County expects to layoff 10% of work force

The county is reportedly taking some drastic financial steps in order to balance the 2012 budget, including laying off 280 employees, sources said.

Officials said with the layoffs, job vacancies and program eliminations, along with operating and expense cuts, the county will be able to slash \$10 million from their deficit, which, according to sources, is well over \$30 million.

However, neither County Manager Al Faella or Fiscal Committee Chairman Freeholder Dan Sullivan would discuss actual budget numbers until the spending plan is introduced April 5.

Approximately 10 percent of the 2,800 full-time employee base will be affected by the layoffs, but because the county has a significant number of civil service positions, the state had to be notified of all layoff plans.

Subsequently, the county filed its first plan for 44 layoffs earlier this month, effective May 1. These employees already received notice of

the impending layoff, but the remaining 236 employees were expected to receive layoff notices this week. Those layoffs will be effective June 1.

Sullivan said New Jersey State Civil Service will establish a special re-employment list for all affected county employees, ranked by seniority. If, in the future, the need arises for any of those employees to be called back to work, Civil Service will take care of calling them back.

But the decision to layoff employees did not come easy.

"While there are no words that can ease the

pain for those employees who may be impacted, this board expresses its sympathy," said Freeholder Dan Sullivan, chairman of the Fiscal Committee.

Along with the layoff notices also came the decision to not fill a total of 72 positions that are currently vacant.

Additionally, the freeholder board, county manager and department directors all agreed to take a three-day voluntary salary reduction equivalent to what three of the unions have already accepted. This included the county police rank and file, police superior officers and Local 68 Engineers.

The cuts did not come easy for the county either, according to several freeholders, who said departmental directors spent weeks scrutinizing department budgets and making all cuts possible. And yet, according to the county, there still was a considerable deficit.

The only thing they could do, said Freeholder Chairman Al Mirabella, was resort to laying off employees.

"We are in a very, very difficult position," Mirabella explained to the audience containing representatives of the 11 unions attending last Thursday's freeholder meeting. Explaining they had done everything possible over the years and up to this point to avoid layoffs, Mirabella said the decision was "clearly a last resort."

Although the majority of freeholders did not have any comments about the layoffs, Freeholder Angel Estrada explained why this situation developed in the first place.

"I realize how difficult this is but we have a responsibility to ensure a balanced budget," he said, stressing that in his opinion he did not believe "the different union groups worked hard enough to come forward to work something out."

Estrada did feel there still was a small window of opportunity for union leaders to step to the plate and negotiate further so there were less layoffs.

Hillside's Menza takes home mayor of the year honors

Monday night The Gateway Regional Chamber of Commerce rolled out the red carpet, awarding their own version of the Oscars to mayors and other town officials.

The ballroom at the Airport Marriot Hotel was packed with 350 mayors, public safety officials, administrators, governing body members and business sponsors eagerly awaiting the climax of the gala evening — the announcement of the Mayor of the Year award.

Like the Academy Awards, the Gateway Regional Chamber had a team of judges made up of members of the local Community Affairs Commission members. And, until the moment the announcer asked for "the envelope please," no one, not even Gateway's Chief Executive Officer Jim Coyle, knew the name of the winner.

Coyle noted that the Gateway Chamber event is the largest, non-partisan political event in the county, and at this year's celebration, Hillside Mayor Joseph Menza was the recipient of the coveted Mayor of the

Year title. He was specifically lauded for his "courage and fortitude in standing up to the political machine."

Menza graciously accepted the award — a gold statue made by the same company that also produces Hollywood's Academy Award — admitting that being mayor was often a solitary job.

"I'm humbled by this award," Menza said, adding that he was not unlike all the other mayors in attendance because he too "served not for the money or power but for love of his community."

As mayor of Hillside, a Faulkner Act town with a popularly-elected mayor separate from the council, it has often been an uphill battle for Menza to make the changes he knew would benefit the community and taxpayers.

The poem he recited during the five minutes each mayor was allotted to bring everyone up to speed on the last year, while lighthearted, managed to touch on some of the highlights.

"My name is Joe Menza and I'm the mayor of Hillside, our council meetings are like being at ring-

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Councilman: 7th Ward does not want plant

EarthCare and Councilman Sheehy have different opinions regarding a proposed medical waste plant

LINDEN — There are two vastly differing sides developing regarding a medical waste facility taking up residence in the city's public works building on Lower Road. How it ultimately ends up, though, now rests entirely with the city council.

Regardless what decision is made by council in the coming months about this proposed facility, one thing is certain — residents living in the area are passionately against EarthCare moving into their neighborhood. On the other hand, the partners involved with getting this innovative and new way to process medical waste off the ground cannot understand why there is so much concern.

EarthCare partner Jeff Crisalli remains, quite frankly, baffled by the opposition he and his business partners received at a meeting held in the 7th Ward two weeks ago. Especially because it was not his or his partners idea to come back to Linden.

"The key is we were asked by the mayor to come back," said Crisalli Monday, admitting that "we had already chalked this up for dead in Linden."

This is not the first experience Crisalli has had in the medical waste industry business. In fact, he previously owned a facility in Toms River that used an auto-clave system, which is different than the roto-clave machinery that has been approved by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection for use.

"The difference is the material goes into a drum container and all and steam and negative air destroys all bacteria. Any liquid that goes into the sewerage system is cleaned of all bacteria or anything contami-

nated," Crisalli explained.

As for attending the meeting held in the 7th Ward without information residents would like to know, Crisalli felt this was premature.

"We are doing this purely as a speculative venture," he added, pointing out that at this point it would be at least a year before any business was off the ground.

Not only does the city council have to vote on closing the public

works garage, but EarthCare needs to go before the Planning Board for approval. However, because this area is already zoned for heavy industrial use, zoning would not be a problem.

The machines that EarthCare would use, he said, cost \$1.2 million each and they intend to have three machines on the premises, two working in two shifts, with one on reserve. But that is jumping the gun, Crisalli said.

"The reason no one has used these machines in New Jersey so far is because its impossible to get an approval from towns," he added, mentioning that this is confusing because there is more bacteria in household waste than in the medical waste they would be processing.

EarthCare, he said, would have about 20 employees, 14 plant workers with six sales people in the field. The plant itself would make

less noise than a compactor.

Crisalli also believes that EarthCare can get the votes needed from council to move forward.

Jack Sheehy, 7th Ward Councilman, does not care how quiet the plant will be or that the DEP has approved the machinery. He, along with residents living in the 7th Ward, do not want any medical waste facility in their neighborhood.

County to make drastic cuts to help balance 2012 budget

"I still believe there is a possibility that some things can be remedied," Estrada said, adding the board "does appreciate our employees, but unfortunately this is the reality of the world today."

It was evident cutting the county workforce was not what the freeholder board planned, but according to Sullivan, the county exhausted all other options.

"A few weeks ago I spoke about the findings of the Efficiency Taskforce's report which recognized the potential to save more than \$850,000 through a series of cost cutting measures to be implemented throughout the course of the fiscal year," he said, but noted that as the board neared the last two weeks before the budget was to be introduced, it became apparent major measures had to be taken to close "a very significant budget deficit."

Even with all department directors asked to cut 5 percent off last year's operating and expense budgets, it still was not enough to cut into the deficit faced by the county.

County manager Al Faella suggested, and the freeholder board agreed, that certain programs and services had to be slashed.

Included in the cuts were Union County MusicFest and the Rhythm and Blues by the Brook concerts, which the board announced two weeks ago. Also included was Kids Kingdom events for this year.

The board also agreed to cut all county funding to the

Rutgers Cooperative Extension, which has its offices in a Westfield, county-owned building. But, according to Union County Communications Director Sebastian D'Elia, this program receives grants from the state and federal government which should be enough to keep it afloat.

The county operated Division of Consumer Affairs will also be eliminated and the freeholder Scholars, Senior Scholars and College for Teens will be cut back to their 2011 spending levels.

D'Elia said, though, that until the board introduces the budget April 5, anything can happen.

"This is not a completed budget," he explained, adding that what is laid out right now is "a picture in time."

"The deliberate document will not be laid out until April 5, but even then anything can change," the communications director added.

Last year, the county's \$484.86 million budget was a 4.9 percent increase over the previous year. Under that spending plan the average homeowner with a house assessed at \$153,823 saw an increase of \$93, and the total raised by taxation in 2011 was nearly \$293.8 million

In 2011, though, the county was able to ward off layoffs by continuing the wage freeze that was put in place the year before. The county maintained the \$10 million budget deficit last year was the result of the state imposed cuts in aid which left little recourse to recover these costs.

Springfield budget jumps \$1 million, claims exception to 2 percent cap

SPRINGFIELD — The township's proposed 2012 budget has been introduced to the public and is awaiting final approval from both local and state officials.

According to Chief Financial Officer Michael Quick, the budget involves \$29.3 million in total general appropriations, up from last year's \$28.3 million. It means a \$93 increase per home assessed at the township's average of \$160,000.

Township Administrator Anthony Cancro reported the budget increase is due primarily to two factors. One stems from overtime related to two severe storms last year; Hurricane Irene, which flooded portions of the town, and a freak October snowstorm that resulted in many fallen tree limbs and downed power lines. These weather events required extra work by police, fire, the Office of Emergency Management, public works and others.

"We had a \$246,000 expense they did not budget for in 2011, which required an emergency appropriation that hurts us in 2012," Cancro said.

The other factor stems from a pension deferral from 2009. The option for municipalities to defer on their annual pension obligation was offered only once by then-governor Jon Corzine.

The only sitting committee member who was on the governing body when this decision was made

is Ziad Shehady, who voted in opposition to the 2009 deferral. Shehady, who now serves as mayor, refused to comment for this article.

Springfield is now paying the remaining \$765,000 of their deferral back in its entirety.

"We're doing that because we want to avoid the 8.25 percent interest the state would charge," Cancro said.

Committeeman David Amlin, who is not on the finance committee this year, said the one aspect of the budget he took issue with was this deferral payment, which he had initially hoped to diffuse over several years.

Amlin said he would have preferred to pay the money back over time, but trusts Quick's judgement and understands the reasoning behind paying it back in one year.

"I just hate the idea that its an extra chunk of money in the budget this year as opposed to being spread out over three years," Amlin said.

The tax levy is \$21.4 million, an increase of \$648,000 from last year. This represents a 2.9 percent increase, exceeding the state's 2 percent cap. However, the township is claiming an exception to the cap law.

"There are four to five exceptions to the rule, one of which is deferred pensions," Quick explained.

