## Board submits 'last stand' report



Board of trustees hands over report to Middles States Commission

With its monitoring report now in the hands of the agency that will determine whether Kean University is worthy of keeping the accreditation it held since 1960, university officials await a critical visit next week that could play heavily into the decision making process

Since the state university was placed on probation July 2 by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education, Kean officials have stressed they were working diligently to address the multiple standard violations that put the school's accreditation in jeopardy.

Kean was put on probation by the commission because there was evidence the uni-

At meeting: 'Where is the acknowledgement of personal responsibility for this situation?'

Although most board meetings during the past year have begun in front of a large, raucous audience that jammed Kean Hall and spilled into the hallways and courtyard beyond, the Aug. 30 meeting was attended by a sparse crowd devoid of students or parents.
Nevertheless, members of the administration, faculty and unions approaching the microphone expressed vastly different views of what lay ahead as the university battles the Middle States Commission on Higher Education.

While some showed strong support for the monitoring report being submitted to Middles States, others issued stinging, often vivid, descriptions of how leadership under Farahi is a slippery slope for the university.

Among those stepping to the podium was Interim President of the Council of New Jersey State College Locals, American Federation of Teachers, William Sullivan, who, using his past service in the United States Navy, warned the board of the consequences of not addressing what has caused the problems at Kean.

As a former sailor, please allow me to use a nautical analogy. Kean University has run aground and is in danger of sinking. When a Navy ship runs aground, a Naval Board of Inquiry is called, the cause of the incident is determined and the offending parties punished. If it is the commanding officer, he or she is relieved of command," Sullivan said, adding that See COMMENTS, Page 12



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# Chemical leak imperils school in Hillside <br> Board of Education President George

HILLSIDE - Just weeks after the discovery of hazardous chemicals below Walter O. Krumbiegel Middle School, officials have declared the building safe for students.

While school is opening as planned this week, months of remediation efforts remain ahead in order to remove the contaminants from the site.

Testing by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection uncovered low levels of the chemicals TCE and PCE, underneath the building itself as well as under nearby houses and commercial structures. These chemicals are commonly used in dry cleaning.

The source of the contamination remains unclear.

According to information posted on the Board of Education website, it is presumed that children and adults who spent time in the middle school were exposed to PCE. However, how much each person breathed in depends on how much time they spent at the school. It is unknown how much PCE was in the air before testing was done.

Based on the current indoor air data collected at the school, the Department of


Chemicals from an unknown source have found their way under Walter 0 . Krumbiegel Middle School in Hillside. Classes have not been canceled and officials say the danger is very minimal at best. Remediation is underway and will take at least two months to complete.

Health would not expect adverse health effects to occur at these levels.

Health Officer Warren Hehl said these substances can be deadly in extremely high concentrations. However, he described the chemical presence as "miniscule but
above the reaction level."
"It's my understanding that based on the levels, there is minimal-to-no risk to the occupants of the school," Hehl said.

Walter O. Krumbiegel Middle School serves students in grades six through eight.

## Aspiring curator's dreams crushed at last moment, but he remains ever optimistic

UNION - Last spring when Marc Mazauskas heard he was accepted to the London Metropolitan University masters program, he thought it was almost too good to be true. Unfortunately, it was.

Just weeks before he was supposed to pack up, bid farewell to his family and friends and take off for two exciting years in the United Kingdom, this 22 -year-old township resident was left wondering how his dream of becoming a fine arts museum curator could end so abruptly.

But it did and if Mazauskas had not been on the internet perusing the British Broadcasting Corporation website for news about London, he might never have discovered LMU's license allowing them to sponsor student visas had been suspended and in jeopardy of being revoked.

For Mazauskas, a 2007 Union High School graduate, studying abroad was more than an opportunity of a lifetime, it was an opportunity to expand on the degree he received in fine arts from Montclair State University.
"I don't remember a time I wasn't extremely interested in museums and art," he said, explaining that even in high school he immersed himself in any art course he could. But, it was his late father, who died the year he was a senior in high school, who was his inspiration.
"Even though he worked in a factory, he was always painting and encouraging me to do art," the township resident explained, his eyes glazing slightly as he recalled his father keeping him stocked with supplies. "It was his passion and it became mine at a very early age."

Although Mazauskas took a detour slightly by exploring an interest in the culinary arts, it was not long before he came back to what he loved and pursued that dream in college. So strong was his belief that he was on the right educational track, this college student pursued a degree only in fine arts and no minor.

In fact, he never missed an opportunity to expand his art education, even if it meant taking on an unpaid internship.

In his final year of college, Mazauskas took on an "archival" internship at a non-profit art gallery in Chinatown in New York See ONCE, Page 16

Cooke said Health Department officials took great care in ensuring the safety of the building, which houses just under 600 students.
"As of right now, they are sure everything is safe," said Cooke, whose own daughter attends the school.

The problem first came to the attention of school officials on Aug. 15 or 16 when the state notified them of a possible problem. Test results confirmed these suspicions about a week later, and an emergency meeting of the Board of Education was held last week to discuss the situation. State officials were present to answer questions.

Hillside PTA member Cherrena E. Rawls was among those at the emergency meeting.
"I think they have it under control," Rawls said. "My daughter goes there and I'm very concerned about her safety."

Rawls said she has not noticed any panic or fear on the part of her fellow parents.

Cooke said school officials were surprised at the low turnout at the emergency meeting, with only "five or six" parents present.

> Union teacher charged with sexual assault of girl, 14

UNION - A local middle school teacher was arrested last week and charged with sex crimes against a 14 -year-old girl, according to information released by the Union County Prosecutor's Office.

Robert Gervasi, 48, of Bloomfield, was arrested Aug. 30 in a residential area in Union as he attempted to meet with the victim. Gervasi is a teacher at Kawameeh Middle School and owner of the Ablaze Softball/Baseball Academy in Parsippany.

Gervasi was charged with two counts of first degree aggravated sexual assault, two counts of second degree sexual assault, one count of second degree luring, one count of second degree endangering the welfare of a minor, one count of third degree criminal sexual contact, and one count of fourth degree criminal sexual contact.

Bail was set at $\$ 400,000$ by Judge Robert Mega. The criminal acts that occurred in Morris and Hudson counties will be prosecuted in Union County, said Romankow.

If convicted on all counts, Gervasi could face more of sixty years in prison.
"This kind of foul behavior will not be tolerated," said Union County Prosecutor See UNION, Page 10

## New chamber located in Roselle Park focuses on helping veterans

 Staff Writer ROSELLE PARK - Veterans with aspirations in the field of business now have a special resource to help them - the Veteran's Chamber of Commerce, a new, statewide organization headquartered in Roselle Park.The Veterans' Chamber of Commerce was started over the summer as a result of collaboration between businessman Jim Brody and veteran Kevin Murphy. Their project has already received certification from the state and has begun to amass members.
"What we're trying to do now is get it off the ground in terms of bringing in members," said Brody, a Summit resident. "We are starting in an area that we know, which is the Union County area."
The chamber is headquartered in a suite in the James A. Brown Agency building, located at 429 Chestnut St. This organization is not associated with the existing New Jersey Chamber of Commerce, but is an organization of its own, with a focus on veteranowned businesses. Its stated goals are to connect veterans and their family members with public- and private-sector opportunities in employment and career development, as well as to inform veterans of programs currently available to them, and open new sales and networking markets to business partners.

