible through the "Greeks Build Israel," a program at Muhlenberg College in Pennsylvania. The program allows fraternities and sororities to participate in philanthropy work - their focus. The trip to Israel is designed for students who have already visited the country.

Thau, 20, said she experienced the "everyday lives of Israeli citi-

"In this community, there are bomb shelters every 100 feet outside, but children only have 15 seconds to get to one once an alarm is sounded," Thau said about what drew her to the cause."These kids should have an opportunity to play like normal children."

The Mountainside native traveled to an area near the Gaza Strip a massive Israeli airstrike devastated many areas in the Gaza Strip, causing widespread destruction Dec. 27 — with approximately 40 of her fellow sorority sisters Dec. 28. In nine days they planted trees, worked at soup kitchens and painted buildings.

Thau said daily thanks from natives was heartwarming. "We didn't think we were doing anything special, but the people really appreciated it," she said.

Each student who applied for the trip in November was required to raise \$950 dollars for the cause. Thau's group raised much more than that with a single contribution, a \$40,000 gift from The Wax Fam-

ily of Allentown, Pa. The family often supports cultural trips taken by Muhlenberg students.

The Wax Family could not be reached for comment earlier this

The money helped the Jewish National Fund and the Israel On-Campus Coalition, two national organizations, build the largest indoor recreational facility in Israel, a facility protected against rockets launched by Hamas in nearby Gaza, Thau explained.

Jocelin's father, Stuart, said he trusted his daughter and the people running the trip to the Middle East to keep the group out of danger, despite the obvious risks in the

"As a father, I had some concerns. But (Jocelin) just has that kind of social conscience where she needs to help. When my wife and I looked at it, we decided the benefits greatly outweighed the risks."

Jocelin's mother, Ina, also had some reservations. She was relieved after doing some research. "I realized how tight the security is," she said.

This trip was Thau's second to

Last year, she traveled to the Middle East as a part of the Birth Right Program at Muhlenberg. But that trip was more of a vacation to see tourist attractions, Thau admitted. While there, she was able to make several friends, whom she still attempts to keep in contact

She said her recent voyage left her feeling stronger. "Being there really opened my eyes. Our help was needed, even if it was just peeling potatoes at a soup kitchen."



## Mayor: Action plan could help Summit through tough times

SUMMIT - The 2009 Common Council doesn't look much different than in 2008, but municipal finances will, according to officials who say they are taking action.

Ellen Dickson, who was chosen as council president, and Michael Vernotico, who was selected as president pro tem, took the dais on Jan. 6, after having been re-elected to council in November.

Dickson said the council has not implemented a hiring freeze, but may consider it after looking at the first draft of the city budget, which is expected to be made public in upcoming weeks.

"We are entering uncharted territory," Dickson said about preparing the city budget at one of the most difficult economic times in

Mayor Jordan Glatt tried to

the City Address.

'Not all the good news has vanished," Glatt said. "Summit still has three big advantages that ought to be as fundamental to our future as they have been to our past and present: location, transportation and education,"

Keeping Summit's strengths in mind, Glatt proposed a three-part action plan to solidify the city's future. The first part includes restructuring the city in order to control costs. "Shared services are a huge part of the answer here," Glatt said. Summit is currently sharing health services, fire dispatch and equipment with nearby municipalities. Glatt proposed sharing municipal courts, recycling and tax assessment as well.

Part two in Glatt's action plan involves revitalizing the Summit's downtown. "A weak downtown is a

remain positive during his State of of the city's core strengths: location and transportation access," the mayor said.

> Glatt suggested a parking garage be built downtown as a way of relieving the parking issue in the area, as well as to spur downtown investment. Currently, 98 percent of downtown parking spaces are three filled at peak periods of the day, according to the mayor. He expects construction of a garage to begin in the first quarter of 2009.

The third part of the proposed plan is investing in the community. According to the mayor, one of Summit's largest draws is education, but the city must also invest in sustainability, the infrastructure and affordable housing.

Glatt wrapped up the meeting with a final pledge to lead the city through trying times.

## Villa: Appellate court judge rules in favor of town

CLARK - A lawsuit filed against the township by the nowdefunct Villa Corporation has been settled in favor of the town on the appellate level, reversing a prior Superior Court ruling in favor of the company.

The lawsuit, filed in 2005, opposed a 2003 ordinance to rezone about 300 parcels of township land for residential use. The

land was occupied by various businesses, some of which were owned by Villa. The rezoning was part of a revision to the town's Master Plan. In the lawsuit Villa claimed property owners in the area had not been properly notified of the change.

The Appellate Division found state statues, requiring personal notice to residents, did not apply in the case of changes related to the municipality's Master Plan.

The court's decision states in

required to provide personal notice affected property owners because the changes to the zoning implemented by the ordinance were the result of a reexamination of the Master Plan."

Township attorney Joseph Triarsi said he was not surprised by the decision. "It was...predictable and...consistent with the statutes," Triarsi said.

## Agreement signed on Riverfront plan

CRANFORD - A redevelopment agreement between the township and Garden Homes means the long-delayed Riverfront Redevelopment project will move forward.

Next, Garden Homes will be seeking additional local, county and state approval for necessary environmental cleanup, flood fringe permits and sanitary sewer improvements. The proposal must be brought before the township's Planning Board within 120 days. This approval process will likely last throughout 2009, according to Garden Homes' Redevelopment Director, Tony DiGiovanni.