Cancro said several increases in revenue helped the town, such as \$10,000 in additional revenue from a cell tower and \$20,000 in delin-

quent property taxes that were collected. The township also obtained more revenue from the improved parking meter system.

Salary and wages basically remained flat, he said.

Cancro said the town recently learned Standard and Poor has rated Springfield a AA+, the same rating as the state of New Jersey, which Cancro said is a "very good sign".

In Springfield, the township administrator and CFO assemble the framework of the budget while finance committee members go on to examine it in more detail. Cancro said he and Quick got started on the budget in January.

Amlin said he is satisfied with the budget overall and does not anticipate any major changes to the budget between now and its adoption.

"I'm just glad we got it done on time this year," Amlin said. "There have been years in the past when the budget dragged on months and months past when it was supposed to be approved. That puts you under a much more watchful eye from the state, which is not a good thing.

Cancro said the finance committee "seemed content" with the budget, and reported little public interest at the March 19 hearing.

"It was not well attended. The comments we got were favorable," Cancro said.

Residents will have additional opportunity for comment and questions at the budget's final reading on April 24.

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\$87.4 million budget includes tax increase

UNION — Township officials expect the average homeowner with a house assessed at \$45,600 to see a \$89 tax increase for 2012 in the municipal portion of their tax bill.

The township introduced its \$87.4 million 2012 budget recently, but taxpayers are only affected by the amount to be raised by taxes, which came to \$62.8 million.

Township Administrator Ron Manzella said not only did the township manage to reduce the tax impact over last year, but they also stayed under a "hard 2 percent cap."

"That means we have nothing extra outside the cap, which many towns have to do in order to stay with that cap," said the administrator who took over after the ailing former administrator Frank Bradley retired last year.

"The increase means the average homeowner will pay \$7.50 a month more than last year," Manzella said, mentioning that considering everything that has to be included within the 2 percent cap, "we are on solid financial footing."

The \$87.4 million spending plan, of which only \$62.8 million is raised by taxpayer dollars, came in \$1.2 million more than last year, or a 1.8 percent increase and under the mandated 2 percent cap.

Last year the township's budget came in at \$85.9 million with \$61.7 million supported by taxpayer dollars and called for an average tax increase of \$99, making it \$188 in tax increases over two years for the average homeowner assessed at \$45,600.

Manzella said they would have only saw a 1.5 percent increase but the township had to factor in mandated library costs, which increased the overall number.

Making a huge financial impact on the 2012 budget, Manzella said, was something no one expected but had to make allowances for financially when working on the 2012 spending plan.

"We had \$15 million in net assessed valuation loss," the administration explained, pointing out that these appeals accounted for approximately \$40 of the total \$89 increase in taxes for the average home owner.

However, one taxpayer in the township made an impact on those appeals.

"We had a significant loss in tax appeals from Merck," Manzella said, but added that this is to be expected in the economy everyone has been experiencing.

The majority of the budget, the administrator explained, is salary and wages, accounting for 23 percent of the spending plan. That breaks down to 20 percent for the police, 20 percent for fire and 5 percent for the

Department of Public Works.

Because of union contracts, salaries increased 2.25 percent, or \$844,000. Health care benefits also jumped by \$1.1 million over 2011.

On the positive side, Manzella said the township remains at full staff with no layoffs.

"We are in a solid financial position and our budget is basically flat," he added, but did stress the township is always looking for where they can share services with other municipalities in order to reduce costs.

"This is a budget that is tight with no out-of-cap expenses," Manzella repeated.

"We are in a position where we can continue to provide excellent services to residents," the administrator said, noting, for example, that Union will maintain its AA bond rating, which is a sign of "good management."

"We didn't delete any services beyond what is safe and healthy for the township and residents," Manzella said.

The township, though, did dip into surplus, or savings, taking \$5.5 million to offset taxes. But this still left \$4.3 million in their coffers, Manzella said.

"One of our goals was to live within a hard 2 percent cap and not put anything outside the cap," the administrator said, explaining that this process involves every department head checking themselves to ensure they stay within their budget during the year.

"Every department head is responsible for managing their own budget and we hold them accountable," he said, noting that he and township Chief Financial Officer Tammi Kobrin hold quarterly budget review meetings with these department heads to ensure they are "on target."

One area that continued to reap extra revenue over the previous year was construction. Last year this department made \$500,000 in fees and Manzella said this department continued on this track of increased revenues for 2012.

Part of the budget included setting aside \$86,127 to pay governing body members who earn \$17,225 each for serving as an elected official on the Township Committee.

The governing body introduced the budget March 14 and is expected to have a final reading and public hearing April 10. This is only one part of a three part tax bill residents should expect. County and school tax rates have not yet been set.

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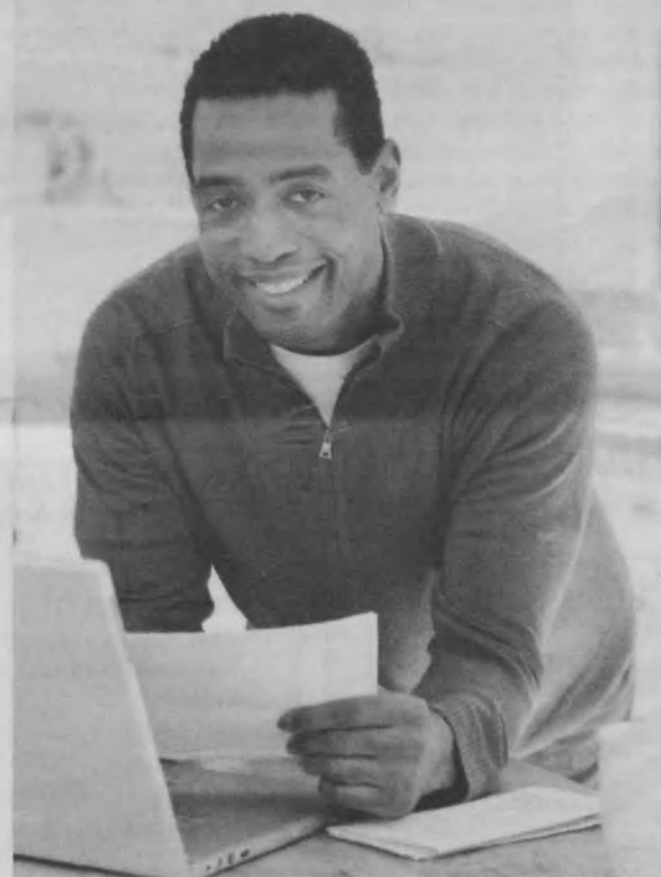


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Union Center property owner: 40% want SID gone

UNION — Union Center property owner Phillip Geron believes the Special Improvement District is not living up to its full potential and should be disbanded. Apparently a good percentage of owners in the center of town agree with him.

Geron, long disgruntled with the state of the SID, recently circulated a petition among landlords who are part of the SID and 40 percent responded unanimously in favor of bringing this program to an end.

However, he stressed, many feared retaliation by the township if they expressed dissatisfaction with how the SID has been handled over the last 18 years.

"Retaliation would come in the form of re-living the Eminent Domain threat, township inspections which are unwarranted, and possible further increase in SID taxes," said Geron in an interview last week. "With one political party in control and patronage out of control, the fear does have a basis in reality."

Geron is attempting to arrange a meeting with members of the township committee in an attempt to rid

SID landlords of "this unwarranted, unfair tax."

"The taxes collected do not benefit the township or center and are used to pay unearned salaries, to a SID administrator who seemingly fails to account for where the money is spent," said the 79-year-old Morris Avenue property owner, adding "it's time to end this program."

On March 8 Geron sent a letter to all SID business and property owners, pointing out that the services rendered to the SID are performed by the township department of public works, not outside contracted people and center festivals come with arrests and "S.W.A.T. teams on our roofs."

"Often events profit someone, but not us or the township. Tenants are leaving while our properties have lost value and our taxes have tripled. This is a mess," Geron said in the letter.

Geron, who owns the Spartan Building located at 2009 through 2013 Morris Avenue believes an unpaid landlord committee would do a better job than SID Director Michael Minitelli has over the last 18 years.

Minitelli, who oversees how the \$158,000 in special taxes paid by center property owners will be spent, is paid \$55,000 annually, or 35 percent of the entire budget, to run special promotions and events along with ensuring the SID receives advertising for holidays. But, this is not a full-time position for the SID director.

Sixteen years ago Minitelli became the director of economic development for the township, a job that pays an additional \$68,259 in salary a year.

Most recently Minitelli was praised by Township Administrator Ron Manzella as the person who

helped work with the Morris Avenue property owner who will add two floors of apartments to a string of stores adjacent to the township municipal parking lot, municipal building and library.

That type of improvement in the SID, Manzella said, will bring additional foot traffic to the SID because people living in the apartments will shop in the center.

Since 1993 when the township decided to form a SID as part of a revitalization effort in the center, property owners had to pay a mandatory SID assessment, or additional tax. In 2010 the SID tax rate was \$1.025 for every \$100 of assessed value, compared to 2009 when the rate was set at 1.006. Since then the rate has stayed within these boundaries, going up or down very slightly.

There are 60 property owners housing 104 businesses in the center, but drawing foot traffic to this shopping area so businesses continue to thrive and prosper has been difficult. Business move in and out, with vacancies often found in stores that seemed to thrive upon opening.

In late 2010 *LocalSource* obtained SID budgets for several

years prior that showed Minitelli was spending \$77,700 annually on promotions, including \$14,000 to put up and take down holiday lighting, \$3,000 for newsletters, \$1,700 for community affiliations and events, and \$59,000 for other promotions. However, there was no detailed information about these expenditures or what promotional activities took place for the SID.

In late 2010 Minitelli could not shed any light on the lack of promotional events in the center, although he did point out that a considerable amount of money went toward holiday advertising in *The Star-Ledger*.

According to state guidelines governing SID's, an executive director of a town's SID must use their expertise to identify areas of need. It is also the executive director's role to involve business owners in this process and maintain relationships with them to ensure their needs are being met.

Several center property owners said they heard Minitelli was retiring as of September, but Manzella could not confirm that, but nor did he deny it.

"I have not received any retire-

Dead woman in Rahway lives on through mysterious tour

RAHWAY — It might be considered a fairly simple case by today's standards. A dead body, obviously a homicide victim, found on the roadside without identification.

Police would analyze DNA, dental records, finger prints, to identify the victim and hopefully the killer.

But this case is a little different. When three brothers stepped outside early one morning in March and discovered the young woman frozen to the ground with her throat slashed, the year was 1887 and even fingerprinting was yet to be adopted by police.