In addition to the business component,
this chamber will seek to give aid and direc tion to veterans with social service and financial needs.
"If they need help in any way, shape or form, we want to be the place they can come to," Brody said.

The genesis of the project dates back more than a year. Brody and Murphy originally discussed establishing a traditional vet-erans-help organization. Eventually they decided to combine their respective fields of expertise to create this unique organization Brody has a range of business and managerial experience, and ran the Township of Union's Chamber of Commerce from 1999 through 2009. Murphy joined the U.S. Air Force in 1970 and later served in Air National Guard and Army National Guard.

A Roselle Park resident, Murphy is chief operations officer of the chamber, while Brody, a Summit resident, is chief executive officer. Both see a need for an organization that supports veterans, and cite the recent retreat of U.S. forces from Iraq and the ongoing war in Afghanistan.

Murphy, who is disabled and regularly visits the VA, where he has met veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan, said he is interested in helping veterans, even during peacetime.
"I know what disabled vets go through," he said. "I see firsthand what happens to these vets."

Jim D'Arcy, commander of the Cranford VFW, said he is not yet familiar with Brody and Murphy's project, but is intrigued by it.
"I think anything that is useful in helping veterans get jobs or promote their businesses in this day and age is great," he said. "If it can truly help veterans then I'm in their court for sure."

D'Arcy, a Vietnam veteran, remembers a time when returning veterans received very little support to help them pursue new careers.
"The only support I truly got was the VA bill, to go to college. But it. was not a lot of money back then," he said.

Murphy said he faced a similar experi-
ence, and is relieved there are more opportunities and funding available now, saying "Even though it's still tough, there has been more openness and acceptance toward vets."

Murphy and Brody have high hopes for their new organization.
"We think this thing is going to take off," Brody said. "We hope in a few years this statewide organization could become a model for a nationwide organization. You've got to start small, you can't start big."

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# Who is the executive county superintendent?

Though students have never heard his name, few teachers have seen his face, and newspapers are denied interviews with him, he is what the state calls their response to the demand for more government accountability. His name is Joe Passiment and he is the Executive County Superintendent of Schools.
"Bottom up or top down, all roads pass through his office," said State Department of Education Spokesman Richard Vespucci.

This week Union County LocalSource delves into the duties and responsibilities of Union County's highest-placed- and most elusive- education official.

Communications Director for the New Jersey Department of Education Barbara Morgan denied requests for a telephone interview with Passiment.

While executive county superintendents have no direct authority over policy in local school districts, their duties include reviewing and approving of budgets, administrative contracts, transportation contracts, homeless student determinations, and other responsibilities as related to helping ensure that school districts are following laws and regulations.

Passiment was appointed to one threeyear term in 2009, and another term that began this year. He earns an annual salary of $\$ 98,123$.

The position was previously filled by Carmen Centuolo. Vespucci said he does not know the circumstances surrounding the decision not to re-appoint Centuolo, who made $\$ 120,000$.

Passiment, like many other executive county superintendents, serves two counties - Union and Monmouth. This jurisdiction is separated by Middlesex County.

According to state officials, Passiment works out of the Ralph Froehlich Building on North Avenue in Westfield, where he makes use of Union County staff and office space. However, staff there said Passiment spends the majority of his time in Monmouth County, coming into the office "only once every two weeks."

Monmouth County, located on the other side of Middlesex County, is 472 square miles - more than four times the size of Union's 103 square miles. Their populations are roughly comparable, with Monmouth at 630,380 and Union at 536,499.

District Superintendents see Passiment a minimum of once a month at roundtable

meetings held in New Providence, where he tells them about new state initiatives, takes feedback and answers questions.

Springfield District Superintendent Michael Davino said Passiment is useful because confusion and problems can arise due to different interpretations. and explanations about state policy and practices. In such situations local schools often refer their questions about state policy to the county superintendent, he said.

Summit District Superintendent Nathan Parker said he is in regular contact with Passiment and has found him "helpful and conscientious."
"We work very closely with him," Parker said. "He's been very supportive and helpful of our efforts. He answers technical questions and offers advice."

While the position of County Superintendent has existed for many decades, a series of laws passed in 2007 increased the position's power and changed the title to Executive County Superintendent.

These laws redefined the position to increase oversight and responsibilities
that the county superintendents have over local school districts, particularly with regard to oversight of the school budgets.

Vespucci said budget reviews were more cursory in the past, but now involve more scrutiny.
"Now the county super might be asking questions about specific line items and districts might be asked to document or justify or at least provide greater detail before a budget goes to the voters," Vespucci said. "A district can't put a local budget on the ballot without the county superintendents approval."

Vespucci said the laws strengthening the position of ECS share the common theme of making government more accountable and streamlined, and were passed by the state legislature in response to an outcry from voters about rising property taxes.

Local superintendents described mixed results with regard to these specific goals. Davino said he does not interact with Passiment as often as he did with Centuolo as a result of his expanded responsibili-
ties in Monmouth County.
Union School Superintendent Patrick Martin said his district is not being held more accountable under Passiment than it was under Centuolo. He described both superintendents as conscientious and professional and said neither ever struck down a Union budget.

Martin said he has the same degree of contact with Passiment as with Centuolo.
"If you call him with a problem, he'll call you right back," Martin said.
Martin said the position Passiment fills may be undergoing further changes soon. Martin said he understands the state has new organizational plans for county oversight of the schools.
"He did a fine job. But my understanding is there is a transition ongoing," Martin said. "That's really all I know. I'm waiting for an announcement myself."

The DOE communications department did not respond to inquiries regarding potential changes to the position of ECS.

"We expected more people to show up; to be honest. I'm kind of disappointed in the lack of parents showing up," Cooke said. "I've gotten more calls from residents than parents of students."

Cooke said the major concerns expressed by parents involved the safety of the school's drinking water and the impact of the remediation on students and curriculum.

Cooke said the school draws its drinking water from a separate source that is safe from the PCE. Remediation will be done on weekends and evenings to minimize the impact on education.
"Most of the work will be done when the students aren't there, whenever possible," Cooke said.

Short term remediation efforts are presently being taken to ensure the building is safe to open to students. These include sealing two crawlspaces with a heavy vinyl material to keep vapors from leaking. Cracks in the basement floor have also been sealed. Portable air filters are
being used in areas with higher levels of contamination

The longer-term remediation is more complicated, involving drilling holes in the floors to install a system of tubes that will route the harmful vapors over the school and out into the atmosphere. This is similar to a radon elimination system and is expected to take at least two months.

Cooke said the state will pay the cost of the remediation, both for the school and any homeowners impacted by the contamination. Cooke said typically the DEP determines the source of the contamination and charges whatever company or entity is responsible. However, since the source has yet to be determined, the DEP is shouldering the cost itself.