Though the agreement for the \$30 million mixed-use project was signed by the 2008 Township Committee on Dec. 23, DiGiovanni said he has no reservations about moving forward with the current governing body, which includes two commissioners who voted for it last

year. Incoming Commissioners Dan Aschenbach and Mark Dugan did not return calls for comment.


The township began negotiating with the Short Hills-based developer in July 2008, after several attempts to revitalize the 3-acre site at the intersection of South Avenue and High Street involving other developers fell apart.

Garden Homes' proposal calls for the construction of four buildings. Approximately 244 parking spaces would be added.

The residential component includes 106 units - 16 are for affordable housing. About 21,835square-feet of retail space and 13,900-square-feet of office space will also be included. DiGiovanni does not anticipate changes to the plans. "A great amount of time was spent to make sure we don't have to," he said.



## Getting to the promised land

Monday is Martin Luther King Jr. Day, when our nation honors the life and accomplishments of this great civil rights leader.

A federal holiday since former President Ronald Reagan signed a bill creating it in 1983, the holiday was moved in 1992 from Jan. 20 to the third Monday in January and has been observed in all 50 states since 2000.

King was born Jan. 15, 1929, in Atlanta. The son of a reverend, there was little surprise he enrolled in theological seminary, later earning a bachelor's degree in divinity.

After he earned his doctorate in philosophy, King became a husband, father and Baptist minister, but the civil rights movement soon captured much of his attention.


In his quest for civil rights, King led the 1955 Montgomery Bus Boycott and helped found the Southern Christian Leadership Conference in 1957, serving as its first president.

King's efforts led to the 1963 March on Washington, where King delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech. There, he raised public consciousness of the civil rights movement and established himself as a great orator.

On Oct. 14, 1964, he became the youngest recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize, which was awarded to him for leading non-violent resistance to end racial prejudice in the United States.

While in Memphis to offer his support for striking black public-works employees, King was assassinated on April 4, 1968. Rather than being forgotten in death, King's life and message initiated changes throughout the United States which continue to this day.

King's words, spoken on April 3, 1968, the last day of his life, have even more importance today: "We've got some difficult days ahead. But it doesn't matter with me now. Because I've been to the mountaintop... And I've looked over. And I've seen the promised land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight that we, as a people, will get to the promised land. And I'm happy, tonight. I'm not worried about anything. I'm not fearing any man. Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord."



## Pre-school center set to open

By Joseph M. D'Alise Staff Writer

ROSELLE PARK — The wait is over for the Roselle Park School District and parents anxious to send their pre-school-age children to the new John J. Adase Early Childhood Development Center.

School officials say the school two years in the making — will open its doors by the end of Janu-

A portion of the property, where a playground is located, will remain closed.

"We anticipate the Certificate of Occupancy by the end of the week," Superintendent Patrick Spagnoletti said Monday.

The delay in construction was caused, in part, by the state Department of Environmental Protections' concerns surrounding contamination at the property on West Webster Avenue.

High levels of zinc were found on the school's playground in 2007. The DEP stepped in, suggesting soil be replaced in the area. The DEP did not return calls to confirm the extent of the contamination.

Though T-Slack Environmental been hired in August to clean up the site, recently adjusted DEP standards, allowing 23,000 parts per billion of zinc to be in soil, established the levels were safe.

"The property is no longer being reviewed by the DEP, and now, it's in the hands of the New Jersey Early Childhood and Licensing Division," Spagnoletti said.

While the school building is open, another contaminate found on the playground will keep that area off limits to youngsters through March. A remediation effort by T-Slack is underway to clear the site of polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, or PAH, which is fairly common in an urban environents, according to Larry Hajna of the DEP.

"The contamination came from a patch of asphalt that used to be on the grounds," said property owner John Adase Jr. "To correct the problem, we are removing the grass in that area and a foot of soil in March."

Spagnoletti assures students will Services, based in Kenilworth, had not need to walk through the playground to enter the facility.

"Our main concern though, is getting these kids into the school," Adase Jr. said in reference to the school opening despite the clean-up work that remains.

The center was built in 1960 by Adase Jr.'s father and operated as a construction company.

Last year, the Board of Education requested the site be converted into a daycare center, according to Adase.

School officials said the board is committed to a five year lease with Adase for \$9,000 a month with three options to renew.

# Death toll increases on UC roadways

State officials have announced that deaths on roads and highways have decreased markedly across New Jersey in the last two years, with the exception of Union and Hunterdon County, where increases in fatalities

A report released by the New Jersey State Police in September show that in 2007, 674

## Man charged in firefighter's death

Vasquez makes first appearance in Union County Superior Court

**ELIZABETH** Vasquez stood quietly before a Union County Superior Court judge last week and heard charges against him stemming from the blaze set on Jan. 2 that prosecutors say caused the death of an Elizabeth firefighter.


Only a translator and a few media members were on hand as 19-year-old, homeless Guatemalan citizen was told he was being charged with felony murder and third degree arson by Judge Joan Robinson Gross in an Elizabeth court room.



## Lance to focus on tough economy

Freshman congressman to serve on Financial Services Committee

The area's newest congressman had a tempestuous campaign, but that hasn't tired him a bit.

