UNION --- What will the world be like in the year 2033? Will DVDs still exist? Will the economy be in better shape? What will cell phones look like? Will cars fly?

Garbage truck for Clark? Mayor: Purchase could cut budget By Paul Greulich Staff Writer

CLARK - Township officials may purchase a garbage truck and assign duties related to bulk cleanup and grass pickup to the Public Works Department, in an effort to save taxpayer dollars and improve services, they say.

The idea, introduced during a Feb. 17 council meeting, stemmed from budget discussions between Mayor Sal Bonaccorso and township administrator John Laezza. "We had to eliminate a million dollars from the budget to meet the four percent state cap," Laezza said about the reason behind the plan. Race for mayor, council grips township

HILLSIDE — As the March 19 deadline for filing petitions for local municipal elections approaches, four slates of candidates are taking shape.

The race will determine the fate of three at-large council seats, --occupied by Jerome Jewel, Frank burden.



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Prosecutor: Linden teacher ripped off autistic students

LINDEN — The teacher accused of double billing the city schools is also being charged with double dipping at a Monmouth County school catering to developmentally disabled students.

Kimberly DeMatteo, 38, of Howell was again charged with tampering with school records and altering reports after it was discovered she reported tutoring multiple students at the same times in order to increase her pay at the Manalapan-based Sunny Days Childhood Developmental Services school, according to Union County Assistant Prosecutor Ann Rubin.

In November, DeMatteo and her husband, Michael Maurer, 35 — both teachers at Linden High School and middle school — were charged with tampering with school records and altering reports to show they were working in two places at once to increase overtime pay. "[DeMatteo] submitted work saying she was tutoring one student at the library while at the same time she was at another student's house on a separate tutoring session," said Union County Prosecutor Theodore J. Romankow.

Maurer reported he was tutoring students at the same time he was working as a hall monitor at Linden Middle School.

tipped off school officials, alerting board members that DeMatteo kept an "irregular after-school teaching pattern," according to the complaint filed by the Union County Prosecutor's Office.

The newest incidents occurred between August 2005 and January 2006, when DeMatteo was working for Sunny Days, a state-licensed business that provides physical therapy, speech therapy and occupational services to developmentally disabled or autistic children age three and younger, according to the school's district's Web site.

Union County investigators said DeMatteo also billed Sunny Days for seeing clients at the same time she was billing Linden School Board for regular teaching and after-school instruction.

Sunny Days representatives did not return calls to their Corporate Center Drive office seeking comment.

In connection with the Monmouth County incidents, DeMatteo faces fourth-degree charges of filing false documents and third-degree charges of theft by deception. These charges are expected to be merged into the earlier Union County case, said prosecutor spokesman John Holl.





Roselle BOE pursues higher QSAC scores

ROSELLE -- School officials are looking to the state School Board for help boosting it's QSAC scores.

Roselle Board of Education requested help preparing its self- tion was always viewed as a good evaluations, which may ensure a better score on the governance portion of the state's annual Quality Single Accountability Continuum report --- an evaluation of a school system's performance during a three-year span to ensure each district is performing proficiently and effectively. The latest review took place between 2004 and 2007.

Last year, the district scored 44 out of 100 possible points on the governance and instruction portion of the QSAC report. Superintendent of Schools Elnardo Webster declined to comment on the reason for the low score, saying QSAC results are a "reflection of the district from...a time frame before I joined the district.'

Scores were also dismal in other areas - the district earned 56 points in personnel and 66 in fiscal management. They school system did perform well in operations, scoring a 90.

Gwen Thornton, NJSBA field representative, said the governance evaluation is new to the OSAC report, and some districts are struggling to meet its requirements, which include completing an evaluation of the school board's and superintendent's performance - an evaluation that must be comparable ward," he said.

Berkeley Heights, Springfield and Hillside also scored poorly on the governance portion of the evaluation, all receiving scores of 56,

"A school board's self-evaluapractice, but was not a requirement until two years ago," Thornton said. "Our goal is to make sure every district completes all its required tasks."

If a district receives a score between 79 and 51 on any section of the OSAC report, it must file a long-term and short-term corrective action plan with county. Districts that score below a 50 on a section can be assigned a state education professional to assist with requirements. Currently, the state has not appointed anyone to Roselle.

In Roselle's corrective action plan, which was approved in December, the school board agreed to become NJSBA certified. Members took training courses, participated in a full-day retreat, conducted a self-evaluation and an review of the superintendent to earn the designation, according to Tamika Bauknight, the district's director of curriculum and instruction.

Thornton commended Roselle school officials for recognizing problems in the district. "They are working diligently to make the improvements," she said.

Webster said he is is positive about the district's future. "We now have an opportunity to move for-





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

Suspect in Elizabeth robberies connected to Linden hold-up

LINDEN - A Roselle man suspected in a spate of robberies in Elizabeth has been arrested in connection with the violent armed robbery of a Linden grocery store.

Benjamin Capers, 36, of Roselle was charged with armed robbery. possession of a handgun and manifesting extreme indifference to the value of a human life by Linden police Feb. 10.

