# Crews continue cleanup from derailment

Crews likely will spend another week or so removing debris and broken rail cars after a freight train derailment just west of the Union train station on Friday afternoon, Dec. 8, forced a two-and-a-half day suspension of all traffic on the line that carries Raritan Valley Line commuters, officials said.

No one was injured in the accident, which drew a full emergency response from Union fire and police, and caused chaos on the Conrail-owned train line and the roads surrounding the station.

County officials responded by dispatching police and Union County Office of Emergency Management officials, who quickly determined that there were no health or environmental risks, Union County spokesman Seb D'Elia said.

Witnesses near the derailment heard what they described as a "crunch" just after 2 p.m.

The 141-car CSX train, which had a crew of two, derailed in three locations, Union

# **Batista considers contesting Hillside mayoral runoff results**

Jorge Batista narrowly lost by 18 votes to Dahlia Vertreese in the Dec. 5 mayoral runoff election, and is now considering subpoening voters to court for an election contest.

"Nothing is off the table to protect the integrity of the election," Batista told Local-Source on Dec. 8.

We wish all our readers a Happy Hanukkah, Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. He alleged that a former public official who no longer lives in town may have voted in the election, and his lawyers may want to question that person. Batista declined to name the official, but alleged it was a Vertreese supporter.

An election contest is a special court proceeding that requires a person to prove that election officials erred in the the process of certifying ballots.

Batista said he may either ask for an initial recount of all votes, or circumvent that to an election contest. Vertreese, who currently serves as the Union Board of Education president, was concerned about Batista contesting the results of the election.

"The idea of being subpoenaed to testify about how and for whom they voted violates the democratic process, and insinuates voter fraud among people who have been historically denied voting rights," Vertreese said in a Dec. 8 statement. "I will not be deterred and shall proceed as the mayor-elect."

Provisional ballots are paper ballots used in polling places for voters whose eligibility is at issue and must be resolved by county officials rather than poll workers, by N.J. statute.

Before provisional ballots were counted Dec. 7, Batista unofficially received 1,711 votes, 28 shy of Vertreese's 1,739, according to the Municipal Clerk's Office on Dec. 6.

There were 26 provisional ballots cast, not enough for Batista to close the gap, though he gained 18 votes once they were counted, Union County Board of Elections Administrator Dennis Kobitz said. The certified count, including the provisional ballots, gave Batista 1,729 votes and 1,747 for Vertreese, the Hillside municipal clerk said Dec. 11.

Vertreese came in second place in the Nov. 7 election, which saw a crowded four-way race for mayor. Batista originally came out on top with 1,624 votes Nov. 7.

Twelve candidates ran for three township council seats on Nov 7, which led to a runoff in that race too. The three candidates from Vertree's camp — George Cook, Nancy See **DOUBTS**, Page 8



# County World War II memorial gets makeover

Frequent visitors to Rahway River Park may be familiar with the variety of trees growing throughout, yet few may be able to identify those planted in 1947 to honor 58 Union County citizens who died in World War II.

Of the 58 trees planted as memorials, 15 were no longer standing but were replaced earlier this month, thanks to the efforts of Alex Shipley, director of the Merchants and Drovers Tavern Museum in Rahway.

Shipley uncovered a detailed draftsman's map that revealed the seemingly lost and forgotten information about the tree memorials. The map detailed the locations of the 58 trees and for which veteran each had been planted. He used the map to find the trees in the park, discovering that 15 were missing.

It took months for Shipley to arrange for Union County Parks workers to plant new saplings, but the refurbishment of Memorial Tree Grove was finally completed Monday, Dec. 4, three days before the 76th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, which launched the United States into World War II.

The saplings can be found in close vicinity to where they were originally located, according to the map.

County spokesperson Seb D'Elia told LocalSource in a Dec. 5 email that the miss-

ing trees were replaced and in the historic tree grove around the memorial marker is being refurbished. This effort is part of Union County Freeholder Chairman Bruce Bergen's UC-HERO initiative to honor local veterans, D'Elia told Localsource.

In proximity to the trees and saplings near the parking lot, Shipley directed attention to a small monument erected in 1947 that displays the names of the soldiers whose sacrifices are remembered by the surrounding environment.

For years, Shipley was aware of that monument, but had no previous knowledge of the memorial trees until stumbling across his discovery. He told LocalSource he'd found the 70-year-old draftsman's map burrowed at the bottom of a donated box.

"I was contacted by the nephew of Union County veteran, 1st Lt. Walter E. Williams, during the summer of 2016," Shipley told LocalSource on Dec. 7.

The nephew, Walter Williams, who was named after his uncle who'd died fighting in Germany, asked Shipley if he could drop off two boxes of memorabilia.

Not knowing what treasures were inside the antique box, Shipley welcomed the material, but left the boxes alone for awhile. It was not until a few months later in January, that he sifted through the contents and found a scrapbook, photos, news-

# Union BOE results unchanged after recount

A requested recount in the Union school board race slightly altered vote totals but left the results unchanged.

Linda Richardson finished atop a list of six declared candidates for three seats followed by Vito Nufrio and Sherry Shannon Higgins.

Current board President Ronnie McDowell, who ran in this year's race, had called for the recount after finishing fourth behind Higgins by 29 votes.

The recount, ordered by Superior Court Judge Robert Mega, was conducted Nov. 29 in Scotch Plains. Records show that the recount changed the votes by a margin of about two votes for most school board candidates, but the number of votes for McDowell remained the same.

McDowell did not respond to a request for comment by this article's deadline. He said in a Nov. 13 statement that he was calling for the recount because he had concerns about mail-in ballots. At that time, he said he had "suspicions that those voters may have been unduly influenced by people 'helping' voters fill out their absentee ballots."