Rep. Leonard Lance, 56, who represents the 7th Congressional District, which includes Union County, seemed to be chomping at the bit to begin his term. Lance spoke to reporters via conference call immediately after being sworn-in with fellow lawmakers in Washington D.C. last

"It was a very moving experience," Lance said of the Jan. 6 ceremony. "I'm greatly honored so many people came to Washington on this wintery day to be with us."

The Republican weathered a tough battle against Democrat Linda Stender to win the vacated seat of longtime representative Mike Ferguson. He will represent most of Union, Hunterdon, Somerset and parts of Middlesex counties. Lance said his first priority is getting the nation's econo-

His first major vote will be on the next economic stimulus package. He has not decided how he will east his vote, saying the details of the pack-

Lance said the package must include tax relief for small businesses and middle class residents.

His hopes were realized several days later when he was appointed to the House Financial Services Committee, charged with handling the stimulus package and other issues involving the economy.

"It's difficult for a freshman Republican to get on his committee of choice, but my experience in Trenton has been fiscal and budgetary matters," Lance said prior to being appointed to the committee.

After that, he said every vote he makes will reflect his own identity as a politician: fiscally conservative, socially moderate and a strong environmentalist.

Before making any decisions, though, Lance said his first priority was to work hand-in-hand with local government.

He will have offices in Flemington and, more locally, Westfield, where he said he will try to continue the "excellent" community outreach practices that Ferguson began.

highways such as routes 78 and 22.

'We certainly know that where you've got corridors with a lot of traffic passing through, there will be more exposure to risk," Fischer said. Jones said that the county has many busy, built-out areas.

"Most of Union County is a very urbanized and suburbanized environment compared to some of the other areas we handle," Jones said.

Fischer said New Jersey's fatalities tend to be higher than the national average because it is such a densely populated state. The overall decrease in deaths in the last two years has been seen as a positive change.

"This is the lowest fatality rate we've had in the state since we began tracking the data 25 or 30 years ago," Fischer said.

Fischer said several factors are responsible for this drop.

"We know that gas prices this year impacted individuals' decisions about how they would get around," Fischer said. "We definitely saw a drop in the amount of vehicle miles that people were travelling.

This decrease in the use of the transportation system seems to have played a role in the lower death toll, she said. "When you reduce your exposure to the system, you're going to reduce your risk," Fischer said.

Fischer also attributed the drop to increased high-visibility police enforcement that sends a message to the public. "Everybody has a stake in this and a role to play," Fischer said. "And that is looking at what you are doing in your daily travels that put you at risk."

Fischer encouraged people to make changes to their personal travel habits to limit unsafe practices such as driving too fast, bicycling on busy roads, talking on cell phones while driving, or not wearing a seat belt. Fischer said 85 percent of crashes and injuries are caused by preventable factors involving the behavior of those involved.



## Jac Kuczynski is all-time scorer

## Her 16th point is sweetest

SPRINGFIELD - Back on Dec. 16, 2005, Jacqueline Kuczynski - better known simply as Jac - scored 14 points in her first-ever varsity game.

Little did she know then that in just a few weeks more than three years later she would have the opportunity to become the all-time leading basketball scorer - for both boys' and girls' - at Dayton High School.

Kuczynski, Dayton's standout 6-1 forward, came into last Thursday night's Mountain Valley Conference-Valley Division home game against Roselle Park needing just 16 points to have the record all to herself.

After netting 13 points through the first three quarters, Kuczynski attempted to break the record by making a 3-point basket. Not only did she miss two quick attempts early in the fourth quarter, but afterwards picked up her fourth foul.

This was not in the script for the fans - including her family - and the student body who came out to see her break the record at home. Dayton's next game was scheduled at Brearley the next night, so everyone anticipated seeing her break the record on her own home gym.

Kuczynski had a career average of 20.84 points heading into this season and was averaging exactly 21 in four games so far as a senior.

After making two free throws to tie the record of 1,704 points set by Michelle Saunders during her senior season of 1994-1995, Kuczynski got the ball again and drove inside the lane with it straight to the hoop.

Although she didn't make the shot, she was fouled and put back at the line for two more free throws.

All she had to do was make one more and the record was hers.

Kuczynski, usually the tallest player on the court, had no trouble making this free throw as she hit nothing but net.

Point 1,705 was in the books, Jac Kuczynski is now the all-time leading basketball scorer at Dayton High.

She finished with exactly the 16 points she needed and was not only the game's high scorer, but the only player on the court to score in double digits. Her 16th point turned out to be the sweetest.

"I just want to say thank you to my family, who was here, all the people in school that came to support me and the coaching staff," Kuczynski said.

Kuczynski's father Frank is a Lieutenant Colonel in the United States Army currently serving in Iraq.

'I want to thank my dad and I know how much it means to him that I wish he could be here," Kuczynski said.

Dayton improved to 4-1 and won its fourth straight - all four victories coming by an average margin of 27.5 points.

Roselle Park slipped to 3-3.

Dayton has done pretty well against Roselle Park lately, including three victories in three tries last year. However, you have to give the Panthers credit for not making it easy at all for Kuczynski to get her points. A 1-2-2 zone implemented by coach Richard Wilson prevented Kuczynski from getting her hands on the ball as much as she is used to.

