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County considers leasing golf courses

Last week the Union County Improvement Authority explained why they are actively studying the purchase of the county's two golf courses and how it will benefit taxpayers in the long run.

Although the county currently owns both Galloping Hill in Union and Ash Brook in Scotch Plains, officials are certain there is a more efficient manner of handling these two golf courses. In fact, if the county continues in the direction they are headed, there is a good chance the debt load they are carrying as a result of building the \$16 million state-ofthe-art clubhouse at Galloping Hill and other improvements to both courses can be paid down faster.

That move would also put all risk in the hands of someone other than the county or the UCIA, according to Union County Public Information Director Sebastian D'Elia, who also sits on the UCIA board.

"One advantage to having the UCIA handle this operation is they are independent, more flexible and have more advantages at their disposal than the county to work with a professional at leasing the courses," D'Elia said.

"That doesn't mean the county won't be getting any revenue," he added, pointing out this would all have to be worked out between the national company leasing the operations, and the authority and county. But, the UCIA has considerably more leeway when becoming involved in this type of arrangement.

Alliance taking steps to get back to its roots

Two years ago the non-profit Union County Alliance was receiving \$322,125 a year from the county and doing little more than producing a 20-page newspaper twice a year that was heavily slanted towards the Democratic party and freeholder accomplishments. Has anything changed since then?

Although the UCA seemed to flounder in 2012, with only temporary leadership in

place and basically nothing accomplished, this year that changed and so did the county's approach to overseeing where those taxpayer dollars were going.

In 2011 when LocalSource reported that UCA president Michael Murray, who once was the county communications director, was earning \$115,861 a year to produce two tab-sized newspapers published in the spring and fall but doing little else, it was apparent something was amiss.

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Roselle Park residents still question lack of zoning enforcement

ROSELLE PARK — Residents living in the West Clay Avenue area are fed up with town officials having allowed a fitness business to continue to operate since November despite receiving multiple summonses for being in violation of zoning laws since November.

When *LocalSource* last reported on this situation in early April, residents were waiting for Regina Mendes Doman of Union, the owner Easy Fitness with Jeannie at 293 West Clay Ave., to appear in municipal court later in the month. They had a long wait. That hearing and others were all delayed until June but the proceedings were moved to judge's chambers so residents have no idea what took place or why the business continues to operate seven days a week.

According to residents of the area, the business owner was told to comply with the zoning laws by June 17 but they said this never happened and no one can get any information about what the business owner was required to do or if she has to comply with the law at all.

Mayor Joseph Accardi recently met with one of the frustrated West Clay Avenue residents living across the street from the noisy business, agreeing "mistakes had been made" with this particular business owner. He told the resident he would be "looking into the situation personally." So far, though, the resident has not heard what, if anything, transpired as a result of Accardi's intervention. Calls to the mayor last week by LocalSource were not returned.

Residents said they are sick and tired of hitting a brick wall when trying to get the town to enforce the same laws every other person in town has to comply with in order to operate a business.

"I mean what do we have to do in order to get this business to comply with the zoning laws?" said another resident who lives near the fitness center.

"Seven days a week she is going stronger and stronger and having more and more noisy Zumba classes and no one is doing anything to help taxpayers over here," said another resident who also did not want her named used.

Adding insult to injury, said the West Clay Avenue resident, is Doman has now added to her business by bringing in a chiropractor and massage therapist.

"This is crazy. Look at how much time has gone by and she continues to break the See 'ZUMBA PARTIES', Page 7

Complaint against district officials rejected

ELIZABETH — An admistrative law judge rejected a claim that two Elizabeth school officials used school records to obtain phone numbers for political robo-calls in 2011.

In a 35-page opinion issued late last week, the Office of Administrative Law Judge Leslie Z. Celentano dismissed charges brought against an Elizabeth Board of Education Assistant Superintendent of Schools Jerome Dunn and the school Information Technology director Alberto Marsal.

The judge's decision is a matter of law, but the complaint was an ethics complaint and therefore was automatically sent back to the School Ethics Commission for any further possible action. Filing exceptions, which are similar to but not the same a legal appeals, are not uncommon in cases of this nature. There is no right to appeal the decision.

The charges, brought to the School Ethics Commission by political allies of Mayor Chris Bollwage and Democrat State Sen. Ray Lesniak, according to sources, charged Marsal with obtaining telephone numbers from school records and giving them to campaign workers for Dunn so robo-calls could be made on his behalf in the 2011 primary election. Dunn was Lesniak's opponent in that election.

The political nature of the charges were brought out under testimony from Michelle Cetta, a Bollwage supporter who filed the complaint, and Susan Mettlen, a former board employee now working as a director of student assessment at Union County College. The judge found Mettlen created evidence against Marsal, according to the transcript of the court proceeding obtained by LocalSource.

"An administrative law judge has now confirmed that political opponents of the Board of Education have manufactured false evidence and delivered false testimony," said Tony Monteiro, president of the board of education.

"This is the natural result of the ceaseless, out-of-control campaign by a partisan political faction which will do anything to add the board of education to the Union County and City of Elizabeth governments they already control with an iron hand," the school board president added.

Monteiro said this political faction had no trouble spending taxpayer dollars by forcing the board to defend itself against lawsuits that find nothing.

"They have filed bogus ethics complaints time after time, solely so they can charge that members of the board are under investigation. Now they stoop to forging documents. It is just fortunate that the evidence has all been laid out and that they have been caught," he said.

Although the complaint charged that Dunn referred to himself as the assistant superintendent of schools in some 2011 primary campaign robo-calls, the judge who decided this case found the New Jersey School Ethics Commission "provided no evidence that Marsal acquired telephone numbers from school records," and none that Dunn referred to himself as the assistant superintendent of schools. In fact, recordings of the calls, according to court testimony, demonstrated that he did not. The court further rejected Mettlen's allegations that Marsal accessed the board's computer See **COMPLAINT**, Page 4

(Continued from Page 3) system to obtain telephone numbers.

