

In final weeks, primary race heats up Lesniak, Obe file complaints, with each alleging illegal campaigning tactics by the other

With just days until residents living in the 20th district head to the polls to decide if Democrat State Sen. Ray Lesniak deserves another two-year term in Trenton, his challenger Donna Obe accused him of violating campaign finance laws and he returned the favor by doing the same.

Lesniak, who has served 36 years as a state senator representing the 20th district, alleged the president of the board of education spent more on her campaign than legally permitted and was financed by Real Democrats For Change freeholder candidates who are limited by law to giving another candidate \$24,600.

Obe, on the other hand, specifically pointed to examples of how Lesniak is breaking the law. She noted in her complaint that the incumbent illegally used a non-profit organization to promote his candidacy, engaging in "deceptive and misleading" practices by using the non-profit, Infinite Possibilities NJ, when it is, in fact, "an arm of Lesniak's campaign."

And as the campaign for the Democratic primary winds down, neither candidate was taking any chances.

Infinite Possibilities NJ is operated by Lesniak's campaign manager, nephew George Devanney, and two of his former staff members. Lesniak admitted this was true, but pointed out any connection he had with Infinite Possibilities NJ was stopped prior to Obe announcing her candidacy.

But Obe did not buy it and she offered supporting evidence in her court document.

"As proof positive of this connection, Infinite Possibilities is running televised commercials which feature Lesniak's name and image and which direct viewers to *RaymondLesniak.com*, which is paid for by the Election Fund of Raymond Lesniak," the complaint alleged.

Obe's legal counsel said this put The Real Democrats

For Change candidate "at a unfair and impermissible disadvantage."

Lesniak refuted Obe's accusations, stressing that while he has been above board in his campaigning, Obe has not.

"I have a grave concern that she has offered nothing but a negative campaign," said Lesniak, adding that he does not blame the candidate but rather the Elizabeth Board of Education.

Lesniak pointed to the fact that Obe has not raised any funds on her own, according to party insiders. This brought into question exactly where Obe was getting the money to spend on her campaign, which Lesniak challenged in his court complaint.

Lesniak said in an interview with *LocalSource* Tuesday he strongly believes Obe's campaign money came directly from the Real Democrats for Change slate of candidates running for freeholder, who he maintained are aligned with See ALLEGATIONS, Page 21

Many have tried, but very few have seceded

Secession has been around since the Civil War, and even earlier. In fact, secession is rooted in the American structure, Even Abraham Lincoln argued that people had the right to stand up to government in favor of another form of their choosing. And that is exactly what Berkeley Heights is doing by taking steps to secede from Union County.

The last time a New Jersey town managed to successfully secede from one county to another was in 1931 when a section of Washington Township in Gloucester County joined Gloucester Township in Camden County.

But as recent as ten years ago, six towns in Essex county, including Millburn, attempted to secede because of high taxes. and lack of services. Although these towns did not succeed in their quest, they did get the attention of Essex county leaders which resulted in steps being taken to resolve some of their concerns.

Rutgers Law Review articles editor David M. Reiner wrote a comprehensive review of secession in New Jersey and the law involving such a move. His paper "Secession in the Garden State: the Secession Movement in Essex County, New Jersey and the Law of Deannexation," delved deeply into this issue, explaining not only the difficulty of a town attempting secession, but also the history of what it entails.

Towns, like Berkeley Heights, who have the right to make such a move, join a long line of other New Jersey towns that have had similar complaints.

Reiner pointed out that despite the difficulty of actually getting through the red tape involved with seceding from a county, "secession is a unique tool for groups that oppose the government." He maintained that unlike historically well known revolutionists, a secessionist does not deny a government's authority but rather the authority it has over them.

Although, when most people hear the word secession they think of it as something that took place back around the Civil War, nothing could be further from the truth. Secession is happening all over the country, and usually in towns that have become dissatisfied with how their county government is functioning. Usually the problem comes down to runaway taxes and the inability for a town to resolve the issue.

Hudak asks why Linden councilman was saved from vote

With more than \$128K in back taxes owed, councilman's delinquent property removed from tax auction at last minute

LINDEN — The Regular Democratic Organization thinks the council pulled a fast one last week when at the 11th hour they saved a council member's business property from being sold at a tax sale.

On May 21 when the city held a tax sale for 40 properties with outstanding taxes, one name was removed from the list: Reliable Tire, owned by 7th Ward Councilman Jack Sheehy and his brother. Although initially it was unclear why the property mysteriously disappeared from the list, it was not long before the issue became political.

On Friday, Linden Democratic Chairman Chris Hudak called for a full and thorough investigation into why this happened prior to the tax sale, which was carried out under the Jones Act for the first time.

