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Businesses charged Stuyvesant HAIRCUTTING with sales to minors Mayfair Liquors, Carli's Lounge may face liquor license suspensions By Paul Greulich Staff Writer HILLSIDE - Two local businesses have run afoul of the law

after selling liquor to a 20-year-old man working as an undercover police officer. Charges of selling alcoholic beverages to underage persons were

filed against Mayfair Liquors at 1444 North Broad St. and Carli's Lounge at 1555 Summit Ave., both in Hillside.

Both offenses occurred on Aug. 19.

The Hillside Police Department conducts periodic undercover investigations to ensure compliance with the law. In the two recent incidents, employees failed to ask for proof of age when they served or sold alcoholic beverages to youthful patrons, as they are required to do by law. New Jersey law prohibits people younger than 21 years old from purchasing alcoholic beverages.

"Underage drinking has been a long-standing problem," Police Chief Robert Quinlan said. "It's a problem in Hillside just like other communities. We take proactive measures to deter sales of alcohol to underage patrons."

In 2008, Mayfair Liquors had its license suspended for seven days for the same type of violation. Carli's lounge has no prior offenses. If found guilty of the charges, both establishments face suspen-

sions of their licenses to sell alcoholic beverages. Carli's faces a possible suspension of 15 days and Mayfair Liquors a possible suspension of 30 days according to penalty guidelines set forth by the state.

Ouinlan said many other local businesses that sell alcohol were also investigated, but complied with the law when approached by underage customers.

"I'm pleased that the majority of establishments didn't sell to them," Quinlan said, noting that in the past, upwards of half the establishments investigated failed to adhere to the law.

"The situation is improving," Quinlan added. "But we're going to keep on doing these periodic inspections as long as necessary.

The charges will be heard on Sept. 13 by the Hillside Township Council, which also serves the function of Alcoholic Beverage Control Board.

Both businesses remained open following the charges, but staff or owners of the two establishments could not be reached for comment.

Mayor Joseph Menza said he wasn't aware of any previous problems with either establishment. He said he hopes officials can address the charges while remaining aware of the difficult economic climate for businesses.

"At this time, when business are struggling, you have to come up with some kind of happy medium," Menza said.

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How the UCPO stacks up Soaring to the top against other NJ counties

The following story is part three in a series examining the Union County Prosecutor's Office.

When compared to three other county prosecutor offices in Central and North Jersey, the Union County Prosecutor's Office appears to have some pluses and minuses to their credit, as do the others.

A special commission was appointed in July by Gov. Chris Christie to see if the state's 21 county prosecutor's offices are doing their best to save taxpayer dollars. Before they return with their findings in December, *Union County LocalSource* looked at how the Union County Prosecutor's Office fared when compared to three counties with similar demographics.

Middlesex, Passaic and Bergen counties provided a range of density, square miles, crime and suburbanurban character required for an objective view of how tax dollars are being spent overall when compared to Union County.

The governor's commission was charged with specifically looking for inefficiencies, administrative redundancies, caseload discrepancies and inconsistent salary compensation, as well as whether regional consolidation and shared services might be an option. In order to analyze and compare statistical data from each prosecutor's office, *Union County LocalSource* used the Open Public Records Act to obtain employee salary, budget and caseload information from all four prosecutor's offices. Demographics from each county were also used for comparison as well as the Police Uniform Crime Index for 2008, the last year available for reference.

The crime rate for each county bears considerable weight when comparing the four county prosecutor offices roster of employees and salaries. With this information, a clearer picture of where there are gaps or excesses in prosecutor office employees and salary can be seen in relation to the overall crime rate.

It is important to note that while Middlesex County may be the largest of the four counties at 311 square miles, compared to Bergen county at 234, Passaic at 192 and Union county at 102.9 miles, Union County tops the list when it comes to overall crime with 32 incidents per 1,000 people. That is more than twice that of Bergen county at 15.6 incidents per 1,000 people and 30 percent more than Middlesex county at 22.5 incidents. Passaic county, which has similar demographics to Union County, had a crime rate of 29.7 incidents per 1,000 people.

Union County also has a high violent crime rate at 4.4 per thousand people, but not as high as Passaic county, which has 5.2 violent crimes per 1,000 people. However, Union County's violent crime rate is 470 percent more than Bergen County and 270 percent more then Middlesex County which has only 1.1 violent crimes per 1,000 people. Also noteworthy is the fact Union County's murder rate of 22 in 2008 is 314 percent higher than Bergen County's which only had seven, and 137 percent more than Middlesex County with 16 murders. Passaic county topped the list with 28 murders in 2008.

Although the number of police officers in a county are not significant to the prosecutor's office overall, the figure does bear weight when it comes to fighting crime generally in the county. For instance, although Union County was second in overall crime per thousand people with 16,800 incidents in 2008, there are only 1,810 police officers working in the county's 21 municipalities.

On the other hand, Bergen County, which came in with the lowest overall crime rate of the four counties, has the most police officers at 2,532. Interestingly, Bergen county has the lowest violent crime rate and murders but has the highest number of police officers. Passaic county had the lowest number of police officers at 1,460.

When budget data from all four prosecutor offices was analyzed, Bergen county came in first with a budget of \$28.4 million, but Union County came in second at \$19.3 million. However, Bergen County has 70 municipalities under its jurisdiction, while Union County has just 21. Passaic County, with 16 towns to cover, has an annual budget this year of \$16.2 million, and Middlesex County, with 25 towns, works with a \$16.5 million budget.

All prosecutor's offices throughout the state handle issues related to, or involved with prosecuting crimes. Because of this, each has a large number of employees handling everything from investigating crimes to administrative clerical work. *Union County Local-Source* looked at several specific employees and their salaries that were consistent in all four prosecutor's offices, including assistant prosecutors, county investigators and clerk typists.

Although the Bergen county prosecutor's office had the most overall employees with 298, Union coun-See HOW, Page 14



Water main leak disrupts traffic flow on Morris Ave.

UNION - The water was flowing but the traffic was stopped on Morris Avenue at Caldwell Place last week as workers labored to mend a water main leak that turned the roadside into a small river

Police Captain Scott Breslow reported the problem is believed to have begun as a small leak on July 31 and worsened by Aug. 1. Workers from the New Jersey American Water Company arrived the morning of Sept. 2. The leak had gone unnoticed until that point.

The company's External Affairs Manager Richard G. Barnes reported that the leak was repaired before 2 p.m. that afternoon although equipment remained on the scene longer into the afternoon. Barnes identified the leak as stemming from a 6-inch pipe.

'A faulty valve caused the leak. The pipe is probably about 60 years old," Barnes said.

lost as a result. Breslow explained that the loose water took the path of least resistance down the street.

"Initially the leak appeared at the curb line but when the work crew got there and did their investigation they discovered the leak occurred at the center of the road which necessitated shutting down one lane in each direction," Breslow said.

About 30 buildings in the area lost water during the repair work, including Burnet Middle School.

Secretary to the principal Mrs. Cucciniello said that while faucets in the building were not producing water, there were no significant problems as a result of the break. Fortunately, school was not yet in session, so no students were affected.

"We do have teachers in school but I haven't heard anyone complain about it," Cucciniello said. "We don't have water but that's about it.'

