

#### projects 2.9% levy

SPRINGFIELD — Taxpayers were given a first glance at the Board of Education's \$34.5 million total budget proposal. School administrators are applauding the spending plan as one of the "most sound" in years.

The first draft of the 2009-10 budget was approved unanimously by the board during its well-attended March meeting.

A taxpayer with a home assessed at the township average of \$100,000 can expect an \$81, or 2.9 percent, tax levy increase from the 2008-09 spending plan. The proposed increase is well below the 4 percent state cap.

The total budget, which represents a 1.8 percent, or \$619,082, decrease from last year's budget, was submitted to the county Superintendent's Office March 18.

County Superintendent Carmen Centuolo

may make minor changes or suggestions before returning the budget to the Board of Education cuts due to smart decisions school officials for public approval or defeat April 21.

District Superintendent Michael Daving assured voters no existing school programs or jobs would be affected if the spending plan is approved.

"We will, at the very least, be able to maintain the established programs within the district," Davino said during his budget presenta-

Davino said \$30,000 has been allocated for a web-based Rosetta Stone foreign language program for students in grades pre-K through 12 and their parents.

"The state is expected to implicate a new global awareness standard and a focus on technology," Davino said, "The Rosetta Stone program should cover both standards."

Clarke and Davino said officials were able to

develop the budget without making program made three years ago.

"A lot of other districts were forced to make cuts the last two years, but we decided to take our hit three years ago," Davino said. "We were told there was a change in the state aid formula three years ago and we reworked the numbers according to the new formula."

This year, Springfield's state aid was flat, remaining at about \$1.5 million. While school administrators approved the budget, some concerns were raised by Business Administrator Matthew Clarke regarding projected enrollment figures for the 2009-10 school year, particularly at Walton Early Childhood Center. There, kindergarten enrollment is expected to increase by 11 students, potentially causing the need for an additional teacher.

# CCUC opposes TD Bank project



The Concerned Citizens of Union County, a six-member action group formed more than a year ago, has voiced its concerns about the possible construction at the vacant site since the bank first introduced the project in November 2007.

# Residents bid farewell at Mass for fallen teen

ROSELLE PARK - Hundreds of mourners filled the Church of the Assumption last Friday to say goodbye to wrestling champ, best friend, brother, and son, Anthony Casselli.



# Three join municipal race; mayor declines

HILLSIDE — The petitions for municipal elections are in and certified, confirming four separate slates of candidates will run for office in the township's most contentious municipal elections in recent years.

The newest additions to the races include incumbent councilmen Jerome Jewell, who has his eyes on the mayor's seat, and Frank Deo, who will defend his atlarge seat. Current Board of Education Vice President Angela Garretson and resident President Carlisle fill out their ticket, the other two at-large seats. By law, Garretson must resign her position on the school board if elected to council.

"We need to have a mayor that's going to be accountable," Jewel said about his choice to run.

After several years of tension and disagreement with the Township Council and department heads, present Mayor Karen bar, who are running for council McCoy Oliver has opted not to seek re-election. She could not be reached for comment at press time.

Jewell is the founder of the Jewell Foundation, a community outreach program supporting organizations geared toward children and families. The foundation offers book bags and school supplies to youngsters, as well as taking them editorial@thelocalsource.com.

on various trips. "I'm always in the community," Jewell said, noting the actions he believes will allow him to be a productive mayor.

Deo, who was appointed to the council in 2007 following the death of former councilman Peter Corvelli, ran unopposed the same year, when the term expired.

"I'm hoping we have increased communication and a good relationship between mayor and council to move Hillside forward," Deo said, noting the large number of candidates running for township office this year.

"It's a good thing for the community. It's a sign there are people interested," Deo added.

Former council candidate Joe Menza will run for mayor, leading a slate comprising George Cook III, Joseph Puglise and Jean Miller.

Another slate of candidates, calling itself "Team Hillside," consists of Andre Daniels, who is running for mayor, and Jeffrey Dykes, Sandra Cureton and Naomi Escoseats.

Yet another slate consists of Shelley Bates for mayor and Sip Whitaker, Leonard Dupree and Beverly Lynn for council. Bates did not return repeated calls for comment.




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

# Cops: Mistaken identities may have led to assaults

ROSELLE - Authorities believe two brothers found wounded and lying in two different borough streets last week were assaulted by gang members.

According to police reports, both victims, who ran from their attackers, were battered by six unidentified black males, in their twenties, wearing clothing that was blue and gray - colors commonly worn by "Crips" gang members.

The 18-year-old Elizabeth victim was cut on his forehead and wrists, in addition to being punched and kicked. He was treated at University Hospital in Newark. Monday morning, he was not listed in serious condition, according to police, who noted he has been unable to offer information about the attack due to his injuries. The 19-year-old Rahway victim, who stated the two were brothers, suffered bruising above his left eye and pain in his right knee. He was treated and released from Trinitas Hospital in Elizabeth.

The brutal attack appeared to be a case of mistaken identity, according to police reports, which indicated the suspects were avenging an earlier assault on a friend.

On March 17, at approximately 8:52 p.m., police found one of the victims lying in the intersection of East 2nd and Chandler avenues. The other was sprawled on the sidewalk nearby, on the 200 block of

One of the victims told investigators they had been escorting their girlfriend home when they noticed a dark colored Pontiac circling the area.

After dropping the girlfriend off, the pair said the suspicious vehicle pulled over near East 5th and Chandler avenues, where they had been walking.

Six men got out of the car and one asked the two ictims: "Did you jump my homey?"

When both men denied the attack, the suspects chased them on foot toward East 2nd Avenue, where they caught up with them. The victims said they were pushed to the ground and beaten. One claimed he didn't recognize the assailants, but noted the blue and gray clothing suggested they might be in a gang.

A witness told police they saw the suspects flee in different directions. The police probe into the case is

# LPD: Watch out for flimflammers

LINDEN — City police have issued a warning to elderly residents; beware of "flimflammers" trying to con their way into your children. home.

Flimflamming, which is any form of theft through deception, is always a serious concern, said Linden Police, who are bringing it to incident less than two weeks ago.

On March 16, at about 10:30 a.m., one scammer managed to woman's Elmwood Terrace home by posing as a city employee and snatch hundreds of dollars in cash and jewelry, according to Police Lt. Raymond Tyra.






Rahway High School held a voter registration drive to encourage students to share their voices during the upcoming school elections. Diego Del Pozo fills out a registration form March 4.



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


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
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# Post 322 moves; shifts focus

SUMMIT — American Legion Lindsey-Street Post 322 hopes the recent sale of its headquarters on Union Place will finance more fundraising and community programs.