The Jones Act enables municipalities to sell liens at auction for properties that previously had no bidders during annual tax sales. Unlike regular tax sales in which bidders pay the taxes on a property and then hold a lien on it until the owner either pays the bidder off or sells the property, the Jones Act allows properties with outstanding taxes to be sold outright.

Under the Jones Act auction, which the city council gave their nod by resolution in April, the winning bidder becomes the restricted lien holder that must foreclose within two years from the date of the acceptance of bids.

To maintain the status of primary lien

holder, the bidder must pay the back taxes on the property in question. This allowed for consistent tax payments to be made to the municipality on properties that have not been paying any taxes for a long time. In some cases years.

Tuesday city tax collector Stacey Carron explained that the Jones Act is the final form of enforcement that state of New Jersey offers tax collectors when they are faced with property owners who are delinquent in their taxes.

The list of 40 properties, which included superfund site Linden Chlorine owing \$13 million in back taxes, was Sheehy's business on St. George Avenue owing \$129,369.94 in back taxes.

Hudak said that according to information he received, it was city officials who had Sheehy's property removed from the list. Later the governing body, along with Sheehy, voted to accept all bids with the exception of his own property. Hudak had a problem with how this transpired.

"I am greatly troubled at what appears to have transpired at city hall this week," Hudak said, adding that on the day of the vote, the councilman's property was the only one removed from the list.

"Councilman Sheehy has a financial stake in one of those properties on the list and his involvement in this process is wrong. At best he should have recused himself from any vote that has a property belonging to him on it. At worst, we need to find out how and why his was the only property removed from the sale list," he said, adding that he intended to ask the Union County Prosecutor to investigate this immediately.

Sheehy's family has owned Reliable Tire on St. George Avenue "since they put shoes on horses," he said. Although it once was a See **COUNCILMAN**, Page 13

Park officially named as acting Union County Prosecutor

Its official now. Late last week Attorney General Jeffrey Chiesa announced that Westfield resident Grace Park will be the new acting Union County prosecutor.

Park is replacing longtime prosecutor Theodore Romankow, whose term was over in late January.

"I am confident that Grace Park will do an outstanding job of leading the effort to bring criminals to justice and protect the residents of Union County," said Chiesa. "Having worked with her at the U.S. Attorney's office, I know that she is an intelligent, energetic and capable lawyer and will be extremely dedicated to the mission."

Park is a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley and Harvard Law School. She was employed by the New York law firm of Cravath, Swaine and Moore as an associate from 2000 to 2003 and as an Assistant U.S. Attorney with the U.S. Attorney's office in Newark from 2003 to 2010.

During her tenure with the U.S. Attorney's office she prosecuted cases involving health care and government fraud, terrorism and violent crime. Most recently she served as Senior Corporate Counsel with the pharmaceutical manufacturer Pfizer,

Inc. Park commented briefly on being appointed as acting prosecutor, but did not go into any details about how she will tackle this new position.

"I am honored to take on the responsi-

bility of serving as acting prosecutor," said Park. "I look forward to the job of combating crime, helping to make neighborhoods safer and working with our law enforcement partners at every level — as well as other stakeholders — to serve the citizens of my home county."

Although Romankow, who served two 5-year terms, expected to be reappointed, as the months went by that failed to materialize. The prosecutor was appointed by Democrat Gov. James McGreevey in 2002 and reappointed by Democrat Gov. Jon Corzine for another five years.

The appointment of Park as the chief law enforcement officer of the county came without fanfare, and in fact was done quietly behind the scenes. Even Romankow admitted that his conversation on the evening of May 15 with Chiesa was very amicable.

The prosecutor, who will stay at the helm until June 17 when Park takes over, said he understood why things turned out as they did.

"Christie is a good man, and he has appointees he wants put in," said the prosecutor who has come under fire in recent years from a local activist group.

Chiesa had nothing but praise for

Romankow, commenting on his long service in a statement.

"I commend and thank Prosecutor Romankow for his leadership, his innovation and his dedication to the crime-fighting mission," said the attorney general, adding that "the people of Union County have been well-served throughout his more than a decade as Union County prosecutor."

Chiesa said Romankow established an excellent track record of investigating and prosecuting gang and drug cases, including many mid-to-high level drug dealers. He also credited Romankow for leading the the creation of a countywide "mental health court" in Union county designed to connect low-level offenders with necessary medical treatment and social services.

Romankow did not know exactly what avenues he would be pursuing after leaving the prosecutor's position, but he said he was open to new possibilities.

