Watchdog, prosecutor sling insults in pre-trial briefs; due in court today

The war of words between blogger Tina Renna and the Union County Prosecutor's Office intensified last week as both took defensive stands prior to a court hearing today to determine if the blogger has to reveal information she knows to a grand jury.

In late November when Renna posted on the Union County Watchdogs blog that she had the names of 16 to 20 county employees who took home generators for personal use right after Superstorm Sandy, it opened a legal can of worms for both the prosecutor and blogger.

Renna, a strong advocate for transparency in county government, has been digging up a plethora of county misdeeds since 2005 and posting them on the UCW blog.

Renna's efforts have brought more transparency to county government, and although she has continued to advocate the importance of open government, when it came down to revealing the names of the county employees who made use of the generators at taxpayer's expense, Renna refused to talk.

The Prosecutor's Office then turned around and slapped Renna with a subpoena to appear before the grand jury to testify about everything she knows. From that point things became even more legally complex, time consuming and much further from being resolved.

In an interview with *LocalSource* Friday, Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow said he found Renna's behavior to be very telling.

Roselle mayor defends salary increase for town council

ROSELLE — The mayor and council unanimously approved a hefty salary increase for themselves last week, but it came after more than a decade of keeping the status quo.

Mayor Jamel Holley last week defended the 66 percent increase in salary council approved for themselves, saying it has been ten years since anyone saw a raise and the governing body has been working hard to ensure there was a zero percent property tax increase, something Roselle property owners have been waiting over a decade for themselves.

The increase raised the six council members salaries from \$9,112 to \$15,000, while the mayor's salary will increase from \$12,000 to \$20,000 annually. As for how this increase will affect town coffers, the mayor said it would not cost taxpayers anything.

The council plans on moving money from operating expenses to salary and wages, not tacking the added expense on to the budget.

However, Holley was not concerned about how the increase would be perceived by the general public. He felt a raise was long overdo and council members should be paid for all the hard work they do.

"We have been working very hard every day even though our positions are parttime," Holley explained, mentioning that regardless what anyone has to say, "this is a full-time job."

The mayor said he and council members discussed the possibility of a raise at length and after looking at what was accomplished the past year, they all agreed it was warranted.

"We looked at what other governing bodies were making and our increase was not out of line," Holley said, but agreed that some towns paid their governing body members considerably less than Roselle, which has a population of 21,000 residents.

For instance, Cranford has 23,500 residents and the four committee members receive just \$2,557 annually for their service, while the mayor, which is not an elect-

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
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Kean restaurant handed a \$50K tax bill

UNION — Kean University may have paved the road for Ursino Restaurant to open without anyone having to jump through the usual legal hoops, but not paying taxes? The township was not about to let that happen.

Late last fall the township decided the campus gourmet restaurant that opened in 2011 in the Center for Science, Technology and Math Education, received a surprise in the mail — a tax bill for \$50,000.

Although state universities and colleges are not required to pay local taxes, or for that matter even go before local municipal planning and zoning boards when erecting a new building, township officials felt a profit making restaurant should pay their fair share.

"There is a special provision in the law that allows a municipality to level a tax if a state run facility rents the property to a for profit business," explained Union Township Administrator Ron Manzella.

But, while the operator of Ursino's, Gourmet Dining Services did not object to receiving a tax bill, Manzella said they did have a problem with the amount.

"They have appealed their tax bill and it is going through the usual channels right now," he added.

Ursino's also avoided the usual problem most business owners face when trying to open a restaurant: obtaining a liquor license. However, because the restaurant is on state property, the operator went through the state to obtain a license to serve alcohol for \$1,000.

Usually, if a proprietor wants to open a restaurant, the chance of getting a new liquor license is slim. Each municipality is only allowed a certain number of liquor licenses, depending on population. Once

this number is reached, no additional licenses can be given out until a restaurant closes and the license is up for grabs.

A restaurant can, however, sell their license along with an establishment or separately, but any agreement made is between buyer and seller. According to one restaurant owner, buying a liquor license can run as high as \$100,000 or more, depending on how popular an establishment is, as well as the location. A municipality does not get involved except when it comes to issuing the license.

Gourmet Dining Services, owned and operated by Frungillo Brothers, received a

ten-year, no bid contract extension for food services at Kean, according to a source with knowledge of this deal.

Kean President Dawood Farahi was reported as the driving force for the creation of Ursino. He reportedly wanted to use the latest state-of-the-art building at the university to showcase a first-rate restaurant.

The two-story space, designed by Glen Cobin, is named for Polish Count Julian Ursin Niemcewicz, who married into the Kean family in 1800.

The space features a wood-burning hearth, a bar made of quartz, a wine suite,

a second floor bar and lounge and a rooftop area.

The green restaurant featuring farm-totable fare that is overseen by Cranford farmer Henry Dryer of Cranford, filters its own water, cultivates bee hives and even in winter is busy producing food that will be turned into gourmet meals.

But while Ursino is supposed to be a culinary trend setter, it is bleeding money. Sources confirmed last year that while the facility is losing money, this loss will be made up by Kean's food services contract. Enough, perhaps, to pay their tax bill, after it is appealed.

Mayor 'gets his man' as new chief quickly takes steps to retire

LINDEN — Although Sal Bivona formally received the police chief title last week, he will not have it for long.

The promotion came just three months before he retires, ending a 34-year career with the police department. But come April 1, a new police chief, James Schulhafer, 59, will take over the top cop position.

Interestingly, even though Bivona received the title he wanted and fought for, he is not around to enjoy it. As of Jan. 1. he began using accrued vacation and sick days, which will bring him up to his April 1 retirement date. Until then, Schulhafer, who also has served on the force for 34 years, is acting chief. The move ended many months of controversy over who was the best man for the police chief position, dividing the council and mayor on the issue.

Last August the mayor went to bat for Schulhafer, but lost the battle. Even though the decision of who is appointed police chief is a mayoral decision, the council still had to give their blessing on the choice and they made it clear Bivona was their man.

Mayor Rich Gerbounka, however, felt Schulhafer was the best man for the job because he scored highest on the civil service exam, while Bivona came in second. The entire matter came to a head in August when the mayor and council stood in opposite corners on the matter.

The mayor admitted Bivona had been a good interim police chief, and was well liked by the community, but he felt the department and city would fare better with Schulhafer at the helm. Schulhafer not only earned a master degree from Seton Hall, Gerbounka said, but also graduated from the prestigious FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia. And he received the blessing of two former police chiefs, who both felt he was the best person for the job.

