UNION - Could the township be run more efficiently? Gov. Chris Christie seems to think so, therefore he slapped a 2 percent cap on municipalities in 2011 to prove he means business

So where do your tax dollars go after the township starts paying its bills? More importantly, is there anywhere in the municipal budg-

ship of Union, like all municipalities in the state, worked with a 4 percent imposed cap. While the annual budget tallied \$82.2 million, the amount to be raised by taxes came to \$64.9 million, according to the township summary of the 2010 tax levy "cap" calculation. In the next year, the township will have to work under the 2 percent imposed cap, regardless of the contracts that require mandatory pay increases for unionized

RAHWAY - Although Lloyd Garrison eventually left his childhood home in Rahway to pursue a career as an artist, he continues to be inspired by his own childhood and that of his ancestors.

Garrison is known in Union County for his realistic and nostalgic Christmas card renditions of Rahway, Linden and Cranford during the 1950s and 60s. In fact, he so perfectly captured such scenes as passengers rushing to make their connection at the Rahway train station, shoppers busily finishing their holiday chores on lower Main Street and ice skating at Rahway Park and the pond next to former Koos's Brothers, that each year at this time, thousands look forward to his latest artistic venture.

Mayor Sal Bonaccorso took to the lectern to speak in favor of the project and explain the long history behind it.

The project was opposed in court by the Villa Corporation, which owned much of the land on Terminal Avenue.

More recently the township arranged to relocate the project as part of negotiations with L'Oreal, one of the town's biggest corporate taxpayers.

Bonaccorso said that while he respects the opinions of the residents, he feels the project will be beneficial to the town as a whole, attracting substantial tax rateables and providing housing for local seniors.

Members of the public repeatedly interrupted Bonaccorso and were gavelled.

Residents urged the board to consider the application further before voting, but board members pointed out that the project had been well advertised in the past and the application conformed to local zoning regulation.

Township Administrator John Laezza was dismissive of the residents' objections. "It kind of surprises me that this same project was going to be put on Terminal Avenue and there was no outcry," Laezza said. "It's a NIMBY (not in my back yard) complex we have here.'

The site is owned by Clark Developers, who would be responsible for actually building and developing the property.

The project was designed by the Appel Design Group, an architecture firm based in Union. Site engineering and traffic consulting was provided by the firm of VHB.

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## Hillside officials hope to avoid employee layoffs

HILLSIDE - A Jan. 3 deadline has been set as local officials negotiate with municipal employee unions in the hopes of avoiding layoffs

"If we can't come to a mutual agreement at that time we will move forward with at least 30-35 layoffs," Hillside Mayor Joseph Menza said of the ongoing negotiations with the townships labor unions.

Menza said the government is looking for zero percent pay increases in the police department for 2011 and 2012 as well as a give-back of raises that went into effect July 1. Menza said the town is only asking that money paid to police after Oct. 1 be returned.

This development, reached by the mayor and Finance Department last week, comes even as public safety officials are preparing to face the repercussions of a dramatic reduction in the Newark Police Department that may put a strain on neighboring law enforcement.

On Nov. 30, 162 officers were laid off from Newark's force of 1.300 officers.

Hillside Police Chief Robert Quinlan said "time will tell" what lose any more police officers."

impact the city's cuts will have on neighboring municipalities.

What impact that has on Hillside remains to be seen." Quinlan said. "However, we are bracing for an increase in crime and violence that may be the result of those layoffs."

Quinlan said there has been an uptick in crime in areas bordering the township's largest neighbor, including the daylight slashing and beating of a woman on Bloy Street. This, however, cannot be attributed with any certainty to the reduction of police staff in Newark, the chief said.

"We've seen some increase in crime along the Hillside-Newark border in recent weeks, but that may be coincidental." he said.

Ouinlan said an increase in crime along Newark's border would put additional strain on a police department that has already seen its roster reduced by 10 percent, or eight positions, over the last year.

"My heart goes out to the residents of Newark, but my overriding concern is protecting Hillside and maintaining our effectiveness, and it's not getting any easier," Quinlan said. "This township can't afford to

Menza said he is confident the government and the unions can come to a mutual agreement to avoid lavoffs.

"The issue of whether crime increases or not doesn't have any impact on what our current financial situation is," Menza said. "We have to separate the issue.

While the township has mutual aid agreements with other Union County towns, Hillside police rarely work or communicate with with Newark officers, Quinlan said.

The Hillside Fire Department, however, does have a mutual aid agreement with the city.

Spokesman for the Newark Fire Department, John Brown, said the department's head count was also reduced, but not through layoffs. Brown said the department experienced a "mass exodus" of firefighters in November.

"Eighty guys retired to keep the layoffs from happening," Brown said, "Some positions will be refilled but some fire houses will be closed down in the process."

The department is down to 66 firefighters, he said. Menza said he expects this reduction will also impact Hillside. Hillside Fire Chief Dominick Naples did not return calls for comment.