The sale of the legion's 59-year home has shifted the organization's focus. "It was such a hassle for a service organization to keep up that building. We're getting out of the management business and into the service business," said William Rapp, commander of the post.

According to Rapp, major expenses included maintaining a liquor license, insurance and property taxes paid to the city. He estimated the sale will save Post 322 between \$50,000 and \$75,000 annually.

While the savings are imminent, some post members said they view the sale as bittersweet. "I'm saddened." said Adam Kohlhof, the current membership chairman who had lived in the building for 40 years. "The financial burden resulted in us not being able to support many of the causes we normally would." Some causes included supporting veterans of both current and past wars, according to Kohlhof.

He noted the post's membership has increased by 20 percent since June; up to 115 members. He feels the sale of the property will not hinder further growth, because it has provided the organization with the financial resources to expand some of its public service programs, Rapp explained.

Recently, the post donated \$1,700 to Lyons Veteran Hospital in Basking Ridge for its peer counseling program. Members have also donated flat panel televisions to area hospitals and visited local schools in the past to educate children on flag history, Americanism and special holidays. "It will also allow us to enlarge our membership to include all service personnel who were in the military during declared wars," Rapp said. 7700, ext. 124, or editorial@thelocalsource.com.

The post also plays a large role in organizing Summit's annual Memorial Day Parade and celebration, as well as the annual Fish Fry fundraiser held in the downtown area.

This year's parade will be held May 26. Rapp expects it to draw approximately 1,600 people. The Fish Fry will be held May 30, and usually earns the post approximately \$1,200.

In an effort to save money, the organization will hold off on leasing space or purchasing a smaller building, but it will use the Central Presbyterian Church on Maple Street for its bi-monthly meetings, according to Rapp.

The Union Place building was built in 1895 and has been sold to Steve McFarland of Short Hills, a partner in the current development of an office/residential complex at the former Summit Medical Group site on Deforest and Summit avenues.

McFarland's Feb. 23 application to the Planning Board to rebuild the third floor at the facility and extend the rear of the entire building were approved. The top two floors of the building have been designated as office space, while retail stores fill the first floor. It is unknown what retailers might be sought to fill the

The American Legion Lindsey-Street Post was established in 1945 and has since been a gathering place for local veterans living in Summit and its surrounding area.

"If I had my choice, we'd still have the building," said Kohlhof. Though letting go has been hard, it's something he knows he must do. "I understand the reasoning behind the move."

# Registered sex offender charged in second assault

SUMMIT - A man already registered as a sex offender has been arrested for allegedly carrying on a sexual relationship with a 14-year

Jesse Goodman, 30, of Annandale was nabbed by city police March 14, and charged with one count of second-degree endangering the welfare of a child, along with two counts of second-degree sexual assault.

In October 2004, Goodman was convicted in Middlesex County on one charge of endangering the welfare of a child after he was accused of having a relationship with a minor, according to the Union Prosecutor Theodore Romankow, County Prosecutor's Office. He in September, Goodman met the was required to register in his hometown as a sex offender under Megan's Law.

Middlesex County Prosecutor's Office spokesman, Jim O'Neill, said he could not discuss the details of Goodman's previous conviction.

Goodman was on parole at the time of his arrest, Union County Prosecutor's Office and Summit Police Department began investigating Goodman after the victims' parents notified authorities he may have had a relationship with their daughter.

According to Union County teen on a popular networking Web site geared toward teenagers. Soon after the relationship turned sexual, Goodman frequently traveled to Summit to see the victim, and often took her to his home in Hunterdon County and to his father's business in Sterling,

Goodman's family could not immediately be contacted for com-


During a court-ordered search warrant executed at Goodman's home, police seized a number of computers and files.

If found guilty on all charges, Goodman faces a minimum of 30 years in prison, according to county police.

Union County Superior Court Judge Stuart Peim set Goodman's bail at \$400,000.

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

# Handled with care

One of the most difficult things a high school administrator can face is a tragedy involving a student. In Roselle Park, the tragic death of senior Anthony Casselli, who was killed in a motor vehicle crash involving six other borough students last week, brought members of the community together in a show of support for the students and members of the Casselli family, as well as the families of the six survivors. But it was high school principal Sarah Costa who, above all, should be commended for the order and sensitivity she brought to the situa-

From the moment word began to spread and hundreds of residents gathered at the school, Costa put the needs of the students first, calling in a team of guidance counselors and opening the school building to droves of scared, confused teenagers as they tried to come to terms with the death of their classmate.


Although much of what Costa did is exactly what one would expect of a school administrator in such a situation, it's clear that the way in which she handled the situation made it a little easier for the students to grieve and will pave the way as they continue to cope with this tragedy.

# Trouble spot

To say that Skate 22 in Union has not been a model business would be an understatement. The skating rink has been a headache for township officials and local police, who visited the facility more than 500 times last year due to various incidents, some involving violence. The breaking point occurred Dec. 26, 2008, when 16-year-old Jean D'haiti was allegedly shot and killed by another teenager during a Christmas night party, and the businesses' entertainment license was revoked by the township.

A Union County Superior Court Judge has ruled that the business must remain closed, at least until another hearing takes place in April. For now, that decision makes perfect sense from a safety standpoint, but in the long run, the last thing the township needs is to lose another business. Shutting down local merchants will do little to stimulate the local econ-

We agree that the skating rink has been a major source of trouble in town, as evidenced by the recent violence that occurred there. It's also obvious that not enough has been done by the Skate 22 Inc., the corporation owns the rink, to prevent such incidents. Philip Walker, the proprietor of Skate 22 Inc. should, without a doubt, be penalized for allowing things to get so far out of hand. He should face tougher restrictions and monitoring by the town and be forced to alter the types of events that take place at Skate 22, but in the end, the business should be allowed to remain open.



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# Ex-teacher pleads not guilty to assaulting former student

SUMMIT - A former city educator arrested four weeks ago for allegedly assaulting a 15-yearold student has pleaded not guilty

Warren Halsey Brown, 67, made his first court appearance March 20, before Union County Superior Court Judge Joan Robinson Gross in Elizabeth.

Brown stood solemnly, encased in a glass room within the court at Union County Jail, as his attorney, Marcy McMann, moved to reduce his bail from \$375,000 to \$150,000.

The higher bail indicates Brown is being viewed as a flight risk. "Because of his health issues and family in the area, Mr. Brown is not a flight risk. He has no previous complaints or record," McMann explained.


Within a week of being incarcerated at Union County Jail, Brown received a quadruple bypass at St. Michael's Medical Center in Newark.

According to McMann, Brown experienced heart failure soon after arriving at the jail, prompting the surgery. He returned to the hospital for a check-up several days after the procedure and is now being held for observation in the medical section of the jail.