Former chiefs Michael Boyle, who spent 34 years on the force along with John Miliano, a 23-year veteran member, gave Schulhafer glowing recommendations in writing.

Gerbounka felt the same and backed that up with his belief that where you stand in civil service testing is important.

"My policy is to promote from the top of the civil service list," the mayor said at the time.

Gerbounka, a former member of the city police force for many years, said last spring that although he had the greatest respect for Bivona, unless there was something on Schulhafer's record that made him unfit to serve as police chief, he should be the city's next police chief.

But while the testing component was important to Ger-

bounka, Bivona had something more important — the "popular" vote. And it steadily grew stronger.

In February 2011 when Boyle stepped down as police chief because he had a very good offer from United States Homeland Security, the mayor appointed Schulhafer as acting chief. At that time Bivona had already put in his papers to retire, but pulled them back when he heard Boyle was leaving. In the end, the mayor compromised and made Bivona acting chief, providing he would retire at the end of 2011. But the end of the year came and went, Gerbounka said, and Bivona failed to put in his retirement papers.

"When a man gives his word you believe him," the mayor said, adding that he was disappointed that Bivona broke his.

Nevertheless, the council was adamant about Bivona being the right person for the job, pointing out that he was beloved by the community and known as a "cop's cop."

Eventually the council unanimously approved a resolution that allowed Bivona to continue serving as chief while receiving \$155,340 salary until he retired.

Then a copy of a letter from the state was discovered alerting the city that no one could hold a provisional position for more than a year. Gerbounka agreed to make Bivona chief, but only until he retired.

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Prosecutor flips script, attacks Renna in brief

"She doesn't have any names," the prosecutor said, adding "it is hypocritical for someone who advocates transparency in government not to cooperate."

Romankow said he never asked for Renna's sources, just the names of the county employees she admitted to having on her blog.

"How can you on one hand tell us we should be investigating this and then turn around and not give us the names?" the prosecutor asked, admitting all of this has been a diversion keeping prosecutors from working on actual criminal cases.

"I'm not after her sources. I just want the names of the employees and I will personally take those names to the state attorney general," Romankow said.

After receiving the subpoena, the blogger asked the court to grant her protection under the state Newspersons Shield Law so she cannot be forced to reveal what she knows to the Prosecutor's Office.

The New Jersey Shield Law requires claimants show a connection to news media, a purpose to gather, procure, transmit, edit or disseminate news and that the materials were obtained in the course of pursuing professional news gathering.

Whether Renna actually is covered under this law as a journalist hangs in the balance until Superior Court Judge Karen M. Cassidy hears the blogger's motion to "quash," or throw out, the prosecutor's subpoena today.


However, both Renna's legal counsel, Bruce Rosen, and the Prosecutor's Office are well prepared for the legal battle ahead. Neither have left a stone unturned when it came to ensuring a judgement in their favor.

With sizzling court motions and briefs flying back and forth last week, both not only used case law to bolster their case, but leveled strong accusations toward the opposition.

The prosecutor's 48-page court brief, filed Jan. 18 and obtained by *LocalSource* claimed the activist fell short of "anything approaching news media." Instead, prosecutors said Renna "is a political activist masquerading as a government watchdog."

They contended Renna failed to get comments from the other side of the issue, failed to identify sources when able, failed to correct mistakes and her blog is "riddled with profanities, slurs and personal attacks."

On the other hand, Renna's counsel accused the prosecutor's office of using "outrageously shrill whining" about the

way the blogger went about getting news and keeping the county accountable.

Rosen pointed out it is the media's purpose to "report, investigate and even castigate government officials," and be a check on one-party government."

"This role — reporting and commentary on government — is at the heart of the First Amendment," Renna's attorney stressed in a rebuttal to the prosecutor's initial brief, adding this is the very reason the blogger has been successful at what she does.

But the prosecutor pointed out that Renna's "true motives become more transparent" when her husband's history with the county are revealed, as well as her own.

For example, prosecutor's brought out in their court brief that Renna's husband, Joseph, was once employed by the county and the blogger herself sold advertising space in county publications and newsletters during his tenure there, including selling ads for the Union County Alliance newsletter, *Union County Directions*. This is the same organization she later blasted on her blog for not being forthcoming about where taxpayer dollars were being spent.

Prosecutors also said it was ironic that while Renna profited financially from her husband's employment by the county, after he lost his job she turned around and berated his former employers for allowing rampant nepotism.

They also revealed that in 2005, a year after her husband was terminated from his employment with the county, Renna founded the watchdog organization "to monitor and demand accountability from the same Democrat controlled Union County government with whom she had no quarrel until her husband was terminated."

"Indeed her background is rife with conflicts of interest," they said, which is in direct violation of journalistic standards,

Rosen, however, strongly disagreed, saying that political figures go in and out of journalism, but "that does not make them any less qualified as journalists when they function as journalists."

To further support why Renna should not receive protection under the shield law, prosecutors accused the blogger of not being able to distinguish between advocacy and news reporting.

They said her repeated attacks on the

freeholders and county manager during freeholder meetings were particularly revealing.

"Given the rancor of her posts and rants at freeholder meetings, it is clear Ms. Renna is a political activist with an axe to grind against the Democrat-controlled government of Union County," prosecutors said.

Rosen countered saying that this was "meaningless," because news people appear regularly at colleges and on television, in debates, taking strong positions.

He said what actually matters is that when the court looks at her writing, whether recent columns or articles at issue now "they will see real investigative reporting."

Prosecutors, however, disagreed.

"Though she does gather information, her purpose is not to disseminate that information but rather to marshall the information she obtains for use in her politically-motivated lawsuits," prosecutors said in their brief.



(Continued from Previous Page) nalist and this was supported in a blog post Renna made entitled "Union County Prosecutor's Office — I'm not an idiot."

In the post Renna specifically drew a distinction between her work and that of journalists, remarking "I am a government watchdog and we need to report things differently."

"Clearly," prosecutors pointed out, "Ms. Renna neither acts nor sees herself as a journalist." They said the blogger only seeks that designation now in order to avoid answering to a subpoena issued by an office she personally dislikes.

"It is clear that the legislature did not intend to bestow the reporter's shield on one who gathers information for the purposes of vanquishing political enemies and waging legal battles," they said, adding if this was true, "then every self-appointed newsperson and anyone with a Facebook account could do so."

Renna's attorney, however, felt the prosecutor's office was way off base when it came to determining who exactly was a journalist, calling the prosecutor's opposition "a red herring," or a distraction from the real issue at hand.