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Freeholders extend lease agreement with Covanta

The 14 Union County towns that signed on years ago, including Elizabeth, Union, Rahway, Plainfield, Roselle, Linden, Hillside, Summit, Roselle Park, New Providence, Kenilworth, Garwood and Springfield, will be "reaping the benefits" of that deal, according to Union County Utilities Authority attorney Jonathan Williams.

Last week, the attorney for the UCUA explained that while there are many details still to be worked out, he hopes the lease agreement will be finalized by the end of the year.

Among those details is getting the 14 towns to sign back on, which Williams doubts will be a problem considering the savings they have realized in the past.

For instance, in 2009 Rahway disposed of 13,387 tons of garbage in the incinerator, saving \$160,647 that year. Elizabeth, on the other hand, processed 58,119 tons, saving \$700,000.

Williams said the 14 towns will probably see additional savings of \$12 to \$14 per ton on their trash, which is "way under market price."

The seven towns, including Cranford and Westfield, that did not sign on in the past because they contract privately for their garbage service "pay significantly higher" fees at the incinerator," according to Williams. Whether that changes in the future depends entirely on private haulers, he added.

"We learned a painful lesson in the past not to pass any savings onto them unless they can prove residents will see that savings," he said, adding that back in the late 1990s the haulers did not and that will not happen again.

The county also has to get the Department of Environmental Protection and Department of Community Affairs sign off on the deal so they can receive regulatory approvals.

Covanta Energy operates the county solid waste incinerator, processing 1,500 tons of residential and business garbage every day. That household garbage is turned into clean, renewable energy, producing enough energy to operate the plant and sell to a power company.

With the latest lease agreement, the incinerator can stay in its present location on the Rahway river through 2050. It also will provide significant savings to the county and taxpayers over the long haul.

Compared to the average cost of municipal solid waste disposal in the county in 1995 when it was approximately \$120 per ton, by 2008 the average cost was down to about \$75 per ton, according to Union County Spokesperson Sebastian D'Elia. There also is the possibility that Rahway, the host city for the incinerator, could receive an increase in hosting fees that could add up to almost a million dollars a year, according to one Rahway official, who asked to remain anonymous. Union County would also reap benefits from the deal, receiving a 10 percent revenue share of proceeds from the sale of energy produced at the facility starting in 2029.

The UCRRF began operating in 1994 after the state mandated all 21 counties in the state build their own incinerators in the early 1990s.

The facility currently generates electricity while disposing of all municipal solid waste generated in the county at rates which are already among the lowest in the region.

But, in order to understand exactly how those savings will be realized, it's important to know exactly how the Rahway facility changes your trash into energy.

The first step begins when private and municipal haulers bring trash to the Rahway facility. Their trucks are then weighed before and after the trash is unloaded, and a tipping fee is charged per ton of trash. Then the trash is burned at high temperatures in combustion chambers and the heat is used to generate steam which drives a turbine to produce 45 mega watts of clean, renewable electricity. The electricity produced is enough to satisfy the energy needs of 35,000 homes annually.

It all adds up, according to Covanta. For example, the 250 tons of municipal solid waste processed to date is equivalent to the annual amount of waste landfilled in the United States. Put another way, that's the equivalent of more than 30 million garbage trucks full of waste, that if placed end to end would circle the Earth more than four times. If the same trash was put in landfills, the waste would have buried the National Mall in Washington, DC from the Capitol to the Lincoln Memorial, completely covering the Washington Monument.

Covanta points out that in processing 250 million tons of waste, they recycled more than five million tons of metal, enough to build 60 Golden Gate bridges. But the process does not come without its problems.

In August, Covanta agreed to pay \$16,400 in fines to the Department of Environmental Protection for exceeding allowable levels of carbon monoxide and sulfur dioxide released into the atmosphere. The fines were due to several incidents over two years, and, according to a spokesperson at the DEP, minor in the big picture.

(Continued from Page 1) reflected in the court's recent decision.

"The Ocean County Prosecutor's Office bounced it back into our laps," Menza said. "The disciplinary process has to advance at this point."

Ocean County Assistant Prosecutor Kristen Pressman said that in cases where police officers are convicted of a crime, termination is not customarily included in sentencing but left to the discretion of the department.

"It's usually handled by the department unless he's pleading to official misconduct, which is a separate charge and which was not the case here," Pressman said. Hillside Police Chief Robert Quinlan said he does not expect Holmes to remain on the force.

"I anticipate that his separation from the police department will be forthcoming through the disciplinary process," Quinlan said.

Holmes' sentencing comes less than a year after the termination of another Hillside Police Officer, Patrolman Vitor Pedreiras, who pleaded guilty to charges of stealing money from a state homeless prevention program.

Quinlan acknowledged Holmes is the second officer in two years to face criminal charges, but stressed that both cases involved off-duty incidents.

"We have very strict rules and

regulations and hold our officers accountable to those rules and regulations," Quinlan said. "However we can't control the officers' personal conduct 24 hours a day."

Quinlan said both Holmes and Pedreiras had good service records.

Menza said police officers, like politicians, are held to higher standards whereby a single mistake can easily ruin a promising career.

"They're human beings, they make mistakes. But they have to understand they're held to different standards than most people," Menza said.

Get involved

Editorials on this page often have urged parents to take an active interest in the education of their children. Many studies indicate that when a parent becomes involved in their child's education, the child does better in school. This suggests that parents should, for example, attend school functions, such as back-to-school nights, school plays or sports games, and possibly walk their child to school on occasion. Also, make the child's day at school an important part of the dinner table conversation. When a parent becomes interested in a child's education, it seems reasonable the child will become more academically motivated.

For this new school year, parents should also consider becoming involved in another way: by supporting school fundraising efforts.


When schools open this week, they will be operating with reduced budgets. In March, Gov. Chris Christie decreased state aid to schools by \$820 million. This resulted in layoffs, furloughs, raise deferrals and the redesign of programs. Many board of education members and school administrators with whom we have spoken said this was the most difficult budget they had ever balanced.

This move by Christie was needed. Schools have become too costly for taxpayers. And now school districts this year will be adjusting to the new reality as set down by the governor.

While none of these cuts impact the mandated curriculum, they do impact what could be called "quality of education" items: The marching band will not participate in away competitions, for example. Classrooms could have more children. A sound system will not be upgraded. Computers will not be purchased.

Parents and the business community have always stepped forward to assist schools. In Irvington, the current effort to restore Matthews Track and Field was inspired by an alliance of residents. At Foley Field in Bloomfield, where the unsafe concrete bleachers will be demolished, private groups and individuals will be stepping forward to raise the funds for temporary bleachers. Now, more than ever, outside assistance is needed by our schools.

This year we urge parents, and residents, too, to support their schools. We have always urged residents to shop locally and support local businesses. This year, we say: answer the call for volunteers at your child's school, and support its fundraising efforts, when possible.

There's just a hint of impatience

There is a hint of impatience, even some anger when you speak to Linden Mayor Richard Gerbounka about special counsel fees.

Last week, City Resolution 273 was approved providing a total of \$112,500 in fees to a Newark law firm regarding a single litigation problem turned out to be that you matter in the city. The topic is a dispute between Verge properties and the city.

In the meantime, Gerbounka and city are hit each year with \$125,000 in interest and principal payments. The problems started when claims arose that the environmental cleanup of the property by the city and Union County Improvement Authority was dragging. City fathers refute that allegation but are still left to defend a \$15 million dollar lawsuit. With the recession drying up opportunities, the battle lines between municipalities like Linden and developers get even more strained.