"Certainly his condition has improved since the surgery," McMann said, noting she could not "delve deeper" into Brown's medical issues.

Brown, who retired in October from Kent Place School in Summit, met the alleged victim at the private school for girls in grades K through 12 in September 2007.

According to Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow, the relationship turned sexual in September 2008 and continued for

several months through activities who McMann explained have all outside of school. "To abuse a position of power and manipulate a young person into an inappropriate relationship is reprehensible," he had said in a press release issued shortly after Brown was arrested Feb. 24,

He was charged with one count of first-degree aggravated sexual assault, one count of seconddegree sexual assault and one count of second-degree endangering the welfare of a minor.

If found guilty on all assault charges, Brown faces up to 30 years in prison.

The Hillside resident has two daughters in their 20s and a wife,

been "very supportive" of Brown.

McMann said Brown's case is still in the discovery phase, and she will know more about their next move once that process is complete.

Brown's second court appearance has been scheduled for March 27.



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
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# Taxpayers face \$81 increase

Aside from enrollment concerns, members of the board agreed the proposed budget is among the most sound since the dissolution of the district's regional status in the 1997-98 school year.

Until 1998, the Union County Regional High School system included students from Springfield, Mountainside, Garwood, Kenilworth, Berkeley Heights and Clark.

The last of Springfield's dissolution payments, about \$218,000, was factored into last year's budget, according to the de-rationalization settlement.

Board President Anthony Delia described this year's budget as "phenomenal."

"We were able to [budget] without taking away from our kids, and we were able to address the kindergarten problems." Delia said. "We could not have asked for a better budget."

Davino acknowledged school officials would like to add or improve existing programs, but said not having to make cuts during current economic climate is "something to be proud of."

"If the economy hadn't tanked, we would be able to expand, but it did, there's no avoiding that fact," Davino explained. "Given that fact, I am extremely proud of what we have been able to accomplish."

Down the road, Davino said school officials will look into making some capital improvements to the facilities, as well as expanding curricular offerings.

"We would have loved to create some new vocational strands, such as some culinary arts classes," Davino explained.

# CCUC rejects bank development

The property was originally part of Liberty Hall estate, where the state's first governor lived from 1772 through 1790.

The 140-acre estate has since been sold off piece by piece.

CCUC spokesperson Daniel Pagdon said many Union residents think the site, located on the Elizabeth border, is part of the city, leading them to have very little concern for its fate.

TD Bank's building proposal calls for the 3.2-acre site to be sub-divided into two lots. The 3,800 square-foot, single-story bank would be built on the larger of the lots, a 2.1-acre parcel. The remaining 1.1-acre space would be donated to Union County for open space.

"We feel it's a great way to show we care about the community," Lauren McClintock, media relations associate for TD Bank, had said about the new plan. She would not disclose the total projected cost of the development.

Pagdon said TD's new onebuilding plan is an improvement beyond the original proposal, which included a pharmacy on the site, but still doesn't appeal to residents who believe the potential construction will interfere with the county park system, as the site is located between Phil Rizzuto and Ursino parks.

"The system was originally designed to connect all the different parks along the [Rahway and Elizabeth] river pathways so you could actually walk through the whole county without leaving the park," Pagdon said.

CCUC members also claimed in a recent press release notifying the public of a rally against the project that the intersection is one of the most hazardous in the state.

But state Department of Transportation spokeswoman Erin Phallon said that is not the case. "We don't consider that a dangerous intersection," Phallon said.

Police Sgt. Robert Christie said traffic is not much of a problem at North and Morris avenues. "There are issues all over town for traffic, but there's nothing of greater concern there than anywhere else," Christie said. "Traffic accident statistics have actually been reduced since the state made improvements

at the intersection."

Lane modifications and upgrades to the traffic signals were made over the past two years, Christie said.

Union County Manager George Devanney said the county recently received formal notification about the offer of land from TD Bank, but has not had time to look into the matter. "From what we understand, the land is contiguous to the Elizabeth River Parkway, and we are always glad for an opportunity to add to public parkland. But, before moving forward, we will need to exercise due diligence to ensure that it's an appropriate acquisition for the county," Devanney said.

TD Bank, an international company with about 1,100 branches operating in the U.S., has two existing facilities in Union, and a total of 14 in the county.

The hearing on the application, which was postponed from March 18, will be held April 15. CCUC members will be on hand and have urged area community members to attend the Zoning Board meeting.

During a tearful eulogy, Anthony's uncle, Vincent Casselli, shared stories and memories about "A-Nice," a nickname given to him by friends.

"Not seeing you again is the hardest part, but all my special memories of you forever will remain in my heart," Vincent said, recalling the joy of when Anthony was born, and the pride when he wrestled in the state wrestling regionals only a few weeks ago.

He urged family and friends to also keep Anthony alive in their memories. "Everyone's life here was touched in a special way by Anthony," Vincent said. During the Mass, Reverend Dennis Crowley asked everyone present to be a support system to each other and help the family during the tragedy. "Remember how precious life is, and how fragile," he said.

Surviving Anthony are his parents, Ron and Kim, and sisters Jennifer and Katelyn.

The March 14, accident occurred at around 9:30 p.m. on Route 35 in Toms River. Six other borough teens in the vehicle were also injured when the 2005 Mazda, driven by Alex Aravena, veered off the road, struck a utility pole and overturned. Passenger Kelly Angus, 14, is still being treated for her injuries at Jersey Shore Uni-

versity Medical Center in Neptune, and is listed in stable condition.

Toms River authorities have said they plan to file charges against the 17-year-old driver, who witnesses say was speeding. Police have not yet disclosed how fast the car was traveling

Aravena also had a provisional license, which does not allow a new driver younger than 21 years of age to have more than one non-related passenger in a operating vehicle at a time.

Authorities said most of the passengers were not wearing seat belts when the crash occurred.

# **Probe into Roselle** murder continues

ROSELLE -- The owner of a Roselle liquor store was fatally shot during an armed robbery last week, authorities said.

Jitendra Parikh, 64, of North Bergen the owner of the Skylark Discount Liquor store on West 1st Street in Roselle was shot during the course of a robbery that occurred at approximately 8:30 abandoned building that led to the p.m. March 18, Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow said in a press release.

the store at the time of the shooting. Investigators are reviewing video surveillance footage taken from an outdoor camera.

According to police, Parikh, who was found bleeding behind the register, was transported to University Hospital in Newark, where he died a short time later.

"This is another example of senseless violence," Romankow said in the press release.

As of Tuesday, no arrests had been made in the case.