"Even if Mettlen's testimony was credible and believable, which it was not, it would have been impossible for Marsal to acquire the only telephone numbers at issue here," the judge found. In fact, the court concluded that Mettlen, with administrative rights to all computers, logged in and changed Marsal's password and then logged back in a minute later as Marsal, all from her home. This was proven in court when Mettlen's computer IP address was discovered when she logged in on the computer both times.

Mettlen took this information to the prosecutor, which started the ball rolling legally against Dunn and Marsal. Mettlen, a key witness against the board of education, was a former director of education information for the school district. According to the transcript of the hearing, Mettlen





admitted under oath that she was the source of information to both investigative reporter Ted Sherman of the Star-Ledger and James Russo of the Union County Prosecutor's Office.

The judge found both Mettlen's and Cetta's testimony "evasive and riddled with inconsistencies and illogical assertations."

Most telling was the 35 documents provided by Mettlen and considered by the court as alleged evidence against Marsal, were found to be "forged in his name by Mettlen," the judge said.

This is not the first time Mettlen, who lives in Cranford, had problems involving an employer.

According to testimony in that case, Mettlen had a conflict of interest regarding her role in awarding computer contracts for the University of Tennessee, directing \$16,000 to herself through a company called Burnett & Associates. The \$16,000 appeared to have been "used for mortgages and credit card payments, and other personal expenditures," a university audit proved.

The administrative law judge in the Elizabeth case found Dunn and Marsal to be "believable and persuasive and their demeanor to be highly credible." In terms of Cetta, the judge found she was a committeewoman in her ward and had "Bollwage for Mayor" signs on the front lawn of her home.

Both Mettlen and Cetta were represented by Daniel McCarthy, a major contributor to both the Lesniak and Bollwage campaigns. McCarthy campaign contribution records were admitted into the case as evidence.

Monteiro said he has directed board legal counsel to forward the judge's findings regarding evidence of Mettlen's manufacturing evidence to the U.S. Attorney, the New Jersey Attorney General as well as Union County College, where she is employed.

The school board president also said he was deeply gratified by the court exonerating Dunn and Marsal in the strongest terms.

"The Bollwage-Lesniak complainant tried to delay this case just so they could claim the Elizabeth Board of Education was 'under investigation.' I know the character of Jerome and Alberto and my heart went out to them during the past two years. They should be gratified by the resounding rejection of these unfounded allegations by the court and the school ethics commission's enforcement section should be ashamed of itself for pursuing them," Monteiro said in a statement to LocalSource.

Cetta and Mettlen could not be reached for comment.

Yet every year the county continued to award this 501-C4 independent non-profit organization more than \$300,000 in taxpayer dollars without any safeguards in place to ensure the people working for the UCA were actually doing their job. The cry from the county was that the UCA was merely a "vendor" and it was not their responsibility to oversee how the money was spent.


Even after it became apparent Murray had not tackled any economic development projects in five years or embarked on longrange planning for the county, which was the goal of the UCA when it was founded in 1993, the county refused to comment or get involved.

Trying to uncover what was going on, though, was difficult.

Because organizations classified as nonprofits are not required through the Open Public Records Act to provide financial or budget information, this made it almost impossible to gauge what the UCA was actually spending money on. Telephone calls and visits to the UCA also resulted in a dead end. In fact, there was little indication anyone was coming in to the UCA offices at 1275 Westfield Avenue in Rahway.

There also were inconsistencies when it came to the UCA's financial records. Local-Source was able to obtain copies of the UCA's 2009 tax return showing expenditures tallying close to a half-million dollars, including over \$100,000 for conferences, meetings and conventions. Murray, who could not explain the expenditure, merely said the tax form was filed incorrectly and would be corrected.

However, he failed to explain how a "mistake" made in 2009 by an accountant on a tax form filed was just being discovered in 2011. When pressed, Murray also could not explain what economic development projects he undertook since taking on the job several years before. A few months later Murray resigned under pressure after being unable to explain these expenditures and the work he performed for them. Afterwards, the UCA "board," comprised of



members who told LocalSource they had not met in years, appointed a temporary president.

Eventually the county slashed the amount of money going to the UCA by close to a \$100,000 when Chairman of the UCA Board, Mauro Checchio, was appointed as acting president.

The UCA had long been a political target for the Republicans, who accused the Democratic freeholders of funneling taxpayer dollars into the UCA. In 2005 the Union County Republicans went as far as to ask state officials to investigate whether the Democrats violated campaign finance law by not reporting several taxpayer-funded publications. It still remains unclear whether the state ever resolved this issue and calls to the state resulted in a dead end.

Last week LocalSource used the Open Public Records Act to obtain any and all documents the county drafted concerning the UCA. This included any contracts or documents sent to the county by the UCA. Although these documents were delayed slightly, when they were received it shed considerable light on how the county is handling the UCA at this point.

However, the UCA contract, which clearly protects the county from any liability, does not actually specifically lay out what the county expects from the UCA president. Confusing is why the contract, usually signed in January, was just signed Monday by county legal counsel Robert Barry and County Manager Al Faella after LocalSource requested a copy of the document. Usually this contract is drafted and signed in January.

According to the documents obtained by this newspaper, in February Checchio sent a letter to the county requesting they the enter into the same professional services contract with the UCA they have over the years. He also asked that the county award the UCA the \$232,125 they were expecting to receive in early January.

Checchio maintained this funding would "allow the UCA to provide bi-partisan leadership and support for the continued economic advancement and growth of Union County." It did not, however, indicate how the UCA expected to facilitate that promise.

Instead, Checchio merely handed over the same photocopied information Murray previously provided to the freeholder board. This included a UCA mission statement, background paragraph on how the UCA was formed and other general information that was not specific. Also provided, as requested by the county, was a proof of liability insurance and the UCA's New Jersey business registration certificate.

