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New engine makes a splash

ROSELLE PARK — Local fire crews are ready to tackle virtually any sort of emergency with the arrival of their latest piece of equip-

The department's newest vehicle, known as Rescue 1 by members of the department, was obtained in April through a \$349,000 FEMA grant for vehicle acquisition. The borough contributed matching funds in the amount of 10 percent of the grant.

According to Fire Chief Joseph Signorello, the grant application was written at the end of 2008 by department engineer Patrick Wirkus, who is now responsible for keeping the vehicle running and maintained.

Signorello said the process began coming together in early in 2009, and a committee was formed to explore possible purchases.

While to the layman, this vehicle may resemble a typical fire engine, it is adapted to a wider variety of rescue operations.

The boxy vehicle can transport six firefighters, whereas the older machine was limited to two. It contains a generator that can power lights to illuminate work scenes and carries rescue and hazardous materials equipment, including the hydraulic extraction machinery known as "the jaws of life."

Arrest made in connection with dismembered bodies in Linden

LINDEN - Three and a half months after six bags containing dismembered body parts were discovered on a quiet Linden residential street, an arrest has been made in the grisly murder.

Ruben Acosta, also known as Alejandro Mercedes, of Union City, who previously had been charged June 1 by Hudson County Prosecutor's Office with disposing of the body parts in Linden, was charged last week with killing Maria Torres, 48, and Lazaro Calero, 49, also of Union City.

The discovery of the remains occurred April 5 after a resident living on the corner of Cranford and Essex avenues called the Linden Department of Public Works to complain that six bags had been illegally dumped on in the street next to her home. The resident noted at the time that although bags of debris and leaves were often dumped in the street next to her home, this time the bags had swarms of flies surrounding them. When the DPW responded with a police officer, which is normal operating procedure when any bag or containers are dumped in the city, the bags were opened and the dismembered body parts were discovered.

Both the Union and Hudson County prosecutor's offices worked together on the murder investigation because while the bodies were discovered in Union County, Torres and Calero lived in Hudson County.

According to Hudson County First Assistant Prosecutor Guy Gregory, investigators believe Torres and

Calero were strangled in their home in Union City, dismembered and then transported in bags to Linden.

Gregory said an investigation of scientific evidence was taken from the crime scene which further linked Acosta to the apartment where the murders took place.

When Acosta was originally arrested on June 3 for allegedly removing the bodies from the apartment and disposing of them in Linden, police recovered a fake New York Police Department badge, a 9mm handgun, handcuffs and \$6,000 in cash.

The gun, according to Gregory, was stolen during a Feb. 1 home invasion in Linden, which resulted in the first charges against Acosta in Union County. Bail on those charges was set at \$1 million dollars.

Authorities in Union City viewed security camera videos from surrounding businesses in the area around Torres and Calero's apartment building, eventually determining that Acosta looked similar to a man making multiple trips from the murder victims' apartment building carrying bags.

Acosta made his first appearance in Central Judicial Processing Court in Jersey City on July 22 thorough a videolink from Hudson County Jail. Bail was set at \$1 million, cash only, for each of the murder charges. Total bail, including the first charge against Acosta from June 3, is \$2.75 million.

Gregory said the homicide investigation was the result of a joint effort between two counties.

"We have to give credit to the Union County Prosecutors office and Linden Police Department for their assistance in this case," Gregory said.

Delaire Nursing home residents raise funds for new bingo machine

LINDEN - Bingo tournaments at Delaire Nursing and Rehabilitation Center are going to be more intense than ever thanks to the addition of a new state-ofthe-art bingo machine.

A July 21 commemoration of the machine celebrated the purchase of the \$2,100 machine, which replaces a 20-year-old piece of equipment that nursing home officials described as dilapidated and "literally falling

Delaire's Director of Admission Jorge Cruz said the fundraising that made this event possible was organized by the home's new Resident Council President Jane

Koza, who is physically challenged, took on this task utilizing skills learned during her career as a business owner.

She helped run her familyowned restaurant in Rahway, a Hawaiian-style gift shop in Florida and later a stained glass business where she sold and showed her stained glass crafts and wares.

Koza said the bingo machine project presented little difficulty.

"They thought it would take a year to raise the money but I raised it in about six months,"

Teens charged with murder in beating death

SUMMIT teens were arrested in connection with the July 17 beating death of a 47-yearold Summit husband and father of four children. Charges against the suspects were upgraded Monday from manslaughter to Williams-Clark murder, according to authorities.

Abelino Mazaniego, 47, who came to the United States from El Salvador 13 years ago, was allegedly attacked around 9:30 p.m. as he sat on a bench in the Promenade off Springfield Avenue. The

Victim's nurse charged with theft

SUMMIT - On Monday, as the funeral of the man who was brutally beaten by teens and left to die took place, a nurse at Overlook Hospital was charged with stealing what may have been the victim's last paycheck.

Stephen Randolph, 39, of Flemington was on duty July 17 when emergency workers brought in Abelino Mazaniego, 47, of Summit who was suffering from severe head trauma, Union County Prosecutor Theodore J. Romankow announced in a press release Monday.

Last week it was revealed by the Prosecutor's Office that Mazaniego had been the victim of an

attack by three teenagers on the Promanade in the downtown business district, just steps from where he worked as a dishwasher in a restaurant. He never regained consciousness after the attack and died three days later.

The night of the attack, the press release explained, coincided with Mazaniego's regular payday. After family members told police that roughly \$640 was missing from his wallet, an investigation was launched by Summit Police that led them to Randolph.

Three teens have been charged with murder in Mazaniego's death and that investigation is ongoing. Randolph has been charged with third degree

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

Hearing on cell tower plan will continue in September

UNION — T-Mobile will have to wait until September before the Zoning Board of Adjustment decides whether or not it can erect a 120-foot cell tower in the Five Points section of the township.

On Sept. 16, T-Mobile and residents will have one last opportunity to present their case for and against the application before the board makes its final decision.

T-Mobile radio frequency expert Ben Sidfar said the tower is needed because the company needs to provide seamless signal coverage for its customers.

The proposed site of the tower is behind the Food King on Galloping Hill Road, which is a business-retail zone. However, the area abuts the residential area of Walton Avenue, which branches into a larger residential area. The site is privately owned but because of township zoning laws, T-Mobile needs variances for height and side-yard restrictions.

Expert witnesses appearing on behalf of T-Mobile continued testifying July 21 along with a steady stream of residents who made it clear that regardless of the number of expert witnesses, they did not want a tower in their neighborhood.

"Is there a magical pill you can take to flush the radiation from you," Matt Ballaster, spokesperson for many of the residents, asked T-Mobile Compliance consultant Daniel Collins.

Collins explained that the amount of radio frequency emissions from the cell tower would be far below the Federal Communications Commission standard.

"It is less than one-tenth of one percent of the FCC's standard, or 1,400 times below the FCC's regulation," Collins said, adding that T-Mobile's tower emission would also be 7,000 times below the state standard.

Ballaster countered this, claiming he had information from the Internet about a tower of similar size that "was suppose to emit RFs below the FCC standard but when privately tested, actually registered 250 times the limit."

"You can't possibly get to 250 times the limit," Collins responded, pointing out that if something goes

wrong with the tower, "it's electronics, there can't be a power surge, it just goes to zero."

Residents, though, continued to fire questions at Collins based on information they gathered from the Internet or from witnesses that were not present at the hearing. Board Attorney Robert J. Pansulla said this type of information was hearsay and not admissible.

Resident Chris Florian did not get far when attempting to admonish T-Mobile for trying to erect a large tower adjacent to a residential area, because Pansulla quickly interjected.

"The FCC sets the standards," he said, stressing that information residents were providing was "beyond the purview of this board."

"It doesn't do you or them any good to go into areas beyond their scope and ours," the attorney said, urging residents to ask questions related only to the expert's particular testimony.

Marc Traum of Mercer Avenue was perplexed over how little homework T-Mobile did before deciding to erect a new tower.

"I'm very surprised that T-Mobile didn't reach out to their own subscribers to see what kind of service they have," he said, adding that he uses T-Mobile for his cell phone and experienced "great service" without the proposed additional tower.