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### Union officials adjust budget to stay below 2 percent cap

(Continued from Page 1) building, health and assessor, finance, administration and the local cable access station.

In 2010, the township paid 516 township employees approximately \$33.9 million. That number does not include the 78 employees that are not salaried but paid hourly wages that range from \$13.90 to \$37.50 per hour. These employees work in various departments, including police, fire, public works, building and health.

Some of the highest salaries are paid to police and fire personnel according to their rank or length of service for the township. At the present time, 103 employees make more than \$100,000.

Fire Chief Frederic Fretz, for instance, has been working for the township since 1971 and currently makes \$181,326 annually. That does not include health benefits or any special package retirement payout this employee might

receive for accumulated sick or vacation days.

Another employee getting one of the top salaries in the township is administrator Frank Bradley, who began working for the township in 1998. Bradley suffered a stroke in November and is out on medical leave, and it is unknown whether he is still being paid his annual salary of \$161,075 or if he is being paid short-term disability.

Taking over for Bradley during his recovery is Ronald Manzella, who has been paid for doing two jobs for the township since he was hired in 2003. As full-time director of public works, Manzella earns \$115,492 in addition to taking on the part-time position throughout the year as assistant administrator for \$32,103 a year. It is unclear whether Manzella works a full eight-hour day as public works director or if his time is split between the two positions.

Of the 516 township employ-

ees, there are 60 sharing the same last name. For example, Richard Malanda, who works in the building department makes \$125,413 a year, while his wife, Terri, a tax department employee earns \$118,024 a year.

Mayor Anthony Terrezza has several family members on the payroll, including his son, Salvatore, who makes \$74,368 a year handling cable access for the township and his daughter-in-law, Andrea, who makes \$49,954 a year as a Police Department employee.

In March, the township struck a deal that bridged a \$5 million budget gap by giving the police union raises in exchange for moving into the state's health benefit plan. Because of these health care concessions, police officers will get raises between 2 percent and 3 percent through 2012.

devote to this passion for painting.

"I love both a variety and a challenge," he said, adding that he dabbles in the Revolutionary and Civil War periods, landscapes, still life, portraits, surrealism, aviation, nautical, westerns, wildlife and florals. But while many artists find themselves struggling, Garrison managed to find many avenues for his talent.

From miniature oils, two series of Christmas plates for the Bradford Exchange, two years of working for Gold Key comics and the cover for an Old Spice cologne advertisement to the logos for "Sleep Doctor" and Finley tea, Garrison is respected in the art industry for his accurate and realistic approach on canvas.

But, he is not timid when it comes to trying new things, like the murals he painted for the Rahway Savings Institution and Prudential in Newark and taking brush in hand for restaurants like Barbary Coast and Brass Bucket in Woodbridge.

But make no mistake, Garrison's work has been popular and desired. Some of his pieces have found their way into the homes of Wayne Chrebet, formerly of the New York Jets, playwright Norman Wexler of Saturday Night Fever movie fame and actors Buddy Hackett and Robert Mitchum.

In fact, one collector, Garrison said, broke all his sales records by purchasing 92 originals. Two of those paintings can be seen in the the movie Death Wish, starring Charles Bronson. But this artist is also proud of the historical paintings he has done, including one of George Washington and his troops crossing the Delaware River for Washington Crossing State Park and a portrait for the Sons of the Revolution organiza-

"What I really enjoy is to create something from a blank canvas, an image that will either make someone feel happy like my Dickens paintings or a very emotional painting like my Civil War veterans," Garrison said. "The most important part of a painting is the idea, the spark and the gathering of information that gives its authenticity. Composition is next in level of importance, followed by application."

A true realistic artist who believes that creativity often spurs its own visions, Garrison said "it's possible to imagine ideas that no one has thought of before.


# Talk now about school budgets

Last year, after Chris Christie became governor in January, boards of education throughout New Jersey experienced two surprises. First, the governor reduced aid for the 2009-10 year to districts he thought held too much surplus, forcing them to spend that surplus to meet the expenses to which they were committed in their current budgets.

The second surprise came only a few weeks before 2010-11 school budgets were due to be approved by voters or boards of school estimate, when the governor announced on very short notice a drastic cut in state aid to most districts. This cut forced a frantic elimination of staff positions and programs. We understand the governor's reasoning: he believed action was needed quickly. But the result was chaos. That can change next year.

As a New Year's resolution, we propose all sides work to eliminate the panic school boards faced this year. We would hope district administrators have begun creating their 2011-12 budgets, with the likelihood of no increase in aid. The governor's office can help by providing advanced notice regarding aid expectations, if any, especially since projections indicate another state budget deficit for the 2012 fiscal year. That would mean more cuts, and if that happens, Christie can tell districts in a timely manner if school aid will be further reduced.