He had been arrested earlier that week by Elizabeth police officers for his alleged involvement in a series of robberies there, according to Linden Police Capt. Raymond Tyra.

He was turned over to Linden authorities after police determined

similar. Friday, Capers was still being held at county jail on \$50,000 bail for the Linden robbery.

On Jan. 12, at around 7:30 p.m., Capers allegedly walked into the brandishing a silver handgun and an empty cloth bag.

grabbed a female customer waiting at the register, held the gun to her head and threw the bag on the counter, demanding it be filled with cash and cigarettes.

The 52-year-old store owner placed approximately \$1,000 and several packs of cigarettes in the bag before Capers released the woman and fled.


Several candidates remarked upon the unusually large number of people running for public office in Hillside this year.

UC chipping in for Madden Field upgrade

RAHWAY - Looking for a place to buy peanuts and crackerjacks?

Madden Field would be a good place to start.

The snack stand and field house at the field, used by local Pop Warner football and Police Athletic League's baseball and softball teams, will undergo a \$300,000 renovation with an addition, according to city officials.

A bond ordinance appropriating funds for the project was passed at the Feb. 9 council meeting.

Half the cost will be covered by the county recreation fund, City Administrator Peter Pelissier confirmed Tuesday. The city will foot the rest of the bill.

While the dimensions of the field house have not yet been announced because the planning process is still in progress, the new

city engineer James Housten assured.

"[The facility] will have a...new kitchen, bathrooms and meeting space and storage rooms upstairs, Housten said.

For volunteers working in the sweltering kitchen and thousands of spectators who use the portable outhouses, upgrades were desperately needed to keep up with the quality on the field.

The athletic teams are perennial successes --- last season Pop Warner teams won conference championships in football and cheerlead-

"Words can't explain how it feels to see the building going up. It's been a long time coming," said city Pop Warner president Kyle Thomas.

Thomas grew up playing football in Rahway. But he said the condition of the field house was

Field alone, lights were installed with county help about three years ago, Deige noted.

"All fields were upgraded six or seven years ago and play structures have been replaced in all city parks," Deige said.



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

\$5K update starts at Hetfield House

MOUNTAINSIDE \$5,585 gift from Blanche M. and George L. Watts Mountainside Community Foundation is giving a needed facelift to space at one of the borough's oldest buildings.

Restoration to the Victorian Room at Deacon Andrew Hetfield House on Constitution Plaza, began last week and is expected to conclude in the upcoming weeks, thanks largely to the grant, which covered the entire cost of the project, according to Scott Daniels, chairman of the Historic Preservation Committee. Construction is being done by Regal Restoration of Westfield.

Daniels said the room needs a boost because molding has aged and windows are no longer functional. "We recently completed upgrades on all the mechanical aspects of the house, now we are fixing up the odds and ends," he

"Modern materials will be used to replicate the original Victorian design...and capture the splendor of days gone by," Daniels explained.

The restoration was not considered until grant was available. The renovation includes repairing and restoring windows in the front bay area and rear windows in the room. Work will also be done on the arch over these windows. Daniels explained the renovations are for aesthetic purposes only. Crown molding will replace existing cove molding to provide a more "authentic feel," according to Daniels.

od the house will remain open to the public, but the Victorian Room will be roped off.

The last renovation, which involved relining the chimney, was completed two years ago. That project costed \$12,000, half of which was provided by means of grant money.

A representative from the Watts Mountainside Community Foundation could not be reached for comment.

Historical Committee member Don Jeka said the foundation has been generous to Mountainside in the past. "They have donated money that has helped make several updates to the facility."

Hetfield House was erected in three phases, the first section was built in 1760 and the other two were completed by 1830. It was owned by The Hetfield Family and their descendants until 1946. In addition to providing shelter to the Hetfield's, the house was also used as a tea room in the 1930s and as an antique store in the 1940s and 1980s. Since it was moved in 1985 from Route 22 to its present location, it has been owned by Mountainside and maintained by the Historic Preservation Committee and used as a museum and a meeting place.

According to Daniels, the center room of the Hetfield House is used for meetings while the kitchen and Victorian Room along with all its furniture and appliances - have been preserved and reflect the era in which the house was built.

Carrington Harrell of East 17th Street was arrested at 4 p.m. Feb. 19, near 17th Street and South Wood Avenue.

Two officers on patrol in the area pulled over the 39-year-old old after seeing him park his black Nissan Maxima along the 1700 block of South Wood Avenue, approach an unknown pedestrian, "conduct a drug transaction" and quickly retreat, Tyra said.

After he was stopped, police explaining to Harrell why he was pulled over saw him put a clear plastic bag in his mouth and began chewing it, reports say.

When police pulled him out of the car, to prevent him from destroying potential evidence, Harrell bit an officer on the hand and began fighting. An officer who arrived to assist the patrolmen was elbowed in the nose, police said.


Escape to the library

With the state of our nation's economic woes on everyone's minds, people are finding it necessary to cut corners and be more frugal wherever possible. Necessities such as housing, heat, hot water, gas and food get first priority, while frivolities such as entertainment are often left out in the cold. This isn't to say we should neglect friendly diversions; without such means of escape, our moods can become dour and our children will suffer the most. But with money so tight, what can people do?

