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Two days, 400 years of history

Residents took a whirlwind tour through more than 400 years of life in Union County last weekend as local historic sites opened their doors to the public free of charge for the annual Four Centuries in a Weekend event.

This tour of more than 20 locations covers themes ranging from commerce and industry to farm life and early aristocracy, taking visitors from the battlefields of the American Revolution to the mansion of New Jersey's first governor.

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Union Candidates debate the issues

UNION - Four political candithe Township Committee sparred last week at a forum sponsored by the League of Women Voters.

Democrat Clifton People Jr., an incumbent, with one three-year term on the committee already under his belt, and his running mate, newcomer Suzette Cavadas, an attorney and Zoning Board of Adjustment member, went head to head for more than an hour with Republican challengers Charles Donnelly and Paul Verzosa, political novices who are making a second try at breaking the stronghold the Democrats have had on the

Candidates getting voter support Nov. 2 will not just reap a political victory but a financial one as well. Each member of the governing body is paid a stipend of \$15,257 a year, while the chairman of the Township Committee, or honorary "mayor," position is paid a stipend of \$18,367.

This is considerably higher than what many nearby municipalities pay their elected officials. For example, Cranford pays their commissioners just \$2,557 a year to serve on the governing body. Councilmen in the city of Linden receive \$17,707 in compensation and the elected mayor \$62,000 a year.

During the forum last Thursday, each of the candidates spent four minutes providing opening comments, which included their own views about issues facing the township and personal background information. This segment of the forum was followed by questions submitted by audience members prior to the forum and pre-

approved by league moderator Dawn Clarke.

One of the questions that raised dates vying for two open seats on the ire of Donnelly and Verzosa was mention of the "half empty" Union Center and how candidates felt redevelopment might change that situation.

> People cited a new 7-Eleven store, proposed medical offices and the newly renovated Stop and Shop supermarket on the perimeter of the center as continued efforts to revitalize the center. He also felt the township could not drop the ball at

This might be tough economic times but development has continued," he stressed.

Cavadas, on the other hand, felt residents also had to play an active part in keeping the center going.

'I live within walking distance of the center and I still take my two-year-old son downtown for a cupcake or to shop," she said.

Verzosa was not as concerned about the center or empty stores, but seemed concerned about the number of townhouses being built on Vauxhall Road.

"This could have a big impact on our schools," he said, quipping that "maybe we need to turn Vauxhall Road into a four lanes.'

Donnelly agreed with his running mate, suggesting that with 172 townhouses, the impact on the schools could be more than the township could handle.

"At \$12,599 a year to educate each child, that is a more than \$3 brought up the fact Union Center's Special Improvement District was 'double taxing business owners."

That is good in one way and bad in another," he said, adding that



Rahway under longtime Mayor James Kennedy, they agreed there was much additional work to be done to revitalize the city, especially in light of the economic recession

Proctor said it is extremely important to maintain the city's stable tax rate, which he said is below the state average. This can be achieved through continuing to revitalize the downtown, specifically the arts district. He said increased interest and revenue in the downtown will also help the city deal with the 2 percent cap that will be enforced by the state next year.

"The best way to deal with the cap is to improve your revenue situation," Proctor said.

Cassio said the taxpayers want and need more open, accountable government and an end to irresponsible spending.

"I'm not against redevelopment, I'm against deals that don't help the taxpayer," Cassio said.

Cassio said that while a good "framework" is in place, the city must work harder to attract small retail businesses rather than focusing so much on large government-funded facilities like the library and arts center. Cassio said the Democrat-controlled government has become "out of touch" with the property tax problems residents are facing and needs to cut back on wasteful spending.

Proctor said the city is already working hard as Cassio suggests, and blamed the recession for the halt in redevelopment.

Resident Charles Neil demanded to know if the mayoral candidates would put an end to nepotism in the local government.

"I'm only here five years and I've never seen anything like this," Neil said.

Proctor insisted that all hirings would be conduct-

Proctor insisted that all hirings would be conducted through the civil service test without discrimina-

tion. Cassio however suggested the city's hiring process was not as fair and open as it could be due to a partisan "reward system."

"Under the Cassio administration, when you retire you're going to get a handshake but you're not going to get a second job," Cassio said.

Other candidates denied statements suggesting local salaries were higher than they should be.

"There are no big salaries in Rahway," Baker said.
Proctor assured the audience that if he is successful in November, he intends to resign from his job as health officer and freeholder to focus on serving in the office of mayor.

"I won't be triple dipping," Proctor said..

A recurring topic was the city's debt and borrowing practices, which Cassio described as irresponsible, as evidenced by a recent denial of an additional loan by the state Local Finance Board. "We can't keep borrowing money we can't pay back," Cassio said.

Proctor insisted that the debt was not out of control and said Cassio was not painting an accurate picture of how business is being conducted by the city.

"The city has bonded projects we've had to do," Proctor said. "The city is staying within our means. We are not, as Pat is recklessly stating, borrowing money we can't pay back."

The debate eventually took a turn for the personal when Proctor questioned Cassio's ability to handle the city's finances when he has been late on his own taxes for several quarters.

"I'm late on my taxes because unlike Mr. Proctor, I have one job," Cassio retorted.

In their closing statements, Democrat council candidates echoed many of Proctor's points.

"We're on the right track," Baker said. "It may take a little more time to get there but we have to be patient."

School renovations on track in Summit

SUMMIT — A slate of school renovation projects funded in part by state grants are on schedule and set to run into 2011, according to school officials who made a presentation charting the past and future of the undertaking last

Financed by an additional \$3.9 billion authorized in 2008 by then-Gov. Jon Corzine, the legislation included \$1 billion earmarked for Regular Operating Districts throughout the state.

These grants are commonly known as RODS grants. In Summit, the total project represents an expense of about \$20 million, 60 percent of which is provided from grants, with 40 percent matched by the city. Work has included renovating doors, windows, fire alarms, sprinklers and roofs that were not up to code. Despite the effects of an ongoing recession, Superintendent of Schools Nathan Parker argued that the economic climate was suitable for this particular spending, citing low interest rates and bids coming in 20 to 40 per-

"There are economic reasons that I think are very persuasive," Parker said. Mayor Jordan Glatt agreed with this assessment.

"It's such a discount I think we'd be crazy to let it go by," he said.

The Oct. 14 meeting brought the public up to date on the RODS projects, which comprise two years' worth of work with origins dating back to a detailed review of the school facilities conducted in 2008.

The first two rounds of work have been completed, and RODS III is expected to get under way in the next few months.

