

Union students join national gun walkout

UNION — Hundreds of Union High School students marched to town hall as part of a nationwide demonstration against gun violence in the wake of the Parkland, Fla., shooting that left 17 dead last month.

Students stood on the high school football field around 10 a.m. on March 14 for 17 minutes of silence in remembrance of the students and teachers killed. Hundreds then walked to town hall, chanting "Enough is enough," a phrase coined on social media for frustration with the number of school shootings that have taken place.

"Gun laws is one part of the argument," said high school student Sienna Bucu, adding that she wants to see action taken on mental health or security in schools, too. "All I really want is action. Everyone is talking about what';s right and what's wrong how they feel about an argument — and they're just talking."

Students in other Union County towns – including Hillside, Elizabeth, New Providence, Summit, Springfield, Westfield, Scotch Plains, Linden and Clark – also demonstrated. Some students walked outside the school building with signs, while others met with local officials inside the school.

Kenilworth mulls ways to absorb sewerage cost spike

KENILWORTH — The borough council's finance committee is currently considering how it will incorporate an unexpected \$200,000 charge into the town's 2018 municipal budget, due to the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority's yearly assessment.

The municipality's budget for the year will be introduced on April 11, clerk Laura Reinertsen told LocalSource.

The council learned of the 28-percent increase by the RVSA at its January meeting. The increase is nearly three times the next highest municipality increase in the 11-member cooperative. Mayor Anthony DeLuca requested an investigation into the RVSA's billing methodology, which was discussed at the RVSA regular meeting March 15.

The \$200,000 represents 1.3 percent of Kenilworth's \$15.3 million budget last year, leaving only about \$100,000 to fit everything else in under the state-mandated 2-percent cap for the borough of about 8,200.

The RVSA calculates its charges based on a five-year rolling average. Each member municipality of the cooperative is assessed a percentage of the yearly budget based on a formula of three components: total flow, biochemical oxygen demand and total suspended solids. A number for each town is generated from metering conducted by the RVSA at multiple locations.

"All of us (municipality representatives) have to know that when we get that yearly number — that the yearly number translates into the five-year rolling average number, and that the number is right," Bob Beiner, RVSA commissioner for Kenilworth, said at the March meeting. "From Kenilworth's point of view, we feel like we are getting overcharged."

Beiner noted that from 2012 through 2015, Kenilworth's yearly rounded numbers were 2.0, 2.2, 2.4 and 2.6. However, in 2016, Kenilworth's number more than doubled to 5.3, and last year the number went to 5.6.

"For a four-year period our average was 2.3, and then the last two years we went up to 5.5," Beiner said. "From my point of view, something is definitely wrong here. Common sense is that something is wrong."

Beiner noted that, out of curiosity, he had looked at the

populations of every town in the cooperative and found that Kenilworth comprises only 3 percent of the people served by the RVSA.

"This means our cost should roughly be approximately 3 percent," he said. "The last two assessment numbers are over 3 percent."

RVSA Executive Director Jim Meehan later replied to Beiner's concerns, saying that population size is just one of the many moving variables that affect the bill, and population size is not always the best indicator.

"We are doing the best with a system that is inherently flawed," Meehan said of the metering system.

Meehan referred to the meters that have an acknowledged margin of error, which can as much as 3 percent on each meter, Meehan previously told LocalSource.

Kenilworth's former commissioner on the RVSA, Richard LoForte, previously told LocalSource that when authorities change metering companies through a bidding process, each company has to certify its meters, but each company certifies them differently, which is See KENILWORTH, Page 10



Officials issue Newark Airport measles alert

The N.J. Department of Health issued an alert March 14 that anyone who traveled through Newark Airport March 12 may have been exposed to measles and, if infected, could develop symptoms as late as April 2.

Anyone who develops symptoms of measles should call a health care provider before going into a medical office or emergency department so that special arrangements can be made for evaluation while protecting other patients and medical staff from possible infection, according to a release from the NJDOH.

A young child who arrived in Terminal B at Newark Liberty International Airport from Brussels and departed for Memphis from Terminal C was later confirmed to have the highly contagious disease. It said the child was infectious on that day and may have traveled to other areas of the airport. Those at the airport between 12:45 and 9 p.m could have been exposed, officials said.

Measles symptoms include rash, high fever, cough, runny nose and red, watery eyes. The disease can cause serious complications such as pneumonia and encephalitis, or swelling of the brain. Measles infection in a pregnant woman can lead to miscarriage, premature birth or a low-birthweight baby. Measles is easily spread through the air by coughs and sneezes. People can also become sick when they come in contact with mucus or saliva from an infected person.

State residents identified as having been potentially exposed by being on the same flights as the ill individual will be notified by their local health departments.

The NJDOH said an exposed person could be at risk if they had not been vaccinated or have not had measles.

"Two doses of measles vaccine are about 97 percent effective in preventing measles," said state epidemiologist Christina Tan. "We urge everyone to check to make sure they and their family members are up-to-date on measles/mumps/rubella — MMR — vaccine and all other age-appropriate immunizations."

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Colorectal cancer awareness gets push in March

BERKELEY HEIGHTS — Colorectal cancer isn't a common topic for discussion and its symptoms are rarely noticed early.

Those are just two of the reasons why advocates for National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month are promoting recognition of the deadly disease via various events in municipalities throughout Union County in March, such as free screenings and testing.

While the disease can be prevented, "the warning signs come fairly late, which is part of the problem," Dr. Tamir Ben-Menachem, chairman of Gastroenterology at Summit Medical Group MD Anderson told LocalSource.

Colorectal cancer is the third most common type of cancer diagnosed in the United States after breast and prostate cancer, Ben-Menachem said.

The disease is caused by tumors that form on the lining of the colon or rectum, which are sections of the large intestine, the lower part of the body's digestive system.

Some warning signs are blood in the stool or changes in bowel habits, the doctor added.

In addition to receiving screenings and colonoscopies, Ben-Menachem suggested alternative preventative measures people can take, such as eating a high-fiber diet, consuming less red meat and refraining from tobacco use.

Although the American Cancer Society predicts the disease will kill more than 50,000 people this year, a greater emphasis on colonoscopies and screenings can reduce that number. The ACS attributes the reasons behind a dropping death rate in both men and women to a number of reasons.

"One is that colorectal polyps, small clumps of cells that form on the lining of the colon or rectum, are now being found more often by screening and are removed before they can develop into cancers," according to the ACS website.

Colorectal polyps are also being found earlier, when the disease is easier to treat, the ACS states.

Currently, "only 62 percent of the U.S. population gets screened for colon cancer," Ben-Menachem said. "If 100 percent got screened, we could substantially prevent deaths," he added.

An event that emphasized disease prevention occured in Hillside last week and future events are to be organized in Berkeley Heights and Union.


For Union residents, Colorectal Cancer Education and Screening Day will be held Friday, March 23, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., at the Vauxhall Community Meeting Hall on Russell Street in Vauxhall.

"We're happy to host this event in recognition of National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month," Union Mayor Suzette Cavadas said in a March 16 press release. "It's important to understand that with the right education, colorectal cancer is identifiable and moreover preventable."

While part of the event will include a presentation by the Union County Office of Health Management, various screenings — including glucose and blood pressure testing — will also be available. Additionally, colorectal cancer screening kits will be distributed.

The New Jersey Cancer Education and Early Detection Screening Program will also provide free breast, cervical, prostate and colorectal screenings to those at or below 250 percent of the Federal Poverty Level, and who are also uninsured or underinsured.