If you get Gerbounka going on the litigation costs he has been forced to experience, get ready for an expanded talk session. He has a long-standing battle with Dupont and also a St. George's Avenue project where the city spent another \$3.5 million in upfront bonded A \$3 million dollar bond issue to costs. Gerbounka knows he has to see the battles through to completion, but it is not one of his warm and friendly conversations. "They are bleeding us dry" is one of the ways he described the battle.

There are some rays of sunlight in the ratable pursuit crystal ball. Commercial real estate watchers say the second quarter of this year was the first time in four years where businesses actually leased more industrial space than they vacated in our part of the state.

According to The Institute for Supply Management which carefully follows the numbers, real estate has been a lagging indication compared to the rest of the economy. Stan Danzig, a major player in North Jersev Commercial Development said, "The positive absorption of space comes as companies to some extent are still consolidating their operations, sometimes taking the same amount of space in one location instead of multiple sites."

James Hughes, the often-quoted Rutgers economist said, "To have really sustained improvement in that sector, we need growth in consumer spending because that's the driver of wholesale trade that is lagging."

Maybe local candidates running for office this year, hearing the anger of hard pressed property tax owners can respond - just wait until that positive absorption starts happening.

In 2006, the New Jersev Foundation for Open Government embarked on an initiative to empower citizens to have the cost of copies for public records lowered.

We drafted a resolution and asked citizens to present it to their local government bodies for adoption. As a board member I led by example. I approached Union County Freeholder Adrian Mapp and several towns and asked them to adopt the resolution. Many did, including Union County.

Union County Freeholder Spokesperson Seb D'Elia took exception to the credit I had given Mapp for this community service in a recent article. He said my information was skewed because I didn't give credit to the other freeholders who voted to adopt the resolution. However, freeholders routinely vote 9-0 on most every resolution before them. If it had not been for Freeholder Mapp, the resolution would not have been on the agenda. I seriously doubt they knew it was proposed by me. No other freeholder has ever returned any of my correspondence.

Although he didn't intend it to, D'Elia's letter made an important distinction between county machine Democrats and Democrats for Change, an organization which has been building in influence in challenging the machine. At the time this occurred, Adrian Mapp had fallen out of favor with the machine and he wasn't given the omnipotent party line. He went on to challenge them in the primary as a Democrat for Change and he lost.

The county Democrat machine sees these Democrats for Change as much as a threat as they do Republicans. ty came in second with 260. Middlesex followed with 209, and Passaic came in last with 186.

Assistant prosecutors, who are attorneys, review all incoming criminal complaints, present cases to the grand jury, file motions and briefs with the court and ultimately, prepare and present criminal cases for tr al in Superior Court. Their salaries depend on whether they are experienced and how long they have been in a particular prosecutor's office.

Union County had the most assistant prosecutors with 62, with Bergen County having 52, Passaic 43 and Middlesex also with 43. However, when it came to comparing assistant prosecutor salaries over \$100,000, Bergen County topped all with 36, Passaic, 29, Union County with 26 and Middlesex with 20. The lowest salary for an assistant prosecutor was found in Bergen County at \$54,300, while Middlesex came in at \$57,079, Union County at \$58,399 and Passaic, \$63.132.

County investigators play a critical role in all prosecutor offices because they investigate all indictable crimes. Their duties also include the interview and interrogation of victims, suspects and witnesses, use of forensic science and expert opinions required in the prosecution of criminal cases.

Union County came in fourth among the four counties with 68 investigators, 26 of which make more than \$100,000 a year. Passaic County was first with 79 investigators, 21 making more than \$100,000, while Bergen was second with 78, 70 of that number making more than \$100,000. Middlesex came in third with 75 investigators, 31 making over \$100,000 annually.

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

"Volunteering on the crisis hotline gives me great perspective," said Brady. "I realize that whatever I'm going through isn't so big after all. We tend to make problems bigger than what they are sometimes.'

More and more often, Brady answers the hotline phone and finds a caller without hope, considering suicide. "It's tremendously powerful to be able to be there for someone in crisis and help them through their dark moment. It feels so good to connect and touch others in such a significant way - to help another human being."

Brady's experiences at CON-TACT have inspired her to go back to school to study psychology. She's begun looking into different programs and options. "I'd love to enhance my skills and learn even more about the human mind. It's taken time and many different experiences to get me to this point, and it's all coming together now," said Brady.



It's the perfect time to invest in phlox for your garden

Sometimes you have to recognize the obvious, and in my case right now, the obvious is tall garden phlox. I see it everywhere I go. The other day I visited a historic garden in the midst of renovation. Clouds of blossoming phlox dominated the old kitchen garden. Closer to home, I varied the route of my usual daily walk and discovered several front yard landscapes dominated by multi-colored phlox. This morning when I opened one of my standard garden reference books, the first page I hit was "Phlox."

The phlox in question is Phlox paniculata, a North American native that occurs naturally from New York state south to Georgia and as far west and south as Illinois

and Arkansas. Like most other popular natives, it has been greatly improved by hybridizers. In the garden, the plants are hard to miss, as they grow 2 to 4 feet tall, with elongated, alternate leaves and glowing, five-petaled flowers in hades ranging from white to deep rose and red, with lots of cultivars in the lavender/purple/blue-purple range. There are even orange culti-

vars, though they never look like more than 800 named selections of better in rich, well-amended earth. sturdy, fragrant clumps that are truly impressive when they bloom in mid-August. American settlers no doubt encountered wild Phlox paniculata shortly after arriving on this continent. By the early 18th century, it had traveled to England and in 1730; it was reportedly blooming there in the garden of Dr. James Sherrard, apothecary and plant collector. The first written description of Phlox paniculata by an American was made by Philadelphia nurseryman and plant collector John Bartram in 1737. The species still blooms today in Bartram's restored garden. By the mid to late 19th century, there were

Phlox fit right in with the asters that are just starting to bloom as the phlox conclude their run. 





Mobley feels division deserves respect **By JR Parachini** IT WAS 25 YEARS AGO WHEN MOBLEY PLAYED ON ONE

Rahway is one of four football teams in the Mid-State 39 Conference's East B Division that has played in a state championship game in the past two seasons.

"When we were in the Mountain Division, people used to thumb their noses at us," seventh-year Rahway head coach Gary Mobley said. "But we've all been there and prevalent and making a lot of noise.

"It doesn't surprise me, the level of success the teams in our division have had."

Rahway is the lone Group 3 school in the division this year, with the other five Group 2.

"There are very good coaches in our division and our kids are taught the right things," Mobley said. "The level of play shows by our records and presence in the post season."

Rahway, Gov. Livingston and Johnson reached state championship games two years ago, while Hillside fell one score shy of doing the same. Summit won North 2, Group 2 last year for the first time since 1994, while Cranford - seeking its first playoff season since 2004 - has many returning starters back in fold this year.

"It's a very highly-competitive division," Mobley said. "It's been that way for years. Summit had a rebirth and Hillside too and GL is always in the mix. Johnson has been in the mix for years and Cranford is bringing back a lot of skill guys. The division needs to be recognized for the quality of programs in it. I'm glad people are starting to see that and we're getting a little more credit for it.'