This phase consists of partial window and lead paint removal at Jefferson School, partial window replacements at Franklin School, mechanical systems upgrades at Lawton C. Johnson Middle School, the installation of emergency generators at Lawton C. Johnson Middle School and Summit High School.

The only objections raised by city officials involved work at Lincoln Hubbard School, where early plans aimed at improving the traffic pattern and student drop off entail carving out a drop-off area and adding additional road surface to allow more vehicles to access the school.

Glatt said the plan was not fleshed out enough and expressed concern about the potential for further noise and traffic congestion in the area.

"I just felt they needed to work out some of the details before it came to the board of school estimate," Glatt said.

He also expressed concern about the potential for further noise and traffic congestion in the area.

"I think we need to notify the neighbors in that area," Glatt said. "I think we're walking into a hornet's nest by not doing that."

Parker indicated the district is not satisfied with this particular proposal in its current state either, adding further review is needed.

"We have to do something, but I want to be sure we're doing the right thing," Glatt said.

Parker said the RODS III projects will hopefully be completed by Sept. 2011. Glatt added that the plans may be reviewed again in the next few weeks.

More than 1,000 students apply to Saturday School

UNION — It looks like the school district is going to have to push back the start date for Saturday Academy because there has been an overwhelming flood of applications - more than 1,000 to be exact.

Even though Superintendent of Schools Patrick Martin knew the concept of a Saturday Academy was something students and parents would embrace because it presented another option for students who actually wanted to learn more, he had no idea how receptive parents would be.

"It is the most extraordinary thing, we have received over 1,000 applications from families whose kids want to attend our academy," Martin said Monday, admitting he never expected a response like this in such a short amount of time.

Initially, Martin was planning on filtering 180 students into nine classes that were geared toward providing additional, no-nonsense, focused instruction in language arts and math to students in grades kindergarten through eight.

Now the superintendent needs more time to make room for the additional 820 kids who want to be a part of the academy program.

Although some superintendents might find this somewhat overwhelming, Martin is elated and excited by the response and how it proves that Union district students want to learn more and they will come to school on a Saturday to do so.

As for turning anyone away or having a lottery to select a specific number of students for the program, Martin refuses to even entertain that thought.

"I can't turn anyone away, we will just have to admitting that while there was work to be done before cally earmarked to bring teachers back to work.

"With 1,000 students, that means we will need 50 teachers instead on nine, and we probably will have to run two sessions, one in the morning and the other in the afternoon," Martin said, adding that the district had already put an advertisement in a statewide newspaper for teachers and received more than 100 resumes.

"So we won't have problems getting teachers, but there is a lot to do before they can be hired," he stressed, pointing out that every teacher has to be fingerprinted to ensure they have no criminal record and checked to see if they are certified by the state.

"This is a good problem to have," the superintendent said, excitement peppering his comments for a program that he believes will help bring the district back to where it was years ago.

Martin said he received several phone calls and email messages following an article in last week's Union County LocalSource, encouraging him to continue to bring forth other programs.

"It is very rewarding to know kids in this district want to learn," Martin said, adding that "nothing can stand in our way now."

However, before Saturday Academy gets rolling, the superintendent has a few things to take care of, such as meeting with the parents who sent in all those applications. The problem Martin has to solve is finding a facility large enough to accommodate all those

Still, Martin is certain that by hosting several meetings, he will be able to handle the situation.

"We can handle anything if it's for the kids," he added.

We must help our neighbors

Economic definitions may have determined an end to the recession, but most people would question that observation. Many of our residents know of at least one person who became unemployed during this period. Some, especially in the lower economic classes, were affected severely beyond losing work.

Most out-of-work residents receive the cushion of unemployment benefits and possibly food stamps. These are funded in part through taxes they paid before they lost employment. Sometimes, though, getting help from the government is not enough. This is especially so with families. The aid, given at a reduced level compared to their earnings when employed, often is quickly spent to provide food and other needs for parents and children.

This means a family's other requirements may have to wait. Even food purchased by aid might not last until the next benefit period. These are the families who need the help of those of us in a position to help.


There are many local organizations which provide help to residents with the greatest need. Community groups and houses of worship operate "clothes closets" and food pantries which provide items at minimal or no

Not only might these groups accept donation of items, but cash donations also would be welcomed as they can be used to fund their program and purchase items to be given to residents who need help.

We are sure there are residents who believe the plight of the unemployed is of their own making. We have heard the arguments often: families should have saved, been thrifty, not purchased a home beyond their means. But unless such residents knew of a family's situation during employment, statements such as these have no

Even so, these families need help now, and their neighbors should be willing to provide a little assistance. We are not talking about a large sum: A group which receives \$5 here, \$10 there, can quickly collect enough to provide aid.

Look in the telephone book, go online, read local newspapers, and you can find groups that seek donations. We urge residents to donate and help their neighbors in need. Put yourself in their shoes.

Striving for a higher level of analysis

A long time ago my girlfriend boldly announced she would be accompanying me to my tax law class the next day. She said, "Look, we go to dinner, we talk about Professor Ridgeley Scott. At the movies it's still about him. I want to see this guy who has become such a big part of both our lives."

The girlfriend later became my wife. Scott became an advisor and friend before he retired. I have long ago forgotten the sections of the IRS code I struggled to understand. Scott did leave me with a solid memory. He would challenge students to strive for a higher level of analysis.

It's the same standard we should apply to candidates this year. Forget the recycled slogans. Let's seek out some specificity in the plans of incumbents and challengers as well. Forget the limited examples, let's get the entire picture as to their plan of action.

In Cranford it looks like the issue of the new sewer bill has injected life into an otherwise dull campaign. In a "dear resident" letter, Mayor Mark Smith took a politically pre-emptive strike with a mailing to all taxpayers. It sounds similar to the former statements of fellow Commissioner Mark Dugan where he blithely called taking "the sewer tax out of the tax-bill a "bookkeeping entry."

Smith explained, "Previously the RVSA charges were built into

the general tax rate, however due to budgetary considerations the Township Committee agreed to bill the sewer charges separately this year." In the letter, Smith previously had said, "The sewer fee is not a new tax or a new charge, its simply a different way for the township to collect for services provided by the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authori-

While long, the problem with the Smith and Dugan explanations is that it only tells half the story. That is the deception taking place.

