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
The 'spirit' of Union County

The other ghost As told by Michael Yesenko,

"During the battle of Connecticut Farms, a New Jersey militiaman was so terrified of being shot and killed that he ran away from the battle. He went to the Brant House, at 1835 Vauxhall Road (Union). It's still there, one of oldest homes in the county. He enters the house, goes up to the second floor bedroom, and hides there all day long.

The next day he is so overwhelmed and distraught that he was a coward, he hangs himself in the bedroom. The Brant family finds the body of the soldier, cuts it down, buries it. Now they begin to hear See JUST, Page 7

Like many areas of New Jersey, Union. County is no stranger to strange lore about ghosts and strange locations.


The following stories represent just a few of the tales that have been passed down through the years.

The Ghost of Hannah Caldwell Union's history is rich, with the Caldwell Parsonage dating back to the Revolutionary War's Battle of Connecticut Farms. Sightseers who notice an old-fashioned woman wearing a translucent white robe beware, however — it could the ghost of murdered war heroine Hannah Caldwell.


Hannah Caldwell's ghost is well-knewn local legend, known to frequent both the Parsonage and beyond. She has been spotted in the cemetery of Union's Presbyterian Church. SyFy Channel's Ghost Hunters' receatly attempted to locate her specter in an episode filmed at the Union County Courthouse, another of her hausting hangouis. But the real legend starts much closer to home, at the parsonage on Caldwell Avenue and Headley Ter-



Robbers pose as city employees

LINDEN — Police have released a sketch of the con man dressing up as a city employee in a plot to distract and rob elderly residents.

Linden and surrounding towns have reported more than a dozen of these crimes in the past two weeks, which police think are being perpetrated by a "gypsy-type group" of transients roaming and robbing across the country.

The latest crime took place on Oct. 10, the third in two weeks. The pictured suspect approached an 88-year-old resident on West Morris Avenue posing as a tax official — he wore a navy blue hat printed with "City of Linden Tax Department" — and saying he had to check the property line. While he distracted the man, one or more unidentified suspects ransacked the house, taking several thousand dollars in cash from the man's bedroom.

Authorities say this crime, and two similar ones in Linden, are likely connected to one group of suspects. Two incidents took place in the 6th Ward area near quick getaway routes in Route 1 and Linden Avenue. The other was on Dewitt Terrace, near the high school.

Linden Police Lt. James Sarnicki said a dozen similar incidents have been reported by police departments in the area.

He said these type of diversion burglaries are common in the Spring when elderly targets are out in the yard, but the nice weather this month has brought them back to "set up shop" in the area.

Band of gypsies

Police believe the dozen crimes in Linden and several neighboring towns are being perpetrated by one group of transient con artists.

Officials say these "gypsy-type crime groups" can be common. They will often set up a base at a hotel or similar temporary lodging and go out in teams to residential areas performing their scams.

Though investigators say they have identified multiple suspects, unless they catch them in the act, they are almost impossible to find.

"They're so transient that it is hard to locate them, they have no one residence," said Sarnicki. "They move around a lot in the state and country."

This particular group have been using clothing bearing the city's logo, usually going out in teams of two or three people. One man will distract the resident while the others allegedly break into the house, snatching whatever they can then signaling they are done on their two-way radios.

Sarnicki guessed there are several different teams connected to the con group based on the frequency of reports, but did not speculate on a figure. Avoiding being a victim

Police have several tips for residents to avoid being scammed by these suspects.

"We are warning residents, especially elderly residents they target, if you are not expecting visitors do not open your door," said Sarnicki. "If you do have contact with someone, make a phone call to the city agency or business to see if you can verify who they are."

Also said the suspects have been wearing t-shirts or hats emblazoned with a city, town or county logo to gain the confidence of their victims.

"Municipal officials have told me they will not come to your house to do a survey without first contacting the homeowner by phone," Sarnicki warned.

Police have also asked residents to call them at any sign of suspicious activity. Residents were also asked to look out for their elderly neighbors who are targets of the con men.

Noman is victim of Facebook scam

ROSELLE PARK - A local woman was bilked out of \$800 through a scam artist posing as a friend on the social networking site Face book, according to police.

A hacker allegedly stole into the Facebook account of a Roselle Park man and began by updating the account's status to say he was traveling abroad.

The scammer then allegedly sent out several e-mails and chatted with various "friends" connected to the Facebook account, circulating a story of being stranded in London and in need of cash to get home.

When the 48-year-old female resident, also from the borough, responded sympathetically, police say the hacker tricked her into wiring \$1,500 to London via Western Union.

"(The suspect posing as her friend) stated

England, claiming to have been robbed of his from any computer source, such as e-mail or wallet, cell phone, airline tickets and credit cards," said Roselle Park police Detective Sgt. Manuel Jimenez.

After the victim sent over more than \$800 cash, "she then received a second request via email requesting additional funds because the exchange rate made the original wire insufficient to secure plane tickets," Jimenez added. She then sent over an additional \$600.

Police said the hacker used the same e-mail address, only switching @aol.com for @operamail.com.

The unlucky 48-year-old Roselle Park resident reported the case of fraud on Oct. 18. She realized the incident was a scam when she textmessaged her friend and asked him about his ordeal. The man said he had no idea what she was talking about, and the two realized they had been duped. Authorities warned residents that he had been robbed at gunpoint in London, to beware of any types of requests for help

social networking site.

"Don't believe any type of request for help (from those sources) until you can verify it in person or phone by hearing your friend's voice," cautioned Jimenez.

He said online scams are becoming more common as hackers break into not only social networking sites, but also bank or business databases and Internet service providers.

The crime is likely to go unsolved, as police said choosing victims from another country makes finding the suspect extremely difficult.

According to statistics released by the FBI, nearly 3,200 accounts have been "hijacked" since 2006.

The Internet Crime Complaint Center, which works with the FBI on Internet security breaches, said they received 72,000 complaints of Internet fraud in 2008 with financial losses estimated at more than \$264.6 million.

LINDEN - A 55-year-old Linden resident was arrested last week after he was allegedly overheard telling a co-worker he was

plotting to shoot President Barack Obama, in town to campaign for Democrat Gov. Jon Corzine. John Brek, a

security guard at Newark Airport, was arrested on Oct. 21, one day after police

received anonymous complaints of someone who overheard Brek threatening Obama on Tuesday night at a coffee cart at the airport.