Rahway held on to defeat Johnson 14-13 in overtime in Clark two years ago on Thanksgiving, enabling Hillside to win the Mountain Valley Conference's final Mountain Division championship on a tiebreaker. The tiebreaker was Hillside defeating Rahway head to head, as each team finished with just one division loss. Hillside's was to Johnson.

Last year, Rahway and Summit both finished 4-0 against Mid-State 39 Conference-Mountain Division foes, but Summit was awarded the Mountain Division title because of a better overall record - the Hilltoppers finished 12-0 for the first time in their history.

Rahway and Summit were the only teams in the Mountain Division last year not to play each other. This year everyone plays everyone within all six divisions of the Mid-State 39 Conference.

At the end of last year, with Rahway playing so well defensively, the matchup everyone wanted to see but couldn't was Rahway vs. Summit.

Rahway gave up the least amount of points of any Union County school - yielding only 112 in 10 games - while Summit scored the most producing a whopping 520 in 12 contests.

This season the teams will face each other in their division opener set for Sept. 25 at 1 p.m. at Rahway's Veterans Field.

Rahway will first play at North Plainfield Sept. 10 at 7 p.m. and then host Scotch Plains Sept. 17 at 2:30 p.m.

Summit will first host Voorhees Sept. 11 at 1 p.m. and then remain at home for a game scheduled against Warren Hills Sept. 17 at 3:30 p.m. Both of those contests will take place at Summit's Tatlock Field.

OF THE BEST TEAMS UNION COUNTY EVER PRODUCED

For the first time in 1984, Union won North 2, Group 4 with an undefeated record, going 11-0.

The Farmers did the same in 1985 and, again, defeated Montclair in the N2, G4 championship game.

Mobley was a key player for Union on both of those championship squads.

In the 1985 sectional final - one year after Union defeated Montclair 34-13 at home in the 1984 title contest - Union and Montclair met again on a very cold day at Bloomfield's Foley Field. The Farmers came back to top the Mounties 13-8.

It was the fourth straight year Union and Montclair hooked up in the N2, G4 final, with Union winning in 1982, 1984 and 1985 and Montclair in 1983.

Those were the days when Union County ruled North Jersey, Section 2. Union County swept the section in 1985, with Union winning Group 4, Linden Group 3, Hillside Group 2 and Brearley Regional Group 1 over Roselle Park.

Union County won two of the group sizes in 1984, with Rahway also capturing Group 3. That was the last year Rahway won a playoff championship.

"I don't feel any different other than I am more responsible and accountable for my actions," said Mobley, who was a two-year starter as a junior and senior for head coach Lou Rettino . "Those were times that I cherished and those high school years are a part of who I am and who I've become.

"I fell in love with football, the game and all it entails. That's why I wanted to become a coach. I want our players to experience what I experienced as young man, building on memories for the rest of their lives.

"It was a blessing to be part of that whole thing, to live in a great community like Union. Playing Pop Warner football in Union, you knew the tradition as a young kid.

'I played for a guy (Rettino) that was a legend and you can't put a price on that. It was the luck of the draw. I could have lived anywhere else.

"Union was a juggernaut. Things were done the right way. We were taught the fundamentals and by coaches named (Fred) Stengel, (Carmen) Guarino, (John) Quinn and (Jim) Benedict to name a few. Guys like Cosmo Lorusso (the head coach at Roxbury who played for Union in the early 1980s) I heard about before I got to high school and he is a coach now.

"They were passionate, committed and knowledgable coaches. What they passed on to you as a young man, you had no choice but to be successful.

"We did what they told us to do and it worked. I use some of the same philosophies and scheme techniques 25 years later and they have worked.

"The game has not changed much at all. Offenses might have changed a little bit, with the spread and things of that nature, but the basic things are still the same - you need to block, tackle, catch and run the ball. If you don't do those things, you won't win."

Roselle Rams full of potential to put together solid campaign

ROSELLE – The Rams have won more games the past two years than the three previous combined.

The first winning season since 1998 was established two years ago, with Roselle also coming close the past two years to qualifying for the state playoffs for the first time since 2000.

There is potential again for Roselle to put together a solid campaign.

"If we keep implementing our program and keep doing what we're doing we can continue to build," said first-year head coach Lou Grasso Jr. "We hope to do the right thing and that it pans out on Saturdays."

Roselle's second game scrimmage was at Millburn Aug. 28. The Rams were to face another Essex County foe in their game-scrimmage, which was scheduled to be played at Columbia last Friday morning.

Then Roselle will be the only Union County team this season that will not open this weekend. This is the Rams' bye week.

Returning starters on offense include senior quarterback Satir Stevenson, senior wide receivers Clinton Coffey and Thomas Taylor, senior running back Darius Mayers and senior fullback Karlbuto Alexandre, who started at left guard last season.

Stevenson is a two-year starter at QB.

"Satir is athletic and a very smart kid, with a GPA over 3.0," Grasso said. "He's learning the system quickly and is a great leader."

Mayers paced Roselle in rushing last year with more than 1,000 yards according to Grasso and is also ready to make his senior season a special one.

"He put on some good weight in the off season and is more of a physical back," Grasso said of the 6-foot, 185-pounder. "He has great speed and is a real prospect."

Grasso likes what he has seen so far from his offense.

"I think we have a chance to be pretty explosive," Grasso said. "The guys up front are starting to get it. They're fast and physical."

Part of that explosiveness is the ability of Coffey to catch the ball and run past opposing defenders with it.

"Clinton is smooth and talented," Grasso said. "He can do it all as a receiver. He can also play running back and, in a pinch, quarterback.

"He can break tackles, his yards after catch are outstanding and he has good hands and runs good routes. "He's a great athlete. He's fast and tough to handle on the field."

Grasso said that Stevenson also provides leadership on defense from his outside linebacker position.

"He's a stabilizing influence on both sides of the ball," Grasso said.

"We also have three pretty good athletes in our secondary and Alexandre is a very physical, attacking type of linebacker."

NOTES: While every schedule known to mankind has Roselle's first game vs. New Providence slated for Sept. 17, the Roselle athletic department has it scheduled for Sept. 16.

The game is Roselle's season- and home-opener.

"It's on Thursday, Sept. 16," Grasso said. "The other schedules are wrong."

Roselle's game on Oct. 9 against Dayton at Union is a 4 p.m. start because of SATs that day.

While Roselle is placed in Central Jersey, Group 2 along with other Union County schools Johnson, Cranford and Gov. Livingston, the Rams are situated in the Mid-State 39 Conference's East C Division along with Group 1 schools Bound Brook, Brearley, New Providence, Dayton and Roselle Park.

The Rams do play three Group 2 schools – Hillside, Johnson and Bernards – and also Group 1 Manville as their four non-division opponents.

Cranford Cougars should be very hungry to show progress

CRANFORD - You can make a case that Cranford should be the hungriest team in its division this year.

The Cougars were primed and ready for a standout season last year, but expectations and their record fell short of a winning campaign.

Cranford did conclude with wins over non-conference foes Voorhees and Carteret, but finishing 4-6 while not beating a single division foe is not division games last year, including an overtime loss at good enough.

Cranford was 0-5 vs. division rivals Hillside, Rahway, CRANFORD'S MULTIPLE DEF .: Johnson, Summit and Governor Livingston. Four of those teams went on to playoff seasons, with Rahway the exception, although the Indians still finished 7-3.