The answer is your public library. It's easy to picture that venerable institution as a collection of moldering books watched over by a gray-haired spinster, while dust settles on hopelessly outdated periodicals. If you would prefer to bring a movie home, many libraries have extensive DVD collections, such as the Rahway Public Library. If Shakespeare is of interest to you, the Kenilworth Public Library offers an annual Bard of the Boulevard series, which hosts actors performing some of Shakespeare's plays. Other libraries, such as the Hillside Library, also host seminars related to everything from business to job hunting and even health-related topics.

Just the cost of making decisions

Maybe the shots that follow are part of the cost of making decisions. Take the action of Sen. Nicholas Scutari of Linden. He also is the municipal prosecutor in the tough court of Linden.

It turns out that Scutari has support in high places. It was reported last week that President Barack Obama is likely to support changes at the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration. Supporters reminded that during the campaign,

Obama said, "I would not have the Justice Department prosecuting and raiding medical marijuana users."





Keep the course open To the Editor:

The freeholders of Union County plan to close Oakridge Golf Course and eliminate nine holes at Galloping Hill Golf Course. The maintenance of the two remaining courses will continue to be managed by Union County but the management of Ashbrook and Galloping Hill courses will be privatized.

The result will be two 18-hole courses in Union County replacing one 27-hole course and two 18-hole courses.

The freeholders state that the current courses are at 50 percent capacity. Despite last year's recommendations not to increase the fees, the freeholders did so and the result was that many Union County residents reduced the number of times they played at Union County courses and played at other courses where the fees were cheaper.

The pitch and putt course and the nine-hole golf course at Galloping Hill will be replaced by a driving range. Although many felt the driving range at Galloping Hill was a good idea, it should not be at the expense of losing nine holes of golf and the Pitch and Putt. In the past, the golf courses' income helped subsidize other recreational facilities.

The Club House at Oak Ridge was allowed to become structurally unsound due to lack of maintenance. This building is a historic structure. Funding from the New Jersey Historic Trust and other sources needs to be obtained to restore this building to its original state.

It is our recommendation that the freeholders do not buy any more land under Green Acres as they have failed to manage and maintain the acreage they have under their control.

The man-made reservoir in Clark needs to be dredged and surrounding rivers also need to be dredged as this used to be done in the past. The freeholders need to learn that as land owners, they are responsible to the Union County public to maintain any land or buildings they purchase.

Anything that can be done to save Oak Ridge Golf Course will be appreciated.

Wilday opens first library

Administrators, students expect facility to offer advantages

By Joseph M. D'Alise Staff Writer

ROSELLE — A school building without a library? Until last fall that was the case at Grace Wilday Junior High School in Roselle.

Work to transform a small, first-floor classroom at the school into the library, which opened Feb. 19, began last fall.

Science teacher Shamim Dean said she was shocked to find out Wilday was without a library when she began working at the school two years ago. "How can a school in America not have a library?" Dean said she had questioned. Her concern prompted her to contact the Global Literacy Project - a non-profit organization that fosters community-based literacy initiatives throughout the world --- she has been a volunteer with since 2000.

"Although the public library is nearby, once the school day ends, [students] are much less likely to walk to it to study," Dean said. "Students need a library in the school building they can visit during the day.

Half the addition was funded through the school budget — administrators set aside \$2,000 in last year's budget to purchase new books and furniture. GLP provides the rest of the supplies for the library, offering a mixture of new and donated furniture, bookshelves and approximately 800 books, according Principal Reginald Mirthil, who said students are "excited" about the new facility.

Yunis Dominguez, a seventh-grader at Wilday, called the completion of the project "a great accomplishment" for the school.

schools without a library," Dominguez said.

Other students said they plan to use the facility as a quite room to get away on a hectic school day. "It can provide a fun experience and a place to come and relax," said Terrence Benoit, also a seventh-grader at Wilday.

GLP helped create the library, but its work is not yet done, according to Emeka Akaezuwa, GLP's founding trustee.

The foundation plans to provide funds allowing 10 students to purchase one book each month for one year to make sure the library is stocked with literature students want to read, according to Akaezuwa.

"We don't just drop off the books and leave," Akaezuwa said. "We are trying to create a culture of reading."

GLP is already making it's goal come to fruition. Author Marcus Reeves, whose work revolves around youth culture and politics, was invited to the library's grand opening by the foundation to talk to students throughout the day about the importance of reading and the culture their new library could provide.

Reeves believes reading allows for better communication skills. "[Students] need to be exposed to various forms of literature to find different ways to express themselves, other than sports or music," he said.

Other activities centered around the school's newest resource are already in the works. "Our next step is to work with the teachers to develop reading programs," said Akaezuwa.

Until a full-time librarian is hired, Barbara Sforza, Wilday's gifted and talented program teacher and certified librarian, has taken on some of the duties.

(Continued from Page 1) estimate what the increase might be.

Bonaccorso estimated purchasing the truck would save the township about \$130,000 annually.