But resident Augusto Fernandez felt those against the proposed tower were getting the short end of the stick.

"We are taking the word of their experts. It's lopsided — who is here to represent us," he asked, pointing out that there was no one to counter the expert witnesses on the residents' behalf.

When residents were allowed to approach the microphone during the public comment portion of the meeting, one resident told the board they had one obligation.

"Your job is to watch out for Union residents, not T-Mobile," he told the board.

Matt Ballaster, who represented the bulk of residents present, summed up how they felt overall.

"We heard a lot of testimony on this, but you are the shepherds and we are the sheep, you are here to protect us," Ballaster told the board. SAVE · 31/2% SALES

Roselle man could be facing life sentence

A jury found a Roselle man guilty on July 22 of two armed robberies that occurred in January of 2009, according to Union County Prosecutor Theodore J. Romankow.

Benjamin Capers, 37, had been accused in two separate armed robberies of neighborhood grocery stores in Elizabeth and Linden, according to Assistant Prosecutor Patricia Cronin, who prosecuted the

According to the investigation, on Jan. 12, 2009, Capers entered the Makim Market on Grier Avenue in Linden. There, he produced a handgun and ordered the owner of the store to empty the register, said Cronin. On Jan. 28, 2009, Capers went to the Summer Street News and Food Store in Elizabeth, where he again produced a handgun and demanded money from the owner.

The owner of the second store called 9-1-1 and was able to relay the license plate of Caper's vehicle. Within a few minutes, the car was spotted by Elizabeth police officers and a chase ensued into Essex County, where Capers eventually crashed his vehicle into a barrier on a highway entrance. Capers then fled on foot, running across Route 78, but was eventually caught by officers, said Cronin.

Capers faces life in prison when he is sentenced on Aug.



Donors must weight 120 pounds and be in general good health. There is no upper age limit for donors provided they meet health requirements. Donors should bring a signed or picture form of identification and know their social security number. Donors should eat a meal one hour before donating and drink plenty of water. People with a fever or sore throat should wait until they are feeling better before donating, and there is a 24hour deferral for teeth cleanings and fillings. On Friday, authorities arrested Nigel Dumas, 19, of Morristown, two days after charging Summit residents Khayri Williams-Clark, 18, and a 17-year-old, whose identity was not available because of his age. All three are being held in Union County, according to the press release. The 17-year-old is being held in the county juvenile detention center. Williams-Clark is being held on \$100,000 bail, while Dumas is being detained on \$250,000 bail.

As of press time Tuesday morning, Dumas' first appearance in court had not been set.

Romankow said the arrests followed investigation by the Union County Homicide Task Force and the Summit Police Department.

The prosecutor also said the attack was recorded by a teenager present during the assault, but not charged in the attack.

The video made national news last week when it was shown on an ABC television news broadcast.

Romankow said in the July 21 press release that authorities believe a video of the beating was circulat-

ed among teenagers in Summit. Investigators, he said, continue to gather and examine evidence as well as take witness statements in this active case that will be referred to the Grand Jury.

At a press conference July 22, Mayor Jordon Glatt repeated the information reported by the Prosecutor's Office, but would not take questions, noting there still was an ongoing investigation.

The Summit Interfaith Council issued a statement in response to the death of the Summit resident, saying it was "the blood of one of our neighbors."

"We cannot know what prompted the perpetrators of this crime to act as they did...We want our young people to know that there are many resources available for them in our community," a statement from the the Summit Interfaith Council said.

Captain claims he was passed over for police chief position

(Continued from Page 3) officials wished to terminate the DPW employee.

Phillips was the highest-ranking member of the Kenilworth Police Department when Police Chief William Dowd announced in March that he would be retiring. Phillips was the only captain on the force at the time, and superior officer to Grady, a former lieutenant. Phillips was on the department eight years longer than Grady, who took over as chief earlier this

The suit alleges that this is contrary to how the borough handled the appointment of the the last six chiefs of police. Phillips, the suit maintains, was qualified for the job and because he was not moved into the chief position, his rank and compensation have been adversely

Phillips alleges that because he objected to and refused to participate in providing false testimony against a fellow borough employee, which he believed it to be a violation of the law, his superiors and others "have engaged in continuous and increased forms of harassment." For example, the lawsuit said, Grady took away the unmarked police vehicle Phillips used since he was made captain in 2001. This and other actions, the lawsuit indicated, resulted in emotional distress and monetary losses for Phillips.

In 2009 the Borough Council began reviewing the promotions procedure in the Police Department. After discussing various ways in which this could be done over multiple meetings, the governing body eventually replaced a test approved by the New Jersey Chiefs Association with a test by the local police chief.

Calls to Phillips, members of the Borough Council and the attorneys representing them were not returned by press time Tuesday.


The simple response for parents is this: There are plenty of activities available within easy reach this summer. It's only a matter of taking advantage of them.

istening to the proactive response

These continue to be tough times in local government. From the angry citizen outburst over a budget at a Linden City Council meeting, to the fatal beating of an El Salvador national in a Summit park, to the tricky budget moves in Cranford, the elected officials are feeling the heat. They can identify with the Sunday morning bikers pushing up the 90-degree angle deer path road in Mountainside. It seems to just get steeper.

In Linden, officials were a little taken back by the anger of citizens facing the double hit of cutback in services coupled with rising taxes.

Mayor Jordan Glatt in Summit has taken a lead in denouncing the punks who fatally assaulted the hard-working immigrant sitting in a park. He rightfully asserts that this in no way represents the quality of his community. The mass on Monday showed how the residents came together after the tragedy.

The rough times in Cranford were etched in the faces of Municipal Clerk Tara Rowley and Busi-Administrator Marlena Schmidt, who have an unwilling front row seat to the impact of budget cuts. These hard-working civil servants knew that before the end of the last township meeting, many of their co-workers would face furloughs of seven days to make up shortfalls.

The flashpoint was a relatively small gimmick by township officials to set up a separate bill for sewer costs, which was a clever way to circumvent the strict cap they were battling. The same move in Springfield a few weeks ago passed without notice.

Former Cranford Mayor Ed Force, no fan of the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority, spoke to the

need for a fairer system to assess sewer fees than merely the assessed value of a home. Assessments don't translate to more water flow. When the bill was part of the municipal tax levy and hence a write off, it wasn't such a big deal.

It was at this point that the commissioners unleashed a heavy dose of rhetoric to cover the scam. Mark Dugan, who in part referred to the move as "an accounting move," started saying the "I don't disagree" a double negative response to Force's assertions. To sugar-coat the scam, Dugan announced that, "my preference would be a system based on use." Preferences aside, residents can look forward to paying a separate bill for the sewer fee.

This evening, Dugan was getting a run for his money in terms of rhetorical excess. Andy Kalinas, Smith's new running mate, has already mastered the "corp. double speak" technique at meetings. His remarks included three times calling on the township to be "proactive," describing the "structure of government" and that old standby of working toward "long-term solutions." Heck, with furloughs and angry taxpayers, for Cranford, long-term is now.

Under the cross examinationlike questions of Kevin Campbell, a Democratic candidate for Township Committee, it was clear this Township Committee had taken the easier road of juggling the books as opposed to making the tough, very painful choices they like to speak

about at their swearing-in ceremonies in January.

Give an assist to Township Attorney Carl Woodward III who lectured the citizenry that the cost, from his own personal experience, was low and the fees are much higher in other communities. With a smile he looked over at Mayor Mark Smith for approval for his efforts. The citizens could also be unfair. Library costs and pension costs were beyond local control. Last year the effort to lay off one police offer and a firefighter resulted in an angry citizen outcry which included the state PBA, county prosecutor and a bevy of relatives and friends of Public Safety Department personnel. The motto should be, "we want our cake and we want to eat it too.'

Dugan's rhetorical excesses weren't done. He says he is already working on next year's budget. He boldly announced "there is much work to be done." One citizen angrily proclaimed that we should just set up a string of authorities or special use fees so that taxes could go through the roof.

When Ruth Ann Della Sera, on behalf of the furloughed workers, asked the simple question about some details on the layoffs, Dugan fumbled for a response until Schmidt jumped in that while the legal notices over the furloughs had been sent, the details hadn't been worked out. By this point, the citizens had already begun filing out of the meeting. The separate sewer tax bill was now a reality, the furloughs were going to happen. Give Dugan and his colleagues credit. They sure know how to be proactive.