Actually, Kuczynski did not end up taking a shot in the second and fourth quarters. She was 3-of-8 from the field, including a 3-pointer, and made 9-of-12 free throws. Kuczynski also had five rebounds and five blocks, grabbing all of her rebounds in the first half and four of her five blocks in the first two quarters.

Kuczynski did not come out of the game until there was 33.74 points remaining in the second quarter. She then played the entire third quarter and did not come out again until she broke the record.

After she set the mark, she missed her second free throw and then after Roselle Park turned the ball over, Dayton head coach Dave Rennie took Jac out of the game with 6:09 left. At that point, Roselle Park was up 41-5, so Kuczynski sat the remainder of the game out.

She scored five points on two field goals in the first quarter, three more on free throws in the second, five more on her last field goal and two free prows in the third and her final three all on free throws in the fourth.

Kuczynski, who scored her 1,000th point near the end of her sophomore season and her 1,500th point as a junior, has an excellent chance to become one of the few girls' players in Union County to reach 2,000 points.

## Brearley eyeing stellar season

## Wrestlers are ranked high

KENILWORTH - With three returning NJSIAA Tournament placewinners in the lineup, much is expected of recent Union County power Brearley once again as the wrestling season begins to pick up steam.

Those three grapplers include seniors Kenny Knapp and Joe Lospinoso and junior Khusen Taramov.

Knapp placed sixth at 119, Lospinoso second at 135 and Taramov eighth at 171.

Knapp and Lospinoso also placed as sophomores, with Knapp third at 103 and Lospinoso fourth at 130.

Knapp and Lospinoso, two of the winningest wrestlers in Brearley and Union County history, will continue on the collegiate level.

"Kenny is going to go Ivy League, he's Top 10 in the class," Brearley head coach Brian Luciani said. "He's waiting for some schools and to see who will get financial aid for him."

Knapp began his senior season with a 115-15 (.885) lifetime record after going 36-8 last year. On Jan. 24 at Union, he will attempt to become only the second Brearley wrestler to win four Union County Tournament championships and only the seventh grappler overall to accomplish the feat.

"Other interest for Kenny besides the Ivy League schools has come from Rutgers," Luciani said.

Jesse Boyden, who graduated from Brearley last year as his school's and Union County's all-time winningest wrestler with a record of 149-16 (.903) that included last year's state championship at 215 pounds, is now wrestling at Rutgers on scholarship.

Lospinoso began his senior campaign with a three-year record of 106-15 (.876), which included a 36-6 mark last year. Lospinoso was defeated by Eastern Regional sophomore Hank Stinson in last year's NJSIAA Tournament 135-pound championship bout at Atlantic City. Lospinoso led the match 3-2 before getting pinned in 5:21.

"For Joey Los, Rutgers has big interest," Luciani said. "Maryland and Hofstra also come to mind.

"Kenny and Joey will wait and see what's going on. Obviously, if things open up for them and they have the opportunity to sign, those schools will be very fortunate to get them."

Knapp has been wrestling at 130 this season.

"He's certified for 125, but we'll see what's going on," Luciani said. We'll judge it. Right now we're doing what's best for the team.

"The kids understand by district time what position they need to be to be successful."

Lospinoso made quick work of Rahway's Brandon Suggs at 140 on Jan. 7, pinning the Indian grappler in 30 seconds.

Knapp was bumped up to 135 in the Jan. 3 match against Brick Memorial at Brick Memorial, which was a 7-1 setback to Mike Morales.

Always a team player first, when asked if she would trade that for a win over conference rival and defending Valley Division champion New Providence, Kuczynski didn't hesitate by saying, "I definitely would."

Quickly after Kuczynski made the free throw to give her the school record, the game was stopped for a photo to be taken with her teammates and family.

Not only was she able to break the record at home, but she was able to do it in a victory over a conference team that came in with a winning record.

"Everything fell into place and I got exactly the 16 points I wanted," Kuczynski said.

Rennie has seen Kuczynski grow from being a tall and lanky player with potential to an athlete that will be continuing the sport on scholarship at Boston University.

"Roselle Park played a zone and were doubling her and even doubling her when she didn't have the ball," Rennie said. "I told the team before the game to not try too hard to get her the ball to break the record. Just play and she'll get her points.

"At halftime when she wasn't really all that close, she had eight at halftime, I said, alright let's start looking to get her the ball. I also told them, with the attention she's getting inside, to get her the ball inside so that she would get fouled and that's kind of what happened. The refs were noticing that she was getting knocked around a bit in the post."

After winning two home games in the Pepe-Levee Tournament at Dayton in late December, Dayton was on the court for the first time in nine days and anxious to get back at it again.

Roselle Park was coming off a 64-35 win at Technology two days before in Newark, which was a game that guard and tri-captain Gabby Clauer poured in a career-high 31 points.

A basket by Roselle Park senior forward and tricaptain Liridona Gocaj tied the game at 5-5 midway through the first quarter.

Then, in the blink of an eye, Dayton went on an 11-0 run to put the game away early.

"We got off to a bit of a slow start and I think that was because everyone felt a little bit of pressure with the attention of Jac breaking the record," Rennie said. "Everyone was a little bit flat in the beginning and they just needed to kind of get into the game and we tried to put pressure on them a little bit."