In Berkeley Heights, Ben-Menachem was set to speak Thursday, March 29, at 7 p.m. about the importance of screening and the warning signs of colon cancer at 1 Diamond Hill Road.



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Roselle school board OKs disputed firm for audit

ROSELLE — The school board has voted to appoint the controversial Bayonne-based firm Donohue, Doria & Tomkins to conduct a forensic audit after previously deciding not to use the company.

The firm was hired at a March 13 special meeting to conduct a forensic audit for the period of Jan. 1, 2017 to Jan. 31 of this year for a price not to exceed \$28,000, according to the resolution.

The review was called for after former school board business administrator Jason Jones and his secretary were "relieved of their responsibilities" effective Jan. 30, the superintendent previously said.

School board member Archange Antoine abstained from the vote, while Keyanna Lovett voted against it. Richard Villeda did not take his seat at the dais until after the board had already voted on the agenda's only measure.

Roll call was taken after the vote by the school board attorney's assistant, Mark DiPisa, when residents attending the meeting reminded school board officials that it was needed.

It appears the firm began work in the district before a contract for a special auditor appeared on an agenda for the board's approval.

Reading what appeared to be a written statement, school board President Patricia Fabrizio said at the board's Feb. 8 meeting: "The board can confirm that we have hired an outside auditing firm to conduct a forensic audit and that the forensic audit has already begun. As this matter involves investigation (and) potential matters of personnel, the board, its members and employees cannot discuss the matter any further at this time."

School board attorney Allan Roth, who was not at the Feb. 8 meeting, told Local-Source the next day that Donohue, Doria & Tomkins had been chosen. A resolution for the firm did not appear on the agenda until Feb. 26, after LocalSource inquired about it. The Feb. 26 school board meeting lasted until almost 2 a.m the next day. A vote for the forensic auditor wasn't taken until about 1 a.m., as members of the audience shouted while board members voted.

Roth, who was struggling to keep a tally of votes, said the measure did not pass in a 5-4 vote against the firm, although he couldn't "recall" how each member had voted.

Donohue, Doria & Tomkins recently audited the Bayonne School District and initially found a \$2 million deficit, until the state later discovered the hole never existed, The Jersey Journal reported in November 2017.

The Feb. 26 resolution said the Bayonne firm "has an excellent reputation in the area of public school auditing." That resolution originally called for the firm's compensation not to exceed \$25,000, or \$3,000 less than what was approved a the March 13 meeting.

The school board also took a voice vote Feb. 26 to have its counsel contact the state Office of Fiscal Accountability and Compliance to investigate its central office. State Department of Education spokesman Michael Yaple told LocalSource on March 2 that the state planned to meet with local school officials soon.

"The DOE's goal is to assist school districts and provide technical support whenever possible,"

Yaple said March 2. "In fact, staff from the DOE plan to meet with local school officials in the near future."

In other business, DiPisa, the school board attorney's assistant, gave newly appointed school board member Courtney Washingington her oath of office again during the March 13 meeting.

He explained that although Washington had been sworn in at the Feb. 26 meeting, she had not signed her oath. DiPisa told school board members that all Washington's votes at the Feb. 26 still count.

Washington was appointed by school board members after Arthur Rice abruptly resigned in January, causing the board to stall on most measures due to a 4-4 split.

Man shot on Routes 1&9 in Elizabeth

Shots fired from a dark-colored SUV into another car on U.S. Routes 1&9 near McClellan Street in Elizabeth in the early morning hours of March 17 left a 28-year-old man in critical condition, the Union County Prosecutor's Office announced in a recent press release.

Authorities have asked for the public's help and seeks anyone who may have witnessed or has information about the shooting, which occurred on a busy stretch of road near the Newark border sometime between 5:15 and 5:45 a.m.

The victim, an Elizabeth resident who was not identified by authorities, was a passenger in a white BMW SUV when he was stuck by the gunfire, the prosecutor's office said in the release. The driver of the SUV took the victim to get emergency medical treatment.

Incumbent Roselle Dem mayor to run as independent

ROSELLE PARK — Incumbent Mayor Carl Hokanson will run as an independent candidate in the November election after the local Democratic Party voted unanimously to endorse 30-year-old Joe Signorello III instead.

Hokanson, who in 2013 secured the local Democrats' endorsement for the primary mayoral election, said that he will run as an independent after not receiving their nod this time around.

"Yes, and to ensure that I would be on the November ballot," he said in a phone interview on March 13, later adding that, "I felt it was the best thing for me."

Hokanson, a former Roselle Park police lieutenant and councilman at large, first announced his candidacy for the upcoming mayoral election in a statement on his official Facebook page.

"I have met and discussed my perspective with the Roselle Park Democratic Committee and spoke them as to what I feel my role as your mayor should be," his March 4 statement read. "Through these discussions, it has been decided that our paths were not aligned."

Roselle Park Democratic Committee Chairman Daniel Petrosky said his party's endorsement for the June primary wasn't given to Hokanson because he "wasn't a team player." Petrosky said it was "a hard decision to make" since he's known

Hokanson for more than 50 years and is "friends" with his family.

The mayor "doesn't get along with any of the Democratic council people," Petrosky said in a phone interview. "My brother's been on council for the last four years. ... He hasn't talked to my brother at all. When there's a decision to make (Hokanson) doesn't talk ahead of time, he just brings it up at the meeting."

While Signorello is a newcomer to politics, his family has roots in the borough. His father is the current fire chief and also sits on the local board of education.

He graduated from Seton Hall University and works in a technology position in the

banking industry, grew up in Roselle Park and attended Union County Magnet High School in Scotch Plains. He also participated in the borough school district's sports teams.

Hokanson, in a phone interview, said Signorello lived outside the country for five years before returning last year. But Signorello said he views that as a positive experience, not a negative one.

"I did really well in New York out of our Manhattan offices for a Swiss bank and they thought I was good enough to go to the headquarters in Zurich," Signorello said. "I think Roselle Parkers should have the opportunity to learn things overseas and take those lessons back home."

He noted that many young people move to big cities and then run for office somewhere else, which creates a "vacuum of useful energy that these small towns need."

Signorello said, if elected, he would want to be as "effective and efficient" with tax dollars as possible, and focus on making transit riders and families "happy" by highlighting the borough's transit hubs. He would also want to focus on making the borough more environmentally friendly.

Hokanson, meanwhile, described himself as a nearly "full-time" mayor who plans to continue focusing on residential and commercial development in the borough. He had multiple meetings planned with contractors, and noted the mixed-use Meridia on Westfield development broke ground in September during his tenure.

Petrosky and Hokanson both said they think the recent split will not boost Republicans' chances in the November general election. Petrosky called Signorello a "strong" candidate, while Hokanson said he can gain votes from both Republicans and Democrats.

The local Democratic Party has also endorsed 2nd Ward Councilman Joseph Petroksy for re-election and Robert Mathieu for 5th Ward councilman. Roselle Park Republican Committee Chairman Larry Leone told LocalSource that his party has endorsed a slate, and will announce those endorsements later this month.



Hundreds walk out over Florida school shooting

(Continued from Page 1) The Union students' plan to march to town hall was initially met with opposition from school board President Vito Nufrio. He placed a resolution on the March 13 meeting agenda that called for students to be disciplined per school policy if they participated in the walkout and left school grounds.

"Your right to demonstrate or protest does have specific boundaries that are clearly detailed within the resolution," Nufrio said at the meeting, reading from a letter he had written. "It is not intended to violate nor deter you from exercising your constitutional right to speak and assemble. It's sole purpose is to advise and guide you as we are expected to do so."