Shortly after that everything changed. According to documentation from the county, not only did Geoffrey Perselay take over as UCA president, which LocalSource reported when it happened in April, but the county quietly changed how the \$232,125 would be disbursed. Now this funding is paid out quarterly with the county demanding a detailed accounting of how taxpayer dollars were used before any more money is

handed over the following quarter.

In April, Perselay sent the county a project report, requesting that the county provide a first quarter payment of \$95,792.05, which is more than they would receive.

'This request is based on actual expenses incurred during the first quarter of 2013 and an advance request of projected expenses for the second quarter," the UCA president explained.

According to information obtained using OPRA, Perselay is making around the same amount as Murray, or slightly less. Rent for the office is \$3,150 a quarter, utilities \$1,500 a quarter and "other expenses," \$12,000 for the first guarter, \$10,000 for the second. Reports and publications in the first quarter were \$6,250, and for the second, just \$2,000. In the second quarter Perselay listed his largest expense for 'studies," as \$14,850.

In a summary of accomplishments he submitted to the county in his quarterly report, the new president made note that the UCA had "continued to work in cooperation with the county, elected officials and legislators," which is a direct conflict with what the county said in the past about the connection between the two.

Perselay also pointed out the UCA was working on Union County Means Business, a partnership with the county and county business leaders to develop the 2013 networking series. He said he arranged for four networking breakfasts this year, noting the kickoff event was "extremely well attended."

He also brought up that Union County Directions, the UCA newspaper previously distributed twice a year, would be published quarterly, with the addition of a web-ready publication. They are also developing an email database to expand this venue.

One of the major projects being tackled by the UCA this year is the Brownfields Resource Guide and Inventory. This updated report includes photos, research and identification of Brownfield sites in the county. Perselay is planning a conference See ALLIANCE, Page 15

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


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First aid on display

'Zumba parties' continue despite outcry from nearby neighbors

(Contiued from Page 3) law," he said, pointing out that now there are Zumba parties with very loud music.

"They blast the music so loud that you can't enjoy your own home," he said, adding that he is completely baffled as to why this business was not shut down.

Doman applied for a certificate of occupancy last year for a business that would be offering "health, nutrition counseling and services," but even the town is aware a fitness center is in violation of local zoning laws.

According to documents obtained by LocalSource, from the start Doman never indicated she would be operating a fitness center seven days a week. Her attorney, Robert Renaud of Palumbo and Renaud in Cranford, did send a letter to the borough zoning officer on Sept. 27, 2012 requesting a "Waiver of Site Plan Review" for the change of tenancy. He noted the type of business was an appropriate change of use. However, it appears the Roselle Park zoning officer never checked into the matter further to ensure this was indeed factual.

After requesting documentation through the Open Public Records Act, one of the residents living near the business discovered borough attorney Richard Huxford eventually contacted the business owner about the violation in a letter dated Dec. 7, 2012. He followed up with additional letters Jan. 14 and Feb. 1.

The letters are evidence the borough was well aware that Doman was in violation of the waiver. Huxford pointed this out in his letter, noting that even though Doman said she would be engaging in a permitted use, a fitness center with Zumba classes was not one of the businesses allowed in that particular zone.

In December Huxford ordered Doman to "cease and desist all fitness activities," adding if she continued with the classes and did not obtain a revised waiver or variance from the Municipal Land Use Board she would receive summons for violating zoning requirements. Doman also was told that in addition to violating zoning laws, she failed to obtain the proper permitting for the sign she erected, which also could subject her to a summons.

Doman failed to cease operation or apply for the required sign permit and was issued two summonses in February. One for the zoning violation and another for erecting a sign without a permit. Although a court hearing was scheduled in late April, the case was delayed and delayed again. Eventually there was a municipal court hearing, but residents were not privy to what took place.

Prior to Easy Fitness with Jeannie moving into the site, the land was leased by a state agency providing programs for adults with autism. To say things changed radically would be an understatement, said a resident of Russell Street, who preferred their name not be used.

"I don't know what kind of repercussions there would be because this woman has to know someone in town hall or be related to them for this to go on. I don't need the town coming after me and slapping me with a violation," he said.

Parking also is a major problem since the fitness center is operating seven days a week. Although the previous tenants had only 8 to 10 vehicles entering the area, according to residents there are 20 cars an hour looking for parking spaces in the evening and on weekends because there are not enough spaces adjacent to the business.

Although contacted, the mayor, Huxford, the borough Construction official and the owner of the business did not return calls by press time.

Shredding program makes stop at Kean University

The Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders announces that its next mobile papershredding program for personal documents will be Saturday, Aug. 10, at Kean University in Union.

"Union County's mobile document-shredding service helps residents fight identity theft and eliminate clutter in their homes," said Freeholder Vice Chairman Christopher Hudak, liaison to the Solid Waste Advisory Council. "It is a cost-effective way to assist our recycling efforts and it ties in with Union County's other Go Green Initiatives."

Kean University campus is located at 1000 Morris Ave. in Union. NEXCUT Shredding of Teaneck will be shredding documents at the site from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., rain or shine. The shredding event will end before 1 p.m. if the shredding truck reaches capacity.

All Union County residents are eligible to use the paper-shredding service. In an effort to accommodate everyone, there is a limit of four, 10-pound bags or boxes per person. Documents should not be bound. Remove plastic binders and paperclips. Paper that is wet or damp will not be accepted. Residents should continue to recycle non-confidential papers and magazines with their municipal recycling program.

Documents are put into 96-gallon containers provided by the shredding company. The items are then dumped onto a conveyor belt and shredded on site. Participants are welcome to view the shredding process via a closed-circuit television. The shredded documents are then recycled, shipped to paper mills and used as pulp. The next shredding event will take place Thursday, Sept. 12, at the Linden Recycling Center.