Consider some 'innovative' options

Linden City Council was finally presented with the 2010 municipal budget for consideration by the Personnel and Finance Committee in mid-June, over three months later than it should have been. The potential impact to homeowners was devastating. With all the time it By Richard Koziol took to develop this budget, when finally presented, I saw very little, if any, significant, innovative, outside-the-box thinking to reduce our municipal spending.

If this council is serious about reducing spending and stabilizing our municipal tax rate, we should immediately look into previously discussed areas of savings and consolidation outlined in reports submitted by the City Council Munici-Consolidation Committee specifically charged to do so over the past several years.

Over the past several years, there have been suggestions to chip away slowly at our ever-increasing fiscal burden. But very few initiatives have been embraced by this administration which would bring positive change at a level to significantly decrease Linden's municipal taxes. We can eliminate parttime benefits and establish layoff plans, but we can also consider options which can save the city considerably more.

In Linden's budgeting process, the city utilizes a zero-based budget process, which is a method of budgeting in which all expenses must be justified for each new period. Zero-based budgeting starts from a "zero base" and every function within an organization is analyzed for its needs and costs. The problem is, we apply no financial ceiling, allowing for budgetary add-ons and departmental statusquo. We must initiate a strict zerobased budget process with a predetermined financial ceiling for next year, and work within it with personnel, salary, benefits, operational costs, etc. When we hit that ceiling, we simply stop spending.

We can also utilize performance-based budgeting in which our municipality will measure departmental performance and use those performance measures to evaluate budget requests. Either way, I believe a reformed budgetary pro-

cedure is essential to accurately estimate expenditures and control spending. Council should strongly consider the full and complete consolidation of the Municipal Garage and DPW under one roof - allowing for the closing of one municipal facility, saving operational maintenance, utilities, etc. We can consolidate the personnel and operations of the Public Property department and close a second municipal facility, namely the Old City Hall. In doing so, we could apply to the NJ State Historic Trust for historic preservation designation and benefits for a building which should almost certainly meet the criteria. We should consolidate in their entirety the operations of the garage, Public Property and Public Works into divisions, under a Municipal Operations umbrella with established oversight to ensure their reciprocity.

The size of our workforce is being reduced annually through attrition, but we allow our existing departmental structure to remain. We should re-organize departments to re-purpose our current workforce and establish inter-departmental cooperation and resource-sharing, by cross-training and cross-utilizing our labor force between various departments.

Even with our reduced compliments, we should never have to sacrifice municipal services due to a lack of personnel.

If we're going to be serious in affecting change to reduce spending, it is imperative that the current administration and council consider the following recommendations:

- · Pursue cooperative initiatives with other municipalities, similar to the Interlocal Recycling agreement with Rahway.
- · Reduce future debt service with only the most necessary bond-

- · Work to end lengthy, ongoing litigation.
- · Limit or eliminate departmental overtime except for emergen-
- · Revise all department's tables of organization and better define positions and responsibilities.
- · Perform departmental evaluations of all personnel and assess and justify the need for each position. And per that assessment, reestablish department compliments based on current personnel.
- · Consider outsourcing of services in areas determined to be costineffective.
- · Develop a multi-year plan earmarking infrastructure improvements to offset reactionary spend-
- · Include significant employee medical benefit contributions in any future bargaining unit negotiations, to keep pace with rising costs.
- Aggressively seek out and solicit new ratables and redevelop-
- · Examine and assess our Worker's Comp Loss-Ratio, establish new thresholds, and demand that Department heads meet the criteria.
- · Ensure employee accountability with strict time-sheet evaluation.
- · Develop an in-house IT department to improve our technology and networking ability.
- · Review our spending on all outside vendors, engineers and consultants, ensuring the service provided matches the compensation.
- · Merge our Zoning and Planning boards into a combined Land Use Board

The City Council Municipal Consolidation Committee, which I chaired three years ago, worked diligently to review our governmental structure for efficiency, and brought many recommendations to Council.

Unfortunately, many remain unaddressed. To reduce our city's tax burden, this administration and council have to look at these and additional innovative solutions, and we need to do it immediately.

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

meeting officially opened, the administrator handed out a resolution addition to the agenda accepting the resignation of Capt. Davis. This was sprung on everyone without any prior notification by the mayor and

clearly done so that not even the other committee members were aware of it before the meeting.

If there was any question as to whether Capt, Davis

intended to resign, the mayor or administrator could have approached him at any time, since he canceled his vacation to continue working and assist Capt. Riley who was assigned as OIC by the Union County Prosecutor's Office when they took over command of our PD. Capt. Davis spoke on his own behalf and bluntly stated he has no intention of retiring.

The UCPO sent a letter to each council member recommending Capt. Mayor Shehady's actions show a lack of maturity and he is displaying arrogance with his refusal to recognize that a Township Committee form of government is not one where he makes every decision but is done in a collective manner with the other township committee members. The mayor has embarrassed our community with his behavior and the residents should be aware of his actions.

- Liberty Gas Terminal, from a Linden administration source: "The natural gas will be transported by ocean floor pipelines to our Linden pipeline that supplies gas to the East Coast. We will receive a host benefit fee, (not given), in lieu of taxes." From a Liberty Gas Terminal Press Release: "Existing pipelines at the Linden area interconnections, the Liberty Gas System can begin serving up to 2.4 billion cubic feet a day to major markets by late 2011. Liquefied natural gas is a form of super-chilled natural gas that reaches below 259 degrees Fahrenheit. The \$550 million LNG project will be in U.S. Federal waters offshore New Jersey."
- Blue Ocean Terminal, from an administration source: "This is another proposed liquefied natural gas floating terminal. Tankers will unload their product and the terminal will store and convert the liquefied natural gas. An ocean pipeline will transport it to a connection point in Linden. We will receive a host community benefit fee, (not given), in lieu of taxes." From the Blue Ocean Energy Exxon/Mobil Project: "Project will have the capacity to supply about 1.2 billion cubic feet of natural gas per day. The floating terminal cost is expected to exceed \$1 billion, and will be anchored to the ocean floor in about 150 feet of water. In 2009 Exxon/Mobil reported a record \$45.2 billion in profit.
- Other future pipelines through Linden: From Inside Indiana Business: "A proposed ethanol pipeline would run from North Dakota, to Linden, New Jersey. It is estimated that 3.6 million gallons of ethanol a year will be carried in the pipeline. Cost estimates of the project are around \$4.25 billion, with a loan guarantee from the Department of Energy to make the project a reality, with an estimated completion date of 2014. To quote Teddy Roosevelt, "Delay is preferable to error."

Other current Linden chemical facilities include: Conoco Phillips "Bayway Refinery," which converts crude oil into gasoline, diesel fuel, jet fuel and heating oil; Infineum, a joint venture of Exxon Mobil and Shell; Linden Cogeneration Plant, owned by El Paso Energy and Buckeye Pipeline Company.

Large-scale wiretap led to several arrests Heroin kingpin brought 250 kilos into United States annually

Alejandro Cleves who served as the kingpin of a notorious drug ring that was responsible for bringing upwards of 250 kilos heroin into the United States annually, was sentenced to 32 years in state prison after he pled guilty to a charge of 1st degree leader of a narcotics trafficking network on July

Cleves, 30, was born in Medellin, Colombia but moved to Union County when he was 7years-old. He continued to reside in the county until 2003, when he fled to South America, to avoid prosecution on drug distribution charges. After nearly three years on the run, he was arrested by Colombian officials in August 2008.

Assistant Union County Prosecutor Jo-Ann Miller handled the case for the state.

Theodore Prosecutor Romankow spoke at the sentencing and noted that Cleves, through his drug network ruined hundreds of lives and caused untold pain and heartache for people and families who were exposed to the illegal

"His cesspool of poison spread through Union County," said Romankow. "Mr. Cleves was nothing but a purveyor of drugs."

Union County Superior Court Judge Scott J. Movnihan sentenced Cleves to 32 years in prison and remarking on the flow of illegal drugs, said it was like Cleves "came

into our county and set off a dirty bomb."