Although prosecutors are not allowed to be involved in politics, the political influence they wield can be enormous.

"I'm ready to move on," the prosecutor said right after hearing he would be replaced, adding that he was always aware that he could be replaced.

(Continued from Page 1) successful is Massachusetts, which was able to eliminate or reform county government in all but six of 14 counties in the late 1990s. These secessionists were frustrated by the increasing burden of county taxes, which eventually resulted in the changes that now exist in this state.

While not successful in their secession bid, Reiner noted that in 1989 Staten Island managed to get the ear of New York when dissatisfaction led to an all out effort to break away completely. While there was a great deal of opposition from then Mayor Ed Koch, the move led to significant reform, such as the closing of the Fresh Kills landfill and an end of fares on the Staten Island Ferry.

Reiner noted that the formation of counties dates back to colonial times when assessors were elected from each town to determine the value and scope of county property. Over time the county assessor became the county board of freeholders.

New Jersey initially was split into four counties, including Essex County, which was established in 1682. Actually, there are four forms of county government in the state.

Included were the county executive plan with an elected chief executive and board of freeholders; the county manager plan that allowed an elected freeholder board to appoint a county manager; the county supervisor plan with an elected freeholder board and elected county supervisor; and lastly, the board president plan which places the executive power in the hands of the board president who must be a sitting member of the freeholder board when elected.

However, while this system of county government generally remained in place, here in the east both Rhode Island and Connecticut have no functioning county governments at all.

In Reiner's report, he explained the biggest obstacle facing municipalities wishing to secede is where to go.

In the case of Millburn, because this town bordered both Union and Morris counties, they had the option of joining either one. Ironically, at the time, Millburn

officials had discussions with Springfield, Summit and New Providence about the possibility of forming a new county if all the towns were able to secede from their own counties. However, even forming a new county comes with its own problems and legislative headaches.

In order to form a new county, which is a viable option for disgruntled municipalities, both the assembly and senate have to approve the move by a two-thirds majority vote. However, the first hurdle facing towns wishing to secede would be getting a non-binding referendum to pass at the polls.

The idea of creating an entirely new county was originally created by Cedar Grove in 2004, and immediately picked up by Verona, who was also seeking to secede from Essex County. But Verona was forced to take the question of forming a new county off the ballot because forming a new county is a decision for the legislature, not a local municipality.

According to Reiner, there are two forms of secession, or "deannexation," municipal and county. Attempts by municipalities to secede from one county and join another are rare in New Jersey history. Despite this, and the fact that the towns in Essex County never did secede, ten years later Berkeley Heights is jumping on the secession bandwagon. What are their chances? That depends on certain variables. For instance, Berkeley Heights is aware of state law governing secession and has followed the rules required leading to placing a non-binding referendum on the ballot. Including being aware that by the first meeting in August they have to pass a resolution that they are seeking a referendum.

In order to get the question on the ballot, a municipality must file a request with the county clerk no later than 74 days before the Nov. 4 election.

The result of the election is nonbinding, which means a town does not have to do anything about seceding from the county, but merely shows the sentiment of voters, Reiner said. If Berkeley Heights decides to move forward from there, the final step is the most crucial and difficult: putting the issue before the New Jersey legislature in order to get a twothirds majority approval vote from both the assembly and senate.

Interestingly, although the New Jersey legislature did not address the secession drive in Essex County, Republicans State Senator Tom Kean Jr., Assemblyman Jon Bramnick and the late Assemblyman Eric Munoz did become involved at the time. The three legislators sponsored a bill involving deannexation in their respective assembly and senate houses.

The proposed bill never went anywhere, even though Reiner said it would have made things easier for towns wishing to withdraw from their own county.

But it also could have presented a roadblock because county officials could prevent withdrawal, which would then leave the municipality to


legally prove the move was arbitrary and unreasonable. Reiner said that, though, would be difficult to prove.

In February 2004 Essex County Executive Joseph DiVincenzo reached out to the five towns wishing to secede with plans for significant projects within their borders, Reiner said. Further he agreed to form a task force to examine county, municipal and educational services, with a goal of reducing the tax burden on towns.

Whether Berkeley Heights continues their quest to withdraw from the county or the two manage to work toward resolving the issues this town finds problematic remains to be seen. By August there should be some indication of whether this municipality is serious about secession or is merely calling the county's bluff.

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
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A MEMORIAL DAY – A veteran sits poised atop a float and waves to the crowd during Union's annual Memorial Day parade on Monday.