"The Shield law does not require that a publication be objective, or that it be nice to politicians, or that it self-promote," Rosen said in his rebuttal brief, noting, for instance, that every publication points out that they were the originators of an investigative story. As far as partisanship being an obstacle to Renna calling herself a journalist, Rosen said "the state is woefully misguided."

"Our press has a long history of partisanship, beginning with Federalist newspapers at the nation's founding, to pro-and anti-slavery newspapers, investigating Watergate, or opposing the Vietnam and Gulf wars," the attorney said,


"There is no rule in the first amendment or the shield law that a particular news media must be objective and there is plenty of case law setting forth that conflicts cannot decide what constitutes news as opposed to information that appears to entertain," Rosen added.

Young artists on display through Feb. 22 at Casano Center



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
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

Celebrating black history

Friday is the first day of February, in which we observe Black History Month. Begun as a weeklong observance in 1926 by Dr. Carter Woodson and held during

the second week of February, the purpose was to focus peo-

ple's attention on the contributions by African-Americans to American history. February was chosen because the month contains the birthdays of two individuals who helped change the social status and condition of blacks: former President Abraham Lincoln and abolitionist Frederick Douglass. Woodson himself was a black man who received his doctorate in philosophy from Harvard University and became an early voice for blacks who were mistreated or misrepresented, both in his time and in American history. Black History Week was first expanded and celebrated as Black History Month at Kent State University in Kent, Ohio, in 1970. Six years later, during the country's bicentennial, this expansion was officially recognized by the U.S. government.

This year, Black History Month comes shortly after President Barack Obama, our first black president, was sworn into office for a second term. His inauguration occurred on the day the nation celebrated Martin Luther King Jr. Day, which honors the slain civil-rights leader. This year is also 150th anniversary of Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, an order issued Jan. 1, 1863, which proclaimed all those

Since its creation, Black History Month has been celebrated in various ways, generally much more low-key than the parades or festivities associated with Columbus Day or St. Patrick's Day. Schools often examine the cultural heritage of blacks in the United States, from their arrival, usually

against their own will, as slaves in the 18th and 19th cen-

turies, to their freedom, involvement in **EDITORIAL** segregated units in World War I and II, and subsequent influence on American history and culture. This influence ranges

> from the Harlem Renaissance of the 1920s — a fortuitous burst of energy among black entertainers, writers, artists and musicians — to later political and cultural achievements of the 20th and 21st centuries. Among the former are individuals such as big-band leader and pioneer Duke Ellington, folklorist and anthropologist Zora Neale Hurston, jazz and gospel vocalist Ethel Waters and poet, novelist and play-wright Langston Hughes. Among the latter are Condoleeza Rice, the first black, female national security advisor and secretary of state; Thurgood Marshall, the first black Supreme Court justice; Colin Powell, the first black secretary of state; and, of course, President Obama.

> Some would question the need for a full month dedicated to the history of one race. Actor Morgan Freeman, himself a black man who grew up during many of the tumultuous events in black history in the 20th century, has been a vocal critic of Black History Month, saying, "I don't want a black history month. Black history is American history.'

> Perhaps, but black history in America is, in some ways, still emerging from the shadows. Disparity still exists. And Black History Month continues to serve a necessary function by bringing this important facet of our common heritage to light. But to accomplish that, we must take advantage of this month. Visit your libraries and museums. Check out cultural happenings as they are listed in your newspapers this month and every month. Make Black History Month a time of awareness, an awakening to the history our great nation

The program temporarily perched in the back pocket of Union wrestling coach Dino DeBellonia was in for a rough night. Between the animated body language and shout outs to his wrestlers, it would be moving in and out of the coach's pocket for review with the frequency of someone popping peanuts.

enslaved in America to be forever free.

Last week his squad faced a fired up Cranford team still breathing the rarified air of having beaten powerhouse Roselle Park. For DeBellonia, now in his fourth year at the helm in Union, the match was part of a series of building blocks the coach envisions in his plan to "bring back the glory days of Union Township wrestling," a perennial powerhouse in the sport a decade

Impeccably neat, and none too shy, the man has a vision and plan for the sport's future. Already a 500 school in the win/loss column, the coach is in something of a multi-faceted build. He unabashedly sees the road to success based on rekindling a feeder program in the younger grades just like Roselle Park, and more recently Cranford, has achieved. Considering a chunk of his wrestlers never tried the sport until freshman year of high school, the foundation for the future is clear.

For the present, DeBellonia has a focused and somewhat loud teaching

method for his soldiers. The Seton Hall University graduate, himself a college wrestler, started his coaching at Seton Hall Prep before moving to Union. There is a laser like focus on the kid in the arena. The coach is up, then on one knee and always ready, shouting cliche basics during the match.

To the wrestler narrowly behind in points with the clock winding down he barks, "Short time. Find a way." For the combatant up against a skilled opponent, the gym observers all hear, "face him, face him." For the wrestler ahead on points the direction is "belly down."

At the end of each match, it's difficult to tell from the interpersonal contact of coach and wrestler how the results turned out. Like a flipped light switch, the tough yelling, motivating coach has turned into instructor.

The eye contact, hand on shoulder and after the heart to heart talk, the slap on the backside came from the coach imparting lessons about wrestling and life.

This coach appreciates the details. A brief delay for an equipment malfunction by a Cranford wrestler sees the Union Coach ready with a water bottle and new insight for his waiting wrestler. He clearly knows how to jawbone the referees to get the edge on close calls. After each match the team spirit is there with the clapping hands for the combatant, win or lose.

The downer of the evening numbers becomes clear when Cranford junior Jonathan El-Khoury pinned his senior opponent from Union. El-Khoury is what they refer to as a "blue chipper" armed with talent and having another year to refine his skills before the college recruiters come calling.

For the part-time wrestling coach and full-time teacher of U.S. History and introduction to law, he still has the responsibility of teacher and motivating the other weight class kids waiting their turn to wrestle even though this night his team will

The coach believes his building blocks need experience.

He scrambles to get his squad into as many tournaments and matches as possible. Each match with rivals, including Rahway, Scotch Plains, Roselle Park, Summit and Mountainside, are another learning experience for the kids in learning about the takedown. It's all part of a plan as DeBellonia helps develop a winning program and successful kids.

Roselle council, mayor give themselves 66 percent raise

(Continued from Page 1) ed position, receives slightly more at \$2,818.

Although Mayor Tom Hannen was just elected in November, when reached to ask how much he earns for the job, the governing body member had to admit he just did not know.

"I suppose I should but the truth is I didn't get into this for how much it pays. I ran because I wanted to help my town and move us forward in a positive way," he explained.

