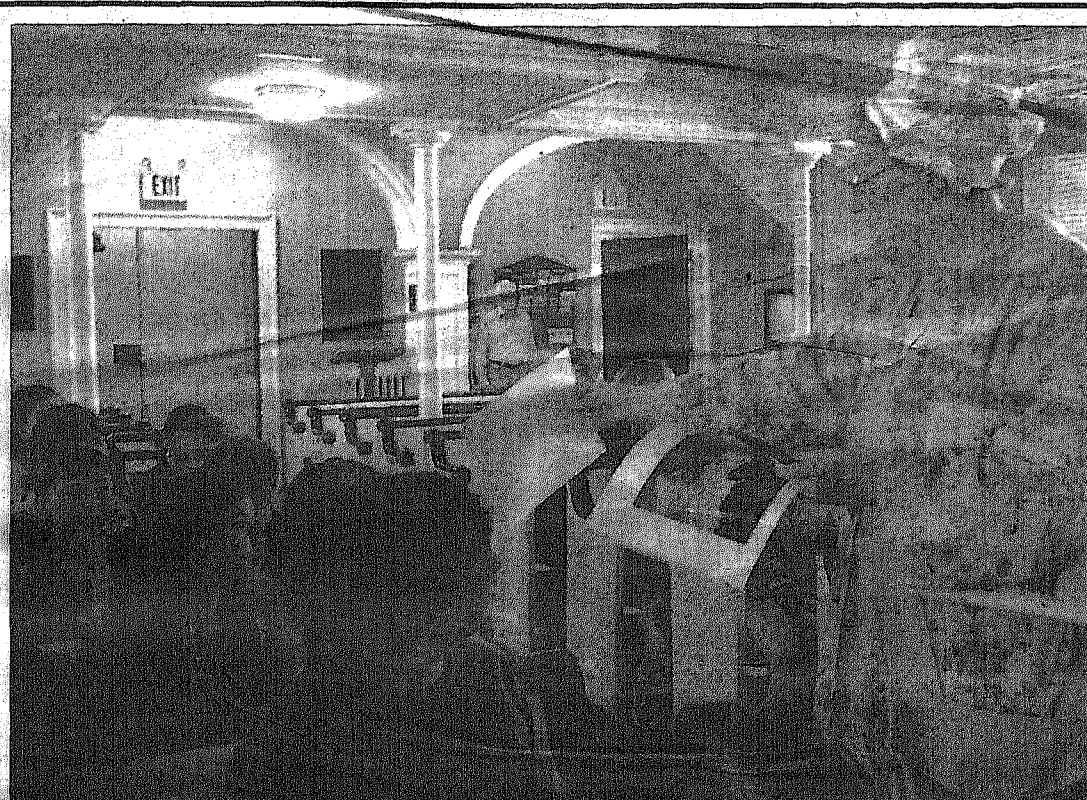

Ballot set for Nov. 2

Primary elections around Union County were marked by significant intraparty Democrat opposition, with challengers known as "Democrats for Change" scoring some upsets in Linden and Roselle that will allow them representation in the general election. Voter turnout was generally low.

County Freeholders

Democrat candidates swept the contested primary election, with newcomer Linda Carter earning 12,962 votes and incumbents Daniel P. Sullivan and Bette Jane Kowalski earning 12,509 and 12,315 votes respectively.

They will go head to head in November against Republican challengers Ellen K. Dickson, Brian T. Flanagan and Elyse Bochicchio Medved.

County Clerk

In the hotly contested county clerk race, Joanne Rajoppi, a 27-year incumbent, faced off against Democrats for Change candidate Lisa McCormick, keeping her position on the ballot for November. The final vote tally was 12,761 for Rajoppi and 10,259 for McCormick. Rajoppi will face Arthur T. Zaplonski in November.

County Sheriff

Incumbent Democrat Sheriff Ralph Froehlich, who has maintained his seat for 33 years, defeated Democrats for Change candidate Charles Mitchell Sr. with 12,761 votes to 11,364. In the fall, Froehlich will go up against Republican challenger Peter B. Lijoi in the general election.

Mayor: RVSA board 'liars or incompetent'

The following story is the third in a series examining the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority:

Elected officials who have battled Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority for several years were not surprised to hear the \$30 million cogeneration plant may be worth only salvage.

"Surprised? Not at all," said Clark Mayor Sal Bonaccorso, who, along with Rahway Mayor James Kennedy and Woodbridge

Mayor John McCormac, formed a Mayors Independent Financial Oversight Committee last fall to audit RVSA's 2010 budget.

However, RVSA dismissed the move, approving the 2010 budget before it could be reviewed.

Bonaccorso placed all blame on the board, which is comprised of representatives from each of the 11 towns served by RVSA. RVSA serves more than 300,000 residents and 3,500 industrial and commercial customers in Union and Middlesex Counties.

"I told them all it would never open," the

Clark mayor said, adding his opinion of the RVSA board.

"The problem is they are all either liars or terribly incompetent," Bonaccorso said, concerned for residents of all the 11 towns footing the bill for the cogen plant.

"The rate-payers are getting ripped off," he added, "I feel sorry for them."

Many officials were not aware that RVSA had requested and paid Cipolla & Co., a certified public accounting and litigation firm that provides damage analysis, to look into what went wrong before, during and after the

\$30 million inoperable cogen plant was built with taxpayer dollars. However, RVSA officials and many town officials did not respond to calls seeking comment on the report.

Woodbridge Mayor John McCormac, like Bonaccorso, had not seen Cipolla's review, but again, the contents did not come as a surprise.

"The board has not acted with fiduciary responsibility that watchdog's should," he said Monday, adding that "they (the board) should all resign."

Town may resort to furlough days

CRANFORD — For the second year in a row, employees of the township of Cranford have received rice notices informing them that local officials will be meeting to discuss matters directly affecting their jobs.

The notices were sent out May 21 to all employees — about 85 in all — with the exception of public safety workers.

At a May 27 meeting, local officials discussed the possibility of utilizing eight furlough days, which would save a total of \$140,000 from the 2010 budget and help offset the impact of cuts in state aid.

The township expects to receive \$2.9 million in state aid this year, which represents a reduction from last year of \$745,000.

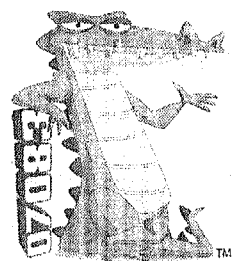
Local taxpayers face a projected tax increase of \$217 per average home assessed at \$181,000. Last year the increase was \$110.

Mayor Mark Smith said no concrete target number has been established, but he hopes for a minimal tax increase without unduly impacting local government services. One option discussed was cutting holiday pay for eight days over the course of the year. However, there was little support for this among township commissioners. Michael Broderick, who represents Teamsters 469, said those who would be affected by the cuts were among the town's hardest workers.

"They are not the high-paid employees of the town of Cranford," Broderick said. "They are the dedicated workers who come in every day and keep the town moving."

Broderick and Smith clashed over the cause of problems that delayed the ratification of the teamsters' 2009 contract until March 2010, which in turn, delayed the discussions on the subject of furloughs. After hearing several members of the public make comments, the Township Committee voted to rescind the rice notices, effectively ending discussion on the subject for the time being.

Officials, however, plan to move ahead with instituting furloughs.



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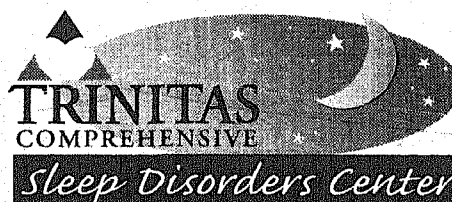

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Roselle BOE member may lose seat on school board

ROSELLE — Local Board of Education member Michael Boyd may be facing dismissal from his position, pending a vote by board members.

Boyd has missed three consecutive meetings, which is grounds for termination as a board member.

This action comes a week after Boyd's May 31 arrest for charges including burglary and eluding police. A statement released by Board President Kerry Pogue-Napoleon stated the board would not comment on any matters involving Boyd's personal life.

"Any action the board takes will solely be based on Mr. Boyd's failure to meet his obligations as a Board member pursuant to the Bylaws of the Board and the School Ethics Code," Pogue-Napoleon said.

Dan Burns, a spokesman for the district, said the board is not permitted to remove a member as a result of misconduct in their private lives. However, according to the board's charter, missing three meetings in a row can be grounds for dismissal. Burns said Boyd, who was elected to the board in 2009, is expected to receive notice of the board's decision this week.

"A final vote will take place at the next meeting,"

Burns said.

Boyd, 39, was apprehended at 1:23 a.m. after leading police on a dangerous chase through residential areas, crashing his vehicle and attempting to flee on foot. Boyd was not injured.

The pursuit began when police received a report of a vehicle burglary in progress on Munsee Drive. The suspect left the scene before police arrived, but moments later Patrolman Derek Farbanec observed a vehicle matching the description given by a witness turning onto Myrtle Street towards Roselle. When Farbanec attempted to stop the vehicle, the driver accelerated into a residential area in Roselle. Farbanec abandoned the pursuit for safety reasons, but was able to catch up to Boyd moments later when his vehicle flipped over and struck a telephone pole on Aldene Avenue. Boyd attempted to flee on foot but was apprehended by Farbanec after a short chase.

Items allegedly taken during the vehicle burglary were recovered at the scene. They included small electronic devices, a designer wallet, cosmetics, a small amount of cash, and a carrier case full of CDs.

Boyd was charged with burglary, theft, eluding police, resisting arrest and criminal mischief.

McCormac has been a driving force in trying to get RVSA to allow more financial oversight by the member towns.

The report RVSA requested from Cipolla was obtained by Union County LocalSource and reported on two weeks ago.

The eight-page confidential preliminary review contended, among other things, that the project was flawed from the start. Further, Cipolla determined the facility could have been built for a fraction of the \$30 million spend on

the project. Former Springfield mayor Bart Fraenkel, now deputy mayor, was very involved in matters concerning RVSA during his tenure as mayor. He felt then, as he does now, that "something has to give."

"The next move in my mind is that Trenton has to get involved," he said Monday, pointing out that "someone has to rattle their cage."

Meanwhile, a look into RVSA's meeting minutes for 2009 and 2010 revealed that Westfield Representative Allen Chin, a board member since 1985, also is a

director on the board of Town Bank of Westfield, where RVSA deposits millions of dollars.

A check of RVSA's minutes from the January 21, 2010 meeting, for example, reveals that RVSA passed resolutions depositing funds totaling \$4 million in Town Bank of Westfield. The money was deposited into short-term investment accounts at a rate of 1.23 percent. Chin, however, abstained from voting on the resolutions appropriating these funds for deposit in the bank where he serves as director.

defeated Council President Bob Bunk and newcomer John Fine for the Democrat nomination for mayor. Armstead won 1,972 votes to Bunk's 1,704. Fine trailed with 282. Armstead will run against incumbent Independent Mayor Richard Gerbounka in November.