Hehl said the chemicals could have flowed under the school from another location. The DEP plans to do testing in the surrounding area that may determine the source of the contamination.

## Union teacher charged with sex assault of young girl, 14

(Continued from Page 3) Theodore Romankow. "Rather than being a responsible adult this teacher robbed a young girl of her innocence. He will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law."

According to authorities, the relationship began earlier this summer, with criminal sexual acts occurring in parks in Union and later at Gervasi's academy in Parsippany and a condominium in Hoboken.

Romankow said the illicit relationship came to the attention of the authorities a
few days prior to the arrest.
"We were alerted by a concerned third party," Romankow said.

A joint investigation by the Union Police Department and the Union County Prosecutor's Office is still ongoing.
"It is still an active investigation for sure," Romankow said.

Gervasi is the second teacher to be arrested for inappropriate contact with a minor in less than a year. In November 2011, a computer science teacher at Connecticut Farms

Elementary School was also arrested.
David Eidel, 38, of Toms River, was charged with one count of second-degree endangering the welfare of a child and one count of second-degree sexual assault.

District Superintendent Patrick Martin could not be reached for comment.

versity was not in compliance with four of the 14 standards required to maintain accreditation. Those standards included 6 , relating to integrity, 7 , institutional assessment, 12 general education and 14, assessment of student learning.

Adding to the university's problems, prior to the monitoring report being due to the accrediting agency, the commission sent a letter to Kean University president Dawood Farahi questioning issues involving standards $4,10,13$ and 5. These standards specifically have to do with board of trustee policies involving the hiring of the university president, policies regarding faculty and staff and evidence the university is in compliance with the commissions policy on "Political Intervention in Education."

Whether Middle States is questioning "political inter-
vention" because of a letter sent to the accrediting agency in March by Democratic Sen. Ray Lesniak, Republican Sen. Tom Kean and Republican Assemblyman Jon Bramnik praising and supporting Farahi's leadership is unknown. However, in the letter, which LocalSource was able to obtain, Lesniak was touted as being a "champion for the university for decades," in addition to playing a key role in obtaining seed funding from the state to develop a multimillion dollar science, technology and math center at Kean.

However, previously, the Kean Federation of Teachers union also pointed out in missives to Middle States that Lesniak has used his political power to obtain key "no show" positions at the university for his sister, as well as highly paid jobs for others politically connected to him.

Although Sen. Kean refused to respond when LocalSource questioned him in the spring about issues involving

March, which was prior to this, makes it clear this legislative representative is a supporter of the university president.

Also, language used by Middle States on its own website updating Kean's accreditation status June 28 and July 19 hinted that standards 4 and 5 , which have to do with institutional governance and management, as well as "equitable and consistent treatment of faculty," could be in question.

Despite this, Farahi assured those attending an emergency meeting held Aug. 30 by the Kean Board of Trustees that he was confident the monitoring report submitted Sept. 1 would result in Kean's accreditation being restored.
"We are fully prepared for Middle States' visit," he said, referring to the two day on-site visit the commission will be Continued on next Page

much like a naval board, "this board must take action."
"This institution must have competent leadership who can right the ship before it sinks. This body has the responsibility to make that happen," he said, suggesting "the faculty and university senate votes of no confidence in the university's commanding officer reflect an atmosphere of despair on campus."

Sullivan pointed out that when Kean was put on probation by Middle States, university officials immediately reacted defensively.
"Rather than look inward and access what went wrong, the leadership of this institution attacked Middle States. Where is the acknowledgement of personal responsibility for this situation? Where is the leadership at this institution?" Sullivan questioned.

And when adjunct Professor and President of the Local 6024 Adjunct Federation of Teachers stepped to the microphone, she left little unsaid about the situation this university is facing and who bears responsibility in the end.

Citing the lack of governance, last minute "fill-in hiring," poor management of class assignments, cancellation of contracts, dropped courses, substandard working conditions, low morale and "an overall lack of respect and support by many," Henderson also used an analogy to hopefully stir the board into removing Farahi as president.
"Kean's faculty and staff are tired. Tired of putting out fires started by a most charming and deceptively skillful pyromaniac," said the professor who has spent decades at Kean, admitting she has survived and outlasted some of the best leadership at the university with no tenure, benefits or job security.
"Every time we put out a fire, another is started and then there is another," she

added. "Middle States will see through all the coaching and mock Middle States Commission on Higher Learning visiting team sessions we are prepping for with Kean's paid consulting firms."

Finally, Henderson made an impassioned plea to the board, asking "what are we proving?"
"Please, we cannot fail and lose accreditation because of the poor, well intentioned but misguided leadership of one person and those he has surrounded himself with. You must, like good leaders, sacrifice the one for the welfare of many and the future of Kean," said the adjunct professor.

Other speakers, such as Jeffrey Toney, Kean Vice President of Academics, explained the work that went into preparation of the monitoring report for Middle States, mentioning that 250 campus staff members participated in this process.

Patrick Eppolito, a bi-lingual professor who worked on the monitoring report, pointed out that open communication enabled many people to work together for a goal.
"This was a massive effort to respond to Middle States," he told the board, adding that "it's my hope and wish that we can set aside our differences."
"We need a commitment from everyone to meet Middle States' standards so we can keep accreditation," Eppolito added.

However, others, such as John Harri-
son, a member of the Kean Faculty Senate that recently gave a vote of no confidence to Farahi, was not so sure working together would solve the problems facing Kean. But he did say the faculty was acting "to preserve the integrity of our institution."

Charlie Kelly, who has been a professor at Kean for 40 years and also is the vice president of the Kean Federation of Teachers, was concerned about what would happen when the fall semester began.
"I have some anxiety about when I go to class on Tuesday because I know I'll get some questions about accreditation, especially from the graduate students," Kelly said, adding "when you are put on probation, your house is on fire."
Kelly also questioned whether input they were asked to provide in regard to Standard 6 , integrity, was even being considered by the board.
"We don't know if you are using it or not," the tenured professor added, noting they received little feedback in regard to this issue. Kelly also did not believe the monitoring report sent to Middle States would "win the day."

If Middle States finds Kean has not made the changes required, they could begin the process to remove the university's accreditation. However, this would not occur immediately, according to a source at the commission.

Instead, based on the information in the monitoring report and visit next week, Middles States will make a determination

in November whether the university remains on probation or needs to "show cause" why they should not lose accreditation.

Middles States would then render a decision in March, one way or another on the matter.

If Kean loses accreditation, though, it would not be effective until June, according to Middles States sources.

Only after that point would Kean have to arrange for students to transfer their credits to another university in order for them to obtain student loans or enable credits earned prior to the loss of accreditation transferred for advanced degrees.

'Meetings with administrators are frustrating experiences marked by explicit disregard for faculty perspectives and expertise, demonstrating contempt for faculty and their ideas,' the respondent said, adding that Dr. Farahi always tells faculty 'you are paid to do a job, so be glad you have one and stop whining.'

