## UCWA files suit, claims UCPAC subject to OPRA

The Union County Watchdog Association filed a lawsuit late last month asking the court to find that Union County Performing Arts Center is a public agency and subject to the Open Public Records Act.

According to the legal brief filed by attorney Walter M. Luers, Tina Renna, president of the UCWA, a non-profit organization dedicated to educating the public about the operations of county government in Union County, the tax-exempt UCPAC, located in Rahway, is a public agency because they hire acts as well as secure sponsorship for the county operated Musicfest.

The lawsuit maintained UCPAC became a public entity when the county purchased the Irving Street theater in Rahway and "poured millions of public dollars into it for renovations."

Renna said the county "continues to invest tax revenues in UCPAC and there are ongoing plans to pour even more money into upgrades." Based on this use of public tax dollars, Renna said UCPAC should be subject to OPRA rules.

"It's clear that without access to information contained in the records of the UCPAC, citizens cannot monitor the operations of our Union county government or hold public officials accountable for their actions and the expenditure of our tax dollars," said Renna.

On Oct. 24, Renna said, she submitted an OPRA request on behalf of the UCWA pursuant to both OPRA and the "common law right of access." Renna requested copies of "all contracts for acts hired for the Union County 2010 and 2011 Musicfest and the five most recent minutes avail-

## Town plans for new businesses, Out with the old, more jobs in the new year

UNION — The township jumped into 2012 promptly on Jan. 1 with a well-attended reorganization meeting. Local officials are eager to focus on cultivating new businesses and jobs for the town in the new year.

Committee Member Joseph Florio was sworn in as mayor, taking over after Committee member Anthony Terrezza served the last two years in the position.

Florio, who has served on the committee for 15 years, said he is happy to be sworn in again.

"It's an honor and privilege to serve and especially to be mayor," he said.

Florio predicts 2012 will be a busy year for Union. One of the foremost priorities for the governing body is to continue to work to draw new businesses to the

"It is important to make every effort we can to reinvigorate the business community here in Union," Flo-

Local officials are already excited about one addition coming to town in 2012 - a medical life station located on Stahuber Avenue that Florio claimed will bring about 250 new jobs to the township.

Township Administrator Ronald Manzella said the vacant building there was purchased by a corporation called Life Stations that fields emergency medical calls in the private domain, similar to a home security company. It will offer around the clock service, contracting with Verizon, a phone company.

"Because it's a 24-hour staffed service, there's no major impact in terms of traffic," Manzella said.

Internal construction work on the building was approved by the planning and zoning boards and completed in 2011.

"They're just waiting for the final okay from the Verizon phone company," Manzella said.

A longer-term project involves a property on Morris Avenue across from Kean University. Sold by the Kean Foundation to Schering Plough and now owned by Merck, the site is now occupied by an office building, research facilities, a parking garage and nine acres of open space.

CRANFORD — After several years under Democratic control, the GOP took over control this week, literally sweeping out the old and ushering in the new.

Although it was expected that Republican David Robinson, who is serving his second term on the governing body, would be named mayor for 2012, other changes, were not expected. The new mayor also suggested that his term would be differ-

"This year," Robinson said, "the township committee will be about action.'

The mayor did not go into detail regarding the action that would be taken, nor did he address the ongoing issues the township faces with a

municipal building bottom floor that remains gutted but not repaired after Hurricane Irene hit in the beginning of September.

The cost of the repairs, estimated by an adjunct committee, could run anywhere from more than \$3 million to as much as \$8 million, depending on the route decided.

Also not addressed was whether the township intends to begin searching for a new township administrator. Former administrator Marlena Schmid was put on administrative leave in September by the governing body and let go from the position at the end of the year. Police Chief Eric Mason has been serving as interim township administrator.

(Continued from Page 1) elected commissioners Andis Kalnins and Lisa Adubato Nesi took the oath of office, changing the political balance on the governing body to a 3 to 2 Republican majori-

Kalnins nominated Robinson for mayor, or president of the committee, as the title is officially referred to in a township committee form of government. And, although Democrat commissioners Edward O'Malley and Kevin Campbell Robinson remain in the minority, Robinson was elected unanimously.

Kalnins also earned bipartisan support as newly elected deputy mayor, despite having no previous experience as a governing body

In a bold move, the GOP majority removed township attorney Daniel McCarthy, replacing him with former governing body member and mayor Philip Morin for a one-year term. Morin, who also serves as the Republican county chairman, was on the governing body for several terms.

