


ing. They don't want all that 'koom bi ya' stuff, but we really did all become very close friends."

ROSELLE - Second chances can be few and far between. Former Abraham Clark High School and University of North Carolina athletic standout, Jesse Holley, said he will try to make the most out of one he recently received.

Jesse, brother of borough councilman Jamel Holley, was one of 12 players chosen from a pool of 30,000 applicants around the country, to be a part of the Spike network's new reality show, "Fourth and Long," which will award one football player, from the group of six wide receivers and six defensive backs, a spot on the Dallas Cowboys' 80-man pre-season roster. "I'm just excited to be given this unexpected opportunity," the wide receiver said.

Jamel said his family is proud to see Jesse pursuing his dream.


"We are all standing behind Jesse 110 percent," he said. "He is hard-working and dedicated to the game, and we're proud of him."

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

Murder suspected in death of woman

RAHWAY -Police are actively investigating the death of a 24-year-old woman found dead in a Rahway apartment two weeks

The body of Jennea Workman was discovered at approximately 9 a.m. May 8 inside her Cambridge Court apartment on West Main Street and Elizabeth Avenue, where she lived alone, Union County Prosecutor's Office spokesman John Holl said.

Workman's death was the result of blunt force trauma to her body, according to Holl.

gineers, businesses pave way for 'Streets

ROSELLE — Plans for a drastic facelift to downtown Roselle are closer to reality after the Urban Enterprise Zone released potential designs and cost estimates for its "Streetscape" project.

A May 15 luncheon of more than a dozen local business and property owners was a follow up to a similar meeting held last month to unveil a sketch of the plan and get input on the project. This summit, however, was to discuss specific details of the plan to renovate the sidewalk along Chestnut Street, between 1st and 3rd avenues, from

the style of benches. "Today [was] step two," said UEZ coordinator Harry Wyatt.

Engineers on the project, from Brick-based CMX firm, said the entire plan - replacing the sidewalk from curbside to storefront ---will likely cost between \$1 and \$1.3 million covered by \$1.4 million already gathered in grants by the municipality. Funding includes a \$153,000 UEZ grant and the rest from the state Department of Transportation.

The engineers showed different types of concrete and brick sidewalks, models of benches, trash

the type of bricks they may use to receptacles and lighting, as well as could begin as early as this fall or progress on the project. discussing potential color schemes and styles, "Roselle has earthytoned buildings and structures, brown and tan, with a mix of brick and concrete buildings. You would look at that...to determine a color pattern," said Joseph Perrello, a landscape architect with CMX engineer. He noted other towns with similar aesthetics often have gray sidewalks and white, tan or brown paving.

> Wyatt said he wants to hold a public hearing within two weeks in order to finalize designs and complete the bid process quickly.

Construction is estimated to last between 60 to 90 days, and the project will be completed in sections, so it will not disrupt businesses in the area, officials said.

In response to concerns raised at the last meeting, business owners were reassured they would not pay into the project and recently renovated facades or sidewalks could be incorporated into the general plan.

"For a long time they've been talking," Jaymini Patel, whose husband owns property along Chestnut Street, said about Roselle's plans to renovate the downtown. "But now, they're finally doing."

The municipality and UEZ are already looking into obtaining grants to cover "Streetscape" expansions on the rest of Chestnut Street, leading up to the public library and businesses on St. Georges Avenue and the Cranford border, Mayor Garrett Smith said.

Second LHS educator admits padding hours

LINDEN - The second Linden High School teacher accused of double billing employers has pleaded guilty to tampering with payroll records, according to Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow.

Kimberly DeMatteo, 38, of Howell admitted to double billing both Linden School District and Manalapan-based Sunny Days Childhood Developmental Ser-vices, according to court records.

"As part of her plea deal, DeMatteo will surrender her position in Linden and will be barred from ever seeking public employment," Assistant Prosecutor Ann Rubin said.

According to charges filed in November 2008 by the county Prosecutor's Office, DeMatteo and her husband, Michael Maurer, 37, often claimed they worked two separate jobs at the same time for Linden schools in order to boost their overtime pay between Aug. 22, 2007 and Jan. 30, 2008.

DeMatteo was later charged with pulling the same scam between August 2005 and January 2006 at Sunny Days, a school catering to developmentally disabled or autistic children. At one point, she even billed Sunny Days for seeing its clients at the same time she was billing Linden Board of Education for teaching and tutoring work, Rubin said.

Because of the plea agreement, DeMatteo will likely receive non-custodial probation, according to county police.

Dematteo will be sentenced June 1 in Middlesex County Superior Court

Maurer pleaded guilty to two counts of fourth-degree falsifying records last month. In his plea agreement, he also ordered to resign his teaching position and cannot seek public employment in New Jersey, according to Rubin.

"[These teachers] are not bad people, they just got caught in something they shouldn't have been doing," Linden Superintendent Rocco Tomazic said.

He added school officials plan to add safeguards to prevent similar scams from reoccurring. A computer program is currently being developed for the district to cross-check all time sheets and detect double billing.

Linden schools will own the program and it is expected to be completed by fall. Representatives from Sunny Days did not return calls for comment.



Explosion at Goodliffe kills 30-year employee

LINDEN — An explosion at a welding supply company claimed the life of an employee who police said set off the blast while filling an oxygen tank.

Nine other employees working at J.W. Goodliffe & Sons at injured, according to local authorities

The employee, identified as Thomas Coon, 60, had been filling a 5-foot-tall tank holding approximately 60 pounds of oxygen at the 1900 East Elizabeth Ave. facility when it exploded at approximately 11 a.m. May 13.

A report on the cause of the incident is expected to be filed sometime this week, according to Occupational Safety and Health Administrator investigator Lonia Simmons.

Linden Police and Fire departments. Office of Emergency Management, Emergency Medical Services, Union County Hazmat and an investigator from the office of Occupational Safety and Health Administration responded to the accident.

The building was briefly evacuated and the area where the explosion occurred was cordoned off. Employees were able to return to work in the rest of the building shortly afterwards.

Coon had been working in a space described as an "enclosed garage area, surrounded by brick and an overhead door," according to Linden Police Lt. James Sarnicki, who said the garage was separate from the main building, where the rest of the employees were working.

The blast "knocked over numerous tanks and damaged the ceiling. An overhead garage door was blown out with damage to the concrete block wall," Linden Police Capt. Raymond Tyra said in a press release issued the day of the accident.

Coon, who lived in Bridgewathe time of the accident were not ter, had been working at J. W. Goodliffe & Sons for more than 30 years when he was killed.

"Based on everything [OSHA] is seeing, they said it will be a short investigation. I'm guessing results will come in a few days," said Sarnicki.

The owner of the business, who police identified as Robert Goodliffe, said there has not been an accident at the business since 1986.

Sarnicki noted there have been no previous safety complaints filed against the company.

The business fills and services tanks containing industrial gases including oxygen, nitrogen and acetylene, Tyra said.

Authorities said they were unsure if any charges would be filed against the company.

"It's too premature to say," Sarnicki said last Thursday. "Any charges are contingent upon what the [investigation] determines."

Another area work place death occurred Dec. 1, 2007, when Victor Diaz, 42, of Linden and Carlos Diaz, 41, of Paterson were suffocated by toxic chemicals while cleaning out a 20,000-gallon retention tank at the North East Linen company on East Linden Avenue in Linden, Following the incident, OSHA issued several safety citations against the business owner.



Remember the fallen

On Monday, as is the custom every Memorial Day, red poppies will be seen in abundance at cemeteries, war memorials, town parks and churches to honor those brave soldiers who gave their lives in service to their country. The tradition was started in 1915 by Moina Michael, who had been inspired by the poem "In Flanders Fields" to sell poppies to raise money for servicemen in need. The VFW continued this tradition nationally in 1922.

Originally called Decoration Day, Memorial Day was started by women's groups to honor fallen soldiers shortly before the end of the Civil War. By the late 1800s, all northern states recognized this holiday, although southern states were slower to join in the festivities. The Holiday Act of 1971 ensured the last Monday in May would be designated for Memorial Day, to ensure a three-day weekend. For many, it is the unofficial beginning of summer.


Unfortunately, the true purpose of this day has given way to backyard barbecues or trips to the park or other festive occasions. Cemeteries are often ignored, the grave sites of fallen soldiers unvisited. Few people remember the customs and, except for local parades led by aging survivors of World War II, it can be just another day off from work or school.

Our nation has tried to recommit itself to what this holiday actually stands for in recent years. Beginning in 1998, on the Saturday before Memorial Day, the Boys Scouts and Girl Scouts place a candle at each of the approximately 15,300 grave sites of soldiers buried at Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park on Marye's Heights in Virginia as part of the Luminaria Program. And in 2004, Washington, D.C., had its first Memorial Day parade in more than 60 years.

These are good steps, but more needs to be done locally to remember our fallen heroes. Talk to family and friends about loved ones who gave everything they had to give to protect the freedoms we hold so dear. Visit cemeteries and help maintain the upkeep of their final resting places.

Visit the living as well at VFWs or other local places where veterans congregate. And come out for your town's parade with the entire family, waving your flags proudly and cheering everyone, living or dead, who has served in our armed forces.

This is a day to honor their memory. Let us never let them be forgotten.

Rules and the First Amendment

A Constitutional Law professor used to raise hypotheticals and wait for the answer. A response found acceptable often brought the tinge of a smile. An unacceptable response often spurred the question "Were you a poli-sci major?"

For Dennis Kobitz, the administrator for the County Board of Elections, he wasn't given the chance to respond. The accusers were members of the American Civil Liberties Union. They released a very high sounding report, "Making every vote count: a review of the 2008 elections in New Jersey."

They said "overly restrictive administrative policies and inadequate enforcement of existing rules continue to adversely affect people's ability to vote." They added, "Transparency and public accountability must be improved as well."