Now, with the necessary talent and experience in fold, it's time for the football team to step it up and challenge for the program's fifth state playoff season and first since 2004.

Erik Rosenmeier, in his sixth year at the helm, began to talk about what his team needs to do in order to succeed this year after its home scrimmage on Aug. 27 against Morris County foe Mendham.

The same six teams - Summit, Rahway, Hillside, GL, Johnson and Cranford - are in the Mid-State 39 Conference's East B Division this year, with everyone playing everyone. That was not the case last year, with four of the six teams playing everyone and Cranford the only team in the Mountain Division without a division victory.

Summit and Rahway both went 4-0, but did not play each other. Summit was awarded the division crown based on a better overall record as the Hilltoppers went 12-0 and captured North 2, Group 2 for the first time since 1994.

"We're going to play against people where first downs aren't going to be enough," Rosenmeier said. We have to score points."

The Cougars scored only 62 points in their five Johnson. At Johnson is where Cranford will begin its season this year, with the teams to meet tomorrow night at 7 in Clark.

"There are athletes in our conference that are going to score immediately," Rosenmeier said. "In the Summit game last year, Summit had nothing with 28 seconds left in the first quarter, then it was 7-7. Then two minutes into the second quarter they took the lead at 14-7.

"I was disappointed with that," Rosenmeier said. "I think sometimes - even ourselves, whether it's our fans or whatever - people have the misconception that 2008 - (3-7) this (spread option) is like a three yards and a cloud of dust offense.

"Georgia Tech led the nation last year in plays over 50 yards. Most people don't think of an offense like that, but we've got to get the big plays out of this offense and sometimes I think we're content with four or five or six yards if we don't finish blocks.

Union Farmers have defense full of top-notch performers

UNION – There will come a time in the season where the Farmers find their stride offensively.

Head coach Brian Sheridan, now in his fourth year at the helm, hopes that crisp execution arrives sooner than later.

However, at the moment, Sheridan is very high on the performance of his team's defense.

"On defense I feel like we might have five, first team, all county kids in our front seven," Sheridan said.

Those players the coach lauds are senior tackle Dan Laguerre (6-3, 280), senior end Eric Simonson (6-3, 225), senior nose guard Drake Harris (6-1, 260), senior middle linebacker Everett Johnson (5-10, 215) and junior strong linebacker Taylor Graves (6-2, 210).

Laguerre is a two-year starter who will be seeking to play on defense at the next level as well.

"He spent his sophomore year going up against Robert Lisowski (who is now playing at Toledo), which made him a great player," Sheridan said. "He's such a strong athlete.

"In the weight room he's over 1,100 pounds in $\frac{3}{4}$ lifts, which is something you don't see until you get to college.

"He's coachable, very intelligent and has a 3.5 GPA. When you coach him he absorbs things."

Simonson is also a returning starter.

"He's as good as anybody at end right now and he had a couple of sacks tonight," Sheridan said after his Farmers hosted North Bergen, Paterson Kennedy and Shabazz in a quad scrimmage Aug. 25 at Cooke Memorial Field.

"We feel like Harris is one of those guys because of his presence on the inside and his strength levels," Sheridan said.

"Because of the way he's progressed this year, we think Graves has a shot."

Johnson, a three-year starter, will continue playing football in the Ivy League at Yale University.

"Everett is as good as anybody, I think, in the county at linebacker because he has three years of experience," Sheridan said. "He's fast and he's explosive and he's another bright kid. He's going to Yale. He has a 5.0 GPA. He speaks German fluently.

"He could have gone to Harvard. He could have gone to Columbia, but chose Yale. He made his decision in the summer, so we're excited about that. He's accepted at Yale and has a roster spot waiting for him. We're just hoping he's the Valedictorian this year.

"On the field he's like having another coach. He also had some other 1-AA interest and some of the higher academic 1-A schools come in."

Union's 7-0 start last year saw the Farmers give up only 65 points and shut out three opponents. Laguerre, Simonson, Johnson and Graves started on that defensive unit.

"We're going to rely on our defense early on in the season until we can really identify who we are offensively," Sheridan said.

Succeeding James Daniels at quarterback is senior Chris Foreman.

"Chris is more in the mold of Dion Nesmith from two years ago, where he's athletic, he can make plays with his feet, he can attack teams on the edge and he can throw the football," Sheridan said.

"He's another basketball player that we have playing quarterback for us."

Backing him up is sophomore Doug Carter, who showed poise and confidence in throwing two touchdown passes against Shabazz during one session of Union's first scrimmage.

"He did a good job last year on JV and we're excited to get him out here and see how he progresses as the year goes along," Sheridan said.

Last year Union had the senior threat of Daniels throwing the ball to standout end Elijah Lee, who is now at Grambling.

"When you have James, who could throw the ball 60 yards through the air and Elijah, who was fast enough to catch it, you become more of a vertical pass team," Sheridan said.

"We're not sure if we're that team yet. We'll see as we progress throughout the summer."

Linden Tigers are constantly out to prove they're for real

LINDEN - The Tigers are in a stage right now where they constantly have to prove themselves. This is not a program that can just send out a team

and easily expect to win eight, nine or 10 games.

After consecutive 5-5 finishes, third-year head coach Deon Candia - a 1991 Linden graduate - feels he has the Tigers on the right path.

"We have a good core of kids buying into our system here," Candia said. "It comes from the off season, with the kids in the weight room and focused."

Linden got out to a 4-0 start last year, but then lost five straight before ending its season with a 26-20 home triumph over Union.

"These are my kind of kids," Candia said. "They want to do the right thing on and off the field and they're learning to love football.

makes me feel good as a coach."

Jaurice Jones started four games at quarterback last year when Trell Myers was out and he is back for what he hopes will be an outstanding senior season.

"Jaurice has some experience and he's a great athlete for us," Candia said. "He gives us an option of running the ball as well as throwing. He's a super competitor."

Candia said that Jones has received an offer from 1-AA school Bryant University.

Backing him up will be sophomore Jeremy Stathum (6-3, 195), whom Candia described as more of a drop back signal-caller.

"He'll stay in the pocket and he's got a very strong arm," Candia said. "He's our future at quarterback."

After a stellar baseball season, senior Will Ingram returns as one of the top running backs in Union County this fall. He rushed for 1,100 yards and averaged five yards a carry last season.

"Will's a great leader for us and a very tough kid," Candia said. "He's also an honor roll student who already qualifies for a scholarship. He also performs well in the classroom and is a great, all-around kid."

Linden averaged 27.25 points in its 4-0 start last year before falling at a team that was under .500 at the time - North Hunterdon - by the score of 21-14.

A 12-7 loss at home to Hunterdon Central followed and then came defeats at home to Westfield 24-7, at Immaculata 42-21 and at home to Franklin 28-21 in overtime in a sectional consolation game.

If Linden is to achieve its first winning season and playoff campaign since 2006, the Tigers must be more consistent on offense.

"We can throw the ball, but we want to build on our running game," Candia said. "We have a pretty experienced offensive line and running game."

Another returning senior running back is Kevin Rodriguez, while junior Ruhann Peele is back at wide receiver after starting in the secondary as a freshman two years ago.

"Ruhann is also our punt returner and kick returner and has super endurance," Candia said. "He can stay on the field all day. He's a true playmaker.