The city of Linden, with 39,432 people, pays its council members \$17,707 a year, with the council president receiving \$20,659.

The mayor, an elected position, earns \$69,675.

However, a city salary ordinance for 2013 suggests that although council members and the council president's stipend stay the same this year, the mayor's salary can go up to a maximum of \$89,675.

Interestingly, when Mayor Rich Gerbounka was elected as mayor of Linden, he opted to take half the salary his predecessor earned.

In Rahway, which has a population of 27,396, regular council members are paid \$8,043, and the president makes \$9,676. The elected mayor is paid \$20,300.

Over in Union, which has close to 50,000 residents, the four committee members earn \$16,922, while the mayor, or chairman of the township committee, earns \$20,372.

On the other hand, Clark, with 14,597 residents, pays its council members \$6,000 and their elected mayor \$15,000 a year.

Mayor Sal Bonaccorso agreed with Holley, explaining that although most people believe governing body members just attend council meetings, that is a far cry from what it really is like when you are an elected official.

"I am on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week. It's more than a full-time job but when you are mayor, you have to be there to answer those calls," he said, adding that council members also are very busy serving as liaisons to countless committees, reviewing endless information for meetings and responding to resident issues, questions and complaints.

"You don't get into this to make money," the mayor added, pointing out that when a person decides to run for an elected seat, it has nothing to do with money.

Holley concurred, saying "this is never about money."

However, getting compensated fairly for the time is important, he said, adding that when council members attend functions, it is always out of pocket.

"It's a salary set for the work we put in," Holley explained, but noted the governing body has been very progressive in moving the borough forward.

"We put in more hours than many other governing bodies, and in the last year our hard work has paid off," Holley said, mentioning that he and council managed to get rolling on constructing and paving 38 roads, renovating parts of the downtown streetscape and working on a \$10 million flood project that is under construction that will alleviate flooding for 200 homeowners.


In addition, Holley said they launched a workforce employment office that has put people back to work, put more diverse police officers on streets to protect residents and visitors and overhauled the borough's recycling program.

"And we did it all without increasing taxes," the mayor added.

Holley felt that any controversy over the salary increase was stirred up by political adversaries, and that was something he really did not want to waste energy on.

"We have more work to accomplish and that just slows things down," the mayor added.

"That is something we have to deal with in our positions, but we can't do much about it."

The teacher, Jennalin M. Garcia-Calle, of Piscataway charged on Jan. 22 following an investigation that revealed she engaged in a criminal sexual relationship with a student at the school, according to a release from the prosecutor's office.

The investigation revealed that the teacher began the relationship with the student in December 2012. Authorities were notified after the victim told a family member about the relationship, officials said.

Police arrest 18 for drunk driving during campaign

The Linden Police Department took part in the year-end "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" drunk driving crackdown, and arrested 18 drivers for driving while intoxicated. "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" is a nationwide campaign operated by the Division of Highway Traffic Safety. The campaign focuses on increased police patrols during the busiest travel and holiday seasons. This year the campaign ran from Dec. 7 until Jan. 2. During the almost month long crackdown, the Linden Police Department increased roving patrols to focus on impaired driving. In addition to the 18 arrests for driving while intoxicated, the Linden Police also made 12 felony arrests, 26 drug arrests, and issued over 450 motor vehicle summonses. In 2012, members of the Linden Police Department arrested 151 motorists for driving while intoxicated, a 32 percent increase from 2011.

"Drunk driving continues to be a problem," said Linden Traffic Bureau Commander Sergeant Michael Babulski. "Our DWI arrests are up because our officers are increasing their awareness and enforcement while on patrol, not because more people are driving drunk. Motorist safety is important here in Linden. We have zero tolerance for any type of impaired driving or distracted driving."



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Rahway sees progress in arts district

Hamilton Stage opens at UCPAC in September

RAHWAY — The city celebrated the expansion of the Union County Performing Arts Center in September as Hamilton Stage launched its inaugural season with a series of short performances and a benefit celebration.

The site is owned by the Rahway Redevelopment Agency and located on Hamilton Street, about a block and half away from the main UCPAC building in the Downtown Arts District.

"We're really excited," Council President Samson Steinman said back in September. "Basically the whole town is talking about it. We sold out tickets for the opening night."

Hamilton Stage was designed by the architectural firm of Farewell Mills Gatsch of Princeton.

Construction took just more than a year and cost about \$6 million, an expense bonded by the city about two years ago. Steinman said there is no timeline for paying back the bond, but the city will soon begin "chipping away" at it using proceeds earned from the stage.

Steinman said in September he is confident this is a good investment, as evidenced by the city recently receiving a National Endowment for the Arts grant to help get the stage's first season underway. The "Our Town" grant was for \$75,000.

Hamilton Stage will be home to six Artistic Affiliates this season. It features a 199-seat Proscenium Theater as well as a smaller 60-seat Front Room Theater.

This new building represents a significant expansion of Union County Performing Arts Center.

"This gives the Union County Performing Arts Center five different performance spaces at the Rahway facility," said Richard Bryant in September, Managing Director of Hamilton Stage.

The inaugural performance was entitled "Hello Hamilton!" It was well-received, with all tickets sold out. The show took the form of a fast-paced variety show, featuring vignettes by its six Artistic Affiliates who offered previews of the performances scheduled during Hamilton Stage's upcoming season.

Report shows high demand for affordable artist housing

RAHWAY — A group planning to build affordable housing in Rahway for actors, artists and other creative professionals never expected the demand would be so great. Now it appears instead of 69 units, there is a need for up to 242.

The proposed plan for affordable artist housing is planned for the former Elizabethtown Gas building on Central Avenue.

The online marketing study drew interested artists from all over the metropolitan area and then some. One thing that was clearly evident from the response was 69 units of affordable one, two and three bedroom apartments will not be enough to satisfy the need out there.

"There is understandably strong demand for this housing in Rahway," admitted Scott Weiner, president and CEO of the Actors Fund Housing Development Corporation, a subsidiary of the Actors Fund that works towards developing affordable, supportive and senior housing for the performing arts community.

Weiner presented a conceptual plan for the Rahway Residence for the Arts last week to the city redevelopment agency and was very optimistic about the results.

"We anticipated this kind of result which is why we presented this project and now we have the data behind it," Weiner added, noting the demand went beyond affordable housing and toward actual market rate apartments.

The technical report submitted by AFHDC indicated the data they collected from the survey supported creation of up to 242 new, affordable housing units in Rahway for those in the visual and performing arts, as well as the entertainment and creative industries.

