CRANFORD — Local officials have announced one probable case of the HINI virus, also known as "swine flu," in a Brookside Place School student, with two other

Commission nears final decision

UNION - The township's Charter Study Commission moved one step closer to recommending a new form of government for Union after cutting their options to three.

Commission members voted to stop pursuing the mayor-council form of government as an option for Union in a 5-0 vote at Monday

night's council meeting. Members cilmen are elected and they choose said that form would give too much one person among them to sit as power to the mayor.

The Charter Study Commission has been tasked with reviewing different types of governments and must recommend the one they find best suits the town. The public clamored for a change after complaints the current mayor is not voted for by the public. Five coun-

Menza wins runoff

Provisional ballots still to be counted

HILLSIDE - Unofficial results from Tuesday night's municipal runoff election show the winner of the mayor's seat to be Joseph Menza, who defeated Jerome Jewell by six votes, while Jewell's slate of council candidates roundly defeated Menza's ticket to win three open council seats.

Winners for the Township Council seats are Angela Garretson, President Carlisle and incumbent Councilman Frank Deo. The slate defeated Joseph Puglise, George Cook and Jean Miller.

Candidates from both tickets indicated that the final outcome of mayor's race is under question. Menza received 1,705 votes, while Jewell earned 1,699 votes.

"There are 12 provisional ballots that will have to be counted tomorrow," Deo said Tuesday

The provisional ballots represent mistakes or irregularities that still need to be counted, Deo explained. Menza also expressed uncertainty, describing the atmosphere of his party as "reserved."





Lance visits Springfield school, responds to environmental questions

SPRINGFIELD — What will it take to lessen the affects of global warming?

Sarah Milochik's seventhgrade civics class at Florence M. Gaudineer Middle School called on Congressman Leonard Lance to share his thoughts.

Lance visited Milochik's class after receiving letters from the students, asking him questions about steps political officials are taking to avoid further environmental devastation.

During his visit, Lance touched on the dangers of rising water levels and discussed energy conservation and alternative energy sources as a means of helping the environment recover. He noted how significant global warming and flooding could be, especially to a coastal state like the direction of energy conserva-

state government and the House of Representatives.

The letters were written as part of their research for Milochik's four-year-old "Project Citizen" assignment. The goal of the project is to teach students the process behind some legislation passed by government. Milochik said every year her students send letters to local politicians, but rarely get responses, let alone visits,

Twelve-year-old Julianna Pica said the discussion with Lance showed students they can have an impact on their community. "We are very lucky and honored to have had him come in to visit." she said. Pica and her peers noted they learned a great deal from Lance about how the global environment can directly affect her and future generations.

Two arrests in store owner's murder

ROSELLE - Two months after a 64-year-old liquor store owner was gunned down during a robbery, police have arrested two suspects believed to be responsible for the crime, according to Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow.

Jimmie Session, 42, and Victor Russ, 42, both of Newark were arrested June 4, on the 300 block of McCarter Highway in Newark. They are believed to be responsible for the March 18 shooting of Jitendra Parikh of North Bergen, and owner of Skylark Discount Liquors

on West 1st Avenue, as well as a string of other robberies in the area,

"These are dangerous men who

took an innocent man's life all for a few dollars," Romankow said.

Both men are being held on \$1 million bail and face charges of felony- and first-degree murder,robbery and unlawful possession of a weapon.

The two men are suspected of robbing Parikh's store at around 8:30 p.m. March 18, and shooting him twice, authorities said.

The husband and father of two sons was transported to University Hospital in Newark, where he was pronounce'd dead a short time later.

The former auto plant site has been unused since the factory shut down in April 2005 and currently generates \$180,000 in revenue for the city. Indianapolis-based Duke Realty bought the property in early 2008 for \$76.5 million, after the city settled a 24-year-old lawsuit with GM.

"What's important is not only giving seniors an opportunity to stay in Linden, but it also won't have a major impact on our tax rate," he said, noting that when families move into town it costs taxpavers \$14,500 annually to educate each child that comes with them.

Duke Realty spokesman Ken Turchi said the company would not comment much on the project until all the space has been rented.

"We don't have everything fully in place with the tenants. We're still working on the details," he said. "We will have more to say in a few weeks."

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
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SFD reviews goals; addresses changes

SUMMIT - The city's fire department is calling on community members to help reassess its priorities.

The department hopes residents and officials will share their concerns and offer suggestion as to how it can update its Strategic Plan, a detailed layout of its goals for the next five to ten years, according to fire Chief

Municipal officials are already doing their part. They, along with Houck, kicked off the effort by sharing their thoughts regarding the department's strengths, weaknesses and future opportunities during the June 3 City Council meeting.

