The county managed to shave $\$ 4.2$ million off the 2013 budget, dropping the average increase to property owners from $\$ 120$ to approximately $\$ 97$.

Last week the Union County Freeholder Board approved two amendments to the budget, reducing the $\$ 494.4$ billion number to $\$ 493.7$ and the amount to be raised by taxes, previously $\$ 321.7$ billion, to $\$ 317.5$ billion.
The cuts resulted in the tax levy increase dropping from $\$ 19.2$ million to $\$ 15.2$ million, according to Union County Department of Finance Director Bibi Taylor.

The amount to be raised by taxes is the amount the
tain services and pay employees. However, the county increase is just one part of taxpayers three-part tax bill, which also includes municipal and school tax for 2013.

Freeholder Daniel Sullivan, who chaired the Fiscal Committee, previously mentioned the county would be looking under every rock to find further reductions, and, he thought the end result showed due diligence.
"Throughout this process we have diligently worked with our administrators, directors and bargaining units to come up with a final budget proposal that realizes efficiencies aimed at reducing the tax levy while avoiding layoffs or cuts that would imperil the delivery of important

The board will hold a public hearing as part of the regular meeting tonight at 7 p.m. on the amendments to the budget and overall spending plan for 2013. Residents will be able to address the board regarding the budget during this public hearing.

Tuesday Taylor explained how the county made the $\$ 4.2$ million in cuts, stressing that while there were some major reductions, others were incremental.
"One of the major cuts was $\$ 1.8$ million in health benefits, bringing the overall cost for expenditure down from $\$ 49.2$ million to $\$ 47.4$ million," the finance director said.

## UCIA continues to answer questions from 'Local' critic <br> speaking through an attorney.

 Staff WriterLocal Finance Board Chairman Tom Neff is not happy with Union County Improvement Authority Executive Director Charlotte DeFilippo and he is not backing down.

However, UCIA Legal Council Jonathan Williams extended an olive branch last week in an attempt to smooth out any roadblocks that could stall a $\$ 20$ million project at Union County College.

But, despite Williams explaining that DeFilippo works very hard and the projects she has tackled over the years would not have been completed without her being "hands on," Neff was having none of it.

Neff's response, sent April 18, obtained by LocalSource Friday, was pointed and less than consolatory.

Taking front and center among his concerns was the fact that DeFilippo, 67 , was being paid an "outrageous" $\$ 160,000$ annual salary, which included benefits and free reign to work from home. This continued to be a major problem for Neff, along with why the UCIA executive director was
"It is regrettable that the executive director of the UCIA apparently felt it was appropriate to have authority activities and qualifications for employment explained by an attorney on her behalf," Neff said in his response letter. He also took a shot at DeFilippo.
"Surely, an executive director as richly compensated as the executive director of the UCIA can express her qualifications without paying an attorney to do so on her behalf," Neff added.

LocalSource obtained a copy of the letter Williams sent April 16 to the Local Finance Board, requesting a private meeting with Neff to discuss any remaining concerns he harbored about DeFilippo.
"I believe that the concerns expressed by Chairman Neff can be addressed and he has indicated that he will try his best 'to keep an open mind.'"

Williams went on to explain the UCIA "does far more on each of its projects than merely providing a conduit for financing," or supervising a staff of two.

The UCIA legal counsel also noted that See LAWYERS, Page 6

# County sheriff faces challenger in primary

Sheriff Ralph Froehlich may have served 12 terms but if his challenger in the primary has anything to say, it will be his last.

Although Froehlich has easily returned to his elected seat every election since 1977 when he was first elected, Union County Police Lt. Richard Puschel thinks it's time for a change.

Puschel, who is challenging Froehlich in the June primary, suggested this week that the sheriff and former police officer, who is over 80-years-old, needed to fire Democrat Assemblyman Joseph Cryan from his $\$ 111,000$ taxpayer funded position as undersheriff.
"More than three weeks have gone by since the New York Post reported that Cryan's racy correspondence with lobbyist Karen Golding was written while he was at one of his government jobs," said Puschel, adding that "inaction of this kind suggests a failure of leadership and a crisis of integrity that must be corrected."

Puschel also said he would never allow a subordinate to engage in such unbecoming conduct as displayed by Cryan, admitting he was "frankly stunned" that Froehlich failed to address the matter at all.
"It is simply not acceptable to have a high ranking law enforcement official using government computers while being paid at taxpayer expense to engage in 14 -hour sex chats with a girlfriend," Puschel said, adding that Froehlich had a responsibility to taxpayers, not to his political alliances.

Froehlich, who was unable to be reached because he was out of the office, earns $\$ 145,000$ a year as sheriff, but also is considered a "double dipper" because he receives a public pension of $\$ 85,000$ annually from his position as a police officer.

Cryan, also a double dipper, is paid $\$ 111,000$ as undersheriff and $\$ 49,000$ for his legislative post as assemblyman.

Legislation was enacted several years ago preventing state lawmakers from draw-

ing more than one public-sector salary, but many are grandfathered-in as of Feb. 1 2008.

Froehlich, a Union resident, is the longest serving county sheriff in New Jersey History. A career law enforcement officer and former Marine, the sheriff implemented many programs during his tenure, including instituting a program that made it easier for local police departments to move prisoners to the county jail.

Although Puschel does not discount what Froehlich accomplished during his 36 -year tenure, he has a problem with the way he overlooked what Cryan has done.
"Joe Cryan disgraced the Union County Sheriff's office by behaving like a sexcrazed teenager. He betrayed Ralph Froehlich's trust by abusing government equipment and he robbed the taxpayers by doing it all at public expense," said Puschel.

He also felt Froehlich's first responsibility was to taxpayers, not Cryan.
"Froehlich has held the office for 36 years so it is time for a change, but he has to make this decision immediately," Puschel added.


## 'Health center’ busted for soliciting prostitution

Kenilworth Police Chief Ken Grady announced the arrests of five woman employees from a Kenilworth "health center" business that was actually a front for conducting prostitution, according to a release.

The health center, K\&W Health Center, located on Federal Avenue in Kenilworth, is alleged to have been providing massages to their clients and then performing various types of sexual acts in return for money.
"The department had received numerous complaints and launched an investigation into the business," said Chief Grady in the release, noting "this is the second time the "health center" has been closed down and arrests were made in connection to prostitution, the last time being July 2008."

The joint investigation was conducted by the Department of Homeland Security and the Kenilworth Police Department. Special Agent Sam Ahn and Detective Anthony Giacalone headed the investigation.

On the morning of April 18, the Depart-
ment of Homeland Security and the Kenilworth Police Department Detective Bureau conducted an undercover operation which led the detectives into the establishment and to the arrests of five individuals for prostitution related offenses, the release said.

Detective Sergeant Jim Grady states that Mi Presty, a 48-year-old female of Palisades Park and the manager of the "health center" was charged with promoting prostitution. Eungean Gu, a 44-year-old female, Yinghua Zhang, a 48 -year-old female, and Jingzi Zheng, a 45 -year-old female, all residing in Flushing, NY, were charged with engaging in prostitution along with Joung Oh, a 49-year-old female from Parlin, New Jersey.