The primary for council president saw newcomer James Moore win the nomination against Councilwoman Michele Yamakaitis, gathering 1,915 votes to Yamakaitis's 1,674.

Jorge Alvarez won a spot on the November ballot for 3rd Ward council seat against Jorge Alvarez, garnering 148 votes to Alvarez's 134.

Challenger Rhashonna Cosby-Hurling defeated incumbent Councilman Gene Davis to win the ballot position for the 5th Ward council seat, securing 314 votes to Davis's 253. Incumbent John Sheehy defeated Ralph Strano to run for the 7th ward council seat, winning 313 votes to Strano's 162. All council positions are three-year terms.

Mountainside

In Mountainside, where two Republicans battled for a position on the November ballot, Incumbent Glenn W. Mortimer defeated fellow Incumbent Jeffrey Wass by a total of 362 to 353 votes.

Rahway

In the mayor's race, Democrat Rick Proctor, county freeholder and health officer for the city, easily defeated Democrats for Change challenger Renee

Thrash 1,348 to 888 votes. Proctor will share the November ballot with Republican candidate Patrick Cassio. Of the three Rahway City Council seats up for grabs this year, regular organization Democratic candidates again finished ahead of their Democrats for Change challengers.

Nancy C. Saliga was the top vote-getter with 1,256 votes, incumbent council members Salvatore Mione and James E. Baker tallied 1,243 and 1,280 respectively. Democrats for change challengers did not succeed in their bid for a line on the ballot, with Yvonne Wesley getting 857 votes, Lynn Parker 845 and Grace Jacquet 775.

Roselle

Incumbent Council President Jamel Holley defeated challenger James Moore Sr. for the nomination to run for council president, garnering 1,475 votes to Moore's 1,171. Challenger Kim Shaw defeated incumbent Samantha Dow for the Democrat nomination for an open 4th Ward seat, netting 307 votes to Dow's 266. Both seats have three-year terms. Shaw will face Republican candidate Roger Stryeski in November.

Union

In Union, where two, three-year seats will be open, incumbent Democrat council members Clifton People Jr. and Suzutte Cavadas defeated Eduardo Espinal and Angel Salcedo for the nomination by solid margins of more than 700 votes. In November they will face Republicans Charles Donnelly and Paul Verzosa.

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Arrest connected to murder investigation

Charges filed in connection with two slain bodies found in Linden

LINDEN — A man has been arrested in connection with the murder and dismemberment of the bodies found in six bags on a Linden residential street in early April.

Hudson County Prosecutor Edward DeFazio said Rubin Acosta, 36, of Union City had a gun, fake New York Police Department badge, handcuffs and \$6,000 in cash. He was arrested on weapons charges because of the 9mm semi-automatic handgun found in his car after he was arrested in Union City June 2.

Police also determined that the gun was reported stolen in Union County.

Other charges included drug possession with intent to distribute within 1,000 feet of a school.

However, he was not charged with the murders of Angel Torres, 45, and Lazaro Calero, 48, both of Union City.

"The investigation into the murder is ongoing and he has not been charged in the homicide at this time," said the prosecutor.

"The theory of our case at this point is he is, in fact, the person driving the car in which the bodies were removed and he generally fits the description of the man seen on the security video," DeFazio said.

The partially decomposed bodies of Calero and Torres were found in six bags April 5 near the quiet residential streets of Cranford and Essex avenues in Linden.

Police believe the victims were

killed and dismembered around April 1 in the Union City apartment they shared.

Last week, investigators released images from a security camera that recorded a vehicle outside the apartment of the murdered man and woman at the time the murders took place.

DeFazio said that when Acosta was stopped last week, he was driving what appeared to be the same car.

The prosecutor also said Acosta looked like the same man driving the vehicle at the time and also making several trips from the apartment.

Acosta's bail was set at \$75,000 cash only, and he remains in Hudson County Jail in Kearny.

The grisly discovery of the dismembered bodies in the quiet residential neighborhood hit hard, especially since the resident who called the Linden Department of Public Works thought the bags contained either garbage or leaves.

The four cloth, and two black plastic bags were reported to the DPW by a resident living at the corner of Cranford and Essex avenues after swarms of flies began covering the bags.

A few weeks later, police identified the remains of the two victims but the case remained under investigation.

Little is know about either victim, except they both lived in the same apartment.

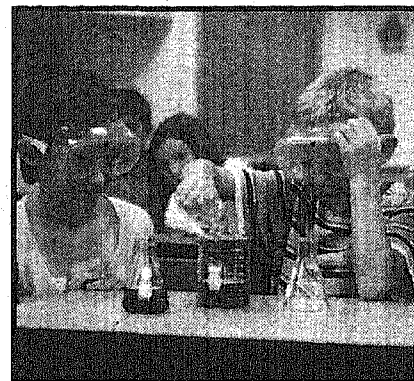
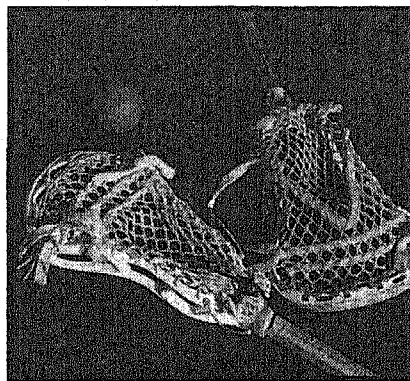

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More than a century of laughter and learning

UNION — Most people only get to read about history, but 104-year old Anna Griffin has been one of the few to live to tell about it.

Petite and fashionably dressed, every hair in place, a soft southern drawl hanging on certain phrases, Griffin has lost neither her sense of humor or the streak of independence that defined her as a young girl. Her memory is as intact as the engaging laugh that emerges when something strikes her particularly funny, or the pain that crosses her face when speaking of the loss she has endured.

Without a doubt, Griffin has lived through more than 100 years in a country that has changed vastly during this particular time. But despite the change she witnessed throughout her life, this centenarian embraces each new day, eager to discuss the past and how those changing times affected her.

And yet, while there is little doubt her life as a black woman living in the south until she was 23 years old was difficult, Griffin does not see it that way at all.

"I didn't know any other way,"

she said, adding that as far back as she remembers, blacks were segregated from whites.

"There were black and white restaurants, schools, even water fountains," Griffin says softly, her eyes looking off for a second or two. Asked if this bothered her, Griffin chuckles.

"We didn't know any better back then, that's just how it was and you just accept life as it's handed to you," she adds.

But, one thing is certain, Griffin has nothing but sweet memories of growing up in Durham, N.C. Back when women and girls wore high top button shoes and long dresses; before there was penicillin, television or airports where planes wait hours to take off for parts unknown. "My mother was a seamstress and she worked for a white woman making clothes for her daughter. She would come home and make me the same beautiful dresses," she said, pointing out how beautiful she looked going to school.

Just a decade or so later, the Great Depression would hit and this southern lady would leave her hometown for New Jersey. Even

though this was a big change, Griffin's easy-going nature and sense of humor managed to make the best of this situation.

"I looked everywhere for a job but the only one I could find was as a housekeeper," she explains, adding quickly that she turned that position down without hesitation.

"I didn't get on my knees for myself, let alone for someone else," Griffin says before she erupts in hearty laughter.

Not long after, she would find work in a laundry facility that handled only hotel bed linens. Working from 7:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m., six days a week, the transplanted southerner is still astonished by the amount of money she made in a week.

"Can you believe I worked all those hours and only took home \$7,"

Griffin said, but added that, "after all, sugar was only 25 cents back then."

The move to New Jersey also allowed her a freedom that would not happen in North Carolina until 1971: the right to vote. New Jersey became the 29th state to ratify the 19th Amendment in February, 1920. Griffin took this right very seriously her entire life and continues to vote in every election.

A few years later Griffin married and had a son named Harold. When World War II broke out, she recalls sitting close to the radio to hear daily bulletins and living through the years of rationing that all Americans endured for the sake of the troops. But a tragedy broke the uncertainty of war, leaving this mother grieving the loss of her only precious son.

"He died in 1942 at just 14 years old from sickle cell anemia," Griffin said, her voice tinged with sadness. "He was a sweet boy, such a sweet boy."

"I got mad with God about that because I had only one son and other people had so many children," she said. "But my mother told me that God knows what he is doing and we

have to accept that."

During the decades that followed, though, she went on to lead a happy, fulfilled life — working as a receptionist for a doctor until she was 90 years old.

It was not until five years ago that she reluctantly moved to South Mountain Rehab and Nursing Home in Union. She is the first to tell you that she is strong and healthy, "just in need of a little help now and then." Still able to walk and read, Griffin admits candidly that she never misses a meal. As for what she has learned throughout 104 years of living, Griffin stops for a moment to seriously consider the question she had been asked.

"I think of all the things I learned, the biggest thing was not to trust everyone," she says with measured carefulness. "Sometimes that is a hard lesson to learn and it takes a long time."

Griffin's outlook on dying is also a reflection of the spiritual life she has led, one that embraces a strong belief in God and the faith of a child.

"I don't worry about dying because everyone has to die," she says with twinkling warm eyes.

FLAG DAY

THE HISTORY OF FLAG DAY

The Fourth of July was traditionally celebrated as America's birthday, but the idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the Flag is believed to have first originated in 1885. BJ Cigrand, a schoolteacher, arranged for the pupils in the Fredonia, Wisconsin Public School, District 6, to observe June 14 (the 110th anniversary of the official adoption of The Stars and Stripes) as 'Flag Birthday'. In numerous magazines and newspaper articles and public addresses over the following years, Cigrand continued to enthusiastically advocate the observance of June 14 as 'Flag Birthday', or 'Flag Day'.

On June 14, 1889, George Balch, a kindergarten teacher in New York City, planned appropriate ceremonies for the children of his school, and his idea of observing Flag Day was later adopted by the State Board of Education of New York. On June 14, 1891, the Betsy Ross house in Philadelphia held a Flag Day celebration, and on June 14 of the following year, the New York Society of the Sons of the Revolution, celebrated Flag Day.

Following the suggestion of Colonel J. Granville Leach (at the time historian of the Pennsylvania Society of the Sons of the Revolution), the Pennsylvania Society of Colonial Dames of America on April 25, 1893 adopted a resolution requesting the mayor of Philadelphia and all others in authority and all private citizens to display the flag on June 14th. Leach went on to recommend that thereafter the day be known as 'Flag Day', and on that day, school children be assembled for appropriate exercises, with each child being given a small flag.