That resolution, which called the walkout a "disruption," was pulled from the agenda after students, board member Jeff Monge, parents and some teachers showed their opposition at the meeting.

The whole school, which has a student population of more than 2,000, did not participate in the walkout, Superintendent Gregory Tatum said as he watched from the bleachers while students stood on the football field.

"Your first line of discipline authority is with your building principal, Mr. Lowery," Tatum said earlier at the March 13 meeting, addressing the students. "Tomorrow morning, I will confer with him regarding any disciplinary issues that he may choose to institute, if any at all for that matter.

That's going to be his prerogative and he will have my support for whatever decision he does make.

"But I will say that I ask you to be safe," Tatum added. "I'm going to ask you to organize yourselves appropriately and represent yourselves and your families well tomorrow. Hopefully this will be a situation where it will provide a lesson for all of us as a teaching moment."

Although hundreds stood on the football field, some went back to class and did not participate in the march to town hall. Student demonstrators blocked the eastbound lane as they walked about a mile on Morris Avenue, with police on foot, motorcycle and in patrol cars blocking traffic.

School Principal Corey Lowery told LocalSource that students who peacefully marched to town hall would not be disciplined. Once they arrived back at the high school, attendance would be taken again, he said.

"I want you guys to remember this is not a one-day thing," he said. "You live your life based on your values and your principals. If you believe something is not right in your world, in your country, in your town, in your community, and your home you have to speak up about it. You have to plan and you have to organize.

"This is not about being emotional," Lowery added. "This is about being rational. It's about being logical and it's about being intelligent. I just want to let you guys know that you guys have made me proud as your principal. I will never forget this moment in my life and I believe that this is what true education is about."

Students also read poems and speeches and were joined by Union Mayor Suzette Cavadas on the steps of town hall.

"Gun violence is a major issue in this world," the mayor said. "I, as a parent, am committed to ensure and work with the board of education, the police and advisory committees to make sure that what happened in Parkland, Fla., does not happen here in Union."

Seventeen people were shot dead at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Florida on Valentine's Day, allegedly by a former student who reportedly used a semi-automatic AR-15 rifle.

Union High School students arrived back at campus at around 1 p.m. after the demonstration.

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Roselle business students putting prospective skills to use

ROSELLE — Nine high school business students are getting intense on-the-job training in their prospective field as they look to compete in an international career competition.

And they're learning the challenges of many businesses – raising funds.

After initially qualifying via the state competition in Atlantic City, members of Abraham Clark High School's Distributive Education Clubs of America chapter were invited to participate in the International Career and Development Conference in Atlanta, Ga., from April 21 to 24.

Despite several fundraising measures, such as bake sales and a GoFundMe online campaign, their March 31 deadline is edging closer and the students still need \$8,815 to make the trip.

Amazen Barnette, president of the school's DECA chapter, told LocalSource the group sells popcorn and cupcakes every Friday, which generates an estimated \$100 per week.

"And on March 28, the borough of Roselle is holding a districtwide fundraiser for \$5 to dress down in jeans instead of our normal uniforms," Barnette said.

The total fundraising goal is \$11,500, which will go toward the nine students' airfare, lodging, meals, and event and registration costs. It also will cover two adult chaperones.

"This is an incredible opportunity for these students and a great source of pride for the community of Roselle," club advisor Robert Norwood said. "Unfortunately, our students cannot afford to go without a lot of help."

If the students are able to go to Atlanta, one will even compete on behalf of the state of New Jersey against top international competitors.

"Attending this conference would mean that my school accomplished something," Barnette said. "It means taking my school on a national level and representing Abraham Clark High School."

Any leftover funds from the effort would go toward next year's DECA scholars' competition costs, the gofundme page states.

DECA is a co-curricular organization that focuses on preparing students for business-related careers in marketing, finance, hospitality and management.

The organization, founded in 1946, is not unique to Roselle but is international, with more than 215,000 members in all 50 U.S. states, the District of Columbia, Canada, China, Germany, Guam, Mexico, Puerto Rico and Spain

DECA is organized into two divisions: the high school division, with participation in 3,500 schools, and the collegiate division, which includes 275 colleges and universities.

Each DECA conference varies, Norwood said, but competitions typically task students with solving business scenarios and questions before a judge.

Since its inception in 2016, the Abraham Clark High School's DECA chapter has expanded its membership and has more than 50 students and 20 community professionals.

Throughout the year, the school's DECA chapter takes part in numerous charitable endeavors, previously raising more than \$900 to support the Bridge of Books Foundation, which gives books to underprivileged children in New Jersey.

The group also runs the Ram Nation Campus Store, the school's apparel retail outlet.

Whether to build upon marketing skills or to improve their public speaking, the students join the chapter for various reasons, Norwood told LocalSource.

"Participating in DECA means a lot to me," Barnette said. "The chapter gives me a lot of leadership and management skills which will aid my future career."



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Rise TV stars surprise Union High School students

UNION — Union High School theater students recently had a double whammy of a surprise: a \$10,000 grant from NBC for the school's theater department and the chance to meet stars from the network's new show, "Rise."

The theater department was one of 50 in the nation to receive NBC's R.I.S.E. America grant, created to "recognize and inspire student expression," according to a March 5 press release from the network.

"Once it all set in, cheers erupted, tears flowed and a general feeling of joy engulfed the room," Jennifer Williams, a choreographer in the school's theater department, said.

The television series "Rise," which debuted March 13, is based on the true story of a teacher who inspired students by building up the school's drama program. The R.I.S.E. America program's goal in making the grants available to school theater programs is similar.

Union High School was the only the school chosen to have three stars of the show — Damon J. Gillespie, Josh Radnor and Rosie Perez — visit students March 9. The show's creator, Jason Katims, and executive producer Flody Suarez were also on hand to take questions from students.

"It is a dream come true for me that 'Rise' will have a genuine impact on 50 high school drama programs throughout the

NBC worked with the Educational Theatre Foundation, a nonprofit organization that strives to shape lives through drama education, to provide the grant.

(Continued from Page 8) their stories reinforce the need to continue this momentum until every school in America has a well-funded theatre program."

Grant applicants had to submit a video showcasing their theater program and a 500-word essay saying how they would use the grant.

Williams said student Ronin Ruste, who plans to study film in college, helped make the department's submission video. The grant funds will be put toward infrastructure purchases to modernize the theater, she said.

UHS theater students first learned of the grant award while working on their own production of "Peter Pan," which opened March 16 and runs until March 25. "The arts is the place in a student's day where they get to put all of the academics together and interact with what they have learned in a hands-on way outside of the classroom," Williams said in a recent email. "In putting together a show like 'Peter Pan,' the students hit on all different subject areas; weaving real life skills with more thoughtful and academic processes."

She added that, during the current production, students have utilized lessons in history, math and English.

The R.I.S.E America grant program received more than 1,000 applications for the grant, according to the NBC press release. Bound Brook High School was the only other school in New Jersey to receive the grant.

Alternative billing methods were detailed in a memo issued by RVSA staff and engineers to the commissioners at the March 15 meeting. But, considering the other methods, enhancing the existing system is the most favorable and easily adaptable alternative, the memo concludes.

Several options for enhancing the existing methodology were outlined and it will be reviewed in the coming months according to the memo, which was obtained by LocalSource.

"We will continued to work and look on this," Meehan told the commissioners. "And an employee from the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission is working on this too."

"He runs the biggest collection system on the east coast, and we are putting the best eyes on this," Meehan continued.