By removing the sewer portions of the payment from the tax bill, it's no longer part of expenses that can be deducted for income tax purposes. Smith has previously estimated that affects a third of the communi-

The local Democratic Campaign that has been less than a firebrand seized on the new opportunity. At the Sunday Chamber of Commerce fair they were handing out fliers decrying the "sewer tax." While a lot of people getting the flier don't live in Cranford, this was some proof of signs of life. They charged "stop the Smith Sewer Tax." They

continued, "Mayor Smith created the new tax in order to increase municipal taxes beyond the state mandated limit."

If Smith has any solace a similar sewer tax in Clark had little impact on the campaign results two years

Still you have to wonder if Smith and Dugan had been more forthright in saying they circumvented cap rules but they didn't feel more cuts were right they might have been better off. Or they might just believe the anger is temporary while the sewer tax is permanent.

A day earlier in Cranford at the Rustic Mill Diner, incumbent Freeholder Dan Sullivan had finished coffee and was bantering with a group of seniors. It was a light and friendly chat until one guy challenged Sullivan on the closing of Muhlenberg Hospital in Plainfield.

The senior said it was a fine hospital and "all of you should have saved it." Sullivan, with more patience than I could have ever mustered, explained that while the county is responsible for the public Runnells Hospital, they have nothing to do with Muhlenberg Hospital, which is privately run. While it was never clear what "all of you" meant, it does raise a key point. It's not only the candidates that need to be held to a higher level of analysis.

It occurred by choice — the choice of our Congress and presidents to give mortgages to people who couldn't possibly afford them.

If you listen to guys like Chris Dodd and Barney Frank, it was the evil financial institutions and huge bonuses that got us all in trouble. Sure, they gave out bad mortgages. If they didn't, the next guy would. But it was the secondary market, the one Dodd, Frank and others pressured to buy, that gave the banks the green light.

The housing bubble and burst started with President Clinton's "The National Homeownership Strategy: Partners in the American Dream," a program with a hundred separate initiatives to increase home ownership. Among the most aggressive, and ultimately most damaging was the push to get Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac to buy subprime loans. From 2002 to 2006 the U.S. subprime market grew 290 percent over prior years. Mae and Mac bought more and more subprimes, from \$38 billion to \$175 billion each year.

President Bush's hands aren't clean, either. The Republicans controlled Congress six of his eight years. Bad loans could have been stopped. Political correctness prevented it, as did political survival.

There's no easy solution. Our current government has decided to debt our way out, rather than suck it up

and let the chips fall. The problem is there will never, ever come a time when the American economy is doing so well that that debt will get repaid. Because God forbid we ever somehow have a surplus, politicians, Republican and Democrat alike, will rush to spend it on their constituents. Meaning, on their own political careers.

As a resident of Cranford who does not even live in the Solomon Schecter School area, I wanted to voice my support for the purchase of the school and surrounding property. I think it is positive for the town in many ways. Here are a few:

We will strive to avoid the initial raising of controversial or sensational issues in the final edition before election. We aim to focus on what the voter needs to know and not on what the candidates want to say.

Our guidelines reflect the reader-service objectives of this newspaper in elections. However, we will review our guidelines from time to time and revise them if necessary to benefit our readers.

Following is the schedule we will adhere to in the Nov. 2 election:

Letters to the editor: Letters of endorsement and support will be accepted up to and including the issue of Oct. 21. Letters may be printed or appear as excerpts at the editor's discretion. Endorsement letters containing more than 250 words will be edited for length, regardless of how many candidates they endorse. Letters without telephone numbers will not be considered for pub-

Mayor addresses tax issues, layoffs

LINDEN — With election day just around the corner, Mayor Richard Gerbounka is not holding back when it comes to issues facing the city.

An Independent candidate, Gerbounka is up against Democrat challenger Derek Armstead, who is seeking his first term as mayor. Armstead has not responded to repeated attempts to contact him for comments on his campaign. A resident since he was 8 years old, Gerbounka admits that if John Gregorio had not been mayor for 28 years, he probably would not have become involved in politics.

"Indicted, convicted and thrown out of office," Gerbounka said of Gregorio, the former mayor was later pardoned by Gov. Kean a few hours before he left office. Still astounded by what happened, the mayor seems stunned that Gregorio managed to get himself elected once again.

So he decided to go up against Gregorio and let voters decide who should be the last man standing. In the end, 104 votes separated the two, and Gerbounka was swept into office. Gerbounka has a reputation for saying exactly what he thinks and letting the chips fall where they may. For instance, when it comes to the number of city employees, especially firefighters, the mayor is brutally honest about what needs to be done.

'You have to understand that 68 percent of our \$95 million budget is personnel and we have to make cuts," Gerbounka said, adding that "we're looking at laying off 16 firemen." But he backs up this need for layoffs in the Fire Department with a few information points, such as the fact Union has a population of 55,000 and only 103 firemen compared to Linden, with a population of 40,000 and 123 firemen,

Gerbounka readily admits that Linden taxes are increasing 14 percent this year, and as mayor he is not proud of that. But he is certain that if a few things on the back burner get rolling, the city will get the financial break they need in the form of taxes.

This is another touchy subject with the mayor, but he does not hide his feelings or, for that matter, what he believes should be done to rectify the situation. It all started, he said, when the former General Motors plant on Route 1 across from Aviation Plaza was leveled and plans for a new retail center were ready to roll. Gerbounka said the project is supposed to be anchored by a Super Walmart on one end and Lowe's hardware store on the other, with up to 20 retail stores in between.

Initially, the Linden Planning Board had approved zoning changes See MAYOR, Page 12

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

from light industrial to retail and it appeared the project had a green light. However, things came to a grinding halt when ShopRite sued the city claiming the Planning Board's process in changing the zoning was flawed. Gerbounka said that when the matter got to court the judge said the city's process was correct but recommended the planning board have a "do-over" just as an added precaution.

Once again, he said, the planning board unanimously approved the zoning change and despite that, ShopRite appealed the decision.

"That puts this entire project back on hold and no taxes coming in from that property except \$800,000 a year," the mayor said, adding that when Legacy Square is completed, the city will reap \$5.2 million in revenue annually. The loss, he said, is entirely due to "ShopRite not wanting that new development to go up because Super Walmart has a grocery department." But he has a solution to the problem.

'People shouldn't shop at ShopRite in Aviation Plaza because they are punishing taxpayers and the city," Gerbounka said. "We need this revenue desper-


Levenson said in three of the establishments, the undercover offiservices, each ranging in price from \$50 to \$100 more than a regular mas-







Tech Team forms at Summit grade school



New Motor Vehicle Commission building opens doors in Rahway

RAHWAY — The days when a visit to the Motor Vehicle Commission meant hours of delay and frustration are hopefully becoming a thing of the past in New Jersey, as evidenced by several new MVC buildings that have recently sprung up, including one in Rahway.