Strengths mentioned included the department's low turnover rate, reputation and strict code enforcement. SFD members generally remain on staff until retirement age, according to Houck.

Council members also discussed the department's efforts to go beyond their necessary duties to provide taxpayers with services departments in some other nearby towns do not, such as pumping out flooded basements, installing smoke detectors and retrieving the occasional cat from a tree. Houck said many of the city's firefighters, a 32-member force, are involved in the community, even while off-duty.

"These folks are paying us quite a bit of money to do what we do," Houck said. "We like to be able to go that extra mile."

The starting rate for Summit firefighters is approximately \$45,000

Weaknesses and concerns brought up at the meeting included the need to get a more consistent response from volunteers during calls and improve physical fitness among its members.

Council members and Houck noted a significant challenge facing the department: providing the volume of staff needed to answer calls for services at large facilities in town, such as the Schering Plough site and Overlook Hospital. Due to the complexity of the building and the potential need to evacuate patients, calls involving such "target hazards" bring automatic mutual aid units from Millburn and Springfield, Houck said.

Our staff is challenged by those larger facilities," Houck said. "We actually received more assistance in 2008 [from other towns] than we received in [2007]."

Mayor Jordan Glatt said he is pleased to the see the department undertaking this review. "I'm glad they're addressing it. It's very proactive," he

Houck said the department's goal is to finalize the new plan by the July 14 council meeting. Finalizing the plan will entail creating several "action plans" identifying areas that require attention.



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


When all 'bark' equals less bite

Just weeks after closing the Oak Ridge Golf Course, we found ourselves shaking our heads at the thought of the county spending about half a million dollars to upgrade a dog park at taxpayers' expense. So when officials announced plans to scale back the renovations, we were relieved; but we can't help but wonder what would've happened had members of the public failed to protest the project.

Union County Freeholders wasted no time spreading the word that they were making cuts to the county's \$442.5 million spending plan to compensate for a \$20 million deficit. Part of the budget modifications included the closing of the Oak Ridge Golf Course — despite protests from golfers — as well as at least 30 layoffs. The result was still a 5.32 percent tax hike. Still, freeholders initially planned to allocate \$586,972 toward upgrades to the Echo Lake Dog Park, until neighbors and various county residents reminded their elected officials that the addition of amenities such as water fountains for dogs, self-closing gates and bag stations shouldn't take precedence in a struggling economy. It's now anticipated that the project will not exceed \$100,000 and will include mostly necessary improvements.

We're glad county officials realized — with help from the public — that they can't claim to be prudent in some areas and careless in others. In fact, it goes without saying that fiscal responsibility should prevail throughout the year, not just as budget time, when officials are attempting to "sell" their spending plan to the overtaxed residents of Union County. That means curtailing frivolous spending such as vehicles for county officials, catered food at meetings and costly renovations to recreational facilities, when those funds could be put to better use elsewhere in the budget, or used to offset increases in other areas.

The decision to scale back the Echo Lake Dog park renovations was a wise one on the freeholders' part, but the county residents who spoke out against the expensive project deserve most of the credit. Their "barks" kept the county from taking a bigger bite out of taxpayers' wallets.



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

A 'moderate' approach

To the Editor:

I write in rebuttal to (Cranford) Commissioner Daniel Aschenbach's e-mail letter of May 11 to 104 recipients and also in rebuttal to his letter of May 22, 2009 in the Cranford Chronicle.

His letter was addressed to 104 people and according to Mr. Aschenbach contained solutions to all of the township's financial problems.

What is most noteworthy about Mr. Aschenbach's letters is their consistency, always rambling and largely inconsequential, coming form one who as mayor and/or chairman of the Flood Advisory Committee squandered millions by his indecision and procrastination.

For example, Mr. Aschenbach, as chairman of the Flood Advisory Committee, he took five years to acquire four easements for the Express Sewer from Brookdale Road to the river.

This caused at least a three-year delay in the flood control project which escalated costs by over \$1 million. For the Brookside Detention Project, we acquired 32 easements in a matter of weeks.

Then, to acerbate the case, he individually chose an alignment for the Express Sewer which cost an additional \$50,000 because of its proximity to the basement foundation of the homes, whereas the original Killam engineer's alignment was near the shallower garage

Mr. Aschenbach's alignment was not approved by any of the four municipal engineers involved, including the writer. Early in 2001, again as chairman of the Flood Advisory Committee, he dawdled on the Killam alignment of the Express Sewer and initiated a restudy which recommended the initial alignment.