The RVSA owns and operates a 35-acre wastewater treatment plant in Rahway that serves the 11 municipalities, approximately 250,000 residents and 3,500 commercial users.

Elizabeth man convicted for sex assault on couples

A Union County jury convicted an Elizabeth man of 60 counts for terrorizing, robbing and sexually assaulting couples staying at local motels during six weeks in 2012, the Union County Prosecutor's Office has announced.

Rasheed Powell, 42, was convicted on 24 counts of first-degree aggravated sexual assault, 12 counts of second-degree sexual assault, eight counts of first-degree robbery, four counts of second-degree burglary, and 12 related weapons offenses. The verdicts came following an eightweek trial before state Superior Court Judge Robert Kirsch and jury deliberations lasting three and a half days.

Beginning March 10, 2012, Powell targeted couples checking into motels along U.S. Routes 1&9 in Elizabeth and Linden, according to Prosecutor's Office Special Victims Unit Supervisor Caroline Lawlor and Assistant Prosecutor Tracy Boyd, who prosecuted the case. Powell would force his way into the motel rooms and order the couples to engage in sexual acts at gunpoint, then order the males into the bathroom while he sexually assaulted the female victims, Lawlor and Boyd said.

Using DNA and other forensic evidence, a joint investigation by the prosecutor's office's Sex Crimes Unit, Elizabeth police and Linden police, assisted by the Union County Sheriff's Office and Union County Police Department, resulted in Powell being identified as a suspect. He was arrested April 16, 2012 at Springfield Municipal Court, while responding to a traffic summons.

Three of the incidents for which Powell was charged took place at the Swan Motel in Linden, with the others occurring at the Benedict, now Bentley, Motel in Linden and the Spring Lane Motel and Royal Motel, both in Elizabeth. The March 6 convictions are connected to four of the six incidents, while Powell remains indicted and awaiting trial for the remaining two.

He has been held on \$3 million bail since his arrest, while also serving time in state prison for unrelated crimes.

All eight victims and numerous law enforcement representatives, including two sexual assault nurse examiners from the Union County Sexual Assault Response Team, testified at trial. Sentencing in the case has been tentatively scheduled for May 4 before Kirsch, at which time Powell will face a term of up to life in state prison.

County playground disability renovation grants awarded

UNION COUNTY — The county's 21 municipalities will divide a half million dollars to make local playgrounds more accessible for children with disabilities.

The grants, ranging from \$15,000 to \$25,470 per town, were approved at the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders' Feb. 8 meeting.

"Every child should be able to enjoy a playground in or near their neighborhood, and participate in enriching sensory experiences with friends, family and neighbors from all walks of life," freeholder Chairman Sergio Granados said in a March 15 press release.

The new "Level the Playing Field" grant program was introduced by Granados last year, and is part of UC HEART, his 2018 outreach and advocacy initiative.

"We would like this program to become a statewide model for counties and local governments, showing how we can work together and help all families make healthy outdoor play a lifetime habit," Granados said in the release.

Once all projects are completed, the county will be the first in New Jersey, and the first in the United States, to have a playground compliant with the Americans with Disability Act for every municipality within its borders, according to county spokesman Seb D'Elia.

Sixteen municipalities, including Berkeley Heights, Clark, Cranford, Garwood, Kenilworth, Linden, Mountainside, New Providence, Plainfield, Rahway, Roselle, Roselle Park, Scotch Plains, Springfield, Summit and Winfield Park received \$25,470.

Other municipalities were allotted lesser amounts. Fanwood and Westfield received \$15,000; Hillside received \$20,000; and Union was awarded \$17,010.

Some parks have already been renovated to make them ADA-compliant, such as Mattano Park in Elizabeth and the Sensory Trail in Watchung Reservation.

The Watchung Reservation trail is a three-tenths of a mile loop that includes Braille signs with rope guides and nature-themed play structures.

In addition to the recent developments within the county's park system, programming and special events are offered for people with disabilities at the Sensory Friendly Theatre at the Union County Performing Arts Center and the Ulrich Swimming Pool in Rahway, and the Watchung Stables and Trailside Nature and Science Center in Mountainside.

Annual fishing derbies, an ice skating social, summer carnival and barn dance, golf, karate, yoga and volleyball events also are organized.

Earlier this year, the county created the Office for People with Special Needs, the first office of its kind in New Jersey. A county release notes that the new office is charged with improving recreational and social opportunities, outreach to community groups and identifying new opportunities for engaging people with special needs.

The office operates under the new Division of Outreach and Advocacy in the Department of Human Services.

Contractor sues Kean over vending machines

UNION — A longstanding vendor with Kean University claims it was dumped for a company that gave the school a \$4.3 million "loan" and received a no-bid contract, court documents show.

Culinary Ventures Vending, of Union, alleged its contract with Kean was terminated by the university in 2017, and given to Delaware-based Canteen after receiving "loans" from Gourmet Dining Services, a Madison-based company that manages various food service outlets on campus. Both Canteen and Gourmet are owned by Compass Group USA.

The suit claims that Culinary had a "decades-long" relationship with the university, which never voiced "dissatisfaction" with its services. Culinary is asking for damages, including lost profits, interest and attorneys' fees.

"Upon information and belief, during the contractual relationship between (Culinary) and Kean," the suit reads, "representatives of Canteen and/or Gourmet met privately with representatives of Kean to craft an agreement which would end (Culinary') relationship with Kean in (direct) violation of the public bidding requirements of the State College Contracts Law."

Kean spokeswoman Margaret McCorry said the university "does not comment on pending litigation."

Culinary, which is owned by Paramount Vending Services, filed suit against Gourmet Dining, Canteen and Compass Group USA on Feb. 19 in Morris County Superior Court.

In 2014, the university received two responses to its request for bids to provide vending machine services on campus: one was from Culinary, while Canteen sent a letter stating that it was not submitting a bid because it wouldn't be profitable, the suit says.

The university cashed a \$10,000 check from Culinary, which accompanied its bid as a bond, despite not delivering an executed contract with the company, the suit alleges. Culinary interpreted the cashed check as the university's acceptance of its bid.

Kean also continued to receive cash and its monthly \$11,250 commission payments from Culinary, and continued to work under its "pre-existing contract," the suit states.

In May 2017, Andrew Brannen, Kean's vice president for administration and finance, sent a one paragraph letter to Culinary giving it a 30-day notice of termination without a cause, the suit says.

"Frankly, your letter lacks professionalism and credibility," wrote Jack Yuppa, a co-owner of Culinary, in response. "It is not what we have come to expect from any member of this excellent university. Consequently, we can only assume that, without any prior notification or bid, Kean University has sought to employ a different vendor."

Brannen responded, according to sup-

porting court documents, stating that Culinary had never accepted the terms of Kean's request for proposals from 2014. "Therefore, Kean University and (Culinary) have no current contract," Brannen wrote.

Culinary then filed an open public records request with the university for six documents, including a copy of its current vending contract and the latest Kean University Board of Trustees resolution approving it. According to the suit, Kean required eight extensions to respond to the OPRA request, which is generally supposed to be fulfilled within seven business days.

A March 2017 amendment to Kean's Food Services Agreement indicated that Kean was indebted to Gourmet Dining for about \$3.6 million, supporting court documents show. The amendment shows that Gourmet Dining also gave three additional "loans" to the university in the amounts of \$500,000, \$150,00 and \$20,000.

The amendment shows that these "loans" funded about \$3.6 million in capital improvements to the university "to facilitate the dining service program." The three additional loans were for other projects, including renovations to the Ursino restaurant on campus.