Chief Grady reports the detectives seized over $\$ 6,000$ in cash along with other undisclosed evidence of prostitution related materials, according to the release. The detectives report the "health center" would charge an initial fee at the door and then the employees would solicit additional money to perform sexual acts, the release said.

## In wake of tragedy, county warns residents to be alert of scams

In wake of last Monday's Boston Marathon tragedy, the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders urges residents to be on alert for new and recycled internet scams that use the event as a means to disseminate malware and conduct financial fraud.

According to the Center for Internet Security, watch groups and cyber security experts have already identified multiple fake domains and websites and charity efforts taking advantage of the Boston Marathon bombing; and based on previous tragedies, more scams will follow in the coming days. The following guidelines, among others, have been suggested for analyzing websites pertaining to the event, and those soliciting donations:

- Be cautious of emails/websites that claim to provide information because they may contain viruses.
- Do not go to untrusted or unfamiliar websites to view the event or information regarding it.
- Never send sensitive information over the Internet before checking a website's security and confirming its legitimacy. Malicious websites may look identical to a legitimate site, but the URL may use a variation in spelling or a different domain (e.g., .com vs. net)

under the authority's model, DeFilippo and the authority entered into shared service agreements to finance, supervise professionals, and prepare public bid specifications on projects.

In addition, Williams said the UCIA also handled all public bidding in accordance with the law, supervised construction management as well as construction, obtained all necessary local and regulatory approvals and produced an end result which has "consistently been on schedule and under budget."

Williams again listed projects the UCIA has completed including a 100,000 -square-foot building in Plainfield, which, he said, required special legislation and Supreme Court of New Jersey approval in order to be completed.

Also brought up was a new juvenile detention facility, built at the direction of the State of New Jersey Commission on Juvenile Justice. This project, Williams pointed out, was awarded environmental and design awards in a national completion by the American Institute of Architects.

Another project, one that received the 2013 Project of Distinction from the Solar Energy Industries Association, was the installation of 31 solar panel arrays in 15 Union County municipalities. This particular project, he added, did not cost individual towns a dime.
Williams stressed that DeFilippo conducts regular meetings with her staff, as well as professionals, to ensure they are publically bid and completed with "fiscally prudent results."
"Each of these projects has included a financial component," the UCIA general counsel said. He admitted, though, that while the authority does charge financing fees to recoup administrative costs, he explained that these costs are not fees attributed just to "conduit financing" but rather to help pay for administration costs associated with completing projects.

Williams also brought up the touchy subject of DeFilippo working at home.
"All of her hours are accounted for in writing and she reports to her board of commissioners on a regular basis," the UCIA legal counsel said, adding the executive director is subject to an annual review and yearly renewal of her five-year contract.

Williams did not, however, inform Neff that the UCIA board is comprised of members of the Union County Democratic party or that DeFilippo is the chairman
of that political party. The question of
whether DeFilippo is compensated for whether DeFilippo is compensated for unused sick and vacation time also hung heavy in the air. Williams said the UCIA executive director "is not compensated for unused sick leave and will not be compensated for accumulated sick leave any differently than other county employees."

Williams did not, though, explain exactly what type of benefits county employees receive.

Williams additionally mentioned that DeFilippo has 33 years of experience in the public sector, citing, for example, that she had served as a municipal clerk, municipal treasurer, municipal administrator and Union County Freeholder.

Ironically, the UCIA executive director actually served as a member on the Local Finance Board, Williams said.
In closing, Williams said the UCIA model is authorized by New Jersey State Statute, providing a "true service to participating public entities."
"The authority and Charlotte DeFilippo are rightfully proud of the results achieved to date and look forward to future appearances before the LFB in order to receive a positive endorsement for this and future projects," the UCIA general counsel said.

Williams, who in 2012 made in excess of $\$ 1$ million from the UCLA, handles all the legal issues for this entity

Neff's response letter addressed multi-
ple issues, including that the purpose for Williams being there was about financing a Union County College improvement project, not discussing DeFilippo.

The LFB chairman pointed out that while Williams may have had issues with what took place at the April 10 meeting, the LFB was doing their job by addressing "overall financing" aspects. That, he said, included looking at what the UCIA executive director earned annually.
"As you are no doubt aware, the Local Authorities Fiscal Control Law generally requires local finance boards to review 'project findings' that are the subject of a proposed bond ordinance," Neff explained, adding that in the course of this review the LFB is statutorily required to give consideration to, among other things, "charges proposed by the authority."

Neff said questions Williams posed in his reference to his letter related directly to UCIA charges "embedded within the project financing." The LFB board, he added, therefore was required by law to review this particular information.
"So please do not misinterpret the statement you referenced, as suggesting I believe that my concerns about authority charges were outside the LFB's purview," Neff added.
"To the contrary, the questions and concerns I stated after the referenced remark were directly related to the pro-
posed facility," the LFB chairman added.

Neff also was quite concerned that there were things missing from information the UCIA should have provided as a matter of course when appearing before the LFB.

Of particular concern was an "appendix" describing the college project in detail.

He explained that without this appendix, which contained cost estimates and adequate disclosure of the proposed facility, the LFB could not possibly have conducted a thorough review of the facility at the April 10 meeting.
"That is why I requested this information be provided to the LFB prior to its May meeting," he added.

Neff did agree to meet with the UCLA staff and representatives, as requested by Williams, but admitted such a meeting would not be productive without all the information he requested from the UCIA.

Neff ended his missive noting that he was "unconvinced" DeFilippo's contract package paid for by taxpayers and college students "is even remotely close to reasonable."

He did say the least of his concerns was that DeFilippo worked from home with the blessing of the county. However, he did say that audit questions from 2009, 2010 and 2011 failed to address any of his issues.

## Neff questions UCIA attorney on cost of UCC project

Transcripts of the meeting held April 10 show the Union County Improvement Authority is requesting the Local Finance Board approve $\$ 20$ million in bonds, but they actually need millions less.

There was some confusion over exactly how much funding the UCIA needed for their next project, which was to make improvements at the college located in Cranford.

LFB Chairman Tom Neff picked up on that right away, among other things, that were not clear to him and other board members in Trenton.

According to the transcript LocalSource obtained of the Local Finance Board meeting April 10, UCIA representatives did not have all the answers either.
"I think this is probably just my own confusion, but the request here is not to exceed a $\$ 20$ million issuance," Neff said to Williams and attorney John Hudak, another longtime powerful member of the Union County Democratic party, who serves as bond counsel for the UCIA.
"Is it a $\$ 13.8$ million project?" Neff questioned, obviously
confused over the exact cost of the project.
"When we submitted, when we did the original LFB resolution for the authority, while they were still fine tuning some of the numbers from the architects, it came in originally somewhere around $\$ 15$," Hudak said, but added that there were other changes that reduced the amount..
"Then they sharpened pencils and we got them down to about $\$ 13.6$ million on the last number run," Hudak added. He did not, though, explain why the UCIA was still asking to bond up to $\$ 20$.
Neff pondered that, questioning whether the UCIA actually needed to put in for more than $\$ 15.5$ million in the first place. Then another board member asked Hudak whether the number they were proposing was a construction estimate or an actual bid.
"That is a construction estimate," Hudak responded. Neff seemed concerned about that and also the fact that the UCIA was getting a $\$ 50,000$ payment in addition to a $\$ 2,500$ annual payment "in perpetuity."
"Actually most of the fees, other than the authority's fee itself which I find objectionable, the only fee that sort of raised my

# Union County 2013 tab set at \$493.7 million

Taylor said that initially the county thought health benefits would increase by 18 percent this year, but that the number actually came in at 10 percent.