This procrastination cost \$20,000 and wasted several months. This dawdling and indecision cost \$32,000 and took the better part of one year.

Now, all of a sudden, Mr. Aschenbach has all the answers to the township's problems. But I'm sure that Mr. Aschenbach could be helpful in solving some of the township's problems if he could use a moderate approach rather than his bulldozer tactics.

I believe that I know Mr. Aschenbach quite well. having followed his political career for more than 30 years and suffered through his many Letters to the Editor.

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


"Before making it a career, it's a job you have to decide you really want to do," Cieri advised. "It's certainly not your typical 9 to 5."



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


Andrascik said it was because of people like those in his family, he was able to reach out and encourage others in need. "It is amazing what...positive can come out of people in difficult times," he said.

Though the mayor-council-administrator style of government, or Faulkner format, was voted down, the vote was reopened after intense debate and some sparring on the dais. The commission pushed the final vote to next week. Bertha Matthews and Suzette Cavadas both said they would like more time to explore the option.

The three other council members, however, said they are strongly against the format.

Jakubowski presented a fiscal study of the governing body's current salaries and benefits. The Faulkner format could make some part-time positions full-time and add at least one extra ward seat to council. This could cost the township an additional \$70,000 per year, he said

"In this economic climate, it is untenable that we could add seats to council," said commission member Michael Cohan. He cited recent recommendations from Berkeley Heights residents and officials, who said they are struggling with this type of government in their own town.

The council-manager style government has received the most positive feedback from the council. This format would allow the mayor's position to be voted on by the community, and the mayor would have power equal to the council.

The Charter Study Commission did have some concerns regarding that option, because a manager would be in charge of hiring and firing department heads with no input or permission needed from council. The council-manager would be appointed by the mayor and could be removed by a majority vote.

An option supported by former

Union Mayor Greg Muller is a special charter. This would allow the township to alter the current form of government slightly. Muller suggested making the mayor's seat a position that is voted on, but does not include extra power.

The Charter Study Commission expects to have an official recommendation by next month, at which point the community must vote for the change in government.

The next meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. June 15 in Council Chambers at Town Hall.



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Romerovski: Officials consider Payment in Lieu of Taxes plan

ROSELLE PARK — Officials are examining a plan to end litigation between the borough and Avalon Bay, the developer seeking to build on the Romerovski site.

During the Borough Council's May 26 meeting, officials proposed establishing a Payment in Lieu of Taxes program, which would resolve the remedy lawsuit the company filed against the borough in 2007.

The dispute between the town and Avalon Bay involves a parcel on Westfield-Avenue designated by the borough as an area in need of redevelopment. The Virginia-based development company had submitted its plan to build 249 luxury apartments in a four-and-a-half story building at the site. Local residents and officials hoping retail space would be included were dissatisfied with the developer's final proposal.

The PILOT program would allow the borough to receive 95 percent of the tax revenue from the site, estimated at \$524,000. This figure is calculated as ten percent

of the gross revenue of the project. The county would receive 5 percent of the taxes, while the school district would not receive tax money.

The attorney representing the borough, Bill Northgrave of Newark-based law firm McManimon & Scotland, said the program could be helpful. "Long-term tax exemption can be used to cause the development of...areas that were difficult to redevelop for certain reasons," he said.

Such an exemptions is intended to serve as an incentive to draw businesses to a certain site. The agreement with Avalon Bay would run 35 years from the date of approval.

The proposal was met with mixed feedback from about 50 residents who attended the meeting. They questioned the potential benefits and possible repercussions of the program.


Most of the public comment centered on criticism of the Council on Affordable Housing, with residents blaming changing COAH regulations for attracting development-related legal troubles to the town.

Joe Accardi, a member of the Roselle Park Concerned Citizens Group, said the program will ultimately prove too costly for the borough and its taxpayers, saying the more than 200 apartments at the Romerovski site would result in an increase in borough services and negate the fiscal benefits. "The biggest expense we can expect comes from the increase to the student population in our schools," he said, explaining more homes will lead to more families moving in with children. Accardi spoke directly to Avalon Bay Vice President of Development Ronald Ladell, who attended the meeting. "We want to develop the Romerovski site, and we want to do it right, but we don't want to pay to have you come here and build."

Mayor Joseph DeIorio stressed the borough has few options other than continuing the legal battle with Avalon Bay. "If we don't want to go into this pilot program, we will continue litigation," DeIorio said.

Help on the way for KDP despite delayed Borough Hall renovation

KENILWORTH — Although the deflated economy has indefinitely halted the borough's \$50 million plan to upgrade the Municipal Building, officials say they still hope to renovate parts of the police station this year.