Active shooter drill prepares Cranford PD for the real thing

At approximately 10:10 a.m. on May 21, a faux 9-1-1 call was received at Cranford Police Headquarters reporting an active shooter situation at Cranford Health, a local extended care and skilled nursing facility. Information from the caller was relayed by Communications Officer Kathleen Ditzel to police units in the field. In less than 90 seconds, a contact team comprised of four Cranford police officers armed with rifles and handguns arrived on the scene and entered the building. Moments later, the shooter was neutralized and an injured victim was rescued by the responding officers.

The entire incident was a planned drill designed to test the operations, policies and procedures of the two organizations, and to enhance the level of cooperation and communication between facility staff and police in an emergency. Detective Robert Montague coordinated the drill for the Cranford Police Department, along with Robert Gasper, Maintenance Director for Cranford Health. Observers from both organizations were on hand to evaluate and critique the incident and response.

In the simulated scenario, a lone gunman entered the facility, injuring one person and killing another. The facility implemented its existing lockdown plan and notified police immediately. Responding police units were able to utilize training recently received as part of their regular active shooter training curriculum. Montague is trained by the National Tactical Officers Association as a certified active shooter instructor.

"The key to responding appropriately in a real life emergency is frequent training," he said. "The more opportunities we have to train with realistic scenarios, the better prepared we are when we need to respond to an actual event."

According to Jean Morris, the facility administrator, the entire scenario was a great learning experience for her and her staff.

"The two agencies working in conjunction led to a successful drill, she said. "The staff performed their roles exactly as they were trained, and the expertise and professionalism of the Cranford Police was readily apparent."

Morris stated that the company holds regular drills with staff in order to prepare for as many potential emergencies as possible.

Cranford Police Chief Eric Mason said that the Cranford Police Department regularly trains for active shooter and barricaded subject emergencies.

Internships: a good tool for today's teen

Summertime is almost here and, with it, a chance for teenagers to earn some money during their vacation from school. Today's teens, however, might not find it

so easy to find a well-paying job this summer. According to unemployment data for April released by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the number of unemployed teens ages 16 to 19 is 24.1 percent. And thanks to the lingering effects of the "Great Recession," things don't look to be getting any brighter in the coming months.

The solution for many of today's teens is an internship. While there is no immediate payout for interning, teens who choose to go this route can gain valuable experience in areas in which they might have an interest. If it turns out they like what the job offers, these students then might pursue this career with more confidence. And if this career isn't to their liking, imagine the time, effort and money they will have saved by not choosing this career path.

Many employers would love to pass along some of the knowledge they have accumulated during years in their career. There are, however, specific national guidelines to which employers must adhere, and teens need to make sure their internships follow these rules. According to the Fair Labor Standards Act, the six criteria are nothing new and are, in fact, based on a 1947 Supreme Court decision regarding trainees. If you, as a teenager, are considering becoming an intern, you need to know what these rules are.

If you are a for-profit employer, the criteria are as follows: • the internship, even though it occurs in the facilities of the employer, is similar to training that would be given in an educational environment;

the internship experience is for the benefit of the intern;the intern does not displace regular employees, but

works with close supervision of existing staff;
the employer who provides the training derives no immediate advantage from the activities of the intern and, on occasion, its activities may actually be impeded;

• the intern is not necessarily entitled to a job at the con-

ship.

• the employer and the intern understand that the intern is not entitled to wages for the time spent in the intern-

clusion of the internship; and

The state of New Jersey has its own criteria which, although similar to the federal stipulations, have some additions:

• the student should be at least 16 years of age;

 the activity must be related to a formal school-to-work transition plan for a student learner;

• there is collaboration and planning between work site staff and school staff resulting in clearly identified learning objectives related to the non-paid activities;

any productive work is incidental to achieving learning objectives;

• the student learner receives credit for time spent at the work site and the student is expected to achieve the learning objectives;

 the student learner is supervised by a school official and a workplace mentor;

• the non-paid activity is of a limited duration, related to an educational purpose and there is no guarantee or expectation that the activity will result in employment; and

• the student learner does not replace an employee.

These rules are in place to ensure that, while an internship is a mutually advantageous arrangement, the student is the one who receives the most from the partnership in the long run. It's a good move for the employer, too, in that it provides an opportunity to give something back to the community while introducing potential future workers to a possible career. And, from the employer's perspective, having an outsider involved in some of the day-to-day workings of a company is sometimes the best way to see where activities, that have been reduced to a routine, could be improved. So, in the long run, this is a win-win arrangement for everyone involved and something every teenager should consider, especially in today's job market.

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The '100% quality experience'

By early Sunday afternoon the small crowd at the round bar at the Linden TGI Friday's seemed unmoved by the recent raids by the Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control. Located just off Route 1 in the city, the holiday weekend and the lack of any hot sporting events may help to explain the small number of patrons for the five high definition televisions.

