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Is a state takeover necessary?





Could the Union County Prosecutor's Office run more efficiently and for less money? Gov. Chris Christie wants to know the answer to that question by Dec. 15.

A special commission appointed in July by Christie has been charged with finding out if the state's 21 county prosecutor's offices are doing their best to save taxpayer dollars. Bottom line: the governor wants to know if the state should take over the 21 county prosecutor's offices, either partially or completely.

The governor also is looking for alternatives to a takeover that could achieve cost savings and efficiencies. That would include taking a closer look at whether regional consolidation and shared services

Overall, while the number of "While county prosecutors are actual plea convictions the Union County Prosecutor's office handled in 2009 is comparable to the other 20 prosecutor offices throughout the state, other conviction rate information is subjective given the size, location and crime rate of other counties. However, in general, the facts provide a closer look into exactly how much money and staff it takes to fight crime in Union County.

For example, with an annual budget of \$19.3 million, the prosecutor's office employs 260 people, 97 of which make more than

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Summit Council alters helipad ordinance

SUMMIT — One month after a proposal to place a helicopter landing pad atop Overlook Hospital was voted down by the city's Zoning Board, officials have altered a local ordinance to make applications for helipads more difficult.

Previously, when an applicant sought to build a helipad as an accessory use - as Overlook Hospital did — the only variances needed were those related to construction, not the actual use.

But an ordinance approved Aug. 3 stipulates that helipads are no longer a permitted accessory use, instead requiring the approval

of what is known as a D variance, which about the matter of helipads. needs a 5-2 supermajority vote to pass.

The option of tightening local laws was first brought up by community members who submitted draft ordinances to the planning board. These sample ordinances, if applied to Summit, would have made it impossible to build a helipad anywhere in the municipality, which the planning board deemed too strin-

The final changes to the ordinance were formulated by the city's Law Committee. The committee is chaired by Councilman Michael Vernotico, who said the new ordinance codified the community's feelings and

"When the hearing began, one of the things that became apparent was we didn't have anything in our ordinances anywhere about a helipad, which is one of those things communities just don't think about," Vernoti-

Those potential applicants most likely to take an interest in building a helipad, and therefore most likely to be impacted by the revision are the city's two other major corporate taxpayers, Merck and Celgene.

Officials said residents were supportive of the new law, noting that many "no helipad" signs can still be seen on front lawns in the area of Overlook Hospital.

Council to meet, discuss safety

SUMMIT - As residents try to make sense of the recent beating death of the husband and father of four in the Promenade by a group of teenagers, the police chief and Common Council search for ways to provide a safer more secure community for residents.

On Monday, the Summit Common Council will meet in closed session to discuss "tactics and techniques utilized in protecting the safety and property of the public." Exactly what will be on the table at this meting is unknown, but according to Police Chief Robert C. Lucid, it could be any number of options that give residents the sense of safety they had in their community before the brutal beating death of Abelino Mazariego on July

Lucid, though, does not believe residents should allow fear to take hold of them.

"People are looking for an answer to this tragedy," the police chief said, adding that "bad things can happen in any town."

This was a case of bad judgement mixed with greed," Lucid added. "Ninety-nine point nine percent of kids in town are good kids that would never even think of committing a crime like this," the police chief

Still, Lucid, like most police chiefs today, has the job of protecting the community. That job recently, has weighed heavy on his mind. Residents have suggested that if the township had more police visibility in the downtown, a crime like this might never have occurred. Lucid disagrees in part, but still has concerns about the number of officers needed in a town the size of Summit.

The police chief said that when he started on the force in 1975, there were 52 police officers. Today there are 46, but with four of those officers on extended medical leave, that leaves Lucid with just 42 officers to handle shifts 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

"Figure into that vacations, sick days, training, illness and other unplanned circumstances and you never know what you will have on any given shift," he said, pointing out that because of this, he has just about exhausted the 2010 overtime budget.

Lucid needs more police officers, but he is well aware of the financial constraints facing every community right now, especially his own. When asked about other options that Summit might utilize, such as curfews for teens, the police chief felt this option was not viable, especially given the circumstances of the Promenade beating death.

'Most of the kids involved in that crime were over the age of 18," Lucid said, mentioning that in general, it is difficult to put in place curfews because people do not like to have those type of restrictions put on their children.

Among the towns that enforce a curfew is Roselle Park, where teens younger than 18 cannot be on the streets after 12 midnight. This ordinance, established in February after some debate by the governing body, did not originate from any police department recommendation. But it has worked, according to one officer.

"In the summer, we start to have more occurrence rather than when school is in session," Roselle Park Police Detective Manuel Jimenez said, adding that during the hot months of July and August, the municipality has one or two teens not keeping curfew. Jimenez said Roselle Park Police actively enforce the curfew.