The case brought national attention to Rahway, but despite the best efforts of police and the local media, the identities of both killer and victim remained stranded in the realm of speculation, becoming one of Union County's most enduring mysteries.

Area residents toured the scene of the crime yet again last weekend for the 125th Anniversary Observance Tour, presented by the Merchants and Drovers Tavern Association.

Members of the association's acting company portrayed 19th-century townsfolk who commented on the grisly and baffling events.

According to local historian Al Shipley, more than 200 people turned out for the event.

The unknown woman tour was

done for the first time in 2006 and then again in 2010 when a book on the subject entitled "The Case of the Unknown Woman" was published.

Shipley said it is the mysterious nature of the story which continues to capture people's attention.

"We don't know the motive, we don't know the killer, we don't know the victim," Shipley said. "With most cases, if there's one element missing it's a great mystery. But this one has three elements missing."

After many years of research and contemplation, Shipley remains unsure how to answer when visitors ask for his own take on the mysterious incident and its nameless victim.

"I really have no answer because there's so many possibilities that all make sense," Shipley said.

Shipley said it could have been a robbery, rape or lover's quarrel gone bad.

Rahway Police Chief John Rodger, who has become familiar with the case over the course of his career, said the aftermath of such a crime would unfold much differently today, because the city is much more densely populated and many people have video cameras and cell phones.

"Today I would hope we would have more citizen participation and more potential leads," Rodger said.

Rodger said the victim may have been a recently-arrived immigrant, which would explain why no one could identify her.

"From what I've read and heard about the case, they did everything they could with the case," Rodger said. "For the police work of that day they did a pretty adequate job."

Rodger said it is understandable for unsolved murders to linger in the minds of townspeople and law enforcement, particularly when they involve someone who is clearly an innocent victim, as the unknown woman is purported to be.

"It definitely gets under your skin a little bit more," Rodger said.

Rodger said he still remembers the case of Helen Smith, an elderly woman fatally stabbed in her garage some years ago.

"Even with today's technology we haven't been able to come up with the suspect in that case," Rodger said.

Shipley said there is often talk of exhuming the unknown woman's body to use modern DNA testing to try to learn more about her identity.

Rodger said this would be a very expensive process that would not be worthwhile unless there was a credible DNA source to compare samples of the dead woman to.

Shipley said he hopes the body is not exhumed.

"Any mystery that gets solved ruins the story," Shipley said. "It really does. If they ever find out who Jack the Ripper really was, there's no story. The mystery makes it really intriguing."

One small step for Union County

Early statements from the county regarding next year's budget have had an alarming tone. And while the official budget is still not available, these early reports point the county in a different direction than residents have been accustomed to as of late. It would seem the financial crisis that everyone else has been dealing with for several years is finally hitting the \$480 million Union County budget.

What we have heard so far: Hundreds of layoffs, programs and departments being cut or defunded and deficit reductions are all to be expected. As much as 10 percent of the county's work force may find themselves out of jobs come June 1. The Rutgers Cooperative Extension is expected to be defunded. MusicFest has already been cancelled.

We have at times criticized the county for what has often appeared to be imprudent spending, and we are confident we will continue to find reasons to point our finger at the freeholder board, however, these are necessary and appropriate steps the county must take in order to pass a balanced budget.

But — and we hesitate to say it — we are not quite sure it is enough. Here at *LocalSource*, we are struggling to find a good reason for Union County government to exist as it does today. They have acted like the arbiters of wealth, deciding how taxpayer dollars should be spent, and in the case of MusicFest, with as little oversight as they can purposefully manage.

We never wish for any hard-working employees to lose their jobs, especially in this economy. But these layoffs do appear necessary, and if anyone is to blame, it is obviously the county. But perhaps not for the reason you think.

The county never should have hired 2,800 employees in the first place. While counties are large, geographically speaking, their governments should be as small as possible. And Union County, just like other counties, has grown far too big under the 14-year tenure of all Democrats.

We are happy and pleased that the county is finally realizing this, however, we are displeased with how they ultimately reached this conclusion.

Only Democrats can be blamed for leading Union County through the last 15 years or so, and it simply took a cut in state aid last year for them to see the error of their ways. Our fear is that if they could find more money, they would spend it, and worry about how their actions affect those around them only when it comes time to cut staffs

and salaries and budgets.

Moving forward, the county should be working to cut all departments, programs, employees, budgets, and general resource consumption to what it always should have been: essential services. MusicFest is nice. A mobile recycling station is nice. The Trailside Science and Nature Center is nice. But roads and public safety are necessary.

We're betting the taxpayers would rather have the cash in their wallets, than in the energy bills it takes to run and maintain an enormous fleet of employees, cars, trucks, buildings, arts centers, science facilities, non-profits, grant programs, scholarships, concerts, parks, and an overly-superficial website that surprisingly lacks necessary information. When will video of freeholder meetings be available to the public? This shouldn't be the responsibility of the Union County Watchdog Association.

Too often we can point our fingers at an instance of the county spending disclosed amounts of money in an undisclosed way on programs, as in the case of the Union County Alliance and MusicFest, that serves no necessary purpose for the taxpayers of Union County.

Layoffs and cuts are tough, but this is a good start. We hope to see another 5 percent across the board budget cut next year, and every year after, until the county is efficiently funding only the services that are deemed truly essential.

One possible solution to give the actual taxpayers authority over how their taxes are spent is to not take it from them in the first place. The county should let the individual towns and taxpayers decide what else they need to buy with their own money, not the entirely Democratic board of freeholders elected by less than 25 percent of eligible voters.

In a county with a population of 536,000, it only takes about 30,000 votes to earn 1/9 of the political power a \$480 million budget holds. This is something that should change, but never will. Less than 25 percent voter turnout, in our opinion, is an unsuccessful election. It's no reason to continue running an unsuccessful government.

If residents and politicians want actual property tax relief, we feel making county government as small and as efficient as possible is the easiest and most sensible solution. Good work getting the ball rolling, but it's simply one small step in the right direction. Here's hoping Union County takes the next giant leap.

founder and pitcher of the Linden Arians Softball Association and was elected into the Amateur Softball Association National Hall of Fame in 1983 and Linden's Hall of Fame in 2007.

"Toots" was the first woman commissioner of New Jersey Amateur Softball Association and founder of the first Women's Umpire Association.

Even more spectacular than "Toots" awards was "Toots'" lifetime pitching record 396-164 which included 109 shutouts, 30 no hitters, and more than 1,700 strikeouts.

Mildred "Millie" Deegan excelled in sports in high school and broke 43 track and field records. After graduating in 1937 she joined the Americanettes Team. One memorable night in 1939 she hit a home run 250 feet breaking a Madison Square Garden Record. Babe Ruth, who happened to be there, was impressed and posed for a picture with "Millie." The local press labeled her, "The Babe Ruth of Girls Softball."

In 1943, "Millie" joined AAGP-BZ that was subsequently featured in the movie "A League of Their Own." "Millie" reported the movie was accurate and that the girls had to go to Charm School and always wear dresses and makeup.

Millie ended her career in Linden where she and her companion coached and played for 22 years.

"Millie's" greatest moment was when she was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame.

All around woman athlete

Mildred Didrickson Zaharias, "Babe" to her millions of fans, was a multi-talented athlete who excelled in basketball, golf, and track and field. "Babe" was all American Girls Basketball champion two years in a row. In her first track and field meet "Babe" won eight events.

In 1952, The National Women's Track Championships were combined with tryouts for the team to represent the United States at the Olympic Games. Babe entered eight of the events, winning five events, and tied for first place in one event and ended up taking first place overall with thirty points.

That summer she was on the team that represented the United States in Los Angeles. "Babe" set an Olympic record with her Javelin throw of 143 feet and 4 inches. She won another gold medal by running the eighty meter hurdles in 11.7 seconds.

In 1953, "Babe" won the championship golf tournament named after her. Subsequently "Babe" had a bout with cancer but came back to win the National Women's Open Championship, her last, in 1954.

Until next year, I would like to conclude Women's History Month with a quotation from a great lady, Eleanor Roosevelt, who set an example for all presidents' wives and the rest of us women.

"Women are like tea bags, we don't know how strong we are until we are put into hot water."

"I never expected it, but I'm honored and humbled," Menza said, adding the past few years have been difficult but rewarding because he stayed the course and fought for what he believed was right.

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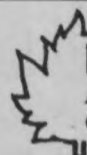

Business owner raises concerns with Union SID

ment papers for Mr. Minitelli as of yet," the township administrator said Friday.

Last week several SID property and business owners agreed to talk with *LocalSource* about the ongoing problems, but asked for anonymity because they feared retaliation from the township.

"Sure I'm upset about paying a special tax and getting nothing back for it except a few ads in a newspaper that I have to pay for," said one business owner, whose rent includes the SID tax. Asked why he felt there would be retaliation, the business owner laughed.

"That's how they keep us in line," he added.

One property owner said he would gladly stand before the township committee to voice his objections to the SID, given how little they receive for their special tax dollars, but he knows what would happen right afterward.

"They would send the fire and construction officials down to my property and make my life miserable with code and fire violations," he said, adding he could not afford

that kind of harassment.

"Besides, how do I know what else they would try to get even with me," he asked.

Geron agreed he heard similar comments, but pointed out that he has a \$20 million investment in the center and he is not about to bail out.

"We need to get rid of the SID and handle things ourselves," he added. But he did feel improvement was needed.

"There is something wrong in the center, but nothing will ever be like it was in the 1930s and 40s or even the 1960s," Geron said, adding that the buildings are old and in need of renovation or a facelift.

"Look, initially the SID did well, but it has outlived its usefulness. We need to find another way to try and revitalize the center," he said.

"Look, I've peaked property owners interest so maybe we can change things," he continued. "I hope so because something has to give. We can't pump money into this SID and continue to get nothing in return."

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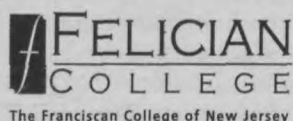
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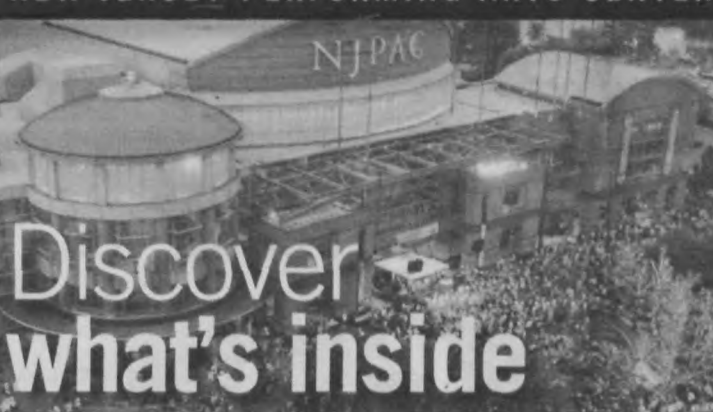


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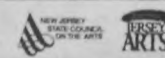

He also strongly believes the city council will never agree to combining both the public works garage and municipal garage so the public works building on Lower Road can be rented to EarthCare.