Earlier in the week "Operation Swirl" had been conducted. Investigators raided bars and sampled drinks. After quickly analyzing the booze at 29 places, including 13 TGI Fridays, the charges varied from replacing scotch with rubbing alcohol and substituting cheaper booze for "top shelf liquor."

The president of the company that owns the TGI Fridays issued a statement "if the allegations are true, we will take immediate steps to correct any issues that may have led to less than a 100 percent quality experience for our guests."

For this Linden TGI Fridays and all other establishments serving alcohol, they will face far greater problems even after the state is done with "Operation Swirl."

The National Transportation Safety Board is urging that the legal limit for intoxication be lowered from .08 percent to .05 blood-alcohol. The argument by the government agency includes the risk for a crash at .05 is about half as much at .08. The group faces some heavy duty opposition from the Governors Highway Safety Association supporting ignition locks for first-time offenders as an alternative.

Even the well known Mothers Against Drunk Driving advocates high tech solutions which prevent convicted drunken drivers from operating a vehicle after drinking.

For one couple sitting at the Linden establishment, by ordering their second round of drinks the impact could have been significant under the proposed law change. Sarah Longwell of the American Beverage Institute argued "Further restricting the moderate consumption of alcohol by responsible adults prior to driving does nothing to stop hard core drunk drivers from getting behind the wheel."

The New York Times estimated a 130 pound woman could only consume two drinks in 90 minutes and still be under the proposed reduced standard. For a 160 pound man, three drinks would be over the top.

Sitting under the bar sign at TGI Fridays in Linden which reads "Ultimate Cocktails" the patrons seemed unaware of the raid or the reduction proposals.

A good bet is they didn't hear the heavy weight argument of the NTSB. The estimate is that if the new standard was developed, an additional 1,000 lives would be saved yearly.

The opposition to any change in the blood alcohol level could be significant. It took 21 years for the states to adopt the changes from .10 to .08.

Another limit reduction could have a significant customer impact. The new business adjacent to the Linden TGI Fridays, including the Harbor Tools and Dollar Store could ironically end up being the main anchors at the shopping center.

Saturday hours to make vote-by-mail process easier

Union County Clerk Joanne Rajoppi will open her offices in Elizabeth and Westfield on Saturday, June 1, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. for voters seeking last-minute mail-in ballots.

The office in Elizabeth at the Union County Courthouse, 2 Broad St., and the office in Westfield at 300 North Avenue East, will be open as a public service for those voters who choose the Vote-By-Mail option for the Primary Election to be held on Tuesday, June 4.

"Every voter should have the opportunity to cast his or her ballot in the primary election for state, county and municipal offices," Rajoppi said. "We want to ensure that even those who have a last-minute change of plans can have a chance to vote."

Sample ballots for the Primary Election in each Union County municipality may be viewed by going to the County Clerk's website: *http://ucnj.org/sample-ballots*.

"By opening the Elizabeth office on the Saturday before the primary election, as we have done for the past 17 years, along with the Westfield office, which has regular Saturday hours throughout the year, we hope to assist those citizens whose work schedules or other commitments keep them from applying to Vote-By-Mail during the work week," Rajoppi said. "This option makes voting more accessible, particularly for senior citizens."

Completed ballots will be kept in a secure lockbox under the control of the Union County Board of Elections, who will collect them for counting.

The Clerk's office has processed more than 700 mail-in ballots to date for the Primary Election.

To obtain a Vote-By-Mail application, voters may download the form at the County Clerk's website: *http://ucnj.org/voteby-mail*, but they must bring the completed application to either of the County Clerk's offices on Saturday, June 1, between 9 a.m. and 1p.m., or on Monday, June 3, before 3 p.m.

Roselle is celebrating the grand reopening of Leonard "Bud" Simmons Park, the first park to be restored as part of a threepark initiative.

Polk Park will be converted to include extensive landscaping, new trees, lighting, checkerboard tables and a three-tiered water fountain. A highlight of the revitalized Polk Park will be a children's art wall featuring monthly exhibits installed by Roselle school children. Chandler Avenue Park will include a new gazebo, clock tower, playground equipment, new landscaping, lighting and new benches.

Roselle is expected to hold similar celebrations throughout the summer to commemorate its new parks, Holley said. "Showcasing these improvements allows residents to experience firsthand the fruit of this investment," he said.



Councilman admits tax lean, but denies any wrongdoing

thriving business they put tires on everything from wheelbarrows to huge cranes, in recent years it was a combination of things that caused the business to become delinquent in their taxes. Sheehy explained Tuesday in an interview that the economy, and an inability to find reliable, hard workers certainly caused the business to take a hit. But when his kidney failed and he had to be on kidney dialysis three times a week, it was a death knell for the business he has shared with his brother.