For the past nine years, the town held an annual bulk garbage cleanup in October. This cleanup, conducted through the Rahway Department of Public Works as part of an interlocal service agreement, costs the township \$165,000 annually, with \$100,000 going toward labor expenses. Grass pickup, handled by Great Northern of Hazlet, costs the township \$80,000, of which about \$30,000 is labor related.

The truck would cost between \$170,000 and \$240,000, which would be a capital expense mortgaged over a ten-year life. No new personnel would be hired to operate the vehicle, according to Bonaccorso.

"We're...looking at the budget harder than we've ever had to look at it," Bonaccorso said.

Town officials say they are unsure when the new service would begin, but are aiming for May.

If the plan is approved, residents will be able to call Town Hall to schedule bulk garbage pickup before monthly collection dates.

The service would be provided each month, except in November and December, when public workers employees are typically preoccupied with leaf cleanup. Bulk trash collection in January and February would be subject to weather conditions.

The schedule and procedure for regular household trash pickup would remain the same, according to both mayor Bonaccorso and Laezza.

"[Some] are embracing this plan...because we're increasing their ability to get rid of garbage throughout the year," Bonaccorso said.

While township officials are working to reduce Clark's budget, potential reductions in state aid may call for further cuts.

"We're not introducing the budget yet, because we don't know what the governor is going to do," Laezza said.

While officials hope to see state aid this year, Laezza said it's "a pipe dream."

Without the funding, town officials will probably look toward eliminating services, according to Laezza.

Man nabbed for car break-ins

SPRINGFIELD - A man police believe is responsible for dozens of car break-ins in several counties has been jailed.

Ernest Ford, 49, of Newark was arrested at 5:30 a.m. Feb. 16, after allegedly burglarizing 10vehicles parked along residential streets in the township during the night. Ford's arrest came after he ran from officers along Maple Avenue near the Union-Springfield border - witnesses along the residential street reported him suspiciously eying parked vehicles.

Officers pursued him on foot. The brief chase ended in a parking lot at Columbia Court housing county officials. County deer hunt to begin

announced the annual Watchung Reservation Deer Management Program is scheduled to begin Tuesday for the purpose of maintaining the deer population in the nearly 2,000-acre reservation.

Twelve experienced, licensed hunters will be active between 5 a.m. and 8 p.m. Monday through Wednesday. In the event of inclement weather on any of those days, the program may occur on March 5 and 6. It will not be extended longer than these dates.

David Bernier, director of the county's Division of Park Planning and Environmental Services, said it is not the county's goal, nor is it practically feasible, to remove all deer from the Watchung Reservation.

"It is only our goal to maintain them at a density that is compatible with the plants and the other animals with whom they share the forest," Bernier said.

From 1996-99, the county's deer management program worked to reduce the number of deer in the Watchung Reservation from an estimated 180 deer per square mile to the goal density of 20 deer per square mile. This goal was achieved and in 2000, the program was altered to focus on maintaining that density level, according to deer have been killed in each hunt since 2000, with a limit of 100 peryear. The program costs about \$4,000, most of which is spent on butchering the deer.

The hunters, who all live or work in Union County, provide their services on a volunteer basis. slugs from tree stands that are at households surrounding the park.

least 20 feet high.

Bernier said that the damage Union County officials have done by deer to food sources needed by other animals is not the only concern.

"There were concerns for deerrelated motor vehicle accidents, loss of residential landscaping, and the threat of Lyme disease," Bernier said.

Captain Richard Osieja of the Mountainside Police Department said that the deer population in the borough is very visible, especially during mating season. He said deerrelated motor vehicle accidents are a definite subject of concern in Mountainside. There were 15 such accidents in Mountainside last year, he said.

"They do cause quite extensive damage to vehicles," Osieja said.

The deer that are killed in the coming hunt will be processed at a USDA-approved butcher and the venison will be distributed to the needy and homeless through the Community FoodBank of New Jersey. Hunters will be supervised by the Union County Police Department and representatives from the New Jersey Division of Fish and Wildlife. Anyone found hunting on any county park property outside the terms of this program will be prosecuted.



der trials including one memorable case in the late 1990s that he tried 40 years after the crime was committed.

"That was interesting in terms of seeing the case come together," Barisonek said.

Barisonek, who was born in Bayonne but grew up in Roselle, graduated from Marist College in Poughkeepsie in 1965 and then attended Seton Hall Law School, graduating in 1968.

Barisonek worked with Essex County legal services before going into private practice, doing mostly civil trial duties. His work included serving as municipal prosecutor in Roselle and Clark and a trial attorney in Linden before becoming a judge in July of 1984. Barisonek said he did not originally plan to find his way into a judge's chair.

"When I first started practicing law, I used to sit in on courts and watch the more experienced attorneys," Barisonek said.

In doing so, Barisonek became friendly with Judge William Considine, who encouraged him to consider being a judge one day.

Barisonek said when the opportunity came, he discussed it with his family and decided it was a worthwhile way to help people. "It wasn't a complicated decision for me," Barisonek said.

At the Union County reorganization meeting, Democratic Chairwoman Charlotte DeFillippo praised the outgoing judge's bipartisan nature.

"When you talk about bipartisanship, you're really talking about fairness and treating everyone the same," Barisonek said.