He also thinks that something is fishy when it comes to how this all unfolded.

"My theory is this sounds like the old way Linden use to do things, not the open way we have been doing things," he said.

"I don't think they have the votes on council," Sheehy added, explaining that it is impossible to move a larger building into a smaller one.

"There are ten mechanics in one building and ten in the other. If we merge the two buildings, some people will have to go," he said. He also noted that the mayor said the city would have to add on to the municipal garage and it would cost \$750,000, but he doubts it would be that little of an investment.

"The city built a tin garage and it cost a million," Sheehy said.

"This is all a rush. If you are going to do something like this, what is the rush? Do it once and do it right," the 7th Ward councilman said.

But that is not the only problem Sheehy foresees with this proposed project. He is concerned about the health, safety and welfare of every resident living in the 7th Ward.

"This building is in a flood area. It is below sea level. It should be self contained, not in an area where flood waters could take that stuff all over," he said. The councilman also has other concerns.

Specifically that the city is allowing EarthCare to "tell us how much they are going to give us to bring that medical waste plant here."

"We should be telling them what we want, not the other way around," Sheehy said. "It's not like they are buying a hot dog stand."

Besides, he added, the 7th Ward

has the same tax rate as Raritan Road, wondering why his ward needed to serve as the location.

"This whole thing is great in theory, but what if there is human error?" the councilman asked. "The sewerage has to be self-contained."

Sheehy said the EarthCare representatives also failed to make a good impression on the three hundred or more residents that came out to the meeting a few weeks ago.

"You should have heard these guys, they were like the Soprano's. They showed a video of a machine and that was it," Sheehy said.

"We have 300 buildable acres in Linden and they have to pick one across from a park," he added. "There are plenty of places they could do this down further on Lower Road. Away from families with kids and parks. Away from where something bad could happen if there is an accident."

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Officers nab suspect in string of Linden burglaries

After a six-week investigation into several burglaries, which took place in the North Wood Avenue business district, detectives have charged Anthony Alves, 28, of Linden, with two counts of receiving stolen property.

Between Feb. 4 and Feb. 14, six businesses on North Wood Avenue were burglarized, according to police, in the early morning hours, possibly by the same person, by using a cinder block to break open the rear door of the businesses. The businesses included two nail salons, a hair salon, a Chinese gourmet restaurant, a Polish delicatessen and a paralegal school.

Taken during the break-ins were several flat-screen televisions, police said. During the investigation, detectives received information that Alves had some of the stolen televisions. On Feb. 23, detectives went to Alves apartment to speak to him when he showed them a 42-inch Vizio and a 42-inch Toshiba television on different walls of his apartment.

Alves told police that he bought the televisions but could not produce any receipts nor remember in what store they were purchased, police said. Alves was later arrested for unlawful possession of a prescription drug. Two burglary victims were later able to positively identify the televisions as belonging to them, according to police, and Alves was charged on March 20.

He was served with the new charges at the Union County Jail, where he is still being held. His new bail is \$40,000. The investigation into the burglaries is continuing, and detectives are still attempting to locate additional stolen property, specifically another 42-inch Vizio and a 36-inch Vizio flat-screen television, and a digital camera with family photos of a Vietnamese family. 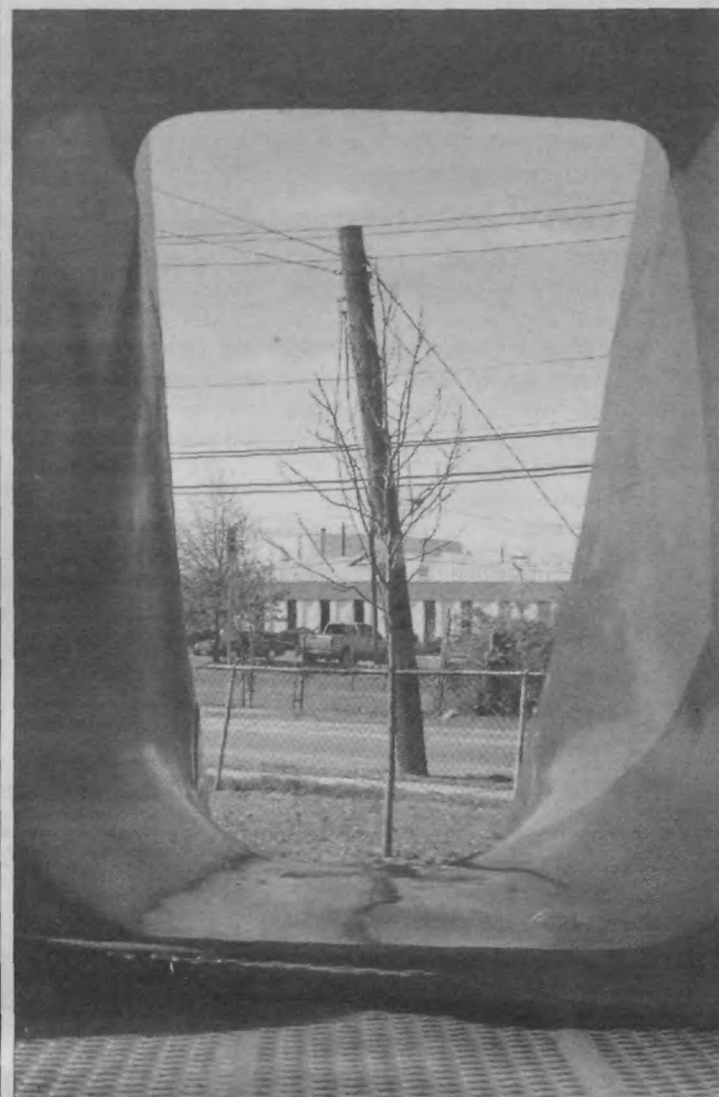

Library to close on Sundays

The Board of Trustees of the Summit Free Public Library has announced that due to budgetary restraints the library will no longer be open on Sundays, beginning April 1. The library will remain open all day on Saturday and continue to serve the public three evenings each week, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

During the last three years, the Board of Trustees has had to make cuts to the library's budget. New Jersey Library Law requires the city to provide minimum funding for the library. Prior to 2009 the City Council had exceeded that amount to provide what it termed "an appropriate level of financial support." This year, only the minimum funding figure was published in the city's budget. Because of this, the Board of Trustees has been faced with the need to cut \$81,000 from the 2012 Library budget.

Closing on Sundays for the remainder of 2012 will save \$27,000, and the remaining \$54,000 will be taken from book purchases, periodicals, operation and maintenance, computer and audio/visual budgets. This will leave little or no funds for increased maintenance, utility costs and unexpected repairs.

Other local libraries are experiencing similar budget restraints, it was reported. The Board of Trustees has tried to make responsible choices so that the public will

continue to enjoy the benefits provided by Summit Free Public Library. A 2010 national study published by the Gates Foundation reported that "millions of people see the library as an essential tool to connect them to information, knowledge and opportunities."

The Board's announcement concluded with a reaffirmation of the library's purpose. "It is our mission to continue to be viewed by the Summit public as an essential part of what a superior community has to offer in 2012."

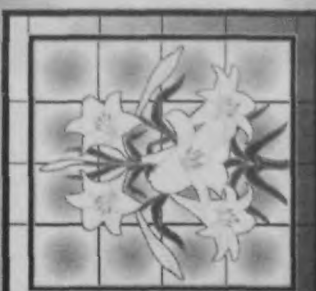

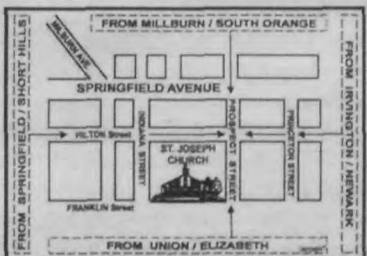

'Stay Close' to Coben's latest

The remarkable mystery writer, Harlan Coben, has done it again.

With his 22nd successful novel, "Stay Close," he not only has managed to mystify his avid followers, but he has created a story that prompts a reader to justify staying up all night anxiously anticipating the thrilling goings-on.

God forbid, one might miss a page of his gems, a paragraph, a line — a word — a Coben reader would probably have to start all over again, from page one. And there aren't enough hours in the night to make that attempt.

Coben has the capacity to defy the intelligence of the mystery book fan by dissecting every idea so that one is unable to discover the real killer. When the antics of the real killer were ultimately disclosed by the author, this bewildered reviewer merely sighed, "Oh, Harlan! Not really."

But that's what comes of being a number one *New York Times* best selling author, who hails from Newark and Livingston, and whose family once owned a travel agency in Union. He can turn his readers inside out with the possibilities that he tosses to them and still entertain them royally.

In fact, he appeared at Words Bookstore in Maplewood on March 22 to talk to his readers and autograph his latest book, "Stay Close."

In this mystery murder book, which, for a change, is set in Atlantic City, Coben unravels the story of a woman, Megan Pierce,

who becomes restless in her "perfect" life — a loving husband, Dave, with a fine job; two intelligent children, all the comforts of home, including a white picket fence, and the possibility of a job in real estate.

However, she resides in the shadows of her past — it appears that 17 years ago, she answered to the name of Cassie, a night club employee, whose speciality was lap-dancing. She and a photographer, Ray Levine, had been deeply in love. But following a murder, in which Ray was involved, Cassie disappeared, eventually marrying and living the comfortable life of a contented housewife. Ray never got over her, and in his horrible despair, nearly drank himself to death. Now, in his 40s, he was able to take on photo jobs of weddings, anniversaries, bar mitzvahs, and such.

A secret phone call from a bartending friend, Lorraine, who has fresh knowledge of that murder 17 years ago, brings Megan back into her "Cassie" world.

In the meantime, there are others who become involved in the situation — Detective Broome, Broome's close friend, Sarah,

whose husband, Stewart Green, was missing for 17 years, and more recently, Carlton Flynn, on the same day, 17 years later; Cassie's good friend, a lawyer named Harry Sutton, Deputy Chief Samuel Goldberg, Fester, Ray's caring employer; Federal Agent Guy Angiuoni, and two others, a hired-for-murder couple, Ken and Barbie. Now, the police are discovering that a dozen or more men had been murdered through the years — on the same date, on Mardi Gras. But where are they buried; if at all.