Located on Woodbridge Avenue at East Hazelwood Avenue adjacent to the Rahway Inspection Station and Driver Testing Center, this facility is one of five throughout the state to undergo a thorough "modernization.'

A ribbon-cutting for the new facility was on Oct. 7, attended by Motor Vehicle Commission Chief Administrator Raymond P. Martinez as well as other state and local officials. "We are confident the decision to enhance the Rahway facility is the right one as it will undoubtedly help the residents of Union County better fulfill their motor vehicle needs with a more operationally-efficient location," Martinez said.

The 9,200 square foot building has 16 service windows, five photo stations, 20 driving test stations and expanded customer waiting areas and parking. The site also includes two training rooms that provide the flexibility for regionalized employee training.

Along with the new building, officials took the time to recognize an old employee - Beatrice Russo, who first joined the agency in 1963 when it first opened and will continue to serve in the new building.

"We felt it was fitting to honor her since she's been there since the beginning," said MVC spokeswoman Elyse Coffey.

The building also boasts a number of green components aimed at reducing energy costs for the state, such as recycled rubber flooring, a window wall and skylight for more natural light, white roofing to reflect heat and automatic sensors on light and bathroom fix-

agency" illustrated the future of motor vehicle services, members of the public conducting business at the facility were slow to note any improvements.

"It's a loose interpretation of the word improved," said Rahway resident Nelson Moteiro. "Bigger building, smaller waiting area."

Moteiro and his wife, Jennifer, visited the new MVC on Oct. 16 but left without being able to conclude their business. Another first-time visitor, Isa Santana, indicated she has yet to find out if workings of the staff match the slick exterior. "I think it looks better than the one before," she said.

Contributing largely to the underwhelming first impression may have been the fact that the MVC's computer system was down. Delays caused the waiting area to fill up and a line of people to stretch out the door and down the sidewalk.

Coffey said the modernization for these five agencies is financed by a bond taken out in 2003. Construction of the Rahway facility cost \$7 million.

The final phase of the project is still underway and due for completion in spring 2011. This involves the demolition of the old agency and the construction of a field house that will be used by driver testing person-

The funding was dedicated at the recommendation of the Fix DMV Commission when it noted the lack of investment in and neglect of the primary outlet for motor vehicle services. The reform efforts include the implementation of evening service hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays and web-based transactions.

"Whether by phone, mail, in person or online, it is critically important that the more than 25 million customer contacts we have each year are positive experiences that demonstrate our focus on excellent customer service," added Martinez.

Local municipalities have been buckling under the strain of keeproad during daytime hours for close to a decade. But next year things will get a little easier when the county lends a helping hand.

The county will launch their own ambulance service starting in April. The service will operate Monday through Friday from 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., allowing the county to respond with mutual aid to all 21 municipalities of the coun-

The new service, based in Westfield at the county complex on North Avenue, will have two emergency medical technicians ready to respond on one of two rigs.

The cost to the county, and taxpayers, will be \$174,000 annually, including salary and benefits for personnel, as well as restocking and maintenance on the rigs. There also is a \$38,000 startup cost that will be used to get the two ambulances, donated by Rahway, and ready to roll by spring.





Those who have experienced Eye Bank of New Jersey. blindness, followed by the miracle of restored sight through corneal transplantation, begin to see the world in a way many people cannot. They no longer take their eyesight for granted.





Johnson comes back to top Hillside in last minute



After losing to Oak Knoll in the title game five years in a row, the sixth time was a charm last year for the Crusaders. The teams battled on Cranford's new field turf at Memorial Field, with third-seeded Johnson coming out on top by a 3-2 score over top-seeded Oak Knoll.

Behind first-half goals from Megan Fisaconaro and Nicole Imbriaco and the most important insurance goal by standout senior Jess Rusin, Johnson held on to finally knock off Oak Knoll in a UCT final and capture its first county championship. Johnson defeated Summit at home two years ago to win its first sectional title.

Oak Knoll, with two more regular season wins over Johnson last year, came back to pull to within 3-2 on second-half goals by Sarah Butterfield and Seton Hartnett.

However, Johnson goalie Becky Brattole did not allow the tying goal and made 12 saves in an outstanding winning effort.

Stephanie Lewis and Rusin earned assists on two of the three goals. Johnson won its fourth straight to improve to 12-4 last year, with its previous loss a 1-0 regular season setback at Oak Knoll.

In last Saturday's UCT semifinals at Johnson, Kellie Campbell scored off an assist from Martin and Brattole made seven saves to lead the secondseeded Crusaders past third-seeded Summit 1-0 in overtime. In regular season play, Johnson edged Summit 2-1 at home back on Sept. 28.

In the second semifinal, Elizabeth Jacobson scored in the second half to push top-seeded Oak Knoll past fifth-seeded Cranford. Oak Knoll previously defeated Cranford 7-1 on the road four days earlier.

As of Monday, Oak Knoll stood at 13-0, including a 3-2 overtime win at Essex County standout West Essex last Thursday.

Johnson's record was 13-2, including a 1-0 home setback to South Jersey power Moorestown Oct. 11.

Linden, Dayton put Union County football on map

Linden and Dayton put Union County football on the map last Friday night by going on the road - out of county - and beating 5-0 teams.

Linden went to Immaculata for a second straight season, but this time left Somerset County with a come-from-behind 19-14 victory in Mid-State 39 Conference-East A Division action in Somerville.

Linden won its fourth straight to improve to 4-1, while Immaculata fell to 5-1.

Dayton also went to Belvidere for a second straight season, but this time left Warren County with a more-thanconvincing 33-6 triumph in Mid-State 39 Conferenceinterdivision action.

Dayton won its fifth straight to improve to 5-1, while Belvidere fell to 5-1.

This was Linden's biggest victory since winning at heavily favored Piscataway 13-12 in the 2006 North 2, Group 4 quarterfinals. That was the last year Linden made the playoffs and that's Linden's last playoff win. Immaculata rarely loses at home and almost never loses to a Union County opponent in Somerville.

Linden - winners of four straight - is now tied for first with Westfield, which is off this week, in the Mid-State 39 Conference's East A Division. Linden and Westfield are now both 4-1 overall and 3-0 in the division. Immaculata is now 5-1 overall and 2-1 in the division.

"A lot of planning went into this victory," said third-year Linden head coach Deon Candia. This is Candia's biggest victory at the helm of the Tigers. He is a 1991 Linden graduate who played for and coached under Bucky McDonald.