"This is the first homicide in Roselle for 2009, and the fourth in Union County so far this year," according to the press release.



The comments, bashing board President Anthony Delia and Superintendent Michael Davino, include statements such as, "This is how Mr. Davino works. He divides communities and groups of peo-

The board is considering filing a complaint with the School Ethics apparent violation of the School for School Board Members, according to Delia.

School officials said they feel the action may need to be taken because the county and state is keeping an eye on the board and its practices since it failed the governance portion of last year's New Jersey Quality Single Accountability Continuum. The board was forced to submit a district improvement plan to the state.

Delia told the two dozen residents who attended the meeting the resolution was not a determination

of Strumpf's guilt or innocence.

Strumpf, who contends the allegations are false, said if charges are filed with the state Ethics Commis-Commission with regard to an sion, he will hire attorney Brenda Liss of the Morristown-based firm Ethics Act and the Code of Ethics Riker Danzig. "I maintain my innocence and will vigorously defend this," Strumpf said a week after the board meeting.

Residents who attended the meeting aired their frustrations during a public comment period following the reading of the resolu-

"The disrespect and mistrust on this board is disgraceful," said resident Fran Sandler.

# **Kent Place youths** 'embrace' Kenyans

SUMMIT - Twelve Kent Place School students who touched down in Kenya two weeks ago were on a mission to implement values guiding them throughout their classroom experiences — tolerance, understanding and helping cultures different from their own.

Students from the all girls school and chaperones, selected through a competitive screening process, left March 13, and were expected to return Monday. Their almost 7,400-mile journey was more than a vacation.

Instead of emphasizing the "Three Rs," the Summit school's Kenya focus was on the "Three Es" and motto for the trip - "Embrace, Envision, Empower."

"It contains an inspiring message, specific to women, which also describes the objectives of our Kenya project," Chaperone James Palmieri, assistant to operations and athletics, explained about the motto.

After spending one night in the capital and largest city in Kenya, Nairobi, the delegation headed to the Maasai Mara Park Reserve region.

The girls took part in a service learning project requiring them to literally "get into the trenches" to help improve conditions at Empopongi Primary School. They helped install a system needed to deliver drinking water to the dormitories. Students worked daily, laying and connecting pipeline to the building, according to Palmieri.

Middle School Director and chaperone Karen Rezach noted others supporting Kent Place also played a role in the project. "Our school even assisted in...purchasing...the pipeline. Financial contributions [were made] towards it, in lieu of directly donating to the school," Rezach said.

The American students' reach has extended past the dormitory and into Empopongis' classrooms. "They [were] active in teaching the Kenyans health topics, including hygiene." said Rezach, who also directs the Ethics Institute at Kent Place School.

Junior Caitlin Wrath. 17, who paid her own way to Kenya with her fellow students, was excited before embarking on the trip. "I'm looking forward to working with new students," she had said.

Visiting the developing world was not a new experience for her. "Last year, I traveled to South America under a different program," Wraith pointed out.

Rezach got the idea for the student trip after visiting Kenya with her hometown rotary, in Maywood, two years ago. She enlisted the help of fellow rotary members, including Kevin Williams, to coordinate the trip.

Williams helped Kent Place with travel accommodations and aided in buying needed equipment and supplies for the pipeline project. He xplained the Maasai's lifestyle, influenced by their ancient culture, necessitates an emphasis on teaching cleanliness.

"Many Americans find it hard to understand the Maasai are living the same way their ancestors lived two thousand years ago," Williams said. "They have never been educated on how good hygiene can prevent many diseases from spreading from one person to the whole community. Washing hands is very new to them, as are many other 'normal' good-health customs we've used for centuries."

The trip marks only the start of a longer lesson for Kent Place students. Youngsters who attended are expected to submit a report to Rezach, detailing plans for helping underprivileged Africans in other ways.

They must [explain] how they will continue what they started," she explained. "Whether that involves going back to Kenya some day, meeting with Kenyans here or educating their fellow Americans so they learn more about the situation, is up to them."



#### KEEP YOUR PETS SAFE FROM POISON

Many owners assume that their pet's natural instincts will keep them safe from accidental poisoning, a potentially dangerous misconception. Animals, like children, must be protected from ingesting toxic substances. Aside from well-known toxins such as antifreeze, de-icing salt, some houseplants, and medications, watch out for less obvious things like cocoa mulch and lawn care products. Protect small mammals from cedar or pine shavings. Keep birds away from oven cleaner fumes. Nothing is cuter than a kitten playing with a ball of yarn, but string, yarn, even rubber bands pose a serious choking or strangulation hazard. Also keep your trash bagged and scaled in barrels. 








A campaign treasurer for Democrat politicians ranging from state assemblymen to local mayoral candidates has been indicted for the alleged theft of campaign funds from former Union County Assemblyman Neil

Rosemary McClave, 66, was charged with theft by deception as well as six counts of tampering with public records by a Mercer County grand jury on March 23.

According to a press release from the New Jersey Division of Criminal Justice, the indictment charges McClave wrote 10 checks to herself, totaling \$5,562.54, from Cohen's election fund, which she allegedly used for personal purchases.

"The checks, which were written and signed by McClave, were purportedly written as reimbursement for various campaign supplies, including computers, ink, paper and The Hillside resident is alleged to have other items," the New Jersey Division of

embezzled more than \$5,000 between 2003 Criminal Justice press release states. "The Express to pay McClave's American Express bills. However, McClave did not purchase any campaign supplies using her American Express card. Instead, she purchased personal items, including clothing from QVC and

The press release indicates that McClave allegedly filed six reports with the New Jersey Election Law Enforcement Commission "that falsely claimed she was reimbursed by the election fund for campaign supplies."

> McClave was not arrested, and will be summonéd to court. She will be represented by attorney John Whipple of Chatham. Whipple could not be reached for comment.

# Stimulus may benefit police

#### \$1 billion in federal funds earmarked for law enforcement hiring grants

The \$787 billion federal stimulus package isn't just helping fund

Police departments throughout Union County are currently investigating the possibility of applying for a \$1 billion hiring grant within the federal stimulus package set aside to fully fund newly-hired law enforcement officers across the

The COPS Hiring Recovery will completely pay for three years' worth of salary and benefits of entry-level, newly hired police officers or rehired officers who were laid off due to budget cuts, according to the Department of Justice, which is running the program. A police department must also keep the officer on staff at least one year after the grant runs out.

There is no limit to how many officers each department can file for, but national funding is capped at approximately \$1 billion.

"As local law enforcement professionals struggle with the current economic crisis, we can't afford to decrease our commitment to fighting crime and keeping our communities safe," said Attorney General United States Eric Holder in a press release

Already four Union County police departments - Linden. Roselle, Clark and Kenilworth announced they are researching the criteria of the grant and hoping to apply by the April 14 deadline.