McDowell ran on a three-person ticket with fellow incumbents Nufrio and Nancy Zuena. Higgins ran on the Children First Coalition ticket with Michelle Shulz and Richardson. Steven Le, campaign manager for the Children First Coalition, said in a Dec. 6 statement that the McDowell-Zuena-Nufrio group never should have cast "doubt in the democratic process."

"After the initial count and the recount, there is no doubt of the results confirming (Higgins') win," Le said. "Furthermore, there is no doubt and should never have been doubt in the democratic process. Our campaign team has moved on from this election, and I hope the other side will too as a sign of good sportsmanship.

"The ball is in their court to either pointlessly and desperately re-dispute the election, or graciously move on in the interests of the community and the children."

Union County Board of Elections Administrator Dennis Kobitz explained the change in the recount vote totals, noting some mail-in ballot voters had both filled in circles and written in names for the same candidates.

"The judges always authorize the recount," Kobitz said, adding that all dis-

tricts were recounted in Union. "There's no reason to deny anybody to having a recount."

It costs \$2 per district, plus a \$25 fee for a recount, Kobitz added.

McDowell's faction was supported by the advocacy group Parents for Change. The group and McDowell decried campaign contributions made to the opposing Children's First group, including a \$1,000 donation from state Sen.-elect Joseph Cryan.

According to McDowell on Nov. 13, he, Nufrio and Zuena, "are all independent thinkers without any strings from outside interest attached. I believe that I cannot say the same for the two incoming board members. After all, they received tens of thousands of dollars in campaign donations from people that are likely expecting something in return."

Cryan's donation in the nonpartisan election, while legal, raised ethical questions from the McDowell camp, whose opposition also raised thousands more than the Parents for Change campaign.

The school board race was highly con-

In June, about \$26,000 was stolen from a secretary's desk in Union High School,

authorities said. Nine suspects were arrested in connection with the theft, including the son of Zuena, who was charged with criminal trespass in connection with the incident

Meanwhile, Le, on behalf of the Children First Coalition, filed a complaint in Superior Court against the school board, alleging that \$5 million in excess bond funds should have gone back to taxpayers. He voluntarily withdrew that complaint and it was also reviewed in early September by an administrative law judge, who dismissed it since for having been filed too late.

# Summit merges courts with neighboring towns

Summit has joined with Berkeley Heights and New Providence to share municipal court services, a consolidation of courts in the three northwestern Union County towns that will eventually center itself in New Providence.

Berkeley Heights and New Providence have had a shared-services agreement since 2010, expanded in 2014; Summit recently joined in with a pact announced at the Dec. 5 Summit Common Council meeting.

The consolidation will require several months of renovation and expansion to New Providence's court facilities, which will require all three town's court services to be conducted in Summit in the meantime.

Summit spokesperson Amy Cairns said the construction is expected to last three to four months although, according to the Berkeley Heights' website, the renovation is estimated to be completed in May.

When the work is finished, all three municipalities will move back into the New Providence Courthouse at 360 Elkwood Ave.

Cairns said each of the three municipalities is contributing \$74,000 for the renovations, to be paid across three years.

Despite the court's relocation to New Providence, "Summit residents will still be served by their own court with its own jurisdiction," Summit Common Council President Michael McTernan said in a Dec. 6 press release.

Cairns told LocalSource that after the move to New Providence, Summit's current municipal court facilities, located at 512 Springfield Ave., will be used for meetings and other purposes.

Summit officials estimate that the consolidation of its court through the shared services agreement will save the municipality more than \$100,000 annually after renovation costs are repaid. Once the consolidation is complete, all three towns will share a prosecutor, judge and court administrator.

The New Jersey Judiciary estimates that "about one in five New Jersey municipal courts is currently part of a joint or shared services arrangement," with 18 of the state's 21 counties having "at least one merged municipal court," according to Summit's Dec. 6 press release.

McTernan touted the shared-service agreement as cutting costs in staffing and administration.

"The consolidation of Summit's municipal court with New Providence and Berkeley Heights will save money and directly benefit taxpayers by reducing the number of court facilities and staff size, as well as required court security measures and administrative oversight," he said.

"This is the latest in a series of shared services implemented by the common council over the last several years."

In another move aimed at reducing costs, Summit transferred its emergency dispatch to private entity Mountain Valley Emergency Communications that provides dispatch services for Millburn, New Providence and Summit.

"It has gone very well," Cairns told Local-Source. "At first some residents were nervous, but the Mount Valley Emergency Communications has saved us significant cost."

She also praise the level of service and response.

Western Union County municipalities are not the only ones participating in shared


service agreements, according to Mike Cerra of the New Jersey League of Municipalities. Shared services agreements are common throughout New Jersey and an ongoing process, he told the LocalSource in a Dec. 8 phone interview. Municipalities have been sharing services for decades, Cera said.

Prior to the Interlocal Services Act enacted in August 1973, municipalities just shook hands on shared services rather than signing official documents. Cerra added that the shared service agreements are maintained as long as all parties benefit, either through reduced costs or efficiencies.

Looking to the future, Cerra said more local governments will probably look into participating in such agreements.

paper articles, letters of condolence for Williams' death and, underneath it all, a map folded in thirds.

"When opening the map, I discovered the tree grove, which described the position of each tree and what soldier they represented," Shipley said.

Inside the box was also an article published in the Rahway News-Record dated June 5, 1947, documenting and confirming the original ceremony held Memorial Day, May 30, 1947, to remember the fallen 58 soldiers through a tree-planting ceremony.

The grove would be "a memorial which will grow as the years pass to keep generations aware of the sacrifice which these men made to permit the continuation of our way of life," according to the Rahway News-Record editorial.

Despite more recent revelations of the grove, Shipley believes many people may be unaware of its location.