"They alternate a lot of guys on both lines, while a lot of our kids play on both sides of the ball. Conditioning was big this week as was our focus mentally. We still have young kids and they learned how to bounce back and play a full game in an environment that is not easy to excel in."

Linden senior Will Ingram, one of the team's emotional leaders, pulled the Tigers to within 14-13 in the third quarter after returning a blocked punt 30 yards for a TD. Linden's extra point failed, preventing the Tigers from tying up the game at that point.

An interception by junior cornerback Jahaad Smith set up the winning touchdown drive at roughly the Immaculata 45 with some seven minutes to go in the fourth quarter. A fouryard touchdown run by Ingram capped the drive, putting Linden ahead 19-14 after a two-point play failed.

Immaculata was held on four downs and then Linden was stopped, with the Tigers punting the ball back. Immaculata had the ball on its own 40 with 15 seconds left. A completed pass to the Linden 30 was the last play of the game.

"It was a great overall effort from all of our kids," Candia said. "I told the kids that they are capable of playing like this if they give the kind of effort that they gave tonight. Immaculata has a legendary coach (Pierce Frauenheim) and will be there year after year. We told our kids that if they do what they need to do, they can play with anyone."

Now Linden has to back up this huge win at home against Ridge tomorrow night and not look ahead to a road game against Westfield next weekend. Ridge is 1-5 overall and 1-4 in the West A Division. The Red Devils, which last year played in the North 2, Group 4 final, have lost four straight.

This is not a Elizabeth, a Plainfield, a Union or a Rahway. Ridge is a team Linden is not familiar with. Ridge is not a neighborhood rival. The Red Devils moved into North 2, Group 4 in 2008 and will be playing Linden for the first time or the first time in awhile.

"Ridge has a different brand of football," Candia said. They are a tough team that executes and has great coaching and history. We need to focus again and we need to be sharp.'

Dayton and Belvidere both moved to 5-1, Dayton now winners of five straight and 5-1 for the second straight season. Belvidere was the only team to beat Dayton in the regular season last year, coming back in the fourth quarter to pull out an 18-13 triumph. Both of these teams are trying to qualify in North 2, Group 1 for a second straight season. Belvidere also defeated Dayton 20-0 at Union in a 2008 sectional consolation contest.

"We came out early and drove right down the field, although we fumbled on our first two possessions going in," said fifth-year Dayton head coach Joe Goerge.

Goerge said sophomore quarterback Anthony Cioffi rushed for three touchdowns, sophomore running back Carl Korieocha rushed for one and Cioffi threw a 60-yard touchdown pass to Aaron Williams.

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

Shoplifting Turns Big Business - and Turns on America

By Rod Hirsch

Well-organized, sophisticated rings of professional shoplifters and boosters – including terrorist cells helping to finance violence in the Middle East – are filching American retailers for upward of \$30 billion annually, selling stolen merchandise at a discounted price to other retailers and increasingly on the Internet, a virtual flea market with a worldwide customer base hunting for bargains.

Organized retail theft (ORT), or organized retail crime (ORC), plagues the retail marketplace, driving up prices on a wide range of consumer goods, everything from diapers and baby formula to auto parts, power tools and jewelry.

Dubbed "shrink" by the industry, losses reached nearly \$115 billion globally last year, according to a report from the Center for Retail Research and Checkpoint Systems based in the United Kingdom.

The crime rings are active in northern New Jersey and New York City; the region ranks in the top 10 nationwide for organized retail theft activity, according to the National Retail Federation. New Jersey retailers lose between \$250-\$500 million annually, according to Union County Prosecutor Ted Romankow, a member of a statewide committee working to combat ORT by organizing law enforcement agencies and retailers to share information through a dedicated communications network.

"The idea is to find ways to stop this if we can or slow it down, reduce the theft problem we have," Romankow said. "We're already focusing in on the intelligence that will be gathered by these retail participants and shared amongst themselves...

"We all agree it's important to share this information on a timely basis. If so, we may be able to prevent it. If there are some boosters hitting Sussex or Bergen County and they begin to move up and down the state, we can forewarn merchants."

Pending federal legislation also is designed to add more firepower to the fight against ORT. In September the House passed the Organized Retail Theft Investigation and Prosecution Act of 2010, bipartisan legislation that directs the U.S. Attorney General to establish an Organized Retail Theft and Investigation Unit tasked with investigating and prosecuting ORT, assisting state and local law enforcement's pursuit of organized retail thieves, and working with victims of the growing criminal activity. The legislation must pass the Senate.

No one is immune, experts say. The boosters target everyone, from big box retailers to neighborhood mom and pop stores, suburban strip malls and urban storefronts.

"New Jersey retailers have a loss of about \$230 per shoplifting incident on average," Romankow said. "We think of shoplifting as someone who steals a stick of gum or a piece of clothing, some small item. But it's a much more serious problem than that. These rings are stealing pretty substantial amounts of product and moving it through a fence. A lot of this now is being sold online. Whereas you used to get about 10 cents or a quarter on the dollar at a flea market, now you're getting

upwards of 65 to 70 percent on the dollar."

Several compelling arguments demand a ramped up, coordinated response to ORT, according to John Emling, senior vice president of government affairs at the Retail Industry Leaders Association (RILA). He said ORT:

 Puts public safety at risk since crime rings often resort to violence. The continued presence of organized criminals in retail settings threatens the safety of shoppers and employees, alike.

Neither Man Nor Machine are Immune from Data Theft

It is one of your worst nightmares come true. You reach for your blackberry – packed with your schedule, hundreds of contacts and sensitive business information – and it is gone.

One moment of distraction and your confidential information could be anywhere, in anyone's hands.

For Eric Tunis, an attorney with Greenbaum, Rowe, Smith & Davis LLP, such a nightmare recently became reality. Tunis was fortunate to recover his device but he emphasizes, "No matter how vigilant you are, no matter how high-tech you are, no matter how far you go to counter the sophistication of the bad

guys out there, you're still at the mercy of human weakness."

Last year alone there were I I million reported lost or stolen identities, an approximate I0 percent increase over the previous year, according to Art Brown of Pre-Paid Legal Services, Inc. Of these cases, database breaches accounted for slightly more than 50 percent.