During sentencing Cleves' attorney agreed with the prosecutor and told the judge that his client 'accepts full responsibility" and "broke his contract with society."

Cleves

In early 2005, the Union County Prosecutors Office in conjunction with the Drug Enforcement Administration conducted one of the largest and most successful wiretaps in New Jersey law enforcement history - a wiretap investigation that resulted in 21 people being charged under indictment. It was through those investigations that police learned the existence and identity of Cleves.

The cases concerning all other co-defendants have resulted in convictions with sentences of up to 24 vears in prison.

> In fact, Romankow traveled to Colombia in 2008 and discussed Colombian Attorney General, members of the of the Colombian National Police and members of the United States Drug Enforcement Administration based in Colombia.

> "We were convinced they shared our assessment of how significant Cleves was to heroin distribution in New Jersey. Colombian officials were impressed with the quantity and quality of heroin Cleves had been smuggling into the United States and committed their help in apprehending him," said Romankow.

> The break came on Aug. 11, 2008 when Cleves was arrested without incident by law enforcement officials in Medellin. After days of surveillance, agents were able to positively identify Cleves as the major heroin trafficker wanted in the United States. The investigation initially focused on Wilson Valdez of Elizabeth, who was a

tap of two telephones grew to 54 telephones, and detectives learned over the last several years to get that Valdez was only one of at least four or five major traffickers in Union and Essex counties who were receiving kilogram quantities of heroin from Cleves. After invesapprehension efforts with the tigators raided Cleves' mother's house in Union, they discovered more than \$300,000 in cash. Nidia Roldan, Cleves' mother, later pled guilty to money laundering.

Even after the arrest of his close associates and family in New Jersey in 2005, Alejandro Cleves continued to operate his international drug distribution network. Members of the Union County Prosecutor's Office and other law enforcement agencies continued to track his activities and ultimately conducted an additional wiretan in 2007 where Alejandro Cleves was again identified as the primary source of supply for a New Jersey based heroin distribution organization. The drugs brought into New Jersey from Colombia were distributed throughout New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania, according to prosecutors. It is estimated that Valdez distributed between 3 and 6 kilos of heroin, supplied by Cleves, was worth approximately \$1 mil- major heroin and cocaine trafficker as well as significant amounts of

in the U.S. What started as a wire- cocaine every week during his dubious tenure. The wiretap investigation was conducted with the full support and cooperation of the United States Drug Enforcement Administration and the Colombian Attorney General's Office.

The wiretap was originated through leads developed by Union County Prosecutor's Office. During the four months the wiretap was in effect, more than 60 detectives from the UCPO and other federal, state and local agencies monitored the conversations around the clock.

The investigation also revealed the involvement of a New Jersey State Trooper in the drug ring.

Moises Hernandez used his position as an undercover agent for the state to warn Valdez that he was under surveillance. In April 2006, Hernandez pled guilty to money laundering, witness tampering, conspiracy and official misconduct and was sentenced to 24 years in prison. The investigation continued into the conduct of another State Trooper assigned to the Narcotics Unit. Detective Brian Holmes was arrested and later convicted by a jury of 1st degree distribution of cocaine for his role in stealing five kilograms of cocaine from a State Police Seizure, Romankow added.



The festival brings together a wide variety of attractions and vendors. It begins with the County Fair at MusicFest on September 8, including a carnival featuring 20 different rides and other attractions and continues through September 12.

September 11 begins with the "Rock On! Walkathon," a 5k walk/run to raise funds to fight cancer through the international Love, Hope, Strength Foundation. Proceeds will also benefit The Valerie Fund, a major children's cancer research foundation based in New Jersey.

Contributions from a variety of businesses and nonprofit sponsors allow people to attend free of charge.

"MusicFest has become a major regional event that attracts top notch, internationally known talent," said Freeholder Chairman Daniel P. Sullivan. "The arts are an engine for economic growth in New Jersey, and MusicFest is one of the many ways in which we help to build a thriving arts scene in Union County and beyond."

Clark Mayor Sal Bonaccorso said the town is looking forward to the event and received great cooperation from the county

Individual sponsors receive free onsite parking, complimentary afternoon barbeque and drink tickets, access to a viewing stand and free unlimited carnival rides. Individual sponsorships are available for one day of performances at \$150, or both days at \$250. Friends of MusicFest is administered by the Union County Performing Arts Center, a MusicFest partner organi-



Rahway's Romeo earns Hall of Fame recognition

RAHWAY - The last time Rahway baseball was at the top of the hierarchy in Union County was 1990. At that time, Paul O'Neill played for the Cincinnati Reds, we of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y. in 2001 and is also were about to see Joe Pesci first in Goodfellas and then the New Jersey 17-and-under State Chairman for one month later in Home Alone and the New York Giants were on their way to winning their second Super Bowl.

Romeo is a 1990 Ratiway graduate wito went on to play at Union County College, FDU-Teaneck and Kean College. Caffrey is a 1991 Rahway grad who was inducted into The American Youth Baseball Hall

Caffrey introduced Romeo to the crowd in During that time 20 years ago, the Rahway High attendance, speaking of his accomplishments and what a great teammate he was.

"I do remember playing with Jim and the key word he used was intensity," Romeo said. "We just kind of played by that. We played the game what we thought was the right way and just played hard every day.'

When Romeo played his legion ball, Rahway had just senior legion. He played four years and was an allstar every season. His final legion season was in 1991. Romeo was also a First Team All-Union County selection in high school.

"I think it was as meaningful as the spring season," Romeo said. "Any time you took the field it was meaningful. Then when you heard the word 'tournament' toward the end of the season it made it that much more meaningful and you wanted to make it to the tournament.

"The site where we ended up playing was Linden every year, so it was a goal of ours to get back there after we had gone the first year and play teams from

As Rahway's leadoff batter, he struck out just once during the 1990 season which is a record that still stands today. A superior defensive shortstop, Romeo played the entire 1990 season without committing an error.

This summer, Romeo's junior legion squad went 8-8-0 in the regular season for 16 points and seventh place and was then defeated by Linden 10-5 in the first round of the league playoffs.

Romeo earned junior legion Coach of the Year honors this year and previously in 2005.

Romeo has been the varsity coach at Rahway since 2006, which was the same year he started Rahway's sophomore legion squad. Rahway presently fields sophomore and junior legion teams during the summer.

"It was kind of difficult because I didn't have coaches to coach the team," Romeo said of starting the sophomore legion team. "You want to try to build a feeder program to try to get as many kids involved as you can.

"Most of my middle school players were playing up, a lot of 6th, 7th and 8th graders, and we haven't won too many games in that division, but it was just something that you feel like you have to start.

"If you want to build anything or have any type of consistency throughout the program you have to start there. For me it's worked out well."

Rahway's varsity went 7-13-1 this past spring as a member of the Union County Conference's upper Watchung Division. The Indians will be situated in the middle division next season, which is the Mountain Division.

Getting kids to gain more experience during the summer in legion ball still has a value.

"Right now it's probably more important to us because of all the (economic) cuts and we're losing some middle school sports," Romeo said. "This is turning into, if I lose my 15-and-under (sophomore legion) team now, they may not have 6th, 7th and 8th grade baseball either.

"It's a big jump from 6th grade until they wait to get to 9th grade to play on the JV team or possibly the varsity team, which makes having legion baseball big. I hope I can continue. "I have a good coach in place now, who is a Rahway graduate, JP Hamel, who is doing a good job of coaching the (sophomore legion) team.

"He's got a good temperament and a good demeanor and the kids play hard for him, so it's worked out well."

Rahway Athletic Director Tom Lewis was also on hand to see Romeo earn the recognition that was bestowed him.

"It's an honor to the Rahway public schools to have Lou Romeo, who is a true professional as our baseball coach," Lewis said. "He's had an outstanding playing career as well as coaching.

"Obviously, we're not a program that has the athletes coming through like some of the bigger schools, but we've been competitive and good and his demeanor and composure is above and beyond.

"This is a real tribute to Coach Romeo and I offer congratulations not only for Lou Romeo but for the community of Rahway."