Pretty heavy stuff. After all, transparency has risen to a level of great esteem in the public consciousness. What a shame the group wasn't subject to the scrutiny of whether or not high sounding equates to reality.

Their report cited four relatively insignificant examples for the entire county. Dennis Kobitz understands his job. He is accessible and follows up on complaints. He also defends the board employees and poll workers who make the process work.

No one bothered to ask Kobitz about the four examples of election problems that brought forth such a serious report. Two examples had to do with poll workers excessively asking for voter identification. While asking for ID is acceptable, it shouldn't be automatic. In another case, a poll worker used provi-

sional ballots rather than allowing the citizens on the machine to vote. Each complaint was properly dealt with by Kobitz and staff. One last change was so specious so as to need no review.

Where Kobitz became pointed was his response to the charge that four counties, including Union, "continue to roadblock the registration of ex-criminals with "improper demands." The so-called improper demands by Kobitz were to ask for the release documents. Hardly unreasonable, in light of the precious right to vote which is regulated in the case of ex-convicts.

There is a lesson from the experience of Dennis Kobitz, High sounded attacks harking the first amendment need our attention. But, when they turn out to be hollow, that also deserves public scrutiny.

Take the example of Ed Davenport and TV 35 in Cranford. Mr. Davenport, the paid station manager, seems to have his problems periodically with local programming. One ex-mayor called Davenport "a politician with a small 'P."

Davenport's most recent controversy centers on an improper mixing of appropriate cable television oversight and the fallacious charges of violation of the first amendment. Davenport permitted the mayor of the community, David Robinson, to be part of a panel show consisting of three mayors discussing budget resident of Cranford.

problems. Whether or not a mayor running for election can be on the show is a subject for review of the by laws of the local cable franchise.

What it is not, is a bubbling First Amendment issue. Starting with the Federal Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984 and later the state legislation establishing the Office of Cable Television, your local public access channel is decidedly regulated.

The internal rules usually prohibit candidates from access during the time of the candidacy. Exceptions are made for coverage of public meetings. Look at Deputy Mayor Mark Smith in Cranford and Clark Mayor Sal Bonaccorso who frequently use the time for reports of public officials to lambaste opponents or people in other political parties.

In the case of public access, the usual standard is "qualified individuals and organizations may utilize public access for the purpose of cable casting non commercial access programming in conformance with the petitioners public access rules.'

The standards and traditions are always subject to review at the time of renewal of the franchise, usually every 10 years.

The rules regarding access should always be subject to review. The point is that the standard is the agreement between the community and the cable TV franchise provider. To mix up that oversight with a civil liberty or a non existent First Amendment right would spur the anger of a lot of constitutional law professors.

4. Learn about the Internet. The more you know about how the Web works, the better prepared you will be to teach your children about potential risks.

Study: Youth Center in need of upgrade **By Paul Greulich** sory Board and Shaping Summit Together had form the eastern entrance into the city's down-**Staff Writer** discussed the possibility of selling the existing

SUMMIT - A 13-month study targeting ways in which youth services can be improved revealed the city's youth center needs a boost.

The study conducted by volunteers from various city organizations stemmed from discussions between officials, and the Department of Community Programs Advisory Board and Shaping Summit Together, a non-profit organization consisting of community members. Findings were reviewed by the two community groups during a special May 12 Common Council meeting.

City youths in grades 6 through 12 were asked what they think should be available at the center, both after-school and on the weekends. Results showed youngsters wanted a place to "hang out," with Internet access and an opportunity for non-structured activities and non-competitive team sports. "There were surveys with the youths and discussions with their families." said Judith Leblein-Josephs, director of Community Program.

Department of Community Programs Advi-

Summit Youth Center property at 2 Walnut St. this grew into a broader review of the city's youth services, quality of the program and its funding model.

'We did not deliver...fast recommendation, because, in these times, we find it impossible to do so," Josephs said in regards to the strain the current economy puts on making largerscale changes, such as building a new center or leasing space to house the facility.

Annette Dwyer, Shaping Summit Together board chair, said the center, which is open to youth on a "drop in" basis and is frequented by more than 200 high school and middle-schoolage youngsters, was constructed in the 1950s and is in need of repair, particularly to windows and the heating system.

"Our team findings place a priority on Gateway 2 or near it. We will continue to analyze facility options," said Dwyer, who noted she is unsure how much the youth center property could sell for.

The Gateway 2 project is an effort to trans-

town into a residential area that will appeal to commuters.

Josephs assured residents and officials the study was not aimed at eliminating youth programs. "We were looking at the best way and the best location to provide programs," she said.

City Administrator Chris Cotter said the General Services Committee will review the recommendations and report back to the Common Council. Cotter said no timeline for this next stage of the process has been set.

"The goal is to move as rapidly as they can with this, understanding that the disposition of that building rests on the economic climate," Cotter said.

The community center on Morris Avenue is another site that hosts youths programs. A master plan study will be commissioned this year to identify ways to better utilize the center, Cotter said.

Berkeley Heights officials reveal 'horrors' of government

(Continued from Page 1) unhappy with his Township Committee's practice of selecting the mayor from within, an issue he now sees as minor in comparison to Berkeley Heights' present ills.

Both DiPasquale and Bonacci said state statutes that define the dozen or so various forms of government available to New Jersey's municipalities are not as clear in their delineation of responsibilities, often leading to disputes

about authority among governing body members. They also said the mayor's ability to break tie votes discouraged council members from working together and compromising to reach an agreement.

Bonacci said the Faulkner form of government could be effective in larger municipalities and in those cases when relationships between different authorities are well defined in advance of the charter being applied.

"You need strong rules and procedures," Bonacci said.

DiPasquale said that with the mayor-council-administrator charter, the administrator can easily be inclined to show more lovalty and obedience to the mayor than the community.

Commission member Michael Cohan questioned whether problems described in Berkeley Heights were related to the form of government or the individuals who are holding political offices.

DiPasquale and Bonacci said both factors played a part in the township's woes, but remained adamant the Faulkner Act presented considerable opportunity for disagreements between officials. They pointed to Hillside's legal and political strife. "You've got the most pure form of government there is," DiPasquale told the commission. "You don't want the courts getting involved with matters of your town government."

Jakubowski pointed out that while officials can be replaced by better candidates at election time, a municipality's charter is considerably more complicated to alter. "It is our objective to look at the form of government, not the people involved," Jakubowski said.

The commission's next meeting will be June 1.







Farmers Market open

(Continued from Page 1) "It can be hard to establish yourself as a new market. We were fortunate enough to do that last year," said Jerry Bishop, Cultural Committee Chairman.

Opening day, municipal employees crossed the street from City Hall to sample the market's goods. One man purchased dinner for the night, stuffed sole, and another collected groceries for the week. Meanwhile, a local couple bought corn and assorted vegetables. They said they noticed the market for the first time as they drove down Wood Avenue. "I don't know...if it's a luxury or a savings, but it looks good, so we'll try it," they said about their findings.

Bishop saw the crowd as a good sign. "I don't know if people are excited to see vendors back or it was a sunny day, but based on the first day, I believe we are going to do as well or better than last year," he explained, estimating about 400 people visited the market daily last season. This year's goal is to either exceed or match that number, he added.

Bishop expects customers to cut back this year; however, he noted the farmer's market is changing its hours and bringing in less expensive vendors in an effort to be more cost effective, hopefully leading to more people visiting the center of town.

Larger companies that sponsored the market last year have returned, Bishop said, noting big businesses owners are more likely to sponsor local markets than buy box seats for games at Yankee Stadium.

"They want to be in the community, because that's where their customers are," he said. "Everyone's gotten creative as a ... result of the economy. If you don't, you're just going to go away."

Even more indicative of a positive season for the market was the return of most of last year's produce vendors, and the addition of a few new merchants, including Hoboken Farms and Vesco Foods, Bishop said. Hoboken Farms offers frozen gourmet foods and artisan breads, and has a permanent booth at the popular South Street Seaport in New York City. Vesco's Pickles, Olives Etc. booth offers a greater selection of foods at cheaper prices than last year's version, Gem Golden.

Returning vendor, Fred Schieferstein of Schieferstein Farms in Clark, also has hopes for a good season.

"I'm expecting my volume to be down a bit, but I believe we will do well," he said, as he was beckoned by a customer.

Schieferstein touted the market, saying some vendors, like himself, offer something local grocers cannot: crops sold the same day they are picked at nearby farms.

"It's nice to purchase something at three in the afternoon that could've been picked at six in the morning. There is no taste like that in the world," Bishop said.


There are other strategies to ensure customers are satisfied this year, including changing market hours, shifting from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. to 3 to 7 p.m. The new hours are expected to have two benefits: cutting down on vendor's staffing costs and operating during times people are on the roads and likely to see the market during their daily commute.

As the barometer continues to rise, Bishop said more crops will be available, and more vendors are schedule to appear, offering many more state-grown products.



BOE to trim \$1M from failed spending plan

LINDEN — The city school board will cut \$1 million from its defeated spending plan, it agreed at a school board meeting two weeks ago.

The decision comes after a recent review of the budget by the City Council's Finance Committee, which suggested cutting the total \$109.6 million plan by \$1 million in administrative costs, mostly in the areas of transportation and travel.

Mayor Richard Gerbounka both the mayor's office and

The budget was defeated April 21 by a margin of 124 votes. When the \$105 million 2008-09 school budget was defeated by voters last year, the City Council only suggested making a \$100,000 cut in supplies.

Budget: Supplies, election costs cut

By Joseph M. D'Alise Staff Writer

KENILWORTH — Though only 12 percent of residents turned out to defeat the proposed school budget by a mere 23 additional votes against the plan, something had to be cut to "respect the views of the voters," Mayor Kathi Fiamingo said.