Marine terminal is a wise investment

Election season is in high gear in New Jersey, especially since the death of Sen. Frank Lautenberg, who died in June at the age of 89. The primary to

determine which Democratic candidate will vie against which Republican candidate took place Tuesday, Aug. 13, too late to list the results in this week's edition. The two victors will be squaring off in the general election on Tuesday, Oct. 16, to finish Lautenberg's term, meaning they will have just two months to define their candidacy. High on the docket of issues to discuss will be the fate of Port Newark-Elizabeth Marine Terminal.

Although the significance of Port Newark-Elizabeth Marine Terminal may not be first in the minds of many voters, it should. A major component of the Port of New York and New Jersey, it is located on Newark Bay and serves as the principal container ship facility for goods entering and leaving the New York-New Jersey metropolitan area, as well as the northeastern quadrant of North America. It consists of two components - Port Newark and Elizabeth Marine Terminal, sometimes called Port Newark and Port Elizabeth, respectively - and is run by the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. The facility is located within the boundaries of Newark and Elizabeth and is significant to both Essex and Union counties.

How significant? The port is the 22nd busiest in the world today, but was ranked No. 1 as recently as 1985. It is the largest port on the eastern coast of the United States and ranks behind only Los Angeles and Long Beach, Calif., as one of the largest ports in the country. Since 1998, the port has seen a 65 percent increase in traffic. In 2003, the port moved more than \$100 billion in goods. According to an opinion column by U.S. Rep. Rodney Frelinghuysen, R-11, today, more than 90 percent of global trade, valued at more than \$1.7 trillion, moves by ship. He further states that this port spurs more than \$36 billion in economic activity each year, as well as being responsible for 279,000 jobs, representing \$12 billion in annual wages. At the same time, he goes on to say that the port generates more than \$5 billion in annual tax revenue to state and local governments.

The Port of New York and New Jersey is not without problems though, problems which can only be fixed by making considerable financial investments. Plans have

been under way for billions of dollars in improvements, including larger cranes, bigger rail yard facilities, deeper channels and expanding wharves. The

height of ships serving the port is limited by the Bayonne Bridge over Kill Van Kull, a limitation that will become more serious when the Panama Canal expansion project opens in 2015, with a third set of locks that will permit bigger ships to reach the port from Asia. Raising the height of the Bayonne Bridge by 64 feet and creating a clearance of 215 feet is expected to cost approximately \$1.3 billion.

Unfortunately, this is only one part of the repair work needed. A harbor-deepening project is needed to create deeper channels and berths. The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey has already invested more than \$2 billion in this project; federal money is needed to meet the demands, which is where our new senator will come in. As the chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee's Surface Transportation and Merchant Marine Infrastructure, Safety and Security Subcommittee, Lautenberg worked with U.S. Sen. Robert Menendez, D-NJ, to get the bridge project's review process fast-tracked by the Obama administration. Just last year, Lautenberg and Menendez had announced the subcommittee's approval of \$68 million to make critical improvements to the channels of the Port of New York and New Jersey, particularly deepening the harbor.

The Port of New York and New Jersey is essential to the health of New Jersey and, indeed, the entire country. We must make every effort to improve it. As the well-being of this port goes, so goes our state and nation. The project has a potential of creating more than 6,000 construction jobs. When coupled with its importance to the region's long-term economic outlook, President Barack Obama was prompted in July to select it as the first large-scale infrastructure project to be granted fast-track review status with his administration's "We Can't Wait" initiative. But this requires federal money, and lots of it. We need a senator who will step into the fray and fight for his constituents.

The election is in two months; we will be watching to see who recognizes this wise investment and jumps at the chance to support it.

The post purchase sales pitch is now a growing part of the shopping effort. We have all experienced the effort of waiters at the Outback in Springfield when after asking for the check I was questioned if I want-

ed dessert and coffee. We have all experienced the charity pitch at places like the Shoprite in Garwood for a food-related charity after the cash register is done ringing.

Even the banks are now out there pitching. On Saturday, a cashier at the Wells Fargo Bank in Cranford informed the lady ahead of me on line that she was a "valued customer" and as such the bank was offering her a new insurance plan. A summary on the benefits of the insurance deal then followed.

Most customers usually politely just say "no thank you" to these sales pitches which ends the episode. You can't help but think some would love to bark out "No. If I wanted the candy bar, dessert or insurance you would have known."

You get the feeling that some smart marketing types have calculated that even though the vast majority turn down the sales pitch, there is still sales and money to be made by the exercise.

Sometimes the sales pitch can be effective. Traveling on Wood Avenue in Roselle, Continued on next page





Alliance working to get 'back on track' this year

(Continued from Page 5) in September on this topic, which will be held at Kean University. The focus will be on how to redevelop Brownfields.

When interviewed last week Perselay was adamant about the focus of the UCA for this year and also about where he wants to take this non-profit.

"I am going to bring the UCA back to where it was," he said, adding that while there was no accountability for how money was allocated by the UCA, there will be now.

"We changed things at the request of the county," he said, but seemed unsure of how much the UCA actually would be receiving annually.

"I thought it was more like \$357,000 a year," Perselay said, but did point out the UCA "took a cut this year."

The new president also said the county expects quarterly reports on what the UCA is accomplishing and he is fully on board with providing those reports. However, presently, the Brownfield's conference in September is his main focus.

'We are planning on having panels at this conference to discuss recycling of land because there are a lot of small parcels that could be redeveloped," he said.

Perselay comes with experience, having been the Director of Intergovernmental Relations for the county in the past and the owner of his own consulting business which focuses on governmental relations and management consulting for local governments. But the president is going back to the past for inspiration when it comes to doing his job at the UCA.

"I think the original goals of the UCA

were laid out by founders Ann Baron, Democrat Sen. Ray Lesniak and Republican former acting governor Don De Francisco. I would like to move back to that and focus on economic development," he added.

The UCA was formed in 1993 as a consortium of leaders from business, government, labor, civic, social service and academic organizations committed to revitalizing Union County's economy and quality of life.

The primary goal, according to information obtained by LocalSource, was to position the county as an "outstanding place to live and work.'