"Our family has owned a business at this location since the 1890s. First it was a blacksmith then it evolved into the tire business it is today," Sheehy explained.

"First our family put shoes on horses and now we put shoes on cars," the 7th Ward councilman quipped, adding it was a shame his health caused things to get to the point it has.

Sheehy readily admitted the business property was behind three years in taxes, but he said he never asked anyone to intervene on his behalf so the business would avoid being sold at the tax sale last week.

"I never said a thing to anyone," the councilman added, but Sheehy did say that any business that was in the process of being sold could be removed from the list. That, he added, saved the day for Reliable Tire.

"I'll bite the bullet for the business, and not paying the taxes, but I never said anything to council," said the councilman who has served two terms and is running in the primary Tuesday against one of Hudak's candidates.

The real problem, as Sheehy saw it, is that Hudak wanted the councilman to run on the Regular Democratic Organization ticket in the primary but Sheehy refused.

"Every Friday for eight weeks he called me and asked me to be on the Democratic line, but I refused. I'm an independent Democrat. If you live in Linden you are a Democrat, but there are different lines," the councilman said.

Even though Sheehy needs a kidney transplant and is on dialysis, he was not willing to give up his seat on council.

"I can't walk away because of the people in my ward. They depend on me," he added.

The problem, he said, is that the regular Democrats realized that it was their political party that put the city in the financial trouble it is in now.

"Plus, I have a major problem with Chris Hudak being Democrat Municipal Chairman and his father being the city attorney. That is a conflict of interest. It's like telling the enemy you are going to attack," Sheehy said.

The 7th Ward councilman is hoping the primary and general election in November will result in Emanuel Donelson being elected to council so there will be "six of us on there forming a majority."

"We need that so we can get things moving in Linden," he added, noting that the way things are right now, "we can't get anything accomplished."

Hudak, on the other hand, is not interested in any of Sheehy's explanations. As far as he is concerned, there is only one solution to the entire mess.

"Councilman Sheehy should end his re-election bid. What appears to have transpired on May 21 is a disservice to the residents of the 7th Ward and the entire city of Linden. Not only has Sheehy cut services and raised taxes due to the city but his recent act deprives the city of a payment of \$15,661.73 in taxes due the city," said Hudak, who also sits on the Union County Freeholder Board.

Sheehy said he will never step down regardless what anyone says about him.

"After all that has happened to me, this is nothing. They can't intimidate me. I do this for the people of my ward, not politicians," said the 7th Ward councilman.








Marching orders

Cod Cakes with Spicy Sauce

Here is a great recipe if you are trying to get your children — or your adult-sized children — to eat fish. The other ingredients mask the fishiness of the fish. Enjoy!

Ingredients

1 pound steamed cod, or any other flaky fish you like

1 large peeled, diced, steamed potato 1 tsp. lemon pepper, or 3/4 tsp. ground pepper with a half to a whole lemon, squeezed

1 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. garlic powder

2 Tbs. grated onion

1/3 cup panko bread crumbs 2/3 panko for breading

3 Tbs. olive oil, one Tbs. butter, for frying; you may need more

Method

In a large bowl, combine all the ingredients, except for the panko breadcrumbs, and mash with a potato masher or fork.

Stir in 1/3 of the breadcrumbs until combined.

Form into patties, about 3 inches wide

Place 2/3 cup breadcrumbs in a shallow bowl and dip each patty in and press down so that they are covered on both sides with the crumbs. Shake off excess.

In a medium-sized skillet, preferably ceramic non-stick, pour in enough of the olive oil and butter to cover the pan, about a Tbs. of oil and a tsp. of butter, and heat until hot.

Fry patties until browned on one side, flip and brown the other side.

Repeat, adding more oil and butter until all patties are crispy. Serve with sauce (see below). Makes about 12 patties.

Sauce

-	one Tbs. mayonnaise
-	1 1/2 Tbs. sour cream
	18 tsp. spicy smoked paprika
1	1/8 tsp. garlic powder
	Stir all ingredients in a small bowl
	until combined, and chill.

Allegations fly as primary winds down

(Continued from Page 1) the Elizabeth Board of Education.

The senator also said he felt his challengers campaign failed to focus on issues facing the 20th district, and instead relied heavily on smear tactics.

"That doesn't help the people we represent," said Lesniak, adding the job of state senator requires not only understanding the issues, but also being able to bring about legislation needed for the residents of the district and state as a whole.