The original \$21.5 million total budget must be cut by \$174,036 allocated for supplies and election costs, the Borough Council concluded during several meetings in the last two weeks. "Cutting a district's budget is never something we enjoy doing," Fiamingo said. "We...chose items that would not directly affect...students."

Superintendent of Schools Lloyd Leschuk agreed with Fiamingo, saying the process of trimming the budget was difficult. "Our...priority was to avoid that which directly impacted the lives of children," he said.

The cut was officially approved by school officials during a special meeting May 18. The change will result in a \$34 break for the average homeowner, who would have paid \$101.35 if the original budget had been approved. The amended budget shows a \$67.35 tax hike for a resident with a home assessed at the borough average of \$167,500. The total average payment will be \$2,877.76. Last year's budget passed, but the 2007-08 spending plan was also defeated, Fiamingo said.

A new 'course' for Oak Ridge

The Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders paid a visit to Clark on May 14 not only for a chance to host their official meeting in one of the municipalities they represent, but to kick off the 2009 Preserve Union County grant application process.

A total of \$500,000 is available in matching grants to local his-. toric preservation groups and municipalities.

The kickoff was marked by brief speeches by local and county officials at the historic Homestead Farm at the newly-christened Oak Ridge Park, formerly the Oak Ridge Golf Course. The 250-year-old farmhouse at the site is in fieed of preservation funds to help address a range of structural issues as well as termite problems.

The Oak Ridge site as a whole was also at the center of the public comments made to the freeholders by residents of Clark and

surrounding municipalities during last week's meeting. In March, county officials decided to close Oak Ridge Golf Course and convert it into a park, citing declining usage and a budget deficit of more than \$20 million. Preparations are now in place for the site to host a range of entertainment events this summer. However, the future use of the park remains largely undecided. The freeholders accepted suggestions from the public of possible forms of recreation that might be suitable for Oak Ridge.

Residents urged freeholders to consider the park as a location for activities including skateboarding, baseball, softball and a golfinspired sport known as disc-golf.

While some residents were excited about the prospect of a new park in their town, others have been persistently critical of the county's decision to eliminate . golf from the site. Golfers suggested that the lack of revenue plaguing the course stemmed

from poor management and could Festival, a series of weekly outhave been easily resolved.

Clark resident Neil Boyle said the freeholders should have actively engaged those who used the facility the most.

"When you made the decision about Oak Ridge, nobody came here until tonight," Boyle said.

However, some Clark residents who are pleased with the county's handling of the local Esposito Park said they feel Oak Ridge will also be successful and popular in its new role.

'I'm looking forward to riding my bicycle in that park," said Clark resident Maureen Connell. "It'd be great for the kids to have someplace to play."

One of the most notable events set to take place at the new park this summer is the Summer Arts

door concerts in July and August, that has been conducted annually since the 1960s.

Mike Brennan, who works as assistant to the head of the Union County Department of Public Works, said changes to the facility have involved levelling off the T boxes, folding in sand traps, and levelling any steeply-graded slopes. Brennan said transforming the golf course into a park has not presented a major challenge.

"It wasn't a big earth-moving project," Brennan said. "It was just getting it ready for-passive recreation."

The park will be open for passive recreation by June 21, when Center for Hope Hospice is scheduled to host a 5k walk at the site, county officials said.

Cold case closed

LINDEN - Two years after a Roselle man was shot and killed on a residential street in Linden, an arrest has been made in the case, with the help of the Union County Homicide Task Force.

Kareem Prunty, 32, of Linden was arrested, Friday in connection with the April 2007 murder of Gregory Fils-Aime, 28, after arguing at a local bar, according to Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow.

Prunty is accused of the shooting, Fils-Aime's body was found with several gunshot wounds to the torso on a residential lawn on the 1200 block of Roselle Street, near Cleveland Street.

Before his death, Fils-Aime had recently moved with his family from Irvington to a home on Crescent Street.

A joint investigation between the Union County Homicide Task Force and Linden Police Department determined the two men were arguing inside a local bar earlier in the night and both left shortly after, according to Romankow.

"As Mr. Fils-Aime walked west on Roselle Street, the investigation revealed...Mr. Prunty approached and fired several shots at the victim," Romankow added.

Prunty was charged with firstdegree homicide and is being held at Union County Jail on \$2 million bail.

The Homicide Task Force has successfully made a number of breaks in cases during the past several weeks, including arrests in a 1982 Plainfield homicide and a February murder in Elizabeth.

The March shooting of Roselle liquor store owner Jitendra Parikh, 64, is currently being investigated by the task force.

Authorities cited calls from citizens as the major reason they were able to break the decade-old cold cases

"There may be people out there who know something about an unsolved homicide, even if it's a year or many years later," Holl said. "Sometimes all it takes is a call to one of our investigators to really reignite a case. Our guys case."







"We want the town to feel that there is economic value in the arts. That's one of our main goals," Leber said.

Township officials expressed support for the idea of JCAS taking up residence in a prominent downtown location such as the crossing, but stressed that the negotiations between JCAS and the broker is a private matter not involving Cranford's government.

"It'd be great if they come to terms and could have this in our town center," said Mayor David Robinson, who was present at the kickoff.

Public Affairs Commissioner Dan Aschenbach was also supportive of the arts initiative.

"This would be a real great thing for the town to have. It would help get the Cranford Crossing on its way," Aschenbach said.

Leber said the amount of money raised from the tour has not yet been determined as the money collected from tickets sold at individual locations has not been collected.

We need a reader-in-chief!

Dear Sir:

Just in case the economy, the wars and foreign affairs are not enough to keep you busy, I have a new assignment that may be the most important and most influential one that any president has ever undertaken.


are becoming more and more tied up in the entangling strings of the many Web sites or by some of the TV media that prefer to Twitter in one line or two or deal with gossip rather than reacting to your recent proud announcement: "I Am A Reader!"

We need someone that most of the country respects to set us on the right path - toward reading the great books. We need you to have us relishing the written word instead of texting in half words and having our ideas summed up in sound bytes.

You, President Obama, are, and have always been, a devoted reader. You are meant to be our communicator-in-chief! Not only do I judge that from your speeches, where it is obvious that you are inspired by "words," but from the list of favorite books you put out.

Biblically speaking: "To whom much is given, much is expected." You have been given the respect and votes of more than half the country, so I don't hesitate to ask you to give more than other presidents gave us. Yes, leadership. Yes, solving our country's problems. But other presidents have done that. Only you have the power to pass on your love of reading to the country.

That is why I recommend that, once a week or twice a month, you take on FDR's fireside chats and not talk, but read passages from one of your favorite books to the country. It can even be videoed via You



The people of the United States Tube. Think of the influence that would have! Why, libraries would be stormed. Book stores will sell out. The written word will once more be respected. You will even outdo Oprah in bringing the nation back to reading which, awakens our souls. The favorite books you have already mentioned are remarkable for their variety --- from the works of Jefferson, Emerson, Lincoln and, of course, King. But you went beyond that. Mark Twain, for instance. I can just hear your voice reading that dilemma moment in "Huckleberry Finn" when Huck is trying to decide whether to turn in Jim, his escaped slave friend, as is the law. He anguishes about his Bible teachings that warn him breaking the law will mean he goes times Jim and he had together, Huck decides, "All right, I'll go to hell!"

Those words have moved generations of readers, But in your voice, it will have the Harry Potter fans dropping those books and dipping into Mark Twain. And older people will remember why they loved reading Twain and take time to reread him.

Occasionally, make your readings just for children or young

adults. That way, many children who never had the privilege that your daughters do of their father reading to them will be influenced to read books that widen their horizons.

But don't make it the easy books that look down on readers. I, as a novelist, having grown up loving words and their rhythms and the way they sink into your memory and give birth to light, know the more challenging novels you read, the deeper the joy and pride. As well as "Alice in Wonderland," give them glimpses of older classics with appropriate selections from works of such authors as Jane Austen and William Faulkner.


Occasionally, make your fireside reads be pure poetry. Having had a marvelous Elizabeth Alexander poem reading at your inaugural, I know you appreciate poetry.

Read, read to us and open the world of letters. You've turned the youth to chanting: "Yes, we can!" Rile them up to say, "Yes, we can read!" "Yes, we can love literature!"

Fewer novels are being read to hell. Yet remembering the grand today or being promoted, since newspapers are cutting review sections where readers might hear about them.

> Bringing together people to share a greater goal is the essence I feel of your victory. Spread that communal communication to us all by reading from great literature and/or current novels. Make the "word" important again. Spread the word. Read to us.

> Be not only our commander-inchief but our reader-in-chief.

The American Stroke Association hopes to combat stroke's staggering toll on U.S. blacks - more than 100.000 suffer a stroke each year --with its Power To End Stroke campaign that includes various initiatives to educate and empower blacks to reduce their risks and improve their health.

"We have to make sure that people know the signs and symptoms of stroke because a person must get to the hospital as soon as possible to have a much higher chance of survival and to avoid potential disabilities," said Dr. Donald E. Casey, Jr., MD, president of the American Heart Association Northern New Jersey Regional board and vice president, quality and chief medical officer of Atlantic Health in Morristown.

The warning signs of stroke include the following:

Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body.

· Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding.

· Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes.

· Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination. Sudden severe headache with no known cause.

"If we want to improve awareness, we must be more focused on educating those at increased risk and those who have the least knowledge about the symptoms," said Casev.

At particularly high risk for stroke are: stroke survivors; blacks; women; mature adults age 55 and older; hispanics and survivors of a cardiovascular event, such as a heart attack or heart surgery.

Each year about 60,000 more women than men have a stroke and at all ages stroke kills more women than men. Blacks have almost twice the risk of a first-ever stroke compared with caucasians.



Union captures its record 11th UCT softball crown Linden downs Cranford in semifinals

LINDEN - Give Amanda Kardys a three-run lead on the big stage and she's going to be pretty tough to beat. "There's no one stronger than her," Union senior eatcher Hana Gross said.