"It is the intention of the alliance to work as a supplement to the efforts of the individual organizations in the county that are focused on its economic recovery and

growth. This will be accomplished through the coordination of meetings, seminars and studies that will become the basis for both tactical and strategic action plans designed to realize Union County's potential as an economic growth center of New Jersey," the mission statement of the UCA reads.

Perselav believes the UCA is on its way to achieving those goals and he is working to see that it happens.

"I think this year will put us back on track and working to achieve what the UCA

County continues to give UCIA 'control'

In February 2012 the county retained Mareth Advisors of Virginia to independently and objectively evaluate the possible transfer of the golf courses from the county department of parks and community renewal to the UCIA. The intent, according to the memorandum of understanding between the county and UCIA, was "providing greater autonomy" for the

operation of the courses so these facilities could better react to changing market and operational conditions.

UCIA Attorney Jonathan Williams of DeCotiis Fitzpatrick and Cole, LLP explained last week at an authority meeting this type of arrangement was considered because with the new multi-million dollar clubhouse, which cost the county \$16 million, and other improvements made to both courses, the county has taken on "a significant amount of debt" to pay down.

At the UCIA meeting last week, Williams broke down exactly why these steps are being taken by the county and how the results will benefit taxpayers.

"We have entered into a memorandum of understanding with the county to move forward with the UCIA purchasing the courses and finding a national company to

take over golf operations," he said, adding the company selected would be involved in a lease agreement, but the county would still have control over setting fees and ensuring the public would still have access to the courses.

"The advantage to this is not only having a private operator from a national company that specializes in golf course management to come in and assume responsibility, but using the lease payments to pay down the outstanding debt," Williams said, explaining "this shifts all the risk to the private operator, while the county receives the lease payments to pay down the debt on these facilities.

Efforts to secure a vendor like this are well under way since the UCIA already put out requests for proposals across the country and received responses from three well known companies interested in leasing the courses.

"We are about halfway through the process now," Williams said Monday in an interview, noting the three companies have operated hundreds of golf courses.

"Golf courses naturally lend themselves to this type of lease," the attorney added, pointing out that aiding the UCIA and county with selecting the right company is critical. The UCIA and county are being aided in this process by the president of Baltusrol Golf Club in Springfield, who is also an attorney.

While any lease negotiated could possibly involve revenue sharing with the county and UCIA, D'Elia said that type of an arrangement would all have to be worked out in the lease agreement.

Williams agreed.


"If this is done properly, and it will be, it will happen without taxpayers expending any money," the UCIA attorney said, adding this particular type of arrangement is the best scenario for the county to pay down debt associated with the golf facilities.

"We are merely shifting the risk and getting the debt paid down faster," Williams said.

This is the second time this summer the county has been actively involved in shifting property they own over to the UCIA for outright purchase by the authority or lease by another entity. Prior to the golf course agreement, the county handed over the financially dependent Runnells Specialized Hospital in Berkeley Heights to the UCIA last month. The Runnells move included a similar Memorandum of Agreement two weeks ago.

Williams explained that this move was to seek proposals for possible purchasers so the county could see what the market has available to the county at this point in time. At the June 27 meeting the freeholder board passed a resolution allowing the UCIA to begin marketing the 300-bed facility that sits on 45-acres of county-owned property. This followed a report in 2012 by HealthCare Resources, Inc. that analyzed and evaluated all possible options to reduce costs at the hospital the county has had to subsidize with millions in taxpayer dollars in order to keep the facility operational.

In the last several years the county has subsidized Runnells by more than \$20 million because of declining state and federal reimbursements and it is not expected to get any better. According to CHR's report, it was evident that while there were additional ways to reduce expenses, none would get the county out of the subsidy stranglehold unless the facility was leased or sold.

Create a 'study zone' for doing homework assignments

Though it might not be something students look forward to, homework is an essential element of the learning process. Homework allows kids to apply the lessons they learned in the classroom while giving educators a chance to determine if students are grasping the concepts discussed in class or if certain lessons need to be revisited.

Students often seek their parents' help when doing their homework, but parents can start helping even before their children bring any assignments home. Streamline your schedule and avoid hectic mornings

Weekday mornings during the school year can be hectic. Parents who must get their youngsters ready for school while preparing for their own day often find themselves rushing through the morning and wishing there was just a little more time before they had to run out the door.

While parents can't add another hour to the morning unless they wake up earlier, there are ways they can be more efficient in the morning. It may not feel good to lose, but be able to share in the joy of the other team and congratulate them on their success. Use a loss as a learning experience that shows you what you and your teammates need to work on going forward.

Backpack safety

The following tips are some of the ways youngsters can prevent backpack-related injuries.

• Carry only necessary items. Children should only carry what is required for that particular school day in their backpacks. If teachers routinely have students carry home many heavy books, parents can consult with the teachers to see if there are other options.

• Distribute weight evenly. Items in the backpack should be spread out to distribute the weight across the entire back. Heavier items should be at the bottom of the pack.

• Use both straps. Using only one strap shifts the backpack weight to one side, causing the back and shoulders to strain. Many orthopedists have reported treating children with back or shoulder pain as the result of carrying backpacks incorrectly.

• Choose the correct backpack size. The size of the backpack should match the scale of the child and should rest evenly in the middle of the child's back.

 Lift safely. Children should lift their backpacks by bending their knees and lifting to protect their backs.

There are some safety features parents can look for when purchasing backpacks. A padded back reduces pressure on the muscles and can be more comfortable, while compression straps make the backpack more sturdy. Additionally, reflective material on the backpack can make the child more visible to motorists.



School buses are safe, but alert kids make them safer

Melcome school

Each day thousands upon thousands of children board school buses to take them to and from school. Parents and caregivers entrust their children's well-being to the care of school-bus drivers and aides. Although parents may worry about schoolbus accidents, such accidents are few and far between. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration advises that school buses are designed to be safer than passenger vehicles in avoiding crashes and protecting against injury. Buses are arguably the safest mode of transportation for getting kids to and from school. By keeping millions of cars off the roads surrounding schools, school buses contribute to less crowded roadways, which are less conducive to accidents.