"I would really like to see a plaque or marking on the trees that indicate their purpose," he said.



# Linden police add pair of new officers at ceremony

Joining the Linden Police Department was just one way for Ariel Franjul to give back to the United States after immigrating here from the Dominican Republic in 1997 at about 10 years old.

Franjul, who was sworn in as an officer on Dec. 11, moved to Linden after being honorably discharged in the Marines.

"I love the town," he said after the ceremony in Linden City Hall, later adding, "I wanted to continue serving my country. This country gave me a lot of opportunities."

Franjol was sworn in with another recruit, Carlos Ralda, in anticipation of the two completing their training Dec. 14 at the John H. Stamler Police Academy. Ralda is a Linden native who graduated from Linden High School, Lt. Christopher Guenther said during the ceremony.

The two new recruits were joined by their families, who stood alongside them as they were sworn in. Chief Jonathan Parham spoke directly to those families during the ceremo-

"My message to the family is 'thank you," Parham said. "Thank you for preparing them for law enforcement. ... Great police officers come from great families. It's just that simple."

Mayor Derek Armstead said the new recruits will have the opportunity to change some of the public's "negative perception of what policing is."

"You have a tremendous opportunity to give the public reassurance that you're their friend, that you're here to help," Armstead said, adding that he still wanted officers to do "what you have to do" to fight crime.

There are currently 115 officers in the Linden Police Department, including the two new recruits, Guenther told LocalSource. Seven people were hired for the academy in 2016, but only three attended and one resigned before finishing the academy, he said. Recruits spend about 20 weeks in the academy, where they learn use of force techniques and criminal law. Linden is still below its full complement of 153 officers, and there are plans to hire more next year, Armstead said after the ceremony.

# Garwood turns focus to other part of Casale property

After receiving approval for its 298unit apartment complex on the north side of South Avenue in Garwood, Russo Development is turning its attention to the other side of the same street.

A Dec. 5 meeting at Lincoln School organized by Garwood Borough Council President Sara Todisco and Councilwoman Jen Blumenstock drew about 50 residents to gather their input regarding two proposals for a 1.74-acre site, mostly asphalt-covered parking lots: 52 townhomes or a 73-unit apartment complex.

"I think the pros of the stacked townhomes is that it is nice to have some variety of product and not to have all the same kind of product," Russo Development principal Ed Russo said.

Russo had been leaning toward the 52 townhomes until about three weeks ago and was asked by the Garwood Planning Board to reduce density, a concern that emerged from the community.

"One of the reasons for the gathering was to see if there is tremendous amount of sentiment one way or another," borough attorney Bob Renaud said at the meeting.

It took nearly three years to attain final approval for the redevelopment plan for the north side of South Avenue, a 5.3-acre site occupied by the largely abandoned Casale Sheet Metal and Petro Plastics industrial sites. The site plan for those properties, collectively known as "South Avenue I," was to go before the board Dec. 14.

The parking lot areas on the opposite side of the street also were bought by Russo in the Casale/Petro purchase, and the redevelopment plan for that tract, known as "South Avenue II," must be approved by Dec. 26, according to a court order, borough administrator Christina Ariemma said Dec. 11.

Both properties were subject to court approval under Mount Laurel housing requirements established by the state Supreme Court.

The Dec. 5 meeting generated questions ranging from fiscal and school impacts to aesthetics.

In addition to the variety introduced by the prospective townhomes, Russo suggested an economic benefit derived from building homes that may be purchased.

There could be a market demand for house, due to the majority residence being built in Union County are rental units, Russo contended.

The downside of the townhomes is that they include several three-bedroom units — which could bring more children and an added stress on the school system — and a potential difficulty in selling 'Out of many concerns expressed by residents, school impact has gotten a lot of attention.'

smaller one- and two-bedroom units.

The apartment plan is less dense, has less floor area, less height and mass and provides 23 additional municipal parking spaces, Russo said.

The courtyards, gym and other amenities built as part of South Avenue I would also be available for use by renters from South Avenue II, which Russo said he hoped would add value.

He indicated that the apartment project was the more desirable of the two, mainly because it is smaller, the building heights are lower and it could be more architecturally attractive as there is more flexibility to build a modern project.

Of the 73 units, there would be 39 onebedroom units, 19 two-bedroom units and eight three-bedroom units, with seven studios. The development would have one E-shaped building with 25 percent of the property being open space.

The development proposal for 52 town homes includes 26 two-bedroom and 26 See **TOWNHOMES**, Page 10

three-bedroom mix. The townhome plan shows a fourbuilding structure with 17 percent of the property allocated to open space.

While both proposals will satisfy 15 percent of their court-ordered Mount Laurel obligation, another key difference between the two projects was that the town homes will yield 173 bedrooms, while the apartment option has only 108.

Garwood has a small public school system with one school and an enrollment of about 400 students between kindergarten through eighth grade; high school students attend school in Clark. The topic of new residents' impact on local schools has been central to discussion among residents and recurred throughout the meeting.

"Out of many concerns expressed by residents, school

impact has gotten a lot of attention," Russo stated.

"No one knows with 100 percent certainty how many school aged children will be generated by the product, but there is a tremendous amount of data that projects the amount of children, and all the data suggests that one-bedroom, studio, and two-bedroom units don't produce that many," Russo responded.

The apartments are not conducive to families with two or three school-aged children, they are conducive to empty nesters and young couples, Russo attorney Christopher Minks told those at the meeting.

Minks who is also on the Mountainside Board of Education, highlighted that the data on school children was submitted along with the fiscal impact study, showing that even if the project brings new students, there is

enough of a fiscal benefit to the community to accommodate them.