Union Catholic has successful summer

A successful summer season came to a conclusion for Union Catholic Vikings Baseball's Junior American Legion team Sunday after it was downed by Cherry Hill 4-2 in double-elimination District 3 Tournament play at Union Catholic High School in Scotch Plains.

Cherry Hill, which lost to Matawan 3-2 in its first game Saturday, will next play in Monday's 2 p.m. game against the loser of Sunday's Watchung Hills-Tabernacle contest.

Vikings Baseball was one of two teams from the Union County League to advance to District 3, with regular season champion Watchung Hills being the other.

In its first District 3 game at Union Catholic on Saturday, Vikings Baseball was defeated by Mount Holly 11-4.

Pitching a fine game for Vikings Baseball Sunday was left hander Rich Birch, who pitched on the Union Catholic varsity this past spring as a junior. In an 82-pitch, six-inning stint, Birch tossed a complete-game, four-hitter that included three strikeouts, just one walk and one hit batter. Because of three Vikings Baseball errors, only one of the four runs he allowed were earned.

"Every time Rich has gone out for us he's pitched well," Vikings Baseball coach John Becht said. "He's had a great summer pitching and he's a leader too. "The team reacts when he's on the mound. He pitched great today."

Birch pitched perfect second and sixth innings and retired the last five batters he faced. He also fielded his position well, coming up with three 1-3 assists in three chances. Of the 24 batters he faced, only eight reached base. Birch picked off the final batter that reached base against him, with the baserunner who was attempting to steal second tagged out on a 1-3-4 play.

"A couple of guys really stepped up for us pitching-wise this year," Becht said. "We're a young team, so young pitching is needed everywhere, so that was a good sign."

Vikings Baseball finished 7-9-0 for 14 points in the regular season before excelling in the league playoffs. As the ninth seed, the squad first won at eighth-seeded Westfield 7-1 in the first round and then knocked off top-seeded Watchung Hills 5-1 in the quarterfinals at Rahway's Veterans Field. Watchung Hills finished a league-best 13-1-0 for 26 points and received a first-round bye.

Then Vikings Baseball was defeated by 12th-seeded and eventual champion Elizabeth 7-1 in the semifinals at Veteran's Field.

Including a 2-1 record in the league playoffs and an 0-2 mark in District 3, Vikings Baseball went 9-12-0 for this legion season.

"We're a young team and I figured we would be right around .500," said Becht, who last year guided Vikings Baseball to the league's playoff championship

"We finished the regular season 7-9 and had a couple of injuries and lost in the districts today 4-2 to a really good team."

The No. 1 injury was to catcher Mike D'Antico, who will be a sophomore at Union Catholic in the fall. He hurt himself and was lost for the season before the league playoffs began.

"He played a little varsity catcher this year," Becht said. "He hyperextended his elbow and I think he just got cleared this past week by the doctors. He'll play a little AAU the rest of the way and at least he'll get some at-bats in fall ball and stuff like that."

Roselle reaches final of tourney

RAHWAY – After Elizabeth struggled to win just four games during the regular season, the 12th seed for the Union County Junior American Legion playoffs began to play its best baseball of the season.

Ultimately, it was good enough for Elizabeth to go on and capture – despite being the second-lowest seed – its first junior legion playoff crown.

Behind another outstanding pitching performance, this time by right hander Joe Torres who tossed a one-hitter, Elizabeth was decisive in its 11-1, five-inning victory over second-seeded Roselle Post 229 in Monday night's championship game at Veterans Field.

After going 4-11-0 for eight points to finish 12th in the 13-team Union County League, Elizabeth was the 12th and second-to-last seed for the playoffs.

Elizabeth went 4-0 in the league playoffs, winning four games in five days. First came a 7-3 win at fifth-seeded Scotch Plains Thursday, followed by an 11-8 win over fourth-seeded Union in Saturday's fourth and final quarterfinal at Veterans Field. Then Elizabeth eliminated ninth-seeded Union Catholic 7-1 in Sunday's first semifinal at Veterans Field.

Elizabeth outscored four foes by an impressive margin of 36-13.

Torres went 2-0 in the playoffs, also beating Scotch Plains.

"This feels great," said Torres, who allowed only two baserunners in five innings Monday night – one on a walk and one on a hit to right field. He struck out six, three swinging and three looking.

"We didn't have a good season, but we came back in the playoffs," Torres said. "We believed. We started playing well the first game of the playoffs. Our defense came alive and our hitters got hot at the right time."

Torres pitched perfect first, third and fifth innings and said his fastball worked best for him. The only run he allowed was on a wild pitch he threw with two outs in the bottom of the fourth.

Scoring for Roselle on the wild pitch was Fernando Cortes, who led off the inning with his team's only hit. The only other Roselle batter to reach base was Ryan Sheekey when he walked on a 3-2 count with two outs in the second.

Torres was in control the entire game, with Elizabeth giving him a 2-0 lead in the top of the second and then a 4-0 cushion by scoring two more runs in the third.

After Roselle made it 4-1 with its lone run in the fourth, Elizabeth put the game away in the fifth with seven runs on six hits against three Roselle pitchers.

Because Elizabeth kept Roselle off the scoreboard in the fifth, the game ended as a result of the league's 10-run mercy rule.

Roselle's lineup included Brendan Cross batting leadoff in left field, Cortes second at shortstop, Mark Giacalone third at third base, righty starting pitcher Matt Marques cleanup, Harry Uhrig fifth at second base, Sheekey sixth at first base, Gabe Reyes seventh at designated hitter for catcher Pedro Gomez, Steven Bara eighth in right field and Isiah Echavalian ninth in center field.

Other Roselle players included Carl Guillone, Fernando Diaz, Ryan Van Vliet, Mike Vanderveker, Javier Lopez, Tom Fitzpatrick and Geo Maldonado.

"This is a Cinderella story, that's all I can say," said Torres, who will be a sophomore at Elizabeth in the fall. He played on the Elizabeth freshman team this past spring.

In the second inning, Alex Reyes drove in Elizabeth's first run on a 4-6 fielder's choice and then Josh Felix followed with an opposite field RBI-single he smoked down the right field line.

Johnny Padilla stroked an RBI-double to left and then Socrates Cruz produced an RBI-single to center to make it 4-0 in the third.

Hitting safely in the fifth inning for Elizabeth were Christian Reyes with an opposite field single to left, Andrew Torres with a single to center, Padilla with an RBI-single down the left field line, Cruz with a two-run double over the center fielder's head, No. 9 batter Jason Haines with a two-run single past the third baseman and Christian Reyes again with an opposite field two-run single to left.

All nine Elizabeth starters scored – with courtesy runner Felix Anderson running for Cruz and scoring in the fifth – while eight of the nine hit safely. The only one that didn't was No. 6 batter Alex Reyes, who was 0-for-3, but scored his team's second run after reaching on his 4-6 fielder's choice in the first. All nine starters reached base.

Leadoff batter Joe Torres was 1-for-3, with an infield hit, a run and a walk; No. 2 batter Christian Reyes was 2-for-3, with a sacrifice bunt, a single and a run and a two-run single and No. 3 batter Andrew Torres was 1-for-3, with a single and a run and a walk.

Cleanup batter Padilla – who was named the playoff MVP – was 3-for-4, with a single and a run, and RBI-double and a run and an RBI-single and a run.

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

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
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

Low Natural Gas Prices Draw More Players to the Game

By Gina Diorio

Choice is at very heart of consumerism. Americans shop for cars or decide what food to buy knowing that choice is what drives competition and gives them leverage as consumers.

Yet when it comes to natural gas and electricity, many consumers set their thermostats and flick their light switches without ever considering choice of these commodities.

Under the Electric Discount and Energy Competition Act of 1999 (EDECA), New Jersey consumers have been free to shop around for energy providers for more than a decade. The act separated utility bills into supply and delivery components, opening the former to competition and allowing consumers to shop for their natural gas and electricity at competitive prices.

According to an energy shopping guide issued by the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities (BPU), "(L)ocal electric or natural gas distribution companies still deliver the supplies through their wires or pipes and respond to emergencies, should they occur - but the supplies themselves are purchased from other companies."

In the natural gas market, the number of these "other companies" is rising, spurred in part by new technology such as fracture drilling that is opening up natural gas sources previously thought untappable, such as the Marcellus Shale Formation that straddles Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York and West Virginia.