A lack of space at Borough Hall, on Kenilworth Boulevard, has created many problems for employees, particularly in law enforcement.

Police Chief William Dowd said residents should not be worried about services and police work being affected, though he did note there is an added burden on officers. "They are limited in some things, but [the current facilities] are still workable. It's just difficult at times," he said.

The Police Department's fourofficer Detective Division currently works out of a trailer outside the municipal complex. Kenilworth's

lone female police officer is without her own locker room and authorities have even been forced to interview some suspects in a locker room.

Dowd said officers are disappointed with the delay, but they understand the situation. "We really can't be upset with it. [The council] understands the new building is a necessity, but in these hard economic times, you have to make a tough decision," he said.

Constructing additions to the current municipal building has been a major goal of the governing body for several years. The final plan includes construction of a new police complex and a new courtroom. An architect had been hired and \$190,000 grant money obtained on the project. The grant money will expire at the end of the year if unused, according to officials.

Task Force, which has been investigating the case, has linked Session and Russ to other convenience and liquor store robberies in Millburn, North Arlington, at another Roselle site, and two in Elizabeth. In each robbery, except in Millburn, a weapon was fired, Romankow said.

The county Task Force had made the murder a top priority, issuing a call for help from witnesses last week, shortly before the two men were caught. Crimestoppers offered a reward of up to \$5,000 for information leading to an arrest and indictment in the case.

UCPO spokesman John Holl said the Task Force received assistance from Bergen and Essex county prosecutor's offices, as well as Roselle, Elizabeth, Millburn and North Arlington police. Detectives found the link to all six robberies by matching bullets found at the sites through ballistics tests.

He added the Task Force also received helpful tips from the public.

"Part of it was the public's help...along with good police work. It was a combination of those things that really helped us find them," he said.

six confirmed cases of swine influenza in Union County, however it does not track cases by municipality.

According to the department's Web site, school closure is not advised for a suspected or confirmed case of H1N1 and, in general, is not advised unless there is a magnitude of faculty or student absenteeism that interferes with the school's ability to function.

Swine flu is believed to have originated in Mexico, where an initial outbreak in April claimed the lives of more than 100 people. The virus has not behaved as aggressively since spreading to the U.S., but is still being monitored by authorities. According to the World Health Organization's Web site, 73 countries have reported more than 25,000 cases with 139 deaths.

> Zeisser said that increased enforcement in one municipality typically does result in some impact on adjacent communities.

> "We learned a long time ago that if you're going to do an operation, you'd better let your neighbors know," Zeisser said. "I have

seen a small influx of crimes along the Irvington border already."

He indicated that this activity consist mostly of daytime burglaries and said the suspects were all successfully apprehended.

Zeisser said the enforcement efforts involved the Irvington Police Department. the Essex County Prosecutor's Office, the State Police and the Drug Enforcement Agency. Quinlan said the state police added approximately 30 additional troopers to the township last month.

Capt. Gerald Lewis of the State Police Public Information Department deferred all questions on state police activity in Irvington

to Irvington Police Director Joseph Santiago, who did not return calls for comment as of press time Tuesday.

Ouinlan said at this point there has been no immediate impact on Hillside, but local law enforcement continues to closely monitor the situation. Quinlan said Hillside monitors gang activity and works with the Union County Prosecutor's Office Homicide Task Force, making the township an unfriendly place for criminals.

"If any of them do relocate from Irvington, they should think twice about relocating to Hillside," Quinlan said. "They're not wel-

County changes dog park project

Plans for a \$586,972 upgrade to one of the most popular county-owned recreation facilities. the Echo Lake Dog Park, have been put on hold due to the adverse economy, officials said.

The upgrade, approved by the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders last month, called for the redesign of the three-acre facility in Mountainside, with the addition of amenities such as water fountains for dogs, selfclosing gates and bag stations.

County officials now say these changes will be scaled back significantly, a result of economic concerns. In a May 28 letter from Freeholder Deborah Scanlon to County Manager George Devanney, Scanlon recommended the administration postpone the work and consider less costly options in light of the economic climate.



Kean earns honors

The New Jersey Speech-Language-Hearing Association has selected Kean University as the recipient of the 2009 NJSHA Program of the Year.

Kean's Speech Upgrade Project attracted the attention of the NJSHA over the 11 years it has been working for retraining speech corrections, so they can acquire new credentials required by changes to state and federal standards.

Martin Schulman, program administrator for the Kean Department of Communication Disorders and Deafness, and director of the Upgrade Project, accepted the award.