Only the Summit and Cranford police departments have ruled out applying for the grant, saying they already have enough officers. See STATE Page 25 Many police officials have indicat-

ed that the plan is a relief to departments as the economy sags and budgets across the state get slashed.

Many departments have been slow to bring their forces up to a full complement and plan to take advantage with three years paid by the government.

Some jurisdictions are laying off police officers," said Linden Police Chief Michael Boyle. "But it's very important to maintain a full complement."

Roselle Police Department also has fewer officers than it would like, with four officer below full capacity. Police Chief Jerry Orlando hopes to fill at least a few positions through the stimulus grant, calling it a "great opportunity."

Kenilworth Police Chief William Dowd said his department is fully staffed, but they may still apply in order to fill upcoming retirements.

The hiring grant could help them skip around a municipalityimposed hiring freeze in the bor-

Despite the tempered optimism, departments are still suspicious about the grant program.

Though funding is paid for three years, the salary and benefits go back on the books after that, so municipal officials still need to make space in future budgets.

No municipal officials or police chiefs have decided to fully commit to applying for the grant before they gather all the details.

"With any federal grant there are strings attached," said Clark Police Chief Denis Connell. "You have to fully investigate those strings before you jump in and take advantage of it."

# inden schools lead in ESL

Imagine living in a small rural town in Columbia, not speaking a word of English, having to travel almost an hour to get anywhere, and never before even seeing a locker. Now imagine being taking from that comfort zone and placed in an American high school.

This was the reality for Linden High School senior Laure Motta, but with help from the district's English as a Second Language, or ESL, program, she has now completely adjusted to American high school life, speaks English fluently and is preparing for college life.

Last year, the New Jersey Department of Education named Linden a "Model District" for their efforts and strides with the ESL

On March 12, Linden School 4 hosted a panel dialogue session with the state Department of Education Office of Leadership Development as well as approximately 75 school officials from all over the state, including panelists from Howell, Perth Amboy, Red Bank, Roselle and Linden.

"We all need opportunities to

everyone sharing," said Elaine Davis, director of the office of leadership development at the NJDOE.

According to Alphonsina Paternostro, the supervisor of Linden's world language, bilingual and ESL programs, the goal of the panel discussion was to get supervisors and teachers from different districts to share thoughts and recommendations as well as to show the importance of an ESL program.

Some topics discussed were qualities that make an effective leader, how principals can effect or support ESL teachers and what supplies are needed to run an effective program. Though neither the state DOE nor Union County feels there is any concern with the ESL programs, both took this opportunity to gather school officials and share ideas that could move their respective programs forward.

"I am delighted, particularly with Linden," Union County Superintendent Carmen Centuolo explained. "Scores have continually improved, and we're moving in the right direction."

Linden Superintendent of Schools Rocco Tomazic saw the

network with each other and to get discussion as an opportunity for people with knowledge to share that knowledge. Although Linden has been recognized as one of the state's leaders in ESL programs, Tomazic humbly stressed that everyone can stand to learn more.

> "We are far from the experts," Tomazic said. "We have as much to learn as anybody. Nobody knows it all and nobody knows nothing."

Supervisor of ESL in Roselle, Elizabeth Franks said everyone present had the opportunity to learn what works and what doesn't.

"The ESL programs are tremendously valuable," said Jacqueline Moore, supervisor of Howell's ESL program. "They serve to help students adjust to a new culture as well as learning the English language."

After completing the ESL program in Linden in just two years and against very strong odds, Motta plans to pursue a college major in engineering with a minor in physics once graduating from Linden High School.

"ESL was very helpful," she explained. "It taught me the grammar and phonetics and helped to get me adapted to a second lan-

(Continued from Page 24) general. Vespucci said most schools were already being prudent in such matters, but the DOE opted to "spell it out" to avoid uncertainty. Since the final draft was released, the state and the individual districts seem to have forged a quick understanding.

Catherine Fernandez, a member of the association who works as the Summit Board of Education's communications coordinator, said

working on a district's Web site is not considered a "pure" public relations duty, although it still provides regular news and communication and is more visible than press releases.

"I would say district Web sites are primarily a public information device," Vespucci said.

Fernandez agreed.

"Public relations is a term that to me says you are putting a spin on things, and I don't feel that what we do is spinning anything," Fernandez said. Fernandez said public relations workers often provide important information to taxpayers as well as other branches of media.

Fernandez said the work she and others like her perform is often varied and critical.

"There's a lot of crisis management, a lot of people working on websites — a lot of people are really right hand men or women to superintendents," Fernandez said.

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



production. And we all want it to be amazing. That's our ultimate goal."



All he needs to make his point is a small book. So, in 60 pages, Naimark manages to highlight the ideosyncracies of perpetrators on the interstate who jeopardize their own lives while causing accidents, some fatal, among those around them. By reading all 32 brief, amusing, yet somewhat tragic chapters, a truly rotten driver can reverse himself — or herself — simply by learning courtesy of the road — and how not to be a truly rotten driver.

Naimark's unusual book, which book chains and retailers, actually is important automotive lesson to be learned, apart from a driver's manu-

smirk, is ironically able to teach the so-called unteachables.

Among the brief chapters, the titles speak for themselves: "Rage Rover," "Speed Limits," "Tethering Car Occupants," "Senior Denizens," "Drunk Driving," "Double Parking,"
"Tailgating," "Signaling," "Car
Lights," "Litter," "Snow and Ice," "Stop, Yield and Traffic Lights," "The Rolling Boom Box," "Teen Age Driver," "Chivalry," "Left Turns" and "Random Insurance."

Naimark points a finger at truly rotten driving behavior and imperfections, and in accentuating every aspect of the misuse of one of the most important elements in life the automobile - the author can cause a driver to take serious note and very well reverse the ways and means of his personal driving habits. He — or she — by reading this truly unusual book, may point an accusing finger at George M. Naimark, Ph.D., and, in turn, write one's own little volume, calling it, "How To Be A Truly Great Driver."

It is, after all, why this book was written in the first place. Isn't it? Can this book find its proper place on the shelf of this reviewer's bookcase among the "How To" books? Only time will tell.

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
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
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

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# Caldwell and Clark make city of Rahway very proud

## Caldwell national champ wrestler and Clark leads Louisville to Sweet Sixteen

It was quite a weekend for Rahway athletics around the country as two junior class athletes made headlines.

First Darrion Caldwell became Rahway High School's initial national champion wrestler as he captured the 149 pound championship Saturday night at the NCAA Wrestling Championships in St. Louis, Mo.