Taylor explained that the reduction in this number came from the county's 2,800 employees having an overall healthier "general well being," rather than the impact of major illnesses, which increases health premiums. This decrease in doctor visits and major illnesses was aided through county-sponsored wellness prevention programs, the county said.

One of the other ways the county saved money, according to Department of Administrative Services Director Matt DiRado, was to provide a financial incentive for employees not requiring health benefits.

This "opt out" plan approved by the state allows municipalities and counties to offer employees using the family plan $\$ 5,000$, and $\$ 1,800$ to a single person, if they do not take health benefits."

Taylor explained that 333 employees out of 2,800 decided to take the county up on this option. Although the county had to pay out $\$ 1.6$ million to employees, they actually saved $\$ 4.7$ million in health benefit costs after the $\$ 1.6$ million was deducted.
The finance director said the county has to pay an average of $\$ 25,000$ in health benefit premiums for a family, so the "opt out" is worth the initial payout overall.

Cranford also offers this incentive option, paying employees who do not need health benefits $\$ 7,000$.

That still was not enough to make the budget reductions the freeholder board wanted to ensure taxpayers were not heavily impacted, Taylor said. She explained that while public entities are faced with statutory and contractual expenses, the focus was to go line-by-line in the budget to cut costs where possible.
"We went back to every department head, took a hard line and told them we would not be filling any vacancies for a period of 90 days," the finance director said. This threemonth freeze did not include any public safety or grantfunded positions.
"We did not make the time longer because our staffing levels have decreased and while employees can absorb the-

work of these former employees, it is not a long term solution in some cases," Taylor added.

Taylor said other major cuts were made in the Sheriff's Department, with $\$ 370,000$ saved by not filling vacancies. This reduced the Sheriff's budget from $\$ 16.5$ million to \$16.2.

Runnells Specialized Hospital was also able to see additional decreases of $\$ 350,000$ through outsourcing of dietary and housekeeping departments.

The Department of Corrections slashed close to a half million dollars through the help of Luminosity, the firm hired to streamline this department.
"Because of the reduction in inmate population, we then saw a drop in medical, food and other costs in this department," Taylor said.

In January when county manager Al Faella released his 2013 executive budget, he said the county was at the beginning of the second year in a "multi-year budgetary turnaround."

Part of the problem was that the county needed to develop more revenue streams and put in place proactive measures that control costs in future budgets. Faella said that was not going to be easy to do because new revenue sources were nearly flat in 2012. In fact, the county saw a $\$ 9.2$ million drop in revenue.

Faella blamed this on the reduction in state and federal reimbursements as well as increased state-mandated costs. This included a $\$ 5.8$ million increase in contractual salary costs, health insurance, pensions and the \$1 million unexpected expense of superstorm Sandy.

Nevertheless, Faella did note that Union County continues to maintain a strong fiscal profile, with one of the highest bond ratings attainable from the three major ratings agencies.
Overall, Faella said, the county managed to stem the tide of eroding revenue collections in line with the national economy recovery. However, the ongoing slump in New Jersey real estate values and the destructive impact of superstorm Sandy plagued the county as the ratable base again declined by 3.8 percent to $\$ 65.9$ billion. As a result, tax appeals jumped 35 percent in the the past two years.

Despite this, county parks and the community development departments increased revenues by $\$ 250,000$, along with the county clerk's office which saw a $\$ 1.1$ million increase.

While still down from record highs several years ago, it was a noteworthy jump according to Faella, who did not see a doom and gloom 2013.
"We maintain a high quality of life in Union County and remain one of the most desirable places to live and raise a family. This is because we continue to make public investments in our educational system, preserve open space, maintain and improve our parks system, our cultural institutions and our roads and bridges," Faella noted, but admitted all this does not come cheap.
"Unfortunately quality does not come without cost," the county manager stressed.

antenna was a $\$ 25,000$ underwriter's counsel fee," Neff said, adding he thought that was "a lot of money.

In order to put things in perspective Neff mentioned there were other authorities with applications before the LFB and their fees came in at $\$ 5,000$.
"I'm not quite sure why it needs to be that high," he added, referring to the UCIA fee.

Hudak again scrambled for a response, mentioning that he thought this was an estimated number that was merely put down for the LFB application process.
"The underwriter's counsel has not been spoken to or retained at this point, as far as I understand," Hudak added, telling Neff no one had been selected for that position as of yet.

Neff also expressed frustration over the UCIA not including a description of the project, which he found strange. Hudak, though, pointing out that the project was still pending approval.
"The issuance of the contract documents is still somewhat in its embryonic stage," he added.

Not fully understanding Hudak's response, Neff made it clear he wanted a layout of the entire general project by the May LFB meeting and Hudak said he would comply.

Although Hudak did explain initially that
the college improvements had been discussed with community members, this too seemed somewhat unclear.
"The college, with the improvement authority, has been discussing with neighbors the project and taking community concerns into how the project will be built," the bond counsel explained, but Neff had questions about this, too.
"Just as to the project itself, the municipality of Cranford does support it or does not support it?" he asked.

Union County College Vice President of Finance Bernard Lenihan spoke to this, explaining what had transpired so far.
"We have not had official discussions with the municipality of Cranford at this point in time," he said, but did note there had been "informal discussions with neighbors."
"We have, in fact, moved the site of it as a result of these discussions," Lenihan said. Neff, though, seemed perplexed.
"I was curious as to what the constituent municipality thought about the the project. Unfortunately they didn't come," Neff said, but noted it was a public meeting and they could have been there to comment.

The UCIA is required to notify the public of a pending hearing before the LFB regarding any project they take on. According to one of the UCIA board members, this notice was published in a statewide daily newspaper.

## In the 'face of disaster,' media fails the public

Last week, it was impossible to avoid the Boston Marathon bombing in the media, and in our hearts. The incident during the marathon was the first terrorist attack of its kind in the continental United States since Sept. 11, 2001, and had the nation in an absolute gut-wrenching uproar. The violence, the cowardly nature of the attack, and the heroes in the aftermath captivated our attention.

The two bombs that exploded killed three people and injured more than 200, some quite seriously. At least 10 people had to have limbs amputated. The terrorist attack turned the marathon, the oldest and one of the most famous races in the United States, into an event which captured the attention of the entire country, if not the world.

What followed was a massive effort by law-enforcement officials to find out what happened and ensure that everyone was safe. In Washington, D.C., President Barack Obama vowed, "Any responsible individuals, any responsible groups, will feel the full weight of justice." The efforts of law enforcement were soon met with probable leads, as video of two suspicious individuals carrying backpacks was televised nationwide.