Two weeks later on May 8th, the board of Managers of the Pennsylvania Society of Sons of the Revolution unanimously endorsed the action of the Pennsylvania Society of Colonial Dames. As a result of the resolution, Dr. Edward Brooks, then Superintendent of Public Schools of Philadelphia, directed that Flag Day exercises be held on June 14, 1893 in Independence Square. School children were assembled, each carrying a small flag, and patriotic songs were sung and addresses delivered.

In 1894, the governor of New York directed that on June 14 the flag be displayed on all public buildings. With BJ Cigrand and Leroy Van Horn as the moving spirits, the Illinois organization, known as the American Flag Day Association, was organized for the purpose of promoting the holding of Flag Day exercises. On June 14, 1894, under the auspices of this association, the first general public school children's celebration of Flag Day in Chicago was held in Douglas, Garfield, Humboldt, Lincoln, and Washington Parks, with more than 300,000 children participating.

Adults, too, participated in patriotic programs. Franklin K. Lane, Secretary of the Interior, delivered a 1914 Flag Day address in which he repeated words he said the flag had spoken to him that morning: "I am what you make me; nothing more. I swing before your eyes as bright gleam of color, a symbol of yourself."

Inspired by these three decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day - the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 - was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30th, 1916. While Flag Day was celebrated in various communities for years after Wilson's proclamation, it was not until August 3rd, 1949, that President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th of each year as Nation Flag Day.

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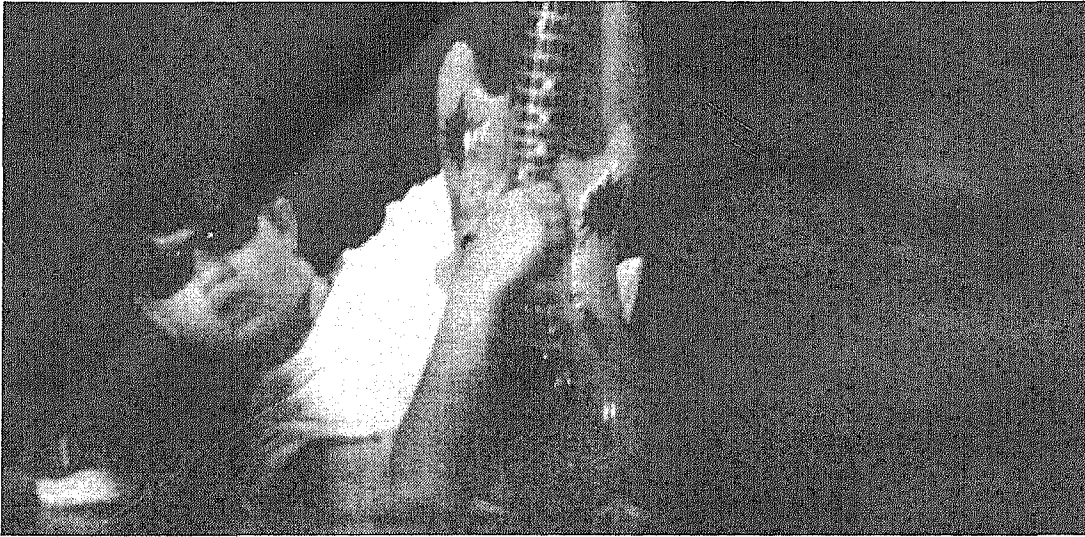
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This is Washington School Idol...

Police, FBI search for robbery suspect

POLICE BLOTTER

Springfield police and the FBI are tracking a lone, male suspect involved with an armed robbery that occurred June 4 at 1:39 p.m. at Unity Bank on Mountain Avenue and suspected to be involved in other recent robberies in the area.

Officers responded to a silent hold-up alarm triggered by a teller, but upon arrival found that the suspect had already fled the scene onto Mountain Avenue.

The suspect approached a teller and demanded money while keeping one hand under his shirt in a manner suggestive of holding a concealed handgun. The bank was occupied only by three employees at the time.

The suspect made off with an undetermined amount of money that he placed inside a brown paper shopping bag.

The suspect is described as a male in his late 30s to 50 years of age. He was described as being between 6 feet and 6 feet, 2 inches tall, with a slender to medium build and he had black and gray hair. He was wearing a long, black t-shirt, blue denim jeans, a black baseball cap with an unknown blue logo on the front and eyeglasses with dark colored frames.

The description of this suspect matches the description of a man involved in two robberies that occurred on April 15, one at the same Springfield branch and another at the Unity Bank in Scotch Plains. Although bank employees who were present at both robberies believe this is the same person, the bank surveillance photos still need to be reviewed.

The Bank Robbery Squad from the Newark FBI office responded to the scene and were assisted by Springfield Police detectives. Police began canvassing for witnesses and or any surveillance photos from cameras at other businesses in the area.

The direction he took or the description of any motor vehicle that the actor may have used is unknown at this time.

Compelling causes to consider

They will hold a public hearing tonight on second-hand smoking at the Union County Freeholder meeting in Elizabeth. What makes the routine hearing interesting is that there is actually opposition stirring over new regulations and their enforcement problems.

The ordinance extends the smoking ban to a host of county-owned facilities like ice-skating rinks, playgrounds, running tracks, swimming pools, ball fields and the Watchung stables among others.

Freeholder Board Vice Chairperson Deborah Scanlon said last week, "The bottom line is that exposure to second-hand smoke should be a serious health concern for everyone. New Jersey has successfully enacted anti-smoking laws in the recent past and the end result is that we are healthier for it."

Sitting last week at Charlie Brown's in Union for lunch, it struck me that it wasn't that long ago when we would advise the hostess if we preferred smoking or non-smoking. Since then, a generation of young hostesses has come around who only know about the full smoking ban.

Scanlon, a cancer survivor, reels off effectively the dangers of second hand smoke including illness and premature death in children.

There has been some editorial opposition based on the fear that we are over-regulating our society. Enforcement with a \$250 fine for the first offense, \$500 for the second offense and \$1,000 every other time, may also present some prob-

lems. The over-regulation problem is on the horizon. In Cranford, the local police brass will accept nothing less than 100 percent compliance with seat belt use. You can question the priority in terms of manpower. We do, in the end, pay for the grants to help supplement the salaries. Evidently, you can't debate the statistics as to the value of the enforcement.

Tonight, the freeholders will hold the public hearing and it looks like the votes are there for its passage. That's a good thing balancing the enforcement and minor inconvenience against the overwhelming benefits the statistics reveal.

A Summit downtown plan

Former Summit Councilman Frank Macioce, along with Breet Haide, have presented a compelling case for changes to improve the city's commercial downtown. The report which can be viewed on the city's website is readable and informative.

Macioce may be something of an optimist. He acknowledges an existing vacancy rate of 13.5 percent in the downtown. Macioce acknowledges certain elements. "are broke but we can fix it." He believes the bevy of proposals, including the streamlining the permit process, encouraging larger

commercial buildings and focusing on filling the vacant stores, can take a bad situation and make it much better. There is some commonality to the efforts in many of the local downtowns to deal with the competition of the malls and Internet. Maybe it's the ex-elected official, which Macioce was in Summit, which gives more power to his arguments. A discussion with him is laced with frequent reminders of the real strength of the downtown. The rail links and the convenience are important. Still, it's the quality of the service he sees that can be provided in the local community which ultimately remains the best value of shopping downtown.

Macioce appreciated the need to fill the empty store fronts. In a bit of verbal judo, Macioce sees the larger vacancy rate as an opportunity to make changes and improve the situation.

Macioce sees the report as being "well received" by the city's Common Council. Two subcommittees have been formed to study portions of the 11-page document.

There are landlords in the county who argue that the day of the small town merchant have passed. They point to the vacancy rate as exhibit one. A retired lawyer, Macioce rebuts the argument with the report provided to the elected officials. The Summit officials owe the city a rigorous review and debate on the report.

SEF helps keep programs in place

Summit residents, we are all aware of the tough economic times that New Jersey public schools are facing. In Summit, we have just come through a difficult budget process in which we had to cope with the loss of all state aid — more than \$2.5 million for the upcoming school year.

The financial struggle will continue, and more and more we will have to rely on the generosity of the Summit community to help us provide the level of education that our students deserve and the community expects. We cannot be satisfied with less.

At the Board of Education's reorganization meeting on May 13, the board presented resolutions of recognition to a number of organizations that maintain as their mission the financial support of our programs: the schools' PTAs and PTOs, the Summit Athletic Boosters Association, the Summit Music Parents Association, the Summit Performing Arts Resource Committee and the Summit Educational Foundation. All of these organizations work diligently to encourage donations from community members and to manage those funds to best serve our programs. We are deeply grateful for the commitment of these groups and for the generosity of their benefactors.

I would like to tell you a bit more about one of these organizations and of the widespread impact it has had on the educational experiences of all Summit students. The Summit Educational Foundation — more popularly known as SEF — was developed in 1986 to provide funding for programs that could not be supported by the district's regular operating budget. SEF contributes to the school in the form of grants, proposals for which are submitted by school staff and then reviewed by SEF grants committee

and myself and approved by the board of education.

SEF is a diligent and effective fundraising organization. This school year alone, the Summit community donated \$326,000 to the SEF. And over the SEF's 24 years of operation, more than \$2.5 million in grants have been made to the Summit Public Schools, reaching every grade level and every academic discipline. During this school year, \$407,719 in SEF grants have enriched our curriculum.

Here are only a few of the more than 50 SEF funded programs being implemented in our schools this spring: two nights of Family Science and Math at each elementary school for students and their families; the purchase of SmartBoards for the third and fourth grades in the elementary schools; a third year of Mandarin Chinese at Summit High School; a science research program at the high school and provision for a full-time studio manager/teacher at the high school's new media literacy broadcast studio. The complete list of SEF's spring grants can be found on the district website, www.summit.k12.nj.us.

In addition, SEF is providing more than \$80,000 to fund the new eighth grade cycle program that will go into effect at Lawton C. Johnson Summit Middle School next year. The current six, 30-day cycle classes per year are being changed to four 45-day cycles and students will have a choice in

selecting two of their four classes. Six new cycle classes have been developed for the eighth graders; the two required courses are Digital Newsroom and Artist as Student. Students may then choose two additional courses from Whodunit? which is an introduction to forensic science, Innovative Design Challenge, Today's Talk and G.L.E.E., which is an introduction to the entertainment field. We are all looking forward to this new program, and we're sure the students will be excited to participate in these cutting edge classes that focus on 21st Century skills and global connections.

However, if it were not for SEF and the contributions of the Summit community, innovative programs such as these would not be possible. Furthermore, the funding provided to our athletic, music, and performing arts programs has been a vital component of our schools' success in athletics — two state championships this school year; music — students accepted to all state vocal and instrumental groups and top scores in multi-state competitions; and performing arts — eight nominations for Summit High School's production of "The Producers" in this year's Paper Mill Playhouse Rising Star competition and the fifth consecutive year the SHS musical has been nominated for "Best Overall Production."