"My campaign is about my record of creating jobs, funding education, reducing violence, and supporting women's issues," said the senator, adding that he is running on his record over the last three decades, which included bringing in \$4 to \$5 million more in school funding for towns like Roselle, Union and Hillside.

But while Obe's party has continued to make allegations about the long serving senator, he refused "to get down to that level."

"I run a totally positive campaign based on the issues affecting the residents of my district," the state senator said, but added he did have a problem with someone breaking state campaign finance laws and that is why he filed a complaint against Obe.

"That is not right," Lesniak said, noting that in addition to that, he provided evidence in his court complaint that the Real Democrats for Change freeholder candidates solicited campaign donations on school grounds by selling tickets to fundraisers.

"I have a witness that will attest to that in court," Lesniak said.

But Obe had even more legal concerns about the longtime senator's current campaign.

Obe also had a major problem with a widely circulated mailer that initially appeared to be in support of the appointment of Superior Court Judge James Wilson on behalf of the Roselle National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. The Real Democrats for Change claim it merely was a campaign piece about Lesniak.

More damming, they maintained, is the mailer looked like it was paid for by the Roselle NAACP, but Obe's complaint said this is "absolutely false." This organization, they claimed, did not pay for the mailer or the postage, which was discounted using a bulk mailing permit.

"The NAACP mailer, therefore, falsely suggests that the Roselle NAACP supports Lesniak, falsely states that the Roselle NAACP paid for the mailer, impermissably coordinates with the campaign activities financed by EFRL, and fails to disclose the actual source of the funds for the mailer," the complaint alleged.



With just days left before residents go to the polls on June 4 for the primary election, both Democratic Sen. Raymond Lesniak, above, and challenger Donna Obe, below, have been slinging allegations back and forth, with both candidates filing complaints against each other for campaign violations. Lesniak says he is trying to take the high road, while Obe insists that the road less traveled by Lesniak himself is the only good one.

Tuesday Lesniak denied paying for the NAACP mailer, again referring to the negative campaign his challenger and her party opted for in the weeks leading up to Tuesday's primary.

"What about the real issues facing the 20th district? That is what we should be discussing," Lesniak added.

Real Democrats For Change Campaign Manager Francisco Gonzalez, though, challenged Lesniak on this, explaining in a complaint letter to the U.S. Postal Inspection Service that the NAACP did not approve or partake in the mailing of the flier.

"The clear conclusion is that this is a fraudulent mailing which attempts to deceive the residents that this decidedly positive clear view of candidate Lesniak was somehow sanctioned by the NAACP. It clearly was not," the letter said, demanding an investigation by the postal service.

Supporting this claim is a "certification letter" by Roselle resident Anthony Esposito who received the mailer and took issue with it. He also said in this letter that he attended a NAACP breakfast fundraiser shortly after receiving the mailer where chapter president, Myrtle Smith Counts, "vigorously denied any involvement in the preparation or distribution of the flier."



According to information supplied by Real Democrats for Change, the bulk mailing permit used to send the mailer belonged to Bravo Media of Carlstadt. Although Lesniak denied paying for the mailer, a spokesperson for Obe, Barry Brendel felt differently.

A copy of Lesniak's campaign disbursement sheet sent to the state showed a check issued to Bravo Media on March 1, 2013 for \$1,829.85, "just before the mailing was sent," according to Brendel.

Jerome Dunn of Hillside, who ran against Lesniak in the primary two years ago, was outraged by this disclosure.

"I'm not sure which is more outrageous: The illegality of this postal fraud or the arrogance of claiming an esteemed organization like the NAACP paid for your campaign mailer without them even knowing about it — and thinking you are so powerful no one will challenge you," Dunn charged.

On the other charge by Obe, Lesniak has admitted publically and in the media that the non-profit ran two commercials in March promoting him and distributed campaign literature promoting his reelection. But the state senator denied Obe's allegations, pointing out that he stopped the ads after filing for the primary. He confirmed that again Tuesday.

The 20th district, comprised of Elizabeth, Kenilworth, Roselle and Union, has been a hotly contested district in the past, with Lesniak coming close to losing his seat two years ago when Dunn challenged the powerful veteran legislator.

Had it not been for Democrat Assemblyman Joe Cryan of Union, who has a strong party following there, Lesniak would not have won his seat back. But even though Cryan pulled out all the stakes for Lesniak with district wide support, Lesniak apparently did not do the same for Cryan.

Shortly after the primary, when Cryan was fighting in Trenton to maintain his seat as assembly majority leader, Lesniak turned his back on the veteran assemblyman and former state Democrat chairman. Subsequently, Cryan lost that bid.