Though parents may feel buses are most likely to be in accidents while in transit, experts advise that children are more likely to get hurt during pickups and drop-offs when they're in the "danger zone" of the bus. The danger zone is a 10-foot radius around the outside of the bus. Bus drivers and other motorists find kids in the danger zone are more difficult to see, and children can get struck by either the bus or oncoming cars that fail to stop when the bus is picking kids up or dropping them off.

While a large part of protecting children is on the shoulders of the school bus driver, it is also vital for passengers to learn the basics of school bus safety. Kindergartners or children who are riding the bus for the first time should be taught the rules of school bus safety.

Some schools offer a school bus tour prior to the new school year. This lets youngsters acclimate themselves to the look and feel of the school bus. This introduction also may include information about bus safety, but parents can also educate their children and themselves about using caution in and around the bus by following these guidelines.

• Get to the bus stop 5 to 10 minutes prior to the assigned pickup time. Rushing last-minute can lead to injury, especially if you're chasing down the bus.

• Remain on the sidewalk or grass at the bus stop. Do not step off the curb into the street until the bus has arrived and is completely stopped. • When boarding the bus, go directly to a seat and sit down. Buckle up if there are seat belts on the bus.

• Remain seated while the bus is in motion.

 Keep voices low so as not to distract the driver.

Keep your head and hands inside of the bus, and never hang out of the window.
Do not throw things on the bus or play

rough with friends or classmates.

• Keep the aisle clear at all times.

• Be careful when getting off the bus. Hold on while going down the stairs.

• Only get off at your designated stop unless you have permission to get off elsewhere.

• When exiting the bus, walk at least 10 steps past the front of the bus and cross in front where the driver can see you. Do not cross behind the bus.

• Wait for the driver to give you a signal that it is safe to cross. Be sure to check that all cars on the road have come to a complete stop.

• Get to the sidewalk or off the street as quickly as possible.







Two green thumbs up

The stifling July heat wave did not stifle the enthusiasm of campers and counselors from Camp Discovery of Plainfield on their recent outing to the Trailside Demonstration Gardens cultivated by the Union County Master Gardeners. On July 19, Camp Discovery Director Eric Halpern and his group of 14 campers, ages 6 to 12. and six counselors returned to the Demo Gardens at Watchung Reservation in Mountainside for a morning of education and enrichment. The gardens were flush with beautiful trees, shrubs, perennials, and brimming with a summer's bounty of herbs, vegetables and berries. A total of 29 Master Gardener and Master Tree Steward volunteers guided the campers through six activity stations developed by the Master Gardeners. The campers also learned how to transplant begonias grown from seeds, and got to take home their newly potted plants.

A match made in the Heavenly Garden of Colors

I am being stalked by cardinal flower -Lobelia cardinalis. Otherwise known as red lobelia, the plant is tall and handsome, rising just shy of 3 feet and producing brilliant red flower spikes in mid- to late summer. The flowers are so red that they knock you for a loop when you first see them.

That happened to me when I caught sight of a stand of cardinal flowers at the Leonard J. Buck Garden in Far Hills. They bowled me over a second time last week when I saw them in the company of blue globe thistle - Echinops bannaticus - in a home garden. Not only were the cardinal flowers glorious, they formed a dynamic duo with the globe thistle. Those of us who love gardens, love discovering a good plant combination. Cardinal flowers and globe thistles are made for each other.

Cardinal flower is a native perennial, hailing from wet locations all over the eastern half of North America. It is sometimes also known as Indian pink. Up close, the flowers are fascinating. Clustered at the tops of the tall stalks, each small, individual flower has two "lips" or modified petals that are joined at the base to form a tube. This adaptation makes life easier for the hummingbirds that pollinate the cardinal flower, not to mention making it lovely for the people who watch the hummingbirds going about their feeding and pollinating business.

While watching the hummers, you may also see butterflies trying to muscle them aside so they can help themselves to the nectar within those red blooms.

Cardinal flowers are back-of-the-border plants. Left to their own devices, they will also form good sized clumps, making their annual appearance even more dramatic. The lobelias I saw in a home garden were watered regularly by an automatic sprinkler system. If you don't have a damp spot for your cardinal flowers, make sure they get regular moisture during dry spells. A soaker hose works well for this, keeping the ground damp and minimizing water evaporation.

Globe thistles are tall enough to stand side-by-side with cardinal flowers and they bloom at approximately the same time. You would never know it by looking at the spiky blue balls, but globe thistles are members of the daisy, or Compositae, family. There is certainly nothing dainty about the roughlooking, deeply dissected leaves that are green on top and lighter, almost white, on the bottom. The stalks are rough and stiff. In fact, the plants might be easily mistaken for weeds except for the magnificent, steelblue, spherical flowerheads. Globe thistle heads are about the size of large golf balls and they have the same garden effect as some of the tall alliums. They are dramatic in cut-flower arrangements as well, if you can spare a few from the garden.

I usually gravitate toward impressionistic garden color schemes, with swathes of color that melt into each other. Globe thistles and cardinal flowers do not melt. They make bold statements individually and even bolder ones together. Like many successful couples, they accomplish this because one half of the pair - globe thistle goes out of its way to be accommodating. Often these daisy-family denizens are planted in poor, rocky or sandy soil, where they succeed beautifully. However, to make beautiful music with cardinal flower, globe thistle will make sacrifices, accustoming itself to the luxurious life of uniformly moist soil. Not only that, but it will also form clumps, allowing savvy gardeners to divide them eventually and repeat the cardinal flower/globe thistle combination elsewhere in the garden.