It has been said that "it takes a village" to raise a child, and the Summit community has confirmed that concept. I want to express our thanks on behalf of the thousands of students who have benefited from this community's generosity. We ask that you continue to support SEF and the other organizations. Your help is needed more than ever.

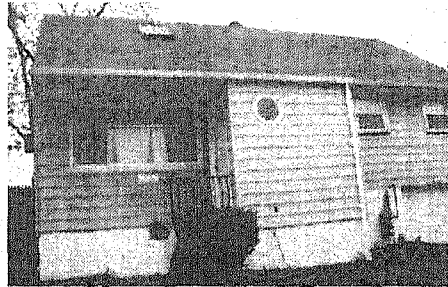

When David Molinaro of New Providence entered Union County College in the fall of 2005, he intended to go to college and begin working full-time.

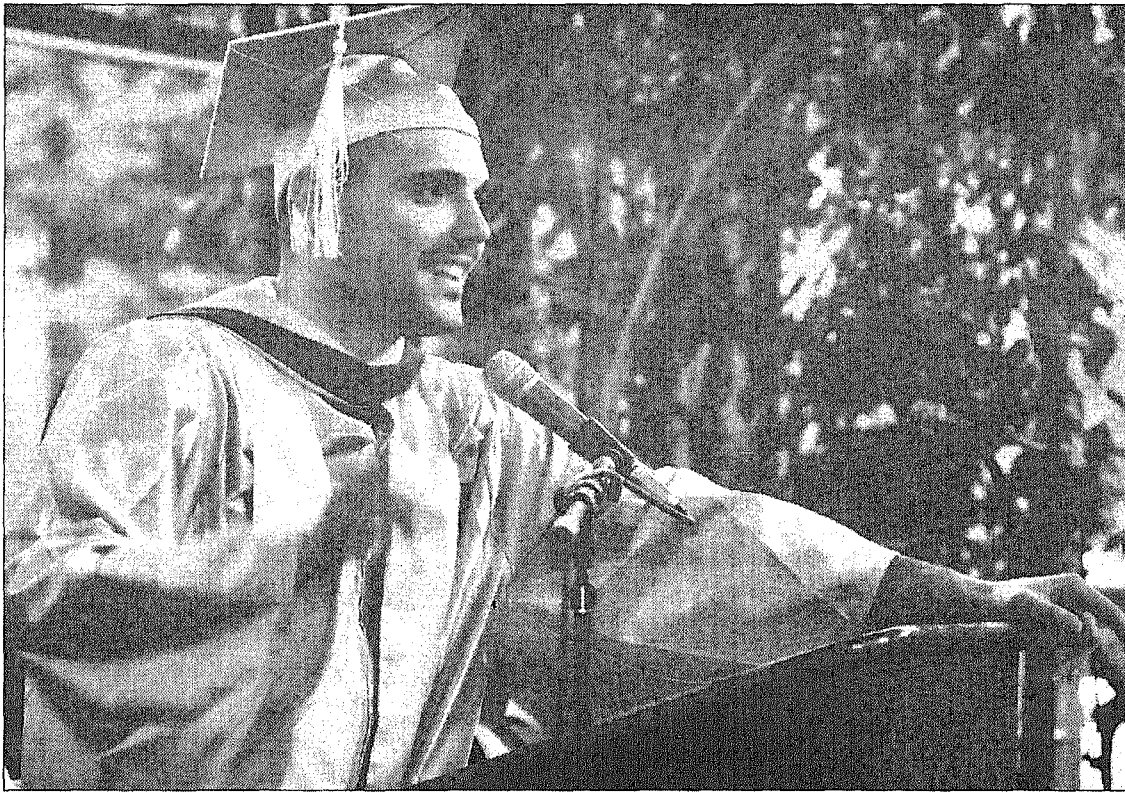

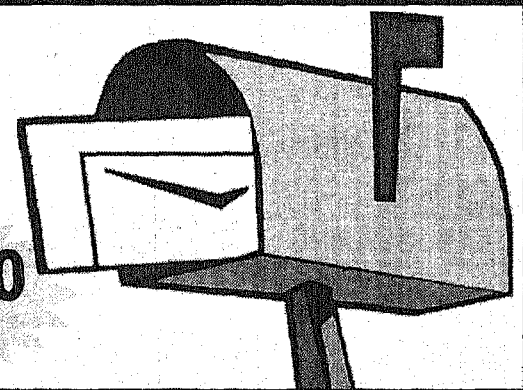

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Rahway BOE alters budget

RAHWAY — A month after the district's school budget narrowly passed, a new round of negotiations and concessions may reduce the number of layoffs set to take effect this year.

More than 50 district employees, including 24 teachers, have received notices they may lose their positions following budget cuts. These employees were spread evenly throughout the district.

District Superintendent Frank Buglione said an agreement was reached at the last Board of Education meeting on May 13 that the teachers will contribute 1.5 percent of their salaries to their medical benefits. This saved \$428,000.

"Contractually it was a nice give back on their part," Buglione said. "They agreed to open the contract up and renegotiate."

The current contract was set to expire June 30, 2011. However, the new agreement extends the contract to June 30, 2013. An additional \$46,000 was saved by returning leftover money earmarked for

funding tuition reimbursement.

"We will bring back as many as we can, but not all of them are going to be able to come back," Business Administrator Al DiGiorgio said.

Ray Candiloro, President of the Rahway Education Association, said he is still unsure how many employees' positions will be saved. "We're hopeful we could have upwards of half the people return, but I'm not sure if that is realistic," said Candiloro.

The employees who have received these notices will not know until later this month if their position can be saved. A special Board of Education meeting scheduled for June 7 will be the next opportunity for school officials to discuss the matter.

The total budget of \$60.5 million will bring a tax increase of \$179 for the average home assessed at \$133,000. "This is the worse cut I think we've had in state aid since I've been here," DiGiorgio said. "We lost about \$2.7 million."

DiGiorgio said district officials will also be meeting with other employees in the hopes of further concessions.

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County mourns the loss of Shelbourne

Former chief dies on June 5

HILLSIDE — Public safety officials, Hillside residents and residents around the county are mourning the passing of a former Hillside Police Chief George A. Shelbourne.

Shelbourne was one of the longest serving members of the department, working 43 years before retiring in 1991. He died on June 5 at age 83 after battling a long illness.

Hillside's current police chief, Robert Quinlan, described Shelbourne as a highly respected and well-liked member of the law enforcement community.

"We're going to miss him," Quinlan said. "He was a great guy and a great leader. He served the town with honor for many years."

Shelbourne grew up in Hillside, graduating from Hillside High School and went on to serve in the United States Navy during World War II.

He began his police career in 1948 and rose through the ranks of the department until he was appointed chief of police in 1969.

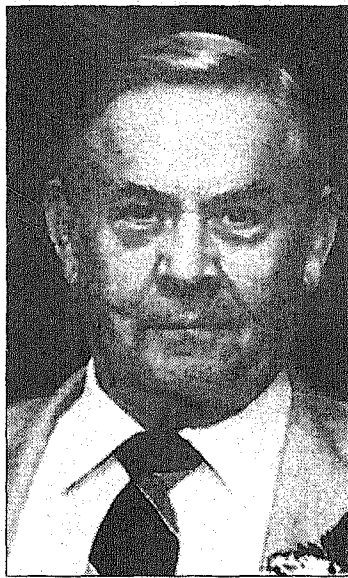
Shelbourne earned his bachelor's degree from William Paterson College, now William Paterson University. He directed the Union County Tactical Squad for two years and served as director of the Union County Police Chiefs Training Academy.

He was a president of the Union County Police Chiefs Association and lifetime member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Union County Sheriff Ralph Froehlich was saddened to hear of Shelbourne's death.

As a sergeant with the Elizabeth Police Department, Froehlich served in a special unit formed by Shelbourne in 1967. This "disorder platoon" drilled extensively to help maintain order during the civil unrest of the day.

Froehlich described Shelbourne as a "no-nonsense leader"

who was focused on "getting the job done".

"Back then the bad guys were afraid of us," Froehlich said. "There was more emphasis on getting the job done than on the methods."

Shelbourne, who moved to Mountainside after he retired, continued to remain active in the Police Chief's Association until his death.

"He was a classy guy from a different time and we sadly miss men with his philosophies, his leadership," Froehlich said.

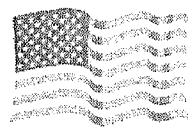

The whole world of readers could easily be overcome by the mystery and intrigue emanating from Emily Winslow's debut novel, "The Whole World."

This overpowering, insightful book by the former Maplewood resident not only tells a heart-pounding, heart-rendering story about life in and around Cambridge University in England, but uncovers the intricacies and humanities of several of its inhabitants consistently.

In addition, the author herself unravels her own emotions and admiration of the atmosphere of Cambridge itself.

It's no wonder that she selected Cambridge as the site for her first book.

The complex personalities of Winslow's three principals, Americans, Polly and Liv, students at the college, and their friend, Nick, a graduate student, are characteristically unveiled.

And when Nick mysteriously

disappears from the girls' lives, a reader begins to experience the psychological shortcomings of all three.

All of this happens before their association with a rather strange professor, Gretchen Paul, who does not allow her blindness to affect her life and activities, nor the interference of her odd husband, Harry Reed, who collects birds. Despite her idiosyncrasies, Gretchen Paul's life also appears to have some dark secrets, particularly due to her mother, a famous writer, Linda Paul.

"The Whole World," published by Delacort Press, a division of

Random House Inc., on May 25, is interestingly divided into five parts: Polly, Nick, Morris, Gretchen and Liv. And, what makes it even fascinating is that each of the parts is written in the first person.