Then Earl Clark helped lead the Louisville Cardinals men's basketball team to another Sweet Sixteen appearance as the top-seeded squad in the Midwest came back to beat ninth-seeded Siena 79-72 Sunday in

Clark scored 12 points in Sunday's second round win after also netting 12 points, grabbing five rebounds and dishing out three assists in Friday's 74-54 first round triumph over 16thseeded Morehead State.

Louisville, seeking its first Final Four appearance since 2005 and its first national championship since 1986, will next face 12th-seeded Arizona this Friday night at 7 in Indianapolis, Ind., with hopes of reaching this Sunday's regional final.

Clark helped lead Louisville to a regional final last year where the Cardinals fell to North Carolina.

This time next year he may be one of the top rookies in the NBA.

Caldwell may redshirt next year and wrestle his final season in two years, with the nationals being held in Philadelphia in 2011. Caldwell has a goal of competing in the 2012 Summer Olympics in London.

"It was an amazing feeling, words can't describe it," Caldwell said Monday of winning his national championship. He began wrestling at the age of nine in

Clark moved from Plainfield to Rahway and helped elevate the basketball program under Chris Remley. The Indians reached the Central Jersey, Group 2 final his sophomore and junior seasons and then won it for the first time his senior season three years ago.

Clark paced Louisville in scoring this year with a 13.6 regular season average in 30 games. The Cardinals are now 30-5 after entering the NCAA Tournament as the overall No. 1 seed following Big East Conference regular season and tournament championships. The Cardinals also earned a No. I ranking for the first time, finishing the season before NCAA Tournament play as the final No. 1 team in the country.

Also in 2006, Caldwell became Rahway's and Union County's first three-time state champion, finishing with an outstanding high school record of 146-4 (.973). At the time he was Union County's winningest wrestler.

Caldwell and Clark highlighted a very talented group of athletes - including Temple football player Andre Neblett - that were members of the Class of 2006 at Rahway High.

"The entire city and the Rahway school system is enormously proud of both of them," Rahway Athletic Director Tom Lewis said Monday morning. "They have brough such positive accolades back to the city of Rahway and the atheltic department in particular, which is quite fabulous to have.

"The two of them in their own way have electrified the city. Everyone has been paying great attention and shown great admiration to the two of them. They were both talked about a great deal in school today for what they have achieved.

Caldwell was the Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Year and Wrestler of the Year his freshman season two years ago when he went 20-6 at 141 and won an ACC championship. He finished fifth in the country at 149 last year.

On Saturday he was not about to lose to junior Brent Metcalf of Iowa for a second time this season. He surprised many be beating the top-seeded Metcalf 11-6 in the title match and was named the 2009 NCAA Most Outstanding Wrestler. Last year, Metcalf won the 149 title - with his only loss coming to Caldwell, which was also the only loss of his career before losing to Caldwell again - and was named the 2008 NCAA MOW and then the Hodge winner, recognized as the best wrestler in the country.

The Hodge Trophy is the eqivalent of the Heisman Trophy in football.

The consensus heading into the championship round of the NCAA Wrestling Championships was that Metcalf was just plain unbeatable, that no one could stop him in his request to repeat as champion at 149 pounds.

"I really didn't have any pressure, other than a little bit I put on myself," Caldwell said. "It was really satisfying. It was the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. I finally accomplished what I set out to do years ago."

Caldwell took the defending national champion down twice in the first period and was in control of the match throughout. He became NC State's fifth national wrestling champion and its first since Sylvester Terkay in 1993.

The final score does not indicate just how onesided the match was. Caldwell, who finished 38-1 on the year, took Metcalf down just seconds into the match to take a 2-0 lead.


"I just wanted to go out there and show myself that I could wrestle, regardless of who people thought was the best," Caldwell said. "I feel like I gave it my best effort. I felt like I could go against anybody.'

Caldwell's high school head coach Anthony Reinoso - who is now the head coach at Linden, with Fred Stueber back in charge at Rahway - explained that Caldwell pinned Metcalf in a regular season match last year and that Metcalf defeated Caldwell 19-3 in a National All-Star Meet match early this season. The loss did not go against Caldwell's record.

"This was the rubber match," Reinoso said of the championship bout. "When he pinned Metcalf last year he caught him with one of his patented spladle moves, which is a move he won several matches with at Rahway."

As Saturday's match continued, Metcalf escaped, but Caldwell got him in a headlock and threw him to the mat for the second takedown of the period. It was the first time Metcalf had been taken down twice in a period in more than a year.

The Crusaders then won their first Cron Tournament championship. Johnson won the first Union County Ice Hockey League regular

The Crusaders then captured the first Union County Cup trophy. Johnson set the school record for wins in a season, netting 20 for the

So on and so forth.

The best season in the program's history included junior center Nick Villaverde setting the school record for goals in a season with more than 50.

Villayerde also led Johnson in scoring in 2006-2007 as a freshman and in 2007-2008 as a sophomore. He had 32 goals and 23 assists for 55 points as a freshman two years ago and 31 goals and 32 assists for 63 points as a sophomore last year.

Dan Kargus, a 2005 graduate, scored 170 goals and had 99 assists for 269 career points.

Jonathan Nudo, a 2003 graduate and the younger brother of Johnson head coach Michael Nudo, finished with 105 goals and 87 assists for 192 career points.

While many top-notch players will be lost to graduation, Villaverde will be one of many key players back for the 2009-2010 season.

Although the Crusaders fell to Bergen County rival Glen Rock in the Public B state playoffs - Glen Rock was the only team to beat Johnson this year, including a regular season game - Johnson did well to come back and tie Northern Highlands in a non-league game after losing to the Bergen County power in last year's Public B quarterfinals.

Metcalf escaped again near the end of the period and Caldwell took a 4-2 lead into the second period. Caldwell started in the down position in the second period, escaped, then scored a takedown on a counter move off a Metcalf shot to take a 7-2 lead.

"After I lost to him 19-3, I knew just how bad he scored on me and that I had to capitalize on my opportunities this time," Caldwell said. "Throughout the whole tournament I was wrestling well on my feet and taken down only once.

"I think I gained riding time on all wrestlers and about 15 takedowns to one in the tournament. I was just feeling really good the whole tournament."

Caldwell cruised in the third period. He got one more takedown and led 9-3. Metcalf got an escape and it late takedown - the only one against Caldwell the entire tournament - but the issue was decided by that time.

"In the championship match, he (Metcalf) had all the pressure built up on him," Caldwell said, "Some of it was his doing and some of it the peoples. He had a lot to live up to. In my mind I knew I could win and in peoples' minds I was the underdog."