Cassidy, a lifelong Cranford resident who holds degrees from American University and George Washington University, said she is pleased to be stepping into the position.

"I'm very honored and happy the chief justice had the faith in me to appoint me to undertake these duties," Cassidy said.

Cassidy has served in the Union area since being appointed to the bench in 2000 by former Gov. Christie Whitman. She has overseen cases in the civil division and family division.

She previously worked as a partner at the Connell Foley law firm in Roseland.

Cassidy said she never aspired to the position of assignment judge, but found herself drawn to the challenge when it became available.

Good... without a 'Doubt' Award-winner on stage in Summit

There is no doubt that four incredibly fine performers at the Summit Playhouse can fully interpret the intricacies of a playwright's powerful play and meaningful dialogue.

John Patrick Shanley had written, "Doubt," which he has considered "a parable," an actual background to his youthful years of parochial education - and perhaps, even he, may still have doubts as to the true outcome of his story.

Nevertheless, "Doubt," which became a prize-winning motion picture, with comparable Oscar nominations, has become more familiar to the public - and more reason to witness it live on stage - at least, as it is presented at the Summit Playhouse.

The story takes place in 1964 in St. Nicholas, a Catholic church and school, in the Bronx, N.Y. It concerns the dire suspicions of the stern, unyielding principal, Sister Aloysius Beauvier, of her superior, Father Brendan Flynn. She is convinced that he is an "abuser" of young boys in the school and seeks to expose him. However, she has no evidence, so she sets

out to prove her point by enlisting the aid of a young, innocent teacher, Sister James.

The young nun, who appears terrified of Sister Aloysius Beauvier - as are the entire classes of children in the school - reports on an incident in which Father Flynn has befriended the only black boy in the school. And that meager information has whetted the venomous appetite of the vicious principal, enough to confront the priest with unwarranted accusations. But are they unwarranted? Sister Aloysius Beauvier even sends for the boy's mother, Mrs. Muller, and her conversation with the appalled and frightened woman, has only made matters worse.

Chase Newhart, who directed

"Doubt" with a somewhat lenient their own doubtful conclusions as to what is transpiring in this explosive story.

And the actors, themselves, are absolutely wonderful - and, in this reviewer's eyes — absolutely convincing. Jeff Maschi plays the priest with a desperate conviction.

Robbi Curtis, as the principal, whose ideas in education are antiquated, and whose own anxieties and unhappiness has the audience shuddering. Meghan Murray, as Sister James, the lovely, devoted young teacher whose admiration of her superiors appear to be diminishing with each day, who, now, cannot sleep because of bad dreams, appears to have been made for this role.

Daaimah Talley as Mrs. Muller rein, allowed the actors to provide is briefly seen, and she is extremely appealing as a proud, but worried and loving mother, making light of her son's friendship with the priest and concerned about the future of her intelligent, but confused son.

> The set design of the principal's office and the outside of the church is so realistic. J. Guerdon Mayfield and director Newhart are to be congratulated for its realism.

"Doubt" will run through Sunday. Its appropriate title will offer enough doubt to its audiences, its director and its cast and crew, to have a hearty discussion in months to come. One wonders if playwright Shanley had been stymied with his own personal doubt, too.



Springfield artist finds some 'salvation' through painting

Body of work reflects painter's feeling, attitude about life

Artist Amy Charmatz of Springfield is an absolute inspiration to the whole world. And she wholeheartedly credits her interest in art, which has shaped her life.

For a handicapped woman happily married, long-employed in the medical department of JFK Hospital in Edison as a social worker with a degree --- to have everything in life turned inside out due to several brain surgeries that rocked her very existence, Charmatz found salvation in creative art. She has since had more than 18 successful exhibitions in galleries from New Jersey, to New York, Pennsylvania, Alabama, Missouri and California. And one is scheduled in June at the Visual Arts Center of New Jersey in Summit.

"I think the turning point of my life, and the beginning of my efforts at artistic expression, was my lengthy journey through and eventual emergence from a long period of clinical depression," she said.

Charmatz said that she has been "trying to find a niche where I could do something. I have named my body of work. 'Art Saves Lives,' because I really believe it has saved mine."

Originally, she had aspirations of becoming a nurse and attended American University in Washington.

"Then I came to South Orange and attended Seton Hall University to become a social worker," she recalled. "I was employed for a

I hate to let a day go by without doing something. And I have an associate, Maria Costa, who helps me in every way. She drives me places. She's also an artist."





RC vs. Plainfield for championship *UCT girls' final is tomorrow*

ROSELLE – Plainfield held on to defeat Roselle 47-40 in Monday night's first Frank J. Cicarell girls' basketball Union County Tournament semifinal at Coach Hagan Court in The Lions Den at Roselle Catholic. Score one for the soon-to-be-extinct Watchung Conference!

Roselle Catholic then came back on more than one occasion to oust top-

seeded Scotch Plains 51-43 in the second semifinal before a crowd of 750. Score one for the soon-to-be-history Mountain Valley Conference! Now we've got a UCT final nobody has witnessed before.