As incidents of data theft rise, businesses are under increasing pressure – not to mention state and federal regulations – to protect customer and employee information. While flagrant violators could face substantial fines and penalties that may

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Effective Sales Management to Avoid The Ruins of Chichen Itza

The Mayan ruins at Chichen Itza in Mexico are marvelous to behold. They include a beautiful pyramid that can predict the solstices, a planetarium and a huge playing field that looks like a Quidditch pitch in the J.K. Rowling Harry Potter series.

The Mayans had a very advanced civilization that included one of the three independently invented written alphabets; highly developed knowledge of astronomy, architecture and math; and sophisticated medicine.



Other advanced Central American civilizations - including the Aztecs and the Incas - declined after the Spanish colonists and soldiers came to the Americas. Not so with the Mayan center at Chichen Itza. It declined hundreds of years before the Spanish arrived.

History identifies these outstanding features of the declining Mayan civilization:

- 1. Advanced knowledge was held by a small number of priests, mathematicians, etc. To the common Mayan, it was esoteric knowledge - magic.
- 2. When things went bad (e.g. droughts, bad crops), the Mayans resorted to human sacrifice. Instead of a policy of woman and children saved first, the leaders protected their own declining position.
- 3. When the last rulers imposed unjust burdens including taxes and continuing the practice of human sacrifice - the people started abandoning the cities. Eventually the civilized center fell into disuse.

Businesses that repeat past behavior, without thoughtful analysis, are susceptible to inducing the ruins of Chichen Itza. This is particularly so with respect to new business development, where ownership is grappling with an uncertain future demand and may need radical new

With rapidly changing markets, plagued by declining life cycles, ineffective sales management produces the ruins of Chichen Itza, where:

- 1. Sales are in decline There is no sense of urgency, by either prospects or salespeople.
- 2. If there is a selling system, it is esoteric knowledge. Salespeople don't understand why they should follow the system. Often top management and/or ownership have contempt for sales (no wonder sales are off).
- 3. Sales leadership overseeing the decline often sets objectives that protect and reward themselves but don't align with corporate success.
- 4. Innovative outsourced solutions are dismissed out of hand.

To prevent the "sales ruins of Chichen Itza," business owners must follow author Michael Gerber's injunction and work "on the business," not "in the business." Ownership needs to seek best practices and constant improvement on an ongoing basis. One way to do this is by participating in peer advisory group meetings, with an organization like Vistage.

Another is through inviting a sales consultant to help install sales best practices, especially needed in new business development. An effective sales and sales management system can:

- · Boost sales 10-20 percent or more, with a limited financial investment
- · Create or manage prospect urgency and commitment
- · End sales force blackmail
- · Provide concrete measurable assessments of each opportunity, answering the question: Is this prospect viable, or wasting our time?
- · Teach and reinforce fearless behavior by the sales team
- Become a scalable core asset, increasing firm valuation 20 percent or more
- · Help sales force recruiting

run into the millions of dollars per violation, Brown notes that non-flagrant violators – those who have at least made a "reasonable attempt" to guard data – may also face fines, albeit lesser ones.

Yet not all businesses fully understand their vulnerabilities, liabilities and what steps to take to safeguard confidential data.

Tunis recommends starting at the point of hire and having employees sign a formal waiver acknowledging that "anytime (an employee) uses company equipment for personal use, (he or she) is subject to discovery." It is also important to hold periodic training to remind employees of the use and misuse of company equipment and to emphasize the consequences of misuse, he adds.

Sergeant Michael Hoose, supervisor of the Union County Prosecutor's Office High Tech/Computer Services Unit, agrees that the greatest threat to data security is the employee.

"Everyone feels that they have the most sophisticated information and protection in place," he notes, citing examples like firewalls, antivirus programs, retina scans, smart cards and biometric entry. "We have the best protection on our computer network (but) the weakest link in this whole circle is the human being."

Not only can employees with work-based internet access inadvertently invite threats, but hackers may be able to convince workers to reveal bits of information over time which, when collected, can open the door to inside attacks, according to Hoose. He warns that employees must be trained to ask questions of people, regardless of whom they may be.

"Additional security will be training personnel, monitoring what they're doing...(and making) sure they're cleared to do the job they're hired to do," he said.

Brown recommends businesses take several steps.

"Every business should appoint an information security officer," he said. "They need to have a non-public information policy. They need to educate and train their employees about their non-public information policy...(And) they need to prepare some type of a written plan should they ever have a database breach."

Although talk of data theft may conjure up images of computer whizzes cracking codes and hacking systems, the risks can often be much less sophisticated – and be addressed with common sense.

For example, when Arlene Reardon took the helm of Therapeutic Massage and Training Center in Westfield two years ago, she found virtually no security on private information. Paper files containing individuals' medical history were everywhere, with not so much as a lock to protect them.

"The first thing I did was call in a locksmith to have the cabinets where the files were held locked," Reardon said. Over the next two years, she went through the files, scanning or digitally recreating all those containing important information and saving them in password-protected files that only she and her assistant director can access.

"Look at the information that you've got out on your desk," Reardon recommends to other business owners. "If somebody were to copy that information, would you want that information being spread? Look at everything with the eye, 'What if somebody picked that up?'"

Whether high-tech or humanly perpetrated, experts warn that data theft is a threat that gives no indication of disappearing. It is up to businesses to maximize their defenses against it so those "what if" scenarios do not become living nightmares.

"I would urge you to take this problem seriously," advised Tunis.

- Hurts everyone. Retailers lose money though reduced profits and additional expenditures for security personnel, training and equipment – dollars that could be better spent on business expansion and job creation or better pricing and selection.
- Hurts consumers through higher prices and the inconvenience of more limited product selection or more difficult access to products that are secured as a preventative measure.
- Presents a serious threat to public health and safety. ORT gangs steal high-cost items, including infant formula, pharmaceuticals and other consumer health care products. These products require proper storage and handling – issues for which ORT thieves have little regard.
- Costs state and local governments more than a billion dollars per year in lost tax revenue that would have been generated through legitimate sales.

"We deal with this problem every day," said Nate Hartle, senior group manager of investigations for national retailer Target Stores. "Our first and foremost focus is on prevention. Most retailers will tell you the same thing. We want to stop the theft from happening in the first place.

"An issue this large, you can't apprehend your way to resolving this problem due to the sheer volume. It puts an added drain on law enforcement. It's just more cases for the cops to work and they're already strapped.

"This requires a deeper solution than one retailer," he continued. "We want the online marketplace to have (the) mindset, how are they making it tougher or more difficult to sell stolen property online? This problem requires a multi-pronged, multi-level approach."

Global online marketplace eBay has partnered with retailers to combat ORT.