Schulman said the Kean program was a good candidate to receive the award because it is probably the most heavily involved school in the state in terms of speech upgrade work.

"Quite frankly it was not a surprise," Schulman said. "It was wonderful to receive it, but not really a surprise. It was the most logical choice for the DOE to make."

The Speech Upgrade Project works to help speech language pathologists keep up with requirements imposed by federal regulations. Schulman explained that prior to 1988, a bachelor's degree was all that was required to work as a speech language pathologist. When this requirement was raised to a master's degree, those already

Annual Bio Blitz takes a closer look at Union County's parks

While he and his teams are combing the woods of Union County this weekend searching for insects of all shapes and sizes, Daniela Shebitz' teams will be looking for all sorts of plant life. Eric Boehm's crews will be in search of fungi; and all the while, a phalanx of scientists and volunteers will go in search of birds, mammals, amphibians -- just about everything short of Big

Bio-Blitz 2009 kicks off Friday at 5 p.m. and runs though Saturday evening. The 24-hour event, the fifth sponsored by Union County, is an intensive effort to measure the biodiversity of a targeted section of county parkland by surveying the plant and animal life, said Betty Ann Kelly, an environmental specialist with the county parks department who coordinates the annual event.

The event, which includes numerous programs for adults and children, will be held in Briant Park, which is also serving as the base station to coordinate all activities, as well as Hidden Valley Park and the old Houdaille Quarry. The quarry and most of Hidden Valley are in Springfield, resources and green space.

Sylvio Codella is looking for a few good bugs. while Briant Park is in Summit. Details can be found on the web at www.ucnj.org/parks/bioblitz. html or by calling 908-789-3209.

The event marks the fifth year that the county, in cooperation with Kean University's Institute of Urban Ecosystem Studies, has focused on a county park for the intensive study. Last year, the study focused on the Elizabeth River Parkway in Elizabeth, Union and Hillside, where 570 species of plants and animals were identified.

One of the highlights of this year's Bio-Blitz is the quarry, which is normally closed to the public. There are going to be several guided hikes through the quarry, along with a "coyote howl" late Friday night when scientists will see if any of the coyotes that have returned to the northern edge of the county respond to simulated coyote calls.

Shebitz is particularly excited about the opportunity to study the quarry this year.

Boehm said he hoped visitors to Bio-Blitz would go away with a deeper appreciation of nature and the ecosystems they live in, not to mention the need to maintain and protect

pathologists that has occurred in recent years. NJSHA President Robin Kanif described Schulman as strong advocate for speech, language and hearing services.

'Marty Schulman is a dedicated, caring professional," Kanif said. "I always felt he was the type of person who wants to see people succeed."

The project is funded entirely by a yearly grant of \$165,000 from the State Department of Education.



Culture takes center stage at Promenade

LINDEN - Nestled in the concrete-facade storefronts of downtown Linden, the Raymond Wood Bauer Promenade certainly does not fit in, but it does stand out.

The \$4 million oasis of arts is the cultural center of Linden, providing a detached space for concerts and artwork displays right next to the urban crush of the city's shopping district along North Wood Avenue.

Completed in September of 2006, the city and the Union County Improvement Authority split costs on the project, which is officially owned by the county but is run by Linden, A \$2 million donation was also given by the family of the site's namesake.

The town's goal was to provide a place for families to have some recreational space.

"When the fellows designed our promenade, they went over to New York City and looked at some NYC-style pocket parks," explained program director Gary Luciano. "It's not that big, but people find it a nice place to sit down, read a paper or enjoy some art."

The promenade offers a place for countless events during the year, including a Farmer's Market run by Linden's Cultural Committee, murals from local artists appeal to each demographic in Turner and Beatles cover bands.

Vendors prepare to sell their wares at the weekly farmers market, while visitors stroll through the Raymond Wood Bauer Promenade in Linden's downtown area. The promenade is serving as the location for several upcoming cultural events such as concerts and art shows.

"That's exactly what we are trying to do, promote Linden culture using the promenade, said Gerbounka. "It is a great source of pride for our community."

Advertisers seem to be more willing to fund local arts as well. The series, which costs approximately \$60,000 to run, received more money from fundraising this year than any before.

"A local business would rather spend money promoting arts in town to people who use their business than spend that same money for an ad for people who are never going to come down to Linden," Luciano explained.

He said that although Linden has always had culture and arts in town, the Promenade offers a solid base and more professional way to patronize those arts.

"For concerts, we used to have a trailer sitting in the middle of Wilson Park, having big name acts change in their cars," he remembered. "Now we have a home."