Saying this was a "very strong response," the report mentioned that giving weight to the survey was the fact the respondents were familiar with the Actors Fund and it also helped that there was broad outreach among the arts for input.

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



'Signed,' sealed and delivered

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Elizabeth sees plenty of progress in 2012

May 2012: Wakefern Food Corp breaks ground on warehouse, expects 150 news jobs

ELIZABETH — In May, Wakefern Food Corp. Chairman and CEO Joseph Colalillo, New Jersey Lieutenant Governor Kim Guadagno, Elizabeth Mayor J. Christian Bollwage, Union County Freeholder Daniel Sullivan and Elberon Development Co. LLC's Executives broke ground on Elberon's new warehouse and distribution center for Wakefern Food Corp at 600 York Street, Elizabeth.

"Wakefern and Elberon have been solid partners with the City of Elizabeth for more than fifty years," remarked Bollwage in a release in May. "This exciting expansion opens a new chapter in our relationship and demonstrates our commitment to job retention and creation for our residents, innovation, and Elizabeth's business community."

The County of Union assisted in passing through \$44 million in Federal Stimulus bond financing to spark the project, which not only maintained Wakefern in Elizabeth but also helped the company to expand.

The 524,000 square-foot, temperature-controlled facility replaces the former Wakefern grocery warehouse built in

the 1950s, and increases storage capabilities by more than fifty-eight percent.

"Once completed, this new warehouse is going to remind the entire region about the great advantages Union County has for doing business," Freeholder Sullivan said in a release in May. "It's all right here: our transportation infrastructure, with interstate highways, railways, airports, the seaport, and the easy access to markets in the New York metropolitan area. We have a great workforce, well trained and highly educated, with a great tradition of hard work and community spirit."

In addition to the expanded square footage, this new site was expected, according to the release in May, to feature thirty-six foot high ceilings increasing the storage space significantly compared to the industry-standard of twenty feet. Projected to bring more than 150 permanent jobs to the city, the facility is expected to distribute non-perishable food products to ShopRite stores across NJ, NY, PA, CT, DE and MD beginning in November 2013.

Since it was founded in 1946, Wakefern has become the largest retailer-owned cooperative group of supermarkets in the United States. Employing an innovative approach to wholesale business services, Wakefern focuses on helping independent retailers compete in a big business world. Providing the tools entrepreneurs need to stay a step ahead of the competition, Wakerfern's wholesale client base benefits from the company's extensive portfolio of services, including innovative technology, private label development, and best in class procurement practices. Headquartered in Keasby, New Jersey, Wakefern operates more than 2.5 million square feet of grocery and non-food warehousing.

"Our family has built and managed industrial real estate in Elizabeth for over fifty years," said Anne Evans Estabrook, CEO of Elberon, in a release in May. "Wakefern was one of our first tenants. We continue the tradition started by our founder, David O. Evans, of providing quality warehouse facilities to companies who bring jobs and ratables to the City."



Union County sees progress on clean energy programs

The Union County Renewable Energy Program announced that it had 90 percent, or 28 of 31 facilities, already installed with solar panels and generating renewable energy savings for 15 governmental agencies in September, 2012. The final installed systems size will total 3.37 megawatts, the county said in a release in September.

The last three facilities, scheduled to be opened in Roselle and Berkeley Heights, were

expected to be operational by mid-October, it was reported.

"Our local governments and public entities who are participating are at the vanguard of the green energy revolution," said Charlotte DeFilippo, Executive Director of the Union County Improvement Authority, in a release in September. "This is a generational accom-

plishment for Union County."

Tioga Energy owns, operates, and maintains over 13,800 solar panel modules providing Union County facilities with renewable energy generated from their systems through a Power Purchase Agreement, or PPA. Through the use of PPA's, Union County facilities are able to reduce their cost of energy by approximately \$5 million over 15 years. Tioga's installation partner, a joint venture between Pro-Tech Energy Solutions and Huen Electric, Inc., is engineered and constructed the systems.

The Renewable Energy Program was started in 2011 by the Union County Improvement Authority through PPA's, which are common throughout the solar industry. In power purchase agreements, the property owners do not own the solar equipment. They simply pay for the electricity generated by the photovoltaic panels, at a rate lower than the price of con-

ventional electricity.

The participating governments and public entities are Morris-Union Jointure (Berkeley Heights), Berkeley Heights Board of Education, Cranford, Garwood Board of Education, Hillside Board of Education, Linden, New Providence Board of Education, Plainfield, Rahway, Roselle, Roselle Board of Education, Roselle Park Board of Education, Union County Vocational Technical Schools (Scotch Plains), Union County College (Cranford), and Winfield Board of Education.

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County parks get an overhaul

The lake at Union County's Nomahegan Park, one of the most popular parks in the Union County Park System, will undergo a \$1.5 million restoration, it was announced in September.

The restoration of the 7.5-acre lake follows the rehabilitation of Upper Echo Lake in Echo Lake Park last year and is part of a four-lake restoration project that also includes Rahway River Park in Rahway, Briant Park in Summit and Meisel Avenue Park in Springfield. While work was expected to get underway in Rahway by the end of 2012, the projects at Briant and Meisel were expected to get underway in 2013, according to County officials.

The Nomahegan project is expected to take upwards of nine months to complete.

"We have a magnificent County Parks

system," said Freeholder Bette Jane Kowalski in the September release. "But the years have taken a toll on our lakes, many of which are man-made. Silt has built up, along with a growing amount of organic matter. That all has to come out."

Nomahegan Park was part of the original park system designed by the Olmsted Brothers landscape architectural firm. An estimated 46,400 cubic yards of soil was excavated in 1930 to create the lake, which holds an estimated 9.8 million gallons of water. The restoration project is going to also involve extensive plantings along the lake shoreline. The plantings are designed to reduce silt infiltration into the lake and to make it more difficult for Canada Geese to have easy access to the water, which then encourages flocks to remain in the park.

Freeholders announced grants in 2012 for towns looking to upgrade fields

Freeholder Chairman Alexander Mirabella announced in October 2012 a total of more than \$1.15 million in matching grants from the Kids' Recreation Trust Fund will be distributed to municipalities across Union County that are looking to upgrade or build playing fields, including hockey rinks, soccer fields, baseball fields, swimming pools, and other recreational facilities for children and families.

"Over the years, our County's residents have played on or enjoyed dozens of fields, and athletic facilities that have been rebuilt, refurbished, expanded, or built new under this program," Mirabella said in the October 2012 release. "The Kids Recreation Trust Fund has made an incredible difference in our quality of life."