Essex County Prosecutor Paula Dow said Brek allegedly told a coworker that he cut a hole in the fence at the airport so he could shoot the president, whose plane was set to arrive in New Jersey the next day for a political rally at Fairleigh Dickinson University. Brek also allegedly simulated holding a rifle towards the direction of where the president would

Following his arrest, police searched his Linden home and found 43 guns and ammunition including hollow-point bullets.

Brek was charged with illegally owning the hollow-point bullets and having a stolen rifle, though the rest of the guns were legallyowned, according to Essex County prosecutors.

According to Dow, Brek was arraigned before Judge Amilkar Velez-Lopez in Essex County Court on Oct. 22. He faces charges of third degree making terroristic threats, third degree receiving stolen property and fourth degree possession of hollow point bullets.

He is still being held at Essex County Jail on \$220,000 bail and faces five years in jail, according to ECPO spokesman Paul Loriquet.

In published reports, Brek said he denied making any threatening comments, according to U.S. Secret Service spokesman Malcolm Wiley.

The investigation is being handled jointly by the United States Secret Service, Port Authority Police and the Essex County Prosecutor's Office.

Dow said Brek was not facing any Federal charges yet, but they could still be issued against him.

Voters to decide on referendum

SPRINGFIELD - A \$4.5 million referendum question that voters will encounter on the 2009 election ballot was the subject of a public presentation at Jonathon Dayton High School on Oct. 20.

The question concerns whether the township should undertake a project to upgrade the 46year-old public pool, which still has its original shell and suffers from issues including leaking pipes. The pool has experienced declining membership over the past 10 years,

Improvements would include expanded eating and recreation areas, as well as repair to existing amenities. Depth marking must also be altered to be more accurate.

Assistant Township Engineer Sam Mardini could not be reached for comment.

The plan would also entail the increase of non-resident fees while fees for residents remain the same. The current family rate for a resident is \$300.

In 2008 the committee commissioned Township Engineer Pennoni Associates to prepare the plan for \$25,000. The decision to put the subject to the public as a ballot question was made several months ago. If approved, work would not begin until after the 2010 summer season. Officials said the money for the project has been allotted specifically for this project and cannot be diverted to other causes.

About 40 residents attended the presentation. At the presentation, Recreation Director Michael Tennaro said the pool had 1,073 members in 1999 compared to 750 members at present.

"Ten years ago the facility was in better shape. Membership has decreased since then," he said.

Officials expressed their intention to win back the lost members largely through these upgrades. Residents took to the lectern to offer suggestions and ask questions, with most speakers expressing support for the plan.

Resident and president of the Springfield

understand why membership has fallen.

"It's just not worth it when the water is ice cold and I can just go to Summit as a guest for \$7," she said.

Cornelison said the proposed upgrades have the support of the Mom's Club.

Resident Brad Weinberger suggested expanding the slides at the pool closer to the scale of those seen at water parks, and expressed faith that the project would ultimately succeed in drawing new members.

"There's not much more I can say about it except, 'If you build it, they will come," Wineberger said.

One resident and pool member opposed putting the matter to a vote by the public because most of the public does not use the facility and will likely vote against the upgrades, overruling the pool's small group of dedicated users.

However, Frankel said the public should have a say in a potential expenditure of this magnitude.

Refinery could face \$92K in fines

By John O'Reilly Staff Writer LINDEN — Repeat violations and fatal dangers at ConocoPhillips' Bayway Refinery in Linden could lead to \$92,000 in

federal penalties. The U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration investigated the Linden refinery on April 23, and last week issued citations for three repeat violations, which could cost \$75,000, and four serious citations totaling \$17,000 in fines.

"The identified violations leave employees at the refinery at risk of accidents that could result in injury or possibly death," said OSHA's Avenel Office Director Patricia Jones.

Repeated violations included failure to implement safety, inspection and testing procedures, and failure to update piping and instrumentation diagrams after process chances, Jones said.

The Linden site had been cited

for similar violations within the past three years. Some of the serious health and


workplace safety violations included obstructed ladders and lack of safety guidelines to deal with containers of flammable liquids.

An OSHA news release said ConocoPhillips has deficiencies in it's process safety management program and the company knew, or should have known, that employees faced severe danger because of the violations.

Bayway Refinery employs 830 workers. Representatives at ConocoPhillips did not return calls seeking comment by press time Tuesday. According to reports, however, spokesman Bill Stephens said the company will meet with OSHA officials to review the violations.

The company has 15 days to officially comply, appeal or respond to the violations.



City Council rejects plans for \$5 billion PurGen plant

Linden residents voice safety concerns of 'clean coal' facility By John O'Reilly

LINDEN - Divisive plans to erect a "clean" coal plant on the Linden waterfront were voted down at the City Council meeting last week

At the Oct 20 meeting, councilmembers, in a 7 to 4 vote, nixed the proposal for a \$5 billion plant at the site of the former DuPont factory, elating environmentalists and dismaying local union workers seeking jobs.

Council President Robert Bunk voiced his opposition to the coal plant earlier in the week, saying it was not safe enough and the amount of jobs created were being exaggerated.

"There are just too many unanswered questions," Bunk said in a statement against the plant. "A project which only offers job growth some five years down the road when balanced against the immediate tax and environmental concerns fails at this point."

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The project, dubbed "PurGen" by Concord, Mass.-based developers SMS Energy LLC, would have used carbon capture and sequestration, capturing the carbon dioxide by-product from heated coal and their experimental project is a seri-

underwater pipes into underwater and will potentially endanger the caverns off the coast.

Several experts have claimed the new carbon sequestration is a safe way of getting energy and reducing pollution. Project representative for the company pushing PurGen was Bradley Campbell, an attorney and former Department of Environmental Protection commissioner.

He told critics pumping the CO2 gases into the ocean floor, where pressure would keep them trapped forever, could help reverse global warming.

Some residents were unconvinced, though, and said they did not want any more industrial pollution coming from the area, a sentiment echoed by critics on council.