But school board members need not wait for numbers or word from Trenton to begin their budget process. Now is the time to discuss 2011-12 plans, presuming that state aid will not increase. Educators must be part of the dialogue with district administrators and school board members. Unions were forced to accept pay freezes on short notice or suffer the ire of Christie. Even with the freezes, layoffs ensued. With additional time, discussions with the unions may provide an amicable solution. Residents can join in the process. Budgets may be found on the website of some districts; in other districts, budgets are available within the administration office. Review the budget; ask administrators for more information if questions arise. Suggest parts to be reduced, or increased if necessary. Public input is a legal requirement for the passage of a school budget: time is set aside for that purpose and a notice is placed in the newspaper. In most districts throughout New Jersey, funding for our public schools constitutes the majority of our property taxes. Now's the time for all parties to get into the discussion and contribute to the process. In the end, they will know they did all they could to produce a budget which met the needs of the schools and was responsible to the taxpayers.

### The survival of a diverse river

Dusk is slowly descending on New Jersey as a brilliant display of **Point** reds, purples, peaches and pinks light up the sky just west of Exit 12 as the Watchung Mountains reach up to the horizon many miles away. In front of me sits the post-agricultural Garden State: a neatly-ordered tank farm containing thousands of gallons of fuel to heat our homes or propel the endless stream of cars and trucks that rush by my left along the New Jersey Turnpike. Below me a yellow-crowned night heron wakes up and starts rooting around tidal flats looking for breakfast as fiddler crabs scurry about upland into the marsh.

While this may seem like the theme for the newest Bon Jovi album or a lost scene from the Sopranos, this is what you'll see on a typical summer night along the lower Rahway River in Carteret before the river empties out into the Arthur Kill. Seeing nature survive amid one of the most populous regions of our country's most densely-populated states is truly thrilling and inspiring.

The Rahway River watershed stretches from the Oranges in the



north to Edison and Woodbridge in the south and the base of the Watchung Mountains in the west. It is home to more than 500,000 people and provides drinking water, both directly and indirectly, for a large percentage of those peo-

Three centuries ago, the Lenni Lenape fished its banks and used it for travel and trade. Rahway relied on the river to ship coal and other cargo to and from New York City and Cranford held elaborate festivals along the River.

The river inspired the architectural firm headed by Frederick Law Olmstead to create a greenway along the river through Union and Essex counties and preserve it for many generations. Of course, the 19th and 20th centuries led to a great deal of use - and abuse - of the river and the surrounding area in the name of commerce and economic development.

Where does the Rahway River Association come in? For almost 20 years we have been protecting and promoting this resource right in our backyards. We are an all-volunteer organization with members throughout the watershed and beyond. In 2010 we sponsored the popular "Discover the Rahway" educational series that brought the river's biodiversity into libraries and community centers and brought people from all walks of life out into the watershed to see both nature and humanity at work.

This month we are conducting a membership drive to build on this groundswell of support and enthusiasm from the residents of the watershed; from Avenel to West Orange. Even though Freeholder Bette Jane Kowalski resides here, the Democratic freeholder slate lost by more than 1,000 votes, but the county Democratic machine still has control over who is appointed to our Township Committee.

staunch supporter of county government and continues to insist that we shouldn't hold them accountable, just beg for mercy and money. Cranford currently sends the county more than \$14 million a year plus Open Space Trust Fund taxes.

In his letter last week, newly elected Democratic Councilman Kevin Campbell revealed that he has no clue as to how Cranford residents are indebted to county government. He stated regarding the Open Space Trust fund "the county already has the money from a dedicated fund it comes from a fee on real estate transactions and it can only be used for open space purposes.'

I wonder, is Mr. Campbell paying property taxes? Even though he's been elected to be a township commissioner he obviously never saw a property tax bill. Every property tax payer pays into this fund, every year.

Union County voters approved the Open Space Trust Fund by a 60-40 percent margin in a November, 2000 referendum that established a tax of 15 cents per \$100 of assessed value dedicated to open space, recreation and historic preservation purposes. Between 2001 and 2008 - the latest numbers I have on hand -Cranford has paid \$3,769,526 into this fund and received \$579,496 back in the form of one-time grants. Cranford is then obligated to hang the county "We're Connected to You" signs on the property that received funds. Over seven years, that is a net loss to Cranford property tax payers of \$3,190,030.

Mr. Campbell has proven even before he's been sworn in that he will continue the Cranford Democratic commissioners' tradition of keeping county politicians happy.

#### Is SID tax necessary? To the Editor:

The Special Improvement District assessment has become a redundant, unnecessary tax on those citizens and businesses compelled to pay it.

Having a Special Improvement District is no longer necessary, if it ever really was. Merchants realize little or nothing from it and businessmen and women who maintain offices reap no benefits at all. The "newsletter" is a waste of paper and postage; the sidewalks a disaster. That we pay a SID assessment but must still remove debris and snow from the walks in front of our shops and offices is an affront: we see sweepers once a month, or less. The SID website is cheap-looking and

uninformative, presents few valuable links and is a poor marketing tool for local business. It does a very poor job explaining what SID really is, or what it is supposed to do, save the explanation that "the Special Improvement District was created to return Union Center to the prominence of its glorious past. In partnership with the local government, the Special Improvement District has embarked upon a planned program of revitalization."