Following the match, as Caldwell began his victory celebration, Metcalf gave Caldwell a big shove and was penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct, costing Iowa a valuable team point in its quest to repeat as team champions - which the Hawkeyes eventually did.

The loss was only the second of Metcalf's career and ended a 69-match winning streak. Metcalf's loss to Caldwell last year cam on Nov. 24, 2007. He finished 37-1 on the season.

Caldwell, in earning the MOW, also won once by fall and three times by major decision during the tournament, allowing just 12 points in five bouts, all on escapes. He did not allow a takedown in the enitre tournament. Counting the 7-1 lead he had when he pinned Penn's Cesar Grajales in the opening round, Caldwell outscored his five opponents by a combined 52-12.

It's still up in the air whether Caldwell will compete for a fourth year next season or the year after.

"Nothing is set in stone yet," Caldwell said of whether he might red-shirt for next season and then wrestle his final season in 2010-2011. "I will wrestle this summer and see how good I do in freestyle. If things don't work out and if coach (Carter Jordan) wants me to wrestle for the upcoming season, that's how it's going to be.

"I highly doubt he will need me, with next year being a rebuilding year. We should have a real dominant team the year after. I would like to take a year off and work on my academics."

It also appeals to Caldwell that the nationals will be moved from St. Louis again next year to Philadelphia the next year.

"I can come back in two years a lot bigger and stronger," said the 5-10 Caldwell. "To be closer to home in Philadelphia in the nationals, that would be a good way to end my career."

After 2011 comes the 2012 Summer Olympics in London. "If it works out I can go right from my senior season in Philadelphia to training for the Olympics in 2012," Caldwell said, "Our assistant coach (Noel Loban) is from England. He has a bronze medal in freestyle from the Olympics."

Loban competed for the U.K. in the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles, He was a six-time British national champion and placed fourth in the World Championship at Budpest, Hungary.

After placing fifth at 149 last year, Caldwell felt even more confident coming into his junior season this year.

"I thought this year that I felt a bit more mature for my age," said Caldwell, who turned 21 six days before Christmas. "I've found North Carolina State as a place where it's not hard to come in here and get better. It was a big jump coming in here from high school, but the coaches here have been able to hone the skills that I have."

In addition to the three state championships he won at Rahway, Caldwell was Rahway's first four-time Union County Tournament champion, a four-time District 11 winner and a three-time Region 3 champ.

"His goal since he was a young kid was to win a national championship in college," Reinoso said. "It's ironic too that he beat a wrestler from Iowa because growing up he wanted to be a Hawkeye. It's a place he wanted to be and Iowa talked to him a bit.

"One of his lifetime goals has now been achieved and hopefully there will be the Olympics ahead and such. It's the culmination of a lot of hard work and people helping him along the way. He's gifted."

Caldwell's only loss this year - Reinoso explained - was by medical injury default to Kyle Terry of Oklahoma in a dual meet. The NCAA Tournament reported that Caldwell was undefeated, but the North Carolina State website takes into account the setback to Terry.

"I was able to speak to Darrion after every round (of the nationals)," Reinoso said. "I tried to tell him that his main focus should be not to let Metcalf take him down

"My advice to him was for him to do what got him there and for him not to get defensive and try not to get scored upon. I told him that his best defense would be his offense and to open up and score as much as he cold. He knew he had to be dominant early and that's what he was."

"He's the greatest wrestler to come out of Rahway," Lewis said. "The whole wrestling community has hung on to this."



# Roselle Catholic girls' post year to remember

The Roselle Catholic girls' basketball team just posted one of its best seasons ever, sparked by four girls who will be back next season: juniors Allison Skrec, Meghan Faughnan and Jenny Malone and sophomore Melissa Tobie.

Here are some highlights:

- The Lions finished 22-4 and No. 1 in Union County, leading the county in wins and tying the school record for most wins in a season,
- Roselle Catholic only lost twice at home and twice on the road and only once at home at full strength.
- The Lions won their second Mountain Valley Conference-Mountain Division championship and first since 2005.
- Roselle Catholic captured its second Union County Tournament championship and first since 2003. The Lions ended up being the last team from the MVC to win the UCT and Roselle Catholic was also the last parochial school to win the UCT.
- The Lions, seeded fourth, defeated the top two seeded teams to win the UCT, downing Watchung Conference foes Scotch Plains, the top seed, in the semifinals and Plainfield, the second seed, in the final in a double overtime classic.

Roselle Catholic began its UCT run with a convincing win over another Watchung Conference school - Union - and then survived a big-time scare from MVC-Mountain Division rival Cranford in the quarterfinals, beating the eventual Central Jersey, Group 2 finalist Cougars by one.

- Roselle Catholic won conference and county championships in the same season for the first time.
- Roselle Catholic also won its own December holiday tournament and began the season with a 9-0 start after winning 13 of their final 18 games last year to finish 14-10.
- Roselle Catholic was 3-0 in overtime 2-0 in single and 1-0 in double. Here are the results:

ALLISON SKREC, junior shooting guard: She scored 406 points in 26 games for a 15.6 average. Skree averaged 18.4 points in Roselle Catholic's final eight games.

She scored at least eight points in every game.

Skrec led RC in free throws completed and made, making 77-of-116 for 66 percent.

MEGHAN FAUGHNAN, junior forward: Also a UCBCA selection, the 5-9 Faughnan averaged 12.6 points, 5.6 rebonds and 1.2 steals. Of her 328 points, 132 of them came on 3-pointers. Faughnan finished with 44 "3s," making one in as many as 22 of RC's 26 contests.

JENNY MALONE, junior point guard: A three-year varsity performer like Skrec and Faughnan, Malone averaged six points, 4.7 assists, 2.8 steals and 2.5 points. Malone suffered a season-ending knee injury with two minutes left in the fourth quarter of the UCT final against Plainfield and did not play in Roselle Catholic's season-ending state tournament home setback to Holy Angels.

MELISSA TOBIE, sophomore guard: A first-year varsity performer, Tobie averaged 8.1 points, netting a total of 210. She also averaged 6.8 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 1.6 steals.

KELLY HAYES, senior forward: Coach Skrec and all of Hayes' teammates were quick to recognize the magnificent job Kelly did of limiting Scotch Plains standout senior forward Kaylin Jaichon to just six points in a 51-43 UCT semifinal victory at RC over the top-seeded Raiders.

# Union softball out to be the best in Union County

Union was the second best softball team in Union County last year.

This year the Farmers - with every starter back except for at third base and shortstop - have designs on being the best.

The Farmers are coming off a 24-4 campaign that included a second consecutive universal Watchung Conference championship.