This move, however, was objected to by O'Malley, who felt there was a lack of discussion among the governing body members on the selection. Campbell voiced concerns that Morin lacked experience regarding the controversial Birchwood housing development project the township is fighting.

McCarthy did note, though, that if the circumstances were different, he would have voted for Morin

But, he added that "this is not an ordinary time.

Kalnins and Adubato Nesi pointed out that Morin's level of legal experience warranted the appointment while Morin assured both Democratic governing body members he would be working "in the best interest of the township."

Mayor Robinson appointed Kalnins to oversee Finance, Adubato Nesi, public safety, Campbell, public works and engineering, with O'Malley charged with public affairs, which includes, health and

Mark J. Cassidy was reappointed municipal judge for a three-year term, while John DeMassi was made public defender along with Richard Brightman, municipal prosecutor and Robert Donovan alternate prosecutor.

Although former mayor and governing body member Dan Aschenbach, who was not reelected this past November and Mark Dugan, who opted not to run for reelection, were not present at the reorganization, both were commended for their service to the

Kalnins cited Dugan for his conservative voice on the governing body, while commending Aschenbach for seeing the township through one of its darkest hours during the flooding that occurred during and after Hurricane Irene.

It was apparent at the reorganization meeting the Republican majority fully intended to pick up

the ball and continue fighting the Birchwood project. The proposed development of apartments has been an albatross around the township's neck, and legally, a financial bottomless pit over the last five

Robinson made a point of mentioning that this coming week paperwork would be submitted to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection opposing the development of the Birchwood

He said hundreds of letters were submitted to the DEP by residents, asking that permits be denied for the project that would allow the developer, S. Hekemian Group, to construct apartments in an area that is flood-prone.

able for UCPAC board of directors. On Nov. 1, she said, Executive Director Samson Steinman denied access to the records, claiming that UCPAC is not subject to OPRA.

Tuesday, when reached for comment, Steinman said he could not comment on pending litigation, but he would be meeting with UCPAC legal council later this week, preferring that any further comments come directly from them.

According to a report by the Union County Prosecutor's Office, UCPAC is a non-profit 501C-3 corporation that originally opened in October 1928 as the Rahway Theater. After it fell into disrepair, the county paid for a \$6.2 million renovation and expansion of the theater, which was completed in 2007. The county also purchased the theater for \$1.3 million, leasing it back to UCPAC for \$1 a year, according to Renna.

The theater was renamed UCPAC in 1985 after the Union County Board of Freeholders passed a resolution officially renaming it.

Renna points to a court case involving the New Jersey League of Municipalities, which is a non-profit lobbying and educational organization comprised of representative New Jersey municipalities and which derived 28 percent of its funding from taxpayer dollars, was a public agency. The court, she notes, held that it was.

Although Renna admitted that UCPAC does not perform exactly the same actions as the league, she believes they are a public entity.

UCPAC, Renna added, according to its 990 filings and newspaper accounts which quote county and other officials, "couldn't exist without the support of the county government and UCPAC is needed to spur economic development on behalf of the county.'

Renna also pointed to the fact that in August 2004 former county manager George Devanney called the purchase of the arts center "an economic development investment."

The watchdog president said it is clear from past published newspaper accounts and the finances of UCPAC, the arts center is not only working closely with public agencies and officials but "performing critical public functions that would otherwise be performed by public agencies.

Union County Communications Director Sebastian D'Elia said Tuesday the county does not comment on issues involving litigation, but pointed out that UCPAC is a separate non-profit agency.

## Fair play: Union resident bucks municipal judge over ruling

UNION - What's fair is fair may be how the saying goes, but one township resident claims the township municipal judge is anything but fair.

Based on what took place in municipal court in October, resident Anthony Nardiello felt he had no choice but to take his case to a higher authority — the State Supreme Court Advisory Committee on Judicial

Nardiello believes Municipal Judge Cassandra Corbett either did not know case law or failed to apply it when she heard his case in October. Regardless, the resident feels fair is fair, especially when it was applied to a township administrator in the past.

Nardiello received the summons for driving an unregistered vehicle, but when it came time to go to municipal court, he did not plead guilty, even though his vehicle was unregistered.