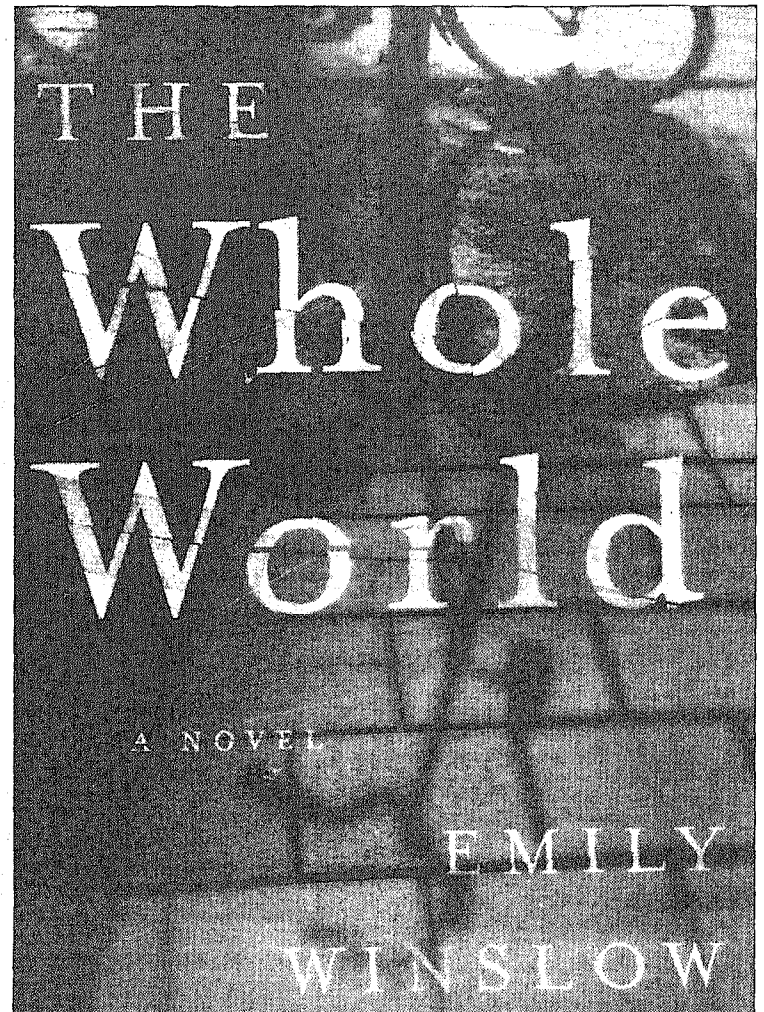
Unquestionably, this method by Winslow offers an intimate view into the individual personalities and somewhat of an understanding of what and why the person is all about.

For a first novel, Winslow writes exceedingly well. She has a sharp knowledge of how young people think and feel and express themselves accordingly.

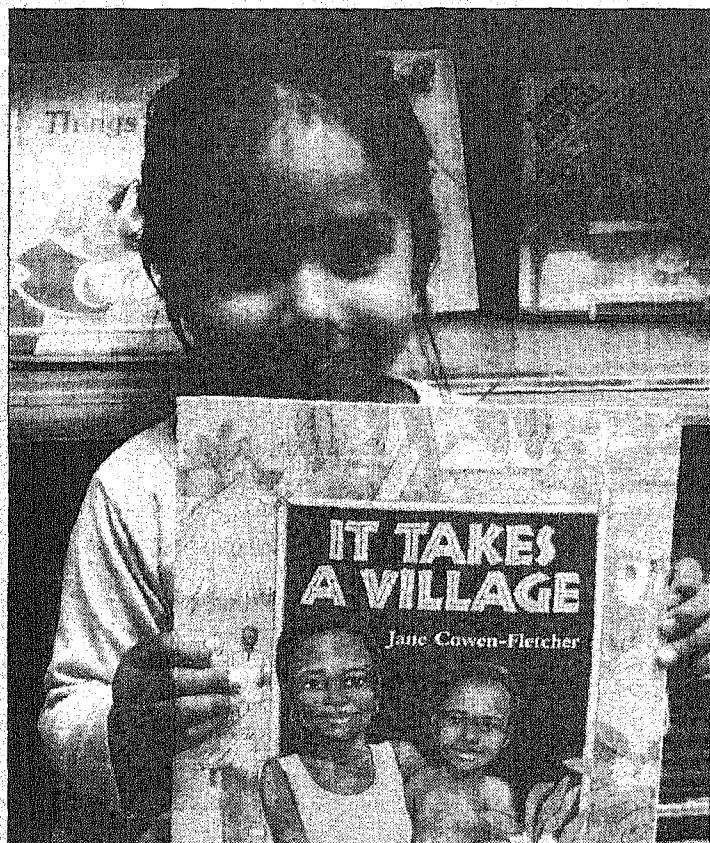
And she shows exceptional literary talent and a promise of more to come.

Author inspired by Cambridge

Maplewood-born Emily Winslow, who resides in Cambridge, England, with her husband and two children, admitted that her fascination with the city of Cambridge inspired her to write a book, "The Whole World."

"Actually," Winslow said, "there were two things that prompted me to write the mystery novel. The first was that my family and I moved to Cambridge four years ago. It's a unique place, 800 years old. And it runs in a very quirky way. The university also is interesting."

"It was all so fascinating," Winslow exclaimed, "that basically I chose to write an American novel so I could express my fascination for the city. Truly, it's an exceedingly strange and fascinating place. And it became my first choice to plot a story. It's the kind of plot that I love. And second, I have always wanted to write a book."

She indicated that there is plenty of tension in her novel, and she wondered, "How I was going to tell my story. How am I going to express to the readers what really happened to Nick?" Nick, incidentally,

is the character who disappears. "I had some fun with writing about him." Winslow explained that it took "a year to write the novel. I was lucky. I got an agent and a publisher about six months after I wrote 'The Whole World.' Actually, it took one year to write it, and one year to edit it. It was more comfortable to write it in England. But it was all new to me."

The new author is thrilled with residing in Cambridge. "It's really great being here," she said, "and not just making a visit. There is such a mix here in Cambridge. It's a unique city because of its population. And I'm getting to know it really well."

Winslow, who was born in Maplewood — "my parents still live in the house in which I grew up" — was graduated from Columbia High School, Class of 1988.

"I did graduate studies at Seton Hall University," she recalled. "I also went to college to study acting

in Pittsburgh at Carnegie Mellon University's drama conservatory. Then I decided to go to graduate school to study museum professions at Seton Hall, where I received my master's degree. I was working in a play at Bellecore Community Theater. Then I did research on getting computers to talk."

She also was a puzzle designer for six years when she worked for Games magazine and created illustrated logic puzzles. They often were issue centerpieces. "I wanted to be a writer for decades. I had yet to find the story that I wanted to tell. But now I have a two-book deal with Delacort Press, Random House. My next book, 'The Start of Everything,' also is set in Cambridge. And one of the characters from 'The Whole World' will be in the new book."

Winslow, who currently resides with her husband, Gavin Stark and their two sons, Samuel, 9, and Westcott, 4, has home-schooled the children in Cambridge. "When they are grown," Winslow said, "I'll take them to America."

In the meantime, Emily Winslow's "whole world" revolves around her beloved adopted city of Cambridge.

Garrett stars in the Fox series, "Til Death," and performs his stand-up act across America.

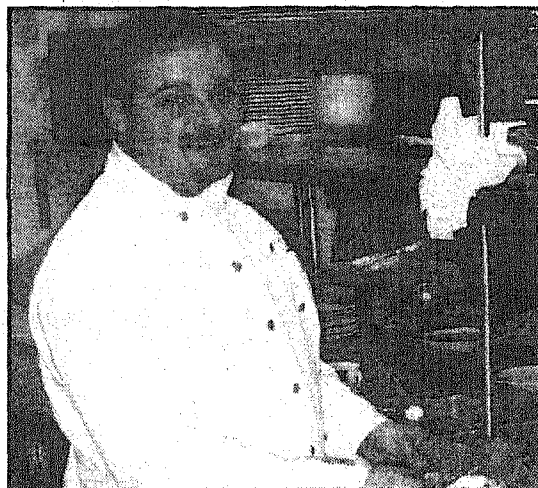

Fast & Friendly To Sit Down Elegant

Are you looking for a five star restaurant - perhaps New York City or Atlantic City - but wishing to stay local and avoid a long drive? Then you should consider a visit to Chestnut Chateau. I have been to the Chestnut Chateau many times and the food & staff never disappoint.

Our recent visit was as usual a wonderful experience. My companion and I chose our usual cozy booth and settled in. After viewing the new extensive menu our choices were made. To start the evening off, we selected the Red Sangria from the new bar bill of fare. The Sangria was a refreshing concoction of oranges, cherries, lemons in red wine, brandy, triple sec with a splash of o.j. The beginnings started to arrive. Bruschetta crowned with a large shrimp was a tasty start. Pea soup flavored with pancetta instead of the usual ham hocks was a silky smooth masterpiece with a delicate flavor topped with seasoned croutons. The assorted appetizers was an eye pleasing array of tempting morsels: Stuffed mushrooms with crabmeat, sage seasoned clams, fried calamari, buffalo wings and in the center of the tray garlic smashed potatoes topped with a giant, king crab claw. All of the above was seasoned just right and cooked to perfection.

Finally our main course arrived. The presentation of both dishes reminded me of covers of Bon Appetite. I had selected the Chicken Francaise - accompanied by smashed potatoes and asparagus. The chicken was so tender no knife was needed. The sauce was so light and tasty. A terrific choice.

My companion had the Lamb Shanks with vegetable risotto. The shanks were cooked in it's own juice and due to the long simmering time turned into demi-glace. The risotto was a fabulous side to the lamb.

For dessert pineapple sorbet served in it's own skin and homemade cheesecake drizzled with caramel sauce. The sorbet was so fresh and sweet. Words cannot describe the cheesecake - one has to experience the flavor and texture themselves.

After the meal I was thinking I have to attribute the quality of all these wonderful dishes to George Niotis. He is a graduate of the French Culinary Institute of New York. His talents shine from the beginning to the end of each meal. At this very moment I think the meal I have just consumed is the best ever. But I will return at another time and George will surpass himself once again.