Roselle Park began in a full court press that worked in the beginning of the game, while Dayton used one to start the second half, which helped them extend an already double digit lead.

Dayton outscored Roselle Park 7-2 in the second quarter to take a 23-9 halftime lead, although Kuczynski had only eight points and the Bulldogs committed 10 turnovers alone in a second quarter that was not pretty for either team.

Senior forward Casey Kennedy scored six of her seven points in a third quarter Dayton won 15-6. The Bulldogs scored the first nine points of the period which extended their biggest run of 13 points that began in the second quarter.

Clauer, who finished with four points, did not score until the third quarter.

Gocaj paced the Panthers with seven points, while sophomore guard Lauren Corigliano added six.

Now that the school record is out of the way, you can tell that Kuczynski is a bit relieved.

"If you asked me if I would be here in this position freshman year, I wouldn't have believed you," Kuczynski said. "Everyone, all my teammates for four years, has backed me up tremendously. I couldn't have done it without them."

Rennie has been fortunate enough to coach many talented players during his 12 seasons at Dayton. Right before Kuczynski it was Cristin Zavocki, now a senior at Lafayette College, who scored more than 1,600 points and led Dayton to the 2005 Central Jersey, Group I championship.

"Jac handled this very well and I think it comes from having to deal with the 1,000 point milestone and the 1,500 point milestone," Rennie said. "She handled it fabulously because she prepared herself and we talked about it and she knew a lot of family were going to be here and she knew a lot of her classmates were going to be here, so we just tried to ease her mind and let her know that it was going to happen.

"She played well and played very aggressively."

**NOTES:** For the game, Roselle Park shot 8-of-49 from the field and made 3-of-4 free throws. The Panthers shot 4-of-29 in the first half and made 1-of 2 free throws in the first two quarters.

Brearley was defeated 33-30. Last year at Brick Memorial, the home team defeated Brearley 34-28 at the same time of the season.

"I really didn't have to move Kenny up, but he needed a better match," Luciani said.

"Joe is certified at 135 and wrestled at 135 at the Beast (of the East Tournament at the University of Delaware in late December). He's been between 135 and 140 so far and wrestling where we need him to.

"Kenny has been getting more quality matches and, unfortunately, Joey has been getting a lot more forfeits."

Boyden graduated last June as one of the all-time winningest wrestlers in state history with his 149 wins. He also became only the second Brearley wrestler and the first one in 23 years to win a state championship, with the other being Tony Siragusa winning at heavyweight his senior season of 1985.

Knapp has a chance to pass Boyden as Brearley and Union County's winningest grappler and also finish among the highest all-time winners in the state.

"Kenny, if he wrestlers just as he has been and gets – say another 36 wins – he'll break 150," Luciani said. "He's been a quality kid for four years. It's hard for me to compare it to anything else I've ever seen.

"Obviously, Boyden was very special in his own way."

Knapp competed and performed quite well at 103 his freshman and sophomore seasons before moving up in weight last year.

"Kenny was tough and gutsy when he wrestled at 103," Luciani said. "Now, Kenny's a young man. He's very exciting to watch and he listens and he executes. He does everything that you want him to do as a coach. There's nothing else you could ever ask of him."

Knapp wrestling at 135 in the Brick Memorial match is a perfect example of his willingness to put the team first.

"We needed to have the opportunity to wrestle there because I thought it was important for the match," Luciani said. "I could have just kept him down and he probably would have gotten a win or a pin maybe, but the bottom line was he knew I needed him there and he did what was best for the team.

"The outcome was bad – he lost 7-1 and the team lost – but here's a kid that understands what it meant for him to do that for the team."

Brearley won its second straight match on Jan. 7 to improve to 5-2. The Bears defeated visiting Rahway 55-22.

Brearley also wrestled Toms River East and Bishop Ahr Jan. 3 at Brick Memorial, with the Bears falling to TRE 38-30 and beating Bishop Ahr 67-6.

In last week's Star-Ledger rankings, Brearley began the week No. 12 in the state, No. 1 in Union County and No. 2 in Group 2 behind defending

champion Long Branch.

After Brearley captured North 2, Group 2 for the first time last year, the Bears fell to Long Branch 30-27 in the Group 2 final at the Ritacco Center in Toms River.

Brearley finished 21-4 and ranked among the Top 10 teams in the state. High Point of Sussex County was ranked No. 1 in the state again to start this season, while Long Branch was No. 2, Brick Memorial No. 6 and TRE No. 9.

Brearley is scheduled to compete against No. 10 Camden Catholic, No. 4 Phillipsburg and No. 3 Jackson in early February matches.

The Bears are scheduled to host Camden Catholic for the second time in three years on Feb. 2 at 6 p.m., host Phillipsburg for the first time ever on Feb. 5 at 6:30 p.m. and then go up against Jackson on Feb. 7 at Rutgers at a time to be announced.

Brearley captured its first three Union County Tournament and District 10 championships the past three years and will be seeking four-peats in both this season. The Bears also captured their first three sectional titles the past three seasons, with the first two coming in Central Jersey, Group 1 in 2006 and 2007.

Brearley defeated Roselle Park in the 2006 and 2007 CJ, G1 finals in addition to beating the Panthers in the regular season the last three years.