"I used the defense of defective notice," the resident said, explaining this defense has been used previously when defendants do not receive notification from the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission in a timely manner. Nardiello claims he never received a summons from the state, which should have led to his case being dismissed in municipal court by Judge Cor-

After all, Nardiello pointed out, that defense held up in court when former township administrator Frank Bradley was issued six summons for improper use of emergency lights, careless operation, failure to keep right, improper passing, expired registration and failure to yield to an emergency vehicle.

This particular incident, which occurred in September 2007, was based on the fact that while the incident took place on Sept. 18, 2007, the summonses were not issued until Oct. 16, 2007 and then sent by mail.

According to the Union Leader newspaper accounting at the time, township attorney Daniel Antonelli explained it was the "timing of the issuance of the motor vehicle summons, which were issued 29 days after the incident."

The township attorney further noted that while the ruling on behalf of Bradley did not reflect the way the township handled summons, "the state summons needs to be issued and delivered to the defendant within 20 days of the incident."

Confused, Nardiello could not understand why this particular defense worked for Bradlev in 2008, and vet when he used the same defense, it did not apply. Like Bradley, Nardiello maintained he did not receive any summons within the 30-day required period,

## Rabies clinic, Jan. 14

The Cranford Board of Health has scheduled a free dog and cat rabies vaccination clinic at the Township of Cranford Recreation Center, 220 Walnut Ave., Jan. 14.

In order to aid in the administration of the vaccine, only cats will be immunized between 9 and 10:45 a.m. Dogs will be immunized between 11:15 a.m. and 1 p.m. Animals must be leashed-restrained and accompanied by an adult. The Health Department recommends that cats be both leashed harness-type is preferred - and kept in 'cat-carriers' during the clinic visit.

Owners of animals vaccinated in 2009 should be aware that the rabies vaccine has a three-year-duration and must be revaccinated

Animals who received their first rabies inoculation in 2011 and rabies vaccinations that expire in 2012 also must be revaccinat-

The New Jersey State Department of Health is recommending that all domestic dogs and cats be vaccinated in order to protect both residents and pets from this fatal disease. Since November of 1989, the rabies epizootic - epidemic of animals - has spread through New Jersey, with positive rabies cases in both wildlife and domestic animals documented in most New Jersey counties.

(Continued from Page 4) that night Judge Corbett disallowed it. I wanted to make it known to her that such a defense exists and it was used, successfully in the Union Township Municipal Court," Nardiello said in his letter to John A. Tonelli, executive director of the state advisory committee on judicial conduct.

In early December Nardiello received confirmation from Tonelli that his complaint had been received and copies of his letter would be distributed to members of the advisory committee. According to Tonelli, the issue was scheduled for discussion by the advisory committee at their next meeting, which was undisclosed.

"The members will decide at that time if there is an indication of improper judicial conduct that constitutes a basis for formal judicial disciplinary proceedings," Tonelli noted.

In 2008 when Bradley's case was dismissed, Roselle Park Prosecutor Robert Donovan, said the matter was dismissed for clear rea-

"Under a recent case, State v. Buczkowski, 395 NJ Super 40 (app Div. 2007), the Appellate division ruled that the defendant must be served with the summons within the 30-day period in order to satisfy the deadline," Donovan said in newspaper accounts of the incident. "If that deadline is not satisfied, the summonses are to be dismissed according to Buczkowski case."

With no proof of the exact date the summons was mailed and no evidence of the date of receipt, the case was dismissed. Nardiello also pointed out that this is not the first time Corbett has had charges filed against her for judicial misconduct. In 2001, Corbett, who was admitted to the New Jersey Bar Association in 1993, was officially reprimanded for an undetermined matter. According to Nardiello, she was again admonished in 2007 for neglecting a client's wrongful arrest and termination of employment litigation and failing to communicate with the client about the matter according to New Jersey Lawyer newspaper.



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

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

# Deer Management Program starts hunting in Lenape Park

problem of deer overpopulation in Lenape Park.

Since 1995, marksmen in the County of Union's state-approved deer management program have reduced the population of whitetailed deer in the Watchung Reservation substantially. Last year, that effort was expanded to remove deer from portions of Passaic River Park in Summit.