There's an intriguing chapter on Cassie's and Ray's reunion; in fact, everything in "Stay Close" is intriguing, especially the characters.

Unfortunately, Coben's favorite character, Myron Bolitar, who has appeared in many of the author's novels, has no place in "Stay Close." But it appears that Coben cannot neglect all of his popular characters, so in the last chapters of this book, he brings forth his famed lawyer, Hester Crimstein. Hello, Hester.

This book, which was internationally published by Dutton, the Penguin Group, is in the process of becoming a motion picture. Oscar nominee Lawrence Kasdan, has teamed with Harlan Coben, to write a screenplay together.

In the meantime, this appealing mystery novel seems to know its way to find a place just to "stay close" among the many Harlan Coben books on the shelf of this reviewer's bookcase.

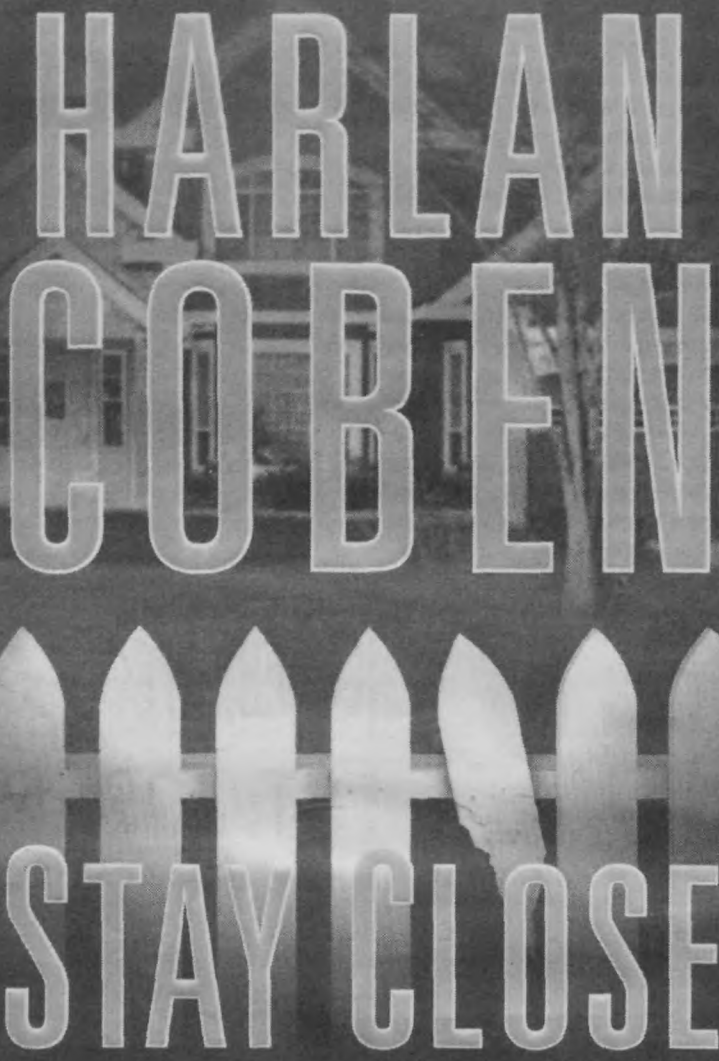

Soften garden stone with South African ice plants

One of the most fashionable structures in any up-to-the-minute landscape is the low, dry-laid stone wall. These walls, which can be remarkably sturdy, are descendants of the stone fences that have marked property boundaries for centuries.

Now, some people use them to make terraced beds on gentle slopes. Others install them to create raised beds or set off a particular part of the garden. The walls can be made of real stone or cast-concrete pavers. I prefer the real thing.

The previous owner of my house had a couple of low walls installed in the back garden. One tamed a slope, creating the upper and lower garden spaces, and the other encloses a raised bed next to the garage. The walls are handsome on their own, but I have always felt they needed some kind of softening.

gardener of the mid-20th century, used to soften walls by planting all kinds of small, flowering specimens in the crevices between stones. I haven't done that, though some plants, like bleeding heart and common violets, have sown themselves in those spaces. As long as the opportunists don't look awkward, I leave them alone.

However, I have long wanted to do something a little more deliberate, by installing plant varieties that would cascade artistically over the sides of the walls.

Being an easily distracted gar-

dener, I thought about the idea for a long time without actually doing anything. Finally last spring my daughter took care of the matter for me by planting a hardy ice plant, or delosperma, in the front of the raised bed.

She had seen similar flowers adorning walls in Greece, and when she spotted a potted ice plant in a local nursery, she snapped it up. Our plant may not have the blue Aegean behind it like the one in my daughter's pictures, but seeing it does not require a large financial commitment, a passport and a long plane ride.

Once installed, the ice plant — with bright purple, daisy-like flowers — flourished and began cascading over the side of the wall. As winter came on, the foliage, which looks like fleshy green needles, turned purple — an unexpected bonus. Now the plant is clearly readying itself for another season,

having grown substantially since being planted. I am on the hunt for more of the same, since I have many linear feet of wall to soften.

Delosperma is a member of the large Aizoaceae family, sometimes known as "carpetweed." The common name is an apt descriptor for many of the low, mat-forming genera in the clan.

Delosperma, like many Aizoaceae, hails from South Africa. The most popular species, like our *Delosperma cooperi*, are from mountainous areas and thrive in thin, well-drained soil. Planting delosperma in a raised bed not only gives it a chance to soften the garden wall, but provides the drainage the plant loves. Clay soil should probably be amended with grit or sand to make it happy.

Such a cheerful, easy-to-please plant was bound to capture the attention of hybridizers eventually. *Delosperma* has become one of the

darlings of Japanese plant breeders. They have produced showy bi-colored varieties like the pink and white Eye Candy, orange and white Perfect Orange; and the yellow and white Rise and Shine. For lovers of white flowers, there is also White Pearl.

Fire Spinner, a flashy new species, is currently being sold. This South African mountain plant features flowers with a white eye zone and orange petals that turn rose or magenta as the bloom ages. With orange at the height of fashion, now may be the optimal time to indulge in a few Fire Spinners.

Panayoti Kelaidis, senior curator of the Denver Botanic Gardens, has done much work collecting and selecting delosperma varieties. Among the cultivars introduced by the Denver institution is the lovely Mesa Verde, which has salmon-colored flowers that bloom repeatedly throughout the summer.

After successful completion of the lesson and a safety questionnaire, participants are qualified to purchase a Union County Archery Range ID card that permits them to use Union County's Archery Range. The range is open daily, dawn to dusk.

Anyone who has already completed an accredited archery safety course can call 908-527-4900 or 908-654-9805 for information about purchasing a Union County Archery Range ID Card.

The fee for the ID card is \$20 for adult Union County residents and \$10 for youths and seniors. The Union County fee also applies to residents of Edison. The ID card fee for all other out-of-county residents is \$30 for adults and \$15 for youths and seniors.

Archery safety class space is limited, so reservations are required. 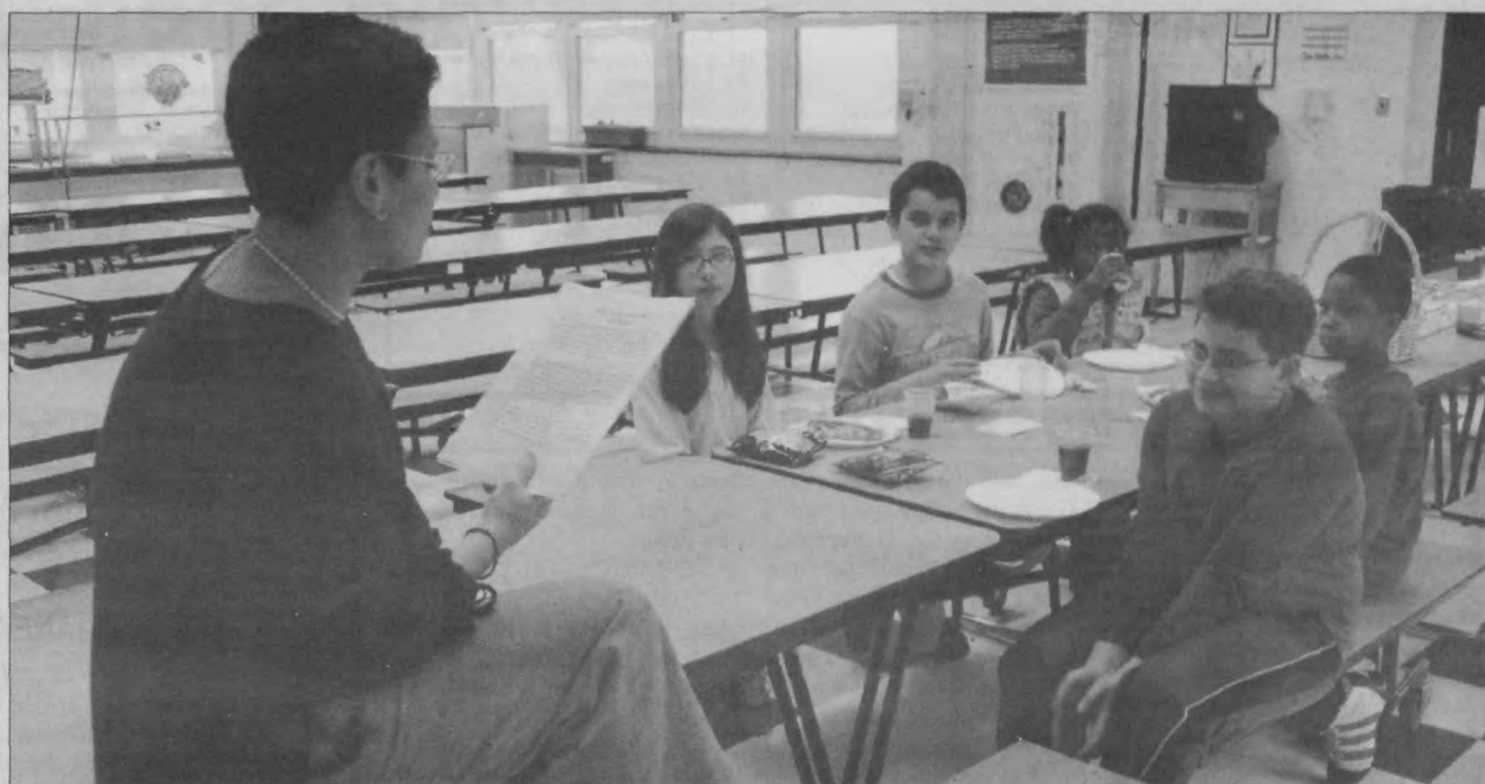

Most delosperma form mats that can increase in size dramatically. Our *Delosperma cooperi* was about 6 inches across when it came to us. After a year, it is already almost 18 inches wide. Some varieties can spread up to 3 feet and, if they are near a wall, start a down-

ward trek over the side.