Cultivated varieties of old favorites like cardinal flower and globe thistle are usually great or slight improvements on the originals, with bigger flowers, different growth habits or color variations. Taplow Blue is my favorite globe thistle because of its brilliant blue color. It retains the 4-foot tall stature of the species. Blue Glow, which may be a bit shorter, is another good variety. An attractive, closely related globe thistle is Echinops ritro. It is about the same size as the bannaticus species, but the flowers are closer to blue-purple. I especially like Veitch's Blue.

Bronze purple foliage is always a plus in the landscape. Queen Victoria, a cardinal flower variety, has it, with the bright red flowers blooming atop dark stems that rise from basal clumps of equally dark foliage. The bronze-purple foliage makes a nice complement to globe thistle's coloring as well.

If you have the space, plant groups of three each of regular cardinal flower and Queen Victoria, mingled with a couple of three-plant clumps of globe thistle for a great block of late summer color.

You may be able to find cardinal flower and globe thistle at local nursery and garden centers that stock perennials for fall planting. If not, try Bluestone Perennials, 7211 Middle Ridge Road, Madison, OH 44057; 800-852-5243; http://www.bluestoneperennials.com. Free catalog.

County reminds residents to help prevent mosquitoes

As record June rainfall and warm temperatures have created ideal breeding conditions for mosquitoes in Union County this summer, the Board of Chosen Freeholders is reminding residents that they can take steps to help reduce the risk of mosquito-borne diseases.

"Union County residents can pitch in by making sure their property is free of any possible breeding sites," said Freeholder Chairman Linda Carter. "It also helps to follow a few simple precautions when going outside, such as using an approved repellent."

Mosquitoes carry a range of diseases including malaria, West Nile Virus and dengue fever. They require only a small

amount of stagnant water in which to breed, so residents are advised to check their outdoor equipment and garden ornaments, including flower pots, buckets, recycling containers, grills, wheelbarrows and tarpaulins, to ensure that there is no place for water to collect.

repellent.

Litter and debris should be removed, and unused pools, fountains and ornamental ponds should be covered. Residents should also check for water collecting in children's toys and play sets, and rain gutters should be cleaned regularly to ensure that water does not collect in blocked or sagging areas.

To avoid mosquito bites, residents are advised to use a repellent approved for use on skin and clothing, and to follow all instructions on the label carefully. Additional guidance on mosquito repellents is available from the Centers for Disease Control.

Another effective precaution is to wear long, light-colored clothing when outdoors in the early morning and early evening. Mosquitoes are most active during these times.

Breeding sites on public property are addressed through the Union County Bureau of Mosquito Control, which regularly inspects and tests for mosquitoes throughout the county and conducts spraying operations as needed.

Residents are encouraged to report mosquito infestations by calling the Union County Mosquito Hotline at 908-654-9834 during business hours. County inspectors will examine the property and provide guidance on eliminating breeding sites. If needed, the inspectors will also survey the surrounding area.

Partly due to its marshlands and network of waterways, Union County has a long history of organized mosquito control efforts and is recognized as a leader in the field. The county's first Mosquito Control Commission was established 100 years ago and is the second oldest in the nation.

Vegetarian Moussaka

This Greek classic can now be made vegetarian if you substitute just a few ingredients. Enjoy!

Ingredients

2 sliced medium-sized zucchini, brushed with olive oil 2 large sliced eggplants, brushed with olive oil

Roast at 350 degrees until wilted,

- about 20 minutes or more
- In a large saucepan, combine:
- 1/2 cup tomato paste
- 2 15-ounce cans chopped tomatoes
- 3 15-ounce cans chick peas
- 4 chopped cloves garlic
- 2 Tbs. olive oil
- 2 Tbs. agave syrup
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 to 2 tsp. salt

Method for moussaka

Cook for about 20 minutes and then pulse to a coarse mixture.

In a glass Pyrex or casserole dish, layer chick pea puree, eggplant, chick pea puree, zucchini and repeat until ingredients run out.

Cook at 400 degrees until mixture begins to bubble - about half hour and then add bechamel on top (recipe below). Let cook until bechamel is

golden, about 10 minutes. Bechamel, or White Sauce Half of this recipe is for the moussaka; save the rest in fridge 6 Tbs. butter 4 cups whole milk 4 Tbs. flour 1/4 to 1/2 tsp. fresh grated nutmeg, adjusted to your liking 1 tsp. salt, adjusted to your liking; with more, add a little at a time 1/8 tsp. ground black pepper Method for bechamel In a medium-sized sauce pan, heat up the butter over a low flame until melted. Stir in the flour with a whisk until fully incorporated with the butter. Slowly add in the milk, whisking all the while. Keep whisking now over a low to

medium flame. Whisk every minute or so until the mixture becomes thick like pudding. This may take about 10 to 15 minutes.

Add in the nutmeg, salt and pepper and add more of each if you need to.

Linden and Rahway football move to different sections , Tigers up to N2, G5; Indians back to CJ, G2

Linden is in a section other than North 2, Group 4 for the first time in a quarter of a century.

The Tigers have not won a state championship since 1985.

Rahway, like a bouncing ball, is back situated in Central Jersey, Group 2 for the eighth time since NJSIAA reclassification began in 2003.

The Indians have not won a state championship since 1984.

For Linden, if the Tigers dream of getting back to a state championship game for the first time in 28 years - they came close last year - and winning their second title in the playoff era they will have to do so in a very challenging North 2, Group 5.

Rahway reached the Central Jersey, Group 2 semifinals four years in a row from 2004-2007 and qualified again in the section in 2011. No Union County school has captured a playoff state title in a Central Jersey section since reclassification began 10 years ago. The Indians will attempt to break that streak this season.

Linden and Rahway were the only Union County football playing schools to move into different sections for the upcoming 2013 campaign.

Linden moved up to North 2, Group 5 and is the smallest school in the section with an enrollment listed at 1284. The Tigers were last in a section other than North 2, Group 4 in 1988 when they were last in North 2, Group 3.


"Initially I was taken back when I heard that," said Linden sixth-year head coach Deon Candia. "I understand the process. We play a lot of Group 5 schools anyway."