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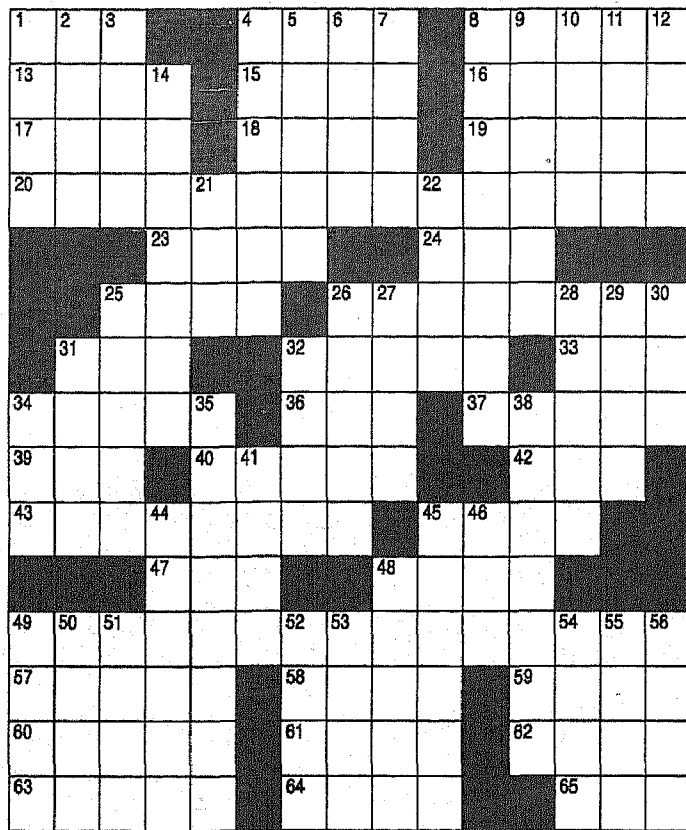

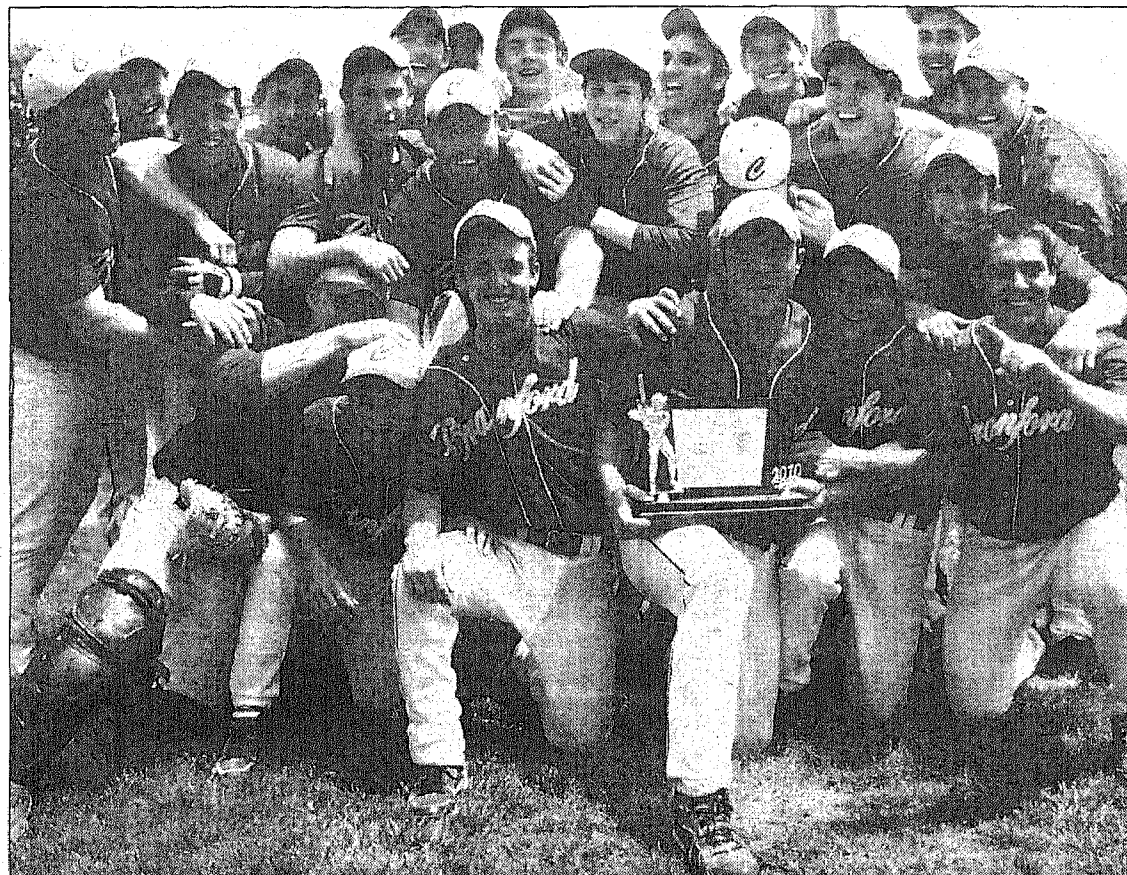

Cranford baseball rolls to 2nd Group 3 state crown

Team effort sparks 15-3 rout of Ocean C.

TOMS RIVER — You got the feeling Saturday after Cranford was getting base hit after base hit and scoring run after run that the Cougars would have also gone on to win a Tournament of Champions title if there was one for baseball.

There was just no stopping this hard-working, dedicated group.

Cranford scored in every inning, batted around in the second and third and banged out 12 hits en route to a dominating 15-3, five-inning rout of Ocean City in last Saturday morning's Group 3 state championship game at Toms River North's Ray Ryan Field.

The Cougars finished 26-5, closed with a season-high, nine-game winning streak and captured conference, county, section and state championships in the same season for the first time.

For 12th year head coach Dennis McCaffery and assistant coaches Brian Chapman and Kevin Feeley, they very much enjoyed their first state championship together. McCaffery was previously 0-3 in group finals as the head coach after winning one at Cranford as an assistant coach under James Shriner in 1997.

This was no senior-dominated team that achieved what it did. There were not only seniors playing a major role, but juniors, sophomores and freshmen as well.

"This is fantastic," said junior right fielder Eric Walano, who went 2-for-3, with two singles, two RBI and three runs, while reaching base three of four times up. "This is the definition of a team. Everyone does their role and everyone does their job."

"At the start of the season people said we wouldn't even be .500," junior shortstop Sean Trotter said. "We came in and these young guys helped us so much. We didn't know it would be like this."

Cranford captured its first state championship since last winning Group 3 in 1997 and the program's third, including the Group 4 crown in 1971.

The Cougars were denied in the last three Group 3 finals they played in during the 2000, 2003 and 2007 seasons.

"We take one game, one inning, one pitch at a time and everyone does their job," Walano said. "It's just a fantastic feeling."

This was a game that was actually close going into the bottom of the second after Cranford senior second baseman Rob Ghiretti made the defensive play of the game to end the top of the second.

With Cranford leading 2-0 and Ocean City having the bases loaded with two outs, lefty-batting Connor Ortolfo hit a one-bounce shot toward Ghiretti that he snared with his glove to his left. Ghiretti then raced to step on second for the force to end the inning and preserve Cranford's two-run advantage.

"It was hit right at me and exploded off the ground a little bit," Ghiretti said.

"I reacted as quickly as I could and got my glove on it."

Former RP football coach Gardi passes away at 71

Coached Panthers to 9-0 mark in 1969

Before there were power points or state playoffs and when more than a few fans showed up to watch high school football games, Joe Gardi served as the head coach at Roselle Park for three seasons from 1967-1969.

Twenty years later he took over as the head coach at Hofstra University and was instrumental in taking the program from Division 3 to elite 1-AA status.

Gardi passed away last Wednesday following a stroke he suffered last week. He was 71 years old.

"When Joe came to Roselle Park we had not had a winning season for 10 years," said John Wagner, a 1969 Roselle Park graduate who played for Gardi during his junior and senior seasons of 1967 and 1968.

Wagner, who was an assistant coach at Roselle Park under Geoff Hill from 1976-1980 and then the head coach from 1981-2005, is the winningest football coach at Roselle Park. He surpassed Herm Shaw — who the football field is named after — in victories his final season.

Wagner's job title now is Assistant Principal — Athletics at Roselle Park.

"He only coached here for three years, but as a young man he was very influential in my life," Wagner said.

"He was a great role model for us as kids, especially a young man like myself who grew up without a father. Joe Gardi, Ernie Finizio (former Roselle Park Superintendent of Schools) and Dale Springer (former Roselle Park High School Principal) were my biggest role models."

Gardi was born in Harrison and attended Harrison High School, graduating in 1956. There he was a First Team All-State offensive guard selection by The Newark Star-Ledger in 1955 during his senior season at the Hudson County school.

He then attended the University of Maryland, where he played football from 1959 to 1960 as an offensive tackle and linebacker. He served as team captain and received the Unsung Hero Award. He graduated with a bachelors of science degree in business administration.

In 1960, he was signed by the Washington Redskins of the National Football League.

Gardi played in two pre-season games before being released. In 1961, he attended camp with the Buffalo Bills, but did not make the team.

In 1964, Gardi was hired as the head football coach at Oratory Prep in Summit. The team lost 37 consecutive games prior to Gardi's arrival.

In his first season, Oratory went 0-9. In his second and third seasons in 1965 and 1966, the Rams went 6-3 and 5-4, with Gardi's three-year record at the school 11-16.

Gardi succeeded Joe Cartier as the head coach at Roselle Park in 1967, with the Panthers finishing 2-7 that season.

Roselle Park improved to 6-3 in 1968 with its first winning season in a decade.

"Joe gave a lot of kids direction," Wagner said. "He was a very charismatic type of person. He could have made a lot of money in sales."

Gardi then guided the Panthers to a perfect mark of 9-0 during his final year there in 1969.

"When he coached with the Jets and they had the Sack Exchange (nickname for the team's four-man defensive line), that was typical Joe," Wagner said. "He would put a label on something and run with it."

In 1970, Gardi returned to Maryland to assume the roles of head coach of the freshman team and recruiting coordinator. That year he was responsible for recruiting star quarterback Bob Avellini.

In 1972, he was promoted to offensive line coach. In 1973, after new head coach Jerry Claiborne took over at Maryland, Gardi was retained and moved to wide receivers coach.

In 1974, Gardi began a tenure in the short-lived World Football League. He served as a running backs coach, special teams coach and interim head coach for the Philadelphia Bell. In 1975, he served as head coach for the Portland Thunder for three games before the league disbanded.

Gardi then served for nine seasons from 1976-1984 as an assistant coach for the New York Jets in the NFL. In 1976, he was special teams and tight ends coach under head coach Lou Holtz.

Gardi served as special teams and linebackers coach from 1977-1980. In 1981 and 1982, he was the defensive coordinator under head coach Walt Michaels.

“He saved the game for us,” said sophomore right hander Kurt Rutmayer, who started on the mound for the Cougars. “At that point it was only 2-0 and that was a really key play.”

Ocean City left five runners on base in the first two innings and seven in the first three.

As what happens so often in baseball, the player that ends the previous inning with a fine defensive play leads off the next inning. Ghiretti led off the bottom of the second for Cranford and hit a fly ball to right field that was dropped for an error.

It would be the beginning of an inning the Cougars would go on to bang out six hits in and score six runs, sending 11 batters to the plate to increase their lead to 8-0.

After Ghiretti’s at-bat, freshman Sean Feeney delivered an opposite field RBI-single to left, which was yet another key hit produced by the first-year varsity player. Marc Linger then walked, with Justin Van Ostenbridge going in to run for him.

Then Trotter (one of the running backs of the football team – not the quarterback like I mistakenly reported in my preview story) connected for an RBI-single up the middle to make it 4-0. Nick Pace followed with an opposite field RBI-single to right for a 5-0 score.

After a wild pitch put runners on second and third with still nobody out, Walano followed with a two-run single to left field for a 7-0 lead. Junior designated hitter Greg Matlosz followed with his second hit of the game, this one a single to left on the first pitch he saw from Ortolf to put runners on first and second.

Ocean City head coach Craig Mensinger then lifted Ortolf, who took the loss to finish his final high school season at 7-3, and put in junior right hander John Huff, who started the game at shortstop.