Indulging in ice plants can net gardeners beautiful, low-maintenance ground covers, wall softeners, or rock-garden subjects. They are also suitable for xeriscape or dry gardens. Small species, like *Delosperma spaldanthoides* or tufted ice plant, are also useful for

containers or troughs.

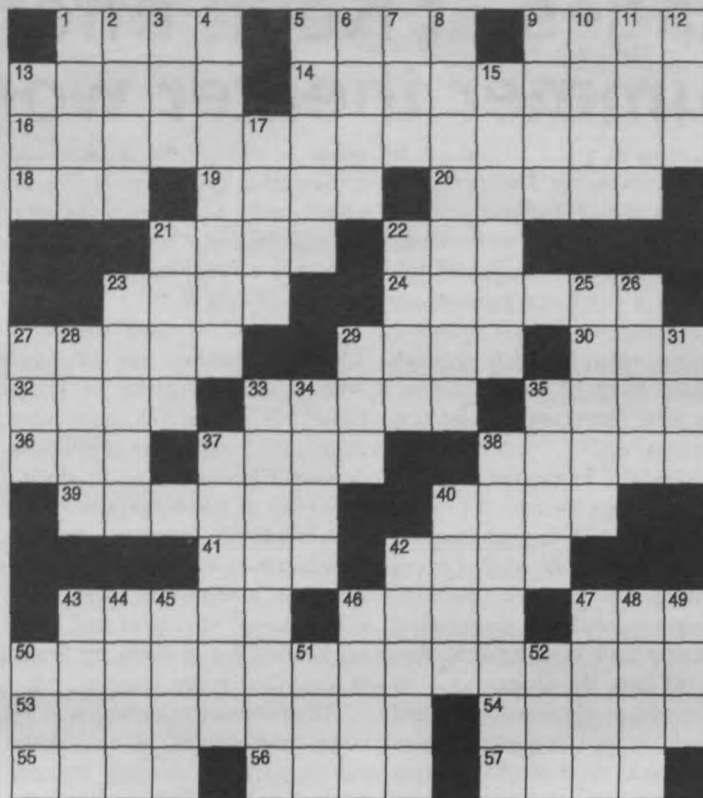

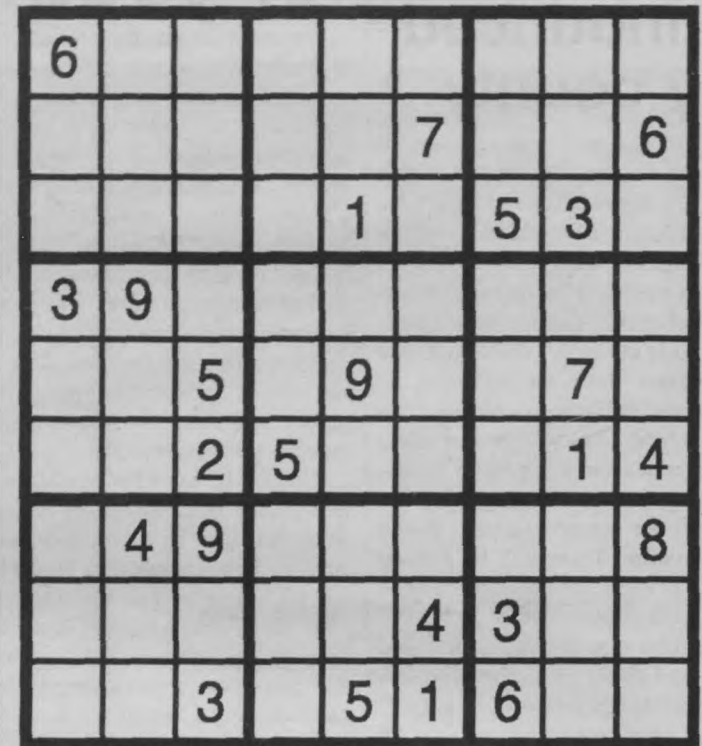

Top girls' hoop players include 5 stellar seniors

Polimeni, Miller, Martino, Lies, Wheeler honored

Another highly-competitive Union County girls' basketball season included no less than six teams that won at least 20 games, which doesn't happen very often.

Four other squads posted winning records, with one of them — New Providence — once again finding a way to reach a sectional championship game.

Summit also reached a sectional final and won 23 games both for the second time in three years.

When the dust cleared, the two best teams battled for the county championship, with Governor Livingston defeating Cranford to capture its very first crown. The Highlanders also managed to win their first division title since the 1980s en route to finishing as the county's No. 1 team.

The only Union County Conference squad to finish undefeated in its division was Hillside, with the Comets capturing the Valley Division championship with a perfect 14-0 mark.

Hillside took advantage of Dayton's offer to switch divisions after the Comets — situated in the Mountain Division a year ago — finished 2-17 overall and 1-11 in the Mountain.

Watchung Division teams that won at least 20 games included repeat champion Roselle Catholic (20-7) and Summit (23-6). Summit won the UCC's first Watchung Division title in 2010.

Mountain Division teams that won at least 20 games were first-time champion GL (26-2), Cranford (24-5) and Dayton (20-8).

Other teams that finished with winning records were Linden (16-9) from the Watchung Division; New Providence (16-11) and Oak Knoll (15-12) from the Mountain Division and Kent Place (13-8) from the Valley Division.

Linden defeated a 7-0 Somerville team in overtime on the road and also beat Summit, Cranford and Roselle Catholic at home. Linden was the last Union County team to lose at home when it fell to Watchung Division rival Union 57-50 on Feb. 7.

New Providence won at Summit in the Dec. 29 Hilltopper Tournament final and later reached the North 2, Group 1 championship game for the third straight season.

Oak Knoll managed to sweep New Providence in Mountain Division play, defeated Dayton at home, bested Linden on the road in overtime and also won a state tournament game under first-year head coach John Bertollo, who was new to Union County and also new to coaching girls' basketball after coaching boys' in Passaic County.

Kent Place finished second in the Valley Division at 11-2 (the Dragons did not host St. Patrick) with its only losses coming to Hillside. Last year, Kent Place shared the Valley Division title with Dayton.

Here's a look at the players who excelled and performed the best under pressure in leading the above teams to victory:

JR'S FIRST TEAM ALL-UNION COUNTY

14-Alyssa Polimeni, Gov. Livingston, senior: As GL's season and Polimeni's high school career were coming to a close in a state tournament game vs. visiting Point Pleasant Boro, Polimeni kept on playing.

It didn't matter that the Highlanders were down by more than 20, the standout point guard gave 100 percent right until the final whistle. That was a great lesson for younger girls' players who aspire to succeed on the varsity level some day.

A four-year varsity starter, Polimeni finished with 1,115 career points.

Hanratty named the 15th head FB coach at R. Park

Guided GL to 6 straight playoff seasons

Terry Hanratty, who played on state championship teams at Elizabeth and is the only coach to guide Governor Livingston to six straight playoff seasons including the program's second sectional title game, was officially named Roselle Park's 15th head football coach at the March 20 Board of Education meeting.

"I wanted to stay in Union County in this area," said Hanratty, 39, who was not retained for a ninth season at Governor Livingston. "I applied for a few positions, with this one being the one I really wanted."

Hanratty, a health and physical education teacher at GL who will turn 40 on May 2, succeeds James Foy, a 1990 Roselle Park graduate, who was the head coach since 2006. Foy's record during his six-season tenure was 17-43, including Roselle Park's last winning season of 6-4 in 2006, his first year at the helm.

Foy was an assistant coach at Roselle Park under the coach he played for, John Wagner, before he became a head coach for the first time. Foy had resigned from his coaching position this time last year only to quickly decide to come back for one more year to aid Roselle Park while it was selecting its new athletic director.

Wagner was in that position - Vice Principal of Athletics - since he stepped down from coaching. Wagner then left Roselle Park at the end of last year's academic calendar to become the head football coach at Point Pleasant Beach for 2011.

Wagner passed Herm Shaw, who the Roselle Park football field is named after, in wins his final season at Roselle Park in 2005 to become the winningest football coach in Roselle Park history. His 150-92-2 (.620) record at Roselle Park includes 11-0 North 2, Group 1 state championship teams in 1992 and 1993.

The Panthers qualified for the playoffs nine times, won nine Mountain Valley Conference division championships and, at one point, had 14 straight winning seasons during Wagner's tenure.

Wagner guided Point Pleasant Beach to an 8-3 record and the Central Jersey, Group 1 semifinals last fall. PPB was 3-17 combined the two seasons before and had not had a winning season since 1997 and had not made the playoffs since 2001.

Roselle Park has also not qualified for the playoffs since 2001. Wagner and Foy were the only two head coaches for the past 31 seasons - Wagner 25 from 1981-2005 and Foy six from 2006-2011.

"I know John Wagner and James Foy were the only coaches they've had the last 30 years," Hanratty said. "Coach Foy and I practiced together in 7-on-7s and I have a lot of respect for him."

Hanratty's eight-season record at GL was 41-43 (.488) and included six playoff seasons, four winning campaigns, three sectional semifinal appearances and one sectional final.

"I'm excited to be at Roselle Park," said Hanratty, who resides in Elizabeth, just one block from Roselle Park. "I grew up close by in Elizabeth.

"This town has good tradition. Kids I grew up with still live there. I lived there for two years.

"Of all the jobs I applied for this was the best fit." Hanratty was to meet with first-year Roselle Park Athletic Director Pete Lubrecht last week and was then to begin assembling his coaching staff, finalize scrimmages and begin to get together with returning players.

"I like to have kids that want to compete and don't mind at all kids that play more than one sport," Hanratty said.

Hanratty is in his eighth year as the junior varsity baseball coach at GL and just completed his third season as the freshman girls' basketball coach at the Berkeley Heights school.

"I think that kids who play more than one sport have a better chance at succeeding during crunch time, when the pressure is on," Hanratty said.

One assistant coach Hanratty will seek to bring with him to Roselle Park is Roselle Park resident Greg Dunkerton.

"Greg coached with me all eight years at GL and did an outstanding job with our linemen," Hanratty said. "He was a big reason why we reached the semifinals three times. He's such a high-quality coach."