Practicing Tai Chi may help with Parkinson's

Experts at the Atlantic Neuroscience Institute at Overlook Hospital plan to study the effects of Tai Chi on patients diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease, in the hopes that the martial art can help them return to a better quality of life.

Starting in September, Dr. Roger Kurlan, Medical Director of the Movement Disorders Program at Overlook Hospital in Summit, the principal investigator for the study, will examine whether practicing Tai Chi improves mobility, reduces falls and lessens depression among Parkinson's patients.

Parkinson's Disease, is a neurological disorder that occurs when nerve cells in the brain that create dopamine, which send signals that control movement, break down. Investigators for the study chose to use Tai Chi because the practice relies heavily on balance in movement, a common problem for patients with Parkinson's Disease.

The Tai Chi classes for the study will be offered at no charge once a week for 16 weeks through Sept. 15 at The Connection, a non-profit facility located at 79 Maple St., Summit that offers a wide range of The program is taught by volunteer



Re-write the law

A mid-July ruling by the state Supreme Court involving a Plainfield man who refused to take a Breathalyzer test has given rise to questions regarding how police handle driving-while- intoxicated suspects. We believe the court made the correct ruling on a faulty law.

In the case, the suspect rear-ended a car stopped at an inter-section. Police, based on field sobriety tests, concluded the man was drunk. Since he didn't speak English, he didn't understand the statement read to him in English by the officer which stated he was required by law to give a breath sample. He refused the test, and was arrested both for that refusal, and for drunken driving. After being convicted on both counts in a lower court, the Supreme Court considered the case and let stand the drunken driving conviction but threw out the charge of refusal.


Under current law, a driver suspected of driving while intoxicated cannot refuse to provide a breath sample, and he must be informed of this fact by the arresting officer who reads a statement provided by the Attorney General's Office. That statement is 11 paragraphs in length, and takes more than three minutes to read. The court correctly ruled that since the man did not understand English, the police failed to inform him.

The court in its ruling directed the Motor Vehicle Commis-sion and attorney general to find a way to make the statement comprehensible to all drivers. The Attorney General's Office is now releasing the statement in 10 different languages, and providing audio tapes on a website that officers at the scene can play for suspects.

This law must be re-written by the Legislature.

First, in what other situation does the arresting officer have to read a three-minute explanation of the law before hand-cuffing the suspect. An officer should only need to inform a suspect that state law requires the sample. The 11-paragraph statement seems written to convince individuals to take the test by answering all possible questions. We see merit in this: We don't want suspects to refuse because they believe the officer is being untruthful with them in any way. But this is a public relations effort, not the job of police. And although police now have the statement in 10 languages, there is still a loophole for translations not provided, for example, in German, Hebrew and Hindi.

Our state has drivers who speak more than 120 different languages. It seems any process that address all contingencies would be too burdensome at the scene. The law should be re-written in the Legislature so that officers can make a reason-able effort to inform suspects of the state law and then let them proceed with their official duties.

'Thoughtful and deliberate' action

For six months, the city fathers considered the approval of a helipad at Overlook Hospital. From safety needs to medical emergencies to the impact on property values, the Summit Zoning Board By Frank Capece heard testimony and studied the

Overlook pointed to the zone, brought forth criticism that uneventful positioning of helipads at Morristown and Saint Barnabas hospitals. The few minutes saved by the use of a helicopter could be the difference between life and

Opponents said the estimated five to nine flights a month over the densely-populated city caused a real danger. They estimated a decline in property values of as much as 10 percent.

From cell tower applications to other controversial projects in already densely-populated Union County, residents have been on the move before local zoning boards. They find out quickly that the usual threat of the ballot box has a diluted impact on Zoning Board members appointed by the governing body not the electorate. 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


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

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Governor forms commission to examine prosecutor's offices

(Continued from Page 1) \$90,000 annually. Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow, whose position is appointed by the governor, earns \$165,000 a year, with the second in command, First Assistant Prosecutor Albert Cernadas Jr. making \$160,000 annual-

Romankow, who was first appointed by former Democrat Gov. James McGreevey in July, 2002 for a five year term, was reappointed in January 2008 by Democrat Gov. Jon Corzine. His second term expires in 2013.

There are 60 assistant prosecutors on staff whose salaries range from \$58,300 to \$148,793, with 26 of that number making more than \$100,000. These assistant prosecutors work in any number of divisions or departments within the prosecutor's office. An example of one department would be the crim-

inal case control unit which is manned by 10 assistant prosecutors who prepare cases for trial.