When reached by phone on March 16, no one from Gourmet Dining was available to speak to LocalSource about the suit. An email sent to Joseph Lally, the Gourmet Dining's marketing director, was not immediately returned.

The Board of Trustees minutes from its March 2017 meeting showed the school had approved a no-bid contract for food supplies and services for Compass Group USA/Canteen Vending, according to the suit. The resolution would have been passed while Culinary was still providing services to Kean, the suit posits.


Meanwhile, after waiting more than 100 days for Kean's current vending contract through the OPRA request, Culinary's lawyers reached out to Kean's in-house legal team to notifying them of the "unacceptable delay."

Two days later, Geri Benedetto, the chief university counsel, left a voicemail for Culinary's lawyers stating that, as of Sept. 28, Kean did not have a contract with Compass Group, the suit alleges. The same day of the voicemail, Kean's OPRA custodian provided Culinary with the vending agreement that Benedetto had allegedly said didn't exist.

In December 2017, Culinary served a tort claims notice to Kean, which could possibly result in additional claims against the defendants, the suit states.

Phone calls and emails to media relations officials at Compass Group were not immediately returned. However, Canteen spokeswoman Ann Sheridan said the company intends to "vigorously defend the matter."

"We are reviewing the suit, but our initial assessment of the allegations is that they lack any merit," Sheridan said in a March 16 email to LocalSource.

Pennsylvania man sentenced to life for Hillside robbery

A Pennsylvania man with an extensive criminal history has been sentenced to life in state prison for an armed robbery in Hillside a little less than three years ago.

Timothy Chambers, 51, of Delaware Water Gap, Pa., was sentenced under New Jersey's "three strikes" law by state Superior Court Judge Stuart Peim on Feb. 23, according to a press release from the Union County Prosecutor's Office.

At approximately 2:30 p.m. on March 17, 2015, Chambers and another man entered Prestige Auto Wash on Liberty Avenue in Hillside and asked the manager for change for \$3, according to Union County Assistant Prosecutors Jessica Guarducci and Kathleen Dillon, who prosecuted the case.

Chambers then followed the manager into his office, brandished a pistol and began trying to wrestle a bag of money away from him, Guarducci and Dillon said. Following a brief struggle, Chambers struck the manager on the head with his gun, grabbed the bag, and fled the scene with the second perpetrator.

Approximately one month later, Hillside police arrested Chambers without incident; the other robbery suspect remains unidentified and at large.

In December, a Union County jury convicted Chambers following a two-week trial before Peim and several hours of jury deliberation.

Golden Gloves finals to be held at UCPAC in Rahway

The finals of the New Jersey Golden Gloves amateur boxing tournament will be held at the Main Stage of the Union County Performing Arts Center in April and again next year, the venue announced in a March 14 press release.

This year's finals for the novice and open weight classes will be held April 20 and 21.

Sanctioned by USA Boxing, Golden Gloves winners will earn a trip to the Golden Gloves National Championship in May in Omaha, Neb.

The state Golden Gloves Finals in 2016 produced 123-pound open division winner Shakur Stevenson, who went on to claim the bantamweight Olympic silver medal for the United States at the 2016 Olympics in Rio de Janeiro. The Newark native previously won the World Junior and Youth Olympic flyweight titles in 2014. Stevenson was the first American man to medal in Olympic boxing since Andre Ward won gold and Andre Dirrell took a bronze in 2004.

UCPAC has partnered with Kevin Barbaro Productions in the planning and production of the event. The UCPAC Main Stage has 1,330 seats and is housed in the restored Rahway Theatre.

Plainfield preschool administrator charged with brandishing knife at kids

An administrator at a Plainfield pre-school is accused of disciplining two students by pulling a knife on them, the Union County Prosecutor's Office announced March 14.

Adetokunbo O. Akinnaso, 64, of Sicklerville, about 20 miles southeast of Camden, is charged with two counts of cruelty or neglect of children, a fourth-degree offense.

A prosecutor's office Special Victims Unit investigation was initiated by a referral from the state Department of Children and Families Institutional Abuse Investigation Unit, according to Union County Assistant Prosecutor Scott Peterson, who is prosecuting the case.

The investigation revealed that after two 4-year-old students were taken to Akinnaso's office for disciplinary reasons earlier this year, she produced a knife and threatened to harm them if they continued misbehaving, Peterson said.

Neither child was injured in the incident, according to reports. Akinnaso surrendered to

authorities and was released on a summons pending a first appearance in Superior Court. Convictions on fourth-degree criminal charges are commonly punishable by up to 18 months in state prison.





Work together to remove that bump in road

The latest governor of New Jersey, Phil Murphy, is only two months into his first term and

results in \$7 of cost five years later. Whole road rebuilding costs 14 times as much as repairs.

already both legislators and residents want to know how he's going to pay for all the improvements he's promised regarding women's wages, health care, climate change, immigration and offshore drilling. With his millionaire's tax, he may hope to generate

\$1.3 billion for New Jersey's underfunded schools, but it feels as though it may be just a drop in the bucket for all the work that needs to be done. A perfect example of this is something that often slips off our radar when discussing state budgets, at least until we have to drive somewhere in this commuter-heavy state: potholes.

Although this may seem almost a cosmetic complaint, potholes are anything but that. According to the National Surface Transportation Policy and Revenue Study Commission of the U.S. Congress, the annual investment required to simply maintain the nation's highways, roads and bridges is now estimated to be \$185 billion per year for the next 50 years. Today, the nation annually invests about \$68 billion, meaning when it comes to maintaining, not even improving, our transportation infrastructure, we are failing miserably.

How much do we use our roads? Consider the facts. One half of our nation's K-12 school population, or 24 million students, rides on 450,000 school buses 180 days per year. Fifty thousand ambulances make 60 million trips a year. Trucks carry 32 million tons of goods across the roads everyday. Two hundred forty million registered vehicles travel 2.9 trillion miles annually. While potholes can cause hundreds and even thousands of dollars of damage to vehicles, 63 percent of Americans do not have the cash on hand to pay for those repairs. And as far as the New Jersey/New York area goes, 51 percent of its roads are ranked poor. Only the areas of Los Angeles/Long Beach/Santa Ana, San Francisco/Oakland, San Jose, San Diego and Tucson rank worse.

This is not a problem that is going away anytime soon and it will have major ramifications on our way of life. The American Society of Civil Engineers believes it would cost \$2.7 trillion to fix our nation's crumbling highway and bridge infrastructure. The average annual cost for vehicle repairs due to rough pavement for individual motorists is \$377, which varies by market. Repairs typically involve tires, shock absorbers, suspension systems, struts, rims, wheel alignment and catalytic converters. According to the American Society of Civil Engineers, the cost of bad roads to American business between now and 2022 is estimated to be \$240 billion. Failure to spend \$1 in road repair typically


Road repair is an enormous problem, so let's focus solely on potholes. Of approximately 33,000 traffic fatalities each year, one-third involved poor road conditions. Despite this, vehicle travel overall is expected to increase by 25 percent by the year 2030. Large commercial vehicle traffic is expected to increase during that time by 64 percent.

Further exacerbating the problem, what works to fix potholes in warm weather doesn't work in colder temperatures. In northern climates, which includes New Jersey in the winter, most wintertime pothole repairs are temporary, so imagine the time, expenses and inconvenience.