"At eBay we have no tolerance for stolen goods as it hurts honest entrepreneurs who are selling legitimate products and is totally against what we stand for," said Paul Jones, senior director of global asset protection for the online marketplace. "A lot of progress has been made in the last few years in terms of cooperation, both in terms of industry groups and also with law enforcement."

This summer eBay announced formal partnerships with leading retail industry trade groups, including the National Retail Federation (NRF), Food Marketing Institute and Jewelers Security Alliance, in an ongoing effort to work together and fight ORT.

The partnership, supported by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, aims to help law enforcement in criminal probes and to prevent crimes in which goods are stolen from brick-and-mortar stores and then resold online.

NRF and RILA have pooled their data into a single national retail crime database. The Law Enforcement Retail Partnership Network (LERPnet) is a database that gives retailers a way to share details of crime with the authorities. LERPnet has information on 20,000 crimes gathered from a network of 50,000 stores, including diversion and security evasion tactics, witness statements, photography and video.

Increased vigilance and cooperation seems to be making a difference, according to the sixth annual ORC survey conducted by the NRF, released in June, which shows 89.5 percent of retailers surveyed said their company had been a victim of ORC in the past 12 months, a slight decrease from 92.2 percent the year before. The survey also found that nearly six out of 10 retailers, 58.9 percent, reported an increase in ORC activity in the past 12 months, down from 73 percent the year before.

"The relationships retailers have built with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies are making it harder for felons, but billions are still being lost each year from this exhausting battle with criminals," said Joe LaRocca, NRF senior asset protection advisor.

Some of that money is being funneled overseas by terrorist cells to finance terrorist operations in the Middle East, according to Steven Emerson, executive director of the Investigative Project on Terrorism, whose testimony before the Senate Committee of Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs offers a chilling assessment of the link between ORT and terrorism.

"Organized Retail Theft has links to money laundering and financing of Middle Eastern terrorism," Emerson said. "It targets everyday household commodities and consumer items affecting a variety of retail enterprises including supermarkets, chain drug stores, independent pharmacies, mass merchandisers, convenience stores, and discount businesses.

"Strong evidence indicates that profits from this chain of illegal activity are funneled to terrorist groups in the Middle East, posing a serious threat to national and international security."

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One hundred years ago Charles Maffey Sr. discovered the "key" to business success – honesty, integrity and personal service.

As the world has changed over 10 decades, Maffey's has maintained pace with technology and customer demands. While in the 1980s Maffey's did little electronics work, today those demands account for 60-70 percent of the company's business.

"The business has changed dramatically in the last 10 to 15 years, especially regarding electronics," Ed Maffey said. "Everything is IP (Internet Protocol) addressable and integrated.

"First customers said, 'I'd like to be able to open that door remotely.' So we installed an electric strike. Then they said, 'I'd like to speak with the visitor first, so we put in an intercom. Then they wanted to see the person so we installed a camera. Now they can remotely see, hear and speak with a person anywhere in the world and remotely open the door right from their desktop."

To remain current with evolving technologies, Maffey's is committed to continuing education. In addition, the company holds licenses for locksmith and access control/burglary alarm installation and servicing, as required by New Jersey law since 2007.

"It legitimizes the business," Maffey said. "For all those years you could have no credentials and background checks and advertise that you were a locksmith."


Trust, however, has never been a factor for Maffey's. The four-generation company enjoys several multi-generational relationships with customers, such as Trinitas Hospital and the city of Elizabeth, and serves as a reliable partner for such entities as NJ TRANSIT and Port Authority of New York/New Jersey. "My late mom, Evelyn, and my 89-years-young dad, Charles Maffey Jr., instilled these values in our minds by example throughout our lives and their careers at Maffey's," Ed Maffey said.

The First Rule of Holes

The first rule of holes is that when you find yourself in one, stop digging.

Last month we came to the conclusion that most politicians are ill-prepared to govern and the bulk of the electorate too uninformed to understand most of what is going on. As a result, politicians often find it more effective to appeal to our emotions than to our intellect.

The current debate over the future of transportation funding in New Jersey certainly proves this.

New Jersey's Transportation Trust Fund is out of money. All its revenue goes to pay off its debt. In addition, its debt rating was just lowered, making it more expensive to borrow. This doesn't really matter, though, because unless there is revenue in the fund we can't borrow.

On top of this, we have one of the most overburdened transportation networks in the country. Travel on our interstate highways is in the top 10 nationally. Travel on principal arteries like Routes 22, 1&9 and 17 is the heaviest in the country, resulting in some of the slowest commute times in the country.

To maintain our roads at this absolute minimum level we use the Transportation Trust Fund. When originally conceived, the fund was to raise money primarily from a gasoline tax to pay for road improvements and maintenance.

However, when the cost of doing this kept growing but the tax did not, someone got the great idea of raising money by selling bonds and then using some of the Trust Fund revenue to pay off those bonds. This is the shovel that started digging the hole.

By bonding transportation projects rather than paying for them, we could get what we want and allow future generations to pay for it. It's the oldest political shell game on the books, kicking the can down the road. Every administration has done it, including the current one.

But now we're at the end game. The Trust Fund is at the point where all the money collected pays off existing debt and we can't take on more debt because we're out of money. We basically have two options. One is to raise the gas tax and the other is to divert money from the General Fund to replenish the Trust Fund. This is quite a deep hole.

Getting the Trust Fund healthy is going to take some major doing. Right now we spend about three times as much as we take in from the gasoline tax. To get on a pay-as-you-go basis, we would need to triple the gas tax just to stay where we are, i.e. no new big projects. This would put us on par with what New York, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and Montana charge.

Am I really calling for a tax increase? Aren't we the most overtaxed people in the country already? Yes to both.

But not all taxes are created equal. There are good taxes and bad taxes. Good taxes keep us from doing bad things like driving too much, polluting the air and causing congestion. If they are used for an investment, like in roads, they are even better. Taxes on income and investments are bad because they discourage people from doing good things like working hard and saving.

Both parties are running like crazy from raising the gas tax that hasn't been raised since 1988 and is among the lowest in the country. They haven't learned the first rule of holes. They know we don't do what is in our best interest because we are as shortsighted and indolent as they are.

Frankly, this issue is primarily the responsibility of the Legislature and they should take the lead. Our future as an economic powerhouse is too important to keep up this stupidity.

Health Care Reform Carries a Dirty Scalpel

The operation was a success but the patient died.

Those famous words soon may be written upon the medical chart of small and medium businesses, nonprofits, trade associations and institutions beginning in 2012 thanks to a provision of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act enacted into law earlier this year that will greatly expand the burden of financial reporting on these entities.