Locals from the Tremley Point Alliance, The NJ Sierra Club, NJ Environmental Federation, and other groups, gathered to form the Arthur Kill Watershed Alliance, a coalition against the coal plant.

They countered that the supposed benefits and safety of this new technology were unproven.

"The concept of spending taxpayers' money to use the residents of Linden as guinea pigs to test transported it through 70 miles of ous environmental justice issue,

ocean's fish and wildlife as well," said Robert Spiegel, executive director of the Edison Wetlands Association. "This is a recipe for another Exxon-Valdez toxic catastrophe."

Others were skeptical about the real safety of the plant, citing a history of industrial pollution from the many factories in Linden.

"Our seniors are dying of cancer and asthma rates are increasing in school children, due to these chemical plants," said Linden activist Beatrice Bernzott, vice chairperson of the Tremley Point Alliance.


Linden labor union members were vocal in their support of the project, which they expected to create several new jobs during the plant's construction.

Union members and supporters on council said they were not troubled by the safety of the plant.

Councilman Jack Sheehy was supportive of the project, saying the chance to create new jobs for the city was crucial.

He said by voting against the plant, someone else would get the benefits.

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Debate focuses on development By Paul Greulich

ROSELLE PARK --- Four candidates competing for two seats on the Borough Council came out to debate their positions on property taxes, redevelopment, and other local issues at a debate hosted by the League of Women Voters on Oct. 21.

Republican Joe Accardi and Democrat Michael Peterson are competing for the 2nd Ward seat, while Democrat challenger David Jacobs is running against Republican incumbent Michael Yakubov for the 5th Ward seat. The meeting saw a low turnout from the public.

Candidates agreed on several issues, including the need to bring in new businesses to fill empty storefronts in the borough, though they differed on how best to attract such businesses.

Yakubov said officials should focus on attracting specific sorts of businesses that stand the best chance of thriving in the community.

Peterson insisted that the decline in business in Roselle Park predates the wider economic problems.

"We're bleeding businesses," Peterson said. "We have 20 empty storefronts, approximately.

Jacobs said the poor business environment, along with high taxes, are what spurred him to run for office.

"It's a good town, but I see it moving a little bit in the wrong direction," he said. "I want to bring it around to the right direction."

Another prominent topic was the Romerovski issue, with all candidates expressing dissatisfaction with the Payment In Lieu of Taxes program that the borough accepted, ending litigation with the Avalon development Bav company. Yakubov defended his vote in favor of the program, saying the entire governing body had been in a difficult position.

"If we'd continued in court we would've spent a million dollars in legal fees," Yakubov said. "Our taxes would've skyrocketed so fast we would've had to move in with each other."

mayor and council had shown better foresight and planning in earlier years.

"If the homework was done right beforehand, this never would have happened," Jacobs said.

Accardi said the borough is stuck with the Avalon Bay project and must make the most of it.

"I'm tired of the finger pointing," he said. "I'm tired of the rhetoric without offering solutions."

All candidates agreed that although shared services need to be pursued as a strategy to reduce the tax burden, the recently-aborted attempt at merging finance departments with the neighboring borough of Roselle was used as an example of why the borough must proceed with caution in this field.

"We need shared services, but at the same time you have to be careful what communities you share those services with," Péterson said.

The functioning and political makeup of the borough's evenly divided Republican and Democrat council was also the subject of disagreement.

Accardi and Yakubov said the council has proved capable of functioning in a cooperative, non-partisan manner, particularly when confronting important issues such as the Romerovski lawsuit and the budget. "We have worked in a bi-partisan manner to do the best for the community," Yakubov said.

Jacobs and Peterson said Democrat council members elected last year have helped change things for the better, but the borough is still feeling the effects of harmful oneparty rule.

"I think its time for Roselle Park to have a change of balance on the council," Peterson said. "You become complacent after a long time in office."

Peterson went on to state that he had been "derided" and shouted at by elected officials in the past when he commented at meetings.

"What I want to see is everyone be respected by this council, regardless who gets elected," he said.





Taking a good look at the numbers

Violence declines in the schools Late last week an announcement from the State Department of Education pointed to incidents of violence falling by 5 percent in the state's schools. State Education Commissioner Lucille Davy called the data "encouraging."

In Union County, the breakdown is interesting. The four categories broken down are violence, vandalism, weapons and substances.


Numbers are open to difference of opinion and this report is no different. For example, Rahway had three reported incidents of weapons possession while Roselle had zero. One surprising number - Roselle Park had 31 incidents of violence while having a relatively small enrollment of 2,000.

As another comparison Clark with an enrollment of 2,300 had 20 incidents of violence while Cranford with 3,700 students had only six. Of course, Cranford has a history of graduating top students who go on to successful careers.

Judging the judges

The New Jersey Law Journal has released its annual survey of lawyers rating the judges. As one lawyer said, "I don't put a lot of stock in the numbers, still it is kind of fun to see how the Union County judges are rated."

The survey deals with nine different categories running the gam-

OP ED Ilya, PurGen, other Linden lore

The adventures of Ilya, a Miami-based manatee that has travelled the eastern seaboard for months, has delighted hundreds of people that have witnessed him passing by.

Unknown to wander such great distances, the manatee navigated northward along the coast of New Jersey and swam into the Arthur Kill as if on a mission. By Friday, Oct. 16 it appeared that his luck was running out; the manatee was huddling for warm water near an outfall along a shallow creek in the city of Linden. Apparently, manatees cannot withstand water temperatures below 68 degrees. With water temperatures in the Arthur Kill dipping into the low 60s, hypothermia could set in.

Scientists were feeding him heads of lettuce when a major storm system pummeled New Jersey. Plans to rescue him are on hold for now before he disappeared altogether.

Meanwhile, a major fight is taking shape in the city of Linden. SCS, a private company wants to build a five hundred megawatt, coal-fueled, carbon sequestration plant that would generate 10 million tons of CO2 emissions that will be piped to a point in the Atlantic Ocean and buried 2,200 yards below on the ocean floor.

The 100-mile underwater pipe would take the emissions out of Linden, out of our sight and conveniently, out of our mind. Practically every prominent statewide environmental group is angling to fight the proposal blinded by their collective hatred for coal.