It didn’t matter what pitcher was out there on the mound, Cranford was going to hit him. Mark Osofsky ripped an RBI-single to left for an 8-0 lead. Huff then got Nick Cook to hit into a fielder’s choice and struck out the next batter to prevent further damage.

Freshman left hander Ryan Williamson relieved Rutmayer with runners on first and second and one out in the third after Rutmayer hit his second batter. Williamson struck out the first batter he faced on a 1-2 fastball and then got the next batter to fly out to right.

Not satisfied with an 8-0 lead, Cranford went back to work at the plate in the bottom of the third to increase its lead once again, ultimately sending 10 more batters to the plate before the third out was registered.

After a fly out to right, Trotter walked and stole second. Pace followed with an opposite field RBI-triple to the right-center gap that scored Trotter for a 9-0 lead. Walano was then hit by a pitch to put runners on first and third.

After Matlosz walked to load the bases, still with just one out, Osofsky delivered his second RBI-single of the day, with his second hit to left field scoring Pace to make it 10-0.

Cook, who was previously 0-for-2 after flying out to center in the first and reaching base on a fielder’s choice in the second, was hungry to join the hit parade. On a 1-1 pitch from Huff, Cook smashed a fastball over the right-center field fence for a grand slam, giving Cranford a 14-0 lead and putting Cranford Saturday night party plans into full effect.

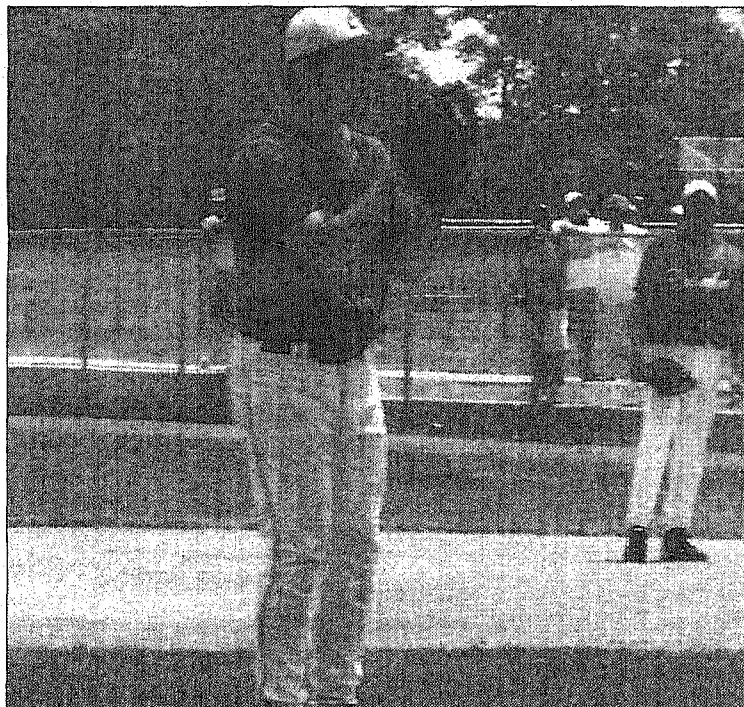

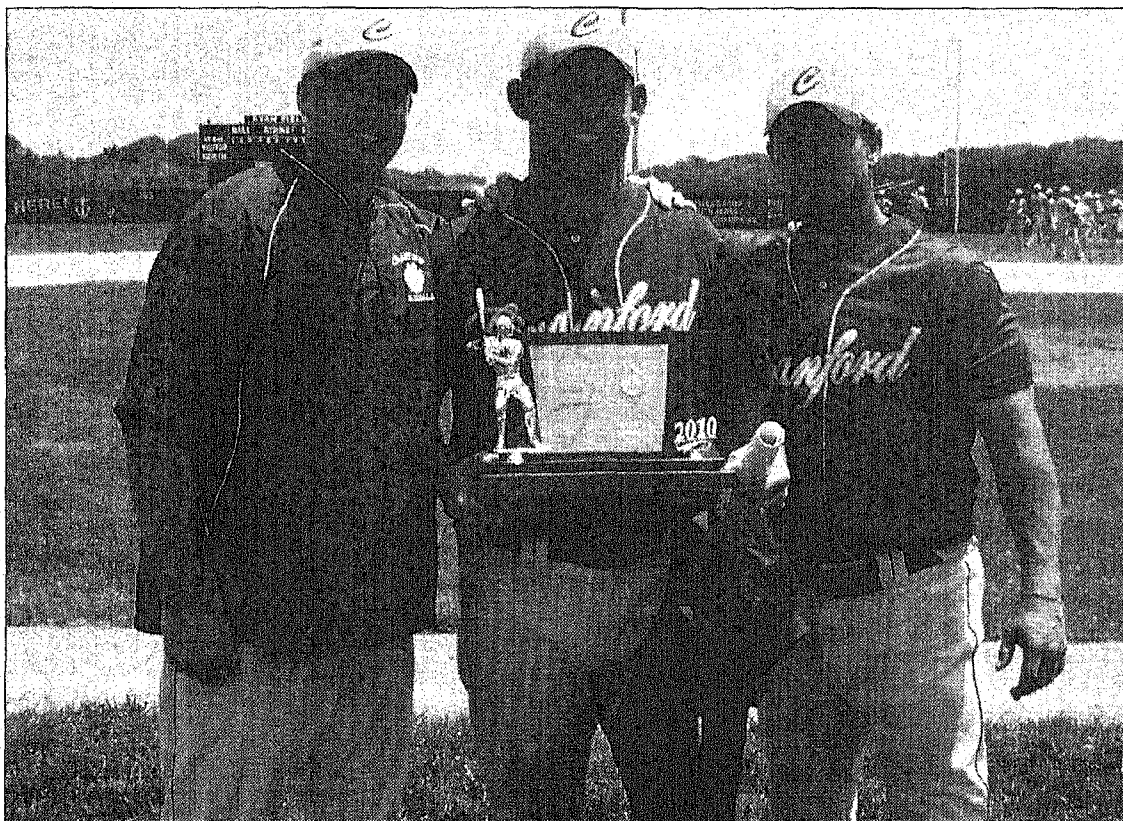

Summit boys' lacrosse wins record 45th straight

Hilltoppers repeat as TOC champions

Was there ever any doubt?

Perhaps the greatest boys' lacrosse team in state history just completed a perfect 23-0 season that included a second consecutive Tournament of Champions crown.

Top-seeded Summit - as expected - downed second-seeded St. Joseph's of Metuchen 6-1 in last Saturday afternoon's annual TOC final played at Rutgers University's Yurcak Field in Piscataway.

The Hilltoppers, who last loss on April 1, 2009, will enter their 2011 season 10 months from now with a state-record 45-game winning streak. The previous mark of 44 was established by Ridgewood from 1990-1992.

Summit also became the first team to win a state championship undefeated since Bridgewater-Raritan accomplished the feat in 1998. The Hilltoppers captured the Public, Group 1 state title earlier this month to advance to a second straight TOC.

In Saturday's record-breaking victory, Sonny Round and Danny Feeny scored twice, with Round netting the first goal. Terry McKenna and Marcel Godino also scored, with Nick Kilkowski earning an assist.

Standout goalie Brian Feeny only had to make two saves, with Summit outshooting St. Joseph's 24-8.

In its June 2 TOC semifinal 11-4 win over fifth-seeded Ridge at Kean University in Union, Round and senior attackman John Scioscia netted three goals, Mike Ford and Tim Yager two and David Kalin one. Feeny made six saves.

For the first time, Summit repeated as conference, state and TOC winners in the same season.

The Hilltoppers were the top seed in all three tournaments this year.

In 1983, Gardi was also named assistant head coach to Joe Walton. Gardi was the defensive coordinator for the Jets for four seasons from 1981-1984. He was preceded by John Mazur and succeeded by Bud Carson.

From 1985 to 1990, Gardi served as an NFL assistant supervisor of officials, which included training and supervision of the league's officiating staff.

"Joe never forgot you on the way up," Wagner said. "I had a chance to go see him at Maryland and then the Jets and at Hofstra. I worked a couple of camps for him."

Gardi returned to coaching in 1990 when he took the head position at Hofstra. In his first year he led his team to a 10-0 regular season and advanced to the Division 3 playoffs where it lost in the semifinals.

In 1991, Hofstra began the transition process to Division 1-AA competition and played six 1-AA opponents and posted an 8-2 record.

The following season Hofstra played seven 1-AA foes and went 4-6.

The 1993 season was Hofstra's first as a full-fledged Division 1-AA team, with Gardi's Flying Dutchmen finishing 6-3-1. In 1994, Hofstra went 8-1-1 and was ranked 22nd in the nation in Division 1-AA.

In 1995, Hofstra lost in the first round of the playoffs to finish with a 10-2 record and a No. 10 national ranking.

In 1998 and 1999, Hofstra again advanced to the 1-AA quarterfinals and finished ranked fifth and seventh, respectively, in the national polls.

Hofstra was an Atlantic 10 Conference co-champion and Top 10-ranked team in 2001.

The 2005 season was Gardi's last. He finished his career at Hofstra with an impressive 119-62-2 (.658) mark in 16 seasons.

"One of the things that I'll cherish the most is that when he received the Distinguished American award from the Union County Interscholastic Athletic Conference I spoke on his behalf and was able to present him with the honor," Wagner said.

Wagner, who played end on defense and tight end and center on offense for Gardi, was in touch with him just recently.

"I spoke to Joe a couple of weeks ago about trying to set up a lunch date," Wagner said. "When Joe came to Roselle Park it was a great shot in the arm. He did a lot of great things for our town. It was a short stay, but he always did a lot and made an impact wherever he went. He will always be in my heart."

Al Zulewski replaced Gardi as the head coach at Roselle Park and then later coached at Harrison.

Dennis McCarthy of the North Arlington-based McCarthy Report - which rates the top football players in the state through print (his annual book that reports on freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors) and video - credits Gardi for being an inspiration for what he still loves to do.

"I spent a lot of time with Joe and members of his staff at Hofstra," McCarthy, 67, said. "Joe was part of the reason I got into scouting."

"He was an outstanding coach and one of the top football minds that I've come across in 55 years."

One of Gardi's top players at Hofstra that went on to star in the NFL was retired Jets wide receiver Wayne Chrebet out of Garfield High School.

"Joe Gardi was Hofstra football and a great guy," McCarthy said.

GL baseball posts a successful 23-8 campaign

BERKELEY HEIGHTS — After nine runs were scored during the first two innings - including three home runs - it appeared that both starting pitchers might be in for short outings and that a slugfest was on the way.

However, both hurlers settled down and from the third inning on it was baseball game, with the next pitch meaning more than the previous one.

Usually when a game is described a pitchers duel, you're talking about a 1-0, 2-1 or 3-2 result.