The Kids' Recreation Trust Fund was established in 2004 to help municipalities upgrade their recreational facilities for children. It is a program of the Union County Open Space, Recreation and Historic Preservation Trust Fund, established in 2000 by popular referendum.

The Kids' Trust Fund consists of matching dollar-for-dollar grants that are based on proposals from Union County municipalities to upgrade their recreational offerings. Eligible projects can include the improvement of existing playing fields and other facilities, or the construction of new facilities.

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


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Progress realized in natural gas savings with reverse auction

In February, Union County announced it was set to realize a savings of at least \$330,000 in costs for natural gas over the next three years as the result of a newly introduced "reverse auction" bidding process. The new procedures were introduced for the first time earlier in

"I would like to thank all involved for making this inaugural process go smoothly and successfully for Union County and our partners," said then Union County Freeholder Chairman Alexander Mirabella in the February release. "This is a great demonstration of the savings potential when local governments pool their resources and their buying power."

In the new process, Union County served as the lead agency for the Mid Jersey Energy Cooperative Pricing System, a buying cooperative that also includes the counties of Ocean, Middlesex, Warren and Somerset, the City of Elizabeth, the Kenilworth Library and the Borough of Winfield Park.

Union County uses natural gas primarily for heating it facilities, including the Union County Courthouse and Administration Building in Elizabeth, the Ralph Froehlich Public Safety Building and the County Services Building in Westfield, and the Trailside Nature and Science Center in Mountainside, along with other recreation and maintenance facilities. Last year's usage totaled almost 151,000 dekatherms — one dekatherm equals ten therms or one million British thermal units.

The new contract saves money by pegging the price that the County pays to just \$1.03 per dekatherm above the commodity price. Under the previous contract the difference was almost double, at \$2.03. Union County and other members of the cooperative also have the option to lock into a commodity price for one to three years. That would provide a buffer from upward spikes in gas prices during that time, resulting in additional savings,

In a reverse auction, the bidder with the lowest price wins the contract. The auction was arranged by Birdsall Services Group as authorized by the State of New Jersey. The winning bid went to the Hess Corporation.

Mirabella noted that Union County's energy budget will also benefit over the long run from federally funded energy upgrades to its buildings. The federally funded upgrades include efficiency retrofits at various County buildings and the installation of solar panels at the Trailside Nature and Science Center in Mountainside, the Juvenile Detention Center in Linden, Runnells Specialized Hospital in Berkeley Heights and the Ruotolo Justice Center building in Elizabeth.

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
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Tony Bennett captivates sold-out NJPAC audience

"Ladies and gentlemen ... welcome to the Tony Bennett Show!" declared the announcer. To hear those words spoken live and aloud in 2013 is nothing short of a minor miracle and a major blessing.

Sinatra. Martin. Presley. Como. Williams. Crosby. All of these men were singular talents possessing incomparable voices who have long since departed from this world. So thank the heavens that we can still count Tony Bennett among us. From the opening notes of his first song at Sunday evening's sold-out NJPAC show, the crowd was instantly transfixed by the legendary entertainer.

Unlike many of his contemporaries who would eventually find their vocal prowess diminish over time, Bennett is still in top form at the ripe, young age of 86. Hitting all the high notes in "Maybe This Time." Seducing the audience with "The Shadow of Your Smile." Inducing a clap-along to "I Got Rhythm." Bennett was in total control

and clearly enjoying himself.

Sunday night's show inside Prudential Hall played out like a highlight reel of the 20th century's finest compositions and a testament to the singer's own shrewd choice of quality material. Upbeat numbers such as "Steppin' Out With My Baby," and the rousing "Sing, You Sinners," had the crowd of all ages completely enthralled. The bouncy "The Best Is Yet to Come" lifted spirits to a higher level as the iconic performer continued to light up the Newark, N. I. stage.

It can be said that great men lead fascinating lives which tend to generate extraordinary yet true stories. And Bennett's life is no exception. Early in the evening, the singer was almost coy in reminding the packed house of a truly jaw-dropping piece of his personal history. While performing as an opening act for Pearl Bailey in Greenwich Village in 1949, the young man was discovered and actually renamed "Tony Bennett" by no less a Hollywood titan than Bob Hope.

Born Anthony Dominick Benedetto on Aug. 3, 1926, in New York City, the young-ster was fueled by twin passions for painting and singing. The constant childhood hardships of the Great Depression and a horrific tour of duty battling Nazi troops on German soil during World War II would undoubtedly serve to reinforce the entertainer's strong humanitarian beliefs in the years to follow. Oftentimes referred to as "Tony Benefit" because of his tireless philanthropic pursuits, the singer's colossal heart and warmth were on full display during the concert on Sunday.

Bennett's huge heart is evidenced in his role as a proud and loving father whose grown children still factor into his everyday life. At a dark time in the 1970s, when the singer was struggling artistically, financially and personally, it was his oldest son,

Danny, who helped him get his life and career back on track. Still serving as Bennett's manager after more than 30 years, it was Danny who helped reintroduce the entertainer and his incredible body of work to receptive younger generations.

But on Sunday night at NJPAC, the Bennett child in the spotlight was his youngest daughter, Antonia. Opening the evening with several songs backed by Bennett's tight, four-piece band, the 38-year-old exhibited her father's trademark poise while performing her more contemporary brand of popular tunes. A delightful moment occurred later in the evening during a duet with her father. Trading off lines on an upbeat Stephen Sondheim composition, the elder Bennett at one point broke out in dance, pirouetting alongside his beaming daughter.

To say that Tony Bennett's music is merely romantic would be a gross understatement and an utter disregard for the man's stunning vocal abilities. Exuding the same sophisticated charm and sly sex appeal that sent the bobbysoxer generation swooning more than a decade before Beatlemania, Bennett was in full command of his unique brand of magic on Sunday. During any slight pause between songs, smitten women of all kinds took the opportunity to shout out, "I love you, Tony!" as if it were 1953 and not 2013.

Old favorites such as "Just In Time" and "When You're Smiling" sounded fresh and new again. The evening's set list was so varied with timeless melodies that even his signature song, "I Left My Heart in San Francisco," almost felt like an afterthought. Bennett has always abstained from straight-up rock 'n' roll, but there was no

denying the flat-out rollicking feel of "One For My Baby (And One More For the Road)." He even transported us back to the earliest days of his recording career with a note-perfect rendition of "Boulevard of Broken Dreams" and his Bennettized version of Hank William's country classic, "Cold, Cold Heart."