Both Ilya and PurGen have come to the city of Linden at a propitious time where the natural environment refuses to die. For decades, the city of Linden enjoyed, and in turn, supported heavy industry, manufacturing, refineries and large warehouses

that dotted the Rahway River and Arthur Kill shorelines.

The tidal wetlands and lazy creeks of the Arthur Kill and the Rahway River have been polluted, rerouted, culverted and filled to accommodate man's footprint for centuries. The highest point south of the Palisades, the Hawkrise Landfill stands today as a monument to the excesses of dumping on the Rahway River's wetlands. Still, nature endures.

In 1992, the New Jersey Conservation Foundation published the "Greenways to the Arthur Kill" as a public policy guide to educate local leaders and planners that the Arthur Kill watershed, despite centuries of pollution, overdevelopment and loss of wildlife habitat, still offers opportunity for open space preservation and protection of natural resources.

Snowy egrets and many species of herons still nest on islands of the New York Bight, consistently rely upon the remaining tidal wetlands and creeks for food.

Migrating shorebirds stop over the local mudflats in search of aquatic insects and crustaceans. Fiddler crabs persist in the spartinafilled wetlands. Local populations of NJ endangered and threatened species continue to breed in the area, including yellow crowned night heron, black crowned night heron and northern harrier. Even more remarkable, the osprey or fish hawk now can be seen feeding along the Rahway River with their young, thanks to a nest recently discovered on wood pilings in nearby Staten Island. This entire area is the last "Priority Site" as described in the "Greenways to the Arthur Kill" deserving of preservation owing to the outstanding suite of species that are still hanging on here. Within this Priority Site, one finds the innocuously described DuPont Brownfield site which is the location for the proposed PurGen Plant, is a mosaic of tidal wetlands, shrub/scrub habitat, filled wetlands and old roads and foundations.

Lost upon the advocates is the fact that many of the aforementioned wildlife linger on the DuPont property. But dirty coal is the dragon to be slain.

For the Rahway River Association, taking back the River and the Arthur Kill for Man and nature is the ultimate goal. With the Rahway River Greenway Plan being implemented in the city of Rahway, the Hawkrise Sanctuary set aside for preservation in the city of Linden, there is hope for a future where the shores of the Arthur Kill can greet the Rahway River as a network of passive trails, nature preserves and parks for the benefit of all. For the residents of Linden it means embracing its own Hudson River Walkway and breaking down the walls that prevent access to the water. And, maybe just maybe, Ilya's mission will not have been for nought.

Let us hope that the next time a manatee comes from Miami, we will greet him with the collective awe and wonderment of hundreds of spectators — plus heads of lettuce — lining along an elevated trail in the city if Linden instead of dying alone amid the steely landscape of pipes and tanks that dot its shoreline.



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



Haunting tales told in county

(Continued from Page 1) Township historian Michael Yesenko said the tale began on June 7, 1780. During the Battle of Connecticut Farms, Hessian mercenaries and British redcoats were dragged into guerrilla warfare in the woodlands around Union. Their bodies at least the ones that were ever found — had to be recovered and buried by continental soldiers as the rest of the invading armies fled.

One such retreating troop off Jaegers (Hessian sharpshooters) tried to make for the Caldwell Parsonage, then home to Presbyterian Minister and patriot James Caldwell and his wife, Hannah. As the soldiers approached the home in the darkness, one of the Caldwell children saw the shadowy figures approaching in the distance. As Hannah looked out the window to see, the soldiers fired: she was shot in the chest and killed.

Later that night, those same soldiers went to Liberty Hall on Morris Avenue, then the home of Jersey governor William Livingston. According to the diary of a British soldier, jumpy and superstitious Hessians walked into the dark building and ran into the governor's daughter Catherine, wearing a long white robe and carrying a flickering candle. They immediately feared it was the ghost of Hannah Caldwell and fled the site.

But several close encounters of the creepy kind have occurred up to present day, making one wonder of Hannah really does roam the area looking to torment her murders.

Tracking the Headless Hessian

Anyone who has ever been thrilled and chilled by the tale of a headless phantom that was once a British soldier prowling the countryside in search of his head might do well to visit the fields of Clark's Oak Ridge Park, where American writer and historian Washington Irving may have drew his inspiration for his famed short story "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow."

According to town historian and Councilman Brian Toal, the grounds are said to be haunted by the spirit of a Hessian mercenary, one of many employed by the British during the American Revolution. More than a few of these fierce warriors never returned home, including one who saw action during the Battle of Ash Swamp in Clark on June 26, 1776.

According to Toal, when fighting broke out at what is now Oak Ridge Park, one soldier forced his way into the Homestead Farmhouse, then known as the Browne Estate. Encountering a girl cooking dinner for the family, the Hess-

ian attempted to have his way with her. However, he was interrupted by the girl's father, who shot the invader with a musket.

"His shot removed the Hessian's head and of course splattered his daughter's clothing with Hessian brains," Toal said.

Much later, people would report seeing glimpses not only a presumably traumatized maiden but of the Hessian himself. Occasional sightings of the figure of a decapitated man wandering the grounds at Oak Ridge in search of his head have persisted to the present day.

An unsolved mystery

Springfield may be known for it's suburban peace, but, surprisingly, the township's history is fraught with tragedy and terror.

One such sad story is the 1972 death of Jeannette DePalma, then a 16-year-old junior at Jonathan Dayton High School.

Though a cause of death was never determined, the case set off a firestorm of speculation over how she died, most recently in a Weird N.J. magazine article — whether it was suicide, drug overdose or murder. The teen disappeared on Aug. 7 after leaving her home to visit a friend. Six weeks later, a dog was found outside of the then-abandoned Houdaille Quarry carrying a human arm. DePalma's partial remains were found on Sept. 19 in the quarry.

A 1972 newspaper article that was published during the hysteria following the body's discovery had a quote from the girl's pastor, the Rev. James L. Tate, saying wooden crosses were arranged around the body and broken branches and logs were placed "in a manner that would have indicated occult symbolism, and perhaps a human sacrifice." Newspapers at the time also publicized his theory that it was a murder by a satanic cult.

That theory has never been proven, and no police reports at the time could be found. Several Springfield Police Department files from that time were damaged in 1995 during Hurricane Floyd.