The project is to draw significant tax ratables, Minks

"It seemed like you are going to get tax ratable if it was only for a for sale product. That is not true," he said. "Whether if it is a for sale product or rental, the borough is going to get significant tax ratable."

South Avenue II is projected for a construction start date sometime in 2020. Russo said.

# Why net neutrality matters

With big news items such as the Mueller investigation into possible Russian meddling in the 2016 elec-

tion and the recently passed GOP tax bill, the Federal Communications Commission has been trying to fly under the radar in its recent bid to repeal net neutrality rules. While the FCC has been discussing this intention for months, the commission only released its actual plans at Thanksgiving, seemingly in an attempt to ensure the public would overlook it.

But these proposed changes were not overlooked and millions of Americans have been submitting comments to the FCC — some pro net neutrality and others against it. Today, Dec. 14, the FCC is voting on this

plan to roll back net neutrality.

So what is net neutrality? Net neutrality is the principle by which internet service providers are required to provide consumers with open networks that do not block or discriminate against certain websites. It means that all websites and services have identical access to internet users. Without net neutrality, industry giants such as Verizon, AT&T, Comcast and Time Warner Cable can prioritize internet access to some websites at the expense of others, creating information "fast lanes" and "slow lanes," letting some webpages load quickly and others not at all. Without net neutrality, ISPs could sell this preferential treatment to the highest bidder, to the detriment of everyone who won't pay, leaving them with slower service.

The strict net neutrality rules in the United States were approved in a February 2015 FCC vote that classified ISPs as public utilities. Immediately following the vote, opponents, chiefly ISPs, challenged the new rules; in June 2016, a panel of judges ruled in favor of the FCC's net neutrality rules, putting the issue to rest

Opponents claim that net neutrality harms ISPs because websites that use large amounts of data and require fast streaming, such as Netflix and Hulu, use vast amounts of an ISP's resources without contributing anything to the ISP system's maintenance or expansion. This is true and it is not fair. But, while rolling back net neutrality would fix this problem, it creates a whole host of new ones. Without net neutrality, small businesses and startup internet enterprises could be crippled. Many new businesses rely on the internet to launch their businesses, reach consumers, investigate options and more. But if these new businesses cannot afford priority from ISPs, they may just flounder and die before even getting a chance to live.

Additionally, without net neutrality, ISPs can begin

to prioritize which websites receive the fastest support based on political ideology. ISPs can throttle

access to — or block access entirely to — websites that espouse messages with which they disagree, such as a website criticizing a telecom company. This could also hamper people's ability to communicate with one another. These days, the internet has become the most used method of communication and it allows us to speak with a variety of other people; how many voices would be silenced without net neutrality? If relegated to the "slow lane," many social movements might be stopped dead in their tracks.

As for how a repeal of net neutrality could affect you personally, not only will access to sites you now frequent possibly be blocked, but you may have to pay more for your internet access. In some countries, such as Britain and Portugal, which do not have net neutrality rules in place, ISPs charge extra fees in a tiered service, in which a consumer may have to pay extra money per platform to have access to communications platforms such as Skype or FaceTime; social platforms such as Facebook or Twitter; and email platforms such as Gmail and Yahoo.

Does this mean that a repeal of net neutrality will ensure this future? No. But the possibilities are chill-

Tom Wheeler, who served as FCC chairman in 2015 when the rules were passed, has openly criticized his successor, Ajit Pai, a former Verizon lawyer, for his attempts to repeal net neutrality. Wheeler has said that he stands by the comments he made when he first voted in favor of net neutrality.

The internet has replaced the functions of the telephone. The internet is simply too important to allow broadband providers to be the ones making the rules," Wheeler said during the 2015 FCC vote. "This is no more a plan to regulate the internet than the First Amendment is a plan to regulate free speech," he said of net neutrality. Keeping net neutrality as it is does not solve the problem of compensating or incentivizing ISPs to maintain and expand internet systems. This is a legitimate problem. Our elected officials must work on a plan to correct this one issue, while preserving net neutrality.

So what can we do? Call your government representatives, contact the FCC, spread the word. And remember, even if the repeal passes, that does not mean new rules cannot be instituted further down the line to resurrect net neutrality.

Keep the issue alive and keep our internet a level playing field for all users.

# Mahonia: beautiful, and patriotic too

When you think about the intelligent, courageous and, inevitably, flawed people who founded our country, a host of names comes to mind. Bernard McMahon's is not among them. However, McMahon, 1775-1816 — knew or corresponded with many of the political and horticultural notables of his era. He was a garden mentor to Thomas Jefferson, who may be considered America's "founding gardener." That association also led the third president to choose McMahon as curator of the plants collected by Lewis and Clark on their lengthy and daring western expedition.

McMahon, an Irish immigrant, was a nurseryman, plant collector and writer. His "American Gardener's Calendar" was the first book of guidance aimed at gardeners in our newborn country. He sent American native seeds and specimens to correspondents in Europe and offered European horticultural delights to customers in America. And though early American gardening was necessarily derivative of European gardening, McMahon encouraged his readers to look close to home for worthy plants. Peter Hatch, writing in the January 1993 edition of Twinleaf, the journal of the Jefferson Center for Historic Plants, noted, "It was in the 'Calendar' that American gardeners were first urged to comb the local woodlands and fields for 'the various beautiful ornaments with which nature has so profusely decorated

It is no wonder, then, that botanist Thomas Nuttall, McMahon's contemporary, named a new genus, Mahonia, after Bernard McMahon.

I wish more people would grow Mahonia and not just because McMahon should be honored and celebrated in his adopted country.

Every garden needs structure and evergreen shrubs are a great way of marking boundaries, defining specific areas and providing year-round color. The most common varieties of evergreen Mahonia, sometimes THE STATE WE'RE IN

called "Oregon grape holly," do all of that and more. The "Oregon" common name usually refers to an American native species, Mahonia aquifolium, which is native to the West. Sometimes it is also used to describe Mahonia japonica, a native of China, with similar good looks and habits.