Roselle Park made strides last year, finishing 3-7 after winning only three games combined during the 2008, 2009 and 2010 seasons.

The Panthers will have one of the top returning seniors in the area next fall in running back-line-backer Juan Carmona.

"They were very close in a lot of games last year," Hanratty said.

Roselle Park lost at home to Brearley 3-0 and held its own in a 20-3 home loss to New Providence, which finished 9-2. The Panthers have not beaten either rival since the 2001 season.

"I hope to continue the progress that went on last year," Hanratty said. "I'm going to come in there and do the best job I possibly can."

GL was 4-6 in Joe Hubert's final season as the head coach in 2003 before Hanratty took over. The only two times GL reached the state playoffs before Hanratty became the head coach were in 1989 when the Highlanders reached the North 2, Group 1 final and in 2002 when they lost in the North 2, Group 2 quarterfinals.

Hanratty led GL to four of its five playoff wins - 4-6 playoff record - and six of its eight playoff seasons.

The 1990 Elizabeth graduate can also tell Roselle Park players what its like to win a state championship as a player. He played on Elizabeth's 1988 and 1989 North 2, Group 4 state championship teams during his junior and senior seasons.

The 1988 team went 10-1, losing only at Irvington 8-0 in the regular season, while the 1989 team was 11-0 and finished No. 1 in the state at season's end. Elizabeth has captured North 2, Group 4 seven times during the playoff era, with only the 1989 team doing so undefeated. Elizabeth defeated Morris Knolls - on the road 13-12 in 1988 and at home 25-0 in 1989 - in those two sectional finals.

"My first year at GL was exciting and new and you learn as you go," Hanratty said. "Now I've been around a little bit, but I'm still young enough to throw the ball around with the guys.

"Coaching at GL was a great experience. I coached excellent talent there and built great relationships with the people there."

One of Hanratty's top players the last few years was senior Anthony Manganiello, who will be representing GL in this June's 34th annual North-South All-Star Classic at Kean University.

"He was one of the best coaches I ever had," Manganiello said at Sunday's North-South Media Day at Piscataway High School. "It wasn't only about winning. He was a great guy and went out of his way to make sure nobody got in any trouble.

"He was a great leader. I will come back and visit him wherever he is coaching next."

Hanratty's goals remain the same.

"I would like to make the playoffs, try to win a conference championship and strive for a state championship," Hanratty said.

Roselle Park finished 1-4 in the Mid-State 39 Conference's Union (East C) Division last year, beating Bound Brook for its lone division triumph.

"I always set goals that are very high," Hanratty said.

Gross nets 1,001 for solid career

Chris Gross made an immediate impact at Roselle Catholic once he was eligible last season. He played 20 games last year, starting everyone, with Roselle Catholic winning 18 of them.

His value was proven right from the start.

The 6-6 swingman produced a fine varsity basketball career, finishing with 1,001 career points.

Gross reached the coveted milestone in his last game, which was Roselle Catholic's 58-43 loss at Trenton Catholic March 1 in the Non-Public, South B quarterfinals. Roselle Catholic finished 17-9, with Gross starting all 26 games.

The only field goal Gross managed against Trenton Catholic - he finished with two points - was good enough to get him just past 1,000.

Gross played his first two years at Cranford, helping lead the Cougars to the 2010 Union County Conference-Mountain Division championship his sophomore season.

"I believe Chris had just over half his total for us," Roselle Catholic head coach Dave Boff said. "He directly went into our starting lineup last year."

Roselle Catholic was 15-0 with Gross in the lineup a year ago before it fell to top-seeded and eventual four-peat champion St. Patrick 63-50 in a UCT semifinal at Rahway.

With 4:35 remaining, RC was as close as 54-45 against the top-ranked team in the country.

Gross helped lead the Lions to three more wins before RC fell at St. Peter's Prep 68-37 in the Non-Public, North A semifinals. Gross paced the Lions offensively with 11 points.

Roselle Catholic finished 22-8 last year, with its 20th win a 42-34 home triumph over Governor Livingston that clinched the UCC's Mountain Division championship.

Gross scored 14 points in his first Roselle Catholic game, which was a 78-38 conference-crossover victory at Brearley.

"We went 35-11 with Chris in our lineup, which is pretty solid," Boff said. "Chris was a glue guy. He was a great guy in terms of asking someone to do a bunch of different things."

"He could post, guard in the post, guard in the perimeter and make perimeter shots for us. He shot over 40 percent from three-point range." Gross also had a knack for knowing where the play was going to be.

"Chris was a great passer and he had one of the best basketball IQs of anyone on our team," Boff said. "He was usually in the right place in the right time offensively and defensively."

"If he wasn't playing well, he was willing to admit it and try to do things to get better. He was a real pleasure to coach."

As far as playing at the next level, Boff said that Gross is involved with a bunch of Division 2 schools and a ton of Division 3s.

"He wants to find the absolute best place for him right now," Boff said.

Cherry put team ahead of his individual success

Earns prestigious RC Chakey Award

After putting team success ahead of individual accomplishment during a successful scholastic basketball career at Roselle Catholic, Wesley Cherry fittingly received an individual award about being a team player.

Cherry received the prestigious Ed Chakey Award at Roselle Catholic's annual Winter Athletics Convocation earlier this month.

The award, named in honor of Roselle Catholic's first basketball coach, is given to a senior basketball player who best exemplifies the qualities that marked the life of Edward Chakey, an administrator, teacher and coach at RC from 1959 to 1991.

"In my opinion Wes Cherry is everything the Chakey Award is supposed to be about," said Roselle Catholic boys' basketball coach Dave Boff, who's continued the tradition of presenting the Chakey Award that former RC coach Pat Hagan started in 1996.

"Wes is a great kid, great student and great basketball player," said Boff, who concluded his fifth season at the helm of the Lions. "He has been tremendously unselfish during his time in our program and always been a teammate that the other boys could count on."

In 2012, Cherry helped the Lions reach the Union County Tournament championship game for the first time since 1963, falling to eventual Tournament of Champions finalist Plainfield.

Cherry will continue his academic and athletic career at East Stroudsburg University on an athletic scholarship.

Coach Chakey's son, Jim Chakey, a member of the Bayonne High School Hall of Fame, continued the tradition of presenting the award. Hagan and Boff joined Chakey when Cherry was announced as the 2012 recipient.

"Wes seemed to enjoy his role as a defender, being the kid that was expected to shut down the other team's best player," said Hagan, who retired from the sideline following the 2007 campaign after 27 seasons at the helm.

"Back in the day (Mr. Chakey's players) seemed to relish and enjoy that role."

"I thought he was the best choice for the award."

Cherry's siblings, Tiana and David, were also successful student-athletes at Roselle Catholic.

Tiana Cherry, who owns the school record in the high jump, was a senior starter and co-captain of the Lions' basketball team that won the school's first UCT title in basketball in 2003.

David Cherry graduated from RC in 2005 as MVP of the boys' basketball team before starring on the hardwood at Rutgers-Newark, where he scored 1,176 points, seventh most in program history when he concluded his career three years ago.

"I think the most important thing to Wes was going out and trying to win games and playing as hard as he possibly could to do that," Hagan said. "Maybe it's because of his siblings or because his parents have been around RC for a long time, but Wes kind of represents a little bit of old school to me and his game reflects that, too."

Hagan's son, Tim, is a former Chakey Award winner. Tim Hagan, a Boston College graduate, is a first-year teacher at his alma mater and an assistant coach in the RC boys' basketball program.

Another RC tradition continued with the presentation of most valuable player awards at the end of the convocation.

Trophies for MVP were presented to: Marcia Senatus for basketball, Jameel Warney for basketball, Nick Campanelli for bowling, Elizabeth Salmi for cheerleading, Melissa Sporer for track and Kevin Drastura for track.

Warney, Roselle Catholic's all-time leading scorer, and fellow senior Chris Gross were recognized and presented with trophies for becoming members of the Lions' 1,000-point club. Gross reached the milestone in the state tournament against Trenton Catholic in Roselle Catholic's final game of the season.

Warney reached and passed 1,000 points last season and finished with 1,698 after netting 410 this year. He began the season with 1,288.

RC honor roll students from the winter athletics season were also recognized at the convocation with scholar-athlete medals for their accomplishment. Dr. Robert Stickles, Roselle Catholic's principal and an alumnus, helped present the scholar-athlete awards.

Senior basketball player Edlyne Darius sang the national anthem to help start the program, following a prayer from campus minister Maureen Hagan.

She poured in 378 this season for a team-leading 13.5 average.

Polimeni also dished out 177 assists for a 6.3 average and finished near 500 for her career. In addition this year, she grabbed 133 total rebounds and came up with 89 steals for averages of 4.75 and 3.2 in those categories.

"In her four-year career Alyssa missed only two games and three practices - all during her sophomore year when she fractured her foot before the last game of the year vs. Spotswood," GL fifth-year head coach Andy Silvagni said. "She never complained about anything."

3-Morgan Miller, Cranford, senior: In 29 games Miller put up 182 three-point attempts. Opposing coaches winced after she made 76 of them to give the Cougars three more points at the time.

Miller was as lethal a long-range outside shooter as there was in Union County, making 42 percent from three-point range. One of those 3s was the first half court shot she ever made in a game, which came at the first quarter buzzer of her team's 49-44 Mountain Division win at 17-0 GL.

Miller - who was equally effective bringing the ball up at the point as she was moving outside as a shooting guard - was more than just an outside shooter, though. She was just as electric when driving to the basket for two, or grabbing a defensive rebound that would start Cranford's high-powered transition game.

Miller averaged 15.10 points, scoring 438 to give her 1,081 for her career, which included three varsity seasons as a starter. She also had 157 rebounds this year for a 5.41 average, a team-leading 107 assists for a 3.69 average and 92 steals and 35 blocks for averages of 3.17 and 1.21. Miller shot 49 percent from two-point range (77-for-157) and made 85 percent (56-for-66) of her free throws.

"Morgan's been a leader since she started on our team," Cranford fifth-year head coach Jackie Dyer said. "I remember when Morgan was in 7th grade and she came to open gyms and played with the high school girls."

"She lives, breathes and dies for basketball. She's going to be missed."

Miller scored a game-high 25 points in Cranford's division win at GL and finished her career with a team-high 10 points in Cranford's 34-32 setback at West Morris in

the North 2, Group 3 semifinals.

11-Kate Martino, Summit, senior: This four-year starter was as consistent a player - Martino scored 405 points last year and 405 again this year - as there was in the county.