The net closed quickly and, by Friday morning, one of the alleged bombers, Tamerlan Tsarnaev, 26, was killed in a shootout with police, following the slaying of an MIT police officer. The other alleged bomber, his 19-year-old brother, Dzhokhar, was wounded in the shootout but disappeared, leading to a 24-hour lockdown for large parts of Boston. He was finally discovered in a boat parked in a backyard in Watertown, Mass., and is currently in custody.

While our thoughts, prayers and condolences are with the victims of this tragedy, as well as with the people of Boston, we were taken aback at the lack of integrity by many different media outlets covering the events as they unfolded, and at a time when just about every last person was watching.

We are familiar with the difficulties in reporting on a constantly unfolding and changing event, and the continual struggle to report breaking news first, but we find it deplorable that some news outlets saw fit to create fictionalized versions of the events as they were happening, which, in multiple cases, led to dangerous outcomes.

For starters, early in the week, CNN reported that a suspect - a dark-skinned male - was in custody and was being transferred to a federal courthouse. They then spent close to an hour speculating on the suspect, his motives, his ethnic background and more. As a result, hundreds, if not thousands, of reporters and onlookers surrounded the courthouse awaiting the appearance of this suspect. To make matters worse, a bomb threat was then reported at the courthouse, triggering even more unnecessary speculation, danger and use of police manpower at a time when those same officers had more important things with which to be concerned. We do not blame CNN for the bomb scare, but their reporting of incorrect facts, which could have been verified through the proper official channels before rushing them into the public spotlight, was outright irresponsible. Their mistake seems to have drifted into the ether and has been mostly ignored, but we can only imagine what the pundits would be saying right now if Fox News had inaccurately reported about a "darkskinned" suspect. Viewers should not let CNN forget about their mistake.

But CNN was not the only news outlet at tremendous fault. Many newspapers ran gruesome and thoughtless images of

 they did it simply to get attention. There were hundreds, if not thousands, of photos to choose from. Displaying images of severed limbs, visible bones protruding from sockets and puddles of blood was wholly unnecessary on the front page. How many parents had to explain to their children why that man's legs were missing? How many people would have been uninformed on the marathon bombing if the picture did not run on the front page?The Daily News made matters even worse. Many outlets ran the same or similar photo which displayed pools of blood and a blown off lower leg. But The Daily News saw fit to use Photoshop to make the lower leg look normal without telling their readers. This is dishonest.

But the media was not entirely alone in displaying irrational behavior in response to this ghastly event. Internet crowdsourcing - which ultimately did help the FBI find the right suspects - can be blamed for much wrong doing as well. Facebook and Reddit are not news outlets, and more people need to be aware that reading the whole story and not judging a book by its cover are credos by which to live.

In the hours and days that followed, many internet users took to the photographs of the event to draw their own conclusions about suspects, posting images of dark-skinned individuals online who were holding backpacks. The New York Post chose to run one such photo, under the headline "FBI seeks these two pictured at Boston Marathon," running the incorrect, speculative photo, prior to the FBI releasing one. Some news outlets are now reporting that one of the men in the photo is afraid to leave his house due to threats of violence.

Throughout the week, these and other claims by wellrespected news outlets showed that a sense of professionalism needs to be revitalized. The public is not in danger if you take the extra, very necessary steps to confirm a story, a tip, or new information. We understand that many of these outlets are competing for ratings and readers, but we would like to think that being respected and accurate would gain them so much more.

It's at moments such as this that Americans have historically shown what they are truly made of, and instead of fewer people showing up for an outdoor event that might be vulnerable to a terrorist attack, more people will likely show up the following year. The Boston Marathon of 2014 is already expecting the largest turnout ever. People are going to show up at this and other such events because, if they don't, the terrorists win. We will hopefully be more attentive and there will likely be more police and law-enforcement officials in attendance, but we will persevere. That's the only way we can keep defeating fear.

But when global attention turns to the mass media to see the face of disaster, the last thing they need is for the facts to be wrong. More than a week later, we are still hesitant to believe some of the stories developing in the aftermath of the bombing due to the high levels of inaccurate reporting. This is the fault of the same media outlets we have come to trust. We know Boston and the nation will recover from these events as best we can, and learn as much as can be learned to help protect us in the future. But we also hope the media elite learned some valuable lessons as well. Integrity sells. Inaccuracy and immoral and irresponsible journalism breeds outright contempt.

## You wouldn't ask a paralegal to sit in as judge

In recent months the question of what it takes to meet the standards of a journalist hit the headlines when Tina Renna, activist, blogger and president of the Union County Watchdog Association, asked for legal protection under the New Jersey Newspersons Shield Law. The answer, apparently, is not much.
Renna sought the protection to avoid going before a grand jury and revealing the names of county employees she claimed to know as having taken home portable generators during the superstorm Sandy power outage. It's these names the Union County Prosecutor's Office wanted to see, so their inquiry into the matter could be fleshed out.
Renna, who has battled against the county as an activist since 2005 , refused to help when asked, and was slapped with a subpoena to go before the grand jury, where she would be forced to reveal the names of the employees. By filing for protection under the Shield Law, Renna sought to quash this subpoena, and therefore avoid going before the grand jury.

The New Jersey Shield Law, one of the strongest in the nation, is in place to protect journalists from being forced to reveal their sources. But, there are guidelines and rules attached to this law to ensure anyone seeking this protection qualifies under it.

I sat through the two-day hearing that ensued in early March before Union county Superior Court Judge Karen Cassidy. The hearing was to provide the the judge with additional information on whether Renna was indeed a journalist, or a blogger and activist. To say this hearing was enlightening would be an understatement.

At times I cringed at Renna's arrogance and was convinced any judge would see that this blogger, albeit an excellent investigator, did not measure up to the standing of a journalist. Of course, it turned out that I was wrong. Apparently Cassidy saw that Renna met the requirements of this law, which is still mind boggling to me.

I suppose I am one of those old fashioned journalists; the kind who went through several grueling years as a rookie starting in 1989. Back then you learned the ropes from old salty editors who had 25 or 30 years in newsroom trenches. They were seasoned pros who loved being journalists and were the best mentors any rookie ever had.
I not only learned how to be a solid reporter from them, but through some kind of journalistic osmosis, I discovered there See REPORTER'S, Page 14

was more to covering the news than just getting the story. And it had everything to do with integrity and ethics.

My first year wasn't easy, but before I even headed out the door to do my first story, I was informed that as a reporter I was not the news. So any illusions of stepping up to the podi$u m$ at a governing body meeting and hammering elected officials like a attorney drilling a witness on the stand was quickly dashed.

My job was to get the stories, make sure all the facts were right and remember there was always two sides to a story. If that meant calling everyone on deadline until I tracked them down, so be it. And no, the other side didn't always like me. Far from it. Sometimes their disdain for my persistence was palpable. But eventually they came around and professional relationships were formed. Many still continue today, some 24 years after they first began.