What that revitalization is, and what role SID is to play is left unexplained. Far as can be determined, the SID's other role - other than to NOT sweep or clear is to run fairs and festivals, which have snow become battlegrounds more than joyous occasions. A township and townspeople's reputation is measured by how it is viewed and how it behaves. Having SWAT teams on rooftops in Union Center hardly presents a good image.

I cannot figure out how anyone could consider SID's existence or expenses a success. It is time to end it. Those employed by SID can be reassigned or dismissed. The Departments of Public Works and Economic Development can take over the 'responsibilities' of SID, at no additional cost to taxpayers, and those of us having offices and retail businesses can use the saved SID assessments to individually market and improve our business, which will do more to "revitalize" the area than all the SID dollars spent to date.



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### **Union County's Christopher's** Program receives 2010 award

The Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders announced that Christopher's Program, which helps at-risk youths avoid gangs and gang-related violence, has recently been awarded the prestigious Community Change Award by the 2010 New Jersey Black Issues Leadership Convention. The program was selected from hundreds of applications submitted throughout New Jersey

Union County Freeholder Nancy Ward spearheaded the development of Christopher's Program, which was named in honor of Christopher Booker, who was brutally murdered by gang members on Thanksgiving weekend 10 years ago. It is part of the 2010 Freeholder Chairman's Initiative, "Helping People."

"The death of Christopher Booker opened my eyes to a world that, 10 years ago, I knew nothing about the presence of gang violence in the State of New Jersey," said Ward. "After much searching for answers, I did indeed gain knowledge about organized gangs, their history in New Jersey, what was being done to combat this growing epidemic, and most importantly, what more should be and must be done."

Before Christopher's Program, Ward initiated numerous two-day gang prevention programs in Union County.

"The experience made it apparent to me that a permanent, continuous and more expansive Union County program was needed in order to quash the ongoing recruitment of our young people into organized gangs," said Ward.

Christopher's Program went into operation earlier this year, through the Union County Department of Human Services. It consists of interactive sessions with trained speakers, experts and agencies in New Jersey, dealing exclusively with the topic of gangs and vouth violence.


Participants are selected at the discretion of the Union County court system, Probation Department and Juvenile Detention Center. Each participant attends the program twice weekly for six consecutive weeks. An alternative schedule of one session weekly for twelve weeks is also under consideration. Sessions are in the Detention Center or at three community locations for those who are on probation or home confinement.

Christopher's Program is also available to all Union County school districts upon request, and accepts referrals from local community agencies.

Christopher's Program also includes a professional development and community education component that serves to enhance community awareness and community education regarding the topic of gangs and vouth violence.

'Christopher's Program is unique in that the partnership between the court system, the Department of Human Services and our communities will now allow us to reach thousands of additional youths in the years to come who stand at imminent risk of joining or staying in organized street gangs," said Ward. The New Jersey Black Issues Leadership Conference Community Change Award focuses on locally-initiated programs that work toward reducing disparities in economic opportunity, education, health and human services and law, justice and public safety. Christopher's Program was recognized for its innovative approach and for its potential to be adapted for use in different settings, and in other counties throughout New Jersey.







# Cranford church is renovated in time for the holiday season

The newly renovated church building of Trinity Episcopal Church formally re-opened on Dec. 5 with a Thanksgiving service of Holy Eucharist. The public is cordially invited to attend an Open House for the new building on Saturday from 2 to 4 p.m. Trinity Episcopal Church is located at the corner of North and Forest avenues in Cranford.

"Trinity has served the Cranford-area community since 1872. We are pleased to welcome everyone to see our new home, which has been designed and built to last another 100 years," said the Rev. Gina Walsh-Minor, Rector of Trinity Episcopal Church. Trinity parishioners will be available to show people around the new church building and to answer any questions about the renovations or the history of Trinity Church. The newly restored and expanded pipe organ will be played during the Open House for attendees' enjoyment.

The new building is the culmination of diligent prayer and tireless work by Trinity parishioners. In 2006, after years of unsuccessfully grappling with structural issues, the parish voted to build a new building. In 2007, the Trinity II capital campaign raised \$1.7 million dollars for the project. The sale of a small parcel of church property raised the additional funds necessary for the \$2 million project.

After evaluating several design options ranging from a completely new building to a major renovation, the Trinity Executive Building Committee recommended doing a major renovation that would preserve the history of the parish by reusing key architectural elements in the new building. After conducting a bidding process, the project was awarded to the team of Siano Brothers Contracting of Cranford and Thomas DiGiorgio Architecture of Westfield. Deconstruction on the old building began in the fall of 2009.