In lesser hands, the simple act of slowing down a song's temp can be the kiss of death, unintentionally creating something akin to a funeral dirge. Not so with Bennett. Nobody on this planet can slow down and own a song quite like Mr. Bennett can. During his stellar take on "The Way You Look Tonight," you could actually see the mesmerized crowd melting into their seat cushions. Never maudlin, never overly sentimental, his timing and delivery remains impeccable after more than 60 years in the recording business. His wistful spin on Charlie Chaplin's "Smile" left more than a few concertgoers' eyes moist.

Bennett's consummate professionalism and discipline to his craft are well-known and widely documented. But how he chose to conclude Sunday evening's performance should be required viewing and a much-needed wake-up call for today's sadly over-produced and classless pop stars and would-be idols.

After making several well-received references to just how exceptional the acoustics are inside NJPAC's Prudential Hall, the singer put his microphone down and walked up to the edge of the stage. With only the accompaniment of his guitarist, Bennett then proceeded to crush—and I mean crush—the living daylights out of "Fly Me to the Moon" ... without the aid of a microphone! There was an audible

gasp of communal astonishment as Bennett's thundering and unenhanced voice filled the entire interior of the intimate concert hall.

If any flaw could be found concerning Sunday night, it might possibly rest with the expectations of the audience. When Bennett finally left the stage and the houselights went up, the eager crowd stood there slightly stunned, waiting for more. We wanted more. I wanted more. There was a certain brevity to the evening and a bitter-sweet sense that the show had just ended before it even began.

At the age of 86, certainly no one is expecting a Springsteen-style marathon from Bennett, And maybe that's for the best. There is an old show-biz adage that goes, "Always leave 'em wanting more." And from what I overheard from the delighted fans exiting the exhilarating, sold-out show, he sure did. For the record, we experienced twenty-one wonderful songs within seventy-four unforgettable minutes.

In a recent November 2012 interview, the entertainer summed up his motivation for performing well into his seventh decade: "I can't wait to hit the stage because I love to make people feel good." And he's *still* delivering on that mission statement.

During one of the opening songs on Sunday's concert, Bennett asks the adoring crowd, "Who's Got the Last Laugh Now?"

And the answer is quite obvious. You do, Mr. Bennett. You do.



Take Back the Kitchen V-Egg Salad

Right now, the Christmas rose is ascendant

When I was growing up in western New York, we generally had the annual January thaw after a prolonged cold snap. In my part of the world this year, we had a prolonged thaw first, followed by a daunting cold snap. It hardly seems fair, and is, in fact, downright disheartening.

To avoid the blues, I bundled up and trundled out into the backyard. There are no snowdrops yet, though the English garden magazines are larded with fulsome prose about the ones opening up there. The tips of the daffodils are showing in the front beds, but I know they will not emerge for at least another six weeks.

I haven't yet acquired the witch hazel of my dreams to brighten up the dull winter days, but I do have hellebores. My spirits rose when I looked at the Christmas rose — Helleborus niger — and saw that it was full of buds. Two of them will open any day now, their white blooms braving the cold to announce that flowers have returned to the garden. Theirs is not the white flag of surrender, but the white banner of seasonal defiance.

Most gardeners are familiar with the Lenten rose, aka Helleborus x orientalis. As the common name suggests, it blooms later than Christmas rose and has a broader range of flower colors. My garden is full of them and, with luck, will be home to even THE GARDENER'S APPRENTICE

more in the next year or so. However, right now, the Christmas rose is ascendant.

For those who haven't seen them, Christmas roses are low growers, rising only 8 to 12 inches in height. The stems emerge from the ground separately from the leaves, on thick stalks.

Each stalk bears one large buttercuplike flower, with either rounded or pointed petals, depending on the variety. As they age, the petals begin to blush, eventually turning dusty pink and persisting on the plants for well over a month. A mature plant can bear 20 or more flowers in the growing season. In my garden the palmate leaves are evergreen, though the oldest ones look quite ratty after a full season of growth. As the weather begins to warm up, I clip them off to neaten up the plant.

Spring is actually hellebore haircut time all over the garden, as the old, worn-out orientalis foliage gets lopped off as well.

Christmas rose is one of about 15 hellebore species and hails from parts of Europe. The Latin "niger" species name is intriguing, because of the absence of black in stems, leaves and flowers. The roots are another story, however, and the species was once known as "black-rooted hellebore." Other common genera, like Helleborus x orientalis and Helleborus foetidus, have white roots.

One of hellebore's great virtues is that it is not appealing to deer or other marauders. All hellebores are poisonous, and Christmas rose was once used for killing rats. Combined with other hellebore species, Christmas rose makes a nice groundcover for partly shaded areas where deer depredation has made gardening frustrating.

There are scores of varieties and colors of Lenten rose, but Christmas rose seems to be a little less amenable to the machinations of breeders. English, Japanese and German plant experts, especially those at the Heuger de Blomen Nursery, have produced a large number of flower forms, but so far they only come in one color — white. Still, you can pick and choose among the various forms available, including the beautiful Wilder, with very large, starshaped flowers.

Winter Moonlight looks more like a single rose, with rounded petals and a prominent cluster of golden stamens. For lovers of double-flowered specimens, Japanese breeders have come up with Double Fantasy, featuring vigorous plants and fully

double white flowers with somewhat pointed petals.

Christmas rose is very happy when grown in partly shaded garden areas or in pots. Its only important requirement is very good drainage. Those gardeners with heavy clay know the drill — improve heavy soil by digging in organic material, grit or sand prior to planting. If plants are already in, dig in soil conditioners around the plants as you can and use organic mulches, which break down and lighten the topsoil.

I am tempted to clip the fattest Helleborus niger bud and bring spring into my kitchen. However, I think that the flower will be happier outside, looking winsome and providing me with a reason to put on heavy clothes and leave the house to seek fresh air and fresh inspiration.



RC girls' basketball garners key road victory at Cranford Is candidate for next week's UCT top seed

CRANFORD - Niavanni Grant saw the slightest of openings and made her move to the basket.

That was all the Roselle Catholic senior guard needed to produce her first points, which came at a time when the visiting Lions really needed them.

Down by eight to start the fourth quarter in hostile enemy territory, Roselle Catholic also needed to step up defensively in order to have a chance at knocking off division rival Cranford.

Grant's oncoming fourth quarter performance both offensively and defensively was the added spark Roselle Catholic needed as the Lions came back last Thursday night to thwart the host Cougars 32-26 in a Union County Conference-Watchung Division clash at

Martin Gymnasium.