Candia also said that Peele received a verbal offer "They dedicated themselves off the field and that already from Rutgers, with the Scarlet Knights looking at him as a wide receiver.

> "He has some work to do academically, but he has a plan and he's working hard at it," Candia said. "He went to camp at Rutgers over the summer and they were impressed with what they saw of him."

One of the top two-way linemen in the county is senior Austin Frank (6-1, 275), who was an All-County selection a year ago.

"He got bigger, had an excellent wrestling season and his working on his foot work right now," Candia said. "He's also very intelligent and has attracted looks from Holy Cross and Princeton.

"He's very competitive and we're looking for some big things from him this year."

Frank leads a 4-4 defensive scheme that is concentrating on better run coverage.

We had some issues last year with the run, with some running backs gaining over 200 yards against us," Candia said. "We had some breakdowns and we really stressed that over camp.

"We need to swarm to the ball. We're working on our technique and tackling so that we can cut teams from making big plays."

• First 8-win season since 1988 – Dayton's previous one was an 8-2 finish 22 years ago.

• First division title since 1988 – Dayton won the Mid-State 39 Conference's Union Division championship. In 1988, the Bulldogs won the Mountain Valley Conference's Mountain Division crown as a Group 2 school.

• First playoff season since 1988 – Dayton's previous one was 22 years ago when it qualified in North 2, Group 2.

• First playoff berth in North 2, Group 1 – Dayton's three previous playoff seasons were in North 2, Group 2 in 1981, 1984 and 1988.

• First win over New Providence since the mid-1980s – I was told either 1984 or 1985.

• First win over Brearley since 1999.

Despite losing talented seniors to graduation such as quarterback John Hoehn, running back Kevin O'Connor and lineman Dan DuBeau, there is plenty of talent back where expectations are high again for the Bulldogs.

Six of the seven returning starters on offense are seniors as are five of the six returning starters on defense.

"We have a senior-dominated team," said fifth-year head coach Joe Goerge. "We know what it takes, but have done nothing yet this year."

Returning starters on offense include junior center Jesse DiCocco, senior guard Kareem Jackson, senior tackle Christian Wortman, sophomore quarterbackrunning back Anthony Cioffi, senior quarterbackrunning back Skyler Apicella, senior running back Jesse Bell and senior wide receiver Aaron Williams.

Back on defense are senior nose guard Alfonso Cacciatore, Jackson at tackle, Wortman at tackle, Williams at linebacker, senior linebacker Mike Hess and Cioffi at cornerback.

guys being seniors," Goerge said.

Jackson is the leader on defense.

"It starts with Kareem up front, he anchors the line," Goerge said. "We have experience on the line with Jackson, Wortman, Cacciatore and at linebacker with Williams and Hess."

Jackson (6-2, 250) can halt an opposing offense by not allowing the ball carrier to get by him once he's off his block.

"Kareem has the ability to do it all," Goerge said. "He's strong, quick, has good size for a lineman and runs real well. "He has the chance to be a dominant player."

A three-year starter, Jackson is looking to play on defense at the next level.

Goerge felt Dayton performed better in its second scrimmage. Its game-scrimmage was to be at Robbinsville last Thursday night.

Rahway Indians continue to be successful on yearly basis

RAHWAY – While the Indians may not have a large number of starting players returning, that has never stopped them from continuing to succeed lately.

Although Rahway did not end up qualifying for the Central Jersey, Group 2 playoffs last year, the Indians still posted a very productive 7-3 campaign that included a season-ending six-game winning streak.

Rahway has made the state playoffs five of the past six seasons – reaching at least the semifinals all five years – and has one of the best records among Union County teams the past six years.

Rahway also gave up the least amount of points of any team in Union County last year, surrendering 112 in 10 games, including three shutouts in a row and four total in a five-game span.

One of only two returning two-way starters is senior offensive right tackle and defensive end Osa Igbinosun, who is the fourth and final Igbinosun brother to be a standout player for Rahway. Like his older brothers OG at Marist, Amen at Fordham and Ike at Southern Connecticut State, Osa will be playing at the next level.

"He's being heavily recruited and getting looks from Maine, UMass, Richmond, James Madison and preliminary looks from a couple of 1-A schools like Maryland and Boston College," seventh-year head coach Gary Mobley said.

Igbinosun (6-2, 250) will look to be a senior leader on both sides of the ball.

"He's right in the line of his brothers," Mobley said. "His motor is always running.

"As a tackle he's a run blocker to be reckoned with. At the next level I can see him as a defensive end or a linebacker in a 3-4. He ran a 4.7 automatic time in the 40 dash."

Rahway's other two-way returning starter is senior offensive left guard and defensive end Keith Bumpas.

"Keith's versatility is something we're going to lean on heavily," Mobley said. "He may line up at tight end sometimes or fullback and on defense at end or tackle. "We feel we'll be able to use that to our advantage."

The other returning starter on offense is senior center Urayoan Garcia.

Taking over the quarterback position is junior Tyler Zihlbauer, who played on the junior varsity last season.

"He's a very athletic and mobile quarterback," Mobley said.

"He has a good, live arm and quick feet. We will try to use his strengths as a weapon.

"We like his demeanor and his work ethic. He's a fit at quarterback similar to the type that Darrion Caldwell was for us.

"He makes plays not only with his arm, but he thinks through the game. He's field smart, which is what we like about him."

Rahway has new varsity skill players in Zihlbauer and fellow juniors Aaron Peters at tight end, Enel Webley at split end, Hakeem Kornegay at flanker and Nafee Ariss at fullback. The tailback is senior Al'Raji Winbush.

"We feel as though the success we've had at the sub varsity level should transfer over to the varsity," Mobley said.

"The big question this year is how will our young guys respond?

"We have juniors at quarterback, flanker and fullback. We'll see if their skill level will translate over to the varsity level.

"They all have playmaking ability and they will be fundamentally sound.

"We also feel good about our offensive line."

The other returning starter on defense is senior cornerback Malik Shell.

"Our philosophy on defense year in and year out does not change," Mobley said. "We focus on what makes us successful, playing stingy and fundamentally sound.

"These guys have played in our system all of their careers, so we hope continuity of the system will lend itself to being very productive on defense."

Summit Hilltoppers confident another title surge is possible

SUMMIT - For the first time in 15 years the Hilltoppers are defending North 2, Group 2 champions.

Despite being hit hard by graduation, Summit players are confident that another title run can be obtained and that the Hilltoppers can get back to the North 2, Group 2 final just like the 1995 squad did.

"We're, obviously, looking to have a great season," said senior two-way tackle Austin Jennings. "We're looking as we did last year to go to the state championship game.

"Right now we're focused on Voorhees (Summit's first opponent) and we just want to be 1-0 and take it one game at a time like we did last year. We're trying to do all the right things to make sure we get to Giants Stadium again."

"Last year was a great feeling and we still have a lot of guys coming back that got a lot of experience last year," said senior two-way end Ryan O'Malley. "I'm getting a good vibe too, the same feeling as last year."

Jennings and O'Malley are two of Summit's seven returning starters, with the others being Max Munoz, Sal Liberato, Logan Jeffries and Nick Oristanio.

John Liberato came aboard as the head coach in 2007 and along with a staff that includes former more-thancredible Summit players and coaches took a program that went winless in 2006 and built it back up to one that finished 12-0 for the first time in 2009 en route to the squad's first playoff championship since 1994.