According to the Delaware River Basin Commission, fracture drilling uses "large amounts of fresh water to fracture the formation to release the natural gas."

This method, however, is not without controversy because the water recovered from the process contains "natural gas and chemicals...as well as brine and other contaminants," which some fear has led to contamination of water supplies and resultant health and environmental risks.


Nevertheless, these emerging sources of natural gas and other market factors have helped keep natural gas prices at an alltime low, about \$5 per thousand cubic feet versus more than \$14 per thousand cubic feet just two years ago. That is encouraging third-party suppliers to step into the

But how reliable are third-party suppliers? What are the benefits and risks of switching? And what do consumers need to know to make the choice that is best for them?

New Jersey business and residential customers are served by one of four utilities for natural gas (where available) and one of four utilities for electricity. PSE&G is the one company that acts as a supplier of both.

James Campos, PSE&G manager of supplier relations, notes that switching to a third-party supplier can prove beneficial.

"I've seen it in cases when the price of gas may have gone down, and customers

tend to try to renegotiate their contract with the supplier," he said. "Sometimes it's successful, and sometimes it's not."

Campos cautions, however, that when developing a contract with a supplier, customers - and particularly business customers, who face greater price fluctuations - should keep a wary eye on what is being offered.

Paul Bralczyk, manager of basic gas supply service for PSE&G, echoes this, noting that while prices are currently low, there is no way of knowing if they will remain low, and the contract is key.

The Salesperson as Poet Presenting the Vision of What is Possible

Great poets express ideas and emotions beyond our day-to-day capacity. These poets activate and connect us with a dormant part of our humanity, helping us grow and experience life on a higher plane.

Great salespeople provide a similar function for their clients.

Very often the prospect or client can't articulate what she needs.

Particularly for the infrequent purchase, the prospect usually is

not an expert. Very often, he focuses on surface issues – product/service features – or the economics of the sale: "I need your very best price – after all, I'm in a pennies business."

The great salesperson shows prospects the latent - or unexpressed - possibilities.

Economic history is the realization of latent demand – the fulfillment of possibilities. For instance, consider the:

- 1. Actual demand for automobiles in 1860.
- 2. Actual demand for computers in 1945 (worldwide demand was reportedly estimated at one computer).

"The great salesperson shows prospects the latent – or unexpressed – possibilities. Economic history is the realization of latent demand – the fulfillment of possibilities."

There was immense latent demand for both automobiles and computers. These latent demands were activated when: (1) new technologies made the innovations economical and (2) the message was effectively communicated to the target audience.

Great salespeople play the latter role – they convey the possibilities, the vision, to the prospect. It doesn't take a game-changing innovation like the computer to invoke the salesperson as poet – as visionary.

Consider the classic dichotomy of builder's grade vs. quality – also known as first cost vs. total cost.

The buyer often has a short-term orientation: the money spent today. Thus, he focuses on first cost.

But most purchases have a future benefit or impact. Conceptually, this impact is not as obvious.

It's the salesperson's job to show the prospect the long-term impact of the decision – to consider the total cost. It is his or her job to show the prospect the difference between:

- 1. Doing it right minimizing total cost with quality versus...
- 2. Doing it repeatedly by focusing on the short-term and buying low-cost builder's grade.

Whereas the marketer does this en masse, the salesperson does this "belly to belly," in the trenches, one person at a time – the most effective method of persuasion.

If the customer buys low-quality builder's grade and suffers the consequences, there was a failure somewhere in selling.


The salesperson failed to rise to her role as poet.

Historically, nations acknowledged great poets as "Poet Laureates." Our economic well-being would be substantially enhanced if we also designated great salespeople as "Salesperson Laureates."

supporting free enterprise, raising awareness of the important role small businesses play in the national economy and promoting creation of 20 million jobs in 10 years.

The chamber solicited videos from businesses that would tell their free enterprise and entrepreneurial story and received more than 130 submissions. Five finalist were aired on YouTube for one month, where they were viewed more than 95,000 times and voted on by the public.

"I am Carlos Sanchez and I am Free Enterprise" was voted the winner.

Sanchez is no newbie to electronic media. The entrepreneur has built his business not only on sweat and dreams but also on technology and connecting to target audiences through the Internet. He promotes his business through his company web site and blog; Facebook, YouTube and Twitter; and an electronic newsletter he sends to clients and perspective campers. He also leveraged his extensive sneaker collection to create videos that have been seen by more than 4 million viewers.

Sanchez also uses traditional marketing, such as fliers and direct mail, and recently introduced a session card that provides clients with more flexibility in attending the camp, recognizing today's demanding schedules as well as the realities of a down economy in which consumers do not want to waste their spending dollars.

Entrepreneurs succeed when they identify consumer needs and create products or services that fill those voids. Sanchez developed the idea for his fitness boot camp while working as a personal trainer at a chain fitness center.

"The majority of people don't get the results they want when working with a personal trainer or going to a gym," he said. "But the group atmosphere provides support. They're

accountable to each other. It's that sense of building the community."

Maplewood BootCamps provides a structured, group exercise experience in four-week programs of two, three or as many as seven days a week. Each day consists of 45-minute sessions comprising five- and 10-minute blocs of exercises working on different areas of the body. Campers work at their own pace but under the supervision of Sanchez and other trainers, yet often are teamed up for fun and competition and to strengthen the sense of community and accomplishment.

Sanchez focuses on both campers' bodies and minds, he said.

"It's great if you lose weight or get stronger, but it's more about seeing an obstacle, making a plan and attacking and overcoming it," he said. "That's what fitness has done for me. When there was a time in my life when I was down I started to exercise and everything changed. I wanted to change the world."

Sanchez came from a world of crime, drugs and poverty and made a plan to overcome these obstacles.

"Free enterprise was my ticket out," he said.

Recognizing and supporting that vision and drive is the goal of the U.S. Chamber's Campaign for Free Enterprise, according to Mary Kane, director, special projects at the chamber.

"We felt that the American people were losing their gut instincts of why businesses were started in this country," said Kane, whose parents emigrated from Ireland in the 1950s seeking a chance to build new lives. "We wanted to say thank you for taking a huge risk and starting (their) own business."

Not taking risk is true failure, according to Sanchez, a philosophy that drives his entrepreneurial spirit and which he tries to instill in his clients.

"BootCamp is not an intimidating place," he said. "It's a safe place that encourages them to do the best they can. The hardest part is just showing up. Once they're there I keep them moving...There aren't any mistakes. If you fall over, your body is learning what it needs to stay up. There is no failure. Failure is not showing up."

serves natural gas customers in Union and Middlesex counties as well as in Northwestern New Jersey, explained the process of switching from the utility to a third-party supplier.

"A homeowner or business contacts a third-party supplier, or the third-party supplier through a sales effort contacts the customer," she said. "Once the contractual price and other conditions of service are established with the third-party supplier, the supplier enrolls the customer through an automated electronic process."

The switch is seamless in terms of delivery of the commodity itself. The natural gas is still delivered to the customer through the utility's distribution system.

Under state law customers who switch to a third-party provider may switch back to their utility at any time, although contractual stipulations – including financial penalties – and/or a time delay may apply. Because of this, experts agree it is important for customers to understand the terms of their contract before making the switch. Regardless of contracts, however, customers will not face service interruptions should their third-party supplier default or go out of business.

"If a third-party energy provider goes out of business, Elizabethtown Gas will take the affected customers back into commodity service," Gerke said.


While cost savings is certainly a strong draw for third-party suppliers, it is not the only draw.

"[T]hird-party suppliers can offer customers packaged products that a traditional utility cannot offer," said Steven Maslak, president and CEO of Gateway Energy Services, a third-party supplier offering natural gas and electric choice to residential and business consumers. "At Gateway, our New Jersey customers can mix and match fixed- and variable-rate plans for their natural gas and electricity.

"For example, many of our customers choose to fix their electricity rates through the end of the year to avoid New Jersey utilities' summer rate hikes, while opting for a

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variable rate on natural gas."

Third-party suppliers also can offer various discounts and incentives, such as Gateway Energy Services' sign-up promotions and Military Discount Program, according to Maslak.