Simply put, beginning in 2012 all businesses will have to file 1099 forms for any goods or services exceeding \$600 purchased from other businesses during the calendar year, with both the Internal Revenue Service and the vendor from which the goods or services were purchased.

Currently 1099 filings are required for very narrowly defined types of purchases, for example financial transactions, targeted transactions such as bartering and prizes, and amounts paid to unincorporated businesses – generally understood to be independent contractors – for services, according to the *Journal of Accountancy*.

The new rule extends the requirement to all companies, trade associations, non-profits and state and local governments and also expands the provision to include the purchase of goods or products. In one commonly-cited example, if a business buys more than \$600 in office supplies from Staples over the course of a year, it now will have to send a 1099 form to Staples and file another one with the IRS.

It is estimated that the new requirement will impact between 30 and 40 million businesses.

The ramifications within the business community, particularly small and medium businesses, are enormous and varied. While most large businesses track their transactions by both type and vendor, most small and medium businesses rely on software that sorts expenses by category. Compliance with the new 1099 filing requirements will mandate that more businesses adopt new tracking procedures at a time when taxation paperwork, at \$74 per hour, is the most expensive paperwork burden placed on smaller businesses, according to the National Federation of Independent Businesses (NFIB).

The IRS promises to somewhat ease this new burden by exempting transactions made using credit and debit cards (great news for credit card companies). However, as the NFIB points out, many larger businesses may look to streamline their reporting burdens by minimizing their transactions to vendors that only accept payment via these cards, further placing at a disadvantage smaller companies that either do not accept credit and debit cards or cannot do so competitively.

Those lining up to condemn the new 1099 requirements go far beyond the usual business advocates, such as associations. While certified public accountants likely will see an increased demand for their services due to the complexity of 1099-related tracking and filing, CPA associations are bemoaning the impact the new requirements will have on their clients. Even the federal government's National Taxpayer Advocate of the IRS "expresses concern that a new (1099) reporting requirement...may impose significant compliance burdens on businesses, charities, and government agencies," according to a summary of its report to Congress.

So who is in favor of this, and why?

Reports are that Congressional staffers who crafted the legislation say it is needed to offset \$35 million in tax cuts for small businesses, as it is expected to generate more than \$17 billion in additional revenue, one supposes through improved tax compliance and fines on business for failing to properly file (\$50 for failure to file or filing with incomplete or inaccurate information; \$100 for deliberately doing so).

The logic, of course, is faulty - although Washington through-and-through.

Solutions to the pending 1099 nightmare are abundant. Recently four remedies proposed by both sides of the aisle floated through Congress but failed – along largely partisan lines, or course. The argument, it seems, is not that the new regulations should be modified or repealed, but rather who should get the credit and how to pay for the lost revenue the measure is expected to raise.

While health care reform was intended to heal the wounds of the American health care system, in the process this one reporting requirement within the act may result in further weakening an ailing business community already weighed down by onerous regulations.

At a time when small and medium businesses are fighting to recover from the worst recession since the Depression and the federal government is touting them as the phoenix that will lead America to renewed economic health and stability, this sector is caught in an eddy of partisan politics and skewed logic.

The new requirements related to Form 1099 filings must be repealed before they take effect – and before the patient dies despite a successful operation.

Insight Leading Us Out of Recession - The Small Business

The National Bureau of Economic Research recently announced the United States recession ended in June 2009, ending the longest and one of the deepest recessions in its history. Couple this with falling initial jobless claims, declining unemployment rates, flattening decreases in home values and an increase in mortgage applications and one would surmise that confidence is returning to the market.

Yet consumer optimism has been slow to materialize, evidenced by the Consumer Confidence Index (CCI), which is down approximately 10 percent since August and 70 percent since its high in 2007.

Consumer spending is down significantly, as well. According to a recent Gallup poll, "Americans' self-reported average daily spending in stores, restaurants, gas stations, and online averaged \$63 per day during August — down \$5 from July, and down \$2 compared with August 2009."

Economists have several theories for the slow recovery in consumer confidence and spending, including: the 1.7 percent dismal growth rate of the gross domestic product; unemployment, hovering substantially above 9 percent; the wealth effect – declines in investment portfolios and home values causing people to feel less secure and pushing them to save more to compensate for their losses; and new federal and state regulations created with the new health care and financial regulations.

Yet all appear to address some characteristic of consumer spending.

Although this recession has and will continue to impact the consumer, it has detrimentally impacted the business community, as well, with the small and medium business (SMB) being impacted perhaps the greatest. Unlike large corporations with the ability to quickly change production and distribution functions, SMBs are typically locked into their business model, with only slight ability to modify in the short term.

More important are the interdependencies between SMBs and the consumer. With most of the businesses in the United States being classified as SMBs and approximately 50 percent of the workforce employed by them, there seems to emerge a "chicken and egg" problem. SMBs cannot grow unless the consumer purchases their products and consumers will not purchase unless they have a foreseeable income – typically supplied by the SMB.

If SMBs are to grow, hire new employees, provide raises to existing employees, engage in new projects, seek new capital and provide confidence to the consumer, they need to engage the local community, build loyalty with existing customers and seek production cost efficiencies wherever possible.

SMBs should educate the local community about the quality of their goods and services in comparison with lower-cost, international rivals and chain stores. They should engage in community events, support local charities, municipal sports programs and the like.

First, SMBs should build strong loyalty and communication programs that not only reward repeat business, referrals and family programs but also reach out to customers they have not lately seen. The first step is to purchase a customer relationship management (CRM) tool for a few dollars per month.

Second, they should consider establishing a social media marketing campaign that includes a website, a blog and possible Twitter and Facebook accounts. Social media is almost free and the ability to target existing and new local customers is uncomplicated and potentially rewarding.

Third and possibly most important, many SMBs are either unaware of and/or averse to the idea of outsourcing some of their value chain and/or production functions to overseas, low-cost business service providers. They can outsource lower-value, routine tasks such as database entry, accounts payable and receivable, programming, development and quality assurance. They will lower costs and create more time for R&D, marketing, client engagement, sales and community outreach.

If consumer confidence is to be restored, it starts with the SMB moving from a high-cost provider of goods and services to a more efficient lower-cost provider that leverages the low-cost service providers throughout the world. By doing this, consumer confidence will be restored – fundamentally because more time will be spent on innovation and R&D and creating new markets and profit centers that will ultimately translate into more jobs, creating incomes and better ways of life for most Americans.