Linden's 2013 schedule includes Group 5 schools North Hunterdon, Ridge, Montgomery, Elizabeth, Watchung Hills, Bridgewater-Raritan and Union, All but Montgomery are fellow North 2, Group 5 teams, with Montgomery situated in Central Jersey, Group 5.

"It won't change anything because of the Group 5s already on our schedule," Candia said.

Linden has played in two state championship games in the playoff era, falling in the 1983 North 2, Group 3 final and winning the 1985 North 2, Group 3 championship. The Tigers were two quarters away from reaching the North 2, Group 4 final last year before falling at Warren Hills 21-7 in the semifinals.

Linden became the first - and still is the only - team to not qualify in North 2, Group 4 with a 6-2 record at the cutoff date. SPORTS

That happened to the Tigers in 2010. Ironically, Linden qualified last year in North 2, Group 4 with a 2-6 record at the cutoff. Last year was the first year the NJSIAA allowed teams with records under .500 to qualify.

Linden made it last year as the seventh seed and came back to win at second-seeded Barringer 19-18 in the quarterfinals before falling at sixth-seeded Warren Hills.

Candia's first game as Linden's head coach in 2008 was also a one-point win over Barringer, a 7-6 decision at home at Cooper Field.

After being in a section last year with teams such as West Morris, Scotch Plains and Millburn schools that moved up to that section from North 2, Group 3 - Linden is back in familiar territory, in a section that includes fellow Union County foes Elizabeth, Union and Westfield and Middlesex County power Piscataway.

Linden won at Piscataway 13-12 in the 2006 North 2, Group 4 quarterfinals, handing the Chiefs a rare first round playoff loss since 2003. Piscataway shut out Linden in the playoffs the two previous seasons.

Candia's record at Linden,

Mobley has led the Indians to one championship game, that coming in North 2, Group 3 in 2008. Rahway reached that section's semifinals in 2010 and quarterfinals in 2012.

With senior Jeffrey Bost back at quarterback, in addition to several other key returners, Rahway could be viewed as one of the favorites this season in Central Jersey, Group 2.

Other Union County schools that remained in that section for this year include Johnson, Roselle and Hillside.

After getting a brief taste of varsity football as a freshman two years ago at Linden, Kyle Phipps decided to transfer to Bergen County national power Don Bosco Prep of Ramsey, where he played last year.

Phipps decided to transfer back to Linden this season for his junior year. He is first cousins with Linden junior running back Juwan Dolbrice, who burst on the scene last year to rush for a team-high 1,021 yards.

Dolbrice (5-10, 180) and Phipps (5-8, 175) have the potential to be one of the top junior running back tandems in Union County this season.

"This is the way things worked out and it helps us in a great way," Candia said of having Phipps return to the Tiger backfield. "He's excited to be back home."

Linden knocked on the door of reaching the program's third state championship game and first in nearly 30 years last fall.

Phipps could be the kind of player that helps lead Linden to that goal this year.

"He came up through our Pop Warner system," Candia said. "He got some touches for us as a freshman and then went to Don Bosco, which is a different level.

"We always knew what he was capable of. He has a hunger about him. He's glad to be back playing in his hometown."

Former RC star is now a head coach

Roselle Catholic High School graduate Amanda Sheehy, who helped the Lions' girls'basketball program win multiple championships for the first time in school history during her career on the court, will now try to win championships from the sideline as a high school head coach.

Sheehy, who spent the past two seasons as an assistant varsity coach at Newton North High School in Massachusetts, was tabbed the new varsity girls' basketball coach at Needham High School in Needham, Mass. earlier this summer.

A 2006 Roselle Catholic graduate and former Linden resident, Sheehy is currently a Behavior Therapist in the Newton, Mass. public schools.

As a freshman, Sheehy was a starter on the RC team that won the won the Union County Tournament for the first time in school history, defeating Union Catholic in the UCT final at the Dunn Center in Elizabeth.

Two years later, Sheehy and the Lions captured the NJSIAA's Parochial A North title, edging Mount St. Dominic in the sectional final in Paterson. Roselle Catholic lost to St. John Vianney in the Parochial A state final in Toms River.

"Amanda Sheehy was a very smart student and a very smart basketball player, often thinking like a coach on the court," said RC girls' basketball coach Joe Skrec, who'll guide the Lions for an 18th season this winter. "Amanda helped Roselle Catholic win a lot of basketball games during her four years, from the moment she walked through the doors at RC in 2002. Needham High School is lucky to have Amanda Sheehy. She's a winner from a very good family, who's going to experience and enjoy continued success."

With Sheehy playing in the backcourt, Roselle Catholic's girls' basketball team also won the program's first division title, the MVC's Mountain Division crown, in 2005. The 2004-05 campaign was the first time an RC girls' basketball team won as many as 20 games in a season.

Sheehy was co-captain of the Lions, with Bridget Sweeney, her senior season in 2006. She was also the RC softball team's starting second baseman as a senior.

"I'll always hold a very special place for Roselle Catholic in my heart," said Sheehy, who wore jersey No. 21 during her scholastic career. "The school is a huge reason why I have been as successful both on and off the court as I have been. I look forward to coming back to Roselle Catholic to play the Lions in the upcoming years. It'll be a lot of fun."

After RC, Sheehy accepted a scholarship to play at Assumption College in Worcester, Mass., a member of the strong Division II Northeast-10 Conference. She was named team captain as a senior at Assumption, where she earned a degree in history, with a concentration in elementary education.

Sheehy, 24, has also worked as a head and an assistant coach in the Massachusetts Huskies AAU program, coaching MetroWest in Wellesley and working numerous camps and clinics teaching the game. She received her masters in education from the California State University San Marcos and is now working towards a masters certificate in applied behavior analysis. Needham High School, with approximately 1,500 students, is a member of the Bay State Conference of the Massachusetts Interscholastic Athletic Association.