Steven Sooby, central region sales director for Hess Corporation – a third-party provider serving commercial and industrial customers – notes the big-picture dimension of energy choice benefits.

"Competitive energy providers have a range of pricing and usage options that help a business develop a long-term energy strategy that fits their needs and budget," he said. "In many cases, products such as fixed and variable rate pricing and green energy are not available from the local utility."

Sooby suggests that businesses shopping for a natural gas supplier consider six factors: total energy needs, risk tolerance, reliability, service and relationship, value/cost transparency, and environmental/conservation goals.

According to Jim Faulkner, an associate with Viridian Energy – a third-party supplier that offers green electricity with a minimum 20 percent renewable content – non-profit organizations also can benefit from switching.

"The first benefit is a potential 10 or 15 percent reduction in (the) energy bill, whether gas or electric," Faulkner said.

Additionally, Viridian operates a referral program that rewards customers such as non-profits for helping others switch, as well as an associate program that allows associates to earn a commission based on the total number of Viridian customers in their organization.

"There doesn't appear to be a downside," Faulkner said.

Consumers debating switching and wary of the unregulated third-party supplier versus the regulated utility should note that third-party suppliers must be licensed by the BPU before they can serve customers in New Jersey.

"(C)ustomers may be able to achieve cost savings or price stability by switching" to a third-party supplier, according to BPU public information officer Doyal Siddell.

Yet while low natural gas prices make it is a buyer's market for third-party suppliers right now, that is not always the case, Siddell added.

"Utilities hedge a portion of their supply," he said. "Therefore, in a rising market, it is more difficult for third-party suppliers to compete since a portion of the utility supply was locked in at lower prices. Conversely, in a declining market, it is easier for third-party suppliers to compete since the portion of the utility supply was locked in at higher prices."

Whether remaining with their utility or switching to a third-party supplier, however, New Jersey customers can take comfort in knowing that, like the car they drive or the food they buy, the choice is fully theirs.



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Recession Unites Employees of All Ages But younger workers look to move after recovery

The more things change, the more different generations of workers become the same, according to a new study from staffing firm Robert Half.

The study shows that workers of all ages have a new appreciation for company stability when making career decisions. Yet for many, attaining firmer ground may entail a career change: Four out of 10 professionals polled said they are more inclined to look for new opportunities outside their current place of employment as a result of the recession.

Other findings include:

- · Pay is not keeping up with performance. More than one-third (37 percent) of employees felt they are not being fairly compensated for assuming a greater workload during the recession.
- Work is more engaging. About one in four (28 percent) said they are more engaged in their work as a result of the recession.
- Generational views on next career steps differ. For Gen Y (approximately 21 to 31 years old), looking for a new job is the most common post-recession career plan, whereas Gen X workers (approximately 32 to 45 years old) polled said they are more inclined to update their skills. Baby boomers (approximately 46 to 64 years old) said staying put at their current companies was the most commonly cited post-recession career plan.
- Cross-generational teams bring challenges, rewards. Nearly three-quarters (72 percent) of hiring managers said managing multigenerational work teams poses a challenge. But more than one-third of workers polled felt having a group of employees at different experience levels increases productivity.
- · Retirement plans are being put on hold. Nearly half (46 percent) of workers believe they will work past the traditional retirement age, and more than one-third said the recent recession has had a very strong impact on those plans.

The study was developed by Robert Half and conducted by an independent research firm. The study polled more than 1,400 professionals in North America who are employed full-time and have college degrees, or are earning college degrees, including 502 hiring managers. Respondents included members of the baby boomer generation, Generation X and Generation Y.

The study identified a number of similarities and differences among generations of workers.

Generational Similarities - For all generations:

- 1. Working for a stable company and having job security were the two most important aspects of the work environment.
- 2. Salary, company stability and benefits were the most important factors when evaluating employment offers.
- 3. Healthcare coverage, dental coverage, vacation time and 401(k) matching were the highest valued benefits.
- 4. Among professionals who plan to work past the traditional retirement age, a majority cited the past recession as an important factor.
- 5. The most commonly cited benefit of being part of multigenerational work teams was bringing together various experience levels to provide knowledge in specific areas.

Generational Differences

- 1. When it comes to post-recession career plans, more Gen Y worker planned to look for new job opportunities.
- 2. Gen X workers were more inclined to enhance their skills sets and build tenure with their companies after the recession.
- 3. A greater percentage of baby boomers said they will work past the traditional retirement age.
- 4. More Gen X workers said they had increased their retirement savings since the recession began.
- 5. More baby boomers identified the greatest challenge when working with multiple generations as having differing work ethics and approaches to work/life balance.

"Many employees, particularly Gen Y professionals, are biding their time in their current employment situations and plan to make a move when they feel the economy is on firmer footing," said Brett Good, a Robert Half International district president. "Now is the time for employers to take action and outline career paths within their company for strong performers. Compensation reviews also should be conducted to ensure that pay is competitive."

A Tale of Two Cities

"Boss, boss, our revenue is only going up by 2 percent this year, but our costs are going up by 10 percent! What are we going to do?!!"

Never has the difference between the mentality of government and business been clearer than when this question is answered.

"Oh my god, we can't do this! How are we supposed to give them everything they want when we have so little money? We are going to have to cut back! We are going to lay people off. If they won't give us enough money, how can they expect to get the services? This is terrible!"

"How are we going to make this work? How can we generate more money? Anyone have any ideas on other ways we can increase revenue?"

The incessant whining over budget cutbacks, caps and the like shows that a lot of the people who run this state are not accustomed to dealing with adversity. For far too long government at all levels of New Jersey have looked upon the taxpayer with avarice and disdain, as if our sole purpose was to fund whatever they wanted funded.

Now they are going to have to change. And as above, the change will constitute either primarily cutbacks or enhanced revenue.

Cutbacks are pretty well understood. We lay people off; we don't repave streets as often; the football team disappears.

Less understood is the revenue enhancement side. How can a town generate more money? Fees? Well, yes to an extent but not enough to balance the budget. More ratables? Now here we have something.

The best ratables are businesses. Businesses pay taxes at the same rate as a homeowner but usually a lot more of them due to their size. And a typical business doesn't use many services. I have yet to meet a business that enrolls its kids (subsidiaries) in the local school system.

We all know that New Jersey in general is not a friendly place to do business. However, at the municipal level is where doing business can become really tough. And the wealthier the town, the harder it is to do business.

Take Linden, for example. Linden is considered by many to be the most business-friendly city in the state. A democratic bastion, this has remained true through successive mayors and councils. Business is embraced in Linden and everyone from the mayor down works to make sure a new business is welcomed and an old business is treated with respect. Linden also provides an amazing array of services at a tax rate far below the norm.

Linden is well placed to survive and thrive under the property tax cap. The city has the desire, resources and knowhow to grow its tax base.

Contrast Linden with Springfield, considered to be one of the most unfriendly towns in the state when it comes to setting up a business. Filled with self-appointed resident committees who complain with great effect, few businesses are successful getting the approvals needed to conduct business.

Thus, the residents of towns like Springfield will bear the full ramifications of the tax cap. Why would a business locate in one of these unfriendly towns when there are friendlier environments in other New Jersey communities or other states that will welcome their investments, their jobs and their tax revenues?

Perhaps the real silver lining in the property tax cap is not that taxes will stop growing so fast, but that the state at all levels will be forced to reevaluate its anti-business attitudes and make New Jersey a business-friendly state at last.

Where the Chamber Stands...

Great Start - But Still a Long Way to Go

After New Jersey legislators and Gov. Chris Christie reached a compromise to pass a \$29.4 billion budget and then hammered out an agreement on capping annual property tax increases at 2 percent, Christie was reported to have told lawmakers he would get better at the budgeting process.

The Legislature had better join the governor at improving. While the negotiations that led to the budget compromise were surprisingly amicable and the compromise on the property tax cap was bipartisan, the final solution – a Legislature-passed cap versus a constitutional amendment passed by voter referendum – leaves much work to be done to ensure that New Jersey's mayors and town councils can meet the cap without devastating local services and education and without subverting it with exemptions.