Union County has received complaints about deer-related impacts from residents around Lenape Park for several years. The Cranford Environmental Commission, the Cranford Tree Advisory Board and the Hanson Park Conservancy have all expressed concern for damage to and loss of landscape vegetation and a fear of Lyme disease.

Browsing for food by large numbers of deer has caused a loss Jan. 9 to Feb. 6. ## Dazed and confused

Here at Union County LocalSource, we are confused. Actually, we are very confused. Because in the past weeks we have uncovered a host of problems, to say the absolute least, with the leadership at Kean University. And well, quite frankly, we were wondering if anyone cared?

Recently in Elizabeth, the board of education president and two others were charged with stealing from a federal lunch program. While the alleged theft was wrong, the attention a few thousand dollars worth of theft garnered was through the roof.

Well, here is another number for you: \$360 million — the amount of debt at Kean University generated under the tenure of the school's allegedly resume-falsifying president who has been given an overwhelming vote of no confidence by the teacher's union.

In 2002 Dawood Farahi was chosen by the school's board of trustees to be the new president. According to the teacher's and faculty union at Kean, the current president was hired under false pretenses, over 10 years ago. They say his more than 50 published articles never existed. And since becoming president, they say student fees have increases dramatically, tenure-track professors have dropped significantly, and the school's debt has increased from about \$40 million to nearly \$400 million.


The thing that confuses us, is that this has garnered practically no attention at all. There are serious allegations involved: deceit, ineptitude and what should be considered criminal fraud. There are six state senators that represent portions of Union County. Where is their outrage? And why does Farahi, a state employee earning \$290,000, get away with no explanation to the public about these charges? He won't even comment to explain about the 50 published articles.

But here is the real problem. There are 15 members of the board of trustees of Kean University. Their names can be found online at www.kean.edu/KU/Members. Among the actions they are "empowered" to make, according to their website, are to "appoint and fix the compensation of the President of the University, the executive officer of the University," and "borrow money for the needs of the University." It is their responsibility, as leaders of the institution, to make sure a candidate for the job of president, a position carrying a very large salary, is not only qualified, but is not falsifying his records. A simple search on Google does not turn up one article by the "executive officer of the University.'

What is the university doing? Why is the county prosecutor not investigating the president for fraud? Why have no politicians representing the voters of Union County and the State of New Jersey demanded a swift solution to what is an obvious

These trustees are Gov. Christie-nominated, under Senateconsents. Doing nothing to fix the problem makes every last politician even remotely involved complicit.

And it's high time someone is held responsible.

Patricia is a beautiful, vibrant and good-humored woman who was an elementary school nurse in the same district in New Jersey for 32 years.

When I asked her if she's seen it all, she replied, "Seen it all and heard it all.


She said that not only did the kids come into her office for their issues, but that parents and teachers spent a good deal of time in her office, too.

She knew all about the marital problems of most adults who came in to sit with her and usually knew about her students' conflicts at home long before their teachers and even sometimes before their parents did. But most of all, she said, "People just needed to talk." And Patricia was there to listen.

She said that she always kept quiet games and coloring books for the kids and music on the radio turned down low. And she always made herself available for chitchat. I asked if she could tell the fakers right off the bat and she said, "After a while I got pretty good at telling. Headaches and stomach aches were the most popular because they couldn't be seen. Sometimes they were bored but most times, they just needed a break. Or someone to talk to. If a kid trusts you enough, they'll start to tell you things.

If she saw something was amiss with a student, or was told something in confidence, she always waited for the child's teacher to "form his or her own opinion."

Then, if the teacher came to her

she could corroborate what she knew and they could work toward a solution together.

One little first-grader she remembered "was a recent immigrant with a troubled mother.'

Patricia was as compassionate as she could be and then the little girl moved away suddenly and always left her wondering. Fifteen years later the girl returned one day to tell Patricia that she was OK now, and so was her mom. She asked to pose for a picture with Patricia and stood close as they

Decades before there were aides and experts assigned to students with disabilities and special needs, teachers with spirited or disruptive students would send them out of the classroom to Patricia's office for most of the school

One little boy with ADHD, she said, "practically lived in my office" for his entire kindergarten through grade six career. He came back every year after that to give her a big hug on the last day of school. Every year without fail, a big hug.

"As the years went on," she said, "I saw too much of the parents. I just wanted to tell most of them to get out and go find somewith a similar finding or hunch, thing to do. But I had to be nice."