# RC girls' hoops on a roll

## Red-hot Lions begin week with 8-0 mark

CLARK - The last time a team from the Mountain Valley Conference went on to win the girls' basketball Union County Tournament was in 2003 when Roselle Catholic won it for the first time. Cranford captured the crown in 2006, but that was the last year the Cougars were in the Watchung Conference before moving over into the MVC the next year.

Approximately one month before this year's event will be seeded the Lions – after missing the semifinals by just a basket last year – have the look of a team that will have to be taken very seriously come the second half of February.

Sometimes a knockout punch in a well-played first quarter can determine the outcome of a basketball game before the remaining 24 minutes are contested.

That was the case Friday night at Johnson High School's gymnasium. Roselle Catholic made nine-of-11 shots and took advantage of five Johnson turnovers in the opening quarter en route to a convincing 52-45 victory.

The Lions, who did not commit a turnover themselves in the opening period, jumped out to a 6-0 lead before Johnson scored and led 19-6 going into the second quarter.

Roselle Catholic led the entire game.

To Johnson's credit, the Crusaders won the second, third and fourth quarters each by two points and were helped by the fact that the Lions made only eight of 19 free throws, including only seven of 16 in the fourth quarter.

Johnson's ability to keep pace with Roselle Catholic in the final three periods may help the Crusaders when the two play again in Mountain Valley Conference-Mountain Division play on Jan. 30 at RC.

Roselle Catholic head coach Joe Skree told his players before the game started that Johnson was the team that won the Mountain Division the past two years and that if his team wanted to win it this year, this game would be a great place to start.

Inside baskets by senior forward Kelly Hayes, junior guard Allison Skree and sophomore guard Melissa Tobic put the Lions up to stay for good.

Roselle Catholic was on its way to making a statement in a big conference game.

The Lions, who have more players back than Johnson, improved to 7-0 and remain one of only two basketball teams in Union County still without a loss. Roselle Catholic also won for the third straight time on the road.

Defending MVC-Valley Division champion New Providence is the other undefeated Union County hoop squad - also winning Friday night to improve to 7-0.

Johnson came into Friday night's game red hot, winners of four straight after a 1-2 start. The Crusaders, who fell to 5-3, suffered their first two losses on the road to quality competition. First was a 45-41 conference setback at Governor Livingston and then a 38-32 loss to Hanover Park in the first round of the late December Roselle Park Tournament.

The Lions handed the Crusaders their first home loss of the season. Last year after losing at home to Johnson 44-31, Roselle came back to edge the Crusaders 45-43 in Clark.

Roselle Catholic began 0-4 and 1-5 last year before bouncing back to beat conference opponents the second time around and finish with a winning record of 14-10.

Going into Saturday's, (Jan. 10) scheduled 4:30 p.m. conference home game vs. Governor Livingston - weather pending - the Lions had won 16 of their last 21 games dating back to last year's 1-5 beginning.

If you saw the Lions execute their offense Friday night against Johnson, you saw a team good enough to play the way it practices.

Roselle Catholic was often able to pass the ball around from perimeter to perimeter and then find the open player inside for an easy basket.

'We passed the ball well and we knew Johnson was going to come out very aggressively in a 3-2 zone," RC assistant coach Charlie Wischusen said. "We thought if we had open looks, the girls would take them."

Part of Roselle Catholic's strategy to constantly pass the ball around is to never let the opponent know who they should key on. Everyone is capable of taking a pass and either going to the hoop with the ball for two or hitting an outside shot.

Skree paced the Lions with an 18-point effort and also played well defensively, coming up with numerous steals whether the Lions were trapping with their defense or whether she was on her own and just quicker to the ball than the Johnson opponent she was covering.

Junior forward Megan Faughnan is proving to be quite a smooth, consistent threat from the outside, making five of her six field goals from the outside and finishing with 12 points.

Junior guard Jenny Malone, running the offense from the point, added nine points, including a big 3-point basket that gave her team a 24-11 lead in the second quarter.

"We have girls on our team who can make the outside shot and we were just fortunate enough to make the shots when we had to," Wischusen said. "We built a lead, sustained it, Johnson came back, we bent, but we didn't break."

Defensively, Tobie did a great job of covering Johnson standout R. CATHOLIC LIONS (8-0) junior forward Gina Trani - although Trani still got her points and led all scorers with 21.

"We knew Trani was going to get the ball, she got the ball a lot and I thought Melissa Tobie did a fabulous job on her," Wischusen said. "Gina Trani is one of the best players in the county and she scored 21, but her supporting cast didn't help her.

'(Kristy) Pflug played well, but Jenny Malone did a great on her defensively, too.

Pflug, a sophomore guard with a great deal of potential, finished with nine points, including one 3-pointer.

Trani has improved a great deal from a promising sophomore season and is now a more consistent big-time offensive threat – just as capable of pulling up and hitting a short jumper as she is going strong to the basket and scoring inside.

Trani has 131 points in eight games for a 16.375 average. Her 21 points vs. RC were two points shy of her season high, which was 23 in Thursday's 36-14 win at home over Union Catholic.

Skree and Malone form a solid 1-2 backcourt punch for the Lions and have benefited a great deal from a productive off-season diet of quality competition.