"We had to keep our composure and stick together as a team," Grant said.

Roselle Catholic, which did not run and wreak havoc with its trademark, game-opening, full court press, captured its eighth straight victory to improve to 15-2 overall and 10-1 in the Watchung Division. The Lions are now in the lead to repeat as Watchung champions - as of Tuesday they had three division games left - and to garner the top seed for next month's Union County Tournament, which will be seeded next week.

Roselle Catholic, which held its fifth opponent and second straight to under 30 points this season, ended up sweeping Cranford in Watchung Division play. The Lions previously topped the Cougars 51-41 at home

Cranford, which was held to its lowest output of the season two days after Roselle Catholic - in a 32-21 division home win - held Scotch Plains to its lowest output, had its second six-game winning streak snapped, falling to 12-4 overall and 8-3 in the Watchung. RC snapped both Cranford six-game winning streaks.

Grant scored the first five points of the fourth quarter and produced half of her team's output in the period, netting all eight of her points in the fourth.

Grant hit a jumper and was fouled at the onset of the fourth, making the ensuing free throw for a conventional 3-point play. She then drove aggressively through the lane and put the ball up and in for her second field goal shortly after.

"There was an opening in the middle, just enough room to get through," Grant said.

In what turned out to be one of its best quarters this year, Roselle Catholic outscored Cranford 16-2 in the fourth, starting the period on a 9-0 run and finishing the game on a 7-0 surge, all seven of those points coming from the foul line.



Electric atmosphere was in store for Dayton-Summit

take the ball to the hoop as Union County's only undefeated basketball team or was Summit able to bounce back from just its second loss - both by one point - to hand the visiting Bulldogs their first setback?

Another electric atmosphere was anticipated earlier this week when two of the top public school teams in Union County were scheduled to clash for the second time.

A marquee matchup was on tap for Tuesday night in Summit as the Hilltoppers were to host the Dayton Bulldogs in their second Valley Division contest.

The first one was worth the price of admission as Dayton came back in the second half and then held off Summit 49-48 on Jan. 10 in a battle of 7-0 squads.

Since that contest, fans anxiously awaiting Tuesday night's rematch in Summit.

Also since that clash, Dayton remained undefeated while Summit almost did

While Dayton survived its game at Hillside, winning 42-41 back on Dec. 20, Summit didn't.

The Hilltoppers lost at Hillside 66-65 last Friday night, in another division battle that went down to the very last second.

That's how close those three teams can be.

That put Dayton - Union County's only undefeated basketball team as of Tuesday at 13-0 - in the driver's seat in its attempt to capture the Union County Conference's Valley Division championship outright.

The Bulldogs, who led the Valley Division at 10-0, would have moved closer to clinching the title should they have won at Summit Tuesday night.

Summit, which was in second place in the Valley Division at 8-2, needed to beat Dayton to pull back to within a game of the Bulldogs.

While Dayton was winning its 13th straight to start the season with a more-than-convincing 62-27 division home win over Brearley last Friday night, Summit was edged at Hillside to fall to 11-2 overall.

Summit's loss at Hillside - the Hilltoppers first defeated the Comets 66-53 at home in division play on Jan. 15 - still didn't take the juice out of Tuesday night's Dayton-at-Summit clash.

However, it did make it more difficult for Summit to win the Valley Division. Dayton will be heavily favored to beat Roselle Park, Oratory Prep and New Providence again, so even if Summit did beat Dayton, there's a good chance the Bulldogs will remain one game ahead of the Hilltoppers en route to the title.

Tuesday's game was to be another measuring stick for both teams, with Dayton seeking to get back to the North 2, Group 1 final and win it this time, while Summit will take on a very challenging North 2, Group 3 field.

On Tuesday night, Summit was attempting to rebound from a loss that snapped a four-game winning streak following its division setback to the Bulldogs, while Dayton was seeking a rare 14-0 start.

Summit, sparked by a game-high 26-point performance from senior Ba'Shawn Mickens, led Dayton by six at the half on Jan. 10 before the Bulldogs rallied - behind a team-high 21 points from senior Elijah Brown - in the final two quarters.

"We played a little bit better defense in the second half," said Dayton head coach Bob Martin, who two SPRINGFIELD - Was Dayton able to continue to years ago guided Dayton to the North 2, Group 1 title en route to the Group 1 state championship game at Rutgers. "We mixed it up a little bit with our man and our zone, but we made some shots in the fourth quarter and we got big some stops and that's how you win

"We played as a team, for sure, and we worked together and everybody had energy," said Brown, who led all players with 10 field goals.

Summit also received 11 points and seven rebounds from junior Ryan Sweeney and three points and a team-leading 10 boards from junior Matt Fischetti.

"Our big guys (Mac Wiesner, Robbie Walsh, Matt Fischetti and Ethan Chivers) were in early foul trouble," first-year Summit head coach David White said. "That changes the way you're able to attack.

"We also didn't shoot the ball well. The Dayton gym is a tough gym to play in, it's small and well-attended."

After Dayton made one of two free throws to take a three-point lead with 10 seconds to go, Summit attempted a 3-pointer that missed, with the Hilltoppers putting in the rebound to fall one point short.

We have to defend better than we did the last time and Friday night," White said. "There was a lot of stuff that we didn't do right which is a credit to both Dayton and Hillside.'

Last Friday night's game was the only one Summit had last week. This week the Hilltoppers have three

"Last week was a strange week in that we played only once, with the kids taking exams," White said. "We would have liked to have played Tuesday to have built up some intensity going into Friday's game."

Summit almost came back from a six-point, fourthquarter deficit in the first Dayton game, while conversely leading Hillside by six in the fourth. After Summit missed a 1-and-1 free throw with a one-point lead against Hillside, the Comets came back to score a layup with two seconds left.

Mickens, who again led all scorers with 26 points, attempted a 3-pointer at the buzzer that did not fall.

"Mickens is our top scorer and that's no secret," White said. "If our front line guys are in the lane, finishing and playing well, that's key.

"Wiesner had another double-double (11 points and 14 rebounds) Friday night. Walsh, at 6-8, has the potential to dominate a game. The only two games Walsh was in foul trouble were the two that we lost."

Walsh had six points and three rebounds Friday night vs. Hillside and in the first Dayton game - after going to the bench in the first quarter with two fouls finished with two points and six boards.

"Against Dayton and Hillside we had plenty of opportunities," White said. "Hillside came out very hot and played a great game."

Tuesday night's Dayton-Summit game also had county and state tournament ramifications as both seek to garner the highest possible seeds in both.