Although the latter two of three first inning runs Union scored were uncarned, they were enough of a cushion for Kardys, who allowed only one uncarned run herself in the bottom of the first.

Sometimes you get a game where all of the scoring is done in the first inning and then the two pitchers settle down and are very tough to score on the rest of the way.

That was the story last Saturday afternoon at Memorial Field as second-seeded Union downed fifthseeded Linden 3-1 in the 34th annual Union County Tournament softball championship game.

Union won its first crown since 2000 and its record 11th championship.

Linden won its only title in 1980.

Union scored three runs in the top of the first - with only the first being earned - while Linden came back with an unearned run in the bottom of the first.

As far as the scoring went, that was it.

Linden senior right hander Angela Riscinti settled down and was superb over her final six innings.

Kardys also found her groove and was nearly unhittable the rest of the way.

It was a sweet victory for Union, which lost last year's title game here to Cranford 2-0.

"This one (holding the trophy in her hand) says No. 1 this time," said Gross, who will continue playing at Alfred University. "That's what we've played for all season. We wanted to win this real bad. We won this and our 20th game on the same day, which were two of our goals."

Union improved to 20-4 and won its second straight, while Linden fell to 16-9.

The Tigers were able to score two bizarre runs in extra innings to come back and take out top-seeded and threetime defending champion Cranford 2-1 in 10 innings last Friday night after Union came back with two runs in the bottom of the seventh to oust sixth-seeded Governor Livingston 3-2 in Friday night's first semifinal.

So, for the last UCT involving teams from the Watchung Conference and teams from the Mountain Valley Conference, the Watchung went 2-0 in head-to-head matchups Friday night. Next year a new Union County Conference will be in place, with the Watchung and Mountain Valley conferences ceasing to exist.

Kardys improved to 14-4 and finished 4-0 in the UCT for the first time. Her lifetime record is now 39-14 and her UCT mark 8-1.

She was 9-6 and 1-0 in the UCT two years ago and 16-4 and 3-1 in the UCT last year.

Riscinti, who defeated Union and Kardys 4-2 in Union last Thursday in a Watchung Conference game, fell to 7-6 and 0-1 in the UCT.

Union defeated Linden 5-1 at Memorial Field on April 8 in the first conference game between the squads.


This win over Linden at Memorial was a bit sweeter. "We had a tough week after losing to Westfield and Linden, but we pulled through the last two games," said Gross, who had one of Union's three hits off Riscinti. "Linden has a great team and great coaches. We had our minds set to be champions and we came out and did it."

Kardys tossed a two-hitter, striking out five, walking one and hitting one batter. After a less-than-spectacular first inning, she allowed only three baserunners the next six shutouts innings.

"Amanda needed to believe in herself," Gross said. "She really came through for us."


Riscinti allowed six baserunners in the first inning, but only three over six shutout innings herself from the second through the seventh.

Union, Cranford, Rah. track excel

The Union girls' track team loosened Cranford's grip on the county track championship last Saturday, ever so slightly.

Cranford and Union finished tied for the county title at 69 points apiece at the Union County Track and Field Championships held last Friday and Saturday at Hub Stine Field in Plainfield.

The result was fairly controversial, due to an error in communication. Some runners in the 200 meter dash thought there would be a final, while others were informed that they would only be running in their particular heat. Cranford sophomore Natalie Englese won the 200 with a time of 25.57, while Union's Ugonna Ndu, who was told by an event clerk that there would be a final, eased up slightly at the end of the race, finishing in 25.75. The result gave Cranford enough points to tie the team score at the end of the day.

Johnson finished third with 60 points, Rahway was fourth with 53, Plainfield sixth with 35 and Scotch Plains seventh with 31. Governor Livingston placed seventh with 28 points, Roselle eighth with 27, Westfield ninth with 24, Roselle Catholic 10th with 21, Summit 11th with 18, Dayton 12th with 15, Union Catholic and New Providence tied for 13th with 10, Elizabeth 15th with nine, Hillside and Kent Place tied for 16th with six, Oak Knoll 18th with four and Benedictine 20th with one. GL was also listed as finishing 19 with two points.

"I had two other teammates running in the 200 as well, and they were expecting there would be a final, but I talked to my coach, and he assured me there would be no final," Englese said. "So I ran pretty much with everything I had in the 200. I feel bad for the people who didn't know, but I guess the officials made a mistake and that was their way of going about it, not having finals and sticking to what they originally said."

Controversy aside, Englese and her teammates were happy with the title, even though they tied for the championship.

"It was just awesome to have a team title and to see our team finally come together, because we have so many different strengths whether it's Julianne Grandal throwing or Kelly Burke jumping, and we have a lot of good runners, both distance runners and sprinters," Englese said. "We were all so happy about it, whether it was a tie or we won it by ourselves."

In addition to her win in the 200, Englese captured the title in the 400, while Grandal, a senior, won the javelin title with a throw of 116-7. Burke, a junior, almost won two gold medals. She jumped 38-5.25 to top the triple jump record set by Johnson's Emily Vargas, Vargas, also a senior, responded with a jump of 38-9.5 to reclaim both the county record and the gold medal in the triple jump.

Burke fared much better in the pole vault, where her jump of 10 feet even topped her nearest competitors, Claire Smith and Julia Scales of GL, by a foot.

Cranford's strength is that it has several girls who are good at different events. Whether it's throwing, jumping or running, Cranford has a few girls who excel in each variety of event.

"It allows us to stay balanced and stay in competition in some of these bigger meets," Cranford coach John Schiano said. "That's how we were able to do so well in this meet. We weren't really expected to compete, but our depth and our balance throughout all the events really gave us that advantage."

Ndu and Cristina Vilsaint won gold medals for Union. Ndu captured the 100 meter hurdles with a time of 14.60, outracing Ernestine Rodgers of Rahway, who finished in second place with a time of 15.65, while Roselle's Genera Randall finished in third with a time of 15.99. Vilsaint easily won the shot put with a throw of 36-2.25. Najah Allen of Rahway threw 34-4.75 to place third.

On the boys' side of the meet, Rahway gained revenge over Union for its two-point loss to the Farmers at the Union County Relays, by scoring 110 points, which gave Rahway its first team championship in the boys' county meet. Rahway's closest competitor was host Plainfield, with 92 points.

Union Catholic finished third with 54 points, Westfield fourth with 43.5, Scotch Plains fifth with 42, GL sixth with 34, Summit and Union seventh with 24, Dayton ninth with 21, Cranford 10th with 11.5, Johnson and Elizabeth 11th with 10, Oratory Prep 13th with seven, New Providence 14th with six, Roselle Catholic 15th with four, Hillside 16th with two and Roselle 17th with one.

Pierre Darisme of Rahway won the 110-meter high hurdles in 14.22 and Mark Jones of Summit captured the high jump at 6-6.

Mike Scarfuto of Cranford was first in the shot put at 46-10 and George Osti of Union won the discus event with a throw of 133-2.

Rahway captured the 1,600-meter relay in a meet record time of 3:16,19. The season continues with this weekend's sectional meets at different sites. The group meets are the last weekend in May and the Meet of Champions is set for June 3 at South Plainfield.

When Deon Candia took over as the Linden head football coach last year, he looked for senior players that would not only excel on the field, but become leaders in and out of the locker room.

One upperclassman he could count on was Sebron Woodley.

A seven-interception season by Woodley that helped Linden improve to 5-5 caught the eye of many small college scouts.

As a result, the 5-11, 185-pound Woodley - First Team All County by The Star-Ledger in 2008 - will continue on the Division 2 level at Southern Connecticut State University in New Haven, Conn.

"Sebron came on really strong for us," Candia said. "He was also a backup quarterback, played receiver and was the holder on extra points. He played many positions well."

Woodley also considered East Stroudsburg, American International and Kutztown.

Woodley's play in the secondary this past season was a big reason why Linden improved by four games and just missed qualifying for the North 2, Group 4 playoffs.

Riscinti allowed six baserunners in the first inning, second through the seventh.

"Angela was phenomenal," Linden head coach Cherie Zimmerman said. "She shut them down after the first inning.'

Riscinti got Union senior shortstop Jessica Goncalves - who will continue at Richard Stockton University - to ground out to third on the second pitch of the game. Amazingly, somewhat, Union won Friday night and Saturday afternoon without Goncalves - one of the leading hitters in Union County - getting a single hit in either game.

Kristen Wilson then worked a walk on a 3-1 count and was moved to second on an opposite field single hit to right by Gross.

On a 1-1 count, Kardys then grounded out to second, with both runners moving up a base to second and third. Then Riscinti walked Allie Davis on a 3-2 count to load the bases. Riscinti fell behind Kristen Scioscia as well and walked her on a 3-1 pitch to force in a run, with Wilson scoring and Union taking a 1-0 lead.

Union's next batter, Heather Baumann, reached on an infield error that allowed Gross to score to give Union a 2-0 lead, with the bases still loaded. Then Amanda Brando hit a ball to third, with the throw home too late to get Davis out. Brando was credited with an RBI on the 5-2 fielder's choice attempt that was unsuccessful.

Now Union led 3-0 and still had the bases loaded with two outs. Riscinti stuck out Union's next batter on three pitches to end the top of the first and was then nearly unhittable herself the rest of the way, allowing only two singles the next six innings, one of them a bunt single.

'I was worried that we would have a letdown after Friday night's emotional win, but that was not the case," Zimmerman said. "We made some defensive mistakes in the first inning and that has been our nemesis all year."

To Linden's credit, the Tigers came back and got one run back in the bottom of the first, but - ultimately - it wasn't enough.

Sophomore third baseman Jackie Lima led off and reached on an infield error and on the same play moved to second base on another infield error, the latter one the result of a bad throw past first base. Sophomore center fielder Erin Walsh was then hit by a pitch, putting runners on first and second with nobody out.