But sure, I made plenty of mistakes along the way, and I still make some today. Every reporter does. Every person does. But as I became more seasoned as a journalist, I knew being objective was critical to gaining the respect of readers and officials alike.

In the beginning I slipped a lot of opinion into my articles, but the buck stopped at my editors who never hesitated to yell across a busy newsroom "What the heck is this? You can't say that in a newspaper!"

When it comes to doing my job as a journalist, it's not about me or how I feel about a particular issue or elected official. It's about trying hard to present both sides of an issue to the best of my ability and letting readers draw their own conclusions from those facts.

It involves a lot more than investigating an issue and then sitting down at a computer and banging out a story filled with expletives, accusations and opinion. If it was that easy I could hammer out ten articles a week in no time at all.

No municipality or county is entirely bad and all politicians are not crooks. Thus, the articles a journalist writes should never be all good or all negative. There should be a balance, because anything less looks like you either are pandering to elected officials or you have a vendetta against them.

Part of being a fair journalist is forming relationships, even though you may not always agree with the people involved. You form these relationships because both sides
need to interview both sides so my articles are as objective as possible. That is due diligence.
Not being able to call elected officials or municipal and county employees leaves you with one thing: conjecture and one sided articles.

Integrity goes hand and hand with trust. If a journalist has integrity, elected officials will trust them, whether they like the reporter or not. When you pick up the phone and call them, the majority will talk to you or call you back. That is just how it is when your intentions are that of a journalist, not an activist.

I have had mixed feelings over Renna receiving the right to use the Shield Law, and as a result being called a journalist.

Initially I was angry because it seemed the journalistic bar had been lowered. I wondered where that left all the journalists who work hard to ensure they never get close to the line of tabloid muckraker.

Things cleared for me less than two days after the ruling when Renna posted on her blog, County Watchers, in an entry titled "How my dissatisfaction with the media led me to become a journalist." She wasted no time in jumping on the journalist bandwagon but forgot there is no line cutting in journalism.

Which is not to say that Renna does not work hard. She does and has uncovered many excellent issues that possibly would not have seen the light of day. Does that make her a journalist?

The truth is Cassidy blurred the lines between a blogger and journalist and that is sad. How do we now distinguish a trained, ethical journalist with integrity from an independent blogger with an ax to grind?

I have never seen Renna write a positive article about the county and that gave me pause. I wondered what the chances were that a journalist would only come upon negative news all the time. As a reporter, I find there is good news and we have an obligation to report on it, just as we do negative news.

The truth is Renna has alienated just about every county official and all the freeholders. I don't doubt no one will speak to her at the county level. If I screamed insults and cursed at officials all the time and told them to rot in hell, as she routinely does, no one would speak to me either. But they do. Why is that?

The basic principles of journalistic integrity - objectivity
in reporting, detachment from personal bias, and a disinterested vigilance for finding the truth - are all essential in forming public trust. Without those elements, is there real truth in what a journalist or activist reports?

Journalism is undergoing a big revolution. Technology and the web have changed how information gets into reader's hands and a large segment of the population has turned to the web for a non-stop flow of continual breaking news.

But when Cassidy wrote her decision on the Renna matter, this blurring of the lines between journalists and bloggers will result in readers being confused. Will they know what Renna does is the "wild west" of journalism; a new frontier and an emerging media network where many excellent writers post, but just as many cannot be trusted to be fair and objective? Its an untamed place and Cassidy just gave Renna the right to do what she wants in the name of journalism.

Without editors, fact checkers, copy editors and a 4th set of eyes reviewing articles, journalists have to look at their own work, and readers will not know what is fact based and what is not.

Many bloggers - not all - lack the responsibility journalists have and yet want the protection of the Shield Law.

When someone wears the coat of a journalist it must be carried with great responsibility. I'm not sure Renna understands that responsibility or has the ability to be objective in any way.

I fault Cassidy as a judge for handing down the ruling she produced, because her decision will become case law.

Perhaps, to Cassidy, there was no difference between journalists and Renna. But I'm sure if some judge decided a paralegal could sit on a bench and preside over a courtroom, Cassidy would have plenty to say in defense of her hard earned judicial career. I'm sure if a private detective attempted to execute a search warrant the police would not be happy. And I'm sure a paramedic cannot perform surgery.

There is a stark difference between owning a website and filling it with blog posts by you and your friends, and working with a team at a news gathering organization complete with editors, copy editors, fact checkers, reporters, paginators, publishers and more. I was hoping that this distinction would have been made. But alas, I can do nothing but continue to provide Union County residents with integrity and accuracy, and hope it pays off.

I rest my case.

## Learn the secrets for making cut flowers last longer

Fresh flowers serve many purposes. A bouquet of flowers can be a gift on a special holiday or birthday. Some people apologize with flowers, while others use flowers to convey feelings of love or appreciation. Many people like to display freshly cut flowers in their homes because their beauty can brighten the mood indoors.

Others plant rows and rows of flowers in a garden with the express purpose of cutting them and bringing them into the home.

While outdoor flowers can remain beautiful and bountiful outside, once they are cut, there is a limited amount of time before they begin to wilt and wither. But there are ways to prolong the life of cut flowers to enjoy their beauty as long as possible.

- Cut correctly. Creating a large enough surface area on the stem for the uptake of water is essential. That is why florists recommend cutting the stem on a slant to expose more area to the water.
- Place flowers in water immediately. Some people advocate cutting the stems while they're actually submerged in water.

However, you will probably be fine if you simply recut the stems on flowers you brought inside and immediately put them in a vase of water. The key is not to let the tip of the stem dry out or close up with an air bubble, sap or other substances, preventing the uptake of water. Be sure to use lukewarm water so as not to shock the blooms.

- Remove leaves. Take off the leaves of the plant that would end up underwater in the vase. Exposure to the water could cause the leaves to rot and fall off, creating algae or sludge in the vase water. It also may breed extra bacteria or attract small insects to the water. However, do not to remove the thorns from roses, as this tends to shorten their shelf life.
- Choose young flowers. Mature flowers may have peaked and begun to make room for a new round of blooms, so try to choose young buds or blooms that just opened so that you'll have an opportunity to enjoy them longer.
- Create a viable water atmosphere. Once a fresh flower is cut and a stem is placed in water, bacteria and fungi can

start to grow almost immediately. These microscopic organisms can clog the small tubes inside the stem that suck up water for nourishment. Many florists send home a packet of water additive to alleviate some
problems in the indoor environment. The packet will contain a biocide that kills bacteria and fungi. There will be an acidifier as well as sugar. The acidifier makes the water more acidic to allow better absorption of water up the stem. The sugar is a food source for the flowers. Homeowners who cut flowers from their gardens can purchase these additives or create their own variations from items around the house. It has been said a penny in the water will kill the microorganisms because copper is a fungicide.

An aspirin can make the water more acidic. You can also try small amounts of bleach, lemon-lime soda or even antiseptic mouthwash.

- Don't place cut flowers next to fruit, which gives off gases as it ripens, causing flowers to age faster. Also, keep the flowers away from direct sunlight and try to keep them in a cool place.
- Change the water. Keep on top of water maintenance by changing it at least every 2 to 3 days to maintain good water health. Be sure to replace the additives each time you change the water.