"Our design goals were to give the building the look and feel of the original 1875 Trinity church, while incorporating modern convenience and durability," said Thomas DiGiorgio, Owner of Thomas DiGiorgio Architecture. "It was a great success. The project was a true collaboration between the architects, the builders, the engineers and the parish. When we began, we truly didn't know what challenges we would encounter, so it was truly a discover, design and build project. By working closely together we created solutions to every issue that met the engineering requirement and stayed



"Moving out of the old building was not only a physical process but also a spiritual process, trusting that God would provide the strength and courage to complete the project. We have been blessed by God with the means to create a new worship space. In our baptismal covenant, we made a vow to God to love him and serve one another. So it matters much more what we do with the building moving forward rather just celebrating that we have successfully opened it," commented Walsh-Minor.

The restoration of Trinity's church organ was a major project itself. The organ was carefully deinstalled and safely stored by the Peragallo Pipe Organ company early in the deconstruction phase of the church renovation. Working with James Lenney, Trinity's Organist and Choirmaster, Peragallo designed the organ and organ cabinetry for the new church building. It incorporated the pipes from the old organ as well as additional new pipes. The components of the old organ were serviced and restored as needed. Next, they built the new cabinetry and assembled the new organ at their factory. After the rest of the new church building was completely finished; Peragallo disassembled the organ and cabinetry, transported it and reassembled it in the new church building. "The installation and 'voicing' of the organ takes a month by itself," said Lenney. "It is critical that all construction is complete so no dust gets into the bellows," Lenney continued.

On Nov. 13 the parish had a thank you dinner for the craftspeople, advisors and workers and their families. In all, 187 people attended and were given the opportunity to get a first look at the interior of the new church building.

"One of the things that was very clear from the beginning of the project was how much the Trinity parishioners care about their church. I am very happy the workers got to experience that first-hand by meeting the parishioners," commented Siano. "We are very thankful that none of the many workers were injured on the project. It is remarkable that in a 15 month project in all seasons of the year with more than 100 people on it, there were no injury reports," said Walsh-Minor. And adding, "God is good — all the time — God is good."





## **'Donovan Dumper' reveals** story of high school legend

In order to read his book, "The Legend of the Donovan Dumper," as told to Tom Whelan of Union, and to understand the person who is Steven Gorski, one must approach the entire text with "an open mind."

The "open mind" is Gorski's suggestion in the preface of the 37page book. Gorski's honest account of what took place in the Silverton section of Toms River 30 years ago in the gym in St. Joseph's High School in September 1981, is nevertheless, still considered "horrific."

He confessed that he did what he had to do in that gym, that he acted alone, and that there was no conspiracy, no political agenda and he wasn't trying to "become famous or draw attention to myself...and there is some remorse." The incident certainly made news then, particularly in the company of more than 1,000 witnesses, and bringing the story forth to Silverton in Toms River, where in 2010, to be honest, it still has its shocking elements.

Gorski also clarifies the name "Donovan" in "The Legend of the Donovan Dumper." He may have briefly spent some time at St. Joseph's High School, but never in Monsignor Donovan High School, because in 1983, the name, St.



Joseph's High School, was changed to Monsignor Donovan High School "to honor Monsignor Lawrence Donovan, a nice man, who had the unfortunate idea to open a Catholic high school in Ocean County."


To understand and to have some compassion for a teenager, who resorted to an unsanitary act, is something a reader must consider. Gorski spent the first four years of his life in Irvington; his father left his mother, when she was pregnant with Steven, and escaped to Poland. Gorski and his mother then moved he had an ideal childhood. He considered the seven years during which he inhabited Silverton as the best years of his life. His existence with his mother on Periwinkle Lane, was as close to perfect as could be for a youngster. He loved breathing in the healthy sea air, fished and crabbed and swam in his

and neighbors' pools, and in the ocean itself, and his education in Silver Bay Elementary School, and then Toms River Intermediate East, was considered ideal. He was active in sports, on the track team; he was ideally happy. And Gorski was ecstatic that he was going to attend Toms River North High School with his friends and buddies.

But his mother had other ideas. She was determined to send her son to a Catholic high school and without his knowledge, filled out the proper papers and enrolled him in the school.

At this point in his life, Steven became frantic; but to no avail. So, he was fiercely coerced by his parent, and hours into his first day of school, in the gym, where the students gathered, and the principal was welcoming the students, Steven dropped his pants and did something so horrifyingly drastic, that he was sent to the principal's office. And while waiting for the principal, he repeated the physical performance.

### Whelan tells story of a high school prank gone wrong

Tom Whelan of Union, writer, independent film producer and screenwriter, took upon himself, an overwhelming task some months ago.

He decided to write a book about a teenage high school classmate from 30 years ago. It wasn't just another classmate; it was Steven Gorski, who made legendary headlines about three decades ago in Toms River when he dropped his pants in a gym full of students and teachers and did the unmentionable on the shiny clean floor.