In 2009, the last year in which complete numbers for conviction rates were available, the prosecutors office handled a total of 2,510 cases overall, convicting 2,242, or 89 percent of those for various crimes. But, of these convictions, just 43, or 2 percent, went on to trial and conviction. The remainder, 2,199, or 98 percent were plea convictions. A plea bargain is an agreement in a criminal case where the prosecutor offers the defendant the opportunity to plead guilty, usually to a lesser charge with a recommendation of a lighter than maximum sentence

These percentages closely mirror state averages that show of all defendants charged, there is an 89 percent conviction rate, with 99 percent of those plea bargained.

Christie also is looking for duplications in administrative positions that may pad prosecutor office budgets unnecessarily. According to reports, the average Union County Prosecutor's Office clerk typist is paid an average of \$48,150 a year, higher than the average rate of \$29,517 for the same position according to the website, PayScale.com for the same position statewide in New Jersey. Senior clerk typists in the prosecutor's office earn an average salary of \$45,532, while a clerk makes \$36,328.

There are approximately 140 vehicles assigned to the employees, however, the assignment list is unavailable

"What we find is some of the kids we do find in violation display signs of being under the influence," Jimenez said. "We think it is an effective tool."

Summit Councilman Mike Vernotico said that while loitering by large groups of teens in the downtown is a subject of concern, the council has not discussed the idea of establishing a curfew.

"The first thing is for parents to convince their children they shouldn't be hanging out in the downtown," the councilman said.

Vernotico said the chief public safety concerns being addressed by officials involve the police and fire department budgets, which are too tight to allow them to shift resources to compensate when staff is strained by injuries or illness. Right now, three police officers are out of action due to on-the-job injuries and one dispatcher is out sick.

The councilman pointed out that these issues predate the murder on July 17, but "what the murder has done is call attention from the community.'

At the Aug. 3 Common Council meeting, Mayor Jordan Glatt said there are usually four police officers in town in the evening with six miles to cover.

Disturbances, he said, are more likely to occur in the parks than downtown, but he did agree that Summit does not have enough police staff.

Glatt also warned residents not to overreact to the recent beating death, adding that after seven years as mayor, he learned that the major crime issues in town are car theft and homes being burglarized.

Meanwhile, as Summit residents ponder the question of whether their community is safe, last week in Union a 16-year-old teenager was accidentally shot.

The group of teens were hanging out in the park behind town hall and Union Public Library around 9 p.m. when 18-year-old Joshua Peterson allegedly began showing off a .38 caliber revolver to his friends, police said. The gun accidentally went off, hitting a 16-year-old boy in the leg. Although the wound was not life-threatening, the teen was taken to University Hospital in Newark, where he was treated and released, according to a press release from Union Police Lt. Robert Perez.

A second teen, Nijee James, 19, was arrested after he allegedly took the weapon to a township apartment in an attempt to hide the gun. Peterson was charged with aggravated assault along with additional weapons charges, while James was charged with tampering with evidence and unlawful possession of a

Roselle approves 12 furlough days

ROSELLE - Borough residents can expect to find their local government offices closed on 12 pre-scheduled days this year as part of a measure to save money from the challenging upcoming budget. Two of these days have already passed.

The furloughs, approved July 28 by a 4-2 vote, will impact all employees with the exception of police, fire and emergency dispatchers. Disagreement among council members persists regarding how much money will be saved by the furloughs.

Councilwoman Sylvia Turnage, who voted against the plan, described it as poorly thought-out and said Chief Financial Officer Wendy Wulstein was unable to provide answers to questions about how much money will be saved or how many workers will be impacted.

Councilwoman Cecelia D. Ricks expressed her support for the furloughs but deferred to Wulstein on the subject of how much money would be saved. Council President Jamel Holley said claims that savings would total only \$20,000 were incorrect but also deferred to Wulstein.

Wulstein, who replaced former CFO Adrian Mapp in February, could not be reached for comment by press time.

Councilman Yves Aubourg, who chairs the Finance Committee, said the furloughs will impact 70 people and save a total of \$137,000. Aubourg said there will also be additional, uncalculated savings stemming from the cutback in utilities like gas and electricity as a result of town hall being closed.

"We're moving in the right direction," Aubourg said, adding that "\$137,000 is a good cause to cut in the budget."

Councilwoman Christine Dansereau praised the local unions for their cooperation and Wulstein for her work.

"She came into a really challenging scenario in our borough," said Dansereau of Wulstein. "She has been definitely progressing and improving

Turnage said the use of furloughs was inconsistent with the borough's recent hirings, including three police officers and five Department of Public Works employees on a temporary, six-month basis.