If you saw a single Mahonia aquifolium or japonica leaflet — dark, glossy green, with spiny edges — you would think it was a holly leaf. The resemblance does not go much further, as Mahonias and hollies are not closely related. Both genera bear leaves that are alternate on the stems. Mahonia differs from holly in that each "leaf" is really a compound structure up to 1 foot long, made up of anywhere from seven to 19 leaflets that are also opposed on the stems. Botanists refer to this form as "pinnately compound."

True holly leaves start out green and stay that way. Mahonia leaves emerge red and green up as they mature. Holly's wood is light brown when cut, whereas Mahonia wood is bright yellow, like its relatives, the barberries.

Another very visible difference between true hollies and Oregon grape holly is the flowers. Holly flowers are most often small and white, giving way eventually to the bright red berries that adorn our holiday decorations. Mahonias bear showy panicles or flowerheads of small yellow blooms with a pronounced lily-of-the-valley scent. The bees love them in spring and so do humans.

Once the flowers have faded, the blue "grapes" of Mahonia's common name appear. These are round to oval, blueberry-size fruits with a waxy or glaucous surface. Though sour, they are edible and can be made into jam if you are so inclined and can get to the bushes ahead of the birds.

Shade gardeners frequently despair about their landscape choices. They can rejoice in Mahonia, which thrives in partial shade. Once established in neutral to acid soil, it can also survive drought. Many true hollies grow into substantial trees; aquifolium and japonica grape hollies top out at three to 7 feet. For those with smaller spaces, the Compacta variety of Mahonia aquifolium reaches only 3 feet tall.

Mahonias suit woodland-type gardens, evergreen showcases and habitat landscapes. The aquifolium species is perfect for native plant gardens. I would choose Mahonia over barberry every time for boundary hedges. Like barberry, Mahonia increase by producing root suckers, but if you watch out for them and remove them promptly, the plant

will not spread. If any pruning is necessary, do it after the flowers have faded.

Throughout America's history, people have applied their own definitions to the word "patriotism" and those definitions sometimes cause conflict. If you want to define noncontroversial patriotism — and good horticultural judgment — in your own garden, plant Mahonia aquifolium and honor Bernard McMahon.

# Westfield BOE panel urges no on full-day kindergarten

Less than two years after voters approved \$13.6 million in bonds for upgrades to schools, the Westfield Board of Education probably will not seek to add full-day kindergarten anytime soon.

'The Long-Range Planning Committee will be recommending to the full board that we not proceed with a full-day kindergarten program at the present time," committee Chairman Mark Friedman told the school board at its Dec. 5 meeting.

The committee's report followed a survey of town residents and its analysis of the results. The committee's report can be found on the district's website.

Regardless of whether the response to full-day kindergarten was supportive, there was a strong appeal for alternate means of funding other than a tax increase, the report said.

In order to fund the full-day program, Westfield would have to construct additional classrooms to one or more of the existing schools, likely through a 20-to-30 year bond, resulting in a tax increase of approximately \$40 for the average

The school board also would have to approve hiring new staff, estimated to cost an additional \$250 per household or about \$290 per year total.

"I think that it's important to note here that it is not our goal to simply stand still and not move our district forward with respect to the need for other options for our students," Friedman told the board. "We are only making the decision to look for other alternatives that would not put a financial burden on the district and ultimately the residents of West-

The survey, nearly three weeks long, closed Nov. 20 with 1,512 responses. It showed that 56 percent of respondents support full-day kindergarten, while almost 25 are opposed.

It also showed that 84 percent of respondents with children of pre-school age want the full-day program, while only 28 percent in the under-30 and over-49 age groups like the idea.

Friedman underscored the importance of the board seeking alternatives to the full-day program.

"As an example, we have a very successful 'Wrap' program. Dr. (Margaret) Dolan and the administration will look at creative ways to perhaps expand that program," he said, referring to Westfield's schools superintendent. "As part of that process, we will look at other spaces in town that might be able to support the growth of the Wrap program."

The Wrap program is a fee-based, option that offers half-day, afternoon and morning sessions to kindergarten students, who may take part in educational activities while not attending the regular half-day program.

A total of about 200 students attend morning and afternoon half-day kindergarten in Westfield's Lincoln School. Another 200 or more attend private programs, according to the committee's

Despite the committee's decision, fullday kindergarten is common throughout the state.

"Ninety percent of the school districts in New Jersey currently have a full-day kindergarten program," the report stated.

#### Newark man charged in Hillside fatal shooting

An Essex County man has been arrested for the fatal shooting that took place in Hillside in early December, the Union County Prosecutor's office announced in a press release.

Jevon Pittman, 24, of Newark was charged with murder and related weapons offenses in connection with the death of 29-year-old Kevinray Hall of Hillside.

At approximately 9 p.m. on Dec. 2, members of the Union County Homicide Task Force responded to the 100 block of Summer Avenue in Hillside to find Hall suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. He was transported to Newark Beth Israel Medical Center in critical condition for emergency treatment and pronounced dead at approximately 11:40 p.m.

A joint investigation by the Homicide

Task Force, Hillside police and Union County Sheriff's Office Crime Scene Unit resulted in Pittman being identified as a suspect, and he was placed into custody without incident on Warren Street in Newark shortly after 4 p.m. on Dec. 6. Members of the Hillside and Newark police departments assisted the Prosecutor's Office detectives in making the arrest. Pittman was subsequently lodged in Union County Jail pending a first appearance in Superior Court.