All hope is not lost though. On Feb. 14, New Jersey Department of Transportation Acting Commissioner Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti announced the beginning of the annual statewide campaign to repair potholes throughout the state. To deal with potholes in an aggressive and efficient manner, the NJDOT has been allowing crews throughout the state to close travel lanes when necessary during daytime hours, including during peak travel times, for priority repairs. Yes, this is an inconvenience, but better that than costly repairs to multiple vehicles, as well as the threat to life. Motorists need to recognize the need for these repairs and slow down in work zones, so crews can continue to do what is necessary.

One way to better remedy the problem is the NJDOT's use of 11 state-of-the-art pothole-filling machines, which make a more durable repair than a cold patch. For a cold patch, often utilizing the brand name U.S. Cold Patch, loose material is swept away, then the cold patch is tamped down or tire rolled. For repairs deeper than 2 inches, layers are used. If the patch settles with time, more can later be applied. The new pothole-filling machines, however, can make a more durable repair than a cold patch. The pothole-filling machine is a truck that can heat a mix of asphalt and gravel before injecting the mix into the pothole. These machines require just one person to operate, with another worker operating a safety truck. These machines cover larger areas more quickly and safely, because the worker doesn't have to get out of the truck. Further they save time and money, with a longer-lasting repair. As the weather warms, crews utilizing these machines will be out in force.

In the past five fiscal years, Fiscal Year 2013 to Fiscal Year 2017, the NJDOT has repaired an average of Continued on Page 16

Linda Karlovich probably didn't figure she would be involved in a battle over state and municipal jurisdiction.

Elected to the Kenilworth Borough Council, she joined the effort of some other local municipalities in banning local pet shops from accepting dogs from socalled "puppy mills."

Late-night cable viewers have seen the heartwrenching commercials of frail dogs coming from disreputable breeding operations.

The legal battle pits animal-safety advocates against local pet shop owners. Legitimate breeders deny the assertion that they run filthy crowded operations, where dogs are caged for 24 hours straight.

Sitting with Karlovich last weekend, she laid out her case: "I want to make a statement that the morals and values of our community do not include promoting cruelty in out-of-state breeding facilities."

The animal groups have taken the position that adoption of abandoned dogs is the best route.

The opposition to the effort includes the famous American Kennel Club, which argues against proposals such as one that passed the New Jersey State Legislature.

The claim is that the new proposals are overly stringent and would punish legitimate breeders.

Last year, a bill that got to former Gov. Chris Christie's desk saw him conditionally veto a law that would have stopped both the consumer and pet shops from buying from breeders who have multiple violations of federal law.

In his veto message, Christie said he had enacted into law in 2015 a mandate that animal shops post prominently where the puppies were received from and when they got their last veterinary treatment.

"The sourcing provisions are the heart of the bill as they ensure the worst puppy mills cannot sell in New Jersey and offer peace of mind to consumers," Brian Hackett, the state director of the Humane Society of the United States, said.

Karlovich said she will continue to push for the municipal prohibition, which already has passed in Cranford and Roselle Park and is being considered in Westfield.

After a slight pause she said, "On this point, I believe we are on the right side of history."

For Hillside Councilwoman Nancy Mondella, the issue of abused animals became personal. In 2013 she adopted an abused animal.

"For six months Rocky didn't play much and barked at everyone who came into our home," she said. "The dog has become a new animal. I guess the conclusion is we needed each other."

In her proposal, Karlovich is pressing "a lack of education on the issue and misleading tactics of pet shops in some cases."

In the end, it's whether municipalities or the state should take the lead.

The education aspect is critical. Hopefully, the byproduct will be the end of those haunting commercials of abused animals.

OPINION Undertaking the cultivation of plumeria

Say the word "frangipani" to me and I think of a delicious almond pastry cream used in Italian tarts, cake and other delicacies. If you eat French pastries, you will know the same custard as "frangipane". Either way, it is delicious and harbors the sweet smell of almonds.

Tropical plant fanciers know frangipani as a flowering plant of the genus Plumeria. The fragrant flowers used to be a major component of traditional Hawaiian leis. Orchids play that role more often now, but the plumeria, or frangipani, flower is still known for its beauty and compelling scent.

The flowers in question are goldenthroated with five swirling petals apiece. Those deep throats allow pollination by sphinx moths, who are lured to them by the promise of delicious nectar. Sadly, the promise goes unfulfilled because the blooms are nectar-free. By the time the moths figure that out, they have done the job of transferring pollen.

Since last week's Philadelphia Flower Show trip, I have been the proud owner of a plumeria plant. Right now it looks like a fat, wishbone-shaped asparagus spear protruding from a 6-inch pot of soil. That is because it is a dormant stem cutting, awaiting a moment of growth and glory that will start in about two months. I have admired

plumeria for years, but have never grown one. The directions that accompanied the cutting suggest that growing this tropical shrub or small tree is the easiest thing in the world. I have heard that before.

There is no species information in the leaflet that came with my sunset-colored plumeria, but I suspect it is a variety of Plumeria rubra, the most commonly cultivated species. Though plumeria are almost universally identified with Hawaii, they are native from Mexico south to Panama. In Nicaragua, plumeria is the national flower. The numerous cultivated varieties feature flowers that can be white, yellow, pink, red, or a combination of those colors.

If you look closely at a 4-inch-wide plumeria flower, you may notice a resemblance to common vinca, another member of the dogbane, or Apocynaceae, family. Dogbane blooms are often twisted in the bud, unfurling as they open. The stems contain a white, latex-like sap that may be irritating to some people. It is a good idea to wear gloves when pruning or snipping stems.

Plumeria, or frangipani, arrived in

Hawaii as tourists in 1860. Unlike most tourists, they put down roots in the freedraining volcanic soil and became extremely popular. Hardy only in warm winter climates, Plumeria rubra can sprout into a 15 to 25 foot tall tree with an equal spread. Those of us in cold winter climates grow them in containers and the plants can be pruned to a smaller, more manageable size. This is especially necessary, because plumeria prefer an outdoor vacation in the late spring, summer and early fall.

Right now my unpromising-looking plumeria cutting is sitting in the sunniest window of my house. In accordance with the direction leaflet. I watered it when I stuck its flat end in the soil.

I will water again when the soil dries out completely and not before. Easy as they allegedly are to grow, plumeria despise wet roots

If all goes well, my plant will migrate to the back porch when outdoor temperatures are above 50 degrees Fahrenheit at night. A few months from now, probably when I have started to lose hope, the bare stalk will begin sprouting long, elliptical green leaves. I will up the watering timetable to twice a week and watch as the stalk grows and more leaves develop. When my plumeria returns to the house in the fall, it will most likely go dormant and lose those hard-won leaves. Patience is key with plumeria cuttings, because they do not bloom until the second year.

So what does a tropical plant have to do with Italian pastry? "Frangipani" comes from Latin root words that mean "broken bread". The name was bestowed on a family of bakers who eventually became part of the Italian nobility. Allegedly, a 16th century member of the house of Frangipani created a perfume to be used on gloves. The sweet smell of the plumeria flowers reminded someone of Frangipani's creation and the common name was coined. It is a long chain of links, but fragrance is the solder that holds it together.

The upgrades allow rail customers to purchase 10-trip tickets, view bus and light rail schedules, and provide more specific travel alerts and advisories.

NJ Transit travel alerts and advisories will now be customizable to selected rail lines and bus routes. After users select the rail line and/or bus route they travel, they will receive service advisories specific to their selections directly through the app.

Upgrades also include the addition of bus and light rail schedules. By entering the origin and destination of a trip and their travel date, customers can view the corresponding bus and light rail schedules in the app.