Summit stands taller than rest

The Summit boys' lacrosse team waited over two months to get another shot at Delbarton.

Summit was presented with that opportunity.

The Hilltoppers took advantage.

In Saturday's Tournament of Champions final at Yurcak Field at Rutgers University in Piscataway, second-seeded Summit defeated top-seeded Delbarton 8-4 in front of nearly 4,000 fans to finish No. 1 in New Jersey.

Summit, the Public, Group 2 state champion, finished its best season ever with a 22-game winning streak and a 22-1 record.

Delbarton, the Non-Public A state champ, finished 19-3. Its only instate loss was to Summit.

Summit hosted Delbarton at Tatlock Field on April 1 in the seasonopener for both. Delbarton came away with a 10-6 triumph.

Summit went on to win the Union County Tournament championship for the second consecutive season and for the fifth time in the seven years of the tourney.

Delbarton defeated Mountain Lakes to win the Morris County Tournament championship.

Summit appeared in the TOC final for the first time since 2005 when it lost to Delbarton 6-2. That was also the last year Summit won a state championship.

Summit also set a school record for wins in a season, breaking the mark set by the 1981 state championship squad. The Hilltoppers then won the overall state crown for the first and only time before Saturday in 1983.

Senior attackman James Kennedy paced Summit with five goals, while Kyle Mahoney, Danny Feeney and Jake Hall netted one. Junior attackman John Scioscia had three assists.

Goalie Brian Feeney did well to come up with 18 saves, while Delbarton outshot Summit 34-18.

Summit led 4-1 at the half after outscoring Delbarton 3-0 in the second quarter. The Hilltoppers led 6-1 going into the fourth quarter.

Delbarton was ranked No. 1 in the state by The Star-Ledger and Summit No. 2. The Hilltoppers will now finish No. 1 in the state for the first time in 26 years.

Local diamond squads have lot to be proud of

TOMS RIVER - It was not a good day for Union County teams in Toms River Sunday.

First Cranford softball lost to Pequannock 4-1 at Toms River North in the Group 2 state championship game.

Then Union softball fell to Williamstown 3-0 at Toms River East in the Group 4 state championship game.

Then Brearley lost to Park Ridge 4-2 at Toms River East - on the field next to the one Union softball was playing on - in the Group 1 state championship game.

Give all three Union County diamond squads credit for getting to Toms River to play in state championship games.

It just happened to turn out that the teams they went up against were a little better.
"We didn't put the ball in play as much as I would

"We didn't put the ball in play as much as I would have liked, but when we did they made some nice plays," Brearley head coach Joe Capizzano said.

Brearley scored two runs on no hits in the bottom of the first to take a quick 2-0 lead.

The Bears had that lead until Park Ridge tied the game with two runs in the top of the fourth and took the lead for good with two runs in the top of the fifth after loading the bases with no outs. The game-winning run scored on an error.

"It's been an incredble run, it's been unbelievable," said Capizzano, a 1988 Brearley Regional graduate and the head coach since 1998.

He led the Bears to their first-ever state championship game after Brearley captured its first-ever sectional championship, with them capturing Central Jersey, Group 1.

"It was a phenomenal season," Capizzano said.

"I'm happy for the seniors and I wish we could have won it. They should feel proud and they did a great job."

Park Ridge, which finished 26-6, won its second state championship and first since the Bergen County school knocked off Florence Township in the 1977 Group 1 final.

Brearley had a seven-game winning streak snapped and fell to 16-7. Senior right hander Tom Mannix went the distance for Brearley and finished with a 7-4 record after winning his last previous starts. He went 2-1 in state tournament games, with three complete games.

The only three runs Union junior left hander Amanda Kardys yielded in five state tournament games all came in the bottom of the sixth against Williamstown, which repeated as the Group 4 state champion. Williamstown defeated Ridgewood 2-0 in last year's final in Toms River. The repeat South Jersey, Group 4 champ has now won two state titles.

Williamstown's first run was scored on a hard-hit single to left that brought home the runner from third. A softer hit to right field plated the game's final two runs. The home plate umpire called the second runner attempting to score on the hit out, which would have been the third out.

However, the inning continued and the scoreboard read 3-0 Williamstown.

Even many Williamstown fans admitted to wondering how the third run could have scored when the home plate umpire called the girl out. They were left to assume that the run scored despite the umpire calling the runner out and the inning continuing.

Very strange.

Anyway, Union - like Brearley - had a sensational season, finishing 27-5. Union began the year 10-0 before losing at Iselin Kennedy 3-2. The Farmers had won nine in a row before falling to Williamstown, which finished 23-2.