Anyone with information about the shooting still is being urged to contact Homicide Task Force Sgt. Jose Vendas at 908-358-3048 or Detective Rich Acosta at 908-347- 0404. Convictions on murder charges are commonly punishable by terms of 30 years to life in state prison.

# Derailment cleanup to last more than week

(Continued from Page 1) fire Chief Mike Scanio and a CSX railroad spokeswoman said Dec. 11.

The train, which measured 8,600 feet or about 1.6 miles in length, was heading east-bound to Selkirk, N.Y., when the front portion jumped the tracks about a quarter of a mile west of the Union station.

"I was a little bit like 'Wow, look what we have here," Scanio said. "Once the engineer and conductor showed us the manifests and they said they were just carrying gravel and rocks, I felt 'OK, this isn't as bad as I thought.'

"My first fear, as I was driving there, is that I was praying to God it was not a commuter train."

Train cars of all types — box cars, tank cars and covered hoppers — were seen piled like toys, perpendicular to one another in some spots.

"(The derailment) was in multiple locations," Scanio said. "There was a large span of debris, a half to three-quarters of mile between pile-ups. I was first told it was behind the gas company on Green Lane. And when I got there, I was like, 'Wow this can't be the same pileup. We have a major train derailment."

Scanio said federal Homeland Security officials were on the scene Friday afternoon, but he had not heard from them since then.

Conrail spokeswoman Jocelyn Hill said by phone that the rail agency was cooperating with the Federal Railroad Administra-

tion in its investigation of the crash. She did not have any preliminary reason for the cause of the derailment.

Scanio said repair crews had towed away all train cars that were moveable while damaged cars were pushed to the side so repair work could begin immediately on the rails, which were mangled in spots. He estimated it would be two weeks before the damaged cars could be completely removed.

"They spent every bit of the entire weekend removing the cars and repairing the track," Scanio said.

NJ Transit ran buses between Newark Penn Station and Cranford from Friday afternoon until restoring rail service for the morning rush-hour commute on Monday, Dec. 11.

Hill said that, although the rails were repaired by Sunday night, freight traffic was still being detoured around the area Monday.

"A lot of resources were brought to bear on this," Hill said. "Restoring passenger service was the top priority."

Scanio said the derailment is the biggest accident he's seen in his 28 years in the department.

# Rahway man gets 20 years for causing fatal collision

A Rahway man has been sentenced to 20 years in state prison for leading police on a vehicle pursuit that ended in a fatal crash in Elizabeth in 2015, acting Union County Prosecutor Thomas K. Isenhour announced Dec. 5 in a release.

Surpris Ophilien Jr., 32, must serve at least 85 percent of that term before the possibility of parole under the terms set by state Superior Court Judge Stuart Peim on

At approximately 2:30 a.m. on July 18, 2015, Elizabeth police were called to the Allstar Nightclub on Third Street in Elizabeth on a report of an altercation, according to Union County Homicide Task Force Supervisor Michael Henn and Assistant Prosecutor Armando Suarez, who prosecuted the case.

En route to the scene, two Elizabeth police officers spotted a green GMC pickup truck being driven by Ophilien travel through a red light at a high rate of speed, Henn and Suarez said.

Officers pursued, but once the pickup truck started traveling the wrong way down a one-way street, the pursuit was terminated. Moments later, a head-on collision took place on an overpass for a ramp leading to North Avenue East in Elizabeth.

Ophilien, who was found to be in possession of a loaded .45-caliber handgun, climbed out of the wrecked pickup and ran a short distance, leaping from the overpass to the roadway below before being arrested. The critically injured driver of the

vehicle Ophilien had struck, 25-year-old Edward G. Coleman Jr. of East Orange - a U.S. Navy veteran and father of three - was rushed to University Hospital in Newark, where he was pronounced dead several hours later.

Ophilien pleaded guilty to first-degree aggravated manslaughter and seconddegree certain persons not to own a weapon in June earlier this year.

On Dec. 4, Ophilien's attorney requested a shorter sentence on the grounds that the 20-year term would

cause his family hardship, but Peim denied the request, citing his prior criminal record and the fact that he had been less than two months into a five-year probationary term for heroin possession with the intent to distribute when he killed Cole-

# Opioid town hall reveals resistance to pot legalization

State Sen.-elect Joseph Cryan said he would oppose a proposed recreational marijuana bill, when asked about it at a town hall series at Kean University that addressed the rise in opioid deaths.

Cryan, who was a member of the New Jersey Assembly from 2002 until 2015 when he became the Union County sheriff, said he is concerned with revenue and "gateway issues" when it comes to legalizing marijuana. He supports decriminalization, saying he has seen how current laws disproportionately affect racial minorities.

"I do know there's reluctance in the state Senate," he said. He later added, "Every piece of data I've seen so far tells me that there's significant issues still to go. There's a lot of problems still with (the bill)."

The recreational marijuana bill is sponsored by state Sen. Nicholas Scutari, who represents Linden. The Linden City Council, meanwhile, created a committee last month to examine the impact of legalization on their city.

Medical professionals, law enforcement officials and those who work in drug prevention and treatment fielded questions from the public at the Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey town hall on Dec. 5.

The average age of those who overdose on opioids in Union County is 42 for women and 40 for men, Cryan said. Each year the number of opioid overdoses has increased in Union County: from 64 in 2015, to about 120 this year so far, acting Union County Prosecutor Thomas Isenhour said at the event.

Isenhour said law enforcement cannot "lock the problem away." Rather, there should be a shift to focus on treatment.

"Unfortunately, treatment costs a lot of money," he said. "And probably, it's much more expensive to treat somebody, than to lock somebody up. Unfortunately, for whatever reason, people seem willing to fund the law enforcement effort, but they're not willing to fund the treatment efforts."

About 60 to 80 percent of those addicted to opioids started out taking painkillers, according to Cryan. The rise in addiction, he said, correlates with an "overabundance" of prescription painkillers.