## Don't let your lawn dehydrate

The following are a few basic watering techniques to help homeowners keep their lawns going strong through the next summer swoon.

- Water when it's coolest. Watering when the temperatures are their lowest might seem counterintuitive. After all, homeowners might think their grass and gardens need water most when the temperature is at its highest. But watering when the temperature is cooler decreases evaporation, meaning your lawn will get the water it needs and won't lose any to steamy conditions that cause evaporation. This is especially important when the amount of water you can use is limited by a drought restriction. You'll want to make sure the water you can use is actually going to the lawn and not evaporating as you're watering.
Watering in the early morning or in the evening, when the sun is not as strong and the temperatures are generally at their coolest, also reduces the likelihood that your grass will burn. That's because water attracts the sun, and a lawn that's wet in the middle of a hot day might attract too
much sun and cause the lawn to burn.
- Recognize that not all plants are the same. How much water a plant needs and how frequently it needs to be watered largely depends on how deep its roots are. A plant with shallow roots won't need to be watered for long periods of time, but it will need to be watered frequently, whereas a deep-rooted plant like a tree or a shrub will need to be watered for long periods of time but not as frequently. Research the plants around your property to determine the depths of their root systems and water accordingly.
- Lean on mulch to retain moisture. Mulch is often considered an aesthetically appealing addition to a landscape, but it serves a practical purpose as well. Mulch retains moisture during the hot summer months, reducing the need to water, which is a valuable benefit during a drought restriction.
Mulch also makes it difficult for weeds to grow, which can keep homeowners from spending their hot summer afternoons pulling weeds out of their gardens and flower beds.

## For safety on the water, find the right life jacket for you <br> Many people assume that simply wearing a life jacket or <br> fitting children with a personal flotation device is one of the

another personal flotation device is enough to provide adequate safety while enjoying activities on the water. But just as important as wearing the flotation device is that it fits properly

Selecting a life jacket is not a one-size-fits-all scenario. Nor are all life jackets suitable for all types of water sports and other marine activities. The amount of buoyancy the jacket provides is relative to the activity and the size of the person wearing the jacket. Furthermore, it is unwise to think that children can simply wear an adult life jacket in a pinch.

According to the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, life jackets that are too small or too large can come off or ride up in the water. A jacket that rides up can end up rising over the mouth and nose, making breathing difficult. The proper fit of a life jacket is one where the jacket is snug, but not suffocating. All the zippers, ties, straps, snaps, and other connection points should be correctly secured.

Those who have experience in the water can test out the fit of a life jacket by walking into the water up to the neck. After lifting up the legs and tilting the head back, the person should be able to float comfortably and not have to put any effort into staying above water. Furthermore, the life jacket shouldn't obstruct the mouth. The person should also be able to swim easily on the back or side without restriction of the arms.

In terms of children and life jackets or flotation vests, the Division of Boating and Oceanic Recreation of Hawaii says that
most frequently asked questions of boating-safety educators.

Typically, children 12 years and younger are expected to wear a life jacket at all times when in a boat or around the water. This means kids will spend significant time wearing the life jacket, so it should be comfortable and fit properly.

According to DOBOR, children's life jackets are typically designed around three sizes. An infant device is for children under 30 pounds. A small child is appropriate for children 30 to 50 pounds. A youth size is right for children 50 to 90 pounds. Larger children may graduate to a small adult's size. Life jackets for young children may have a flotation collar that helps to keep the head upright, as a child's head tends to be his or her heaviest part of the body. In addition, there will likely be a strap that secures between the legs to prevent vest from riding up.

All life jackets should be replaced when they start to fade to the color of the inside label. This might be indicating that their safety protection may have started to deteriorate.

In addition to properly fitting a life jacket, it is important to practice being in one in the water. While life jackets may keep adults and children afloat, they may not keep a struggling person face up. Therefore, it is advisable to remain calm in the water while wearing the flotation device.

Life jackets can save lives when properly fitted and worn correctly. Also, many people prefer to purchase life jackets that are a Coast Guard approved device for added protection.


Many sports require a life jacket. It's important to know how to select and adjust the right model.

## What's new? Wakeboarding!

Water enthusiasts take to rivers, lakes and oceans for scores of different marine activities. The popularity of water sports has exploded, including a growing interest in wakeboarding.

Wakeboarding is an activity where a person is pulled behind a motorboat at about 20 to 24 miles per hour. Instead of water skiing, the boarder uses a single board that resembles a snowboard, though wakeboards are shorter than snowboards and slightly wider. The feet are bound to the board with either straps or a boot-like device so that the board will not fly off of the feet while doing tricks.

Statistics indicate that there are more than 3.1 million wakeboarders across the globe. Roughly 75 percent of wakeboarders are males ages 13 to 24. Wakeboarding has become the fastest-growing water sport.

An offshoot of traditional boat-propelled wakeboarding is cable wakeboarding. This is where the wakeboarder is attached to a permanent, overhead ski lift-type cable that stretches across a body of water and connects to fixed towers. The cable pulls the wakeboarder to ramps where he or she can execute tricks.

Wakeboarding, particularly cable wakeboarding, has become so popular that it may someday qualify for inclusion in the Olympics. While currently part of the X-Games \& Gramty Games, the International Olympic Committee announced cable wakeboarding as one of eight new sports being considered for the 2020 Summer Olympic Games.

The rise in cable parks is also notable. There are two wakeboard cable parks in Canada and roughly 30 in the United States. Individuals can purchase passes to enjoy the park at a fraction of the cost of renting a boat and refueling.

Wakeboarding is an adventurous water activity that seems to be here to stay. Now may be the time to try your hand at wakeboarding and see if this water sport can become one of your new favorite summer activities.

## Obey the rules of the road when you're riding a bicycle

Streets provide means of transportation for motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians. When so many different people come together on the roadways, particularly of varied shapes and sizes, there's the potential for safety problems if everyone isn't working together.

Although most drivers must pass a test and driver-education classes, including gaining practice on roadways, the same testing measures are not in place for cyclists. Even though bicycles are not powered vehicles, they are governed by the same rules of the road as trucks, cars and motorcycles.

While there may be the potential for injury, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention state that it is relatively low when safety procedures are met. At the forefront of bicycle safety is wearing a helmet

Males of the age 9 to 15 cycling in the summer without a helmet make up the highest number of bicycle incidents in the United States, according to the American Academy of Family Physicians.

Even with low incidences of bicyclerelated injuries, it may still be prudent for avid cyclists to take a class or refresh their knowledge of bicycle rules of the road. In most areas of North America, bicycles and tricycles can be operated on all roads unless otherwise prohibited. Areas where bicycles are often prohibited include bridges and tunnels. A drivers' license is not needed to operate a bicycle, but rules may vary if the bicycle is powered or has been modified with a small engine. It is best to check with the Department of Motor Vehicles to determine the rules where you live.

Cyclists must ride on the same side of the road as vehicular traffic and in the same direction. Just like motorists, cyclists must obey all traffic control signs and signals. Both cyclists and motorists should yield the right of way to each other - one does not have preference in a right of way.