Patricia's cousin chimed in, She's very even tempered and she's wonderful with people who annoy her. I should know.

"How did you avoid burnout?"

"Well, it changes every year," Patricia said, "but there is no greater bunch than the teachers. There was just so much camaraderie. It wasn't all work; we had fun in-between. Things can get stressful, but as long as you have friends to help you through ... and I miss the kids. They were so much fun. But they had so much they had to do. And then afterschool activities; they just needed a break. I always gave them the benefit of the doubt.'

She said that she wishes she'd kept some of the excuse notes she got. I thought they might make an excellent coffee-table book for doctor's waiting rooms and lobbies. Then I asked her what I knew was a leading question, but I asked it just the same. "Would you say that most kids are basically good kids?"

"Oh, yes, absolutely," she said without missing a beat, "that's why I always gave them the benefit of the doubt."

Always, I repeated to myself. That's a precious commodity in these times. Thank goodness for school nurses like Patricia.

## Red-light cameras up and running

Red-Light Safety Cameras were activated in Union on Saturday, ushering in a new level of protection for motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists at three intersections. A public-education and 30-day warning phase will accompany the start of the program, giving drivers an opportunity to become familiar with the system. Fines will not be issued during the warning period,

but photographs will be taken, and warning notices will be mailed to the vehicles' registered owners.

Union is one of nearly 40 localities in New Jersey saying "yes" to the camera program. Over the past decade, on average, red-light runners have caused 885 fatalities and 165,000 injuries annually in the United States. Two-thirds of the time, the person who dies is someone other than the red-light runner. National and international research shows cameras reduce red-light violations and the life-threatening Tbone collisions that can result when vehicles collide in the middle of an intersection. This year, an Insurance Institute for Highway Safety study found Red-Light Safety Cameras saved more than 150 lives in 14 of the country's largest cities.



## 'Phal' orchid's seductive charms

For years, I turned my back on the seductive charms of orchids. Though clearly beautiful in color and form, they also seemed exotic to the point of being unnatural. On the practical side, I have never been sure that I could sustain the level of Apprentice commitment required by orchids.

Maybe it was my imagination, but every time I came face to face with a lush cattleya or Dendrobium, I thought I saw the shadow of death passing over the plant. I figured that I saved a good number of orchids by restricting my indoor gardening activities to African violets and other plants I knew I could nurture successfully, or replace cheaply.

But life is full of surprises. Several years ago, I became the foster parent of a moth orchid, or Phalaenopsis, originally purchased by my daughter. Since then, it has rebloomed reliably every year, either because of or - more likely in spite of my care. Now, the buds are swelling once again, and the plant appears set to produce at least 10 of the distinctive, pinkish blooms that last up to six weeks.

I have gotten so puffed up about this triumph of benign semi-neglect that I have taken to calling my orchid a "phal," the way the real hobbyists do. I am seriously considering the purchase of a second Phalaenopsis.

Phalaenopsis was one of the first exotic orchids to find its way into

19th-century Victorian homes. In the floral language that was all the rage with Queen Victoria and her contemporaries, moth orchids symbolized gaiety and luxury. Though the plants preferred the warmth and humidity of newly fashionable greenhouses and conservatories, they could also be made to flourish in more ordinary, indoor accommo-

More than a century later, moth orchids are ubiquitous, thanks to the wonders of tissue culture, by which thousands of clones can be produced from small tissue samples. You can find phals everywhere, from supermarkets to big box stores to the highest of high-end florists. Price points are determined by the size and age of the plant, flower color and the level of retailer over-

The basic moth orchid stands between 1 and 2 feet tall, with arching flower stems that bear white flowers. Each one features three Discovered in the 18th century, rounded top petals and a lip-like bottom petal that consists of three lobes, the center of which is cruci-

form with distinctive tails or spurs. Centuries ago, observers decided that the showy flowers resembled white moths. The genus name comes from the Greek "Phalaena," meaning moth and "opsis," meaning appearance.

Phalaenopsis leaves sprout at the base of the plant and can grow to 10 inches long. Deep green, they may be mottled or marked in some varieties and species. Three to five of these substantial leaves will appear on the average moth orchid plant. One or two die each year, to be replaced with new foliage.