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## A memory we all share

The 11th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001,
errorist attacks is on Tuesday. Ceremonies, terrorist attacks is on Tuesday. Ceremonies,
both public and priviate, will be held nationwide to mark that morning 11 years ago when the four planes crashed into the twin towers, the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., and an empty field outside Shanksville, Pa. But nowhere will the ceremonies be so personal as here, in Union County and neighboring counties, where so many of the victims lived.
We remember the victims, and the day they didn't come home. We remember hearing the news of the first plane crash. The date Sept. 11 stares at us from the calendar, and we cannot let it pass without notice.
Last year we asked many of our neighbors about their recollections of that day, which we included in a special supplement. Below, we have pieced together a chronology of Sept. 11, 2001, using either excerpts from the words our neighbors spoke, or the impressions they expressed to us. Each speaker relates a small portion of the much larger story that we all share in common.
"I was listening to Howard Stern on the radio and I thought he was doing a skit about a plane hitting the World Trade Center. I remember thinking that he had gone too far this time and that was it, I wasn't going to listen to him anymore,"

A Bronx native, she was concerned about her son, Shalon, who lived and worked in New York.
"I was in shock. It was unbelievable,"
-Michelle Cunningham, Rahway

A traveller with experience in some dangerous countries, she didn't panic but was transfixed by the magnitude of the event.
"As soon as I got home, I put on the TV and just was riveted on what was taking place. You know, even though I have been in very dangerous countries where I knew it wasn't safe, when they said a plane went into Tower One and then the second plane hit Tower Two, it was surreal,"
-Janet Pallente, Clark
She worked in New York City and said there was uncertainty about where the terrorists may strike next.
"They evacuated my building because it was across the street from an immigration building and at first we thought maybe they were targetting government buildings,"

Her husband, a local firefighter, had to travel to New York City to help with the response effort.
"He had to go over to Staten Island to fill in for firefighters who had to go to ground zero. I wanted to get my kids out of school because I was so scared."

She and her co-workers at the Union County Jail flocked to the nearest television when word of the attacks reached them.
"Everyone ran to the conference room. We were not sure what was going on until we saw those buildings coming down. People started to cry. We knew we were not secure."

## A very memorable convention collection

By today's close of the National Democratic Convention in Charlotte, Ellen Stein from Linden and June Fischer from Scotch Plains will have collected a new round of political memorabilia. They have a good deal of experience.
For Stein, her string of consecutive convention visits began in 1980. Fisher, a retiring New Jersey National Committeewoman, began attending earlier in 1972.

More than the posters, stickers etc., the memories of their adventures is a far greater stash. When asked about any convention, it's a good bet they can tell you a great story. Whether it's their service as a delegate or manning a VIP room, they are the political fuel that help to make the events move forward.

Fisher, sitting in the New Jersey delegation during the 1996 convention in Chicago, became the unwilling bumper for a slew of cameraman angling for a shot of former Mayor Richard Daley Sr. heading the Illinois delegation seated behind the Garden-Staters. After the head bumps and pushing by the cameramen, New Jersey delegates found a contrite Daley who personally apologized.
Stein recalls her experience at the 1992 New York Convention, where her duties included escorting Rev. Jesse Jackson after his speech to the VIP seating area. To her chagrin, previous empty seats reserved for Jackson were suddenly begin utilized by Kennedy children. As Stein began con-

sidering the most diplomatic resolve of the problem, she was given an assist by a former president. Enter Jimmy Carter, who asked Stein if Jackson would like to sit with him and his wife Roslan. A happy Stein recalled that the next day the lead picture in some national newspapers was of an attentive Carter and Jackson following the events.

Sometimes the solutions aren't so happy. Fisher recalls being seated between former Governor Brendan Byrne and former Congressman the late James Howard as a heated discussion grew into a nasty confrontation.
"I sat mortified during the battle. I didn't have the nerve to tell Congressman Howard that he was standing on my toes."

Stein recalled being seated in an empty skybox in Chicago during the 1996 convention.
"Sitting with some friends we were wined and dined. I never did find out who was the host picking up the tab," she said.

A convention visit can even bring a historic meeting.
"I like to get into the convention hall early to get an isle seat," Fisher recalled. In walks Sen. Joe Biden, a long time friend of Fisher's.
"He gives me a hug and announces to the hall, if I had 10 more like June I would have been President."

Four years later, Fisher would have the honor of introducing Biden as the morning speaker before the New Jersey Delegation.

Stein admits she has the official convention poster from every event she has attended. Fisher, less shy, says she seeks "anything she can buy or that is given to her at the events."

Fisher, who had the distinction of serving as a National Committee Woman for 28 years and 32 as a State Committee Member, is retiring from party elective office this year. She predicts a Democratic win but says the Democratic lead is "somewhat shaky and we have some sniffles." Fisher says her main concern is the National GOP fundraising edge she sees developing.

Both of the convention goers have an amazing lineage. On their lifelong acquaintances, Fisher has watched her friend Mike McCurry go from Princeton University political operative, to Presidential Press Secretary, to successful business person.

Next week Stein will go back to her state consulting job. She is one of the most knowledgeable in the state on defense funding issues.

Beyond the glitz, reminiscences and actually some hard work by these two Union County people, they get the satisfaction of watching history in person, and comparing it with the perspective of past events. That's a very impressive collection.

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## The Birchwood Battle is just beginning

The Aug. 23, LocalSource editorial compared Cranford's efforts opposing the Hekemian Group's development of Birchwood Avenue to the futility of resisting the assault on the Alamo. Resistance may be as futile in August 2012 as it seemed in March 1836 , but we hope not.

Cranford may take hope from another battle that took place in Texas six weeks later, the Battle of San Jacinto. Texans again outnumbered, this time prevailed under the leadership of Sam Houston, and the victory led directly to Texas independence.

Cranford's most critical battle will come at the Department of Environmental Protection. This builder's remedy pits the environment against affordable housing. Hekemian's application requires multiple DEP permits for the following: flood hazard area; road elevation of one to two feet; wetlands delineation and disturbance; stream encroachment; protected species great blue heron has made his home on the property; and brownfield remediation. Does this site sound suitable for the proposed development?

Because winning the battle at the Department of Environmental Protection is critical to stopping this overdevelopment, a group of residents, Concerned Citizens of Cranford LLC, have retained Bob Podvey, an environmental attorney with 47 years of experience. Bob Podvey is a trial attorney who is certified by the Supreme Court and is founding partner of the law firm Podvey Meanor located in Newark. If Cranford is to prevail at the DEP, consistent legal representation is needed. Cranford has had four law firms involved in this matter. Please review some of the arguments from the recent hearing at our website, www.cccranford.com.

Is this matter really about affordable housing? It is no secret that politicians from both parties tried to rezone all of Birchwood Avenue - 55 acres - from commercial to residential in the 2007 timeframe. The effort failed during the process of rewriting the township's master plan. The only way around the commercial zoning was a builder's remedy lawsuit.