Now, in order to thoroughly clean his slate, Gorski decided to talk to Whelan, and Whelan cleared the air once and for all by writing the true story of what actually happened back in September 1981 in St. Joseph's High School in Toms River. The book is called "The Legend of the Donovan Dumper." The school had its name changed two years later to Monsignor Donovan High School.

"I grew up in Toms River," explained Whelan during a recent chat. "Steven Gorski and I attended the same school; he for a short time, and I for four years. I graduated in 1991."

The whole idea for a book actually began

Internet. "I had written some books, and Steven began to correspond with me," said Whelan.

"We e-mailed each other, and before long, we agreed on a book. He would tell his story, and I would write it. And when I first met him, we were both 14, and when we met again, we were 43 years old. I have twins the same age, right now, who are in high school: Patrick is at St. Peter's Prep School in Jersey City, and Kathy is at St. Mary Academy in Watchung.

'You know," Whelan reminded, "Steven was obviously stigmatized by the whole thing. He was only 14 years old at the time; he just seemed to have stepped out of the moment, and it became an urban legend. It seems like everyone knew what he had done: all you had to do was mention Toms River, and the questions would be forthcoming. It was really strange, especially when people knew that I had lived in Toms River, went to the same school that Steven had attended. How strange it was that anytime I mentioned my growing up in that town, some people that I hardly knew had actually brought the urban legend of Steven up to me. They even knew the name of the high school. That's how people know him. But Steven has come

when Gorski had read about Whelan on the to terms with it over the years. He always wanted to tell his side of the story, exactly what really happened. He really wanted to live it down."

Whelan mentioned how "amazing it is how 30 seconds can change the life of a person. Steven was a good kid, a quiet kid, not a troublemaker. He admitted that he kind of snapped at the moment. He said that it was like being out of body and watching this happen to himself. He just flipped so dramatically over the top."

When they discussed the possibility of a book and perhaps, later, a movie, Gorski had all the confidence in the world that Whelan would do a good job.

'He knew I'd done some writing, and he obviously wanted to tell his story, exactly what happened. So, Steven came back to New Jersey from his home in New Mexico. We drove all around Toms River. It was fun," recalled Whelan. "We had so many childhood experiences there. And he found that by telling his story - 'these are the facts,' he said, and after telling it, his life became very fulfilling."

The author said that "we'd like to do a movie about it. You know, Steven traveled the world during his stint in the Army. And I've been involved with independent movies.

I've acted, written and produced movies. We'd want to do it in Toms River," said Whelan. "We'd expand on the book. And he wants to take ownership of his story, which is actually about redemption. How can a guy be judged by something he did at the age of 14?

Whelan said that it took about four or five months to write the book. It's a short book, but by revealing the real facts, today, Steven is very happy. He went through a lot of turmoil about this."

Whelan, who was born in Jersey City, has resided in Union for the past 16 years. He graduated from Widener University in 1989 and received a degree in English. He has been a real estate agent most of his life.

"I've enjoyed reading and writing. I've written several books, and my latest is 'Delivering the Bone,' a book of essays, that will come out in 2011. I also have two films coming out in early 2011, 'We Are the Hartmans,' starring Richard Chamberlain, who is 77 years old and still going strong, and 'Mangus.' And I have five movie properties to come out in 2012. I have to get them off the ground and on film."

Writing, producing and working in real estate certainly keeps Whelan busy. "But it's the kind of busy that I like best," he stated.





### Union boys' basketball is sparked by standout PG Senior Ikwuegbu a leader for Farmers

His name might not be the easiest to spell, but Union boys' basketball coach Tony DiGiovanni loves writing it in his lineup.

Senior point guard Chidoziem Ikwuegbu (6-2) has established himself as a leader during his third varsity season.

"He's always been a gym rat who loves to play the game," said Giovanni, now in his fifth year at the helm of the Farmers.

After sharing the point last year with senior Tony Gilchrest, Ikwuegbu is the man this season.

"He's a diligent worker," DiGiovanni said. "This year he will run the team the majority of the time."

Ikwuegbu's outstanding backcourt play last year helped lead Union to a 17-10 finish and final No. 3 ranking in Union County behind county champion St. Patrick and sectional champ Plainfield.

In Union's 44-37 UCT quarterfinal win over Westfield at Roselle Catholic, Ikwuegbu poured in a season-high 13-point effort that included three 3s.

"He has a nice touch and shoots the ball well," DiGiovanni said. "He can control the tempo and is a great ball handler."

Ikwuegbu also paced Union with 14 points in his team's 54-46 North 2, Group 4 semifinal setback at second-seeded Hillsborough.

"The biggest thing is that the rest of his teammates trust him," DiGiovanni said. "I think he's the most underrated point guard – maybe – in the state.

"He just turned 17, so he's a young senior. I think he's a scholarship level point guard."

Two other prominent returning players include the lone junior on the varsity roster -6-3 forward Marcus Carter - and 5-11 guard Chris Foreman, one of seven seniors.

"There are similarities, with both being tough kids," DiGiovanni said. "Chris is a football player and both are very good rebounders, although they are a bit undersized.