Union was defeated by Cranford 2-0 in the Union County Tournament championship game, reaching the final for the first time since 2002 when the Farmers lost to first-time champion Cranford.

The Cougars are coming off a 25-1 campaign and a third straight UCT championship. Cranford's only loss was in its only North 2, Group 3 contest.

Cranford, in addition to a senior-laden team wanting a fourth straight UCT title, will set its sights on trying to do better in Central Jersey, Group 2 at the end of the season.

While Cranford may have the best hitter in the state in Fordham-bound senior Katherine VanBenschoten. Union might have arguably the best pitcher in Union County in junior left hander Amanda Kardys.

"I would say Cranford is the favorite," said Union head coach Chris Flinn, at the helm since 1996 after serving as an assistant to George Hopkins.

"We don't play Cranford, but in our conference Linden and Westfield are strong and you also have other teams like Roselle Park, which made the county semifinals last year."

Cranford, last year's Mountain Valley Conference-Mountain Division champion, is the best from the MVC, with junior Kelly Hardman and VanBenschoten on the mound and senior Deanna Russomanno at shortstop heading a squad loaded with experience.

Union is among a group of Watchung Conference teams that could prevent the Cougars from celebrating another county championship.

The key to Union's success this year will be the left arm of Kardys, who was 16-4 with a 1.04 earned-run average last year after posting a 9-6 mark as one of two Union pitchers two years ago.

"Amanda played all summer - she went to Florida a couple of times to play in tournaments - and performed well," Flinn said. "She has developed a couple of more pitches and is a little bit more of a complete pitcher."

Kardys struck out 219 in 134 innings last year and walked only 19. She tossed 11 shutouts, with three of them coming in the UCT. In four UCT games, she went 3-1 and allowed only two runs total in 26 innings.

Kardys struck out 13 and did not walk a batter in the UCT final against Cranford, allowing only four baserunners total in seven innings.

Kardys also proves valuable at the plate, batting .320 (24-for-75) and driving in 28 runs from her No. 5 position in the batting order last year.

Kardys earned First Team All-County honors in The Star-Ledger last year. So did catcher Hana Gross.

Now a senior, Gross will continue playing softball at Alfred University in Alfred, N.Y., near Buffalo.

"Hana has a great arm, throws out a lot of people and blocks the plate well," Flinn said.

Gross led the Farmers last year in batting average, home runs and RBI, winning the team Triple Crown.

Gross was among Union County's three strongest catchers last year, with seniors Brittany Murray of Johnson and Jenny Drechsel of Cranford the others. Linden's Courtney Melchionna, one of the county's top hitters, was also a fine backstop for the Tigers last year, filling in at there. She is now also one of the county's top seniors.

Gross batted .493 (35-for-71), slugged nine home runs and drove in 37 runs from the No. 3 position in the lineup.

"She hit home runs off Cyndil Matthew of Westfield - the 2007 Star-Ledger Union County Player of the Year - Fitzsimmons of Bridgewater-Raritan and the Bishop Ahr pitcher," Flinn said. Matthew, a senior, will continue playing at UMass.

Gross also did well to throw out Cranford junior speedster and leadoff batter Russomanno attempting to steal second base in the top of the first of the UCT final on a strike out-throw out double play.

Union continues to be strong up the middle with senior four-year starter and two-year First Team All-County perfomer Jessica Goncalves in center field.

"Jessica plays softball 12 months a year," Flinn said. Gonealves also played varsity soccer, but continued to play softball in fall Sunday leagues.

"She's the best center fielder in the county I would say," Flinn said. "She covers a lot of ground, has a great arm and has thrown a lot of people out at the plate."

# Flood insurance is recommended for homeowners

When people hear the word lons of water. If you take action "flood," New Jersey is not the first place that often comes to mind.

Yet, the Garden State is home to four of the top 75 counties nationwide that are most susceptible to flooding. Allstate Insurance Company, parent corporation of Allstate New Jersey, the Insurance the Information Institute and the National Flood Insurance Program don't want to see consumers get soaked.

According to the I.I.I., Atlantic, Ocean, Hudson and Monmouth counties are at a high risk for flood-

Most troubling is that, on average, a mere 20 percent of homeowners in those counties have flood insurance.

"Though awareness has increased in light of recent events, there is still a lot of work that needs to be done regarding educating consumers about flood insurance, said Dan Dressel, claim field director for Allstate New Jersey.

"For example - take Monmouth County - less than 10 percent of the county's homeowners are covered with flood insurance. If a hurricane or a strong Nor'easter should hit, many residents could potentially suffer a great economic loss."

"Flood insurance is affordably priced and it really does offer homeowners great protection," said Dressel

Many think only those living in coastal areas or near large bodies of water should have flood insurance, but that's not necessarily the case.

In fact, the Federal Emergency Management Agency reports that 25 percent of all claims paid by the National Flood Insurance Program are for policies in low-to-moderate risk communities.

Given the amount of coverage provided with a policy, it is a smart affordable purchase. The I.I.I. stated that in 2006 the average amount of flood coverage was \$190, 849, but the premium only averaged \$474.

#### Snow melt problem prevention

Allstate www.floodsmart.gov, the official Web site of the NFIP, offer these guidelines to protecting your home when winter gives way to warmer conditions:

 Snow can hold a lot of water. Each cubic foot of drifted, piled or compacted snow may contain galnow, you can prevent that snow from becoming a flooding problem.

· Make sure downspouts carry water several feet from your house to a well-drained area.

About 2,500 gallons of water will come from a 1,000 square foot roof with one foot of snow depth across the roof. This much water may cause problems if it's allowed to drain next to your house.

Move snow on the ground away from the house.

Water from the snow may cause a wet basement if allowed to run down along the basement wall. If the ground is sloped 1 inch per foot near the house, moving the snow just 3 to 5 feet from the house will reduce problems.

· If you have a sump pump, examine and clean it. Test your sump pump by pouring water into

Make sure the discharge hose carries the water several feet away from the house to a well-drained area. Also, make sure that the pipe is on sloped ground so it drains to prevent it from freezing.

· Remove snow from around rural yards to minimize soft, wet soil conditions.

Remember that a 20-foot diameter, 10-foot high pile of snow contains about 2,600 gallons of water. Move the snow to well-drained areas.

#### Don't get soaked

Consumers should be aware that most homeowners, commercial and renters insurance policies do not cover flood damage. Homeowners may need separate flood insurance coverage to protect against losses from floods during hurricanes, thunderstorms or any time of the year.

In general, a policy does not take effect until 30 days after you purchase flood insurance. So, if the weather forecast announces a flood alert for your area and you go to purchase coverage, it's already too late. You will not be insured if you buy a policy a few days before a