"This year was like we ended practice last year, we're keeping the pedal to the medal," Liberato said. "We're going to do the things that we do best. That's what the scrimmages are for, to find out what we do best."

Summit's first scrimmage was at home against Shore Regional, Bloomfield and Caldwell Tuesday. The Hilltoppers will host Chatham Saturday, Aug. 28 at 10 a.m. and then their game-scrimmage will be at Lakeland Sept. 2 at 5 p.m.

As many as 25 seniors graduated from last year's state championship squad, but there's plenty of upperclassmen this year to continue the program's recent winning ways. Last year was Summit's first winning season since 2003. When asked on Wednesday at Summit's Media Day if he named captains yet, Liberato said, "we have senior leaders. They are Pete Badgley, Sal Liberato, Austin Jennings, Ryan O'Malley, Nick Oristanio, just to name a few. The cream will rise to the top. We let the leaders lead."

Liberato said on Thursday that Badgley, a two-year starter, has been named the team captain.

"He's done a phenomenal job for us," Liberato said. Replacing two-year starter Joe Jaskolski at quarterback is junior Ryan Bringewatt. He guided Summit's junior varsity team to a 9-0 record last season. Summit's freshman squad also went 9-0 in 2009.

According to www.summitsports.org, Bringewatt completed 57 of 109 passes (53 percent) for 970 yards last year. He threw 15 touchdown passes and was intercepted seven times.

On the ground, Bringewatt carried 35 times for 227 yards, which came out to an impressive 6.5 average.

"He's a very good runner and an accurate passer," Liberato said.

Liberato also cited the performance of his offensive line.

"I think our strength comes from our three offensive linemen," Liberato said. "We have Munoz back at center for the third year, we have Nick Oristanio back at guard and we have Austin Jennings back at tackle.

"We have two outside guys, Sal (Liberato, the coach's son), who is the fastest kid on the team and then we have (Ryan) O'Malley, who is 6-foot-6. We're going to try to use all of our weapons."

Defense is where Summit improved the most last year, enabling the Hilltoppers to go all the way.

"We have a good nucleus back, starting with our two defensive ends in O'Malley and (Logan) Jeffries," Liberato said. "Those guys really never came off the field last year.

"Then we have Nick Oristanio, who is back for a third year at middle linebacker. He's our master controller. He makes all the calls up front and everything like that.

"We feel we have a good nucleus back."

Johnson Crusaders primed to take next step this season

CLARK - Was last year's 6-4 playoff campaign a stepping stone for even bigger and better things for the Crusaders this season?

With the amount of returning starters back on both sides of the ball that could be the case.

Johnson has eight returning starters back on offense, with three of them returning on defense, in addition to several other players who rotated in last year.

"We want to reach our full potential as a team," second-year head coach Nick Gregorio said following his team's first scrimmage session, which was at Group 4 Bridgewater-Raritan and also against Group 3 Roxbury and Group 4 Sayreville. "With the amount of starters we have back, that potential can be pretty substantial."

Returning starters on offense include senior Sal Bove at left guard, senior center Alex Rodrigues, senior wide receiver P.J. Franciotti, senior running back Corey Ryan, senior wide receiver Mike Pace, senior fullback Jordan Taylor, senior quarterbackwide receiver Anthony Fischetti and senior placekicker Matt Morozoff.

Senior Lou Bove is a left tackle and a cousin of Sal Bove.

"Our strengths on offense are our skill players," Gregorio said. "They were major contributors for us last year."

Those players include Franciotti, Ryan, Pace and Fischetti.

"Being in the second year of a new offense, the players have a greater understanding of the system," Gregorio said. "The line is also considerably ahead as far as knowledge of assignment and scheme than it was last year at this point. The linemen are a lot smarter and a lot more confident and know where we're going."

Johnson had a big home scrimmage scheduled against Group 2 North Plainfield and Group 1 schools Dayton and Cedar Grove Aug. 28. The battle for the starting quarterback position was sure to intensify between senior Josh Urbanovich, Fischetti and sophomore Lance Pecina.

'It's an open competition," Gregorio said. "The bottom line is the one that performs and produces the best will be the starter.

"It will be a competition from now until the end of the season.

"We have three guys we can win with who have different strengths and weaknesses."

Urbanovich was the junior varsity quarterback last season.

"Josh is more of a throwing-type of quarterback, one who can drop back," Gregorio said. "He has a strong understanding of the offense and understands defenses."

Fischetti is a lefty-throwing QB who lets his athletic ability lead the way.

"Anthony's an athlete who has speed and the ability to make plays off it," Gregorio said.

Pecina was the quarterback on the freshman team last season.

"Lance is also very athletic for a sophomore," Gregorio said. "He does all the little things right."

On the outside looking to go down field deep or cut across the middle and use his 6-5 size to catch the ball and then blitz pass opposing pass defenders is Franciotti, who last year was one of the most dangerous receivers in Union County.

'He's a complete receiver," Gregorio said. "He's tall, fast, agile, and runs very good routes. P.J. can just pull down the football.

"He's hungry to make a play and wants to be the DECADE OF 2000s: (66-39, .629) guy. He wants to compete and be the best player in Union County."

A three-year starter, Gregorio also said that Franciotti is a solid blocker.

"He wants to play receiver at the next level," Gregorio said. "He was our leading pass catcher last year."

Ryan has had injuries to battle through before trying to go through a season this year without any.

Corey has the potential to be a dominant player on both sides of the ball, he just has to stay healthy," Gregorio said.



KENILWORTH - While the Bears are inexperienced at quarterback and running back, they do have seven returning starters on defense, which is not a bad thing at all for a Group 1 school - or any school for that matter.

scrimmage season continues would most likely be tackle Bob Loneker, senior guard Greg Rice, senior accurate.

"All of our skill kids are brand new," ninth-year head coach Scott Miller said. "They got some varsity experience from last year, but very little.

"Defensively, all of our guys up front and two of our linebackers return, so our front seven is not doing and Loneker at end and junior Mike Christian and Rice too bad '

To say Miller and his coaching staff have found a way to win year after year and graduation class after graduation class would be an understatement.

In Miller's first eight seasons at the helm, he has guided Brearley to the state playoffs every year and enters his ninth season with an outstanding 70-16 (.814) record. His 8-7 playoff mark includes two state championship game appearances and the school's first North 2, Group 1 title since 1991, which was achieved in 2006

That year Brearley became the first Union County team to go 12-0.

Miller has the best record of any coach in Union County the last eight years, while Brearley finished with the best record of any Union County team for the decade of the 2000s at 79-27 (.745).

Last year's squad qualified for the Central Jersey, Group 1 playoffs, but entered with a two-game losing streak after falling at Roselle and at Dayton in Union. However, the Bears bounced back to win at South River in the quarterfinals, earning a semifinal contest at eventual champion Asbury Park.

this year, along with fellow Union County schools New Providence, Dayton and Roselle Park.

Just how fast Brearley begins to click offensively will have a lot to do with the maturity of senior quarterback Joe Calello.

"Right now it's too early to tell," Miller said. "On the JV level last year he was able to run with the ball well. "He's pretty quick and elusive. For a senior starting at

quarterback for the first time it's tough.

"We hope he won't make the major mistakes and play within himself."