Cranford is the poster child for everything that is wrong with the Council on Affordable Housing. Instead of gutting COAH as Gov. Chris Christie promised, it appears that COAH is gutting the town. Shortly after Tropical Storm Irene, Cranford was flooded with politicians ready for a photo-op; we have heard little from them since regarding the need for reform and the inappropriateness of development in such a sensitive and environmentally challenged area.

Raising a road one to two feet in a flood hazard area has potentially serious implications, and efforts to force Cranford to approve such a change are outrageous. We

hope that the DEP will use some plain old fashioned common sense and deny the applications.

Fair minded individuals must wonder at Elizabeth McKenzie's - court appointed special master - impartiality regarding affordable housing calculations. At the time of Judge Chrystal's decision Cranford had a surplus of 108 affordable housing units. That sum excluded a 99 -unit vacant land adjustment derived from supposedly vacant land in Cranford, which included GSP median, lawn area at the municipal building, and parcels in nearby Roselle Park. Though McKenzie stated that Cranford is entitled to a reduction based on vacant land adjustment, she directed that it be taken after this development is built. Because Cranford had fulfilled rounds one and two of its COAH obligation, McKenzie then decided to move the goal post requiring Cranford to meet an unknown round three obligation. In her home town of Princeton she called round three requirements "a result of some bad data, some old data and a not very well designed methodology," but in her mind COAH's bad data and methodology work just fine for Cranford.

The LocalSource asked if the legal bills are worth it. Consider the township's costs associated with building the 360 apartments. The Board of Education study states that a new school will be required. There will be costs associated with sewer infrastructure, approximately another \$1 million in road improvements and a traffic light. Conservatively speaking, this totals about a $\$ 45$ million price tag to taxpayers for 54 affordable housing units. The math s frightening, and the cost is punitive.

When asked where the water from the development would go, Mr. Dipple, the engineer for the developer, responded "in Casino Brook to the Rahway River." When asked where the water from the road would go Dipple again responded the same way. Cranford cannot afford to put any more water in the river without further jeopardizing current residents' safety.

Cranford residents cannot put their fate in the hands of either political party. We need separate representation. 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## Once an educational goal now simply a vacation abroad

(Continued from Page 3) City, spending three months rifling through hundreds of boxes of art museum treasures.
"Three times a week I took the PATH train into the city and spent from 10 in the morning to 6 at night sorting everything they had stored in the basement," he said, mentioning it took three months to catalog everything by the time he was done, but that was faster than anyone expected this difficult task could be accomplished.

While there, this township resident also helped the curator, which only fueled his desire to explore a career in this area himself.

But that wasn't the only side job Mazauskas took on while at Montclair University. He also worked for three years at the Starbucks at the Kenilworth A\&P, where he was a barista
"It was a way to make extra money that could be used to further my education," he explained, adding that when the opportunity came up to study abroad, he could not believe his luck. But that excitement did not last long.

It all began back in February when Mazauskas's Montclair University professor and mentor Jonathan Greene mentioned LMU offered a great masters program for graduates looking to further their education abroad.
"Since they have a master's degree program that focused on curating contemporary art but also the amazing opportunity of an internship with one of the most prestigious art gallery's in London, the Whitechapel Gallery," he said, adding "I could not believe my luck because this gallery holds openings for a lot of contemporary artists."

So Mazauskas immediately applied to LMU, a university with 30,000 students and approximately 2,600 "foreign" students. Of course, this township resident
still was concerned he might not meet all the standards required or be able to cut through the red tape involved but he did and then some.

Within days of hearing he was accepted to LMU, Mazauskas began the task of applying to this university for the school loans he would need to pay for his continuing education. But again the process was easy.
"I couldn't believe everything fell into place so easily," he said.

In the meantime, Mazauskas's mentor, Greene, also the owner of the Hunterdon Museum in Clinton, thought his protege might benefit from some time interning for him. So Mazauskas began making the trek to Clinton when he had time and soon found he was learning how to set up museum displays, research artists and even put together exhibitions.
"I really like contemporary art so this was a great opportunity for me to explore this area even further," he said, adding he prefers museum work to galleries because exhibitions last three to six months in a museum while art gallery showings last only a matter of weeks.

Time flew as this eager student absorbed everything he could about the field he loved and before long Mazauskas realized it drawing close to the time he would be leaving for his two year sojourn to London.

It wasn't long before friends, family and even customers at Starbucks all knew Sept. 17 was the day he would be jetting off to begin the next chapter of his life.
"I guess I never thought anything could go wrong," he said, recalling the fateful evening in July he read the article informing him the Border Agency overseeing international visas for students had suspended LMU's license to teach and recruit students from other countries.
"I guess initially I thought it would be straightened out by the time I had to leave
but things just went from bad to worse very quickly," Mazauskas said.

Within a day or two the British Broadcasting Corporation along with others were reporting that LMU had been stripped of its ability to sponsor any visas to foreign students and it was even possible that 2,600 students studying there would be deported unless they found other universities to sponsor them.

According to news reports and information released by LMU, the London university lost it's highly trusted status because a survey by the border patrol found "significant problems" with the qualifications of many of its foreign students.

Some of the problems included students who obtained visas to study at LMU, but there was no poof many of those surveyed were even attending the university.

The British government, which recently began to crack down on immigration, pointed to student visas as a category ripe for abuse by those who instead of attending the university, were looking to work.

Mazauskas said students already at LMU will have 60 days to find new sponsors once they are formally notified by the government.
"I never heard a word from the universi-
ty but my mom emailed them and they sug gested we research other universities and transfer my application," Mazauskas said, noting that "at this point I just don't know what will happen."

Mazauskas is well aware there is no hope at this point he will be getting his masters degree from LMU. And, because so many students at the university on visas have just 60 days to find other sponsorship or be deported, he feels it is unlikely he will find an opening at this late date. However, all is not lost, according to this optimistic, future contemporary art curator who always has a smile.

Mazauskas said he and his mother, Michelle, and her fiancee are heading to London on Sept. 17 despite how things fell apart.
"We had the tickets and they were planning on going for a week anyway, so we figured we might as well use that time for a vacation," he said, admitting when things go wrong, you might as well make the best of it.
"You never know, anything can happen," Mazauskas said, confessing that while the outcome was very disappointing for him, he just has to believe everything will work out for the best in the end.

## Nothing simple about love story in 'Past Reflections'

There are no simple love stories in novels. There must be some sadness, some tragedy, some unforeseen incident or incidents to enliven the interest of the reader.

Certainly, Sandra Bonaldi of Nutley understands what a reader really wants from a romantic novel. As a result, she has provided the ingredients necessary to enhance her characters and the story line in her second novel, "Past Reflections."

As in her first novel, "Midnight Magic," published last year, Bonaldi manages to turn ordinary people into subjects of intrigue and makes everyday events difficult to decipher.

For example, in "Past Reflections," published by A Wings ePress Inc., Julie Finch, a 17 -year-old city girl, recently graduated from a Catholic school for girls, finds responsibility in retaining her first job as a counselor at Camp Wiskle.