Kardys reached back and struck out the next Linden batter looking before giving up a single to left field by senior catcher and Kean University-bound Courtney. Melchionna that loaded the bases with one out.

Junior second baseman Alexis Frees managed to hit a 2-2 pitch to second base where she grounded out, but Lima came home to score to make it a 3-1 game.

Then with runners on second and third and two outs, Kardys managed to get her first strikeout swinging and prevent further damage.

After that, Riscinti and Kardys threw nothing but zeros.

NOTES: Union lost in its two previous trips to the final, both times to Cranford in 2002 and 2008.

Linden has lost two of the last three championship games.

Union won two titles in this decade. Cranford won the most with four, while Roselle Park also won two and Brearley and Governor Livingston one.

This was the first UCT final that Cranford wasn't in and also the first one that didn't result in a shutout since Brearley defeated Governor Livingston 2-1 in 10 innings in the 2005 contest, giving the Bears their first championship.

In the North 2, Group 4 playoffs, sixth-seeded Linden was scheduled to play at third-seeded North Hunterdon Tuesday in a quarterfinal. Union earned the top seed and was to host eighth-seeded Bridgewater-Raritan one day this week in its quarterfinal.

Linden lost at North Hunterdon 2-0 last year in the semifinals, while Union lost at home to J.P. Stevens 10-0 in the quarterfinals. Linden finished 20-9 last year and Union 24-4.

AT-BAT OF THE GAME: The bases were loaded and there were two outs in the top of the first when senior right fielder Kristen Scioscia stepped up to the plate for the Farmers after junior third baseman Allie Davis walked ahead of her. Scioscia got the count to 3-1 in her favor and was waiting for a good pitch to hit. She didn't quite get one and yet still had the plate discipline to take ball four. That gave Union a 1-0 lead and put the Farmers ahead for good. Scioscia gets credited with the game-winning RBI and it was the only one of the four runs in the game that was earned. Union's next two runs in the inning came after a Linden error and were unearned.

DEFENSIVE PLAY OF THE GAME: There were really no super outstanding defensive plays made by either team, so I'll go with the final out of the tournament. Down to its last strike, Linden pitcher Angela Riscinti hit an Amanda Kardys fastball to left field, with Union left fielder Heather Baumann making the catch. Union becomes UCT champions for the first time in nine years.



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

Anticipation of the service of its non-profit status. 4-11.6 <u>For-Profit Entities and Compa-nies that pay royalties to charities in</u> order to utilize the charity's name and status on their bins do not qualify as licensees under this Ordinance. The purpose of the Ordinance is to license only legitimate not-for-profit entities engaged in this endeavor on a not for profit basis. 4-11.6 <u>Application Requirements.</u> The application for obtaining a permit shall include:

Summer sun may not be fun for everyone

For most people, sun exposure is a part of spring and summer. After a long winter spent inside, most people can't wait to head to a nearby lake or ocean and enjoy the warmer air of the fairer seasons.


For many of those same people, overexposure to sun is also a big part of spring and summer. With the tanning craze still in full swing, hitting the beach or the park to catch a few rays is as popular as ever. However, overexposure to the sun is no less dangerous than it was 20 years ago. While some might look at a sunburn as an annual rite of summer, that sunburn is actually a condition known as photodermatitis, and even those who aren't fair-skinned are potentially at risk.

What is photodermatitis?


For parents, a yard can be a great place to let children play and enjoy themselves, all within viewing distance of mom and dad's watchful eyes.

Though backyard playgrounds might not be as prevalent as they once were, that doesn't mean they're still not fun for children. Of course, a backyard play area is only as fun as it is safe, so parents considering creating one for their children should consider the following tips before beginning such a project:

• Be mindful of drainage. Building a play area in a spot on the lawn that doesn't have proper drainage is asking for trouble. During winter, such areas are threatening children's balance and potentially leading to injury. Even in warmer months, poor drainage could result in puddles after spring or summer rains, attracting mosquitoes and other insects and making children more susceptible to bug bites.

 If possible, build in a relatively shaded area. While it might not be possible to create the play area entirely in the shade, try to keep as much as possible out of the sun. This will protect children from the sun, particularly during those hot summer afternoons when child en love being outdoors but UV rays are at their most harmful.

· Build away from patio or barbecue areas. Erect play areas away from patios or barbecue areas. In addition to concrete sidewalks that can hurt children, you won't want children playing anywhere near charcoal, starter fluid or propane tanks.

(Continued from Page 7) of photodermatitis, which can manifest itself in a rash, scaly patches on the skin or even blisters. For some people, it can be a chronic condition, wherein they're certain to have this abnormal reaction whenever their skin is exposed to UV rays.

What signs indicate photodermatitis? Photodermatitis is more than just sunburn. In addition to the

redness and pain associated with sunburn, symptoms of photodermatitis include hyperpigmentation or dark patches on the skin, lesions that resemble eczema a condition in which patches of skin become rough and inflamed, with blisters resulting in itching and bleeding — chills, headache, fever and nausea. Fair skin alone rarely produces photodermatitis symptoms when a fair-skinned person gets a sun-

burn. This highlights the point that photodermatitis is more than a sunburn, and can be the result of additional factors beyond fair/sensitive skin.

Who is most at risk?

People with fair to light skin remain very susceptible to sunlight. In addition, those with blond or red hair and green or blue eyes also tend to be more sensitive, as does anyone taking any of the aforementioned medications. A great many people also put themselves at a greater risk by allowing themselves to be exposed to harmful UV rays throughout the summer months. Exposure longer than 30 minutes greatly increases a person's risk for photodermatitis. Exposure between the hours of 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. only compounds that risk, as 50 percent of UV radiation is emitted during that time period.







Myth: Winning is important, and it's good to teach children early on to strive for success.



Schering-Plough and New Jersey Catch Some Rays


Parking decks continue to sprout across New Jersey like so many cactus plants in the Arizona desert. Yet today these drab, monolithic concrete structures are more akin to grey rainbows anchored in pots of gold.

Parking decks – and other similarly built structures – hold bright promise for helping New Jersey meet the goals of its ambitious Energy Master Plan – to reduce energy consumption by 20 percent while generating 30 percent of its energy needs from renewable energy like solar and wind power by 2020.

The rooftops of these multiple-story structures provide an ideal platform for the installation of environmentally friendly solar panels used to generate electricity, much like the endless stretches of barren desert floor in the Southwestern United States are being transformed into solar farms that produce electricity.

Global health care giant Schering-Plough last month became the latest New Jersey company to "go solar." The company literally threw the switch on one of the largest solar energy systems in the United States and the largest in New Jersey, an innovative network of 22,000 solar panels installed on the rooftops of seven buildings at its Summit campus.

The 1.7 megawatt system, installed over a 15-month period by PPL Renewable Energy, is expected to deliver about 12 percent of the energy needs at the Summit facility annually. That is the equivalent of enough electricity to power 200 homes during peak hours.



Approximately 22,000 solar panels on the rooftops of seven buildings at the Schering-Plough Summit campus will produce 1.7 megawatts of electricity, the equivalent of enough energy to power 200 homes during peak hours.



While helping to reduce reliance on more conventional fossil-based fuels, the solar project also takes advantage of an innovative commodity brokerage system that will trade SRECs – Solar Renewable Energy Credits – and replace a costly rebate program that had helped launch solar initiatives in the state with a robust free market system.

The project also embodies a classic win-win situation for a partnership forged between private enterprise and state government, with tangible economic and environmental benefits.

It is a symbiotic business and environmental relationship that benefits all partners – Schering-Plough, PPL, New Jersey and, in a larger sense, the global community.

Power generated by the grid will help the pharmaceutical giant's bottom line by reducing and helping to manage energy costs. PPL will derive income from its investment, as Schering Plough is under contract with the company to purchase energy for the next 15 years.

"It's good for the bottom line," said Fred Hassan, Schering-Plough chairman and CEO. "It's also a good model for what we might see in this country as we work on energy conservation."

- The Summit solar system is expected to reduce greenhouse emissions by 3 million pounds of carbon dioxide annually. That is equal to:
- Removing 250 cars from the road
- Saving 150,000 gallons of gasoline
- Reducing oil imports by 3,000 barrels
- Not using 52,000 propane cylinders for home barbecues
- · Planting 123 acres of pine forest

Throughout the state, in downtown shopping districts, train stations, college campuses, hospitals, shopping malls, casinos, industrial parks and corporate campuses, parking decks and other sprawling buildings with substantial rooftops offer more partnership opportunities for companies like PPL Renewable Energy, which has several other solar and wind-powered installations in New Jersey and other northeastern states.

Thanks in large part to installations similar to the Schering-Plough project, New Jersey is at the forefront of solar-power; only California has more.

"Here in the state of New Jersey we are number two in solar installations in the (Continued on page 5)

Chambers of Commerce Offer Food for Thought in Down Economy

In the early 1900s the leading packaged cereal manufacturer in the United States was Post. Lagging behind in the number two spot was a lesser known company, Kellogg.

When the Great Depression hit, Post did the predictable – decreasing expenses by cutting back on marketing – while Kellogg did the opposite, doubling its marketing budget. By 1933, Kellogg's profits had increased almost 30 percent and the company had taken the lead as the number one cereal manufacturer – a place it still holds today. As the economy began to slow in 2008 Jim Coyle, president of the Gateway Regional Chamber of Commerce, wondered if the business downturn would mean that many area business would follow the example of Post, cutting back on their marketing by cutting out their chamber membership, or Kellogg, increasing marketing to expand their sales. The answer was not long in coming.

"(It's been pretty amazing," said Coyle. "(Membership) started slowly in 2008, then picked up dramatically this year."

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Gran'ther Pendleton Returns

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Gran'ther Pendleton has been a treasured literary favorite since childhood. Dorothy Canfield Fisher tells his story in *Heyday of the Blood*. Everyone should know Gran'ther and his zest for life – particularly in these challenging times.