Most of today's moth orchids are descended from Phalaenopsis amabile, a native of Borneo, the Philippines, Java and northeast Australia. Unlike some Phalaenopsis species that are lithophytes, living on rocks; amabile is an epiphyte that lives in trees and receives much of its nourishment from rainwater.

Hybridizers have been ministering to Phalaenopsis since the mid-19th century, producing plants with flowers of many colors. In addition to pristine white blossoms, you can find specimens with pink, purple or yellowish blooms, sometimes ornamented with dots or strips in darker shades. There are also bi-colored varieties. Most bloom once a year in the winter, but mature moth orchids can be cajoled into blooming a second time by cutting back the bloom stems to a node just above the one where the first flower appeared.

My orchid thrives on a weekly 20-minute soaking in tepid water. This year I will also treat it to a position atop a tray filled with a layer of water and pebbles. This promotes the high humidity levels the plants crave. Since my plant's original bark-based potting mix has begun breaking down, I will repot it in fresh mix after the blossoms fade. In the summer, it will go outside in a shaded, protected spot on the back porch, returning to my south-facing dining room window seat when the nights turn colder in September or October. I hope that with slightly more attentive care this year, my foster orchid will produce two healthy flower spikes next winter.

To learn more about orchids in general and Phalaenopsis in particular, visit the American Orchid Society's website, www.aos.org. If you prefer to learn the old fashioned way, there are many books on orchid culture. William Cullina's 'Understanding Orchids" is a good place to start.

Many of the orchid addicts I know started with a single Phalaenopsis. I suspect I have the potential to join their ranks.







## Randolph's pin provides DeBellonia with 100th win

UNION - When Jeremy Randolph took to the mat Dec. 23 he was ready to deliver.

Union trailed visiting arch rival Irvington by three and it was up to Randolph to do what he had to do to provide third-year Farmers head coach Dino DeBellonia his 100th career victory.

In Randolph's mind it was pin or else. There was no other option.

Facing Irvington's Jeanson Etienne in the match's final bout at 138 pounds, Randolph was much more aggressive in the first period, but had

Randolph was ahead, but winning the bout by decision was not going to give Union the victory.

Randolph gained another point early in the second period for a 3-0 lead before he grabbed a solid hold of Etienne and would not let the Blue Knight grappler escape from his clutches.

Randolph earned a pin in 2:28 to give host Union a come-from-behind 37-34 triumph.

As a result, DeBellonia earned his 100th career triumph, which includes 88 wins as the head coach at Seton Hall Prep for six seasons from 2004 to 2009 and 12 more at Union since 2010.

"There wasn't anything else I was thinking about other than going out and getting a pin," said Randolph, a two-year varsity wrestler who competed at 125 last season. "All I wanted to do was get him on his back.

"There was no other way."

Union came back from deficits of 15-0 and 34-28 to even its record at 1-1. Irvington, which won seven of the 12 bouts contested but had to forfeit at 285 and 106, slipped to 0-2.

"I wanted to get a shot to a half as fast as possible," Randolph said of his strategy in defeating Etienne. "This is one of the best feelings in my life."

"From a coaching standpoint, by looking at the scoreboard we needed a major (decision) or better (technical fall or pin)," DeBellonia said. "Jeremy did what we told him to do.

"We told him to work for a fall which is why the sport was created."

Sparked by outstanding performances from Edwige Gedeon at 145, who won by decision; and Romario Herbert at 152 and Ishmael Crawford at 160, who both won by fall; Irvington jumped out to a 15-0 lead.

"We knew it would be a barn-burner," DeBellonia said. "Irvington is very well-coached and has some very good wrestlers."

The Blue Knights are guided by former Irvington standout grappler Kyle Steele.

"It helps when you have a full lineup," DeBellonia said.

Putting Union on the scoreboard for the first time was junior Stephen Gibki, who managed a pin of Irvington's Matthew Carpenter in 3:07 at 170.

"Stephen decided to dedicate himself to the sport in the off-season and still has a ways to go," DeBellonia said. "He can be a leader on the mat. We'll turn to him for leadership.'

Giving Union four huge points at 195 was senior Brian Homere. Irvington had just increased its lead to 18-6 after Dyuenet Beaublanc edged Claude Medeles 6-5 at 182.

Homere had an 8-2 lead on Irvington's Joshua Ogbennaya before he managed one more point-producing move inside of six minutes.