Officials said the amount of unused medication not disposed of properly contributes to the problem. Project Medicine Drop allows residents to dispose of unused or expired medications anonymously and safely at local police stations.

New Jersey doctors are starting to prescribe pain medication less frequently, according to Dr. Andrew Kaufman, director of University Hospital's Comprehensive Pain Center in Newark. In 2011 there were about 5 million prescriptions for pain medication written, but the latest data showed that number is down to 4.5 million, he said.

"We have the second-lowest per capita prescription writing in the country," Kauf-

man said. "The lowest is Hawaii."

There is now more information available to doctors as to who should be prescribed opioids, Dr. Steven Peskin, executive medical director of population health at Horizon Blue Cross Blue Shield of New Jersey, said.

In Union County, programs are available for those who seek treatment, including the Community Law Enforcement Addiction Recovery, or C.L.E.A.R. program. Under this program, people can turn in illegal drugs and paraphernalia at the Union County Sheriff's Office without facing arrest. Participants are then connected with a recovery specialist from Prevention Links, a nonprofit organization based in Roselle that combats drug use. If someone with an active warrant seeks treatment under the program, court officials suspend the warrant for 90 days, Cryan said.

The auditorium at Kean was filled for the town hall event. Attendees made suggestions to those on the stage, including promoting hiring programs for those in recovery.

The Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey has held several other Knock Out Opioid Abuse events this year.

Last month, Isenhour and representatives from Prevention Links spoke about the county's opioid crisis at Roselle Catholic High School, which was sparsely attended.



# Cranford teen honored for helping county homeless

Cranford student Daniel Serna, 15, was recently recognized for working to alleviate the pressures of homelessness in Union County by Homefirst Interfaith Housing and Family Services Inc.

Serna received the 2017 HomeFirst Hero Award from the homeless shelter and nonprofit organization at the organization's Evening of Thanks dinner at the Shackamaxon Country Club on Nov. 1. For his project, which began as a bar mitzvah initiative and is now in its fifth year, Serna collects thousands of school supplies each year.

The HomeFirst Hero Award is for individuals who have exhibited exemplary service to Homefirst and its clients, spokeswoman Karla Spivey told LocalSource in a Dec. 6 email.

"I feel honored to be recognized by Homefirst for helping other kids get the supplies they need to start the school year off right," Serna told LocalSource in an email Dec. 7. "Receiving this award helps me realize the difference I can make in the community."

Serna's partnership with the nonprofit organization started as a community service project while making preparations for his bar mitzvah.

"I thought of Homefirst because my temple, Temple Sholom in Scotch Plains, had worked with Homefirst on other projects in the past," the teen said. "I came up with the idea of collecting school supplies because school is hard, and supplies are expensive. Having the right supplies to begin the year helps kids start the year off right."

Every summer, Serna sets up a donation bin at the Cranford Community Center, at PrimeTime summer camp in Cranford and at Temple Sholom in Scotch Plains.

"The first year I collected about 1,000 items and by the second year it was more than 2,000 new school supplies," Serna said. "Next year will be my fifth year, and I've already had some people give me donations in September, when they found school supplies on sale and wanted to help start the collection for next year."

The Homefirst Family Success Center in Plainfield hosts an annual back-to-school day in August, when families can pick up their supplies, Serna said.

"I like that Homefirst works directly with families in our local community, and I've volunteered at Homefirst so I know that they make a direct impact in people's lives," he said.

Through a variety of programs, the organization works to tackle homelessness. Spivey noted that programs include everything from transitional housing for individuals and families for 12 to 18 months, to emergency cash assistance for rent, mortgages and transportation.

There are two support centers located in Plainfield and one in Hillside, Spivey said,

According to Spivey, Homefirst give support to more than 2,000 men, women and children throughout Union County. In noting the importance of the organization's work, she underscored a report in the 2017 NJ Point In Time Count citing there were about 8,532 homeless men, women and children living in New Jersey.





# Cost of gifts this season is nearly the same as last year

According to one festive and fun annual economic indicator, the cost of this holiday season for shoppers is not expected to rise a significant amount over last year.

For more than 30 years, PNC has calculated the combined estimated price of the gifts from the classic carol "The 12 Days of Christmas." Known as the PNC Christmas Price Index, the results can indicate what holiday shoppers might expect at the register.

This year, the index calculated the total price of all 12 gifts to be \$34,558.65, a modest 0.6 percent increase over last year.

While the average consumer is unlikely to shop online or at the mall in search of geese-a-laying or a partridge in a pear tree, the Christmas Price Index can be informative for those planning their holiday shopping, as the cost for these gifts often increase or decrease at a rate consistent with the U.S. Consumer Price Index, a measure of inflation produced by the U.S. Department of Labor.

"The U.S. economy is growing at a sustainable pace, fueled by higher consumer

confidence, low unemployment, modest wage gains and low interest rates," says Thomas P. Melcher, chief investment officer for PNC Asset Management Group. "However, The PNC Christmas Price Index rose at slow steady pace of 0.6 percent in 2017, as companies appear hesitant to pass through price increases to the consumer."

A few factors largely have driven changes in the index over the years. The Internet makes it easier to find the gifts from the song online, but these goods and services tend to be expensive, mainly due to added shipping and handling costs. The price of services overall has increased, while the price of goods has slowed. Fuel costs, which have been especially volatile over the last few years, have a major effect on the cost of shipping. So, while you may have no need to buy anyone on your list any maids-a-milking, it is good for jewelry lovers to know that the price of golden rings jumped more than any other gift that may be on their true love's wishlist this year!