The use of mobile ticketing through the MyTix app has grown steadily since its introduction in 2013 and there are now more than 1.5 million customer accounts.

in this country, a seemingly minor leak from a faucet, shower head, toilet or other appliance can collectively result in a tremendous amount of wasted water. Since July 2017, the NJDOT has repaired more than 112,000 potholes, with the busiest pothole repair season just under way now.

In January of this year alone, the NJDOT repaired 34,800 potholes, compared to 28,000 in the same month last year.

Roads such as I-78 East in Newark, New Jersey Turnpike Hudson County, Route 80 in Morris County and the Garden State Parkway in Union County have been getting numerous complaints about potholes causing flattened tires and the like, so motorists should expect to see more pothole repair teams out there, as well as the inconvenience of more closed lanes, with the payoff of smoother roads by the time summer arrives.



Awareness of electrical hazards is the key to reducing the number of related injuries and deaths. PSE&G takes this opportunity to remind customers of a dozen ways to avoid electrical safety hazards.

 Never handle electric appliances with wet hands; electricity and water don't mix. Never use electric appliances in wet or damp conditions unless the appliances are specifically rated for it.

· Secure electric sockets around toddlers and babies. Toddlers can easily insert objects into electric outlets that are not covered properly. All outlets within reach should be protected with plastic closures that fit snugly and cannot be removed easily.

· Eliminate defective or worn electric wires. Inspect all appliances and extension cords regularly to ensure that they are in good condition. Cords should not be

loose or fraved and should have a grounding prong intact, if so equipped.

· Never pour water on an electric fire. Water acts as a conductor and can cause shock. A fire extinguisher that is rated as Class C for use on electric fires must be used.

· Leave wiring to the professionals. Proper electric wiring for any building is critical and must meet codes and standards of safety. Employ the services of a licensed professional who can do the job safely and correctly.

· Watch for overheating bulbs and lights. Lights and bulbs can be sources of heat and must be kept away from flammable materials, including upholstery, drapes, lampshades, bedding and cribs. Never exceed the maximum wattage specified for the device. Consider replacing bulbs with a lower wattage bulb.

· Never work on electric equipment with the power on. When doing work on electric equipment, ensure that all sources of electricity to the appliance are turned off. When working on or near outlets, overhead lights, or cutting into drywall, be sure to shut off the correct breaker. A simple voltage tester can be purchased for home use at a local electrical supply store. Making contact with household currents can result in death or severe burns.

· Do not misuse extension cords. Never

use extension cords as a permanent substitute for additional outlets. Also, never overload extension cords. Discard them if they have worn out wires or loose connections

· Check for covered cords and wires. Electric wires and cords radiate heat. Never cover wires with rugs or furniture. They could overheat and start a fire.

· Protect electric outlets close to sources of water. Electric outlets in bathrooms, kitchens, laundry rooms and garages should be ground fault circuit interrupting outlets to reduce the chance of electric shock. GFCI outlets are required around pools and spas. "Arc fault circuit interrupters," especially in homes with aging wiring systems, can also be added to enhance protection from fires.

· Keep ladders at least 10 feet from power lines. When working outside, always make sure that, if the ladder fell, it would not make contact with any power lines or other electrical equipment.

· Never touch or go near a downed power line. Always assume the power line is live. Immediately call PSE&G at 800-436-7734 or the local utility to report downed wires.

Proposed state budget would hike funds for local schools

Gov. Phil Murphy's first proposed budget increases state "formula" aid that goes directly to school districts by \$283.6 million, the initial step toward fulfilling the state's schoolfunding obligation, according to a March 15 press release from the N.J. Department of Education. The budget also increases aid for expanded preschool, STEM programs and other education priorities.

Within the funding plan, more than 94 percent of school districts will receive additional state aid and no school district will see a decrease in K-12 formula aid. The 546 school districts that will receive additional state support represent suburban, rural and urban communities.

"Even with these investments, we know our current school funding formula, enacted in 2008, needs to be modernized, and I ask you to work with me to make these changes so we can reach this goal of full, fair funding by the 2021-2022 school year," Murphy told legislators during his budget address March 13. "Together, we can fulfill the promises made a decade ago while ensuring that our dollars are spent according to the needs of students and districts today."

Union County schools would see an increase from 2.5 percent in Linden — equivalent to 23,771,568, to 13.7 percent for Berkeley Heights — equal to \$1,473,639.

The other county schools that would see seeing increases in aid are: Clark, \$1,288,480, 12.4 percent; Westfield, \$3,604,871, 10.9 percent; Summit, \$2,008,784, 10.6 percent; Scotch Plains-Fanwood, \$3,527,217, 10.2 percent; New Providence, \$1,162,779, 10.0 percent; Cranford, \$2,624,844, 7.7 percent; Mountainside, \$613,011, 7.6 percent; Garwood, \$504,445, 7.5 percent; Kenilworth, \$4,988,007, 6.7 percent; Winfield, \$1,807,799, 6.4 percent; Hillside, \$23,100,991, 5.0 percent; Rahway, \$22,467,291, 5.0 percent; Roselle, \$25,552,835, 5.0 percent; Roselle Park, \$11,511,568, 5.0 percent; Union County Vocational, \$6,724,531, 5.0 percent; Elizabeth, \$390,533,502, 4.6 percent; Plainfield, \$132,241,297, 4.6 percent; Union, \$32,684,260, 4.5 percent; and Springfield, \$1,547,093, 3.2 percent.

The state's school funding formula, the School Funding Reform Act of 2008, has been fully funded only once since it was enacted.

"As an educator, I'm excited about this budget because it's the first time in years that we've seen this level of emphasis on investing in education," acting Education Commissioner Lamont O. Repollet said in the press release. "We're going to focus our resources to advance the governor's education agenda, which means fully funding our schools and enhancing learning opportunities."

Murphy has also proposed eliminating off-formula addon aid categories that were created over the past several years. In addition to the new formula aid being added, his proposed budget re-allocates the money from these categories back to the same districts using the school funding formula.

The proposed budget includes a total of \$14.9 billion in

proposed state support for schools for fiscal year 2019, including pension contributions from the lottery.

The budget proposes the largest increase in preschool funding in more than a decade. Districts that currently operate a state-supported preschool program will see an increase to their per-pupil funding, and the preschool expansions that were established this year, which serve 2,000 children in 26 districts, will be made permanent. In all, the increase to existing preschool programs will total nearly \$33 million. In addition, \$25 million more in preschool expansion aid will allow for the development of new pre-school programs to serve more than 3,500 children.

The proposed budget includes a \$2 million grant program to help high schools implement college-level computer science courses, and to support teacher training for those courses.

The proposed budget includes a \$66 million increase in school security aid, allowing districts the flexibility to support school safety initiatives that fit the needs of their districts. Nonpublic schools also will receive \$75 per student in school-security funding.

In addition to aid provided directly to school districts, the state annually covers the cost of important education-related costs such as teacher pensions, retired teacher medical benefits and Social Security contributions for teachers. The proposed budget will include an additional \$478 million to support these areas in the upcoming school year.

Linden man indicted for murder in December killing

A Linden resident has been indicted for shooting a man to death in December outside the victim's home, the Union County Prosecutor's Office announced March 12.

Shansey Abernathy, 23, is charged with first-degree murder and two related seconddegree weapons offenses in connection with the killing of 27-year-old Alphonso Pearson.

Shortly after 12:45 p.m. on Dec. 20, Linden police responded to the 800 block of Cleveland Avenue for a reported shooting and found Pearson outside his home and suffering from a gunshot wound to the chest, according to Union County Assistant Prosecutor Jeremiah Lenihan, who is prosecuting the case. Pearson was rushed to Trinitas Regional Medical Center in Elizabeth, where he was pronounced dead, Lenihan said.