"Marcus worked hard over the summer to develop more of his game around the basket. He's, potentially, our best defender. He can guard any position.

"Chris can create his own shot and score off the dribble."

DiGiovanni, who always uses many different starting fives based on practice performance and the upcoming opponent, said that any of the other eight varsity players after Ikwuegbu could start.

"They all have a good understanding, have paid their dues and will get their shots," said DiGiovanni, who is a 1995 Union graduate who played for Ted Zawacki.

The other seniors include 6-0 guard Nana Ansah, 5-11 guard Femi Oyedele, 5-10 guard Lawrence Gill, 5-9

guard Tim Oyeniran and 6-3 forward Kevin Thomas. The lone sophomore on the roster is up-and-coming 6-7 guard-forward Tyler Roberson.

"He's very talented and very skilled for his size," DiGiovanni said. "He didn't play with us this summer, but he's picking things up quickly.

"He's a threat to score from anywhere. He shoots 3s, he passes the ball well and he dribbles well for a guy his size. He's in the process of developing his full skill package."

Sparked by an outstanding senior season from 6-6 forward Jon Merceus, who was a Star-Ledger First Team All-County selection after averaging 15 points and 11.3 rebounds with double-doubles in 23 of 27 games, Union did well to reach the UCT and North 2, Group 4 semifinals a year ago.

The Farmers more than held their own in both games played against St. Patrick last year, falling 62-46 on the road in the regular season and 64-47 at the Dunn Center in the UCT semifinals.

Union won at Linden twice last year, the first time in the second conference game between the teams and the second time in the North 2, Group 4 quarterfinals. Union beat Linden twice in three games to finish ahead of the Tigers in the final county rankings.

"The kids are aware of the basketball world," DiGiovanni said. "We want to prove our worth. We want to play the best teams we can play."

In addition to two conference games this year against St. Patrick, Union also has challenging nonconference games scheduled against Bishop Ahr, Rutgers Prep, Irvington, Ridge, Don Bosco Prep, Bergen Catholic, Seton Hall Prep, Hudson Catholic and St. Thomas Moore.

Conference crossover games are vs. Mountain Division foes Summit and Union Catholic.

**NOTES:** Union's fifth and final scrimmage was to be at home Tuesday against Immaculata. The first three were vs. St. Anthony and Delbarton at home, at Bridgewater and against Newark West Side and Delbarton at home.

The Farmers open tomorrow at 4 p.m. vs. Union County Conference-Watchung Division foe Elizabeth. The Minutemen are coming off a rare sub-.500 season in which they finished 6-14 a year ago.

Union swept Elizabeth in conference competition last year, first winning 56-44 at home and then 55-37 at the Dunn Center.

The Farmers will then play at non-conference foe Bishop Ahr Saturday at 4 p.m. before participating in a round robin holiday event at Ridge High School in Basking Ridge.

Union will play Rutgers Prep Dec. 27 at 6 p.m., Irvington Dec. 28 at 6 p.m. and then Ridge Dec. 30 at 7:30 p.m.

The Farmers will also play in one of the New Year's Classic games that are scheduled for Jan. 2 at Teaneck. Union will face Don Bosco Prep at 1 p.m.

Union will resume conference play Jan. 6 at 7 p.m. at defending Watchung Division champion Plainfield.

Scotch Plains dropped down to the Mountain Division, with Cranford moving up to the Watchung Division. St. Patrick will play everyone in the Watchung Division twice this year and is eligible to win the division title.

Cranford won the Mountain Division last year to capture a conference title for the first time since 1970.

St. Patrick went 6-0 against Watchung Division foes last year, but was not eligible to win the division title because the Celtics only played everyone else in the division once. Plainfield won the title with a 10-1 mark.



Roselle Catholic High School wrapped up the fall athletic season with a couple of special presentations at its annual convocation.

A "golden boot" was presented to senior Melissa Tobie, who shattered the girls' soccer program's record for goals in a season with 36 and a career with 73.

"It was great getting recognized with a special award and seeing many years of hard work pay off," said Tobie, whose sister, Kate, a freshman, assisted on many of her goals this fall. "This was also a product of the effort the team gave throughout the season. It was really nice to have my grandfather here.'

Tobie eclipsed the school record set by 2002 Roselle Catholic graduate Kathleen "KK" Foster, who returned to her alma mater to be part of the ceremony. Foster received a plaque commemorating her record.

"It was great to come back to RC to share in the honoring of another athlete," said Foster, who played basketball at Drew University. "I loved playing soccer and basketball for RC. This was special to me.

"From all I've heard, Melissa (Tobie) is a great athlete and a good person. I wish her much continued success in the basketball season.'

Melissa Tobie is a returning two-year starter for the Roselle Catholic girls basketball team, which has won back-to-back Union County Tournaments.