At the outset, Gran'ther's great grandson Professor Mallory – nearing retirement – talks with his unhappy young assistant.

The younger man started, "Why-Why-" his face twitched. He went on desperately, "I've lost my nerve, Professor Mallory."

"What do you mean - nerve?" Asked Mallory, challenging impatience in his tone.

The younger man started, "Why, Why" His face twitched. He went trembling so the papers he held fell on the floor. "I worry – I forgot things – I take no interest in life. The psychiatrists tell me to relax, to rest. I try to, but it's no good. I never go out – every evening I'm in bed by nine o' clock."

To inspire his assistant, Mallory tells of an extraordinary experience with Gran'ther at the turn of the century. Gran'thur – 88 years old, in very poor health – worried everyone in the extended family, who tried restricting his activities appropriately.

Gran'ther ignored obvious and sound medical advice, did what he pleased and:

"He used to remark triumphantly that he had now outlived six doctors, who had each given him but a year to live, 'and the seventh is going downhill fast, so I hear!"

Professor Mallory recounts a glorious childhood day, when he and Gran'ther stole off to the county fair after being forbidden by his parents. Here's a taste of that day, a description of the horse race:

"If I live to be a hundred and break the bank at Monte Carlo three times a week," said Mallory, shaking his head reminiscently, "I could not know a tenth part of the frantic excitement of that race or of the mad triumph when our horse won. Gran'ther cast his hat upon the ground, screaming like a steam calliope with exultation as the sorrel swept past the judges' stand ahead of all the others, and I jumped up and down in an agony of delight which was almost more than my little body could hold."

Mallory recounts Gran'ther's view on fear:

"'I've larned a lot about the way folks is made. The trouble with most of 'em is, they're 'fraid-cats!...The only way to manage this business of livin' is to give a whoop and let her rip!'"

Mallory concludes with Gran'ther's recurring motto:

"Live while you live, and then die and be done with it!"

Gran'ther is a fictional character. My father-in-law is a flesh-and-blood relative of Gran'ther.

Grandpa Charles, now 85 and largely retired, has a unique business in upstate New York. He purchases merchandise and drives into the countryside to migrant work camps. He is the store.

His health has been failing for many years, but he continues to do what he loves – to the extent he can – going on the road, selling merchandise, against medical advice.

Last fall, Charles was hospitalized for a heart attack; his kidney function declined dangerously. We drove to Rochester to say goodbye.

He was ashen, largely confined to bed.

When he and I were alone in the hospital room, I asked him how he kept mentally alert. He told me he was planning his next sales trip. I felt this kept him going, thinking about getting back on the road.

We were concerned he wouldn't last the week.

Well, he did last the week. He returned home, his kidneys regained some functionality, and within a few months, he started getting out again.

On Mother's Day my mother-in-law returned from a morning walk and passed Charles taking off in his car, going on the road to sell – against medical advice.

We waited all day for his safe return. When he returned safely, I was reminded of Gran'ther's motto:

The only way to manage this business of livin' is to give a whoop and let her rip!

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Chambers of Commerce Offer Food for Thought in Down Economy

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Instead of contracting, membership at the Gateway has grown each month and now stands at about 1,500, an increase of about 200 over last year.

The numbers tell the tale. In February/March of 2007 17 new members enrolled in the Gateway, 20 new members joined in February/March of 2008, and 34 new members enrolled in the same period this year. In addition, the Gateway Chamber, the largest business-to-business association in the New York/New Jersey region, continues to maintain a retention rate of about 95 percent.

But numbers are only part of the story. People and benefits are the real explanation behind the organization's growth, according to Coyle.

Marcy Sasso, director of operations for the Ambulatory Surgical Center of Union County, "had heard rumblings about how good the Gateway Chamber was for awhile," she said. Sasso looked into the dues-versus-benefits ratio and decided to enroll a few months ago.

"In times like these it only makes sense for businesses to band together to support one another," Sasso said. She found the chamber to be a great place to network and also found other services she needs for her business.

"I saw some work done by Blu Hand Design Studio at the Chamber and I asked them to design a poster for us," she said. Now Sasso is encouraging other healthcare businesses to join the chamber.

Not every chamber of commerce is doing as well as the Gateway during the downturn.

"Membership is somewhat flat, which we consider a positive during this time," said Kevin Friedlander, senior vice president of communications for the New Jersey Chamber of Commerce.

While some businesses have cut back on marketing, including budgets for organization memberships, many others, both current and prospective members, understand the value of face-to-face networking chambers offer.

Mick Fleming, president of the American Chambers of Commerce Executives, a national association for chamber of commerce executives, says that trends in membership vary from region to region and even chamber to chamber. Chambers that give the most value for the dollar are retaining more members in hard times than those that give less, he said.

"It used to be that many companies joined the chamber just for the concept of civic rent," Fleming said. "They felt an obligation to have that chamber sign in their window, just to support the organization in principal. But that has been changing in the last few years. Chambers must earn the respect of the members."

For example, the Gateway Chamber offers a wide variety of meetings at various locations and times of day.

"We have over 200 meetings a year. That's almost daily networking opportunities," Coyle said.

The Gateway is an umbrella organization for 14 other chambers and business groups, including local chambers in communities such as Springfield, Clark and Linden and specialized groups such as a women's business group, a group for veterans and even an Irish business group. There also are committees that work with municipal governments and an education committee that meets with local officials from both area universities and local school boards.


The Gateway's Affinity program also offers discounts for members at a variety of businesses. That program was particularly attractive to new member Lynette Walcott of Cavagna North America, Inc. Cavagna joined the Chamber in February and has already "reached out to a number of businesses to see where we can develop partnerships and take advantage of discounts," Walcott said. In fact, the cost savings Cavagna receives through the Affinity Partnership program will help make the chamber membership pay for itself.

For businesses that want to follow Kellogg's example and come out the other side of the recession on top, joining a chamber of commerce is a cost-effective way to develop new business relationships, according to chamber experts and business people.

"I tell everyone I talk to about the Gateway Chamber," says Sasso. "It just makes good sense to join."

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Executives Staying More Connected During Vacations

Out of sight does not necessarily mean out of mind for vacationing executives, according to results from a recent business survey of marketing and advertising executives. The survey showed that 61 percent of those polled said they check in with work at least once a day while on break.

That compares to 47 percent in 2006 and 38 percent in 2001.

The national study was developed by The Creative Group, a specialized staffing service providing creative, advertising, marketing and web professionals on a project and full-time basis, and conducted by an independent research firm.

Advertising and marketing executives were asked, "How often do you check in with work while on vacation?"


"For better or worse, technology has made it easier for professionals to check in with the office from just about anywhere," said Megan Slabinski, executive director of The Creative Group. "While periodic updates may provide peace of mind, being overly connected can detract from the benefits of time spent away from work."

Slabinski said careful planning can help employees disengage while on holiday.

"Professionals should prepare for their vacation as if they won't be available, rather than planning to check in," she said. "Handing off projects ahead of time can help workers come back genuinely refreshed."

Tips to help professionals make a clean break from the office include:

· Put someone on point - Managers should select someone whose judgment they trust to make decisions in their absence. It's important to give the point person the responsibility and authority to make judgment calls.

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- Establish ground rules If you need to check in, set specific times when you'll be checking in, rather than having people contact you throughout the day.
- · Don't leave them hanging Use out-of-office functions to let your clients and customers know when you're away, and provide the names and contact information of colleagues to contact in your absence.
- Let it go Delegate projects that must continue in your absence. Be sure to let coworkers know where to find key materials.
- Bring in reinforcements Hiring temporary or freelance professionals to bridge gaps can help projects stay on course while you're gone.
- · Consider remote locales If you have a hard time breaking away from the office, consider vacationing in a spot that doesn't have cell phone or Internet access.

United States," said Joseph Fiordaliso, a commissioner on the state Board of Public Utilities. "We're number seven in the world. Per square mile we have more solar installations than any state in the union."

Added Gov. Jon Corzine, "New Jersey has been a national leader in solar energy programs, and this private sector project is a fine complement to our own initiatives as we work to secure and strengthen the state's energy future."

"Managing energy well is critical to our operations," said Tom Pagliuco, energy director for Schering-Plough. "We are making our consumption of energy 'greener' by using renewable sources like solar and by reusing byproduct heat created in generating electricity on our sites.

"However, reducing overall energy consumption is our main goal. We believe the greenest kilowatt is the one not used."

The BPU has enabled companies like PPL to more aggressively pursue solar installations by approving the transition of New Jersey's solar program from an up-front rebate system to a commodity market based upon Solar Renewable Energy Credits (SRECs).

"What the state has done is to create and support a market for renewable energy credits," explained PPL's John Steckel. "We're not getting any money from the state for the Schering project, but what the state did do was create the market for SRECs so that the value of SRECs replaced the need for grants to build projects. The state provided a revenue stream that made the project economically feasible. That's why there is as much solar in the state."

Traditionally, solar had been funded by rebates and grants," Pagliuco explained. "SRECs were a smaller piece of the puzzle. The state knew they couldn't do it with rebates alone but to fund that level of activity were looking for a more market-driven approach. The state went with a solar REC market-driven approach in 2007. That's when we were first approached by PPL about the project."

Under the program, solar system owners earn SRECs for solar electricity production, which are registered and traded among electricity suppliers and other buyers within an established

infrastructure. Electricity suppliers are required to buy the SRECs, or pay a Solar Alternative Compliance Payment in lieu of the purchase.

The SRECs allow renewable energy producers to raise cash. One SREC is equivalent to 1,000 kilowatt hours (KWh), or one megawatt-hour (MWh).

SRECs represent the renewable attributes (clean energy benefits) of solar power generated from a solar electric system, and they can be bought or sold separately from the electricity, thus providing the solar system owner with a source of revenue to help offset the cost of the system installation.