Whatever the circumstances, the suspicious Springfield death still fifes locals' imaginations more than 30 years later. HAIRCUTTING

Three Democrats, two Republicans and two independents all running for three open seats on the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders gathered in Cranford on Oct. 22^t for a spirited debate on the issues facing county residents.

Incumbent Democrats Al Mirabella and Deborah Scanlon are joined this year by new candidate Mohammed Jalloh, a lawyer and Roselle resident. Freeholder Chester Holmes has opted not to run again this year.

Republicans Nicole Cole and Anthony Sytko posed the stiffest opposition to the Democrats, who have maintained a 9-0 majority on the board for nearly 15 years.

Independent candidates Hope Thompson and Karen Gielen also joined the fray, announcing themselves as political newcomers who hope to give a voice to residents suffering from lack of health care facilities and transportation in western Union County.

Mirabella said the consolidation of the county's golf courses has saved money, while the use of Kemper Sports, a golf management company, to run the courses at Galloping Hill and Ash Brook with involvement from the county makes the golfers better off than they were previously.

Sytko said the use of both government and private management for these facilities was a duplication of services and represented "the worst of both worlds."

Cole questioned Mirabella's assertion that the county's golfers are better off, particularly senior citizens who relied on Oak Ridge because of its gentle grade. She said the golfers are angry, pointing out that rallies aimed at reversing the closure continue to take place.

Jalloh said the conversion of Oak Ridge allowed it to serve wider range of uses and audiences.

"Residents will have an opportunity to do a lot more on that property than they previously did," Jalloh said

Parks Master Plan updated with public input

The Union County Parks Master Plan is seeing its first update since 1999 with help from the pub-

The county has hired Eatontown-based Birdsall Services Group to prepare the new plan for a cost of \$212,000. Public feedback will be incorporated into the process through a questionnaire ranking priorities for the county parks system.

Residents can voice their views as to whether parks should be left in their natural state or developed with recreational facilities, and whether it is more important to preserve land along scenic roadways or historical sites.

The questionnaire also asks residents whether there are any local properties they think the county should consider acquiring and preserving. More generally, residents are asked whether the county has gone far enough in acquiring open space, or whether it should still pursue other opportunities to preserve open space.

County officials expect strong opinions on the subject of Oak Ridge Park, which was converted from a golf course last spring amid public outcry.

Freeholder Deborah Scanlon said there are many possibilities for this new park.

"This may well be the most exciting aspect of

the master plan because we are starting with such not been scheduled. large open spaces at Oak Ridge," Scanlon said.

One persistent piece of advice already received on the subject has been to turn the park back into a" golf course. A rally supporting this course of action was held Oct. 25 at the park.

Kathy Torpey, a member of the Save Oak ridge Committee, said she hopes the rally will make people aware of the freeholders' needless use of open space monies she feels would be better used to dredge rivers and reservoirs.

As for the future of Oak Ridge Park, Torpey said the wishes of golfers, particularly seniors, have not changed.

"We are hoping it will be converted back into a golf course," she said.

County officials said this is not an option that will be pursued as part of the master plan.

"We're past the point of re-opening the golf course," said Freeholder Chairman Alexander Mirabella.

Mirabella said possible options that can be explored include the use of ice skating rinks, bicycle paths and other amenities that could draw the public to the new park.

Once the plan is drafted, there will be public hearings where residents will be permitted to appear before the freeholders. Dates for those hearings have

"As large as the county park system is, there are many diverse opinions as to how it should be used," said Freeholder Bette Jane Kowalski. "Parks evolve with the times, and needs change. Residents can help improve the parks by lefting us know how those needs are being addressed."

The parks system has more than tripled in size since its inception in the 1920s. The 6,600-acre Union County park system stretches from Mattano Park in Elizabeth west to Cedar Brook Park in Plainfield; from Milton Lake Park in Rahway north to the Passaic River Parkway in Summit. The most recent acquisitions and improvements have been made possible through the Union County Open Space, Recreation, and Historic Preservation Trust Fund, established by public referendum in 2000.

The Union County parks system was designed by the Olmsted Brothers landscape architectural firm. The Olmsted Brothers' plan called for larger parks as well as an integrated system of narrow riverside greenways leading to open fields, lakes, conservation areas, and recreation areas. The new plan is expected to be completed by spring of next year.


"It was nice to see such a high turnout," she said.

'Grapes of Wrath' shows true desperation

Producing a play at any time is a costly proposition, but putting on "The Grapes of Wrath" - given its large cast and complex special effects — is especially dicey in the current economic climate. As Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey's Artistic Director Bonnie J. Monte said on opening night, however, this is the right play for the right time. Was she ever right!

Using Frank Galati's 1990 Tony Award-winning adaptation of John Steinbeck's epic, iconic novel about the plight of the Okies during the Great Depression — a script that Jack Moran as the young Romeo, Al beautifully retains some of the novel's Joad. most stirring passages - Director Joe Discher has fashioned a riveting tale of the Joad family, who, literally pushed off their farmland by the bank and a terrible drought, travel west to California in search of jobs. Along the way, they struggle to hold on to their family, their dignity and their humanity in the face of great physical and societal odds.

While the uniformly excellent cast will remind you of the 1940s film version, which Bosley Crowther called "one of the best movies ever made," each actor manages to put his or her own stamp on the role.

low key as Tom Joad, recently released from prison, who arrives home in the nick of time to join his family on their journey. His anger simmers just beneath the surface, bubbles up only to be controlled as he tells his mother that wherever people are downtrodden, "I'll be there." He has truly found his calling.

Jim Casy is powerful in his doubt, with his wild eyes and calling up of the human - instead of the holy spirit.

As Pa Joad, John Little's hope is palpable and heartbreaking in the face of the duplicity he faces at the hands appropriate atmosphere. of the California employment agents.

And Wendy Barrie-Wilson's Ma is the backbone of the family, as she is of the entire book, whether it be her eyes lighting up at the sight of her firstborn or maintaining her equanimity in the face of death and abandonment to intone the words, "We're the people; we keep goin' on."