"The caveat for me is: How can you furlough workers for such a miniscule savings and hire at the same time?" Turnage said. "It's a slap in the face to our workers.'

Ricks said this was not accurate. "We did not hire additional staff. We replaced vacancies, and the same goes for DPW," Ricks said.

Employees and residents coping with the effects of the furloughs have been further dismayed by the understanding that this sacrifice does not preclude layoffs this year.



First responders join to clean up gas spill

First responders from around Union and Somerset counties had their hands full with what could have been potentially one of the worst disasters in recent memory when a tanker truck carrying 8,000 gallons of gasoline overturned and began leaking.

Smoking ban has locals fired up

If you are thinking about hitting one of the local county parks to than Freeholder Vice Chairman stretch out on the grass and enjoy a smoke, think again. You could be vou are caught.

Recently the Union County Freeholders unanimously approved an amendment to a 1993 ban on smoking in county buildings and structures to include county parks and pool facilities.

The amendment prohibits smoking at boating and ice skating facilities, playgrounds, running tracks, all snack bars, swimming pools, ball fields, tennis courts, Watchung Stables and restrooms supporting county owned recreational areas and facilities.

"This new policy will help protect the health of our residents and visitors while shielding them from second hand smoke in our parks and facilities," said Freeholder Chairman Daniel P. Sullivan.

Under the new policy, the county may also ban smoking at county sponsored events, including concerts, fairs and festivals, but that would be at the discretion of county manager George Devanney. Signage would be displayed at these events to alert the public that there smoke anywhere," Sarnoski said, offense.

The purpose of the change to the 1993 ordinance goes even deeper Deborah P. Scanlon believing the health risks from second hand hit with a \$250 fine the first time smoke can kill. "Second hand smoke contains more than 4,000 substances, including 200 known poisons and 69 known and probable cancer-causing substances," the freeholder said. Scanlon added that the surgeon general has established that exposure to second hand smoke can lead to illness and premature death in children and nonsmoking adults. The Environmental Protection Agency has classified second hand smoke as a "Group A carcinogen."

In 2006, New Jersey lawmakers approved ban on smoking indoors at public places. New Jersey was the 11th state to pass such a broad prohibition. Some Union County smokers were not happy about the latest ban, but they took it in stride.

'Pretty soon we won't be able to smoke in our own house anymore," said Jared Amster, 26, of Rahway.

Amelia Jones Sarnoski, 56, of Roselle, chuckled at the latest news, but was not surprised.

"I remember when everyone smoked at work and now we can't

pointing out that even though a pack of cigarettes is running over \$7 a pack, she is not giving up the habit. "I like to go to Rahway Park with my granddaughter but if I can't smoke there anymore, then we just won't go."

Abby Miestrovich, 38, of Roselle Park, the mother of three children younger than 6, said the ban on smoking was long overdue. I have small children and I like to take them to Nomehegan Park in Cranford, but I don't need people blowing smoke on them while they are playing," she said, adding that she is doubtful the ban will be enforced, though.

Jack Anderson, 63, of Union, shook his head in disbelief before explaining that the average person might not agree with the freehold-

"I hate to say this because these freeholders are pretty smart people, but did anyone consider the parks are outside, not inside," said the non-smoker. "I mean, the whole sky is fresh air, tons of it, and the little smoke there is gets absorbed."

In addition to a \$250 fine offenders can receive for the first offense, anyone caught smoking a second time will pay a \$500 fine and \$1,000 for each subsequent





Cat lovers throughout the country can conveniently sit back and relax while planning to obtain a birthday, holiday or any-day gift for family members or friends. That is if the future recipients also share a love of felines.

The special gift, actually, is an extraordinarily amusing, comically illustrative book called "Careers For Your Cat." 

It may be true that felines can be incorrigible when it comes to any kind of exertion, but "Careers For Your Cat" actually provides a Meowers Briggs Personality Quiz," a cat-nip of options for a variety of 34 careers. Why, if a reader's cat can pass the quiz, it can reach out to the world of interviewing employers and obtain a regular job or a professional career position whatever's available.

According to the truly imaginative author and illustrator, career options out there have titles: Creative Extravert, from opera singer to art gallery director; Creative Introvert, from restaurant critic to jazz musician; Labor-Intensive Extravert, from stunt performer to personal trainer; Labor-Intensive Introvert, from pastry chef to sculptor; Intellectual Extravert, from CEO to TV news anchor; Intellectual Introvert, from librarian to private investigator, and Inert Introvert, from security guard to product tester. There also are tips for acing the interview. And the accompanying drawings are really delightful and adorable.



> He made the move from linebacker to strong safety in 2008 after rebounding from injury to appear in seven games, with one start.



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