Despite her lack of height, there was nothing she couldn't do on the basketball court and do well. Her heart and ability and desire to succeed can not be measured.

Martino finished with 1,210 career points, which is third-best in program history. This year she was Summit's second-leading scorer behind fellow senior guard Kelly Osmulski after she was the leading scorer last year and Osmulski second.

Martino averaged 14 points this year, dished out 152 assists for a 5.2 average, grabbed 116 rebounds for an even average of four a game, and finished second all-time in career assists with 416.

"Kate makes decisions on the floor that people think about and they go, 'maybe,' and she's already made that pass," seventh-year Summit head coach Brian Erickson said. "She gives you the ball on the button, when you want it and where you want it."

Martino scored 179 points her freshman year and 221 as a sophomore.

Many of her assists her first two years were the result of baskets scored by 2010 graduate Emily Cristaldi, who is second on Summit's all-time scoring list with 1,220 points, just 10 more than Martino finished with.

"She makes passes nobody else will make," Erickson said. "Her No. 1 thing is her decision-making skills, but she also defends as good if not better than anybody in this county."

"That's why I think she's one of the best pure point guards. She doesn't care if she scores as you can see by her assists."

15-Anna Lies, Dayton, senior: The third of three Bulldog players to reach 1,000 career points this season - doing so by hitting a 3-pointer early in the second quarter of her team's UCT quarterfinal win over Union Catholic in one of the two gyms at Johnson - it was Lies who set the tone from the point.

"Anna made our offense run," Dayton 15th-year head coach Dave Rennie said. "She was able to break down defenses and pull up when she needed to. She pushed the tempo too and was great on the fast break. Anna was also a tremendous passer in the open court."

Lies scored 289 points for a 10.3 average

and finished with 1,068 for her career. The four-year starter also averaged 5.4 assists, 4.0 rebounds and 3.0 steals this season.

Fellow senior teammates that also reached and passed 1,000 points this year included Emily MacDonnell first and Jen Kuczynski second.

"Anna also assisted on over 1,000 points," Rennie said. "She led the team in steals and anticipated well. One of the reasons we averaged over 50 points this year was Anna's leadership at the point."

Her free two throws at the very end were the difference in Dayton edging Linden 57-56 in overtime in a UCT quarterfinal at Roselle Catholic, with the Bulldogs reaching the semifinals for the second straight season.

Lies just committed to playing on the Division 3 level at Marymount University in Arlington, Va.

3-Shannon Wheeler, Linden, senior: When Wheeler was the best player on the court, Linden was going to come away the winner. A perfect example of that was Linden's come-from-behind 39-31 home win over Roselle Catholic when the visiting Lions were 11-0 at the time in Watchung Division play.

"We played hard as a team and really brought our intensity," said Wheeler that afternoon after she scored 10 of her game-high 18 points in a game-changing third quarter that saw the Tigers outscore Roselle Catholic 16-2 after they trailed 16-12 at intermission.

Wheeler scored 460 points for an 18.4 average and finished with just over 1,500 for her career.

Wheeler reached 1,000 points on Feb. 25, 2011 in a 68-67 home loss to St. Anthony before last year's state playoffs.

"She's a scorer," said second-year head coach Paul Gorski. "She will be a big gain for whomever she plays for next and a tremendous loss for us."

Wheeler, who Gorski said has drawn interest from a couple of Division 2 schools, also averaged 5.75 assists and 4.0 rebounds this year.

"Shannon was a hard worker who got the other kids motivated," Gorski said. "She realized how important the team was."

COACH OF THE YEAR

Sjocquelyn Winstead, Hillside: The Comets went 2-17 last year, including a 1-11 record in the Union County Confer-

ence's Mountain Division.

They took advantage of dropping down to the Valley Division this year by becoming the only basketball team in Union County - including both boys' and girls' - to win a division title undefeated. Hillside went a perfect 14-0 to capture the Valley Division championship and was also one of six girls' teams in Union County to win at least 20 games, finishing 20-6.

Hillside won a division title for the first time since the Comets captured the Mountain Valley Conference's Sky Division championship in 2004, which was when third-year head coach Sjocquelyn Winstead was a player her junior year.

The Comets were sparked by a freshmen class that included Afeni Richardson off the bench, starter Yasmine Robinson-Bacote and other reserves Tia-Monique Cole and Chioma Emeana. "We've been able to bring in a group of freshmen and retain them," said Winstead, who as a junior in 2004 was part of a 19-6 Hillside team that reached the North 2, Group 2 championship game.

"They're the future of our program." They are also the present, with Robinson-Bacote receiving rave reviews from more than one opposing coach. "There was a lot of development of their skills during the summer season," Winstead said. "We have players that can play all positions and girls' that can play basketball."

The point guard was senior Khadijah Callahan, the 2-guard junior Rah'Shanai Cole and forwards included juniors Jasmine Lombard and Jovania Pierre.

"Our three goals were to finish over .500, qualify for the states and get a comfortable seed and win our conference," Winstead said. Hillside accomplished all three.

TEAM OF THE YEAR

Governor Livingston: The Highlanders won their first 17 games before falling at home to Cranford 49-44 in a game that they outscored the Cougars in three of the four quarters. GL then won nine straight before it was defeated at home by eventual champion Point Pleasant Boro 74-57 in the Central Jersey, Group 2 semifinals. PPB was the only team GL played that it did not defeat. A program-best 26-2 record included the Union Conference's Mountain Division title and the program's first UCT championship.

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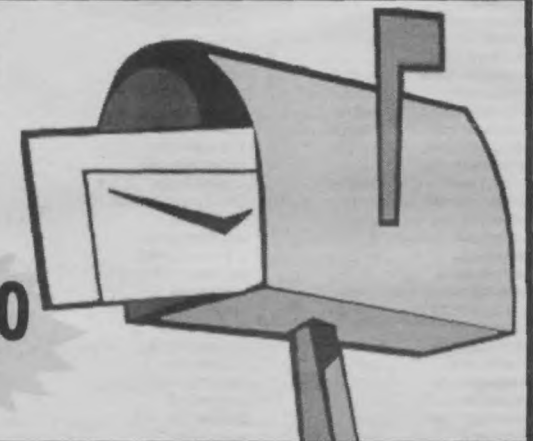

A. No alcoholic beverages shall be sold, served, delivered or consumed, nor shall any license permit the sale, service, delivery or consumption of any alcoholic beverage, directly or indirectly, upon the licensed premises between the following hours:

C. ORDINANCE 1197-2012

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 1005(b), 1008(c)(1), 1009(c)(1), 1010(c)(1) AND 1013 (a) AND (d) OF THE LAND USE ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF MOUNTAINSIDE

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Mountainside, County of Union, and State of New Jersey have determined that there is a need to exercise more control over changes made to existing construction and new construction in the residential zoning districts of the Borough, and to expand the permitted uses in the L-1 Limited Industrial zoning district of the Borough;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council as follows:

Section 1005(b) of the Borough Code be and the same is hereby deleted and that there be substituted the following new Section 1005(b):

(b) Alteration, Extension Or Enlargement Of Nonconforming Uses, Structures And Lots. Nonconforming uses, structures and lots in all zoning districts shall conform to the following requirements:

(1) Any structure, lot or use of land which is nonconforming shall not be enlarged or extended in any manner whatsoever.
 (2) There shall be no structural alter-

ations or enlargement made to any nonconforming building or structure which enlarges or extends the building or structure.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT Subsection 1008. (c) (1) of the Borough Code be and the same is hereby deleted and that there be substituted the following new Section 1008(c) (1):

(1) Height. No building shall exceed a maximum of two and one half (2 1/2) stories or thirty (30) feet in height, whichever is the lesser.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT Subsection 1009. (c) (1) of the Borough Code be and the same is hereby deleted and that there be substituted the following new Section 1009. (c) (1):

(1) Height. No building shall exceed a maximum of two and one half (2 1/2) stories or thirty (30) feet in height, whichever is the lesser.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT Subsection 1010. (c) (1) of the Borough Code be and the same is hereby deleted and that there be substituted the following new Section 1010. (c) (1):

(1) Height. No building shall exceed a maximum of two and one half (2 1/2) stories or thirty (30) feet in height, whichever is the lesser.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT Subsection 1013 (a) of the Borough Code be and the same is hereby deleted and that there be substituted the following new Section 1013 (a):

(a) Primary Intended Uses. The uses in this zoning district are business, professional, executive or administrative office purposes, scientific or research laboratories, warehousing and limited industrial and manufacturing uses, the nature of such industrial and manufacturing uses being dependent upon their compliance to performance standards of Section 1010 (d), commercial uses of a strictly wholesale sales and services nature and private membership, non-profit and/or recreational facilities open to the general public which provide indoor facilities for swimming, tennis, racketball, handball, baseball, soccer, lacrosse, exercise imposed by the performance standards set forth in Section 1013 (d).

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final adoption and publication and in the manner provided by law.

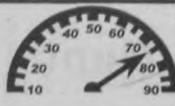

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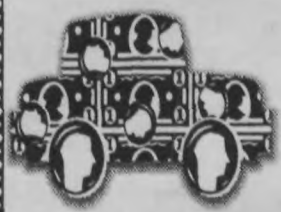

Trinitas named one of best places to work in NJ

Trinitas Regional Medical Center, a major 549-bed teaching hospital which provides healthcare to those who reside or work in Central and Northern New Jersey, has again been named one of the Best Places to Work in New Jersey by NJBIZ.

This survey and award program identifies, recognizes and honors the top places of employment in New Jersey that benefit the state's economy, its workforce and businesses.

Trinitas is a previous winner of this distinction and achieved placement on this list in 2006, 2007 and 2008 in the large-sized company category.

The Best Places to Work in New Jersey program is made up of 100 companies split into two groups: 52 small/medium-sized companies (15-249 employees) and 48 large-sized companies (more than 250 employees).

Companies from across the state entered the two-part process to determine the 100 Best Places to

Work in New Jersey. The first part consisted of evaluating each nominated company's workplace policies, practices, philosophy, systems and demographics. This phase was worth approximately 25 percent of the total evaluation. The second part consisted of an employee survey to measure the employee experience. This phase was worth approximately 75 percent of the total evaluation. The combined scores determined the top companies and the final ranking.

The overall registration and survey process was managed by Best Companies Group. BCG also analyzed the data provided and used their expertise to determine the final rankings.

The award program, created in 2005, is produced by NJBIZ. NJBIZ, program sponsors and partners will honor this year's 100 Best Places to Work and announce their ranking during an awards dinner and ceremony on April 25 at the Hilton East Brunswick.

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