Returning starters on the offensive line out to give To say the defense is ahead of the offense as the Calello as much protection as they can include senior guard Dillon Geoghegan, senior tight end Kevin Silvestrini and junior tight end Anthony Tancs.

"Behind them we hope to move the ball a little bit," Miller said

On defense, returning linemen include Silvestrini at tackle.

Hanratty is proud to report that Anderson is one of 12 GL football players presently playing in college.

Others include Max Machado and Rob Ingebretsen at Bryant University, Frank Yannotta at Moravian, Frank Colder at East Stroudsburg, Matt Zimmerman of Mountainside - who is one of two captains this year - and Matt Boyer at Princeton, Ian Cunningham at Wagner, Tyler George at Monmouth, John Manganiello at Coast Guard Academy, Kevin Reavey at The College of New Jersey and Joe Gilfedder at Ithaca.

Hillside Comets sparked by a healthy Ginyard at quarterback

HILLSIDE – The Comets might have been on their way to a second consecutive playoff berth in North 2, Group 2 last year if were not for the loss of quarterback Davonte Ginyard to a broken collarbone.

After Hillside was coming off a tough 28-26 setback at North Plainfield that snapped a threegame winning streak, the Comets tangled with Rahway at Johnson's Nolan Field. In the first quarter of that that game, Ginyard suffered the injury, which included a torn rotator cuff.

He was able to come back and start Hillside's season-finale against Hanover Park, helping lead the Comets to a 45-24 sectional consolation triumph and a 4-6 finish. Now a senior, Ginyard is one of four returning starters on offense.

"Davonte worked extremely hard to get back into shape to be where he needed to be," third-year head coach John Power said. "He's a tough kid who really is the key to our offense.

"We struggled without him and he showed what a competitor he was against Hanover Park. He really continued in the off season and so far has played well in our scrimmages.

"We're looking forward to a big year from him."

In addition to junior right guard Justin Gist starting a couple of games last season, the other two prominent returning starters are senior left guard Bryant Aguilar and senior tailback Andrae Vogelson.

"Bryant is a National Honor Society student and a kid who has his best days of football ahead of him," Power said. "He's a hard-worker and a tough kid that is going to do great things with his life, whether it's in football, business or whatever.

"Vogelson has really grown up in the off season. He's made a lot of good decisions, not only on the football field but with his life. He has a promising future ahead of him. He's doing well in school and on the field and he's a team leader. We really like our senior class."

Vogelson at Sam linebacker and Aguilar at tackler are joined as returning starters on defense by senior safety Kevin Oshiokpekhai, who is also a wide receiver on offense and Hillside's punter on special teams. Ginyard runs a Multiple-I offense and shows great versatility at the signal-caller position.

"Davonte is extremely unselfish," Power said. "Even though we run the Multiple-I, we also run the option and he puts us in the right place. He's a guy that makes the right reads, which is really key for an option quarterback. He's extremely athletic."

Hillside got off to a slow start offensively last year, not scoring until the fourth quarter of its second game at Cranford.

However, two Comet touchdowns in that period were enough in an eventual 14-7 triumph.

"We need to find more consistency offensively," Power said. "We started slowly last year and then kind of hit our stride.

"Then we lost Davonte, which definitely hurt, and that falls on us as coaches to make sure we're more consistent in the event of an injury.

"We have more talent this season and should be a lot more consistent."

After allowing a Union County-best 85 points in 11 games in 2008, the Comets took a hit defensively last year when they surrendered 225 in 10.

"Basically, we've changed personnel and have kids that will definitely be better at going to the ball than they were last year," Power said. "I think they understand the scheme more.

"They learned their positions this summer and I think you'll see us play with a little more passion than we have."

Of the six teams in the Mid-State 39 Conference's East B Division, four of them - Summit, Johnson, Gov. Livingston and Rahway - have made it to a state championship game last year or the year before.

Hillside was one score away from making one itself two seasons ago.

The other team in the division - Cranford - is primed to challenge for a state playoff berth and produce its first winning season in three years.

"Overall, the league from top to bottom is outstanding," Power said.

Roselle Park Panthers claw their way until the very end **By JR Parachini**

ROSELLE PARK - The Panthers are coming off a first 0-10 season, have only four returning starters back total and face a very challenging schedule to say the least

Yet fifth-year head coach James Foy couldn't be more excited about the present and optimistic about the future.

"We told the kids to forget about last year, it's over, and we're moving on," Foy said. "We, literally, almost have a brand new team out there."

Roselle Park was last victorious on Oct. 17, 2008 when the Panthers won at Newark Central 28-20. The last home win was earlier that season against Sussex Tech 47-14. The Panthers finished 2-8 in 2008, with the last winning season achieved in 2006.

Returning starters on offense include quarterback Vinnie Brunette and running backs Connor Gabriel and Nick Longo - all seniors - and on defense junior safety Brendan Leary and Gabriel and Longo, who both play linebacker.

"For us to have only four guys coming back from last year after going 0-10 is very tough," Foy said. We have taken a different approach this year.

"We're very young and we're going to play a lot of sophomores as it turns out."

Roselle Park's first scrimmage was Aug. 24 when the Panthers hosted Glen Ridge, Manville and Kinnelon.

"With the first group, we had 5-6 sophomores out there," Foy said. "There's a lot of teaching right now, with it being a big adjustment for sophomores to come to varsity and see the speed quicker and the strength of the opponent stronger.

Compared to last season's first scrimmage, Foy was very pleased with the performance his young team put forth Aug. 24.

"We were definitely better," Foy said. "We didn't let up any touchdowns in the two rotations and on offense scored twice and moved the ball well.'

Summit and Dayton both went 0-10 in 2006 and just last year challenged for state championships, with the Hilltoppers winning their first one in 15 years, going 12-0 and finishing No. 1 in Union County.

Hillside went 0-10 in 2007 and then improved dramatically the past two seasons, including an 8-3 playoff campaign in 2008 where the Comets were one score away from reaching a state championship game.

"We're excited about where we're going to be," Foy said. "We hope to mature quickly. If the kids understand, we'll do a little better than last year. How our maturity translates to wins and losses we'll have to 2009 R. PARK PANTHERS (0-10) wait and see."

The most positive number that came out of last season was 33. Foy reported that the Panthers began (H) Manville 34, Roselle Park 16 the season with 33 players and also ended it with 33, despite all of the struggles in between.

"It was real credit to the players that nobody quit and there was no finger pointing," Foy said.

Last year's captains helped see to that, including seniors Will Fahoury, Victor Paulino and Ron Valente and Longo as a junior.

"Our kids were focused right to the last week, right up to the Roselle game," Foy said. "They hung on our every word.

"We still had 33 there on Thanksgiving morning and they did a great job of remaining focused.

"Success can be measured in different ways and that is one of them."

Longo, Gabriel and Brunette - the only three returning senior starters - were named this year's captains.

"We've talked to them about leading the way and showing the other kids how things are done," Foy said. "Normally the players vote on who the captains will be, but because we had so few seniors, the coaches decided to name those three right off the bat. We still might name one more."

Foy said the number of players now is 31, which might increase by a few by the time the season begins.

"With our sophomore and junior classes, we have a nice core of kids," Foy said. "One of the questions is how quick are they going to mature?

"In our first scrimmage those sophomores and juniors started to get a chance to play for the first time and saw what the competition was all about. How quick they will mature and gel as a team we'll have to see."