For the first time it will be fourth-seeded Roselle Catholic – this year's MVC-Mountain Division winner for only the second time and first time since 2005 – vs. second-seeded Plainfield, which before this year last won a Watchung Conference title in 1985.

The two will clash in the championship game here tomorrow night at 7:30. The junior varsity final at 6 p.m. will pit fourth-seeded Summit vs. second-seeded Westfield,

That 1984-1985 season was also the last time Plainfield won the UCT, which was its last of a record seven in a row it captured from 1979-1985. The Cardinals are also in the final for the first time since the 1980s.

The last time the Cardinals celebrated winning the title was just a few moments before we flocked to the movie theatres to see "Rambo 2" and the first "Back to the Future" flicks. The Kansas City Royals actually won the World Series for the only time that October. ATM machines were popping up everywhere. That's how long it's been for Plainfield.

Roselle Catholic – the last MVC team to win the UCT - does not have as many county tournament trophies in its glass case, but the Lions have appeared in the final more recently.

Roselle Catholic won its only crown in 2003 when it defeated Union Catholic in its first and only championship game appearance. The Lions won that night at the Dunn Sport Center in Elizabeth.

Then two years later in 2005 also at Dunn, the Lions had their hearts broken by Union Catholic in the first semifinal when a buzzer-beating shot put the Vikings in the final against defending champion Scotch Plains and left Roselle Catholic wondering, what if?

Roselle Catholic did make up for that tough loss by going on to win its first sectional title that season when it captured Non-Public, North A for the first time.

Roselle Catholic – now 21-4, on a five-game winning streak and the winningest team in Union County - and Plainfield – 16-7 and winners of six in a row and 13-of-15 since a 3-5 start - don't have much of a history against each other.

That doesn't matter to either team. Plainfield just beat a Roselle squad that had won eight straight, while Roselle Catholic downed a Scotch Plains team that was on a 10-game winning streak.

Plainfield was sparked by a team-high 15-point performance from junior guard Chanel Johnson.

"We had to play smart, bring intensity and play defense," Johnson the said. "When we play as a team everybody picks everyone up." gral

UCC women's basketball eyes another region title *Owls 2 wins shy of reaching districts*

Sondra Parin enjoyed a great deal of success as a key performer for the Johnson girls' basketball team.

As a forward for the Group 2 Clark school her relentless efforts on defense and ability to drive to the hoop were instrumental in helping Johnson win nearly 40 games and back-to-back conference titles the past two seasons.

The 2008 Johnson graduate - who also performed in track and field for successful Crusader teams - didn't decide to continue to play basketball until last summer. She's now glad that she did.

Parin is now an important player that the Union County College women's basketball team counts on.

She will be in the starting lineup tomorrow night when the Owls put their first-ever 25-0 mark on the line in the Region XIX semifinals at The County College of Morris in Randolph.

"Coming in I didn't know what to expect," said Parin last week after she watched her high school alma mater win a Union County Tournament game at Rahway. "I came into it blindsided. I wasn't recruited, I was a walk-on.

"Over the summer when I wasn't playing I asked myself, 'what am I going to do with my life? That's when I decided I really wanted to play."

UCC fifth-year head coach Cheryl Bell, who played her high school ball at Union and then her college ball at UCC and William Paterson, is glad that Parin decided to contact her.

"I got in touch with coach Bell and we started in September," Parin said. "I'm going to stay another year and, hopefully, we do just as well next year. Then I would like to go to a four year school, like Division 3, nothing big."

Parin (5-9) is the type of player who uses her athletic ability to excel on defense by being in the right place at the right time - whether it's to grab an important rebound or come up with a necessary steal. On this team, she has no choice. Being in shape and playing sound defense are the staples of UCC hoops.

"Coach Bell is amazing and we work crazy hard in practice and it pays off," Parin said. "We have a deep bench, so a lot of the girls can play together. When we scrimmage each other it's also a good time."

"Sondra is relentless, tough and very open to learn," said Bell, who played at Union for Walt Hennessey her senior year before graduating in 1988. "She's very coachable and she's adjusted to our style of play, which is a running team.

"She likes it and plays well. She's great at grabbing boards at 5-9 and is very fundamentally sound."

UCC won 24 games last year and 29 the year before in seasons that the Owls captured Garden State Athletic Conference and Region XIX playoff championships.

This year's success is nothing new. The twist is that UCC has not lost entering the Region XIX playoffs. The Owls went undefeated in the regular season for the first time and are now ranked No. 6 nationally among Division 2 junior colleges, which is the school's highest ranking.

Right now Bell and assistant coaches Tracy Napoleon and Janell Nelson have the task of keeping the team focused. UCC's last game was a 90-84 win at Burlington County College on Feb. 14.

When the Owls take the court again for their next game this Friday, they will have gone 13 days from their last game to their next.

"We've had an incredible season up to this point not losing at all and have played each game hard," Bell said. "Now we're getting them ready for one game at a time."

UCC's starting lineup for Friday night's game at CCM will be: sophomore Nicole Lilenfeld (5-5) of Piscataway at the point guard, sophomore Courtney Larsen (5-6) of Carteret at the 2 guard, sophomore guard Martyna Ruminska (5-8) of Kearny at the 3, Parin at the 4 and freshman center Crystal Harris (6-3) of Dickinson in Jersey City at the 5. Bobbi Van Fleet (5-11), a sophomore guard-forward from J.P. Stevens in North Edison, has also started at the 4 position.