Unfortunately, in applying for the job, at the persistence of her best friend Tracey, who is also a counselor, Julie lies about her age, pretending to be older. Adding to this burden, Julie, who has been injured in an automobile accident caused by her drunken mother, is also making an attempt to recover from a serious breakup with Scott, the best friend of her older brother, Matt.

Befriended by counselors, including attractive brothers Kevin and Jake, and a trouble-making junior counselor, Nancy, Julie tries to enjoy a happy summer at camp.

But Julie constantly reflects on her past experiences with Scott. And soon, she is in conflict, finding herself attracted to Kevin, while contemplating the strength of her love for Scott, who is ultimately suffering from serious medical problems, of which Julie had not been aware.

There are enough emotional clashes and and frightening occurrences throughout "Past Reflections" to keep readers turning the book's pages. And for some light aftersummer reading, and perhaps a touch of the passion and tragedy found in soap opera dramas, "Past Reflections" holds its own.

Therefore, Bonaldi's book comes recommended. Unquestionably, it can squeeze in alongside the author's first book on the shelf of this reviewer's book case, while still making room for a future, third volume.

## Frances Willard: The adventure continues

When I walk around my garden I hear voices. Sometimes those voices come from across the street, where my neighbor is pulling weeds to the accompaniment of talk radio. More often though, the voices are inside my head, retelling the stories of each plant that I pass. Those stories weave themselves together like the fragrance notes in a complex perfume.

Soon there will be another story in the mix. Frances Willard, a tall, herbaceous peony, will arrive this fall and bloom next spring. I bought Frances because the flowers are beautiful, with pink buds that open and age to cream petals with touches of peach blush. It is a vigorous, mid-season bloomer, with strong stems and darkgreen leaves. The variety has been going strong for more than a century and I can already picture it holding forth in a sunny section of my garden.

The story of this heirloom peony is really several stories. Frances Willard was bred by a well known breeder, named after a redoubtable woman, kept in commerce for years by a small specialist nursery and rescued by yet another specialist plant seller. The fluffy pink and white blooms carry a lot of history.

Frances Willard, introduced in 1907, was one of many bred by the Brand Nursery, the first such commercial institution in Minnesota. The firm's founder, Oliver Brand, established the company in the town of Faribault, but it was most likely his son and successor, Archie, who introduced Frances Willard. Archie specialized in varieties of Paeonia lactiflora and, according to several sources, the plants were known for their vigor. The company thrived, reaching a commercial high point in the 1920s. It 1929 the Brands took the unusual step of making Myrtle Gentry, originally hired to run the company's office, a full partner in the enterprise. Taking a woman into an established partnership was certainly unusual for the time and says a lot for the abilities of Ms. Gentry and the sensibilities of the Brands. It is not surprising that one of the company's best peony cultivars was named "Myrtle Gentry."

Another strong, competent woman, Frances Willard, 1839-1898, was celebrated in her time as a feminist, educator and founder of the temperance movement. She was born near Rochester, N.Y., and attended college in Illinois. Her career led her through various teaching and administrative positions, culminating in 1871 , when she became the first dean of women at Northwestern University. During the second half of her career, Willard turned her attention to women's suffrage and the temperance movement. Her activism helped lead to the founding of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, in 1874. She was known for exhort-

ing women to "do everything" - engaging in all forms of public and private activism for the causes she espoused:

Admirable though she was in many ways, Frances Willard was not immune to prejudices that were widespread in her day. While campaigning for the temperance movement she made derogatory statements about members of minority ethnic groups that troubled some of her contemporaries and still concern her modern admirers. Still, her accomplishments were an inspiration to many people and her fame was widespread. Nine years after her death, the Brands named a strong young peony seedling "Frances Willard" in her honor. Willard's name is not as widely known today, but her namesake plant lives on thanks to a couple of nursery owners devoted to keeping the best of the past.

The first of those was Sherman Nursery, an Iowa concern founded in 1897. Family owned until 2009, the nursery specialized in peonies and maintained a large collection of specimens introduced in the 19th century. Frances Willard was among them. Hard hit by the 2008 recession, the family finally sold the business to another, larger nursery in 2009. This resulted in many of the older peonies being removed from commerce. Nursery owner Scott Kunst of Old House Gardens has reintroduced some of the Sherman Nursery's peonies, including Frances Willard and Chestine Gowdy, another Brand peony with pink, cream and crimson petals.

Kunst also contacted the University of Michigan, which maintains a collection of heirloom varieties in its Peony Garden at the Nichols Arboretum in Ann Arbor. Arboretum officials, who have a wide circle of contacts in the peony world, also agreed to help with the Sherman peony preservation effort.

France Willard the peony has all the strength and vitality of the original Frances Willard, without the personal baggage. The plant is an artifact of an earlier time and a tribute not only to its namesake, but to those who have worked to ensure the survival of heirloom varieties. ## Gov. Livingston Highlanders are featuring a double wing offense

BERKELEY HEIGHTS - Gary Lubisco paid his dues as a respected assistant coach at a successful Group 1 program, Dunellen in Middlesex County.

Now he's taking on the task of being a head coach for the first time at a different school - a bigger one at that - in a different county.

While the 1995 Millburn graduate admitted that he did show interest in the Millburn job - which was one of several in the Union County and Essex County area that was open this year - he couldn't be happier where he is right now.
"Being able to be at a place like Governor Livingston is what I've wanted for a long time," said Lubisco, who just turned 35 and who was an assistant coach at Dunellen the past 11 seasons under head coach Dave DeNapoli.

Lubisco will also teach social studies at GL.
"All the kids in the community have been amazing and so on board, which has helped my transition tremendously," Lubisco said. "I can't say enough."

Lubisco succeeds Terry Hanratty, now the head coach at Roselle Park. The Highlanders made the state playoffs only twice in their history before Hanratty guided GL to the playoffs his first six seasons at the helm, including the 2008 North 2, Group 2 final.
"Terry did such a great job here, so I know I'm stepping into some big shoes," Lubisco said. "This is a great challenge for me.
"Being a head coach for the first time, the amount of things you're asked to do multiplies.
"It's a fun challenge and I'm excited for the opportunity."

The quarterbacks in charge of GL's elaborate double wing offense include senior Justin Ennis - one of six returning offensive starters - and junior Pat Mahoney.
"Justin is your prototypical waggle quarterback, a threat to run and pass," Lubisco said. "He's smooth on the run and gives us an added dimension that puts pressure on defensive ends.
"In any single wing he's also a perfect fit for that, a strong runner. He's perfect for that flexibility.
"Mahoney is a bigger, more prototypical passer (more of a drop back)."

Lubisco described an offensive strength as "ground and pound."
"We've been punishing teams so far, gaining three yards, three more yards and then busting one," Lubisco said
"We want ball control."

# Roselle Rams seek next step of winning in the playoffs this time

ROSELLE - The Rams qualified for the playoffs the last two years, making it in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 1989 and 1990 when Roselle reached the North 2, Group 2 final each year. The Rams won the 1989 game and lost the 1990 contest.

In those years Roselle won at least one playoff game. The Rams lost close first-round encounters the past two seasons.