The Lions, under head coach Gary Carvalho, qualified and hosted a state tournament match for just the second time in school history. Melissa Tobie said the highlight of the season was a 1-0, overtime victory at home against Kent Place in the rain on Chakey Field.

Also at the Nov. 15 Convocation, a plaque was presented to senior Joe Perez, who connected for 23 goals for the Lions this fall. It's the most goals by an RC boys soccer player since 1990, according to coach Scot Simpson.

Perez called his two goals in a 2-1 victory at Rutgers Prep one of the highlights of his season.

Perez and Tobie were also recognized as the most valuable players of their respective squads.

Erica D'Uva (tennis), Sam Uzzell (volleyball), Tyler Boscia (cross country) and Ines Simoes (cross country) also walked away from the convocation with MVP hardware.

### Union football produces strong finis

After a rare, middle-of-the-season, five-game losing streak, the Union football team was able to bounce back by ending its 2010 campaign with three consecutive victories.

"It was definitely nice for our younger players, but I'm more excited for our seniors," fourth-year head coach Brian Sheridan said. "They were able to leave the program on a high note."

Among that senior class were returning starters Everett Johnson (5-10, 215) and Dan Laguerre (6-3, 280). Both came back from injuries that cost them to miss games this season.

"Everett will be a guy that we'll miss around here," Sheridan said. "He was a two-year captain."

which were losses that put Union's record at 2-5 after the Hillsborough contest.

"That was the low point for us when Everett went down, because we lost our leader and that was tough," Sheridan said. "Everett really brings a lot to the table.

"He's a mentor to the kids in the locker room and a tudor for them academically."

While continuing to play in the Ivy League at Yale University is on Johnson's radar, he will look at other schools.

"If he gets an offer from a 1-AA school, he and his family will have to make a decision," Sheridan said.

according to Sheridan, was a big reason why Union was able to avoid a sub-.500 season and finish at 5-5 for the first time since 2007

"He was probably our best football player at the end of the vear," Sheridan said. "He was so dominant up front."

Sheridan reported that Laguerre finished with 20 tackles for losses, including seven quarterback sacks. Another fine student as evidenced by his 3.3 grade-point average, Laguerre is a candidate to continue on the 1-AA level.

'He fought injuries early on, but then proved to be a force on both sides of the ball," Sheridan said.

After a 2-0 start included road wins against Montgomery and Watchung Hills - teams that both won their last games of the year to finish 1-9 - Union played Immaculata for the first time. After a slow start, the Farmers came back to make the score a more respectable 48-31.

At that point in the season sophomore Doug Carter (6-0, (5-10, 185) moving over to wide receiver.

Then in Union's next game at Plainfield, Carter went Johnson missed the Elizabeth and Hillsborough games, down with a concussion. He did not return to action until the Hillsborough game, missing the rest of the Plainfield game and then the Westfield and Elizabeth contests that followed.

> "We asked Chris Foreman, our best receiver, to play quarterback," Sheridan said. "Then we put Doug in at quarterback in the Montgomery game and he responded with a big effort."

> Carter's play behind center was instrumental in Union coming back to beat Montgomery. Carter then led the Farmers to a more convincing win over Watchung Hills in what was his first varsity start.

Laguerre's lineman play on both sides of the ball, completed 31-of-83 passes for 447 yards, five touchdowns and one interception.

> "He's built more like a tight end or linebacker," Sheridan said. "He's a thicker kid, who also plays baseball.

> "He's like a young Daunte Culpepper if you will. He can hurt you with his legs."

Sheridan began the year with Carter and freshman running back Jamauri Bogan (5-9, 165) - who he proclaimed in the pre-season as Union's fastest runner - as promising players with unlimited potential.

"After our 2-0 start we needed to identify who we were on offense," Sheridan said. "It was still a work in progress. Our best player was a freshman and we didn't want to put too much on his plate.

"Our next biggest threat was our sophomore quarterback. It was an interesting beginning to the season. We had two really, potentially, good football players who were very young."

Bogan didn't disappoint. While he did not get as many 190) had taken over at quarterback, with senior Chris Foreman carries earlier in the season as he did late, he produced a fourtouchdown game against Immaculata, including two kickoff returns for scores.

> Bogan carried the ball 153 times for 1,102 yards (7.20 average) and also caught 10 passes for 106.

> He scored 17 touchdowns total, including 14 rushing, one receiving and the two on the kickoff returns against Immaculata. He might be the first Union freshman to rush for 1,000 yards.

> "What Jamauri accomplished this year is a result of his commitment to the program," Sheridan said. "His first two or three games he only got five to six touches.

> "He never questioned why he didn't get the ball more. He believed in the plan that we had. We talked to him about increasing his role."

Bogan scored all four Union touchdowns and led all Carter ended up starting six games at quarterback. He rushers with 171 yards on 35 attempts in Union's 28-24 home triumph over Linden Thanksgiving morning.

Union's conference win over Linden denied the Tigers a rare eight-win season and also a share of the Mid-State 39 Conference's East A Division title.