"We try to recruit heavy," Bell said. "You may lose a girl or two from the break and you never know who is going to return.

"We have a solid foundation and hope for at least seven returnees every year. Next year we should have eight sophomores."

Many of Bell's players were accomplished standouts for their high school teams.

"Most of the girls recruited are 3-4-year starters in high school," Bell said. "A lot of times we get a kid that usually had to do a lot for their high school team.

"Some didn't get looks because, perhaps, their schools were not competitive, but they were still good players.

"We see these kids by the time they are sophomores, then see them in summer leagues and catch them again as juniors and seniors.

"We work a lot at this. Many times we are at a high school game and then going right to practice."

With defense at the forefront, UCC has allowed less than 50 points 10 times and less than 40 four times so far this season.

"We have very good team chemistry and have a very good defense," Parin said. "The coaches stress defense the most.

"We hope at the end of the game that we're in better shape than the other team is. Most of the time we are. Defensively, they understand, although a lot more work needs to be done," Bell said. "Hard work and defense are the biggest things we pride ourselves on."

Crystal Harris leads the team in scoring with a 15point average from her center position.

"Offensively, we're clicking and playing well together," Bell said.

Now, after what will be a long layoff between games, it will be interesting to see how quickly UCC will be able to click in a big game on Friday night.

From here on in the season is one and done. If UCC wins Friday night it's on to Sunday's championship game, with a berth in the districts on the line. If not, then the Owls season will be history.

Let the pre-March Madness begin!

NOTES: Should UCC capture Region XIX for the third straight season by winning at CCM tomorrow and then on Sunday in the championship game there, then the Owls will be competing in the District Tournament, which is one game.

It pits the Region XIX winner vs. the Region XX winner on March 7 at Community College of Rhode Island. Although it is technically considered a "Nationals" game, the winner will move on to the more advanced National Tournament.

UCC lost to Community College of Rhode Island in district play the past two seasons – two years ago at Community College of Rhode Island and last year at CCM.

Bell explained that UCC's gym in Cranford is not big enough to host a district game according to the Division 2 junior college rules, with district games being considered the first national games. In regular season play this year on Jan. 18, UCC won at Community College of Rhode Island 63-50. It was the second win in two days there for the Owls during a weekend of tournament competition. UCC edged Genesee Community College of Batavia, N.Y. 59-57 at Community College of Rhode Island the day before on Jan. 17.



Plainfield had to really dig deep to survive the quarterfinals. The Cardinals trailed seventh-seeded Summit 36-24 with 6:30 remaining in the fourth quarter before ending the game with a 21-0 run.

"Everybody's trying to win, so we're going to play as a team," Johnson said.

Roselle, which appeared in the semifinals for the first time in three years, fell to 15-9. As the 11th seed the Rams were the only seed outside of the top four to reach the semifinals. They will now look forward to competing in the Central Jersey, Group 2 playoffs for the first time since reaching the final in 2006 when they lost to eventual champion Rumson-Fair Haven at Bridgewater-Raritan. Roselle will play at Rumson in a first round game on March 2.

Scotch Plains, which appeared in the semifinals for at least the sixth straight season and was seeking its fourth title after winning its first three crowns in 2004, 2005 and 2007, slipped to 18-7. The Raiders will seek success in North 2, Group 3 after suffering a tough UCT semifinal loss now for the second straight season after winning the crown two years ago.

Scotch Plains lost to eventual first-time champion Westfield in last year's semifinals after beating the Blue Devils in overtime in the 2007 final.

"Anyone can win at this point," said Roselle Catholic senior forward Kelly Hayes, a South Orange resident. "We've seen upsets and we just upset the No. 1 team tonight."

Hayes played well defensively against Scotch Plains senior center Kaylin Jaichon, who scored only six points, which is well below her average. Hayes grabbed six rebounds, while Jaichon had to sit the final 5:45 of the second quarter with three fouls.

"I think that if we come in and each player does their job – not everybody is going to score 30 points and not everybody is going to get 13 rebounds – we have a chance," Hayes said. "Everyone has to do their job individually in order for us to be successful."

Roselle Catholic won the fourth quarter 12-8 against 12th-seeded Cranford to beat the Cougars by one in a very scary quarterfinal for the Lions.

Now, after knocking off one very tough Watchung Conference team in Scotch Plains, the Lions will have to beat another Watchung Conference squad in order to win their second UCT crown and first in six years.

Roselle Catholic will be playing at home again on Friday night, but will still be the road team like it was Monday night because they are the lower seed once again. Like Monday, the Lions will be the underdogs to a bigger Watchung Conference team that will be very tough to handle inside.

"Having our fans here and believing in ourselves will be our biggest thing," Hayes said. "It doesn't really matter who is the better team.

"It's who will be ready to play that night in that game because any team can roll."

In the first half of the Roselle-Plainfield game, the visiting Rams started well in the first and second quarters, opening the first with a 6-0 run and the second with a 5-0 surge.