An ensuing investigation involving the Union County Homicide Task Force, Union County Sheriff's Office Crime Scene Unit, Union County Police Department Ballistics Unit and Linden police resulted in Abernathy being identified as a suspect. He turned himself in to authorities the day after the shooting, according to reports.

SECTION I - AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER VII Chapter VII (TRAFFIC) is amended at Section 7-14 (PARKING PROHIBITED DURING CERTAIN HOURS ON CERTAIN STREETS), only as follows:

7-14 PARKING PROHIBITED DURING CERTAIN HOURS ON CERTAIN STREETS

No person shall park a vehicle between the hours specified any day upon any of the streets or parts of streets described.

SECTION III - RATIFICATION Except as set forth herein, all other provisions and terms of the Code of the Township of Springfield shall remain in full force

Each section, subsection, paragraph, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance is declared to be an independent section, subsection, paragraph, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase or provision. In case any such portion of this Ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstances, shall be adjudged or otherwise determined to be invalid, unconstitutional, void, or ineffective for any cause or reason by a court of competent jurisdiction, such determined to be invalid, effect or invalidate the remaining portions of this Ordinance, and the application of such remaining portions shall not be affected thereby, and all such remaining portions of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. To this end, the pro-visions of each section, subsection, paragraph, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase and provision of this Ordinance are bereby declared to be severable. SECTION V - REPEAL This Ordinance is not meet to control.







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Roselle Catholic boys' basketball TOC champs

Lions win event for 3rd time to finish stellar season 29-4

TRENTON - On the second Friday in February Roselle Catholic had them.

The Lions had the No. 1-ranked team in the nation – Montverde Academy, Fla. – on the brink of its first loss.

Roselle Catholic led by six with 29 seconds left before Duke commit R.J. Barrett took the game over by scoring six points in the final 24 seconds to lift Montverde to a stunning 60-59 triumph in the Metro Classic at Kean University.

"That was a big learning experience for us," Roselle Catholic head coach Dave Boff said. "We had to learn to close games."

As it turned out, lesson well taken for the Lions.

Forward to Sunday's final game of the season. Underdog Don Bosco Prep scored the first two points of the fourth quarter to produce the game's sixth and final deadlock. All even with just under eight minutes to go.

Roselle Catholic, after it saw two 11-point second quarter leads evaporate two periods later, this time had a bit more clock to regroup and prevent what happened against Montverde.

With McDonald's All-America Nazreon Reid on the bench with four fouls and a team-leading 18 points, fellow senior Alanzo Frink made sure the Lions were going to close this one out.

After junior Josh Pierre-Louis scored inside off an offensive rebound to give Roselle Catholic its fifth lead and the advantage for good at 44-42, Frink produced a conventional 3-point play, followed up with consecutive free throws and then slammed home a convincing dunk to put the Lions ahead by eight with just over four minutes to go.

Frink went from entering the fourth quarter with seven points to finishing with 16 as his presence in the paint during the game's final eight minutes quelled Don Bosco Prep's final threat.

"With Naz in foul trouble we all had to play really hard in the fourth quarter," Frink said.

Roselle Catholic's final run of the season, an 18-4 stretch in the fourth, propelled the top-seeded Lions to a 61-54 win over second-seeded Don Bosco Prep in Sunday's 30th annual NJSIAA boys' basketball Tournament of Champions championship game at Cure Insurance Arena.

Roselle Catholic captured the TOC for the third time and gave Union County its 10th championship in 30 years, with St. Patrick winning six and Elizabeth one.

The Lions have now won the third-most TOC titles, behind St. Anthony with 13 and St. Patrick with six. Their record in four TOCs is now 7-1.

Roselle Catholic finished 29-4 – winning the most games in head coach Dave Boff's 11 seasons at the helm – and closed with a 12-game winning streak.

The Lions also finished undefeated against in-state competition, with only four out-of-state losses to foes from Pennsylvania, Virginia and two from Florida.

Also, Roselle Catholic won these five championships in the same season for the first time: division, county, section, state and TOC.

Repeat Non-Public, A state champion Don Bosco Prep became the sixth team to lose consecutive TOC finals, joining Shawnee (1995, 1996), Seton Hall Prep (1997, 1998), Shabazz (2001, 2002), Science Park (2008, 2009) and Plainfield (2011, 2012).

The Ironmen - who hung tough, played hard until the end and represented their school well - had a 19-game winning streak snapped and closed with an outstanding 28-3 mark.

Rutgers commit Ronald Harper scored eight points in the game's final minute to finish with a superb, game-high, 33point performance. Senior point guard Michael Concannon finished with 10 and St. John's commit Marcellus Earlington fouled out in the fourth quarter with five.

Reid, who will next play at LSU, came back off the bench in the fourth – he did not foul out – and led Roselle Catholic with 23 points. His final high school dunk put RC ahead 54-44 with 3:32 remaining. Reid went up high with one hand to slam home a basket off an alley-oop pass from Pierre-Louis.

"I learned a lot from Coach Boff and the staff," Reid said. "To win the TOC shows how hard work pays off.

"This was tough, but we felt all along that this was our year."

Pierre-Louis, one of the state's top 6th men, finished with eight points.

Roselle Catholic ended the first quarter on an 8-0 run to take an 18-9 lead.

Don Bosco Prep closed the second on 14-6 surge to pull to within 30-27 at intermission. Concannon drilled a 3 from the left side right before the buzzer to send the Ironmen into the locker room at halftime feeling good about themselves.

"They played well, fought hard and gave us everything they had," Reid said.

Don Bosco Prep can also say that it produced three leads in the third quarter, first going ahead by the score of 31-30 on an inside basket by Earlington after he grabbed an offensive rebound.

A free throw by Harper put the Ironmen ahead again at 32-31 and then two more free throws by Harper gave DBP its final lead of 35-33 midway through the period.

Roselle Catholic scored the game's first six points before Harper scored six straight to forge the game's first tie at 6-6.

Roselle Catholic's 11-point leads in the second quarter were 22-11 and 24-13. RC's biggest lead of 14 was 60-46 with less than two minutes to go.

Roselle Catholic senior guard Ithiel Horton finished with six points.

"Our toughness spurred us on in the fourth quarter," Horton said. "Don Bosco Prep is a good team, but they didn't face the kind of teams we did and that helped us."

Boff guided Roselle Catholic to the Union County Conference's Valley Division title in 2010 and then the Mountain Division crown in 2011 before the Lions moved up to join the big boys in the Watchung Division in 2012.

"I couldn't be more proud of a team," Boff said. "The No. 1 goal on our mind all season long was to win the TOC.

"We became the first RC team to win five championships in the same season and we've now started to separate ourselves and put ourselves in elite company with three TOC titles.

"Frink was outstanding again and has been the last few weeks and really all season long. However, everyone really contributed. It was never just one guy."

Roselle Catholic lost four times in four tries to last year's eventual TOC champion, The Patrick School of Elizabeth.

Although the Celtics were quite a different team this year minus three outstanding players lost to graduation that are now playing in college, RC and TPS games were still barnburners.

This time RC went 3-0 vs. TPS, which went a long way toward the Lions reaching their goals of accumulating five championships.

"We talked about having bouts of selfishness last year," Boff said. "We had none of that this year."

"It was an honor to play for this team," Reid said. "My teammates never quit."

Roselle Catholic has now captured four state championships and three TOC titles since 2013.