# Protesters persist outside Elizabeth courthouse

Six protesters gathered at the Union County Courthouse for the fifth week Wednesday, Dec. 6, to protest the excessive force allegedly used against a One-Stop Career Center employee during her arrest in Elizabeth.

Titianna Cunningham, 21, said that when she entered the Elizabeth Avenue employment office where she works on Oct. 18, Union County Sheriff's Officer Sandro Reyes began to scan her with a metal detector wand.

The incident eventually resulted in Cunningham facing three charges: obstructing administration of law, resisting arrest or eluding an officer, and criminal trespass, a court official said.

According to Cunningham, Reyes scanned her three times with the metal detector wand, and an alarm never sounded.

"I told him after the third time, 'I'm not dealing with this,'" she told LocalSource in front of the courthouse on Dec. 6. "Call my supervisor. I'm not a client. I work here.' He didn't call my supervisor. He told me to step to the side or step out of the building. I told him, 'No, call my supervisor because I'm not dealing with this."

Cunningham said that when she stepped beyond the checkpoint and headed to the elevator, the officer stopped the door from closing with his foot and told her repeatedly to get out of the elevator.

"I told him I will, if he calls my supervisor to verify that I work here because he's harassing me now," she said.

Cunningham said she did not have her work identification card to show the officer when he asked for one, but another security guard confirmed that she worked in the building.

She said she told the security guard and Reyes that she was not able to leave the elevator because they were blocking her exit.



They stepped back and Cunningham started walking to the entrance "so they could call my supervisor," she said. That's when, according to Cunningham, Reyes grabbed her arm from behind her, slammed her to the floor, cursed at her and put both his knees in her back.

"I'm very traumatized and angry," she said. "It's past depression now. It's anger because now I have to deal with this every single day. Not only that, he traumatized me and abused me, now he's trying to ruin my life with the charges he placed against me."

105 YEARS

Union County Sheriff Joseph Cryan questioned why the protest of what he characterized as friends and family of Cunningham meritted a story before declining to comment further to LocalSource when reached Dec. 7 by phone. NJ Advance Media previously reported that Cryan said the department was investigating the incident.

Salaam Ismial, an activist from Elizabeth who organized the courthouse protest, said he had asked the state Attorney General's Office to take over the investigation to "avoid any skepticism from the public."

"It's a conflict, if anything," Ismial said.
"Cryan is transitioning" to the state Senate
in January.

A spokesman for the state Attorney General's Office said the agency does not confirm or deny investigations.

Cunningham's mother said her daughter had to go to therapy after the incident and they plan to file a civil suit against Reves.

Cunningham will make her first court appearance Jan. 9, 2018, a municipal court official said.



I decided to simply make a corn bread that tasted like stuffing. Not only was it delicious, but it was also gluten free to accommodate those with sensitivities. I hope you like it!

#### **Holiday Stuffing Corn Bread**

#### Ingredients

1 cup cornmeal

2 eggs

1/3 cup neutral oil - I use avocado oil

1 cup plain yogurt

1 15-oz. can creamed corn

2 Tbs. dried sage

1 Tbs. dried rosemary

1 tsp. salt

1 Tbs. baking powder

1 lb. portobello mushrooms, chopped finely

1 Tbs. butter

Steps

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In a medium-sized frying pan over medium heat, melt the butter.

Saute the chopped mushrooms until wilted.

While the mushrooms are cooking, mix all the other ingredients in a large bowl until combined.

When the mushrooms are cooked and cooled, add them to the corn mixture and stir until combined.

Grease a 9-inch-by-13-inch "casserole dish," fill with the batter and bake for 45-50 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean.

# New Jersey Department of Health urges flu vaccines

The state Department of Health reminds residents to get an annual flu vaccine before flu activity begins increasing in the state. While seasonal flu outbreaks can happen as early as October, flu activity is usually highest between December and February.

"Now that flu season has arrived, the best way to protect yourself, your family and your co-workers is to get a flu shot," acting Health Commissioner Christopher R. Rinn said in a recent press release. "Flu vaccination can reduce flu illnesses, doctor visits, missed work and school as well as prevent flu-related hospitalizations."

National Influenza Vaccination Week was the week of Dec. 3. and educational institutions, businesses, organizations, and community partners were encouraged to participate in the New Jersey Influenza Honor Roll.

Institutions from these categories participated in flu prevention campaigns, flu vaccination clinics, or partnerships with local stakeholders to promote flu awareness and prevention. In addition, students at eight participating colleges and universities are engaged in a friendly competition to improve flu-vaccination coverage on their campuses through the department's first

annual New Jersey College and University Flu Chal-

'To increase vaccination coverage and to continue to protect the health of New Jersey residents, it requires collaboration among stakeholders within our communities," Assistant Commissioner and State Epidemiologist Tina Tan said. "Through these initiatives, our partners share the responsibility of ensuring that New Jerseyans are aware of the dangers of flu, the benefits of the flu shot, and have greater access to vaccination.'

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends a yearly flu vaccine for everyone 6 months of age and older. Certain people are at greater risk for serious complications from the flu. Those at high risk

children younger than 5, but especially children younger than 2 years old;

people 65 years of age and older; pregnant and postnatal women;

Native-Americans and Alaskan natives; and

people with medical conditions such as asthma, heart disease, and diabetes.

The Department of Health stresses that a flu vaccination should be a priority for those who live with or care for individuals at higher risk for influenza-related complications, including health care personnel and household contacts of children less than 6 months old who are too young to receive the vaccine.

For the 2017-2018 season, the CDC recommends only injectable flu shots be used. The nasal spray flu vaccine should not be used based on concerns about its effective-

As long as flu viruses are circulating, it's not too late to get vaccinated, even in January or later.

Flu vaccines are offered in many locations including doctor's offices, clinics, local health departments, urgent care centers and pharmacies.