However, Plainfield closed both quarters a bit better, ending the first with a 5-0 run and the second with a 9-0 streak to take a 24-15 halftime advantage. Roselle did well to outscore Plainfield 14-8 in the third quarter, with standout sophomore point guard Bianca Partlow leading the way. She scored five of her gamehigh 16 points in the period.

Meanwhile, Plainfield missed its first nine shots of the third and had no rebounds to Roselle's six as the Rams pulled to within 24-22. Johnson made Plainfield's first field goal with 4:12 left in the third.

"We had droughts and I had to let them know that we had to score," Plainfield first-year head coach Mauri Horton said. "Half-court wise we know we always have to get better."

Roselle was only down 32-29 going into the fourth quarter.

The closest the Rams got after that was pulling to within 38-34 with three minutes left after freshman center Nyasia Davis made two free throws. Imani Cox followed with two free throws and Asia Smith with an inside basket to put Plainfield back in control at 43-34 with two minutes remaining.

"We like to run and get up and down," Horton said. "We work on our half-court game in practice. We take our time and move the ball and hit rhythm shots."

Plainfield had a big run at the end to knock out Summit. The Cardinals had a big run in the beginning to have the lead the rest of the way against Roselle. A more consistent effort might be needed to take home the trophy Friday night.

"We feel like we're never defeated and have learned from our losses," Horton said. "That's the biggest thing.

"We can't get rattled. As long as we play tough defense we're going to be in any game. We've been talking about this since the summer time. I just want them to play and that's what they're doing. They're playing good basketball."

Roselle Catholic jumped out to a 4-0 lead on Scotch Plains behind an outside shot on the left side by junior point guard Jenny Malone and two free throws by Hayes, which was her only two points of the game.

It didn't matter that Hayes was not able to fill up the hoop. Her job and that of bench player Anthonia Ajumobi, who also finished with two points, was keeping tabs on Jaichon.

Scotch Plains had to end the first quarter on a 4-0 run to trail only by a 10-7 margin going into the second quarter.

Then a seesaw game broke out.

After the first tie of 14-14 following a 5-0 Scotch Plains run in the second quarter, Roselle Catholic took its second lead and then Scotch Plains tied the game again at 16-16.

The first Scotch Plains lead – which was 18-16 - was realized when sophomore forward Aysia Peterson made the first of her two field goals after grabbing an offensive rebound and putting the ball back in from positioning in the lane.

Roselle girls' excel with UCT quarterfinal victory

ROSELLE - The Roselle girls' basketball team will next look forward to competing in the Central Jersey, Group 2 playoffs for the first time in three years after being eliminated from the Union County Tournament Monday night by Plainfield.

The 11th-seeded Rams did well to reach the semifinals for the first time in three years and were the only team outside the top four to get to the final four.

Roselle gave a solid effort in a 47-40 setback to second-seeded Plainfield. On Monday, the 12th-seeded Rams will play at fifth-seeded and defending champion Rumson-Fair Haven in a CJ, G2 first round contest.

The last time Roselle played a state tournament game was when the Rams reached the 2006 CJ, G2 final at Bridgewater-Raritan. Roselle was defeated by Rumson that night.

Here's what was written last Thursday night following Roselle's quarterfinal round victory over 14thseeded Elizabeth:

Exactly three weeks ago the Roselle girls' basketball team took a beating at the hands of Mountain Valley Conference-Mountain Division arch rival Hillside, falling 47-26 on the road.

Roselle defeated Hillside 49-38 at home exactly three Thursdays before that.

One reason for the difference in the score the second time around was that Roselle junior guard Jakoya Duggans didn't play. She was being reprimanded by head coach Kim Kenny.

Duggans poured in a game-high and season-high 23 points in helping Roselle defeat Hillside the first time the teams clashed.

The Comets took advantage of her absence the second time and let the Rams have it three weeks later.

At that point, Roselle was 7-8 and had to re-group just to be able to qualify again for the Central Jersey, Group 2 playoffs.

Duggans was also not allowed to play in Roselle's next game, with the Rams hanging on for a 35-33 home win over Union Catholic. She then re-entered the lineup and Roselle has not lost since.

Duggans scored 12 points and grabbed 10 rebounds in helping lead 11h-seeded Roselle past 14th-seeded Elizabeth 41-25 Thursday night in the first of two Frank J. Cicarell Union County Tournament quarterfinal contests that took place on Coach Hagan Court in The Lions Den at Roselle Catholic.

So, in the last three weeks Roselle has gone from falling under .500 at 7-8, having to play without their top player Duggans for a few games, getting Duggan back, qualifying for the states and then becoming the first team to make it to the UCT semifinals.

Roselle, now 15-7 and on an eight-game winning streak, is also the only team seeded outside the top four to reach the UCT's final four.

Duggans' return to the lineup has helped a great deal. "We are all playing as a team and tonight we came together and pulled it off," said Duggans, whose squad took the lead for good in the first quarter against Elizabeth by ending the period with an 8-0 run for a 13-5 advantage after the first eight minutes.

Now the Rams will see if they have a victory or two in them when the states commence this Monday.