Other standouts include James Michael Riley in several roles, most notably the lonely, slightly loony Muley Graves, Floyd Knowles and the Man in the Barn; Jim Mohr as randy, raucous Grampa; James Patrick Earley as the haunted Uncle John; and

As the pregnant Rose of Sharon, Susan Maris combines the brightness and hope of the newlywed mother-tobe with, at the end, the gravitas to know just what she must do to save another human being.

Steinbeck's interchapters, the ones that chronicle the experiences of the migrants-at-large, are beautifully rendered by Michael Daly, Jay Leibowitz, Nick Plakias, Elizabeth Hess and Kate Ivins as a series of narrators and musicians playing original music on guitar and jew's harp composed by Plakias.

Set designer Marion Williams has Christian Conn is steadfast and used what is essentially a bare stage to represent various stops on the 2.000mile journey from Arkansas to California, with the addition of a few boxes, some tents, a terrific jalopy that's pushed around the stage and some spectacular special effects whose surprise I don't want to spoil. Suffice it to say, you'll be wowed.

Maggie Dick's costumes speak to Pearce Bunting's fallen preacher the period and situation, except that some characters' clothes stay a bit too crisp and clean to suggest a long journey without access to laundry and bath facilities

One might be inclined to dismiss the connection between the plight of sharecroppers such as the Joads and of those who face foreclosure on homes they purchased but could not afford. The banks may not be bulldozing houses today, but the mortgage holders are just as elusive in 2009 as they were 70 years ago. Most folks are, as Tom Joad put it, "putting one foot in front of another" as they struggle to maintain their dignity and feed their families.

A tale, unfortunately, for all seasons, "The Grapes of Wrath" at the Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey is a sobering lesson that "the more things change, the more they stay the same." If it's been a long time since you read the novel or if you have a teenager in high school or college who is reading it, get on over to the F.M. Kirby Main Stage Theatre on the campus of Drew University in Madison to refresh your memory.







While Union and Summit are on their way to capturing the top seeds in North 2, Group 4 and North 2, Group 2, a couple of Group 1 schools could climb up the ladder in their sections with big wins this Saturday.

Dayton (6-1) hosts Bourd Brook (3-4) at Scotch Plains at 1 p.m., with the Bulldogs seeking to finish among the top three seeds. Dayton is presently fourth in the power points standings in North 2.

More importantly, the Bulldogs have qualified in North 2, Group 1 for the very first time and will be in the playoffs for only the fourth time overall and first time since 1988.

Dayton was 0-10 in 2000 and then dropped football for the next four seasons (2001-2004).

A junior varsity team returned in 2005, with the Bulldogs going 3-5-1. A varsity team for the first time in six years was produced in 2006, with Dayton going 0-10 again. The 2007 team finally won, but finished 1-9.

Last year's squad made great strides and finished 5-5, including four shutout victories.

On Saturday at New Providence, the Bulldogs came back in the second half to defeat a 4-1 New Providence team 18-7, snapping the Pioneers' four-game winning streak.

Dayton won its sixth game for the first time since its last winning season of 6-4 in 1999.

The Bulldogs might have beaten the Pioneers for the first time as well, nobody knows. It was a special win for

Dayton, considering all the program has been through in the last 10 years.

"A lot of hard work went into this and we are not done yet," head coach Joe Goerge said.

Goerge has been with the program since the new beginning in 2005 and with the help of assistant coach Bob Martin, the Bulldogs are a viäble team capable of beating whomever they play.

"The kids are now seeing the fruits of their labor, which is nice," Goerge said.

Should Brearley (6-1) win at Roselle (2-4) Saturday at Arminio Field, the Bears could finish among the top three seeds in Central Jersey. Brearley has won four straight and is in CJ, G1 for the first time since 2005.

Bulldogs reach goal of qualifying for playoffs Dayton football in for first time since 1988

NEW PROVIDENCE – When you're prepared and you come to play football, good things happen.

John Hoehn was prepared and came to play. Jonathan Wortman was prepared and came to play Kevin O'Connor was prepared and came to play. Chris Maslo was prepared and came to play.

Anthony Cioffi was prepared and came to play.

The rest of their Dayton teammates were also prepared and also came to play as you win as a team in this sport, just like you lose as a team.

These days, Dayton is doing the winning for a change.

On Saturday afternoon amidst the rain, thunder and even lightning that stopped play for 30 minutes during halftime at Lieder Field, the Bulldogs proved themselves once again as they came back in the second half to defeat host New Providence 18-7 in a Mid-State 39 Conference-Union Division game.

Dayton scored single touchdowns in each of the last three quarters, played outstanding on defense – especially in the second half – and might have beaten New Providence for the very first time – nobody knows for sure.

One thing for sure is that the Bulldogs clinched their first state playoff berth in 21 years by beating New Providence.

Dayton will be part of the field in North 2, Group 1 for the very first time.

You can bet the Bulldogs are excited.

The only other years Dayton qualified were 1981, 1984 and 1988 – all in North 2, Group 2. Dayton has a 1-3 playoff record and won its very first playoff game in 1981, which is the only year the Bulldogs reached a playoff championship game.

The last time Dayton reached the playoffs was when the Bulldogs began the 1988 season 8-0 under the late head coach John LeDonne.

Three more things are for sure – Dayton clinched its first winning season since 1999, won six games for the first time since 1999 and will host Brearley Nov. 7 at 1 p.m. at Union with the Union Division title on the line.

Dayton was also last a conference champion in 1988 when the Bulldogs captured the Mountain Valley Conference-Mountain Division title that season.

The last time Dayton defeated Brearley was its last game of 1999, which was an 18-15 win in Springfield. That victory clinched Dayton's last winning season before this year and was the last time Dayton won six games until today - Saturday, Oct. 24, 2009.

Dayton won its second straight to improve to 6-1 and will host Bound Brook (3-4) this Saturday at 1 p.m. at Scotch Plains according to the Dayton schedule on www.highschoolsports.com.

Bound Brook was defeated at Belvidere 34-0 last Friday night.

Dayton is one score away from being 7-0. The Bulldogs lost at Belvidere 18-13 two weeks ago after leading 13-12 in the fourth quarter of a game that featured both teams 4-0 at the time.