"He was able to get what's called a 'spin behind' for two points," DeBellonia said.

Homere produced the move right before the third period buzzer, giving him a 10-2 win. That meant he won by major decision for four points, rather than by decision for three. In a match that went down to the final bout, that extra point was huge.

"He did it with three seconds to go," DeBellonia said. "Those two additional points were critical."

Homere, with very little body fat for a 195-pounder, was in control the

"Brian is physically put together," DeBellonia said. "He didn't really start wrestling until last year. He's very strong and polishing his technique."

## Fall softball league is a hit for budding players

## Many Union County towns represented

From early September through the end of October 600 area softball players descended to Cranford each weekend to play in the region's largest and most popular fall softball league.

League - the CBSL - the Cranford Fall Softball League featured 39 teams from 16 communities in four counties, with girls ranging in age from 7 to 15.

Players hailed from Cranford, the Elmora section of Elizabeth, Kenilworth, Maplewood-South Orange, Piscataway, Rahway, Union, Westfield, Colonia, Woodbridge Township, Scotch Plains-Fanwood, Summit, Clark, Metuchen, Springfield, Roselle Park and Long Hill.

Founded in 2009 by CBSL board members Scott Wetherell and Keith Hoffman, the league initially included eight teams in two divisions. They were the 10-and-under and 12-and-under divisions from four towns - Cranford, Roselle Park, Summit and Maplewood-South Orange.

In 2010, the league expanded to 19 teams in those two divisions. Then this year the league expanded to include 8-and-under and 14-and-under divisions and exploded to its current size.

Including championship playoffs for every division, the league hosted 190 softball games over its sevenweek schedule. Most games were played at Cranford's three-field Adams Avenue complex. The remainder were played at the township's signature Memorial Field complex off Centennial Avenue.

Although the weather was often uncooperative, virtually all of the scheduled games were played, including dozens that had to be rescheduled because of the fall's pounding rains. Area managers appeared to appreciate the volunteers' efforts to get the games in.

There were major tournaments that were canceled on days when this league got all its games in," said Jess Hulnik, who this spring will begin her third year as the head softball coach at Scotch Plains.

Hulnik is also a coach in the Cranford Fall Softball League and president of the Parkway Invitational Softball League, which is the area's premier summer travel softball circuit.

"I really have to give the league credit for being able to get all these games played," Hulnik said.

Talented travel teams came from as far away as Morris, Essex and Middlesex counties. But the league participants understood that, as a fall developmental league, the focus was on having fun and getting the girls some experience at a higher level of play.

"Fall softball is all about relaxed fun with your friends, about the memories the girls will take away with them," Hoffman said.

"Near the end of the season I saw a Piscataway player taking a picture of an empty field after her game

"She turned to her teammate and said, 'I want to Sponsored by the Cranford Baseball and Softball remember this place.' That was pretty much my favorite moment of the season."

> All of umpires were professionals from the Amateur Softball Association of America. In addition to Wetherell and Hoffman, the league was administered by Cranford residents John and Kristen Mallon, Jim Litterio, Tim Dineen and Kathey Wetherell.

> Volunteer members of 14 participating Cranford families pitched in to help line the fields before games.

> Cranford fielded seven teams in the league, including two each at the 8-and-under, 10-and-under and 12-and-under levels and one at the 14-and-under level. A total of 95 Cranford girls took part.

> Hoffman said the league could not grow any futher because the available field space was at its maximum use when allowing for make-up games and a full slate of championship playoffs. Organizers were determined to keep it going for as many years as other towns were willing to come here to play, he said.

> "We're not going anywhere," Hoffman said. "For the people to administer this league, it's not just about our own kids, It's not even about Cranford kids.

> "When you look around on a Saturday morning in the fall at three packed fields with 100 happy kids from all over the place that are laughing and kidding each other and playing softball, that's something you don't ever want to give up."

Feehan was a Third Team selection in 2005 and 2006 before claiming First Team accolades in 2007.

Caseres attempted 102 shots with 48 on goal and a .471 shots The 2011 All-America ballot consisted of only those on goal percentage. Caseres netted five game-winning goals, scored the first goal of a game six times and collected three hat

Caseres earned Second-Team Academic All-NJAC honors during the 2010-11 season. She ended her career ranking tied for 12th in Division 3 history in points and tied for 15th in goals.

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

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