"We knew everyone would come out strong and we were confident coming in at 6-0," Allison Skree said. "We wanted to establish our defense and make sure they didn't get out to a good start."

'We wanted to run and try to tire them out," Malone said.

With each victory comes continued confidence. However, the Lions realize that they have to take every game very seriously and can't rely on what's happened in the past.

"We don't want to be too confident because we still know that we have to work real hard," Malone said.

Skrec poured in a career-high 22 points and Malone 18 in RC's season-opening 70-63 overtime conference road win against Roselle. Skrec and Malone both scored five points and accounted for all of RC's scoring in the extra session won by the Lions 10-3,

Skree now has 104 points in seven games for a 14.86 average. She was named MVP of the Roselle Catholic Holiday Tournament after scoring a game-high 19 points in a 55-38 win over North Brunswick and then netting 13 more and dishing out six assists in a 45-40 win over Voorhees in a game that featured two 3-0 squads.

NOTES: Johnson was to continue at home against MVC-Valley squad Brearley Tuesday night. The Crusaders will then face Mountain Division teams Roselle tonight at 7 in Roselle and Cranford tomorrow night at 7 at home.

Roselle Catholic is now 6-0 vs. Mountain Division foes, with road wins against Roselle, Governor Livingston, Cranford and Johnson and home wins against Rahway and GL, the home win over GL being a 48-41 victory last Saturday.

Faughnan paced the Lions with 16 points in Saturday's win over the Highlanders. Tobie added 12, Skrec eight, Hayes six, Malone three and Anthonia Aiumobi three.

In RC's first win over Governor Livingston, Faughnan was also her team's high scorer with 18 points. Skrec scored 11, Tobie four, Hayes three and Ajumobi two.

Faughnan made four 3-point baskets in the game.

ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRING-FIELD, CHAPTER XXXV, LAND USE REGULATIONS, TO ESTABLISH A NON-RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT FEE ORDINANCE, BY THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD, COUNTY OF UNION, STATE OF NEW JERSEY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN-SHIP COMMITTEE of the Township of Springfield, County of Union, State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION I - AMENDMENT Section 35-86, Non-residential Development Fee Regulations, is hereby enacted in full as follows:

35-86 NON-RESIDENTIAL DEVELOP-MENT FEE REGULATIONS

#### 35-86.1 Purpose

The purpose of this ordinance is as follows:

The purpose of this ordinance is as follows:

a. In Holmdel Builder's Association V. Holmdel Township. 121 N.J. 550 (1990), the New Jersey Supreme Court determined that mandatory development fees are authorized by the Fair Housing Act of 1985 (the Act). N.J. S.A. 52:27d-301 et sec., and the State Constitution, subject to the Council on Affordable Housing's (COAH's) adoption of rules.

b. Pursuant to P.L. 2008. c. 46 section 8 (C. 52:27D-329.2) and the Statewide Non-Residential Development Fee Act (C. 40:55D-8.1 through 8.7), COAH is authorized to adopt and promulgate regulations necessary for the establishment, implementation, review, monitoring and enforcement of municipal affordable housing trust funds and corresponding spending plans. Municipalities that are under the jurisdiction of the Council or court of competent jurisdiction and have a COAH-approved spending plan may retain fees collected from non-residential development.

c. This ordinance establishes standards for the collection, maintenance, and expenditure of development fees pursuant to COAH's regulations and in accordance P.L. 2008, c.46, Sections 8 and 32:38. Fees collected pursuant to this ordinance shall be used for the sole purpose of providing low- and moderate-income housing. This ordinance shall be interpreted within the framework of COAH's rules on development fees, codified at N.J.A.C. 5:97-8.

#### 35-86.2 Basic requirement

a. This ordinance shall not be effective until approved by COAH pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:98-5.1.

b. The Township shall not spend development fees until COAH has approved a plan for spending spe

#### 35-86.3 Definitions

The following terms, as used in this section, shall have the following meanings:

section, shall have the following meanings:

Affordable housing development a development included in the Housing Element and Fair Share Plan, and includes but is not limited to, an inclusionary development, a municipal construction project or a 100 percent affordable development.

COAH or the Council: the New Jersey Council on Affordable Housing established under the Act which has primary jurisdiction for the administration of housing obligations in accordance with sound regional planning consideration in the State.

Development fee: money paid by a development fee: money paid by a development fee improvement of property as permitted in N.J.A.C. 5:97-8.3.

Developer: the legal or beneficial owner or owners of a lot or of any land oproposed to be included in a proposed development, including the holder of an option or contract to purchase, or other person having an enforceable proprietary interest in such land.

Equalized assessed value the assessed value of a property divided by the current average ratio of assessed to true value for the municipality in which the property is situated, as determined in accordance with sections 1, 5, and 6 of P.L.1973, c.123 (C.54:1-35a through C.54:1-35c).

Green building strategies: those strategies that minimize the impact of development on the environment, and enhance the health, safety and well-being of residents by producing durable, low-maintenance, resource-efficient housing while making optimum use of existing infrastructure and community services.

## 35-86.4 Non-residential develop-ment fees

#### Imposed lees.

1. Within all zoning districts, non-residential developers, except for developers of the types of development specifically exempted, shall pay a fee

equal to two and one-half (2.5) percent of the equalized assessed value of the land and improvements, for all new non-residential construction on an unimproved lot or lots.