In a unique way, Spotswood's hold-on 7-5 triumph over Governor Livingston in the May 28 Central Jersey, Group 2 championship game turned out to be a battle of starting pitchers eventually matching zeros and ultimately going the distance.

Spotswood, paced by senior right hander Cody Pace, was just a little better than GL, which also received a fine effort from junior righty Mike Cranston.

In a 126-pitch, complete-game performance, Pace (5-2) tossed a nine-hitter that included three strikeouts and three walks. The lefty batter also helped his own cause by blasting a Cranston changeup for a two-out, two-strike, opposite field, insurance home run over the left field fence in the top of the sixth that extended the Charger advantage to 7-4.

On the mound, Pace found a way to get the job done after getting hit hard the first two innings.

"Sometimes it's not always the best all-around player that does it to you," said GL head coach Chris Roof, who has guided the Highlanders to three CJ, G2 finals during his seven-season tenure. "Pace showed tremendous heart and was tough as nails. Sometimes that happens."

After giving up a leadoff single in the bottom of the seventh to Mike Rielly, Pace grabbed a ball hit right back at him by Tyler Martis and turned around to start a huge 1-6-3 double play.

GL leadoff batter Billy Worswick then did well to come back from a 1-2 count to work out a walk and keep the Highlanders alive.

The game should have ended four pitches later when Joey DiSarno hit a routine ground ball to short on a 2-1 pitch. However, Spotswood shortstop Kevin Martin threw the ball low and past first baseman Mike Liming, who could not scoop it up.

That turned out to be only the second error in the game - both by Spotswood - and put runners on first and third, with GL still behind 7-4.

That was also the first time GL had a runner reach at least second base since Billy Worswick's one-out solo home run in the second pulled the Highlanders to within 5-4.

Standout senior left fielder Jake Skinner came to the plate next and was previously 0-for-2 with a walk. He popped up to first and then to left his last two times up.

A home run hitter who, obviously, would have loved to have connected for one there to tie the game, instead

Skinner hit a 1-0 pitch the other way to right field for an RBI-single, pulling GL to within 7-5 and putting runners at first and second.

"We fought together and became a family," Skinner said. "We relied on each other to make big plays."

"He had a heck of a state tournament," Roof said.

Skinner sacrificed trying to blast a home run - which is the most difficult way to hit one - for putting the bat on the ball and hitting a line drive instead possibly popping the ball up again. It worked as his opposite field run-scoring single gave the Highlanders another run and one more chance.

Cleanup batter and lefty swinging Paul Mirabella connected on an opposite field RBI-single to left against Pace to drive in GL's first run in the first inning. He next grounded out to second and looked at a third strike on the ninth pitch of his fifth-inning at-bat.

In the seventh, he swung at the first pitch he saw, had a good cut and hit it hard. Unfortunately for the Highlanders, the ground ball went right to second baseman Matt Mangarella, who threw to Liming at first to end the game.

Once again, GL came so close for the chance to win a game to get to get back to Toms River. The Highlanders also lost the CJ, G2 final at home last year, falling as the fourth seed to sixth-seeded Shore Regional 11-6 to wrap a highly-successful 20-8 campaign.

This time the fourth-seeded Highlanders concluded another fine season at 23-8, including an 11-3 mark for second place in the Mountain Division of the Union County Conference.

Spotswood, which improved to 14-12, won the section as the 11th seed, winning two games at home and two on the road. The Chargers of Middlesex County lost to South Jersey, Group 2 champion Audubon at Rutgers last Wednesday in a Group 2 semifinal. Third-seeded Audubon hung on at home to edge fourth-seeded Buena 4-3 in the May 28 South Jersey, Group 2 final. West Essex beat Audubon 2-1 last Saturday at Toms River South in the Group 2 state championship game.

GL, as the second seed, won at top-seeded Spotswood 6-1 in the 2006 GJ, G2 final and eventually reached the Group 2 state championship game at Toms River South.

In a 127-pitch, complete-game effort Cranston (8-3) allowed only seven hits, while striking out nine, walking four and hitting one batter. Unfortunately for GL, three of the seven hits he allowed were home runs.

Two of the round-trippers came in the first inning to give Spotswood a 5-0 lead. After an infield single by leadoff batter Pace, an opposite field single to right by Corey Brown and Mangarella grounding out to third, cleanup batter Liming drilled a shot that bounced on the top of the center field fence and over for a three-run homer.

Cranston then walked Shawn Weeks on five pitches, but got John Relay to ground out to second for the second out. Then designated hitter Anthony Pietanza hit a two-run homer over the left field fence to make it 5-3.

Cranston struck out Dean Vitale looking to end the first

and then settled down beginning with the second inning. He held Spotswood scoreless for the next five innings - from the last out of the first until two outs in the sixth - on just two hits before Pace's insurance home run.

One of the hits was an infield single by Pietanza leading off the sixth, with courtesy runner No. 23 coming around to score on Pace's home run. Spotswood's seven runs came on three home runs, with two of them two-run shots with two outs.

"That could have been any of our pitchers on the mound making those pitches," Roof said. "I didn't think they were bad pitches. Spotswood does not strike out that much and Mike was able to get nine strikeouts."

"Down 5-0 we showed character and the ability to fight to get back in it."

GL quickly came back to make it a 5-3 game with three runs in the bottom of the first. With one out, DiSarno produced a bloop single to center field, Skinner walked and then Mirabelli came through with his run-scoring hit. Mirabelli moved to second after his hit when the left fielder bobbled the ball for an error.

John Jennings followed with an RBI-sacrifice fly to center and then designated hitter and lefty batter Keith Skinner brought home Mirabelli with an RBI-double that bounced once and then over the center field fence.

What was interesting about Skinner's hit was that the infield umpire between second and first - with a much closer view of the blast - immediately waved his right arm around, signaling that it was a home run.

However, he was over-ruled by the home plate umpire, who - from much farther away - ruled that the ball bounced over the fence for a grounds rule double. Instead of GL closing to 5-4 on a two-run homer by Skinner, GL cut the deficit to 5-3 on an RBI-double by Skinner.

Part of the reason why GL did not advance a runner to second base from the second to the seventh inning was that two baserunners were gunned down by Spotswood catcher Weeks attempting to steal second base in the fourth and fifth innings.

Pace did not strike out a GL batter until he ended the fifth with his first. He found a way to get the batters out despite not being overpowering or having a super curveball or changeup.

"He settled in and pitched with his heart, which is not a knock on him," Jake Skinner said. "He didn't have amazing stuff. He just went after us and we didn't do enough."

"The best team doesn't always win," Roof said. "Give them credit, they made all the plays."

"We've won 43 games the past two years and reached this game both times."

"We'll get it one of these years."

NOTES: On the lineup card Spotswood waited to give GL literally moments before the first pitch, the team's record that was written down on it read 25-7 and the spelling of John Relay's last name was Ruzay. Interesting.

Fraudulent FEMA aid

Union County homeowners, renters and business owners who have registered for disaster assistance through the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency should beware of fraudulent individuals attempting to charge for an inspection.

Inspectors contracted by FEMA are contacting New Jersey residents applying for disaster assistance following the storms and flooding in mid-March.

The FEMA inspection is free. These inspectors have approved FEMA identification badges that

include the inspector's name and photo, and the name of the company under contract with FEMA.

The inspection generally takes 30 to 40 minutes, during which the inspector will assess disaster-related damage for both real and personal property and may take photos of the interior and exterior of the damaged dwelling.

The Earned Income Tax Credit is an additional tax credit available to working low-income families and varies in size depending on income level and the number of children in the home.


In addition to EITC, there are programs such as NJ Family Care, Food Stamps, and Women Infant and Children that are available to





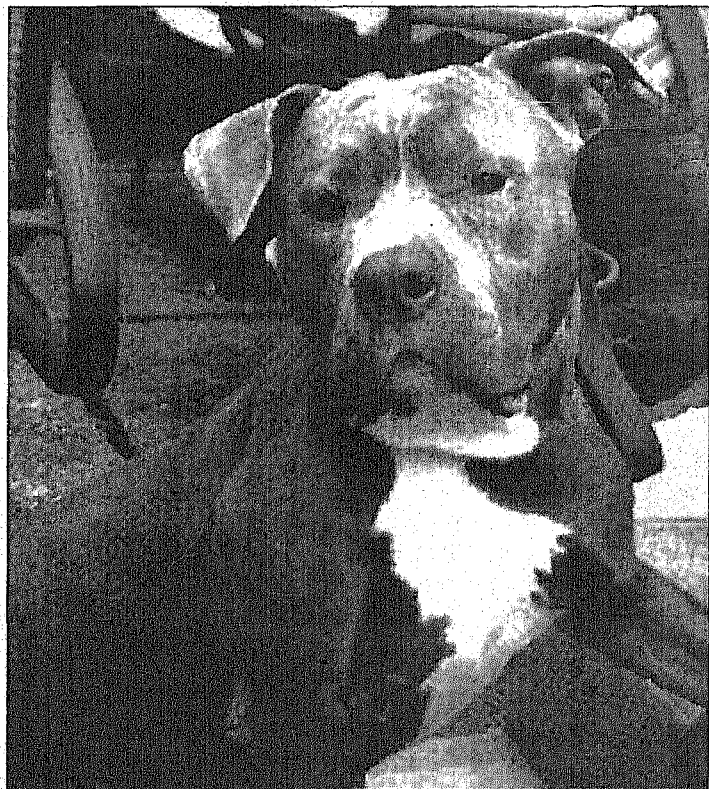

Firefighters battle Memorial Day blaze

ROSELLE — Memorial Day ended with a bang this year for local firefighters who responded to a blaze that broke out Monday night in a Linden Road residence.

Fire Chief Paul Mucha said first responders were met with "heavy fire conditions" upon arrival.

"They encountered a large volume of fire on the first floor. But we got in and got the fire under control fairly quickly," Mucha said. "They did a good job."

The two-alarm fire was reported at 10:21 p.m. Firefighters had the situation under control by 10:57 p.m. Four people had safely exited the house by the time firefighters arrived. However, a wheelchair-bound woman successfully exited the house, but suffered smoke inhalation and was transported to Trinitas Regional Medical Center

in Elizabeth, where she was treated and released. One firefighter suffered heat exhaustion and was also transported to Trinitas and later released. Mucha said the cause of the fire is still under investigation.

"It appears now to be accidental in nature," he said.

The house, a two and half story, single family dwelling, was left uninhabitable. Mucha said the family was able to relocate with relatives.

"I don't think it'll be torn down, but it has to be gutted and rehabbed," Mucha said of the structure.

Mutual aid units responded from Cranford, Linden and Elizabeth, and the road was closed as fire crews worked to extinguish the blaze and clear the scene.

"We had numerous apparatus blocking the roadway," Mucha said.