Many cyclists fail to signal their turns and ride in a predictable manner. This can be dangerous and lead to accidents. Hand signals can be used to indicate turning intentions if electronic signals are not installed.
If riding at night or during dusk, a headlight and reflectors can help promote visibility, as can a rear, red flashing light.

Riding on roads is not as safe as riding on sidewalks, but most cities and towns prohibit the riding of bicycles on sidewalks, particularly in urban centers. When any riding is done, a helmet should be worn for personal safety; it also may be the law

Because bicycles may be harder to see and hear than cars and motorcycles, there
are some other safety precautions cyclists can take to avoid accidents.

- Do not ride in the blind spots of other vehicles.
- Do not assume you can overtake or pass a vehicle that has the power to go much more quickly than you.
- Do not follow cars too closely to allow for adequate reaction time.
- Wear light colored or reflective clothing so that motorists can see you on the road.
- Use a bell or horn for further indication that you are in the area.
- Do not assume that because you are on a bicycle you can dart in and out of traffic.
- Be aware of parked cars on the side of the road. Some safety authorities say approximately 5 percent of bicycle accidents occur when someone opens a parked car door in front of an oncoming bike.

Along the same vein, motorists can be more aware of cyclists on the road.

- Give cyclists a safe distance when passing.


Avoid bicycle accidents by following the rules of the road, which govern drivers, bikers and walkers.

- Slow down when passing a cyclist.
- Do not assume you have dominance over the cyclist.
- Do not try to goad the cyclist or scare him or her by veering in their direction.

This cat-and-mouse game can be dangerous.

Cyclists and motorists can share the streets safely when they use some common sense and follow the same rules of the road.

combine incredible beauty with dire peril. Roses and raspberries have thorns, but those are nothing compared to the small daggers that bedeck the stems of hawthorns and flowering quinces.

There is not a flower lover on earth who, when sighting a flowering quince in full bloom, would not want to march right up and clip a few stems. Those who have never dealt with quince before will leave the raptures behind quickly as fingers collide with spines, which can be three quarters of an inch long and exceedingly sharp. Nature will have her little joke.

Flowering quince - Chaenomeles japonica, Chaenomeles speciosa and hybrids - have been enchanting and lacerating us for a long time. The japonica species was introduced to the United States from Asia in 1784. The somewhat less impressive speciosa species arrived in 1815 . The quinces caught on quickly. For some time, flowering quince was known as Pyrus japonica, a nod to a closely related Reneceae family member, the pear tree, whose species name is Pyrus.

I coveted flowering quince for years before finally acquiring one about five years ago. Mine is a white-flowered variety, which is not what I ordered. What I really wanted was something closer to Vita's old fashioned Boule de Feu, or "Bowl of Fire,"

which has flaming scarlet petals. When the tiny plant arrived, it was duly installed and cosseted for two years before it flowered. By the time that long-awaited event took place, it was too late to get a replacement. Besides, the white flowers are lovely and a few branches rebel and produce red blossoms. They stand out like beacons.

The mislabeled plant is now about 5 feet high with a 4 -foot spread and is currently covered with scores of blossoms. They remind me a bit of apple blooms, to which they are related. Of course I clip off branches for the house, making sure to clip all the spines before they even pass the threshold. Once impaled, twice shy.

The difference between flowering quince and common quince - Cydonia oblonga is that common quince is grown primarily for its aromatic, pear-like fruit, and the flowering variety, which may also fruit, is grown for its flowers. My flowering quince bore two fruits last year and the fragrance was intoxicating. I am looking forward to more fruits this year, if the weather and the bees cooperate. If I harvest more of them, I will stew them with apples, which makes a delicious quince/applesauce.
writer Vita Sackville-West, co-creator of the great gardens at Sissinghurst in Kent, England, mentioned flowering quince many times in her garden column for the English newspaper The Observer. She recommended using them en masse for flowering hedges. Needless to say, the quinces would do double du'y in that situation, barring intruders with a wall of barbed branches.

Quinces can also be grown as specimen plants, or incorporated into a mixed annual, perennial and shrub border. They appreciate the same conditions as other members of the rose family - full sun and rich, loamy soil. Like many beautiful things, they tend to grow in an undisciplined manner. Prune them after flowering.

In Vita's day, the most popular flowering quinces were single-lowered varieties, like my shrub. Now, judging by the catalog listings, people want fluffy-flowered doubles. Among the popular cultivars are members of a flowering quince series with the trademarked name "Double Take." Within that series are varieties christened "Pink Storm," "Scarlet Storm" and "Orange Storm." For lovers of architectural plants, some catalogs carry Chaenomeles contorta, which has pink-tinged white, single or semi-double flowers and branches contorted in a manner similar to Harry Lauder's
ta. If space is a problem, try the alpine variety Chaenomeles japonica var alpine which has single orange flowers and grows only 1 foot high with a 2 - to 3 -foot spread.

You can still get single-flowered vari eties, like Chaenomeles Spitfire, with stunning red-orange blossoms. Jet Trail is a white-flowered cultivar with single petals and Kan toyo bears pink blooms.

Beauty is the best reason to invest in flowering quince. Don't be intimidated by the spines. For centuries, gardeners have grown all kinds of spiny things, including barberries, cacti and holly, and managed, using a combination of gloves and caution, to enjoy them without being seriously maimed.

# Cranford garners UCT base top seed Cougars going for 8th crown

To nobody's surprise at the seeding meeting at Cranford High Sctiool Monday night, state-ranked Cranford earned the top seed once again for the 60th annual baseball Union County Tournament.

As of Monday night, Cranford was 7-0, ranked No. 2 in the state and was Union County's only undefeated team.

On Saturday morning, Cranford came back to win at Delbarton 2-1, with Delbarton ranked No. 4 in the state at the time.

As the top seed last year and also as the two-time defending champion, Cranford was defeated by eighth-seeded Union 3-1 in the quarterfinals in a game that was played at Union because Cranford's field was not playable.

Cranford has won the UCT seven times, all under 15th-season head coach Dennis McCaffery, including in 1999, 2000, 2001, 2003, 2007, 2010 and 2011. McCaffery is $7-0$ in UCT finals.

Scotch Plains, with a record of $7-1$ as of Monday and only a 10-8 loss at Watchung Division rival Gov. Livingston last Tuesday, was in linusto garner the second seed. The Raiders last won the crown in 2009 and have reached the semifinals every year since 2008.

Dayton, which reached the semifinals last year, was 6-i and had won six straight since opening with a 12-2 Mountain Division loss at Roselle Park April 2. Dayton won the Mountain Division last year.

Union Catholic was 8-2, with its only loss to a Union County school being its $7-1$ setback at home to Dayton last Tuesday in Mountain Division play. Union Catholic won the Mountain Division in 2011.

Summit, which dropped down to the Valley Division this year, had a record of 7-2 before playing GL Monday and led the Valley Division with a record of 5-0. The Hilltoppers also produced one-run wins at home over Essex County schools Newark Academy and Glen Ridge.