Grandal, D'Antico spark **Cranford past Westfield** Girls' soccer out for 1st UCT title since 2000

If you're going to lose to an opponent it's much better to suffer the defeat in a regular season game than in one that has much more on the line.

The Cranford girls' soccer team lost at home to Westfield 6-0 back on Sept. 17.

The two met again Sunday night in the second Union County Tournament semifinal at Johnson, with a trip to the championship game on the line.

Cranford had not lost since, while Westfield ranked No. 3 in the state by The Star-Ledger - was unbeaten. Both teams also had 0-0 ties on their resumes, including Cranford at Montclair in its seasonopener Sept. 12 and Westfield at Union on Oct. 7 after an 8-0 start.

After 80 minutes of regulation play and two more 10-minute sudden overtime periods, Cranford still had not scored against Westfield. However, this time Westfield failed to score against Cranford as well.

That meant the game was going to be decided on penalty kicks, with each team getting five. It the score of the kicks was tied after five rounds, sudden death rounds would ensue. 1

The penalty kick shootout was tied 3-3 after the required five rounds, with Westfield stepping up for its sixth attempt.

Cranford senior goalkeeper Lauren Grandal was up to the challenge as she saved the shot.

Next stepped up senior Taylor D'Antico for the Cougars. She fired a shot into the goal that not only knocked out favored Westfield, but put Cranford in the final for the first time in five years.

Cranford won the match 1-0 after winning the penalty kick shootout 4-3 in six rounds.

The Cranford and Westfield records after the match were identical at 15-1-1.

Wow! What a win for Cranford, especially after losing to the same team by a 6-0 count more than a month ago.

That might never have happened in UCT play before, as far as one team beating its opponent after losing to the same squad so decisively in the same season.

Fifth-seeded Cranford, behind two other UCT shutouts by Grandal, blanked 12th-seeded Kent Place 4-0 at home on Oct. 10 in the first round and then went to fourth-seeded Union on Oct. 17 and upset the home team Farmers 3-0.

Grandal has three shutouts and has not allowed a goal in three UCT contests so far.

She played well in Cranford's 2-0 loss to Scotch Plains in last year's semifinals at JOhnson.

Cranford will tangle with second-seeded and fourtime defending champion Scotch Plains in this Saturday's 7 p.m. at Johnson's Nolan Field in Clark.

D'Antico, Sarah Dowzycki and Victoria Labrutto scored in the win over Union, while Grandal made seven saves.

Natalie Englese, Michelle Gargiulo, Julianne Salerno and Jamie Webb scored in the triumph over Kent Place.

Guided by head coach Jennifer Michewicz, there's no reason to believe that the Cougars can't knock off Scotch Plains this weekend after losing to the Raiders

last year. After all, Cranford defeated Westfield after losing to the Blue Devils earlier this year. Paige DellaBadia had big shoes to fill as the new

goalkeeper for the Scotch Plains girls' soccer team. Jackie Law, who graduated this June, helped lead

Scotch Plains to their first four championships the last four seasons. DellaBadia then had to overcome a midseason injury when she dove for the ball in a 2-1 home win over Monroe on Oct. 3.

DellaBadia returned to the lineup and has been nothing short of impressive, especially in UCT play.

Sunday night at Johnson, DellaBadia saved the day for the second-seeded Raiders, especially in the second half when they were outplayed by third-seeded and undefeated New Providence.

DellaBadia made four quality saves in the final 40 minutes on New Providence shots targeted for the goal.

DellaBadia's outstanding performance was the reason Scotch Plains was able to hang on and defeat New Providence 1-0 in the night's first UCT semifinal.

"I was nervous, but I was excited, so my adrenalin was pumping," DellaBadia said. "I just knew that I had to be on my feet and be ready for every ball that came to me."

Scotch Plains won its 11th straight to improve to 13-1-1. The Raiders opened with a 0-0 tie at Pingry and their only loss was 2-1 at home to Westfield Sept. 23.

New Providence, which received a four-save effort from goalie Connie Haggerty, fell to 15-1.

Just like the previous Saturday at home against seventh-seeded Johnson in the quarterfinals, it was a firsthalf goal scored by sophomore forward Sarah Van Buskirk that proved to be the game-winner. This time - after it was first reported that there was no assist on the goal - an assist went to Avika Shah.

DellaBadia, who finished with five saves total, made three outstanding saves in a four-minute span early in the second half. With 36 minutes left she made a fine save on a through ball in the penalty box and then three minutes later was positioned perfectly to smother a close-range, point-blank shot taken right in front of her.

"That was a quick play and I think she slid it in with a real quick shot and I had to react quickly," DellaBadia said of the save she made on the close-range, pointblank shot. "I'm lucky she didn't go too far to the right or left or it could have been more dangerous. Luckily, it came right at me, so it was easy to smother."

Just one minute after that she dove to her right to thwart another tough shot headed for the goal.

Perhaps her best save of the night came with just 3:20 left. A hard and low New Providence shot was saved by DellaBadia when she dove - full body - to her left and punched the ball away with both hands.

"I saw her on the outside of the 18 and wasn't expecting a shot at all because she had room to dribble in," DellaBadia said. "When she took it, it was a pretty decent pace shot, so I knew I had to get there as quick as I could and it ended up as a corner kick, but I stopped it from going in."

Scotch Plains has outscored its three UCT foes 8-0. DellaBadia was steady against Johnson last Saturday and spectacular against New Providence Sunday night.

"This is really exciting that we've been able to come this far," Della Badia said. "Our defense is really strong, so I'm confident in them.

"I know that they are there for me, so I have to be there for them."

Scotch Plains will be seeking its fifth overall championship and fifth straight, while Cranford will be out to win its second title and first since 2000. Cranford was last in the championship game in 2004 when it

bowed to Governor Livingston 1-0. "We just want to keep playing hard and take it one day at a time," Ewing said.

Scotch Plains and Cranford have not played each other this season.

New Providence had a four-game winning streak snapped and is now 4-2. The Pioneers will host Hillside (3-4) this Saturday at 1 p.m. at Lieder Field.

Dayton football has come a long way – to say the least. After the program's first 0-10 season in 2000 – which followed a decade of almost a new head coach every season – there were no players, or not enough.

So first, there were no wins and then second, there were no players.