So what will it take for Roselle to get over the hump and win a playoff game this season, which would be for the first time since 1998?
"We would like to get a home game this time," third-year head coach Lou Grasso Jr. said.

It was Lou Grasso Sr. that guided Roselle to its only playoff title in 1989 and also the 1990 championship game.
"Getting to the playoffs and winning, you have to put yourself in the best position," Grasso said. "We were underdogs and on the road the last two years, although anything can happen in the playoffs."

Roselle was more than representative at Summit in the first round of last year's North 2, Group 2 playoffs and even had a brief lead in the fourth quarter before falling.

The year before in Central Jersey, Group 2, the Rams also lost a close first round contest.

Roselle is back in CJ, G2 this year and a member of a very formidable Raritan Division inside the newlyaligned Mid-State 38 Conference.
"If we make the playoffs, we know we'll be tested with the schedule we have and the division we're in," Grasso said.

Back to lead the multiple offense is junior quarterback Tyrone Crutchfield. He showed great promise starting as a sophomore last year.
"He's always had arm strength and athletic ability," Grasso said.
"He's working on the mental makeup of his game and handling adversity and being a leader.
"He has a pretty good grasp of the offense and is working on sharpening his technique and not making the mistakes he made as a sophomore.
"He's a super-talented kid, with such a good arm, a strong and pretty accurate throwing arm. He has the ability to make throws a lot of other kids can't make."

Damon Haynes rushed for over 1,300 yards last year and is now primed to top that as a senior.
"He's a very elusive and tough runner for his size ( $5-8,170$ )," Grasso said. "He was a big pick up last year, filling the void for (2011 graduate) Darius Mayers."

ROSELLE PARK - There's a new sheriff in town and his name is Terry Hanratty:
The Elizabeth resident and former successful mentor at Governor Livingston, who lives just a few first down markers from Roselle Park's Herm Shaw Field, is embracing his next coaching challenge with everything he's got.

Roselle Park last posted a winning season in 2006 and last made the state playoffs in 2001, which was also the last year the Panthers downed arch rivals Brearley and New Providence.

Could this be the season when some - or all - of those streaks come to an end?
"When I first met with the seniors we started to do things to build on," Hanratty said. "We painted the lockerroom ourselves, we went out and through fundraising bought flags for the field and were able to create signs that read 'Panther Pride.'

The other returning starters on offense include senior linemen Greg Kurywczak at right guard, Erick Romero at right tackle, Rob Bianchi at left guard and Kevin Metellus at left tackle.

Back at tight end and plackekicker and punter is senior Frank Schneeberger.

Kurywczak, Romero and Metellus are all 6-1 or taller.
"Their size says a lot for a senior class at a Group 1 school," Hanratty said. "The kids know how to play the game. Some of them have started for three years. Our seniors have really done a good job so far."

Those experienced players up front will be out to protect first-year signal-caller Jordan Andre, who was Roselle Park's junior quarterback a year ago.

## Summit Hilltoppers receive boost from Marines at onset of practice

SUMMIT - Summit went 11-o last year and then lost to an 11-0 Madison team 47-7 in its final game.

Eight months later, head coach John Liberato brought in the Marines.

Those local Marines - stationed in Elizabeth include: Staff Sgt. Michael Diaz of Long Branch, Staff Sgt. Fausto Rivera of Manhattan, Staff Sgt. Candessa Benn of Brooklyn and Corp. Sergio Castro of Roselle Park, who is a 2008 Roselle Park High School graduate.
"Over the summer we wanted to do something for the kids to 'definitely get their attention,'" Liberato said.
"On the first day of practice we met up in the weight room and we had the Marines up in the front of the room as the kids walked in. We definitely got their attention."

There was no shame in losing to a quality Madison team that defended its title. However, if it's decided that, perhaps, a bit of a wakeup call might be needed, who better than to go to for motivation than the Marines?
"I didn't tell anybody, I didn't tell the parents, I didn't tell my players and I didn't tell my coaches," Liberato said. "Staff Sgt. (Diaz) and I see each other at Summit High School a lot and in December after we lost 47-7 we felt that we wanted to leave no stone unturned.
"I felt that we were in a position that we needed to hear a different voice about our values and stuff like that and who better to do that than the Marines? The one thing that they focused on was complacency.
"We've been a program that has seen a lot of success over the years and I felt that, myself included, maybe there was that sense of complacency. As the rings tell us, complacency kills. They (the Marines) gave our kids a couple of examples and a couple of stories that really hit home.

We're practicing and playing with a sense of urgency every day because of our partnership wtih the Marines and I'm very thankful for that."

Here, Staff Sgt. Diaz further explains: "It's usually around six hours, like three hours of actually sit down in a classroom environment going over all those traits and then two to three hours of practical application, which is we come out here (Tatlock Field) and we work out and we teach them how it comes into effect.
"The whole leadership brings together the team and that's what we're looking for."

With the Marines now running a good portion of the first day of practice, Summit players had to pay extra attention to detail.

Trivino has also been impressed with junior Jerod Fletcher at running back and freshman Saverio Salcfas at guard.

Trivino said that Salcfas is also an impressive swimmer.
"Jerod knows how to wiggle and how to set up a trap block," Trivino said. He also said Fletcher has been timed in the 40 dash at 4.6 .
"With Anthony and Jerod we have a nice tandem," Trivino said. "Our two receivers (sophomore Mike Iuliano and senior Mike Saladino) both have good hand."
Leading Dayton's 4-4 defense is junior outside linebacker Joe Iuliano.
"Joe is tough as nails," Trivino said. "He'll be blitzing here and there. He's a motivational leader out there as a junior."

Trivino said that senior inside linebacker Joe Fiorenza displays a great amount of strength and can stuff the middle and be a force.
"We improved with every scrimmage and were able to expand the game book each time," Trivino said.

CRANFORD - When you have one of the top players in the county returning as your quarterback there's reason to be optimistic a third straight winning season can be obtained.

Standout senior Reggie Green is that athlete for Cranford this season.

A role model for players to look up to, here's an example of Green's dedication:
"He's played three sports and he hasn't missed a practice yet in any of them," Cranford head coach Erik Rosenmeier said.

Green, who also excels in basketball and track and field, led Cranford to its first football state title in the playoff era last year.
"He's, obviously, gotten a lot of accolades, but that doesn't change who he is," Rosenmeier said. "He's not that vocal, but rather leads by example. He's never going to be unprepared."
Also a hard worker in the weight room, Rosenmeier said that Green really likes Pittsburgh and Temple has shown interest. Many times Green's version of running Cranford's spread offense is sprinting past everyone and spreading himself from the pack en route to the end zone.
"We've had some good players, but he's unique in that when he gets into the open field, he's tough to catch up with," Rosenmeier said. "He poses a problem for defenses once he gets that first step ahead. He can score quick and when he does that the other team is trailing.
"He brings big-play capability. If you focus on him, we have other players that can hurt you. If you take the focus off him, he will make you pay.
"Rahway did a good job against him last year and then he broke one late."
Because of injuries, senior lineman Chris Folinusz may play the entire season at the skill positions, including running back, wide receive and tight end.
"Chris can play 10 of 11 positions on offense, leaving quarterback to Reggie," Rosenmeier said. "That speaks of his athleticism. He plays with a willingness to win.
"He reminds me of Baris Grant, Darnell Grant's younger brother, when he played at Irvington. He was a pretty good lineman who came in and played tailback and did a good job there as well."