## Williamson strong pitching lifts Cranford past Delbarton

MORRIS TOWNSHIP - Among the many clichés in the sport of baseball is that a pitcher's best friend is a double play.

Last Saturday the wind - blowing in a bit - was just as friendly to Cranford pitcher Ryan Williamson.

After hitting a home run the opposite way over the right field fence in the bottom of the fourth to give his team the lead and break up Williamson's perfect game, Delbarton senior Jeff Anderson just missed tying the game with another home run to lead off the bottom of the seventh.

This time he crushed a Williamson fastball deep to left field, with everyone in attendance thinking that it was going out. Instead, it was a fly out to left, with the ball caught just a step in front of the 350 -foot sign in left-center.
"Off the bat I thought it was another home run, but my shortstop, Tommy Trotter, said it wasn't out and that it was going to stay in the park," Williamson said.
"I thought for sure it was going out and then I looked again and said, 'oh no, the wind is blowing it back in'," Anderson said. "I didn't hit it off the sweet part of the bat, but I hit it good."
"It looked like it was gone off the bat," Cranford senior catcher Chris Folinusz said.

Last Monday Anderson worked out the details, although there is no athletic scholarship money yet, to join Folinusz next year at Rutgers.
"When it was hit he put a good swing on it and made good contact," said Cranford head coach Dernis McCaffery, who last Thursday in his 15 th season it was reported that he won his 300th game at the helm of the Cougars. "I thought it was gone. I thought our left fielder did a nice job of making the play."

Three batters later - with the tying run on second base - Williamson retired Brian Rapp on a line out to second as Cranford held on for a 2-1 come-frombehind road win at Delbarton's Brian E. Fleury Field.

Cranford, which last week was ranked No. 2 in the state by The Star-Ledger, improved to $7-0$. Delbarton, ranked No. 4, saw its record slip to 8-2-1.

Williamson, one of the top left handers in the state and who will continue at North Carolina State, was outstanding, tossing a two-hitter in a 94 -pitch performance that saw him allow only four baseruniers. He threw first-pitch strikes to 21 of the 25 batters he faced and retired the side in order in the first, second, third and sixth innings.
"I was throwing a lot of first pitches for strikes and my curveball was on today, it was breaking," said Williamson, with Anderson - ironically - hitting a curveball for the home run he slugged while down O-2 in the count.

Williamson, now 3-0 this season and 20-5 lifetime with his last loss coming as a sophomore, retired the first 11 batters he faced until Anderson's home run with two outs in the fourth gave the Green Wave a 1-o lead.

# Cougars begin week with 7-0 record after big victory <br> (Continued from Page 47) 

Williamson has allowed only one run in three starts so far this season, with his first two wins coming at Morristown-Beard 4-0 on April 5 and at home against Union 3-o last Tuesday.
"My changeup was called a couple of times and that was working for me too, I was throwing that for strikes," Williamson said. "I was fortunate to have all three pitches (fastball, curveball, changeup) going for strikes today."

Williamson struck out 10 - eight swinging and two looking - and walked two, one in the fifth and one in the seventh with two outs. He struck out the side in the sixth on 12 pitches, getting all three batters swinging. The most pitches he threw in an inning were the 22 he tossed in the seventh.
"Every time Ryan's on the mound he always puts us in the best possible shape; we've just got to put more runs on the board," Folinusz said. "There's not much more you can ask for. He throws strikes to get people out. If he's spotting up and keeping things low you can't touch him."
"Ryan pitched a very good game, was highly-competitive and kept his composure the whole game," McCaffery said. "He did an outstanding job against a very, very good team. He had control of three pitches."

Delbarton catcher Chris Schafter produced his team's other hit, connecting on a single up the middle to lead off the bottom of the fifth. Schafter also walked with two outs in the bottom of the seventh, with Delbarton's courtesy runner reaching second on Williamson's only wild pitch.

Cranford was in good shape to score first off Delbarton senior righty Adam Schreck in the top of the fourth when senior Sean Feeney drilled a shot to the right-center gap that went for a leadoff triple. However, Feeney was stranded after the next three batters were retired on a line out and two ground balls.

The Cougars also had a runner on third with two outs in the fifth, but was unable to push across a run.

Cranford, down to its final five outs, struck for both of its runs in the sixth. Feeney, with one down, went the other way to produce a hit down the left field line that went for a double. Batting second in the lineup, the lefty-hitting Feeney - a four-year starter - was $2-$ for-3, with two extra-base hits and a walk.
"Sean's a battler, he's been doing it for four years," McCaffery said. "He's gone to morning hitting every day for the last four years and he hits before school every day. He's an extremely hard-working player who gives everything he has every day."

Andrew DiFrancesco followed with a shot to right field that went over the outfielder's head and reached the bottom of the fence. His double - Feeney had to hold up on the basepaths to see if the ball was going to be caught - put runners on second and third with one out.

Folinusz, Cranford's cleanup batter, was intentionally walked to load the bases. Williamson, who had a bloop single to right-center in the second and a ground out to first in the fourth, was up next.

On a 0-1 count, Williamson pushed a pitch the other way to left field for an RBI-single, tying the game at 1-1. The bases remained loaded.

Schreck was taken out, tossing 72 pitches in 5 and $1 / 3$ innings. Schreck was eventually charged with both Cranford runs, while he struck out four, walked one and allowed six hits.
"He threw me a knuckleball on the first pitch and on the second pitch he threw me an up-and-in fastball and I just waited on it and took it the other way to left field," Williamson said.

With Rapp now pitching for Delbarton, Cranford senior Jake Forrestal hit a ground ball to second base that the infielder booted, but picked up and threw to first base to nip Forrestal, despite the protestations of Cranford fans behind the fence who yelled at the umpire to tell him that he made the wrong call.

The ball was not hit quite hard enough for a potential inning-ending double play to keep the game tied at 1-1. What it did was bring in Cranford's second run, with Forrestal producing the game-winning RBI.
"Our guys wanted to play them really bad, they're a solid team," Williamson said. "So are we."
"We battled, but just couldn't come through," Anderson said.

NOTES: Cranford, which was scheduled to play Johnson Tuesday in a Union County Conferencecrossover contest, was selected as the top seed again for the 60th annual Union County Tournament.

The UCT will continue Saturday with eight firstround games at the higher seeds.

Cranford has won the tournament seven times - all under McCaffery - with championships captured in 1999, 2000, 2001, 2003, 2007, 2010 and 2011. The only title the Cougars did not win last year - they won division, section and state championships - was the UCT when Union senior lefty Devin Zimmerman handcuffed them 3-1 in the quarterfinals. Cranford was also the top seed last year as the two-time defending champion.
"Last year was a stinger vs. Union," Williamson said. "We're ready for the county tournament, but we're going to take it one game at a time."
"Seeds don't really matter," Folinusz said. "We just have to play our game and come out and win every game.
"We can't let our guard down. We just have to keep playing tough all year."

Cranford began its season April 2 with a 12-1 win at Memorial of West New York.

The Cougars then won at Morristown-Beard and followed up that victory with a 12-4 triumph over Linden in their home-opener on April 9.