Union won its first Union County Tournament championship since 2000 and its record 11th. The Farmers also captured North 2, Group 4 for the first time since 1995 after reaching the final for the first time since 1998.

In addition, Union won its most games since a 28-2 finish in 1995 when the Farmers led the state in wins that season.

Kardys had a six-game winning streak snapped and finished 18-5. In 35 innings of state tournament competition in five games, Kardys allowed only three runs - all in one inning on two separate hits.

Kardys will enter her senior season with a 43-15 lifetime record, including 9-6 as a freshman and 16-4 as a sophomore.

Union appeared in the Group 4 final for the first time since its only win in the game in 1989 when the Farmers defeated Middletwon North. Union also lost the 1984 final to Cherokee.

Cranford - like Union and Brearley - also had a season to remember, with many thrilling victories. After one-and-done-at-home-as-the-higher-seed state tournament appearances the past two seasons, the Cougars came back to capture Central Jersey, Group 2 for the first time this year. In three of the previous four seasons, Cranford lost its first state tournament game.

A bottom of the ninth Katherine VanBenschoten home run at Adams Avenue Field in Cranford propelled the Cougars to the sectional title, which was their first since repeating as the N2, G3 champion in 2000.

VanBenschoten ended up scoring Cranford's lone run Sunday against Pequannock. After she walked and then advanced to second on a bunt single by Kelly Hardman, she was driven home on an RBI-single hit by Kelli Bruno.

VanBenschoten, who will continue at Fordham, finished a brilliant four-year varsity career with 47 home runs, including six this season. The state record is 55.

Hardman, a junior right hander, pitched well, yielding an unearned run in the bottom of the fourth and three earned in the bottom of the fifth. It was the first time this year Cranford allowed four runs. Pequannock scored its first run on an error in the fourth and its final three all on RBI-singles in the fifth.

Hardman was simply dominant on the mound for the Cougars in state tournament play. In her previous two games totalling 17 innings, she allowed a total of three baserunners - two hits and one walk - while winning backto-back extra-inning, one-hit contests.

Hardman finished 13-4 after having a five-game winning streak snapped. She will enter her senior season with a 33-5 lifetime record, including 8-1 as a freshman and 12-0 as a sophomore. Hardman has already been the winning pitcher in two county championship games and one sectional title contest.

Pequannock finished 27-2 and won its first state championship in its second appearance in a final. The Panthers of Morris County lost the 1995 Group 1 state championship game to Bound Brook.

Senior righty Megan Brain, who threw more than 100 pitches, finished 19-1 and combined with her younger sister - junior Kristin Brain - on a five-hitter. Kristin entered the game in the top of the sixth after Cranford had two baserunners on and nobody out after plating its only run. Kristin retired all six batters she faced, striking out the side in the seventh for the save.

Cranford had a six-game winning streak snapped and finished 20-4. Cranford made its second appearance in a state final. The Cougars fell to Hamilton 4-1 in the 1999 Group 3 state championship game.

Gregorio's goal to coach football becomes reality

Nick Gregorio set a goal for himself to become a head football coach by the age of 30.

Gregorio was officially named the 14th head coach of the Johnson program in Clark at a special school board meeting May 19.

The 1997 New Providence graduate turns 30 on Wednesday.

Mission accomplished.

"Clark reminds me of my hometown, a small town with a very strong tradition in football," Gregorio said by phone May 25.

Gregorio, who spent the last two seasons as an assistant football coach at Kean University in Union, will also teach health and physical education at Johnson.

"I want to continue the tradition that has been there at Johnson," Gregorio said.

Johnson went 8-4 last season under Gus Kalikas, losing four games by a total of 10 points. The Crusaders came close to winning a third playoff championship and first since 2002 before falling to Manasquan 19-14 in the Central Jersey, Group 2 title game at Rutgers.

Kalikas, a 1990 Johnson Regional graduate, guided Johnson to a 31-21 (.596) record in five seasons at the helm from 2004-2008. He will officially become the full time athletic director at Johnson this fall.

"Johnson has been a very successful program for a long time," said Gregorio, who went through three interviews for the position.

"It was a grueling process," Gregorio said. "I knew that Gus was going to become the athletic director and that the position was going to be open.

"Once I saw the ad in the paper I sent my stuff in right away."

Kalikas informed Gregorio that he was Johnson's choice on the night of May 19.

"Gus called me and that was it," Gregorio said. "I met the team the next day. I met some of the guys on the staff that were in the building and met the administration and faculty.