Folinusz, who will continue playing baseball after high school, helped lead Cranford's baseball team to another Group 3 state championship this past spring.

## Union Farmers have the talent to challenge the toughest foes

UNION - What kind of a player does acting head coach Dominic Cuniglio think junior runnịg back Jamauri Bogan is?
"He's - hands down - the best athlete I've ever coached in my 13 years," Cuniglio said.

Bogan was named the New Jersey Gatorade Player of the Year last season after rushing for 2,260 yards. He has 3,360 total, including 1,100 his freshman year, and is 600 yards away from tying the school record of 3,960 yards set by present Union track coach Tony Stewart in 1985.
"From head to toe, everything about him is top of the line," said Cuniglio, who became acting head coach Aug. 14 when present head coach Brian Sheridan took an extended leave of absence. "Jamauri's a leader by example.
"In today's society, players in the NFL flaunt themselves. He's all about the team and what he can do to help the team reach its ultimate goal of winning a championship."

Cuniglio came aboard last year as the offensive coordinator. He is a 1993 Steinert graduate, who went on to excel at Monmouth University where he was a two-time All-America offensive lineman.

He played at Monmouth with present Union assistant coach Carmen Marano, who like Sheridan is a 1993 UHS grad.
"It doesn't matter whether Jamauri gains a thousand yards or one yard, all he cares about is the team winning," Cuniglio said. "When Brian hired me as the offensive coordinator, he handed me Bogan's highlight film from his freshman year. He has vision and abilities that are second to none."

Bogan became the first Union player to be named the state's Gatorade Player of the Year since Sheridan, as a senior, was honored 20 years ago after the 1992 season when he led Union to another 11-o record and a second consecutive North 2 , Group 4 crown.
"Jamauri has great vision and acceleration that he uses to his advantage," Cuniglio said.

As good as Bogan is, however, he can't do it alone.
There were several games last year where he had close to 50 carries.
"The biggest thing with our offense is that we're not the Dallas Cowboys," Cuniglio said. "We can't slam the ball up 50 times a game."

Cuniglio's spread offense - like many others - will have a lot to do with what the defense gives it.
"In those particular games where Jamauri carried the ball all those times, we went with him because that's what was there and those defenses we went up against took other things away," Cuniglio said. "It's not something we want to do on a weekly basis.
"In the first Elizabeth game, we needed to win to have a chance at making the playoffs. Jamauri accepted the challenge."

Senior tackle Darius Stapleton returns for his third year on the offensive line.
"He's the rock of our offensive line," Cuniglio said.
Senior quarterback Doug Carter is also a three-year starter.
"Doug has improved tremendously from last year," Cuniglio said. "He's in tremendous shape after having a very good baseball season and he's primed to have a huge year."

## Cranford football a defending state champ for the first time

## Sparked by standout seniors Green, Folinusz

 Sports EditorFor the first time in program history the Cranford football team is a defending state champion.

Now the Cougars go from the glory of that victory last Dec. 3 to the harsh realization that last year was last year and this is a whole new season.
"People are used to us being 6-4, not state champions," said heavily recruited senior option quarterback Reggie Green.
"Now that we've got a state championship, we have a lot more to prove to everybody"

Cranford blanked Parsippany Hills $27-\mathrm{o}$ in last year's North 2, Group 3 championship game at Kean University's Alumni Stadium in Union.

Right now the Cougars are still preparing for tomorrow night's season-opener at home vs. Watchung Hills.
"We'll miss a lot of starters from last year," Green said. "Right now we're dividing stuff up and having people fill in.
"We're trying a lot of people at a lot of different positions to see what they can do. We're experimenting.
"At first we thought it was going to take time, but now we're coming together quicker."

Green proved quite tough to bring down last year, especially when he gets that initial burst of speed.
"This year I've been working on reading the offense and improving my mechanics," Green said.
"This is my second year in this offense, so I've got to be perfect with my reads and everything. I've also been reading defenses more."

Returning senior lineman Chris Folinusz will see time at the skill positions because of injuries to seniors Nick Diaz and Jimmy Dwyer. Diaz is also a force defensively at linebacker.
"We have a couple of guys hurt, but other guys have stepped up," Folinusz said. "I think we'll be all right Everything is starting to mesh and come together.
"Our biggest problem is just, pretty much, the linemen. The little stuff we can fix. Our intensity is there, we're running to the ball and we're tackling good."

Head coach Erik Rosenmeier said that Folinusz can play 10 of the 11 positions on offense, leaving quarterback to Green.
"I'll play pretty much wherever they need me," Folinusz said. "I don't care about stats, I just want to win. We always have to prove ourselves.
"Until we start winning year in and year out like some of those other teams, we're going to have to keep proving ourselves. We're going to have to show people we can win and that we can still do it."
Watchung Hills is in the Mid-State 38 Conference's newly formed Watchung Division along with North Hunterdon, Plainfield, Ridge, Linden, Montgomery and Immaculata.
The Warriors are coming off a $2-8$ season

[^0]:    (Continued from previous page) making to Kean next Wednesday and Thursday. The visit is an important part of the process the commission undertakes to ensure an institution of higher learning actually is in compliance with the standards found to be in violation by a university.
    In the report sent to Middle States, which was obtained by LocalSource, Kean officials noted they have made multiple changes on campus, including the addition of a new academic integrity policy along with various tools to measure how well students are learning. Also included were examples of how the university is performing its duties.

    Among the many submissions included in the monitoring report was an example of the response received in a campus survey undertaken by Kean officials. Although there were only 56 responses to the survey, the text response from one was enlightening.

    One of the questions the respondents was asked was for examples of an institutional practice that fostered respect among students, faculty, staff and administration. The answer did not put the university president or administration in a favorable light, though.
    "Meetings with administrators are frustrating experiences marked by explicit disregard for faculty perspectives and expertise, demonstrating contempt for faculty and their ideas," the respondent said, adding that Dr. Farahi always tells faculty "you are paid to do a job, so be glad you have one and stop whining."

    Another question requested the respondent to provide specific examples or initiatives that demonstrate cooperation and collaboration between faculty and administration, but again the response was a negative one.
    "My peers and colleagues generally treat me and one another with respect but high administrators do not. They yell, threaten, don't listen, are dismissive, arbitrarily and frequently change rules and procedures and don't allow questioning or discussion," the respondent said.

    Despite the voluminous monitoring report that Kean officials insisted addressed all the standard violations that forced the state university to be put on probation by Middle States, faculty members, as well as others, are not as confident. They believe the problem goes much deeper and must be rectified by the board or things will continue to deteriorate at the university, regardless of Kean continuing their accreditation.