Third, there was no team. Fourth, there was no football program at all for four seasons from 2001 through 2004, with several Dayton students going to play for Brearley in Kenilworth during that span.

Joe Goerge, who previously coached at Franklin, came on the scene and along with longtime assistant Bob Martin, the pieces were starting to be put in place.

But there were growing pains and plenty of them. A junior varsity team was produced in 2005 and a sustainable 3-5-1 record ensued.

Varsity came back in 2006, but also another 0-10 record. Then the Bulldogs were able to play at Meisel Field

in Springfield again in 2007 and managed to beat Manville there for the program's first varsity win since the victory over Brearley that ended the 1999 season.

Dayton did not win another game in 2007 and then lost Meisel Field again for good right before the 2008 campaign started. However, the Bulldogs began last year with three straight shutout victories and finished with four, total, in a 5-5 non-losing campaign.

That set the stage for this year, with Dayton using Union's Cooke Memorial Field as its home field for the second straight season. Seven games in so far and the Bulldogs are legit.

New Providence carried the ball 24 times for 105 yards in the first half, including 38 on its first drive that stalled at the Dayton 25. Senior fullback Dan Barletta led the way with 59 yards on 11 carries in the first half and had to be stopped in the third and fourth quarters if Dayton was going to come away with a victory.

Dayton held New Providence to three plays and a punt to start the second half and then drove down the field for the game-winning touchdown.

Barletta was held to just four yards on seven carries in the second half and the Pioneers to only 25 on 14.

"We just had to step it up because they were running the ball hard on us," said Dayton junior linebacker Chris Maslo, who was in on several key tackles in the second half, including a solo one of Barletta for exactly no gain on a fourth-and-one from the Dayton 34 with 7:44 left and counting.

"Our defense decided to step it up, stick them at the line and hold them," Maslo said.

After a scoreless first quarter, a five-play sequence defined the second quarter. After Barletta ran for no gain on first down and then for five yards on second to give New Providence a third-and-five at its own 29, senior quarterback Eddie Morgan rolled right and then threw an errant pass that was picked off by Dayton junior linebacker Aaron Williams.

On the very next play and on his first carry of the game freshman running back Anthony Cioffi ran around right end and down the sideline for a 28-yard touchdown run, giving Dayton a 6-0 lead.

Then New Providence junior Vinny Fuschetto returned the ensuing kickoff 85 yards right up the middle for a game-tying touchdown. Lefty kicking senior placekicker Nick Fuentes made the extra point to give his team its only lead at 7-6, which remained the score at intermission.

Both Fuentes and Dayton senior DJ DiProfio did an *excellent job of punting, both landing kicks inside the opposition's one-yard line.

DiProfio punted five times for a 41-yard average and Fuentes three times for a 37-yard average in the first half.

New Providence's first three plays on its first possession of the second half were Dayton senior lineman Jonathan Wortman stopping Barletta for a two-yard loss and then junior lineman Alfonso Cacciatore making a tackle of Fuschetto on only a two-yard gain. Morgan then managed just one yard after being tackled by junior lineman Kareem Jackson.

This was a game where the entire Dayton defense just swarmed to the ball-carrier and got there much quicker and with a lot more muscle in the second half.

Dayton then began its first drive of the second half on its own 36 with senior quarterback John Hoehn running for four yards on first down.

After consecutive Dayton penalties – one off sides and the other holding – Hoehn found room up the middle for a 19-yard gain on second-and 22. He then ran for two more yards to give Dayton fourth-and-inches from its own 45.

Dayton called a timeout with 7:21 left in the quarter to discuss the play.

"I would never have gone for it there on fourth down, but felt that this was the time to do so," said Goerge, in his fifth year as a Dayton coach and fourth of the Dayton varsity team.

Hoehn faked a hand off and then gained 13 yards on an option play, running up the middle while carrying New Providence defensive players on his back who could not initially bring him down.

Senior running back Kevin O'Connor then gained 17 more yards up the middle to give the Bulldogs a first-and-10 at the Pioneer 25.

Hoehn gained four more yards and then junior running back Jesse Bell carried for 10 to give Dayton another first down at the New Providence 11.

After a one-yard run by Hoehn and then a five-yard loss by him on a combined tackle by Morgan and junior Richard Nelson, Dayton was faced with a thirdand-14 from the New Providence 15.

This time Hoehn rolled right, found O'Connor open and then O'Connor just took the momentum of the reception and ran with the ball into the right corner of the end zone for what would turn out to be the gamewinning score.

Dayton now led 12-7 and was in control.

"Kevin is a monster, he's just a great player," Goerge said.

O'Connor capped Dayton's last drive with a threeyard touchdown run. Earlier during the march, Cioffi had consecutive eight-yard gains on the right side of the field.

"We said at halftime that there was no way this was going to slip through our fingers," Hoehn said.

"We knew we had to stop them at the start of the second half. We put it to them and we knew it was coming.

"Then we took the ball and we just drove down the field." Hoehn is part of a special senior class that has been through so much going back to the beginning.


"We earned a lot of respect today," Hoehn said. "We came into their place and they're a great team. New Providence has always been a great team. They're great this year. They lost to two tough teams (Brearley being the other).

"We knew what we had to do and we earned some respect today, doing what we had to do."

"This was four years in the coming and I give my credit to those 10 seniors," Goerge said.

Those Dayton seniors – 11 actually listed on the roster – that Goerge talks about are Marquay Mayo, John Hoehn, Josh Kest, DJ DiProfio, Kevin O'Connor, Jonathan Wortman, Jake Saladino, Ketih Heleno, Eric Sion, Steven Cohen and Dan DuBeau, who was out with an injury.

"They stuck it out for four years and remember that four years ago it was 48-0 here at the half," Goerge said.

Winning a sectional championship for the first time last year in a special 20-win season - and also winning that title at home - was most satisfying for the Johnson field hockey program, which is one of the best and most respected in North Jersey year in and year out.

However, the Crusaders dreamed about finally beating Oak Knoll to capture its first Union County Tournament crown.

Johnson went 0-12-1 for five years against Oak Knoll before finally beating the Royals in a regular season game on Oct. 31, 2005.




TOWNSHIP OF UNION VEHICLE AUCTION