Adding to these woes is the fact that the Democratic party in Union County has seen definite cracks in its once solid foundation in recent months.

With Union County Democratic party leader Charlotte DeFilippo stepping down as county chairwoman right after the primary, the future of the once solid political front is unknown.

The primary should give an indication of whether Lesniak's powerful hold on the 20th district is as strong as ever, or if carelessness had tainted his chances of retaining his seat in Trenton.

Tuesday Lesniak was confident about the primary, explaining that he was relying on his tenure as a senator.

"People in this district know that I work hard for them and that they need someone with experience in Trenton," he added.

Enjoying the underrated beauty of silverbell trees

Four years ago I planted a little Carolina silverbell tree — Halesia Carolina, sometimes known as Halesia tetraptera — in front of my house. It wasn't much of a tree then. Rescued from potential oblivion after failing to sell at a charity plant sale, it was only about 4 feet tall. I had a space that needed a tree and since all I had to invest was the time and exertion required to plant it, the silverbell looked like a good deal. It had leaves, took up water readily and responded to my tender ministrations by putting out some new growth.

The silverbell's first winter was harrowing. Besieged by heavy snowfall from the day after Christmas through March, the sapling spent most of the winter encased in an iceberg created over the many weeks when successive layers of snow were thrown up by the town plows. I was convinced that it was doomed. By the time spring finally arrived, I had resigned myself to that fact. The silverbell was less resigned, however, and sprouted a few dangling, bell-like white flowers in a triumphant demonstration of horticultural resurrection. After that, there was no turning back, despite two years of horrendous October storms, including Hurricane

Sandy. Now the tree is about 8 feet tall, with a good, strong central trunk. This spring it produced so many silver bells that even the local dog walkers gave it high praise. It has the potential to grow between 25 and 40 feet tall, but will probably finish on the shorter end of that range because of its streetside location.

Like many inhabitants of the New York metropolitan area, the silverbell is not native to these parts. It grows wild in the southeastern quarter of the country, including the state referenced in its common and Latin names.

English botanist Martyn Rix, writing in his wonderful book, "The Botanical Garden, "describes Carolina silverbell and its relatives with faint praise, saying only, "The American species are hardy and attractive small garden trees." The same might be said of the common redbud — Cercis canadensis — which is much more widely planted. The Carolina silverbell obviously needs a better publicist. There are only five Halesia species in existence, one of which is native to Asia. Mountain silverbell — Halesia monticola is the closest in appearance to the Carolina species. Both bear the distinctive drooping "bells," each composed of four petals fused at the base. The mountain species grows a bit taller and is somewhat more tolerant of hot climates, but would work in most of the same landscape situations as its Carolina cousin.

Carolina silverbell, which is also available in a pink-flowered form, makes an excellent specimen tree, but begs to be included in gardens. It would be lovely underplanted with spring bulbs, including little species tulips. One of the tree's alternate common names is "lily-of-the-valley tree," and it would be equally appropriate to surround the tree with true lilies of the valley - Convallaria majalis - to underscore the theme. The lily of the valley would also provide fragrance, something the silverbell blooms lack. For fragrance later in the season, plant some August lilies -Hosta plantaginea - nearby. They are my favorite among the millions of hosta species and varieties because their flowers are large, white and intensely scented.

I have always wanted to have an estatetype driveway with rows of trees planted on either side, forming a European-style allée. Silverbell would be perfect for this and the fallen flower petals would form a romantic snowy carpet in the spring. Of course, in order to make this particular landscaping dream come true, I would have to acquire the estate first. I will close my eyes and think of silverbells every time I buy Power Ball lottery tickets.



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
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

RC's record-setting team runs off with accolades Sets school mark in sprint medley event

Roselle Catholic's record-setting sprint medley relay team ran off with plenty of accolades from the school's annual spring athletic convocation.

Mike Cianci, Tyler Tucker, Matthew Boscia and Nael Jean-Jacques set the school record of 3:37.5 at the 2013 Union County Relay Championships.

Tucker, who ran 22.6 in the 200 meter leg of the relay, was tabbed Most Valuable Player of the Lions' spring track team.

Record-setting shot putter Adia Ledbetter, a Linden resident, garnered MVP recognition for the girls' squad.

Cianci, also a Linden resident, received the Lyons Memorial Scholarship, established by Peter Lyons, a 1973 Roselle Catholic graduate.

The award presented to Cianci, who captured Union County Conference-Valley Division titles in the 200 meter dash and 400 intermediate hurdles, is based on sportsmanship, personal integrity, discipline and teamwork in recognition of the values associated with the RC insignia. 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