The BPU expects to phase out rebates by 2012 and rely on SREC-based financing to spur private investment and market development for solar technologies.


The Summit project will help push Schering-Plough closer to its goal of reducing energy consumption 10 percent at its facilities worldwide by 2013.

Schering-Plough's ambitious global strategy has earned recognition from the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). In March, the EPA named Schering-Plough a 2009 ENERGY STAR Partner of the Year, which recognizes corporate efforts to use energy efficiently in facility operations and to integrate superior energy management into overall organizational strategy.

The EPA cited the company's Global Energy Management Team, which develops global policies, programs and initiatives aimed at energy reductions.

Progress is already being made. Worldwide Schering-Plough managed a 3.7 percent reduction in energy usage last year aided by a web-based data management system that monitors and controls 16 million square feet of facility space worldwide.

"Three years ago Schering-Plough initiated a global strategic energy management initiative to build a foundation for an energy-efficient future," Hassan said. "This project is a major achievement of that initiative. It represents the achievement of three objectives – savings, sustainability and societal benefit."



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Recession Disables Special Needs Workforce

The tractor trailors pulling into the Occupational Center of Union County are a reflection of the down economy gripping the nation and the far-reaching impact the recession is having on many levels.

In better times three trailors might offload at the Occupational Center, a vocational training facility for people with disabilities in Roselle that specializes in high-volume, light-hand assembly and packaging of consumer goods. These days, more often than not only one trailor pulls in.

That means less work for the 250 full- and part-time individuals employed by the Occupational Center. It also reflects a wider pool of ripples, according to Mark Lasky, the center's president.

"The last couple months have been a bit of a struggle to fully employ our people," Lasky said. "We have a tradition of full employment. Now we don't have a backlog of work. Our leads begin to say call us back next week."

The Occupational Center's clientele includes companies that supply the big box chains and price clubs. Lasky sees imports slowing, orders dropping and inventories not being replenished, resulting in less work coming through his doors.

"One company kept 30 or 40 (of our) people busy year-round," he said. "Now they're going under."

Individuals with disabilities and special needs are among those in the work force being hardest hit by the recession, according to Lasky and other human services experts.

The federal Office of Disability Employment Policy reported that in April the unemployment rate for those with disabilities was 12.9 percent, compared with 8.4 percent for persons with no disability.

In New Jersey the Corzine administration is proposing to cut \$3.8 million in funding for non-profit agencies that help train and place people with disabilities in the workforce, a reduction that will further hamper the efforts of organizations like the Occupational Center, according to Lasky.

In addition to its in-house vocational training, the Occupational Center also places candidates into the workplace and provides transitional support. At any time the center might have 40 to 50 individuals working on-site at companies, and Lasky is finding those placements harder to come by, as well.

"We're having a little bit of a hard time finding entry-level positions," he said. "Due to layoffs throughout the state there are more people qualified on paper."

Down the road from the Occupational Center the Cerebral Palsy League also is feeling the pinch of a slower economy. The League operates adult services that include in-house work training and a vocational center.

"We operate within a larger community and many of the organizations that subcontact with us are declining in activity," said Louis Brigando, associate executive director. "Consequently less work is subcontracted to us."

The Union County Educational Services Commission helps special needs individuals aged 16-21 transition into the work environment, placing students from its own five schools and four other Union County school districts with employers.

The commission places students in entry-level positions, attempting to find a good match that benefits both employer and employee.

"The whole idea of doing it in school is so when they come out as young adults they are trained for the work force," said Jim Quinn, transition coordinator at the commission.

Quinn has seen a reduction of available spots for students as a result of the slow economy.

"I approach smaller businesses and they tell me they've laid off people and really don't have any work," Quinn said.

Hard times seem to hit individuals with disabilities and special needs hardest, experts agree.

"Persons with disabilities experience a curious paradox," said Brigando. "Specifically, the benefits of good economic times are often attenuated in the face of higher competition and productivity demands. On the other hand, the consequences of stressed economic times are often accelerated, meaning that there are clearly fewer opportunities and major likelihood of reduction of support and services essential to maintaining viable employment."

When the loss of work opportunity that comes with a tight economy is matched with cuts in state funding supporting non-profits working on behalf of people with disabilities and special needs, the repercussions of the single trailer at the Occupation Center are magnified for this sector of society.

"The safety net is going to begin to break down as more and more people look strictly at the dollars," Lasky said.

As the safety net unravels, so does an integral part of the lives of people with disabilities and special needs.

"Working is essential to the quality of life," Brigando said.



Inside Views

Irrational Thinking Won't Produce a Rational Budget

Last month, on April 15, tax day, I attended a presentation by Assemblyman joe Cryan (D-20) on next year's budget. It was an excellent presentation where Assemblyman Cryan outlined the efforts of the Corzine Administration to produce a rational budget in the middle of the worst recession in generations. The Assemblyman described it as a budget of sacrifice and cutback, furloughs and belt tightening.



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So far so good.

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Then came the kicker in his presentation. Even with all this sacrifice and belt tightening the state government needs more revenue, i.e. a tax increase. The Assemblyman said don't worry, however, taxes would be increased for only the top 1 percent of income earners, those making more than \$500,000 per year.

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Cryan said there were fewer than 30,000 filers in this category, and they could well afford to ante up a bit more to keep the state solvent. And it had been shown by Governor McGreevy that the wealthiest don't flee the state when their taxes are raised.

Assemblyman Cryan is also the chairman of the Democratic Party for the state, and what he said was great politics. First he appealed to all of us with the talk of cutbacks and sacrifice. Then he said that the pain of the tax increase would be limited to only 1 percent of the population. The other 99 percent of us get off scot-free.

Good politics this may be, but it is bad policy.

Our politicians seem to forget that the annual variation in income is the greatest for that top 1 percent of earners. In other words, when times are good, these folks make a lot. This floods government coffers and leads to increased spending. Everyone is happy in these fat years.

In the lean years, however, the folks at the top make a lot less, and the government that is used to feasting on their largesse is suddenly put on a diet. Remember, nearly half of all state income tax revenue comes from this measly I percent of earners.

Thus a drop in income of just 10 percent for these earners results in a drop of 5 percent in state income tax revenue. Given that much of the income in this group is related to investment performance, it is easy to see why we are facing such a deep hole.

All we have to do is take a look at our leader, Governor Corzine. In 2007 the Governor had investment income of \$11.8 million. His contribution to the state through income tax was just more than \$1 million.

In 2008, however, the Governor lost nearly \$3 million. That means that his state and federal taxes are zero. Here's one of the richest guys in the state and he isn't paying anything. A lot of the top I percenters are in this same fix. Investment revenues are down, bonuses are down and tax obligations are down.

On April 15 I mentioned to Assemblyman Cryan that I would be surprised if the tax collections that they expected for 2008 were accurate. I expected them to be way short.

And way short they are, with the shortfall now estimated to be \$1.2 billion for this fiscal year. I would guess that this fact also will necessitate a new estimate of 2009 revenues. The economy is not recovering and large income growth in any sector certainly is not on the horizon.

So, what will they do? Will they see an even greater shortfall and raise taxes on the most volatile even more? If more tax revenue is needed, from a policy perspective, it would be much more sensible to raise taxes for a far greater number of people, maybe the top 50 percent of income earners.

We are, however, dealing with politicians. Why would we ever expect anything sensible to come out of them?

No Accounting for Accountability

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The New Jersey Legislature is considering a bill that would prohibit an employer from looking at a job applicant's credit history or finances when deciding whether or not to hire that individual.

What's next, outlawing resumes for being intrusive and labeling typing tests as genetically biased?

Sometimes it seems as if New Jersey's lawmakers want every business in the state to pull up stakes and head to Pennsylvania or Delaware. There can be no other explanation for the neverending parade of suffocating regulations and laws that handcuff businesses in a state that consistently polls among the least-business friendly in the nation.

Now during the worst economic downturn in 60 years the newest kick in the gut to the state's business community seeks to bar companies from considering an applicant's history of paying their bills or their state of finances.

Specifically, A3804, introduced by Assemblyman Anthony Chiappone (D-31), "Prohibits job discrimination on basis of credit history or financial status."

Certainly any bill trumpeted as being anti-discriminatory sounds like a good idea. Certainly it is unfair for someone to be denied employment because through no fault of their own they have lost their job in a sour economy and have fallen behind in mortgage payments and perhaps medical bills. Certainly that individual should be protected.

The problem with A3804 is that there already exists a law that does just that. The federal Fair Credit Reporting Act (FCRA) ensures that job applicants are protected from their credit histories being used unfairly in denying them employment.

Among other things, the FCRA states a job applicant:

- Must be told if any information in their credit report has been used against them to deny employment;
- · Has the right to know what is in their file;
- Has the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information and have that information either corrected or deleted; and
- May seek damages from violators.

Most important, under the FCRA a job applicant must give consent for credit reports to be shared with existing or potential employers. Simply put, a job applicant can refuse to allow his or her credit history to be revealed.

Yet A3804 seeks to extend this protection so far as to make it impossible for a potential employer to even ask to consider this information, forcing them to hire blind and fill positions in which a poor credit history might indeed be relevant.

Few if any employers would use a credit history as the sole determinant for a decision to hire a candidate. Yet credit histories are relevant because they reflect how people handle their personal obligations.

An unemployed individual making good faith effort payments on their bills while seeking employment is viewed in a different light than a person with five maxed credit cards or a practicing doctor or lawyer living beyond their means.

In addition, the personal comportment that is often reflected in an individual's credit history takes on importance at many different levels in the business environment. A bank teller in serious credit card debt is a liability no institution would be expected to carry. Yet a department head or administrative assistant with access to proprietary information valued by the competition is no less a threat to a company's health. Is an individual with six-figure student loan debt a sound choice for a student loan management position at a college?