"Gus introduced me to everybody. I had my first staff meeting. There will be a lot of meetings in the beginning."

Gregorio will retain the services of defensive co-ordinator Mike Mancino and assistant coach Marc Crisafi, who has coached at Johnson the last two seasons after serving as the head coach at Union from 2001-2006,

"I couldn't be any luckier having Mike and Mark with me, especially for my first year as a head coach," Gregorio said. "I will keep some guys and bring some of my own guys in.

Gregorio served as the running backs coach at Kean in 2008 after coaching the defensive line in 2007.

"Coaching at Kean the last two years was an unbelievable experience," Gregorio said.

"We had great kids, a great staff and commitment from the administration.

"Athletics, in general, was a total 180 from what it used to be there 5-6 years ago.

"When I played at Montclair State (Gregorio graduated from MSU in 2002), Kean was not good. Now it's one of the top teams in the NJAC, competing for the conference every year. Dan Garrett (head coach) recruits kids with character and not just ability. They now have the right formula for success for a Division 3 school."

Gregorio began coaching as a graduate assistant at Springfield College, before a three-year coaching stint at Ridge under head coach Tom Falato. He was also the strength and conditioning coordinator at Ridge and taught there as well.

The former gridiron standout at Montclair State University was also an All-America shot-putter for the Red Hawk track and field team.

Gregorio earned his Bachelor of Science degree from Montclair State and a Master of Education degree from Springfield College.

He was an offensive lineman for Frank Bottone at New Providence and for Rich Giancola at Montclair State, two pretty good coaches with long and successful tenures at their schools.

"Coach Bottone is the reason why I am a coach and I would this year's game at Rahway's Veterans Field.

not be where I am today without him," Gregorio said. "He has always been a positive influence on me and has always kept in touch with me after high school.

"I use him as a reference and hope to always be able to give him a call. I aspire to be like him. He's been tremen-

Gregorio played on the varsity at New Providence for the 1994, 1995 and 1996 seasons after serving as a ball boy for the varsity games when he played on the freshman team his first year. During his senior season in 1996, New Providence won at Roselle Park 16-13 in a North 2, Group 1 semifinal.

Roselle Park was 8-0 and the top seed and had defeated New Providence 28-0 at home in the regular season. New Providence lost to Butler in the final 16-8. Butler also defeated New Providence 35-21 in the 1994 final during Gregorio's sophomore season.

In addition to his head coaching duties, Gregorio will be in charge of Johnson's offense.

"I will look to add my own flavor," Gregorio said. "I've been exposed to a lot of different systems over the years."

Gregorio spoke of the triple-option at Springfield College, a no-huddle spread at Ridge and a little more multiple scheme at Kean.

"I've had a diverse background in learning different types of offenses," Gregorio said. "We'll be more of a multiple spread type of offense here at Johnson."

NOTES: During his time at Montclair State, Gregorio played on teams that went to the NCAA playoffs three straight seasons and won back-to-back conference championships. When he coached at Springfield College, the school went to the NCAA playoffs two years in a row in addition to winning consecutive conference titles.

All three of Johnson's scrimmage dates are on the road, including its game-scrimmage at Hanover Park on Sept. 3. The Crusaders are scheduled to open their 2009 season at home on Sept. 11 against Governor Livingston.

Non-Union County opponents this year include Somerset County foes North Plainfield and Bernards. The Crussaders will continue to play Rahway on Thanksgiving, with

Article II "Administrator"

§4-20. Creation of position: Borough Administrator

The position of Borough Administra-tor of the Borough of Roselle is hereby created, and the employment of a Bor-ough Administrator is hereby author-ized.

§ 4-21. Appointment: qualifications.

The Borough Administrator shall be appointed by the Mayor with the advice and consents of the Borough Council. Said appointment shall be on the basis of the administrative qualifications of the appointee, with special regard to his/her education and training in government affairs and actual

experience therein. The compensation of the Borough Administrator shall be fixed by the annual Salary Ordinance of the Bor-ough.

He/she shall, in the absence of a "Qualified Purchasing Agent", as set forth in N.J.S.A. 40A:17-9(b) being employed and designate by the Borough, coordinate the purchasing of supplies, services, materials and equipment. He/she shall cause to have certified the receipt of the same and attend to the submission of proper vouchers for payment and review of all disbursements in connection therewith. If the Borough has appointed a Qualified Purchasing Agent, the Borough Administrator shall oversee the activities of such official.

E. Except for workshop, regular and/or special meetings of the Mayor and Council for purposes of taking governmental action for which the Borough Clerk shall arrange and prepare agenda for and such official.