Make no mistake, reducing the cap on property tax increases from the current 4 percent to 2 percent is a step in the right direction. Property taxes in New Jersey have increased more than 70 percent in the last 11 years, more than double the rate of inflation. While the rate of increase has more than halved since the introduction of a 4 percent cap in 2007 – from 7.2 percent to 3.3 percent – New Jersey residents still pay the highest property taxes in the nation on a per capita basis.

The problem with the 2 percent solution is similar to that of the 4 percent cap. There are exceptions to the cap – albeit far fewer – that can allow local governments to exceed the cap. Of greater concern, with a Legislature-passed cap versus a constitutional amendment, lawmakers can make changes later that might further weaken the cap and undermine its effectiveness.

A constitutional amendment would have (1) placed the issue directly in the hands of those most affected by it, the state's residents and homeowners, and (2) removed any temptation on the Legislature to tweak the law in the future.

As the decision has not been left with the voters, it now falls on the governor and lawmakers to "get better" at helping local governments meet their obligations to residents while staying under the cap.

There are exceptions to the cap that include pension and health benefits, capital expenditures and certain emergencies. These are areas that are largely beyond the control of local governments.

Yet certain major drivers of increases in local expenses will not be addressed by the 2 percent cap – namely arbitrated salary increases for police and firefighters and unfunded state mandates. While police and fire salary increases statewide have averaged 4 percent since 2000, the real impact on municipal budgets averages between 6 and 10 percent due to administrative calculations, according to the New Jersey League of Municipalities.

Unfunded mandates that place severe and undue strain on municipal budgets touch on everything from planning for constantly changing affordable housing regulations to storm water management. In a state known for home rule, municipalities have been overrun by the cost of mandates that often have no logical relation to the realities within their borders.

While the 2 percent cap will limit increases in property taxes, it will not place such a constraint on arbitrated salary increases and unfunded mandates. Therefore, the Christie administration has proposed a slate of 33 bills – the so-called tool kit – that the governor believes will help municipalities rein in expenses currently beyond the control of local governments, including capping annual increases in public employee contracts, inclusive of binding arbitration awards. The governor also has taken positive steps toward reducing unfunded mandates and onerous regulations on municipalities and the business community.

These are steps that need to be turned into strides and then leaps if local governments are to be given a fair shot at meeting the new limits on property tax increases without shortchanging residents. This is the time for the Legislature to join Gov. Christie in getting better at this.

As with economic downturns of the past, the current recession has brought one silver lining. Businesses of all sizes and within every sector have learned to operate more efficiently. Companies have discovered or developed ways of producing products and services with fewer resources.

This is a lesson local government and school boards will learn over the next few years as they strive to creatively do more with less while New Jersey rights its foundering ship of state. A constitutional amendment for a 2 percent cap in property tax increases would have been more in line with the sink-or-swim scenario the business community faced during the recession. For now the compromise between the governor and Legislature has a built-in life preserver.

We're not out of the deep water yet. We still need to get better at this.

Carlos Sanchez is discussed on the front page of this newspaper because he represents American free enterprise at its best. With hard work and a good idea, Carlos built something out of nothing and, in the process, helped those who attend his boot camps live healthier lives. But if current trends continue, it may be harder for others to realize similar success.

The congressional leadership and the administration have taken their eyes off the ball when it comes to America's top priority – creating jobs. Although the economy may be growing again, it is not growing nearly fast enough to create the 20 million jobs we'll need in the next 10 years to replace those lost in the recession and to keep up with a growing population.

Instead of partnering with the business community and embracing proven ideas for job creation, the congressional leadership and the administration have embarked on a course of rapid government expansion, major tax increases and suffocating regulations.

As the president has said repeatedly, prosperity and job growth come from the private sector, not from the government. Government's role is to establish the right conditions so that the private sector can invest, grow, compete, create new products and services, and put Americans back to work.

Here are the recommendations of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce for jolting our economy back to life.

Let's start by addressing America's uncompetitive tax rates. This Congress has already raised taxes by almost \$700 billion to pay for health care, stimulus and other programs. Proposals in the capital markets, energy and climate change arenas would raise hundreds of billions more. And beginning next year, Americans will be hit with the largest tax increase in history.

Our weak economy simply cannot sustain such massive tax hikes. We urge Congress and the administration to immediately support at least a temporary extension of the tax relief passed in the prior decade. We must also reduce the corporate tax rate to spur investment and job growth.

Spending is also going through the roof and deficits right along with it. Instead of expanding entitlements, Congress and the administration should control and modernize them without

delay. Sustained economic growth can help bring down the deficit, but we will also need to generate additional revenues. Our policy challenge is to do so in ways that do not undermine economic growth or competitiveness.

The president said that millions of American jobs can be created by doubling U.S. exports in five years, and we agree. We can start by immediately passing pending free trade agreements and reviving global trade talks known as the Doha Round.

Millions of jobs, as well as our global competitiveness and quality of life, depend on modernizing all forms of American infrastructure. We must remove the regulatory, legal and financial roadblocks to private investment.

The regulatory burden imposed on the job creators of our country has reached a tipping point. Congress approved a 2,800-page health care bill that includes a new employer mandate and hundreds of billions of dollars in business taxes. The Senate is poised to pass a sweeping financial reform bill fraught with unintended consequences, huge new bureaucracies, and higher taxes and fees. The Environmental Protection Agency and Labor Department are embarking on an unprecedented amount of regulatory action.

Congress and the administration must address the cumulative impact of this regulatory avalanche to restore certainty, unleash investment and create a better atmosphere for job creation.

It is imperative that business and government leaders work with each other, not against each other. Our current economic direction is not working, and it's undermining our position in a tough and competitive global economy.

Insight Capping the Leak of Faith

In the wake of the Deepwater Horizon oil rig explosion, hundreds of millions of gallons of crude oil have leaked into the Gulf of Mexico. But that is not the only thing leaking right now; the business community is watching trust and credibility slowly seep away.

The oil spill is just the latest example of the devastating economic effects of corporate irresponsibility. Questionable banking practices played a significant role in the recession, and now BP's poor safety practices may have been responsible for causing the largest offshore oil spill in American history.

But these events also are having a more indirect economic impact by shaking the trust that is the foundation for all commercial transactions.

A recent article in Bloomberg Business Week cites various ways that a lack of trust can have economy-wide consequences. Lost faith in banks and other financial institutions, for instance, can dampen enthusiasm for investing, with obvious consequences for growth. One economist quoted in the article notes an enormous body of research showing that trust in institutions is vital to a country's economic development.

But this is a problem that goes well beyond the public losing faith in the nation's banks and corporations. Even within the business community, trust has been leaking away for years.

In 16 years as a negotiation consultant, I have seen countless transactions fall apart for one simple reason: a complete lack of honesty and trust. Instead of being open about their needs and cooperating toward a common goal, the two parties inevitably treat the negotiation like a poker game. They keep secrets, bluff the opposition and do everything to "win" at the expense of the person across the table.

It is an approach that causes more than a third of negotiations to fail. In those that succeed, the mutual distrust and secrecy causes the parties to miss out on countless variables that could

have provided gains for both.

The hostile and untrusting attitude that pervades virtually any commercial transaction is cyclical: both sides know they can expect secrecy and deception from the other, and therefore instinctively come to the table from a position of mutual mistrust.

And do not think for a minute that contentious negotiations only happen in big corporate mergers. Thousands of negotiations take place every day, from the biggest acquisition to the smallest sale, and as long as things continue as they are, mistrust and dishonesty will remain the currency of the business world.

If trust is to return to the economy, it will not happen through increased regulation, which only creates new legal hoops for corporations to jump through without addressing the underlying problem. Rather, it will happen when the business community creates a culture based on trust, honesty and fair dealing, and brings those values to every commercial transaction.

Of course, tigers are not going to change their stripes overnight and they certainly are not going to turn over a new leaf out of an altruistic desire to help the economy. Instead, they will do it for the same reason they do everything – because it helps their bottom line. When it comes to negotiation, being open and honest with the guy on the other side of the table will help both parties, as they discover new opportunities to create value and see the benefits of building a long-term partnership.

If the business community wants to regain the public's trust, then they have to start by changing their very culture. Or to put it another way: before corporations can expect people to trust them, they have to start by trusting each other.

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