It is often noted that one bad employee can cost a business more money than a good employee can bring in. At a time when businesses throughout the state are fighting for survival, it is illogical to force employers to increase their risk of hiring bad employees when sufficient protection already exists for any job applicant.

Times are hard. Résumés are being padded and work histories are being forged. Honest job applicants are competing with those less so. When a trust-worthy individual loses out on a job to someone less scrupled, it is not only the honest applicant who suffers. The employer and its customers suffer, as well.

A personal credit history reflecting short-term difficulties in no way reflects dishonesty or desperation. However, long-term trends may indeed be indicative of more deeply rooted problems.

Job applicants deserve – and have – the right to ensure their credit histories are accurate and are being fairly used when evaluating them. Employers have a right to perform that evaluation.

Bill A3804 is a bad idea.

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Reforming Health Care: Then and Now

In 1994, when Congress last tried to reform our nation's healthcare system, I was still a fairly new member of Congress serving out my third term in the House. Fast forward 15 years and I think it's a useful exercise to ask, "What has changed?"

My colleagues and I from the 1994 battle are still here. We are a little bit older, but we are also a little bit wiser about how to approach health reform. We have the benefit of having a second chance and we have no intention of making the same mistakes that were made during the last go-round on health reform.

For example, in the House the three committees that have jurisdiction over health issues are working together in a unified fashion to develop a single proposal based on the key principles outlined by President Obama. This is a stark contrast from 1994 when the three committees were handed a legislative proposal from above in which they had little or no input and went to work on separate paths.

Even though it was early in his first term, President Clinton's health reform plan came too late. He had already spent significant political capital on other priorities, like the North American Free Trade Agreement, making it more difficult to get healthcare reform across the finish line.

Another major difference between today and the 1994 debate is how various stakeholders are positioning themselves now. Back then, lines were drawn and many organizations and interests took sides. The debate became polarized and politicized, including the use of campaign-style attack ads.

The attitudes and actions of everyone involved, including the business community, are completely different now. Industry representatives, such as America's Health Insurance Plans and PhRMA, have teamed up with consumer groups like Families USA and AARP. Similarly, groups representing employers' interests have joined forces with unions.

They all recognize the importance – even the imperative – of working together. They understand that we all have a vested interest in reforming health care. Businesses want healthy workers who improve productivity. Workers want a job that provides important benefits such as health coverage for themselves and their families.

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For businesses large and small, health care costs are a growing expense. They have become a costly burden for some and they make it all but impossible for many small businesses to provide health care to their employees. The cost of coverage for businesses has increased by as much as 80 percent in the past five years alone. As a result, one in five small businesses in New Jersey can't afford health insurance.

Businesses want workers who are in good health, who don't lose time to illness and who don't seek work elsewhere just to get health coverage. The "cost" to businesses of not providing coverage includes lost productivity.

The longer we debate this issue, the longer healthcare costs continue to spiral out of control and the longer Americans have to wait for access to affordable and quality health care coverage.

We need people who are willing to take their seats and stay firmly planted as we hammer out these details, especially on the most controversial aspects of health reform.

There are many other details that will need to be flushed out that require tough choices on the part of patients, providers, insurers, manufacturers and members of Congress. I'm hopeful that we all have learned from our previous mistakes and will continue to work together to finally reform our nation's healthcare system. We literally can't afford to let history repeat itself; we may not get a third chance to do it right.

When the Correct Decision Adds Up

The writer and poet Karl Kraus once said, "In case of doubt, decide in favor of what is correct."

The New Jersey Legislature is in the unique position of doing both what is fiscally wise – at a time when fiscal wisdom is nothing short of imperative – and also what is morally correct. The Legislature is considering a bill to close five of the state's seven institutions for people with developmental disabilities. The legislation, A3625/S2654 introduced by Assemblyman Louis Greenwald, will more closely align New Jersey with the national trend of moving people with developmental disabilities out of institutions and into the community while also more efficiently allocating scarce budget dollars.

At a time when state leaders are desperate for solutions to help close the projected \$1.2 billion budget deficit, this bill offers the Legislature the chance to save money while also doing what is correct.

First let's look at the numbers. Nearly 3,000 New Jersey residents live in developmental centers at an annual cost of about \$225,000 each, or two to three times the average cost of community living. By comparison, the cost for providing community housing for members of Community Access Unlimited (CAU) runs just \$20,00 to \$80,000 annually.

New Jersey's seven developmental centers consume 31 percent of the \$1.4 billion budget of the Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) while serving less than 8 percent of the population served by the department. Closing five of the seven centers and moving those residents into community living will equate to a considerable cost saving for DDD and the state.

So clearly the numbers support closing New Jersey's developmental centers. So does our moral obligation to do what is correct, to enable each member of society to live more fulfilling lives.

Community living offers people with developmental disabilities the opportunity to live in their own homes while receiving the supports they need. They contribute to the fabric of society, in

many ways financial – by paying rent or mortgages and through income taxes when they work – and build self-esteem.

This year at Community Access Unlimited we are celebrating our 30th year of helping people with disabilities and at-risk youth. We began CAU in 1979 by successfully removing 20 people with developmental disabilities from institutional living and integrating them into the community. In our 30 years we have supported more than 7,000 individuals, helping 3,000 people with developmental disabilities to live independently or semi-independently.

While it has been immeasurably rewarding to provide this support for three decades, equally important is that our business model works. CAU was one of the first non-profit agencies in the nation to see the federal low-income housing tax credit as an opportunity to acquire property to be used for community housing for its members. Today, in addition to 55,000 square feet of commercial space, CAU owns more than 200 units of housing throughout Union County. Each year we assist more than 3,500 individuals with all kinds of disabilities.

Our core value and belief has always been that all people can be independent citizens participating in and contributing to the community. One of our first members, Adelaide, spent the first 22 years of her life in institutions and foster care before coming to CAU in 1979. Today she lives independently and is a member of our board of trustees, an officer in our self-advocacy arm, Helping Hands, and a proud partial owner of Jump Start, our self-advocacy consulting business.

A look at the dollars makes closing New Jersey's developmental centers a fiscally sound decision. A look at the thousands of people with disabilities whose lives have been improved through community living makes it a correct decision.

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

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



There are Myths of Mobile Marketing?

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There's been a lot of buzz in the past few years about mobile marketing coming of age. Quite a few thoughts about using this medium for marketing have taken root as common knowledge. Since mobile marketing is seemingly here to stay it is important for businesses and consumers to understand which of these concepts are true and which are false.

It's Just Teenagers, Right?

While it may seem that teens and 20-somethings are the only demographic groups a business can reach via mobile marketing it is actually one of the biggest myths surrounding this powerful new marketing tool. The reality is that in the U.S. there are 270 million cell phone subscribers – 88 percent of our population. Clearly it is not just teens using cell phones.

Usually the first form of mobile marketing that comes to mind is text messaging (also known as SMS). A common misunderstanding on this topic is that only teens send and receive text messages.

In fact, according to Nielsen Mobile, 123 million Americans use text messaging regularly and up through the age of 44 people actually send more text messages than make phone calls. Yes, the teens are the most voracious users of SMS, but they are not the only users.

I Don't Want to Start Getting Spam on My Phone

Of course consumers and businesses alike are very concerned about mobile spam, as well they should be. But it is important to note that mobile spam is the exception not the rule. Due to the consumer-focused guidelines and best practices outlined by the Mobile Marketing Association and enforced by the cell phone carriers, the vast majority of text message vendors are very strict about ensuring that text messages are sent only with the recipient's explicit permission.

In addition to the industry's best practices there is legislation (m-SPAM Act of 2009, S.788) before Congress that, if passed, will make sending mobile spam illegal. Consumers should be careful to only sign up for text message programs from reputable companies or businesses they currently do business with. However, they should not forgo all text message offers if they are interested. Text messaging is not synonymous with mobile spam.

We Don't Need to Develop a Mobile Website

Many businesses don't realize that their audience may already be interacting with them on the mobile web whether or not they are ready for them. Nielsen Mobile reports that 44 million Americans regularly use the mobile web and a survey done by iCrossing shows that 84 percent of mobile web users expect sites they visit frequently to provide a dedicated mobile version of their site.

Since the iPhone hit the market thinking has started down the path that a mobile-specific site is not necessary since this device can handle the full-sized Internet with ease. Yes, the iPhone is amazing and has changed the face of mobile marketing forever, but the sites that are shown in the commercials are iPhone-developed sites. They work that way because they are developed to do so. It doesn't happen naturally.

Secondly, even as well as the iPhone has sold, as late as third quarter 2008 it was only fourth in the list of Top 10 Mobile Phones in the U.S., with a 1.5 percent market share of all subscribers. Bottom line, people are using other phones besides the iPhone and they need and expect to find a mobile-specific version when they get there.

People Don't Want to be Marketed to on Their Phone

Of course no one wants to be marketed to on their phone. We don't want to watch commercials on TV either. People do not read a newspaper or magazine specifically for the ads.


What people do want is to have valuable interaction with businesses on their terms. If businesses keep their customers' needs first and follow all applicable best practices, the marketing efforts they make will not feel like marketing to the people receiving them.

As an example, a mobile coupon from a company that comes after they have signed up to receive it is welcome. Getting a tidbit of information on a topic of interest (daily horoscope, sports scores, stock quotes) is fine. Finding out about a hard-to-find product being available is valuable. Being able to purchase a theater ticket or find a local restaurant on the go is helpful. The list is virtually endless if a business just pays attention to what their customers want.

One other aspect of mobile marketing that is important is trust. People buy from companies they trust and they are more likely to interact via mobile with trustworthy companies. If the trust is there then that also takes the edge off it feeling like marketing to the consumer.

While it may seem cumbersome to figure out how to get started in mobile marketing it is something that businesses cannot afford to ignore. Consumers are using mobile media and they expect businesses to be there for them.