2. Non-residential developers, except for developers of the types of development specifically exempted shall also pay a fee equal to two and one-half (2.5) percent of the increase in equalized assessed value resulting from any additions to existing structures to be used for non-residential purposes.

3. Development fees shall be imposed and collected when an existing structure is demolished and replaced. The development fee of two and a half percent (2.5%) shall be calculated on the difference between the equalized assessed value of the pre-existing land and improvement and the equalized assessed value of the newly improved structure, i.e. land and improvement, at the time final certificate of occupancy is issued. If the calculation required under this section results in a negative number, the non-residential development fee shall be zero.

zero. b. Eligible exactions, ineligible exac-tions and exemptions for non-residen-tial development

tial development

1. The non-residential portion of a mixed-use inclusionary or market rate development shall be subject to the two and a half (2.5) percent development fee, unless otherwise exempted below.

2. The 2.5 percent fee shall not apply to an increase in equalized assessed value resulting from alterations, change in use within existing footprint, reconstruction, renovations and repairs.

3. Non-residential developments shall be exempt from the payment of non-residential development fees in accordance with the exemptions required pursuant to P.L.2008, c.46, as specified in the Form N-RDF "State of New Jersey Non-Residential Development Certification/Exemption" Form. Any exemption claimed by a developer shall be substantiated by that developer.

4. A developer of a non-residential development exempted from the non-residential development fee pursuant to P.L.2008, c.46 shall be subject to it at such time the basis for the exemp-

to P.L.2008, c.46 shall be subject to it at such time the basis for the exemption no longer applies, and shall make the payment of the non-residential development fee, in that event, within three years after that event or after the issuance of the final certificate of occupancy of the non-residential development, whichever is later.

5. If a property which was exempted from the collection of a non-residential development fee thereafter ceases to be exempt from property shall remit the fees required pursuant to this section within 45 days of the termination of the property tax exemption. Unpaid non-residential development fees under these circumstances may be enforceable by the Township as a lien against the real property of the owner.

35-86.5 Collection procedures

#### 35-86.5 Collection procedures

a. Upon the granting of a preliminary, final or other applicable approval, for a development, the applicable approving authority shall direct its staff to notify the construction official responsible for the issuance of a building permit.

b. For non-residential developments only, the developer shall also be provided with a copy of Form N-RDF State of New Jersey Non-Residential Development Certification/Exemption\* to be completed as per the instructions provided. The Developer of a non-residential development shall complete Form N-RDF as per the instructions provided. The construction official shall verify the Information submitted by the non-residential developer as per the instructions provided. The construction official shall verify exemptions and prepare estimated and final assessments as per the instructions provided in the Form N-RDF. The Tax assessor shall verify exemptions and prepare estimated and final assessments as per the instruction official responsible for the issuance of a building permit shall notify the local tax assessor of the lirst building permit for a development the.

d. Within 90 days of receipt of that notice, the municipal tax assessor of any and all requests for the scheduling of a final inspection on property which is subject to a development fee.

d. Within 10 business days of a request for the scheduling of a final inspection on property which is subject to a development fee, f. Within 10 business days of a request for the scheduling of a final inspection, the municipal assessor shall confirm or modify the previously estimated equalized assessed value of the improvements of the development fee, should the Township fail to determine or notify the development fee within 10 business days of the request for the amount of the development fee, and thereafter notify the development fee within 10 business days of the request for final inspection, the development fee amount of the development fee within 10 business days of the request for final inspection, the development fee amount of the

Funds deposited in the housing trust fund may be used for any activity approved by COAH to address the Township's fair share obligation and may be set up as a grant or revolving loan program. Such activities include, but are not limited to: preservation or purchase of housing for the purpose of maintaining or implementing affordability controls, rehabilitation, new construction of affordable housing units and related costs, accessory apartment, market to affordable, or regional housing partnership programs, conversion of existing non-residential buildings to create new affordable units, green building strategies designed to be cost saving and in accordance with accepted national or state standards, purchase of land for affordable housing, improvement of land to be used for affordable housing, extensions or improvements of land to be used for affordable housing, extensions or improvements of roads and infrastructure to affordable housing sites, financial assistance designed to increase affordability, administration necessary for implementation of the Housing Ele-

ment and Fair Share Plan, or any other activity as permitted pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:97-8.7 through 8.9 and specified in the approved spending plan.

D. Funds shall not be expended to reimburse the Township for past housing activities.

C. At least 30 percent of all development fees collected and interest earned shall be used to provide affordability assistance to low- and moderate-income households in affordable units included in the municipal Fair Share Plan. One-third of the affordability assistance portion of development fees collected shall be used to provide affordability assistance programs or less of median income by region.

Affordability assistance programs may include down payment assistance,

security deposit assistance, low interest loans, rental assistance assistance with homeowners association or condominium fees and special assessments, and assistance with emergency repairs.

2. Affordability assistance to households earning 30 percent or less of median income may include buying down the cost of low or moderate income units in the municipal Fair Share Plan to make them affordable to households earning 30 percent or less of median income. The use of development fees in this manner shall entitle the Township to bonus credits pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:97-3.7.

3. Payments in lieu of constructing affordable units on site and funds from the sale of units with extinguished controls shall be exempt from the affordability assistance requirement.
